

With a service history of over nine years, including seven years at Minot Air Force Base, Deny has ended his career and now will retire to a good home, one that knows him well. Senior Airmen Ryan Gutshall has been part of Deny's life for the past two and a half years, including eight months of deployment in Afghanistan where "we were together 24/7" according to Gutshall.

It is Ryan Gutshall who will adopt Deny, and together they will be moving to Lackland AFB, except now Deny will no longer be part of the K9 corps.

"Deny is being medically retired" according to Gutshall. "The past nine years he has been trained and expected to find bombs. He has been living on base in the kennels, but now all of that is going to change, and it's going to be a bit difficult.'

Deny, by nature, is protective of his trainer. "He is not over aggressive, but he will check you out and get to know you" continues Gutshall "yeah, he's really a pretty mellow dog."

Unlike K9 units in Minot, Deny did not leave work when his trainer did. "We don't take them

home at the end of the day, so he won't have all the other dogs around him anymore either."

Deny's retirement was certainly bittersweet for both dog and trainer. "Sure, it was a happy day, but I'm not going to lie, I have never cried so much in my life" continues Gutshall.

So X294, a K9 trained to sniff out explosives, will enter the civilian sector and going forward will be Deny, partner and friend of SrA Ryan Gutshall. It's a storybook ending for both Deny and Ryan.





UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

For the past several days the news has been dominated by the loss of Queen Elizabeth II and rightfully so. She was probably the best known person on the face of the earth.

And while some people believe it has been overdone, there are plenty of Americans, plenty of North Dakotans, who have been mourning the queen just as the British have been doing.

You have to admit, 70 years on the throne is a remarkable achievement, one that quite possibly will never be duplicated. What struck me was the day after her passing, I saw a photo from October 1951 on the news of Princess Elizabeth sitting with President Harry Truman. Less than a year later the 26-year-old became monarch of the British Empire.

Some of us have a more personal

connection to the queen. We may have seen her someplace during a visit to the United States or Canada. I had the opportunity to see Queen Elizabeth in May 2005 when she officially opened the Saskatchewan Centennial in Regina.

I spent 31 years as a news reporter and/or editor and hands down, that was the biggest story I've ever done as a journalist. I've covered Virgil Hill in boxing, I reported on an attempted murder and kidnapping trial, I've met five heads of state in my journalism career and also covered the Grey Cup (Canadian Football League championship) when the only American team in CFL history, the Baltimore Stallions, won the title in 1995.

But nothing comes close to that warm, spring day in Regina when Queen Elizabeth showed up at Parliament to open the centennial.

As you might imagine, there was a lot of pomp and circumstance. Bands playing, horse-drawn carriages, military salutes and politicians meeting with the monarch.

There were about 30,000 people on the parliament grounds when the queen and Prince Philip arrived to incredible cheers. Many had waited a long time. I got there grossly early so I saw the crowd fill in and build

in a light rain.

A pool of reporters was set up, but it was only for Canadian and British journalists so I took a place at the front of the line in the crowd so I could get some decent pictures.

As the day unfolded, Saskatchewan Premier Lorne Calvert said a few words, then Canadian Prime Minister Paul Martin spoke and introduced the queen and finally Queen Elizabeth spoke to the crowd. At that moment, I was able to snap a picture of the premier, the prime minister and the queen all on the same stage at the same time.

Following her speech, Elizabeth and Philip decided to meander through the crowd. They walked along a path in a garden of native plant species and came back around to the steps of parliament. They walked right past me and Queen Elizabeth was no farther than 3 feet from me when I snapped several photographs.

The next day, that photo and a major news story I had written was published on page 1 of the Minot Daily News. It didn't occur to me at the time, but apparently, I had violated British protocol by photographing the queen from closer than 10 feet. But, oh my goodness, it's a great photo and

I still have that issue of the Daily News to remember that day.

Unfortunately, I was the only U.S. reporter at that event. Regina is so close to North Dakota, but no other American reporters decided to go to the opening. So on the day my article was published, I began getting phone calls. One of them came from Rep. Earl Pomeroy who said he didn't know the queen was going to be in Regina.

I had learned of her visit months before it happened. I simply called the British Consulate in Ottawa and was quickly granted press credentials, not only to cover the opening of the centennial, but to attend a reception for the queen in a Regina hotel. I missed the reception because I had to drive the 250 miles back to Minot and file my story before deadline.

It was an incredible day, one of those days of fond memories that is rare in a journalist's career.

All I can say is during the entire visit of which I witnessed, the queen was so gracious, so polite and so at home in Regina, it was as if she belonged there.

The world is going to miss this wonderful lady for a long time.





