New Healing Options at Minot Health Clinic: Hyperbaric Chamber

This futuristic-looking chamber is actually a new way to treat many ailments and is on the cutting edge of health technology, now available to Minot citizens. Trisha Fennern, FNP-C from the Minot Health Clinic, introduced the two new Hyperbaric Chambers this past summer. The first of its kind in this portion of the state, Fennern was excited to present the concepts to the city of Minot and start helping people feel better.

As with any new technology, especially in the medical community, new concepts need some explaining and understanding before patients start coming on board with the treatment methods. These Hyperbaric Chambersthe Minot Health Clinic has one smaller and one large chambercreate a pressurized environment where more oxygen is forced into the blood and plasma in order to encourage them to increase healing and create a healing therapy for a multitude of illnesses and conditions. As with any medical therapy, each case needs to be discussed with a provider, but Fennern said that the chamber can be used to help conditions like anxiety, PTSD, concussions, COVID lasting symptoms and even some injuries which require specific accelerated healing.

They are currently offering a 20% discount to any active duty members and veterans for the month of December. Before therapy can begin, each patient will first undergo a consultation in which goals and expectations will be discussed, as well as options and suggestions for the amount and time of therapy. Although the number of therapy sessions can

vary, a patient can expect to receive anywhere from 10 to 40+ sessions in the chamber for top goals. The chamber sessions usually last about an hour and Fennern said that the best results come from doing several sessions per week.

Fennern said the Hyperbaric Chamber sessions are painless and can be very relaxing but are actually revitalizing the body. She mentioned that there are no known side effects to the therapy beside occasional ear discomfort from pressure. Fennern mentioned that this type of therapy works directly with Red Light Therapy, and together they can work even more effectively. 

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. -- Team Minot observed Native American Heritage Month in November with events such as a proclamation signing, a veterans panel and a closing ceremony. The month was a time for Airmen to learn the history and culture of Native American communities.

At the panel, civilians and veterans expressed their previous experiences with the military as Native Americans. This panel allowed attendees to learn about the struggles and triumphs of previous warfighters.

"I am proud to serve the country," said BJ Rainbow, a former Corporal in the U.S. Marine Corps. "I joined because I'm protecting nations within a nation. We have a connection to this land, [and] to the elements on a spiritual level."

During the ceremony, held on November 30, attendees had the opportunity to learn about and experience the culture of local tribes and Native American Airmen. Ceremony attendees were introduced to the personal collection of Tech. Sgt. Pashala Lewis, a Native American Airman from the Quinault tribe located on the Pacific coast of Washington. Items in the collection included traditional bands, blankets and ceremonial wardrobes. The items belonged to his family and had ceremonial and cultural significance.

"I believe it's important to share information about my tribe because I think it's essential to educate people about the differences in cultures of Native Americans across the U.S.," said Pashala.

Kobe Morsette and Sage Casas, two dancers from the Mandan Hidatsa Arikara Nations, performed a Prairie Chicken dance, a ceremonial dance used in competition, at the closing ceremony. After the performance, the dancers answered questions about their traditions, dance and regalia. The regalia is a powerful mode of self-expression blending historical and modern dress. Each different dance is a way of expression, a language in itself. These dances are used in many

different celebrations including but not limited to harvests or seasonal changes, marriages, and competitions. Opportunities like these are thanks to the hard work of the Minot Air Force Base Native American Council that strives to create learning opportunities for Airmen on base.

"I believe that with the military being so diverse, it brings a lot more insight and innovative ways to get every mission done," said Staff Sgt. Christopher G. Henry, the Minot Air Force Base Native American Council president.

Across the Air Force, diversity of backgrounds, experiences, demographics, and perspectives are essential to our success in an increasingly competitive environment. The United States military and its diverse branches create a culturally rich and operationally relevant military that can effectively accomplish various missions.



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

Everyone who is aware of North Dakota's history knows that Pembina is a unique community for several reasons. Most notably, it was the first place in our state that was settled and that was in 1797.

It wasn't part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, but was, at that time, a part of Canada called Prince Rupert's Land. A fur trading company called the North West Company set up a fort on the north side of the confluence of the Red and Pembina Rivers and that today is the community of Pembina.

If you read into Canadian history, you'll find the British government believed the best and most plentiful furs were in the Pembina vicinity so the Hudson's Bay Company also built a fort, in 1803, this time on the south bank of the Pembina River.

