There is always something new happening in town to further the destinations within the Minot area. This Saturday, June 25, the Ward County Historical Society is hosting the Grand Opening for their Pioneer Village Museum. The museum consists of twelve historical buildings that have been specifically brought to this new location in order to show visitors the village life during the early 1900s. Although the houses vary a little in time periods, all are equipped with furniture and artifacts of life in North Dakota from long ago.

Even though the Pioneer Village is open Tuesday thru Saturday 11-5pm for tours, the special grand opening this weekend will give visitors a chance to look through houses, experience a plethora of period-specific costumes, demonstrations and games from the turn of the century. The event will also feature live music, basket making tutorials, book signing from Hunter Andes, antique tractor and airplane displays and food and drink vendors. It is also worth mentioning that the Pioneer Village Museum is completely FREE to view! Since it is operated by the Historical Society it is free and open to the public, though they do accept donations.

OPERATION WOUNDED WARRIOR JUNE 26, 1954

On June 26, 1954, Operation Wounded Warrior began with the first flight out of Saigon, Vietnam. The 315th Air Division and 6481st Medical Air Evacuation Group (USAF) transported over 500 wounded French and Foreign Legion troops to Clark Air Base, Philippines, and then Tachikawa Air Base, Japan. The operation took two weeks and five flights in total. From Japan, the critically wounded troops were flown to the United States by Military Air Transport Service and then on to France and North Africa. Wounded Warrior was carried out by C-124 Globemasters and many of those transported were survivors of the siege of Dien Bien Phu. Two French generals and

Spouse photographer Christina Goolsby, who started taking photos when she was just 17, takes all sorts of photos, but loves to do maternity and birth shoots the most. When asked about being a military spouse and having to constantly start over she said, "There's both positive and negative aspects to being a mil spouse and being a photographer. The positive is that typically everywhere you go, there's someone who wants or needs photos. The negative has to be when you leave, you're leaving clients that you've grown to have a bond with and having to start fresh." She loves photography and her job because, "I love photography because I feel like it metaphorically stops time even when it can't physically do so."

Jasmine Landreville loves to capture natural photography. She said," I love 'in the moment' photography because that's when I feel you capture the true memories. Not just posed and filtered ones." She also mentioned that ... " I think being a photographer and a military spouse is a positive thing because you meet other military people and families and you get to connect on a level that most others don't understand! You can always take your work with you, no matter where you PCS to, and you're able to travel and see beautiful places. This differentiates military spouse photographers from other photographers because they have a wide span portfolio of different destinations they are even able to photograph. It brings so much beauty to your photos.' Jasmine said her favorite place to shoot is in downtown Minot. "I love all the original buildings, rustic structure feel and the amazing wall art that has been

painted on the brick! It shows so much beauty in Minot!"

Boudoir photographer Mariah Keith said, "This specialty-Boudoir- is just such an exciting and rewarding job. I love watching women seeing themselves in their gallery and say, 'Oh my gosh, is that me?!' It completely validates all of my hard work, and seeing them wear a confident smile when they walk away for their session is the best feeling I could've imagined in a career." All About Pets

Instead of Declawing Your Cat...

While choosing to declaw your cat may come with short term benefits for you and your household, the procedure is not in the best interest of your feline friend. Declawing is the process of amputating the front knuckles of a cat's toes so that it can no longer use its claws, and many shelters and animal advocacy groups strongly advise against it. Felines have a natural instinct to use their claws to mark territory, stretch, play, and even defend themselves in dangerous situations. When their claws are removed, cats run the risk of developing chronic pain, lameness, and behavioral issues.

If you're having problems with your cat tearing up your furniture or your arms, here are some more humane options to curb unwanted scratching and prevent the need

for declawing: •Consistent nail trimming — every few weeks should be sufficient, depending on your cat.

•Nail caps or claw covers—Soft Paws is one recommended brand for caps that are glued on to your cat's claws and can help to alleviate excessive scratching.

