Team Minot observes 9/11 Remembrance Day

The ceremony was a part of a daylong event in honor of 9/11 Remembrance Day. As a part of the ceremony firefighters, security forces and medical personnel assembled in formation to honor the heroes from that day.

"As mentioned before, many of you here joined after the events of Sept 11th," said Hoadley. proud to serve alongside brave Americans who raised their hand to serve knowing we were at war during a critical time of our history. Today we will continue to honor those we lost and keep our promise to never forget.

Civil Engineer Squadron hosted this year's 9/11 Remembrance Day events. The day's events also included a stair climb and name reading of the 343 firefighters who lost their lives that

Each participant paid tribute to a New York City Fire Department firefighter by climbing up a hill or walking the equivalent of the 110 stories of the World Trade Center. Each individual tribute not only remembers the sacrifice of an FDNY firefighter, but also symbolically represents their heroic journey to save others.

Through participation in these events, attendees ensured each of the firefighters lost during 9/11 were honored and that the world knows that they will never forget the nearly 3,000 men and women who lost their lives 21 years ago.

When the north tower was struck at 8:46 a.m., first responders began responding to ground zero. They established command and control, aided evacuations, and began treating the injured, while also beginning their last stair climb into both the north and south world trade center towers. Within an hour of the north tower being struck it began to collapse and within 10 it fell.

"To quote President Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg address, 'It rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us that from these honored dead we take increased commitment to the cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion," Hoadley said.

Continuing to Talk Like A Farmer

A few weeks back we introduced you all to some of the local vocabulary at harvest time. I realize that there are a fair number of Minot AFB personnel that have grown up on a farm the Midwest, but then there are a lot of new Airmen and families, and I just want to make sure that they are introduced to a bit of our local farming culture.

If you were here last year you know that it was an unusually dry summer. The dreaded "D" word, (drought) was common to describe farming conditions in North Dakota, and well for pretty much of the Midwest. On our family farm there was talk of not "firing up" the combine at all. Thousands of dollars in input expenses (what you pay to plant your crop) wasted on what appeared to be one of those lost crops. As it turned out, late rains made a substantial difference on some of the fields of soybeans, and even later planted wheat, but it would certainly be fair to say that the crop of 2021 was a disappointment.

What a difference a year can make. Well really there are two factors that affected this year's crop. Rain and rain. Rain that came late last fall assured farmers that there would be moisture during spring seeding. And then there was the late snow in April and finally the continued above average moisture through the early growing season. Drought, although it lingered well into summer because of the extreme dry conditions, was no longer the buzz word. Instead we heard about above average topsoil moisture (where seeds get planted) and adequate subsoil moisture. A wave of optimism began to creep back into the farming communities. Another benefactor in what could be described as a very wet spring was the pastures and hay lands. More grass for cattle, more hay for keeping those cattle longer. The evidence was the unusual amount of bales that dotted the landscape.

So turn the page to another chapter, harvest. My Dad used to be a telephone man in the middle of North Dakota. He used to tell me that "if the crops look good from the road, that means a full combine." Hey folks, the crops did look good from the road. And although it is very dry right now, it is almost perfect harvest weather. Turn back the clock a bit to the

that dump hail, referred to on the

Northern plains as the "Great White

Combine". And now another of those words used in our farming communities, it's a bumper crop. Yeah, one of those better than average crops that fills the bins and puts smiles on everyone from the farmer to the local merchants downtown who know that there will be extra spending money this winter. We certainly appreciate each and every one of the dollars that the Minot AFB pump into our communities, but the ag economy still drives North Dakota, and unlike the boom and bust of the energy sector economy, the farming community does not have quite the high "highs" and low "lows" that go along with the global oil economy.

Finally, I had a conversation with my classmate and best friend from high school yesterday. When I asked about the harvest he said "best I can remember". Some wheat fields yielding 70 plus bushels to the acre. Folks, that is a bumper, bumper

crop. And in his words, prices are decent, and the quality of the grain is above average, even though we didn't have much rain towards the end of the growing season. All in all, a great year, so far, in the farming communities of North Dakota. Something to put in your Christmas cards when you write home this holiday season.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

Now that harvest is in full swing, a lot of things come to mind, but there is one thing I doubt many people think about and that is the loss of the old, wooden elevators,

sometimes called prairie skyscrapers. On Sunday, we made a trip to Bismarck to purchase a lawn mower and went through the community of Coleharbor. There are, of course, two of the original structures still standing tall against a backdrop of canola, barley and wheat.

