This program provides an opportunity for enlisted members to attend college in-person to complete their degree while in active-duty status and proceed to OTS after graduating.



# **Completion of Juniper** Oak 23.2 Exercise

#### USCENTCOM

TAMPA, Fla. – Today, U.S. Central Command and the Israel Defense Forces concluded Juniper Oak 23.2, the largest U.S.-Israel partnered exercise in history. Juniper Oak 23.2 integrated U.S. and Israeli 5th generation fighter assets, the USS George H.W. Bush Carrier Strike Group, command and control elements, rescue and refueling aircraft during a longrange large force exercise that included a live fire exercise with more than 140 aircraft including B52s, F35s, F15s, F16s, FA-18s, AC-130, AH64s, 12 naval assets, High Mobility Rocket Artillery Systems, Multiple Launch Rocket Systems, a mix of jet fighters, and long-range bombers.

Juniper Oak 23.2 enhanced interoperability and the ability of CENTCOM forces to rapidly move

combat power into the region. Today the partnership between CENTCOM and the IDF is stronger and continues to grow," said Gen. Michael "Erik" Kurilla, CENTCOM commander. "Our partnership is a key pillar of our commitment to expanding regional security cooperation."

"We at CENTCOM will take the lessons learned from Exercise Juniper Oak and share and incorporate them with all our partners across the CENTCOM region," Kurilla concluded.

Roughly 6,400 U.S. troops alongside more than 1,500 Israeli troops participated in the exercise. CENTCOM remains committed to strengthening partnerships and enhancing interoperability in support of a more stable, more secure region.

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# **Reflections of A D Day Vet** *Edward Zilli Turns 100...*

On the short elevator ride to the 7th floor of the Parker Center, I reflected on the article that I would be writing about Edward John Zilli, a D Day veteran who soon would turn 100 years young.

Quickly I did the math. February 8th of 2023, he would turn 100. D Day was on June 6th, 1944. Barely a private when he crossed over the Atlantic on the Queen Mary, on D Day he found himself leading a landing party headed for Utah Beach, "and the hell that way ahead" according to Ed.

Back to the math, 2023 minus 1944? D Day was 79 years ago, and Ed was 21 years old. Considered a bit "older than the others", it made him a prime candidate for a leadership position.

The elevator door opened, and I was escorted to a corner apartment. One step inside the door and I am quickly engulfed by photos and memories of Ed Zilli's 100 years, medallions and metals that define his years in the service. Family photos, many in black and white, adorned most of the wall space. There were also china cabinets that were filled with family heirlooms. It was a 12 foot by 12 foot mini museum that I was honored to visit on this day. The curator was Ed Zilli, and soon I was sitting across the dining room table from one of the few D Day veterans still alive to share the stories of that day, referred to as the longest day because of the many who died on that beach while trying to establish a foothold for the invasion of France and trek into Germany.

Ed's son in law, Ted Bolton, shares the story of the beginning of the journey to Utah Beach. "As part of the US Army's 4th Infantry Division (known as the Ivy Division), Sgt Edward John Zilli had crossed the Atlantic on the Queen Mary, landed in Scotland, rode a blacked out train to a small village in England, had several months of additional field training, and now found himself crossing the English Channel on an LST heading for Utah Beach in Normandy, France. Ed grew up on Long Island New York, right on the ocean, and was a great swimmer so he wanted to be as high on that ship as possible. When I asked why he replies, "I could swim like a fish, and I figured if that ship got hit and was going down, I wanted to be able hit the water and not be trapped inside." He went on "you know a lot of my guys weren't good swimmers, so I told them if you end up in the water dump your gear, everything including your rifle. It's no good to you if you're drowned."

Ed lives just out the back door of Margie's Art Glass studio. Margie (Zilli) Bolton is Ed's daughter, and between Ted and Margie, they aid with Ed's everyday needs, albeit, for being 100 years old, Ed does well.

In my 45 years as a journalist, I have gravitated toward the stories of veterans like Ed. My curiosity about D Day and Utah Beach partially stemmed from a visit to the WWII Museum in New Orleans. I was privileged to visit with four Canadian Forces veterans who were on Sword Beach. Tears would flow down their cheeks when they talked about D Day. Ed did not know much about Sword Beach but did share that an entire group of Canadian commandos who were deployed to take out a German gun battery "were wiped out. Not one of them survived," said Ed. "Can you believe that? Not one of them survived."

Ed describes the landing at Utah Beach as chaotic. "You didn't know where you were, or what you were to do. You'd meet up with someone and ask them for advice and they didn't know. Yeah, it was total chaos."

Ted continues Ed's story, as he talks about how common sense thinking would not only help Ed survive but was the drive behind his entire life.

"It was that kind of common sense thinking that helped him not only survive the war, but to excel in both his military & law enforcement careers. The "Ivy Division" was the first unit to land on Utah Beach. Once his feet hit the beach Ed spent the next twelve months in almost constant motion, involved in some of the most notable events of the war. After fighting his way off the beaches of Normandy and through the hedgerows of France, he helped liberate Paris. Sgt Zilli says, "There was no time to enjov Paris that summer. We were moving and fighting constantly, but I sure had some good times in Paris the following summer!" After liberating Paris and eastern France, it was on into Germany, fighting in the Hürtgen Forest, and later the Battle of the Bulge in the frigid winter with only light jackets.