•Provide enrichment — toys, playtime, and designated scratching posts are great ways to keep your cat happy! They won't need to scratch your couch when they have more fun things to do around the house.

 Outside time — most people probably don't think about letting their cats outside since they can often be difficult to catch. But outside is a great place for cats to explore and hunt! Some cats will naturally



come back to their owners once they've satisfied their wanderlust, which is great for enrichment. If you're not sure if your cat will return or you're worried about their safety in a busy area, try a cat harness with a lightweight leash to take your friend on all the adventures!

•Make unwanted scratching objects unattractive — putting aluminum foil on furniture or other popular scratching areas has been said to deter some cats from going to town with their claws. Other options to deter your cat from scratching can include double-sided tape or unpleasant fragrances such as citrus.

•Training and behaviorists—if all else fails, work with your cat to deter him from scratching unwanted items. A spray bottle or a clapping noise can interrupt their behavior so that you can properly redirect them to an appropriate toy and reward them for using that instead. As a last resort, it may even be helpful to find an animal behavior specialist who can help you determine other solutions for your cat's scratching.

It is possible for a cat to have medical problems that declawing would fix, but it's important to consult with your vet to find any other possible solutions before making that decision because it can affect your cat for the rest of its life. As pet owners, it's our job to make sure our animals have everything they need to live their best lives. Instead of declawing your cat, try these alternatives to give your furry friend its best shot.

However, if you still think that, you haven't vet attended the world-famous Medora Musical in its purpose-built outdoor amphitheater set amidst the badlands of southwestern North Dakota . It will change your mind.

Located just west of Dickinson, and not too far from the South Dakota and Montana borders, is the town of Medora. North Dakota - population 129. The entire town encompasses less than one square mile, but the quaint feel will make any one feel at home and maybe start to fall in love with the state. Medora town offers a few blocks of 'mom and pop' restaurants, historic sites and intriguing shops. The shops are more than your average gift shop, including lots of handcrafted and made-in-state items from local vendors. I fell in love with handcrafted vases made from trees and unique spiral candles. If you need (or want) North Dakota items, Medora is the place to go!

The completely-walkable town is only a block or two but is packed with things to do. It has the most amazing log fort playground for the kids. This maze-like play structure has sand pits with toys, a special area just for toddlers, plenty of stairs and obstacles for climbing kids and includes nice and shady places for parents to sit. Plus it is located right next to the free public bathrooms. Next to that, is a fun perk for all ages, the Theodore Roosevelt National Park themed, Medora Mini Golf. Newly-built this year is the "Point to Point Park," which features a free splash pad, kids ziplines, pickleball courts and a bounce pillow. For a small fee there is also a luxurious pool with a lazy river and a larger zipline for those who dare. My daughter and I had a blast!

While there is plenty to do in the tiny town, there are only a few places to stay within the town itself. Since Medora hosts only local accommodations (no chain hotel or restaurants in sight), the center of town is home to the Badlands Motel. This motel is perfectly located to walk to all Medora attractions (besides the Musical) and is so close to the playgrounds and Point Park that kids and parents alike will love the ease. The motel is updated, offering the comforts of any hotel but with the

amenities so nearby it almost has a resort feel. The photos posted online don't do this place justice, and the lobby has free coffee and lemon-infused water for its guests. Since camping is so popular with the state, I would be remiss not to also mention the Medora Campground located just out of town. This beautiful campground has all types of sites and the cottonwood trees and beautiful nature to accommodate it. It also has a playground and basketball court, plus a small store for camping items and is a very short walk to the city swimming pool. While a drive (and parking) will be required when visiting the town, the campground is the perfect stay for those who love the outdoors.