These prairie icons are quickly disappearing. There are still some around, but as time deteriorates the buildings, owners have no choice but to side with safety. The elevators at Coleharbor are a good example. As you drive by, you can see right

through the buildings, and in a word, both are unsafe.

Several of these old structures are still in use, however. The companies owning them have gone to great lengths to make the necessary upgrades to keep them functional since many of them were built from the early 1890s into the 1930s.

I've personally seen a number of the prairie skyscrapers dismantled or destroyed to make room for new, modern, concrete structures, or to make room for open spaces or other buildings.

Growing up in Hazelton, we had two elevator companies. There was the Farmers Union Elevator and Peavey, two competing companies in a small town. First, the railroad went, then Peavey, then Farmers Union. It forever changed the Hazelton skyline. Today, the community water tower is the only thing poking out above the tree canopy.

One day I was on my way to Jamestown on Interstate 94 and as I approached the community of Cleveland, I saw the local grain elevator being toppled right there on site. It was quite a spectacle. It seemed as if the colossal structure dropped over in slow motion.

I've seen prairie elevators taken down in Foxholm and Carpio and although I wasn't in Ĥazelton to witness either elevator being destroyed, I know the Peavey structure was burned down as a training exercise for the local fire department.

Many years ago, my brother tore an elevator down in the ghost town of Sanger, in Oliver County. He didn't get paid for doing it, but could keep all the wood from the structure and anything else that was in the elevator. To this day, he isn't sure it was worth it, even though there was a sizable amount of copper wire that he sold.

Up until the late 1970s, there was an elevator in downtown Bismarck, on the corner of Ninth Avenue and Main Street. It was always interesting to see that building in downtown Bismarck. After it was torn down, I believe a parking lot for St. Alexius Hospital was put in its place.

And for those of us in North Dakota who are able to watch Canadian television, even the iconic grain elevator in the hit CTV comedy Corner Gas, was torn down. It was a

typical Saskatchewan elevator in the town of Roleau (aka Dog River), but after the show was canceled after six years, it was decided to take one of the most recognizable structures in Canada down for safety purposes.

I know there are people out there who photograph old grain elevators. I've looked at some of those photos, from St. Agathe, Manitoba to Spokane, Wash. Montana and Idaho still have plenty of prairie skyscrapers, as does Alberta and South Dakota.

There's one picture floating around that I think was taken in Mott shortly before World War I. It shows horses and wagons lined up to 10 or 12 individual elevators. It's a striking photo that shows harvest as it once was.

In Kansas, it's a little different. You'll see a mix of modern and old, but many of the elevators in Kansas are massive, even the oldest ones.

Here in North Dakota, we still have some that haven't gone by the wayside. It would be good if we could preserve some of them so that we never forget how massive amounts of grain used to be handled before modern silos and before unit

Last Monday, I went to the Soggy Doggy Pool Paw-ty at Roosevelt Park Pool. My sons and I found seats on the bleachers to watch dogs jump from diving boards and wade in the kiddie pool. 90 minutes each week to sit quietly, while trying to spell difficult words. You'll wear ill-fitting polo shirts to competitions—no one really knows how old they are. There are no rewards for participating; no extra credit will be given. There are no prizes if your team wins. The bus you'll take to meets has no air conditioning. Maybe you'll become a better speller. Maybe not. No guarantees.

Who wants to sign up?

And enough other people to eventually overflow our roster, allowing me to become an alternate. This meant my score only counted if multiple teammates were unable to compete, or in the event of a tie.

Dull description aside, my single season on Spell Bowl is one of the things I remember most fondly about my senior year. Nothing about the experience stands out except how absurd it was that Spell Bowl became something fun, memorable, and in the quirkiest way—even cool.

Based on the description, it shouldn't have been any of those things—but it was. I joined, because I'm a joiner. I stayed, beyond necessity, because it was an undeniably good time.

Minot is like Spell Bowl in all the best ways.