- 1. The Community on Base- "Being at an overseas base, there is a sense of community on base. Everyone feels a little closer to each other because we are all we have. The friends we made there become your family, you do holidays, vacations, and life events together that create a special bond."

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

PRESIDENT BUSH ENDS B-52 ALERT OF COLD WAR September 27, 1991



The Strategic Air Command B-52 bomber was kept on around-the-clock alert, posed for retaliatory strikes against the Soviet Union. (USAF Photo)

September 1991, President George H.W. Bush ordered the termination of the Strategic Air Command alert that had been initiated in October of 1957 as a result of the Cold War. This halt signaled the end of the war, which would officially come in December with the collapse of the

communist state. As a result of the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty with Russia, hundreds of B-52 Stratofortresses were dismantled at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona. In the years following the Cold War, the Air Force implemented a downsizing trend that permanently closed many bases around the country. Because of its strategic location and continuous support of the nuclear triad, Minot AFB remained a pivotal location for strategic deterrence, and while the 5th Bomb Wing B-52s were taken off alert, they remained poised for action on a moment's notice.



Every day in the United States on the average, 15 workers lose their lives as a result of injuries or illnesses related to their work. When you add the figures that's over 5400 people a year. Unfortunately these people leave behind families, friends, and co-workers.

Recently there are more and more "mishaps" that come across my desk dealing with everything from damaged or lost tools and equipment, Damage to Government vehicles due to inattention, dressing inadequately for the cold weather conditions, this list can go on and on... I think you understand the point. Airmen at levels need to fine tune the skills we have been trained and imbedded to our thought processes and way of thinking.

So what is the point am I driving home? Complacency! When it comes to safety, complacency is deadly. If you come to work in an environment that has dangers, you can't afford to let your guard down, you can't relax. become comfortable in hazardous areas, your lax attitude will end up getting people hurt. Or worse, it gets you hurt. We can fall into the mindset, "I went to work and nothing happened, nothing happened last week and nothing dangerous happened last month. 



Have your Wheel Alignment checked every other tire rotation and always when installing new tires. Wheel alignment sometimes referred to as tracking, is part of standard automobile maintenance that consists of adjusting the angles of the wheels so that they are set to the car maker's specification. The purpose of these adjustments is to reduce tire wear, and to ensure that vehicle travel, is straight and true (without "pulling" to one side). Alignment angles can also be altered beyond the maker's specifications to obtain a specific handling characteristic. Motorsport and off-road applications may call for angles to be adjusted well beyond "normal" for a variety of reasons.

Primary Angles

The primary angles are the basic angle alignment of the wheels relative to each other and to the car body. These adjustments are the camber, caster and toe. On some cars, not all of these can be adjusted on every wheel.

These three parameters can be further categorized into front and rear, so summarily the parameters are:

Front: Caster (right& left)

Front: Camber (right & left) Front: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Camber (left & right) Rear: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Thrust angle

Secondary Angles

The secondary angles include numerous other adjustments, such

SAI (left & right)

Included angle (left & right) Toe out on turns (left & right) Maximum Turns (left & right) Toe curve change (left & right) Track width difference Wheelbase difference Front ride height (left & right) Rear ride height (left & right) Frame angle

Setback (front & rear) is often referred as a wheel alignment angle. However setback simply exists because of the measuring system and does not have any specification from car manufacturers.

Measurement

A camera unit (sometimes called a "head") is attached to a specially designed clamp which holds on to a wheel. There are usually four camera units in a wheel alignment system (a camera unit for each wheel). The camera units communicate their physical positioning with respect to other camera units to a central computer which calculates and displays how much the camber, toe and caster are misaligned.

Often with alignment equipment, these "heads" can be a large precision reflector. In this case, the alignment "tower" contains the cameras as well as arrays of LEDs. This system flashes one array of LEDs for each reflector whilst a camera centrally located in the LED array "looks for" an image of the reflectors patterned face. These cameras perform the same function as the other style of alignment equipment, yet alleviate numerous issues prone to relocating a heavy precision camera assembly on each vehicle

Did You Know?

Did you know the 5th Bomb Wing's original home was once located in the territory of Hawaii?

The direct history of the wing begins with the activation of the 5th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing in 1949. However, upon its activation, Strategic Air Command (SAC) bestowed the history of the 5th Bombardment Group, with its extensive WWII combat honors, on the new wing. This Bestowal of history is explained in "A Guide to Air Force Lineage and Honors," by Charles A. Ravenstein.

This group was originated and activated in Hawaii on May 19, 1918 as the 2d Observation Group. Then on April 12, 1921 the unit was redesignated as the 5th Group (Observation) and later, on June 21, 1922 as the 5th Group (Pursuit and Bombardment). The group's first station was Luke Field on the island of Oahu, Territory of Hawaii. At the beginning of 1939, the 5th moved from its old headquarters at Luke to Hickam Field; Hickam was to be the unit's home until farewell was said to Hawaii in 1942.