Finally, any stay in Medora would not be complete without a visit to the Musical! This Broadway-like performance may seem a bit out of place in a tiny town in North Dakota, but once you visit, you'll get it. The amphitheater is placed high on a butte with gorgeous views of the landscape, and when the sun sets it offers the viewers an open-skied image that looks like a painting. Besides the breathtaking views, the Musical is filled every year with The Burning Hills Singers, an ensemble of some of the best singers/dancers from all over the country. This group of a dozen performers really will knock your socks off with professional-level talent. The Musical is slightly different each year, and always offers new performers and hosts to entertain all ages. The musical this year featured renditions of classic country songs that had the entire 1000+ seat amphitheater smiling and swaying along. Besides the musical sensations and live music performances, the Musical features an entr'acte performance from guest stars which perform for a few weeks during the summer. The ventriloquist, Lynn Trefzger had the entire audience cry-laughing as she brought audience members on stage and performed voice-overs. Trefzger will be the guest star until July 10 when BAM!, who uses the art of comedy-percussion, will perform until the end of July. As the under two-hour show comes to an end, guests are treated to the dusk sky and lights lighting the MEDORA sign backdrop. The entire night is magical, impressive and worth it to go back year after year! This in itself will awe any North Dakota skeptic that doubts there is anything spectacular about this state. I almost teared up at the overwhelming beauty, love, and joy that this musical brings. Go see the Musical this Summer!

All in all, Medora is one of North Dakota's proudest places! BAKED ARTICHOKE DIP

INGREDIENTS 10 CLOVE GARLIC, PEELED OLIVE OIL 1/2 CUP PARMESAN CHEESE 1/2 CUP ASIAGO CHEESE

1/2 CUP ASIAGO CHEESE 1/2 CUP FONTINA CHEESE 1/2 CUP PROVOLONE CHEESE 8 OUNCE CREAM CHEESE 1/2 CUP MAYONNAISE 1 (14 OZ) ARTICHOKES, DRAINED AND CHOPPED 1 TEASPOON KOSHER SALT 1 TEASPOON KOSHER SALT 1 TEASPOON COARSE GROUND BLACK PEPPER SLICED BAGUETTE, CRACKERS OR SLICED VEGETABLES, FOR SERVING When ready to cook, set the Traeger temperature to 350°F and preheat with the lid closed for 15 minutes. Place garlic cloves in a small oven-safe pan and add enough olive oil to coat the garlic.

Place on grill and cook for 35 to 40 minutes. Garlic is done when soft enough to push a fork through the garlic easily. Remove from grill and let cool. After cooling, separate the garlic and oil and reserve the garlic-oil for use in other recipes. Place garlic in a bowl and mash with a fork until it is a smooth paste. If it seems dry, add a little of the garlic-oil.

Mix together the Parmesan, Asiago, fontina and provolone cheeses. Set aside 1/2 cup of cheese mixture for topping the dip. Combine the cheese mixture with the cream cheese, mayonnaise, garlic and artichokes. Mix well and add salt and pepper to taste.

Place mixture in an oven-safe dish and top with 1/2 cup of reserved cheeses. Place the dip on the grill at 350° and bake for 60 minutes.

Serve dip with sliced baguette, crackers or sliced vegetables. Enjoy!

TRAIN NOW; TRAIN SMART Patricia Stockdill

We're just into the early days of summer's official arrival but grouse season is right around the corner with its tentative Sept. 10 opening date.

Don't blink, because the state's resident waterfowl season is – once again tentative – slated to follow beginning Sept. 24.

And, of course, then it's the revered (and, yes, still tentative until Gov. Doug Burgum signs the official hunting proclamation) Oct. 12 pheasant opener.

The big question of the day is "just how well-conditioned is that four-legged Hunting Maniac?"

Oh, sure, he or she was probably romping in the water whenever the family headed to the lake.

He or she probably romped in the yard already this summer. That's a good thing – a really good thing. .

But are they really, truly ready for the rigors of hunting season? Preseason conditioning and training shouldn't start the day before the season opens. In reality, it should have started much earlier.

But take heart, it's not too late for proper preparation, training tune-ups, and conditioning – and still be ready for hunting season. It is, after all, only early summer.

For starters, be smart about preseason conditioning by avoiding the heat of the day – take that four-legged Hunting Maniac out for a few minutes in the morning or evening.