It might not seem excitingenjoyable—when even first described, but because of the genuine enthusiasm, and willingness to participate in the people who live here, it's something paradoxically lovely.



've always been an eager participator; I think that's why I feel so at home in Minot. It's a community of participators. Need someone to join in? Chances are I'll raise my hand.


RACQUEL LABADIE, GS-12, USAF PRIVATIZED HOUSING RESIDENT ADVOCATE **5TH BOMB WING**

KNOWLEDGE IS KEY

unlock doors to many Knowledge can opportunities.

And knowledge is key when it comes to unlocking a hunting dog who inadvertently ventured into a trap or cable device when in the field.

It's better to be proactive, educated, and prepared when it comes to dealing with in-the-field injuries and that includes knowing what to do in the event a dog becomes entangled in a trap or cable device.

One of the best ways a dog owner can become educated is obtaining the three N.D. Game and Fish Department brochures developed by the department's furbearer biologist Stephanie Tucker – herself a trapper and dog owner.

Part of a wide array of Game and Fish Department specialty publications and brochures, the brochures include "Foothold Traps - Identification, Use, & Removing A Dog", "Cable Devices – Identification, Use & Removing A Dog", and "Body-Grip Traps — Identification, Use, & Removing A Dog".

All three booklets can be ordered from the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov) or are available at Game and Fish Department offices and many cooperating agencies as well as by mail by calling (701) 328-6300 to request copies.

Finding your dog in a trap or cable device can be gutwrenching but the best thing a dog owner can do is try to remain calm, which helps a person focus on quickly and competently removing the dog from the device.

It helps to understand that a cable device works much like a dog collar. Sometimes the cable's lock can be slid to enlarge the loop and remove the dog. Or, by carrying a cable cutter designed to cut galvanized aircraft cable a person can also cut the wire to remove the dog.

Education is important, but so, too, is awareness. Public lands such as Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas are meant for multiple user groups, including trapping and snaring. It's a good idea for all dog owners - not just hunters but anyone simply hiking in the outdoors on a WMA –

to familiarize themselves with trapping regulations, seasons, trap and cable device types, and release techniques and equipment.

Trappers with traditional foot-hold or body-grip traps and cable devices are required to obtain written permission from private landowners. When a hunter has the opportunity to contact the landowner to ask for hunting permission, it doesn't hurt to ask if they are allowing trapping or the use of cable devices so a person is aware of their potential presence.

Taking safety and awareness a step farther, it can also be beneficial to find out what other state and federal agencies allow – or don't allow – on the public land they manage when it comes to trapping and cable devices.

Regardless of land ownership, dog owners should keep track of their dogs and not let them out of their sight for prolonged periods of time, whether trapping or hiking.

The idea of developing the brochures evolved because of dog/trap encounters in neighboring states as well as occasional situations in North Dakota.

Each brochure describes the device and how it works on its intended target, whether a body-grip trap, any of the various types of foothold traps, or a cable device - and perhaps most importantly explains techniques for safely and efficiently removing a dog from the device, including drawings to help illustrate devices and removal techniques.

The brochures are free. Go to the Game and Fish Department website link, (gf.nd.gov/publications/ order) to order a copy of the brochures detailing information on how to release dogs from traps and cable devices as well as any of the other wide array of booklets, brochures, and posters available at no

A dog owner doesn't have to be a trapper or biologist to know what to do. They simply need to get the brochures and become educated and aware.

It can save a dog by sharing that knowledge with



Groundbreaking Naturalization Ceremony at Minot AFB

Airman Amin Ahmadi, a 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron management office apprentice, and Airman 1st Class Jorge Peralta, a 5th Force Support Squadron classification technician, were the first Airmen to go through the enhanced naturalization process, becoming citizens of the United States at Minot AFB, Aug. 31, 2022.

After going through the previous procedure consisting of numerous hurdles and trips herself, Senior Airman Jessica Ramsay, a 5th Bomb Wing judge advocate military justice paralegal, revamped the process for the Airmen seeking naturalization

"I worked with a working group to formulate this new process and to get the cooperation from the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services," said Ramsay. "It was a process that took about a year. There were attempts to improve this procedure in the past, but it finally came full circle, and we were able to pull it off today."