But there is something else unique about Pembina that I

doubt many people younger than 50 years old would be aware of and that is television.

From 1960 to 1975, Pembina, North Dakota had the dubious distinction of being the smallest community in the United States to have a television station. It was KCND-TV channel 12. People in Glendive, Mont., might argue that point, so there is a caveat to this distinction.

KXGN, channel 5 in Glendive believes it was the smallest television market in the United States during those years. It went on the air in 1957 and it was indeed the smallest market. In fact, that was confirmed during U.S. Senate hearings held in Helena in 1959.

But here is where this gets a little dicey. During the 15 years that KCND was on the air, the population of Pembina was about 700. The population of Glendive during those same years was about 7,000. So clearly, Pembina was the smallest community in the United States to have an independent television station.

It was the smallest community vs. the smallest television market. That was because KCND wasn't built to serve Pembina. Its target was the city of Winnipeg, 60 miles north with a population of about 700,000 at the time.

The studio, master controls and transmitting tower for KCND

were just west of Pembina, but it had a sales staff that worked out of Winnipeg and competed against two other stations. KCND was affiliated with NBC and ABC and produced some of its own local programming.

Despite Winnipeg being the target, KCND served northeast North Dakota, northwest Minnesota and a good swath of southern Manitoba. Old articles in the Winnipeg Free Press indicate that because of KCND, southern Manitoba had access to "Hollywood" for seven years before a second North Dakota station in that area, WDAZ in Devils Lake-Grand Forks, went on the air.

The north end of Winnipeg was in the deep fringe of KCND, so the ownership of the Pembina TV channel offered free rooftop antennas to people in Winnipeg to get channel 12, until cable TV became a reality there in 1968.

Changes in Canadian law regarding advertising in the early '70s made it more difficult for KCND to compete in the Winnipeg market and it didn't have enough U.S. advertising to support itself. So in 1975 Izzy Asper of Winnipeg offered to purchase the station.

His goal was to move it to Winnipeg and put it back on the air with a Canadian license rather than an FCC license. The station

was sold and Asper moved the operation to Winnipeg. The tower that transmitted the KCND signal was later moved to the community of Minnedosa, Manitoba.

On Labor Day weekend in 1975, CKND went on the air with low power on channel 9. This was unique in that both channels were on the air for approximately three days. They both broadcast the Jerry Lewis

Labor Day Telethon. Following that event channel 12 went dark.

Since that time, CKND has grown to serve all of southern Manitoba and is the flagship station of Global, Canada's third nationwide network.

In 1986, television returned to Pembina and channel 12. KNRR-TV is a satellite station of Fox affiliate KVRR, channel 15 in Fargo. And you guessed it, the target was Winnipeg. And when U.S. TV switched

to digital in 2009, it became harder for Canadians to receive the channel 12 signal. However, the city of

Winnipeg is still considered a fringe reception area of KNRR.

Meanwhile, in 1981 KCND resurfaced as Prairie Public Radio's Bismarck affiliate on 90.5 FM. It became part of today's statewide network of public radio stations.

Team Minot Airman selected for Senior Leader Enlisted Commissioning Program 2022

On Sept. 26, 2022 a senior enlisted Airman from the 791st Missile Security Forces Squadron at Minot Air Force Base, was chosen to join the ranks of the Air Force's commissioned officers.

Master Sgt. Stephaun McKinley, 791 MSFS operations and training superintendent was one of 16 Airmen selected for the Senior Leader Enlisted Commissioning

"I could barely keep the emotions at bay, sitting there with all my leaders in the room," said McKinley. "It was a crazy experience. It's been a blur. Leaders from around the base are already taking me under their wing and really trying to mentally prepare me for what's to come."

SLECP designated allows Air Force and Space Force senior leaders to directly select exceptionally performing, highly talented enlisted Airmen and Guardians for commissioning through officer training school.

The SLECP holds no board or application for selection, however during each cycle of selection the competition is extremely stiff with only one Airman being selected from each U.S. Air Force Major Command. McKinley, among the thousands of enlisted Airmen over the multiple Air Force Global Strike Command bases, was the only person selected for SLECP in the MAJCOM.

"They say pressure creates diamonds," said McKinley. said McKinley. "Adversity grows you so much, it's kind of surreal, but I know that I'm ready. I'm going to be a sponge. I'm really going to learn

from the officers around me."