Start gradually, let them rest, and always keep them hydrated. It's not just people who need water for a life welllived. Gradually build up their conditioning and exercise program.

Purina offers some other tips when it comes to training: •Re-enforce basics. Friendly little reminders are good for dogs of all ages, especially because they know fall is coming. They're more than ready and that means they're more than excited.

It's hard to contain excitement so take time to remind them they need to sit, stay, heel, and all of those other wonderful basic commands they know but don't want to bother with because they're focused on the upcoming hunting season.

•Don't condone undesirable behavior. Yes, the Hunting Maniac really should retrieve the bird to hand, not jump out of the pickup or crate until released, or try to jump over the moon to grab a bird you're carrying.

.

Upland hunting situations can be re-created so the dog learns to follow hand signals.

And retrieving training can be as simple as tossing a training dummy. Some really neat ones on the market even look like a teal, mallard, pheasant, and Canada goose, complete with wiggly tail and rope that doubles as its tail for ease of tossing. Plus they're almost life-size.

•Whether it's preseason training and conditioning or real world hunting, water really, truly is essential for people and dogs, alike.

They need frequent rests and water breaks, especially when afield early in the season. Just like people, dogs can become dehydrated and suffer heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Monitor their physical condition and activity during preseason exercise and training sessions.

Try adding a small quantity of broth to their water for dogs who don't like to drink from a squirt bottle or bowl because they're too excited to quit running, playing, training, and hunting.

The flip side to that are dogs who gulp too much water, which is also unhealthy. Put small quantities in the bowl to help prevent that beloved Hunting Maniac from drinking too much too fast.

- So get out there.
- Train. Condition. Teach.

Yes, it's a busy time of year. But it's important to take the steps from learning obedience to conditioning and progressing to the actual hunt and hunting season. If a dog is making mistakes it's better to correct them sooner rather than late – before the real hunt begins.

And remember, hunting season will be here before we know

•Re-create reality. Nothing is better than real life, in the field training. But let's be honest – that's not always possible. However, with a little imagination a backyard can double as a hunting simulator.

For example, duck hunters can practice having the dog sit in an area with limited visibility, spread out some duck or goose decoys, and work with him or her so they learn to patiently wait until given a command to retrieve.

This Brittany, Huni, knows it's only June but patiently awaits being released from her "down" command during an early morning training session.

Exit surveys aim to identify attrition trends, improvement needs

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio --

With the competition for talent fierce across the Department of Defense and industry, finding ways to keep skilled civilian experts on the job is critical to the ability to meet current and future warfighting needs.

A new exit survey initiative aims to help Air Force Materiel Command leadership better understand why people leave the organization and identify opportunities to improve retention and engagement.

"Our goal is to collect consistent, quantifiable data that can help us assess perceptions of the workplace mission, regarding culture. leadership, communication, and employee recognition," said Ashley Morgan, chief, AFMC Personnel Programs. "Ultimately, we want to understand why people are leaving the organization, whether for a new position, retirement or other, and to better understand if we need to make changes to our work environment in order to increase employee engagement and minimize turnover.'

The anonymous exit survey will be hosted on Survey Monkey and be a standardized item on outprocessing checklists for civilians leaving any AFMC headquarters or center organization. The questions asked will be the same for all exiting employees, regardless of center affiliation, in order to ensure the collected data can be accurately assessed for trends.

Survey questions cover a wide-range of topics including mission and culture, leadership, communication, resources, recognition, training and more. The survey also captures the reasons an individual is leaving the organization, including voluntary retirements, job transfers, reassignments and more.

"We want to understand if there are different factors that are driving the attrition of diverse demographic groups," said Morgan. "To implement the best change actions based on this data, we need to understand the overall reasons affecting each individual as well as the demographic group's decision to leave the organization."

The exit survey is one of a number of tools that AFMC is using to address talent management and retention across the mission. These include widespread use of workforce flexibilities such as remote work and telework, use of centralized hiring cells for entry and developmental positions, expedited hiring timelines and use of Direct-Hire Authorities to bring new talent faster.