Given the location of Minot AFB, it was important to Ramsay to see what she could do to bring the process closer to the personnel on base. She herself was a foreign national when she joined the Air Force and felt that her experience of becoming a U.S. citizen was less than ideal.

All the appointments, to include

the interview, fingerprinting and the oath ceremony are four and a half hours away in Fargo, North

"This is a significant inconvenience both for the "This member and their unit considering the member would have to often leave during work hours to attend these appointments, which aren't considered permissible TDYs,"

said Ramsay.

In recent years, restrictions have been placed to the Basic Military Training (BMT) naturalization ceremony. Ramsey hopes one day these restrictions will be lifted and the ceremony will make its way back to BMT, but for now she feels having a naturalization ceremony at Minot AFB is the best

"I'm very thankful for everyone who has contributed to this," said Peralta. "For future U.S. residents who wish to enlist, having this procedure right here at our base, it means a lot."

One of Asmad's strongest reasons for obtaining citizenship is to make the process of visiting his family easier.

"For me, the American dream is

something very odd," said Asmad. "I'm a very simplistic person, I don't desire much, aside from completing my education, making my parents proud, and having a family and not having to have them deal with the nuances of growing up in a developing country, and having to deal with being a first-generation immigrant









Striker Airmen Coder program sees software built by maintainers to save time for maintainers

The Striker Airmen Coder program cohort saw new software built by Air Force Global Strike Command maintainers to save time for maintainers.

AFGSC devised the SAC program as an effort to develop Air Force coders who can create innovative and efficient technical solutions within their own units.

The Airmen created Mercury, a fleet maintenance schedule program, as an AFGSC software

"I never coded, and this program really laid that foundation. If you have no coding experience, it's a challenge but it's well worth experience," said Senior

Airman Robert Davenport, B-52 maintainer at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana.

Five Airmen and one civilian were selected through an aptitude test before undergoing a coding boot camp for three months. They spent a further three months working with Ruby Shore Software based in Shreveport, Louisiana, to develop their project as junior developers.

SAC participants said they gained new technical skills and new experience with software, in addition to learning how to work with a team, over the course of the program.

"I never knew any sort of coding but the training and coming here to fully implement what I learned with our industry partner was an amazing experience," said Senior Airman Mercedes Porter, of Dyess Air Force Base, Texas.

Nick Phillips, Ruby Shore Software chief technical officer, described SAC as a fulfilling experience for his company.

"We're thrilled with Mercury, the product these Airmen delivered in their short time here in the Barksdale Air Force Base area," Phillips said. "Thank you to the fantastic Airmen we've had the privilege of working with and guiding. We've worked hard to improve our process in the Strike Airmen Coders from cohort to cohort, and the Airmen are

instrumental in that effort."

The SAC program administered by the Cyber Innovation Center through Partnership Intermediary Agreement with AFGSC.

The teams demoed their project Aug. 26 during a presentation

held for AFGSC staff and the Office of the Chief Scientist at STRIKEWERX in Bossier City, Louisiana.

The project will now be analyzed by AFGSC for future scalability and further development.



NOTES ON BEING SAFE

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY: KNOW AND WATCH YOUR SURROUNDINGS

5TH BOMB WING OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH MANAGER Did you know approximately you should always be alert. You can encounter a pedestrian anytime and anywhere, even in places where they are not supposed to be. They can be hard to see, especially at

5.900 pedestrians in America are killed by automobiles every year? Almost one-third of these victims are children under the age of 15. All of us are pedestrians at one time or another, and are obligated to abide by the same traffic laws that assure the safety whether we are walking, bicycling or the motorist, or an adult or child. As parents we are also obligated to teach our children the importance of traffic safety, especially in housing areas where streets have a tendency of being smaller. Here are a few pedestrian safety tips to follow: • Walk on the sidewalks - Stay

- on the sidewalks and crosswalks. Avoid walking in traffic if there are no sidewalks or crosswalks. If you have no other choice, walk facing the traffic.
- Look LEFT, RIGHT, and LEFT for vehicles – Stop at the curb and look LEFT, then RIGHT, then LEFT again. Stopping at the curb signals drivers that you intend to cross. Cross in marked crosswalks and obey the signals.
- See and be seen- Stay out of the driver's blind spot. Make eye contact with the driver when crossing busy streets. If walking at dusk or dark, wear reflective gear and carry a flashlight. Vision is more impaired at night.