McKinley said he is thankful for the supervisors and mentors he has had throughout his career. He says that shaped him into becoming a senior NCO, and helped him to commission.

"McKinley will be bringing a lot of talent over to the officer corps,' said Maj. Zachary Hunt, 791st MSFS commander. "He's more than qualified, and I'm very excited to see the perspective he will be bringing."

McKinley said his inspiration to commission sprung from memories of his first base. He said he struggled as a young Airman, but everything changed when new leadership came into his squadron.


He remembers how amazing it felt to have leaders that guided and mentored him.

"That's where the spark was when I joined the Air Force," said McKinley. "I knew I would want to be commissioned in any form or fashion. That's when I saw the impact an officer could have on a workforce. I knew I had to commission.'

McKinley will leave for OTS in 2023. He hopes his career will lead him to become a pilot for the C-17 Globemaster III, and that he can have a lasting impact on the Airmen he serves with, just as his leaders impacted him as a young





I Just Tell People I'm Nosey

Bob Herrington Talks About His Past Role As Senior Enlisted Advisor

They refer to them as Command Chiefs today, but some 35 years ago at Minot Air Force Base, Bob Herrington was the Senior Enlisted Advisor for the 5th Bomb Wing. "It was the same then as it is today. There were about 1,800 enlisted folks, and I was the liaison between them, the wing and the wing commander."

Bob first arrived in Minot in 1967 after being stationed in the Philippines in 1966 and 67. At that time, he was mainly working in aircraft maintenance.

After arriving at Minot, Bob would move around to various positions, leaving Minot AFB in 1970. He returned in 1984 and eventually ended up as the Senior Enlisted Advisor in 1988. "It's a significant position. You represent all of the enlisted folks starting with the first-year Airmen who are here a little lost, cold, and they want to be somewhere else. At the top are the Chief Master Sergeants who are ready to retire and want advice on how and where to go," according to Bob.

During his tenure in Minot, Bob would meet and marry Pamela Bondly; they have two children, Bob and Sandi, and four grandchildren.

After just one year as the SEA for the 5 BW, Bob transferred to Vandenberg Air Force Base in California, and it was his first experience with missiles, more specifically the Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles common to Minot

"While I was at Vandenberg, they activated the 20th Air Force which would include six bases. I was Command Chief for the 20th Air Force and responsible for over 6,000 enlisted personnel. My job would be to travel to every one of the six bases each year. I would tour the bases and gain information about each one," he said.

Bob's return to Minot AFB in 1984 and subsequent advancement to SEA in 1988 are special memories. "Before I became 5 BW SEA, I was 57th Air Division Maintenance Superintendent in Minot. At the 57th we were over the aircraft wings in Grand Forks, Malmstrom and Minot. I had different positions throughout the Bomb Wing from Branch Superintendent to Maintenance Control Superintendent. I guess I couldn't keep a job," he said with

The next stop was Ellsworth Air Force Base in South Dakota, where he would be the Superintendent for the 99th Training Wing and involved in testing and training on the B-1 bombers.

In 1994, Bob retired and he and Pam made Minot their home.

For Bob, retirement was just the end of his active duty career, and certainly not his involvement in the activities at Minot AFB.

As a member of the Military Affairs Committee, Bob serves as the Honorary Commander to Chief Master Sgt. Kacky Crider, current Command Chief of the 91st Missile Wing. He also serves as the Retirees Activity Director for the Minot AFB and volunteers in the 5th Medical Group in the pharmacy. Thursday is normally Bob's day on base, and he can often be seen visiting the various wings, "Because I really like to know what is going on."

For Bob, he said his career in the Air Force was excellent. But he is quick to point out that being an

Army brat, traveling to many bases when he was young, and later in his 30-year Air Force career, "there just isn't anywhere else that has the special relationship between the two communities-Minot and Minot Air Force Base—that we have here. I help with the relationship between the First Sergeants on base and the Minot community. I play volleyball with the First Sergeants teams when they take on the Airmen Leadership classes.'

The smile and the now grey hair of Bob Herrington are a familiar icon on Minot Air Force Base. He may see himself as being "nosey," but the rest of us know he is a wealth of knowledge who deeply cares about each and every one of the personnel who serve their country at Minot AFB.