However, while acquiring new talent is important, it is critical that the command retain the highly specialized, trained experts who are key to keeping our Air Force mission ready.

"Skilled employees are critical for mission success. We must understand why they want to stay and what makes them leave. This effort provides, for the first time, a mechanism to help identify changes that we need to make to retain top performers," said Bill Snodgrass, AFMC Director of Manpower, Personnel and Services. "Talent management matters. If we can continue to improve our workplaces and make AFMC a choice organization in which to work, we will benefit from having the best and brightest on our teams long into the future."

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

10 Tips to Respect Wildlife, Stay Safe and How to Avoid Internet Ridicule

As we're gearing up for record numbers of visitors in our state and national parks this summer, read these 10 tips to help keep wildlife wild, preserve your physical integrity and prevent your park experience from turning into an involuntary YouTube sensation.

Many local, state, and national parks could see record crowds this summer. And given visitors' increasing propensity to document their park experience at all costs, resulting in painful encounters between visitors and wildlife with the visitors on the wrong end of the stick (no pun intended). The consequences can be tragic. Several animals die as a result, and sometimes people do, too.

The main rule to follow is simple, really: Keep your distance, at least 100 yards from bears and wolves and 25 yards from other wildlife. So let's say you're at Theodore Roosevelt National Park, and you pull up and observing a bison alongside the road that's grazing, you want the bison to continue grazing. You don't want to do something that actually alters their behavior.

The following 10 tips are based on the National Park Service's safety instructions and their recommendations from the wildlife experts. This is by no means an exhaustive list, so check with local rangers for information relating to a specific park and read any warning literature given to you as you enter a park. These materials often contain very specific advice regarding the species within a particular park.

1. DON'T HONK AT WILDLIFE

Animal sightings often create road congestion as people line up to take pictures. Bear sightings and the chaos they create are so common in parks, also known as "bear jams". There is a reason female bears actually choose to spend time near roads, You can be in a bear jam, people will honk their horns, they'll whistle, they'll try to get the attention of the animal, remember all of these things will stress the wildlife.

2. WATCH YOUR STEP — AND THE COLOR OF YOUR SHOES

As you walk on a beach, make sure not to step on birds' or turtles' nests — the same goes for rock climbers encountering nesting raptors. The color of your footwear can matter, too. If you're attending a sea turtle hatchling release at say at Padre Island National Seashore, avoid wearing white shoes. The turtles use the white foam of the waves, the moon and the reflection of sunlight on the water to find their way to the ocean. White shoes, clothing and lights can disorient them and cause them to lose precious energy, which in turn makes them more vulnerable to predators.

8. DON'T FEED THE WILDLIFE

Don't feed the wildlife, even if the wildlife is begging. Coyotes and bears that get a taste of human food will often come back for more and can become aggressive in doing so. Animals can pay the ultimate price for their cravings. Mammals are not the only ones involved. Ravens have been known to unzip/unfasten many different kinds of packs and containers. In summary, store your food away, use bear-proof containers if necessary, and cover your car with a tarp when visiting vulture or marmot country.

9. THE ROAD DOESN'T BELONG TO YOU

Even on the roads within state and national parks, wildlife has the right of way. Obey the speed limits and pay particular attention at dawn and dusk when many mammals and reptiles are most active. Seasons and weather variations can also trigger migrations of large numbers of animals (salamanders, turtles, monarch butterflies and tarantulas, for instance).

10. DON'T TOUCH THE WILDLIFE

Some visitors have dared to pet bison and were very fortunate to escape unscathed. You shouldn't try to emulate them. Wildlife doesn't like to be handled. Did you know that if they are stressed out, they will void their bladder and thereby lose the water they need to survive extended periods without water?

These wildlife safety tips aren't fool-proof, the advice I am providing is based on my experiences and research and what I've learned talking with state and national park rangers. When you are traveling to an unfamiliar region, you should do your own research and ask local rangers questions about wildlife before you hit the trail. Being smart is the first step to staying safe.