• Watch your children – Do not let your children play in the streets or close to the roads. Do not let them cross the roads without While walking supervision. through the housing area ensure to be aware of any cars pulling out of their driveways, especially if they are backing out. They may not always see you. Children are small, unpredictable, and cannot judge vehicle distance and speeds. Start teaching your children at an early age on traffic safety. Teach the colors of all of the traffic lights and the vehicle lights and what they mean. Educate the importance of not darting out on the road, even to chase a ball.

As a motorists on Minot AFB do not always assume the people around you are paying attention. Sometimes their attention can be diverted especially if they're children. All people are unpredictable and as a motorist,

night or while it's raining. Slow down if you can not see clearly. Stop for pedestrians who are in the crosswalks and when you stop for a pedestrian in the crosswalk, make sure you are far enough back for cars in the other lane to see the pedestrian in time to stop. If vehicles are stopped in the street in front of you, do not just assume you can pass them, maybe their waiting for a pedestrian to cross the road. When turning right on a red right, always look to the right as well as the left to make sure pedestrians are not crossing in the crosswalk. If you spot a pedestrian wearing headphones or using a cellular

not hear your vehicle. vigilant at all times, especially in areas where children may dart out unexpectedly into traffic areas. These include base housing and school areas, near school buses and around ice cream trucks. While backing out of your driveway, always look in your back window as well as your mirrors to ensure no kids are behind you. If you have to, walk around the vehicle before driving out.

One last tip to keep in mind, if you see a child in the front yard or near a curb, always assume they will dart out on the road. If you always keep this in mind, this will lessen the chances of a child being struck. By paying attention to your surroundings, whether you are the pedestrian or the motorist. It could be a matter of life or death.

A U.S. Air Force B-52H Stratofortress assigned to Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, performed a flyover during a Southern University and A&M College football game, Sept. 3, 2022.

The flyover was conducted to promote recruitment as part of Air Force Global Strike Command's Project Tuskegee. The project—a partnership with Tuskegee University—affords Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets the opportunities available as an AFGSC "Striker." Members from the 5th Bomb Wing volunteered to participate in the flyover operations in support of Project Tuskegee.

"My hope is that in some way I was able to provide some form of inspiration and representation to a kid, teenager, student or cadet that looks like me," said Capt. Zaquero Hartnett, a 69th Bomb Squadron electronic warfare officer. "Someone who was able to see us overhead and witness how amazing flying can be. Maybe this was their first ever flyover, and now they start thinking I can do that, I can fly too. It's a special feeling knowing that in some way you are affecting the future aviators out there and if they ever need anyone you have their back."

As a part of AFGSC, Team Minot has a critical role in strategic deterrence and global security through the missions of the 5th Bomb Wing and the 91st Missile Wing. Outreach events like the flyover showcase how diversity and inclusion are critical in accomplishing the mission.

"The 5th Bomb Wing was privileged to lead the charge on a series of upcoming flyovers

The command is entering an era of transformation as it begins to transition from legacy systems to more modern weapon systems

based on new technologies.

Anthony Cotton. Gen. commander of AFGSC, takes the task of delivering long-range strike capability across the globe as his charge. He sees this task requiring a mindset of modernization across the command that provides opportunities to all, while also embracing the rich history of Global Strike.

"All Airmen stand on the shoulders of the Tuskegee Airmen," Cotton said. Tuskegee Airmen were critical to the success of bomber forces during World War II, proving we are better when everyone has an opportunity to contribute."

US bombers exercised mine dropping over Öland

SWEDISH ARMED FORCES HEADQUARTERS

Friday, the Swedish Armed Forces and US Air Force conducted a joint exercise above Öland. Two Stratofortress B-52 exercised mine dropping together with the Swedish navy.

When the US bombers entered Swedish air space, they were escorted by Swedish JAS 39 Gripen. Off the eastern coast of Öland, a Visby-class corvette guided the bombers, marking the area where mines were to be laid in the exercise.