More than a Mural

August 22, 2022, marked an important date in this base's history, though it probably went by without much fanfare to many. In fact, it went by without any official recognition at all. 

After many months of work, the mural was finally completed. 
Tis the Season for Toy Safety

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission more than 120,000 children are treated in the hospital emergency room for toy related When selecting a toy, injuries. the following things need to be considered: One, the age of the child should be the primary key, so that they are getting something that is appropriate for their group and skill level. Two, inspect the toy by looking for quality design and construction. Avoid items that have sharp points, glass, exposed metal edges, and small attachments. This notice can be the deciding factor also if the toy will be a good idea as a gift. Remember, a toy for sale does not mean that the product is safe. CLOSE TO HOME

Ok, admittedly there are days when a person just doesn't want to venture outside in North Dakota's cold and wind of winter. But then there are days when it's just no fun to stay inside.

That's when ice-fishing some of the Minot area lakes irresistibly beckon.

Places like Lake Metigoshe. One reason N.D. Game and Fish Department North-central District Fisheries Manager Jason Lee enjoys a trip to Lake Metigoshe, tucked in the Turtle Mountain forests north of Bottineau, is its scenery. "It's just so much different than the rest of North Dakota," he described.

Bluegill do well in Lake Metigoshe because of its structure — a mix of islands, points, and bulrush vegetation along its shoreline, Lee continued. He recommends bluegill enthusiasts target that shoreline vegetation.

Lee explained that there's a good possibility anglers could find a nice mix of bluegill sizes to offer action throughout the day based on their June population samplings on the lake.

Another reason to fish Lake Metigoshe is it has relatively easy winter access to get to potential bluegill areas even if there's snow - places an angler can walk to simply by pulling a snow sled with their ice-fishing gear. In addition, public access is available at Hahn's Bay, The Narrows, and Lake Metigoshe State Park.

The caveat to ice-fishing Lake Metigoshe in the winter — or any North Dakota lake, for that matter is the state's infamous winds tend to blow snow and pile it up.

And that typically means snowdrifts along shorelines and access points of one's favorite icefishing destination. Roads getting to and from any particular lake may be fine but access onto a lake might be a different situation.

Lake Metigoshe's Turtle Mountain setting offers silent beauty tucked in the trees of surrounding hills but the region tends to get more snow settling onto those hills and access points. Snow conditions can make accessing Lake Metigoshe a challenge without tracked vehicles, which is why using sleds at public areas is often a good way to get onto the lake.

Lake Audubon is North Dakota's third most popular ice-fishing destination, behind only Devils Lake and Lake Sakakawea. Its popularity means that local benevolent landowners, anglers, or a business may take the time and expense to keep access open.

It's just that sometimes access points can blow shut within hours or even minutes after they're open so anglers want to be prepared in the event of getting stuck — always carry a shovel and emergency

But back to fishing Lake Audubon in the winter: It's known for its walleye bite, typically an hour before and after sunrise and sunset, Lee described. It also offers winter pike activity.

Rice and Makoti lakes are two more area winter fishing destinations for pike. June samplings on Makoti Lake found good numbers and nice sizes of pike along with small perch. However, Lee suggested anglers give the perch more time to grow up, a better opportunity in coming years more so than in 2022-2023 winter months

Hiddenwood Lake has a mix of walleye and pike, along with Buffalo Lodge Lake, which tends to be popular for northern pike spearing when good water clarity conditions exist.

Water clarity on any North Dakota lake can vary from year-to-year. While water clarity tends to remain the same or similar throughout winter on lakes, it can vary if a weather event allows for runoff conditions, Lee described.

Several other Minot area lakes offer potential opportunities and they're easy to find. The Game and Fish Department website, (qf.nd.gov) provides directions to lakes across North Dakota, as well as details about each lake — things like depth, fish species, etc. Go to the "Where to Fish" link off the main page after clicking "Fishing".