The program continues with the world premiere of Concerto Nova, an original composition by Minot native Erik Mychal Anderson. This

piece was written for electric cello which will be performed by his father, MSU Division of Performing Arts Chair and MSO principal cellist J. Erik Anderson. Electric violins, viola, and bass are also featured in the composition.

Local composer and performer, Erik M. Anderson has a passion for music of diverse genres which influence his writing. A fan of jazz, rock, and hip hop, his music often features driving rhythm and expressive melodies. You can hear the impact of composers Leonard Bernstein and Dimitri Shostakovich. Creating music that is both personally meaningful and satisfying to the listener and performer is incredibly important to Anderson.

"The electric 5-string cello, along with distortion, wah, and other pedals, offers a completely new and exciting palate of colors. Erik's concerto brings together blues, Latin, hip-hop, and metal styles, yet with the overall scope and organization of a classical work. So excited to bring something totally new to the Minot stage!" exclaimed cellist I. Erik Anderson.

Following intermission, MSU Professor of Woodwinds and Director of Jazz Studies, Mr. Charles Young will be featured on alto saxophone for Autumn in New York, which was recorded by Charlie Parker with strings in 1952. Following Mr. Young's performance, one of his former students, Minot native, Jasmine Spitzer will join the MSO to sing familiar jazz tunes recorded by Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald, Michael Bublé, and Aretha Franklin.

Raised by two music teachers, **Jasmine** Spitzer has been surrounded by the love of music her whole life. She grew up watching her family play huge roles in the Minot music community, both in education and performance. With these big shoes to fill, she pursued Music Education at Minot State University for two vears before transferring to Ohio Wesleyan University to continue her studies. Jasmine is now one of Columbus Ohio's most soughtafter vocalists with a reputation for adventurous versatility and an infectious presence on the bandstand. As both a bandleader and a sideman, she has appeared in nearly every live jazz venue in the city and continues to forge her path. Influenced by Ella Fitzgerald, Billie Holiday, and Nancy Wilson, you can hear the classic sounds of the past in her voice.







TRICARE Open Season starts in the fall. That's the time when most families can make changes to their TRICARE health care coverage for next year. Preparing for open season now can help you make the best selection for you and your family later.

"Each year, open season gives you the chance to either sign up for TRICARE, or change your current coverage," said Dr. Danita Hunter, chief of TRICARE Policy and Programs. "Before open season begins, give yourself time to review resources and ask questions about your options. This will help you choose the right coverage for you and your family."

Are you enrolled in or eligible for a TRICARE Prime option or TRICARE Select? If yes, open season applies to you. However, it doesn't apply to active duty service members, or ADSMs. To learn more and to help prepare you for open season, follow this five-step checklist.

1. Know the dates and your choices

Open season starts Nov. 14 and ends Dec. 13, 2022. When considering your options you have these three choices:

Stay in your plan.

Enroll in a health plan.

Change health plans or switch between individual and family enrollment.

2. Review coverage details

Being familiar with the plan types can help you pick one to fit your budget and your health care needs. TRICARE Prime is your managed care option. It offers the most affordable coverage. With TRICARE Prime, you have a primary care manager (PCM) to manage your routine care and refer you to specialists for specialty care.

TRICARE Select is a self-managed care option. It offers the most freedom of choice. You aren't required to have a PCM. You can choose your own TRICARE-authorized provider and manage your own health care. You'll have lower out-of-pocket costs if you use a network provider.

Compare TRICARE plans to learn more about each health plan.
3. Consider all cost factors

The amount you pay for coverage depends on your health plan and who you are. For example, costs vary if you or your sponsor is an ADSM, a National Guard or Reserve member, or a retiree. To find your health plan costs and to compare costs, use the Compare Costs tool.

4. Consider your needs for next


Do you expect any big life changes in the upcoming year? The open season may not be the only time you can update your coverage. As outlined in the TRICARE Qualifying Life Events Fact Sheet, certain life events may change your health plan options. Moving, marriage, birth of a child, or retirement from active duty are all Qualifying Life Events (QLEs). A QLE opens a 90-day period for you to make eligible enrollment changes. If you take no action during open season, you'll have to wait until you or a family member experiences a QLE to make changes to your TRICARE Prime or TRICARÉ Select plan.

5. Update your information in

Being able to use TRICARE depends on you keeping your information current in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). If you don't show as eligible for TRICARE in DEERS or your information is incorrect, it could prevent you from using your TRICARE benefit. You may also miss important information and enrollment deadlines.

Remember, you don't have to wait until open season to think about your options. Start planning now. Find more info and resources on the TRICARE website.