"Broadly speaking, the exercise involves the identification of an area in Swedish territorial waters, where we wish to prevent opponent movements. The US bombers then drop mines in the area", says Chief Swedish Navy, Rear Admiral Ewa Skoog Haslum. NO LIVE MINES USED

The mine dropping was simulated in the exercise. No live ammunition was used. After the exercise, the US bombers were escorted due north and around noon, observant citizens were able to see and hear the planes in the Stockholm area.

"The Bomber Task Force exercise is very important to us. Within a few weeks, we have obtained


proof that all our service branches have the capability of joint action with US Bomber Task Force", says Commander Joint Force Generation Command, Lieutenant General Johan Svensson.

"The Swedish Air Force is able to protect them, the ground units can conduct Close Air Support and the navy is capable of neutralising sea targets. There is no doubt that this enhances our capability of defending Sweden", says Lieutenant General Johan Svensson.

Minuteman III test launch showcases readiness of U.S. nuclear force's safe, effective deterrent

AIR FORCE GLOBAL STRIKE COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen launched an unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile equipped with three test re-entry vehicles from Vandenberg Space Force Base, California, at 1:13 a.m. Pacific Time Sept. 7 to demonstrate the readiness of U.S. nuclear forces and provide confidence in the lethality and effectiveness of the nation's nuclear deterrent.

This test launch is part of routine and periodic activities intended to demonstrate that the United States' nuclear deterrent is safe, secure, reliable and effective to deter twenty-first century threats and reassure our allies. Such tests have occurred more than 300 times before, and this test is not the result of current world events.

The ICBM's reentry vehicles traveled approximately 4,200 miles to the Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands. These test launches verify the accuracy and reliability of the ICBM weapon system, providing valuable data to ensure a continued safe, secure and effective nuclear deterrent.

"We have had a busy test schedule just in the past few months and I am in awe of the way our team has performed during each mission,' said Col. Christopher Cruise, 576th Flight Test Squadron Commander. "Today's launch sends a visible message of assurance to our allies, and I couldn't be more proud of the mission of continued deterrence this launch represents."

The test launch is a culmination of months of preparation that involve multiple government partners. The Airmen who perform this vital mission are some of the most skillfully trained and educated the Air Force has to offer.

Airmen from the 341st Missile Wing at Malmstrom Montana, 90th Missile Wing at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming, and 91st Missile Wing at Minot AFB, North Dakota, were selected for the task force to support the test launch. The three missile bases have crew members standing alert 24 hours a day, year-round, overseeing the nation's ICBM alert forces.

"These tests show the reliability of our deterrence weapons systems, showcase the continued reliability of the Minuteman III, and the incredible people who make it work," said Maj. Natalie Quinn, Task Force Commander. "All of

these components comprise a system that stands on continuous alert, defending the United States and our allies 24/7."

The ICBM community, including the Department of Defense, the Department of Energy, and U.S. Strategic Command, uses data collected from test launches for continuing force development evaluation. The ICBM test launch program demonstrates the operational capability of the Minuteman III and ensures the United States' ability to maintain a strong, credible nuclear deterrent as a key element of U.S. national security and the security of U.S. allies and partners.

Air Force Global Strike Command is a major command with headquarters at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, in Shreveport-Bossier City community. The command overseas the nation's three intercontinental ballistic missile wings, the Air

Force's entire bomber force, to include B-52, B-1 and B-2 wings, the B-21 Bomber program, Air Force Nuclear Command, Control and Communications systems, and operational and maintenance support to organizations within the nuclear enterprise. Approximately 33,700 professionals are assigned to two Numbered Air Forces, nine wings, two geographicallyseparated squadrons and one detachment in the continental United States and deployed to locations around the globe. 

Follow five U.S. Air Force trainees on their eight-week journey of becoming Airmen while they deal with the challenges of navigating through basic military training.





•Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace continues producing walleye during the day from boats with fair to good catfish success. Limited trout and salmon, however. Shore bite remains better at night for a few walleye using crankbaits. Wing walls slow. East end of Lake Sakakawea still producing salmon in 70 feet and deeper using white flashers and white squids. Try morning hours from shore using spoons, Mepps spinners, or crankbaits as some fish move into shallower water. Look for more shallow success as the spawn begins. Most salmon are still in the 6- to 7-pound range with limited numbers of larger spawning fish showing up yet.