MINOT'S 91ST SMW BECOMES FIRST COMBAT-READY

MINUTEMAN III WING IN THE AIR FORCE **DECEMBER 13, 1971**



On December 13, 1971, the 91st Strategic Missile Wing (predecessor to the 91st Missile Wing) became the first fully operational and combat-ready Minuteman III wing in the United States Air Force. The missiles were first placed at Minot AFB in 1970 under the 741st Strategic Missile Squadron. MAFB was at the forefront of the "Force Modernization" Program, which

Minuteman III test launch (USAF Photo) oversaw the switch from earlier ICBMs to the updated Minuteman III missiles. After the transition was completed, the 91st SMW was ready to provide strategic deterrence with a fleet of 150 ICBMs spread across 8,000 miles of North Dakota. Each Minuteman III weighs about 76,000 pounds and has a range of over 6,000 miles and a maximum speed of approximately 15,000 miles per hour. Each missile was projected to have a service lifespan of 10 years. However, the Minuteman III has remained in service for over 50 years, making it the oldest deployed strategic ballistic missile in the world.

Understanding, coping with seasonal affective disorder

FORT LEE, Va. --

For many people, the change in weather and season brings great joy and happiness. But for others, it makes them sad. Seasonal affective disorder, known as SAD, affects an estimated 10 million people and possibly includes someone you

According to the National Institute of Mental Health's SAD resource page, many people go through short periods of time where they feel sad or not like their usual selves during a SAD episode. They may start to feel down when the days get shorter in the fall and winter, and begin to feel better in the spring when the daylight hours are longer. In some cases, these mood changes can affect how a person feels, thinks, and handles daily activities.

There are different types of SAD. For winter-pattern SAD, or winter

depression, the symptoms start in the late fall or early winter and go away during the spring and summer. This type applies to most SAD cases. Summer-pattern SAD is a less common type where some people may experience depressive episodes during the spring and summer months.

According to NIMH, SAD is not considered a separate disorder; it is a type of depression characterized by its recurrent seasonal patterns. The signs and symptoms include those associated with major depression as well as specific symptoms that differ for winterpattern and summer-pattern SAD.

SYMPTOMS OF MAJOR **DEPRESSION MAY INCLUDE:**

- Feeling depressed most of the day, nearly every day
- · Losing interest in activities you once enjoyed

- Experiencing changes in appetite or weight
- Having problems with sleep • Feeling sluggish or agitated

MISHA KING

- · Having low energy
- Feeling hopeless or worthless · Having difficulty concentrating
- · Having frequent thoughts of death or suicide

WINTER-PATTERN SAD SPECIFIC SYMPTOMS MAY INCLUDE:

- Oversleeping (hypersomnia)
- Overeating, particularly with a craving for carbohydrates
- Weight gain
- Social withdrawal (feeling like "hibernating")

SUMMER-PATTERN SAD SPECIFIC SYMPTOMS MAY INCLUDE:

- Trouble sleeping (insomnia)
- Poor appetite, leading to weight

- Restlessness and agitation
- Anxiety

Episodes of violent behavior WARNING SIGNS OF SAD INCLUDE:

- Talking about feelings of hopelessness or desire to hurt self
- Increased alcohol/drug use or
- Withdrawal from activity/ isolation
- Extreme mood swings (good or bad)
- Impulsive behavior
- Depression/constant anxiety
- Saying goodbye to loved ones
- Giving away possessions • Self-harm or injury

TIPS THAT CAN HELP PREVENT SAD:

- Create a comfortable work environment that reduces stress (both physical and mental).
 - Remain active and prioritize

physical movement.

- Get organized through planning work and maintaining a tidy work place to avoid becoming overwhelmed.
- Maintain connections with friends and colleagues by deliberately reaching out and creating a habit of connection.
- Ask others how they are feeling or if they are contemplating suicide or hurting themselves.
- Encourage colleagues to seek professional help or use the Employee Assistance Program (EAP)
- Provide a support system to let others know they are not alone.
- Stay connected and check in regularly.
- Provide a listening ear.



All About Pets

As many Airmen and families already know, military life is not easy. Here are a few tips to help you make manage your busy Air Force life while also taking proper care of your pet!

•Get a low maintenance pet—snakes, certain varieties of fish, hamsters and other rodents, and turtles are just a few ideas of pets that are relatively low maintenance compared to your everyday dogs and cats. It's still important to provide adequate enrichment, environments, and food for them, but if you do all those things, these pets will be just fine during long work hours. Be sure to check with you housing authority first to make sure these pets are allowed.

●Find a "lazy" pet—high energy and working dog breeds are not recommended for owners who are away from home a lot and do not have the time, energy, and resources to keep their dogs fully enriched. You could consider bringing home a characteristically "lazy" breed instead. Basset Hounds, Boston Terriers, Bull Mastiffs, and Maltese are a few dog breeds that pop up often in the conversation around low-energy breeds. However, it's still important to note that all dogs are different. You may find a dog that is a couch-potato by nature, or you may find a "low-energy" dog that wants to go 24/7. Make sure you consider the needs of certain breeds and individual dogs (or cats) before adopting, and even if you have a low-energy dog, you still need to meet their basic requirements. Which is why working people should consider.

•Outside help—for shorter periods (a week in the field, a 12 hour day at work), it would be beneficial to hire a pet sitter, dog walker, or even a neighbor or family member who is willing to help out. While some pets won't go crazy at home all day, they still need to be provided with socialization and enrichment. See if you can find someone to pop in every few hours to play with, feed, and let your pet outside! Doggy daycare is a great option for many canine parents, and while cats and other small pets are usually alright left alone, it's never a bad idea for them to have someone to play with. Don't be afraid to reach out to the base community through Facebook or your friends/family for help if you're feeling overwhelmed with your pet-parental duties. Chances are there is someone out there who is willing to help you and your pet out.

ullet For bigger challenges, consider finding a temporary foster home for your pet. Family members, close friends, and even willing community members are always options for long-term pet care instead of rehoming. There are also "deployed pet" help sites that can connect you with temporary fosters, such as Dogs on Deployment and Guardian Angels for Soldier's Pets. If you're thinking about rehoming your pet due to the cost of PCSing with them, consider applying for SPCA International's Operation Military Pets grant.

Taking care of pets is a big responsibility, but when we bring them into our home, it's our duty to treat them with the care and love that they give us as well. Military life can make it more difficult, but there are so many resources out there to help.



DOD Study to Gauge Resilience of Military-**Connected Youth**

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

Defense Department launched a survey to assess the health and well-being of militaryconnected youth and their families.

The Study of Adolescent Resilience asks children ages 11-17 about their experiences with military life. The findings will inform policies, programs and services for military-connected adolescents and their families.

"Our military youth have unique voices rooted in their military life experiences. The SOAR survey provides an opportunity to put their voices into action and provide necessary feedback to address military-connected adolescent said Patricia Montes Barron, deputy assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy.

SOAR is embedded within the larger DOD Millennium Cohort Study of active-duty, reserve and National Guard service members and veterans, which began in 2001. The approximately 40,000 service members and veterans enrolled in MCS who have adolescent children will receive a packet in the mail

inviting them, their child and the other parent, if applicable, to fill out individual online surveys.

The confidential online survey takes about 30 minutes to complete and focuses on how military experiences impact teens' psychosocial adjustment and physical health, academic achievement and educational and career aspirations. The study also gathers insights into parenting experiences and the relationship between military-connected adolescents and their parents.

Each participant who completes a survey will receive a \$10 gift card to Amazon.com, up to \$40 per family. Adolescents will also be able to download a certificate of participation that showcases their involvement in the study.

The Naval Health Research Center is conducting the SOAR with funding and support from the Office of the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Military Community and Family Policy.



Next Step in Making Air Force's First **Hypersonic Weapon**

BARKDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. --

Barksdale have personnel successfully taken the steps toward implementing the Air Force's first air-launched hypersonic weapon. The Air-Launched Rapid Response weapon or ARRW, is scheduled to be operational as early as fall 2023.

Recently, Airmen from the 2nd Maintenance Group, 307th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, and civilians from the ARRW and B-52H Stratofortress Systems Programs Office validated loading procedures for what will be the B-52's newest weapon.

By trial and error, Airmen and civilians developed the standard methods for attaching the weapon to the aircraft and unloading it.

The ARRW travels five times the speed of sound, giving combatant commanders the ability to hit time sensitive targets with ease.

"It demonstrates the far reaching capabilities of the B-52 and now projects its combat capabilities even further with the ARRW system," said Master Sgt. Caleb Nolen, Air Force Global Strike B-52 armament systems manager.

The process of making this hypersonic weapon is expedited because of the National Defense Authentication Act section 804 Rapid Prototyping, Rapid Fielding program which allows swift weapon development in certain

"The FY16 (fiscal year 2016) NDAA implemented section 804 as a means for programs to quickly prototype weapons within 5 years, and then a determination will be made if in fact the program was successful enough to move to Rapid Production phase," said Bret Berryhill, logistics chief for ARRW.

ARRW is scheduled to begin livefire testing near the end of this year and will be considered for rapid production.

The ARRW is the Air Force's first air-launched hypersonic weapon that gives combatant commanders the ability to hit time-sensitive targets faster than they were ever able to before. With the validation of loading and unloading procedures the weapon can start live fire testing and then production. The weapon is scheduled to be operational in fall 2023.



SMOKED PUMPKIN SOUP



INGREDIENTS

- 5 POUND PUMPKIN, WHOLE **3 TABLESPOON BUTTER**
- 1 ONION, DICED 2 CLOVE GARLIC, MINCED
- 1 TABLESPOON BROWN SUGAR 1 TEASPOON PAPRIKA

- **5 CUP CHICKEN BROTH**
- 1/2 CUP HEAVY CREAM FRESH PARSLEY, AS NEEDED

1/4 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON 1/8 TEASPOON GROUND NUTMEG 1/8 TEASPOON ALLSPICE, GROUND 1/2 CUP APPLE CIDER

Using a sturdy knife, cut the pumpkin into guarters. Scoop out the seeds and stringy fibers. Separate the seeds from the fibers, and save the seeds for roasting, if desired. When ready to cook, start the Traeger grill and set temperature to 165 ° F with the lid closed.

Arrange the pumpkin quarters, skin-side down, directly on the grill grate. Smoke for 1 hour. Increase the temperature to 300 ° F and roast the pumpkin until it is tender and can easily be pierced with a fork, about 90 minutes. Let cool. then separate the pumpkin flesh from the skin.

Meanwhile, melt the butter over medium heat in a 4-quart saucepan or stockpot. Saute the onion and garlic until soft and translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in brown sugar, smoked paprika, cinnamon, nutmeg, and allspice. Immediately add the apple cider, and cook for several minutes until the mixture is reduced and syrupy. Add the pumpkin and chicken broth. Let the soup simmer for 20 to 30 minutes. Blend soup until smooth. Add salt and pepper to taste. If it is too thick, stir in more chicken

> Divide the soup into bowls and drizzle with the heavy cream. Top with a sprig of parsley, if desired.

Stay Ahead of Trouble

Roadside assistance calls to AAA often double, or triple, during winter weather, due to motorists spinning out on slick roads, flat tires, dead batteries and other breakdowns. Last winter, AAA responded to more than 312,000 roadside assistance calls. The most common calls were for tows,

Motorists can help avoid winter breakdowns with preventative vehicle maintenance, including: Tires: Adequate pressure and tread depth are essential for stopping and going on ice and snow, but tire pressure can drop during cold weather. Make sure tire pressure matches the sticker on the driver's side doorjamb and the tread depth is above the wear bar indicators marked on the tires. Battery: The average life of a battery is 3-5 years. Cold weather can drain batteries quickly, and leave drivers stranded. Have a technician inspect the battery at least twice

Replace old windshield wipers and solvent: Precipitation and salty spray from the roads often make it hard to see when driving during the winter. Solvent and good windshield wipers can greatly improve winter driving visibility. If you break down or spin out during a winter storm, it may take longer for help to arrive. That's why it's important to be patient and pack an emergency roadside kit that includes blankets and extra clothes to stay warm, flashlights and extra batteries, an ice scraper, safety reflectors, a shovel, a first aid kit, a simple tool kit, water and non-perishable food, jumper cables and a mobile phone and charger to call for

Safe Winter Driving

Motorists can also avoid spinning out on slick roads by remaining alert and driving for conditions. To stay safe on winter roads, AAA offers several winter driving tips:

Slow down: Always adjust your speed to account for less traction when driving on snow or ice. This often means driving below the posted speed limit.

Accelerate and decelerate slowly: Apply the gas slowly to retain traction and avoid skids. Also remember, it takes longer to slow down on slick roads.

Increase following distance: Allow five to six seconds of following distance between your vehicle and the one in front of you. The extra space will allow you time to stop safely. Never use cruise control: Using cruise control on any slippery (wet, ice, snow, sand) surface can cause your vehicle to lose control more

Don't panic: If you start to slide, hitting the brake is the worst thing to do. Instead, take your feet off the pedals and keep your eyes focused on where you want to go.

Leave early: Expect trips to take longer in winter driving conditions.

By taking a few preventative measures and adjusting your driving practices to fit weather conditions, you can stay safer on the road this