Of particular interest to me was Ed's relationship with General George Patton, who led the 3rd Army in the aforementioned Battle of the Bulge. "Georgy? Yeah, he was a great guy. He was a great leader," Ed reflects. "Without him we would have lost those battles."



The war would finally end, and Ed's description through Ted gives the details of the final days.

gives the details of the final days. "Then on May 8th, 1945, he and his men were only a few miles from Pilsen, Czechoslovakia, home of the world famous Pilsner Urquell Brewery, when word of the German surrender reached them. I ask what did you think when you heard the war was over? Zilli's eyes light up and he says, "Hell, we were so close to getting that great beer, you know, just one more day and we would have been there! I mean, of course we were all happy it was over, but we had been thinking about that beer for days, and it was just a few klicks away....


Nobody truly knows how many D Day veterans are still with us. What Ed can tell you, and there are several pauses as he talks about the assault on the beach, is that the Germans had machine gun positions dug through the cliffs, and that hundreds died that day on Utah Beach. "We got to



being most famous was The Battle of the Bulge, and Ed was there. Rumors of an end to the war were circulating through the American troops, but in a last ditch effort the Germans mounted on last push, which of course failed. Soon rumors became reality, and May 8th ended the war in Europe.

"We were the occupying army" says Ed "and our job was to go town to town and if necessary, take prisoners." In one case, Ed was encouraged by his commanders to meet up with what was left of a German force. Not knowing what he was walking into, perhaps a trap, Ed cautiously drove his jeep into town where he met the German officer in charge. "I pointed to his gun, and he pulled it out of his holster and handed it to me. It was then that I discovered that not only German troops, but German tanks were surrendering to him. I still got that gun." He laughed when I asked him what he did with the tanks. "I think we gave them gas so they could drive the tanks into town."

Sgt. Edward Zilli would return to the United States after the war, only to re-enlist and head back to Germany. In his memorabilia are maps of Germany showing the landscape of Germany, and which country would occupy that area. It was a less stressful time, and many of the occupying US Army men would end up meeting and marrying a German girl. "See




over there, that's a picture of my wife. She's German you know." Beside that photo is another of Ed, his wife Margaretta and his two girls Margie and Miriam.

Ed's return to the United States, and his time as a Suffolk County Long Island cop, is another chapter. I guess you can have several chapters of your life when you are 100. He and his wife would eventually move to Florida, after that they would join their daughter Margie in Minot.

"It isn't too bad around here" according to Ed, "the people are friendly and it's quiet." I can only think that compared to being a cop in New York, Minot could seem like a ghost town.

There is never an end to a story that has been written over 100 years. There are only new chapters maybe told for the first time, and more than likely told many times after that. The photos on the wall, the memories recorded on sheets of paper, cards, and newspaper articles, they are all just snapshots taken to preserve a moment in time. To Sgt. Ed Zilli, we owe our gratitude for the day he stepped onto a beach in France, to protect our freedom. He could have been one of those who never came home. But if you sit down and chat with Ed long enough you realize that it was determination, pure American red blooded kid from the country determination, that got him to 100 years. Happy Birthday Ed!

#### UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

Call it climate change, call it a long-term weather cycle, you can even call it a coincidence. We can argue about it all day and make it a political football. But there is no doubt water is becoming a serious issue in the western United States, despite recent heavy rain and snow in California.

This drought phenomenon has been discussed, on record, here in North Dakota, for at least 20 years, but people appear to be disinterested.

In 2003, a group of North Dakota and eastern Montana farmers attended a first meeting of its kind at the Williston Research Extension Center that outlined a shortage of water out west. That meeting focused on the Colorado River and it's depletion.

# Water, it doesn't just grow on trees!...

growing some of the crops commonly grown in California and Arizona that could easily grow here. Carrots, onions, broccoli, cabbage and garlic were among the choices listed.

Since that time, there have been numerous lawsuits because of the depletion of the Colorado River. Whether you agree or not, the water in that river has become quite precious. It supplies the entire city of Los Angeles as well as numerous other cities in California, Nevada and Arizona.

It's also a major irrigation pipeline and that's why the presenters at the Ernie French Center in Williston were so adamant about putting a bug in the ear of northern farmers. Thousand-cow dairies should also be mentioned here. If you've ever been around a dairy farm, you know they use an awful lot of water. Now, image 1,000 cows on a dairy farm.

Fast forward to now. The city of Scottsdale, Arizona is being sued by the community of Del Rio because Scottsdale had been supplying water to Del Rio until now. Scottsdale city leadership has decided that the water for their city is too precious to share with Del Rio. Unfortunately, Del Rio doesn't have an alternate water supply and one homeowner said his water supply will dry up in two weeks. There are also vineyards at Del Rio that need to be irrigated. What happens to them? Arizona doesn't receive enough rain, so they will, in effect, dry up without that water.

This unstable circumstance in the southwest could be a gold mine for North Dakota and eastern Montana. There appears to be plenty of water here, well maybe not like Indiana or Ohio, but enough to sustain most crops without irrigation.

So why aren't dairy farms popping up here? Why aren't more farmers switching over to crops like onions and carrots? Why do we continue the status quo, appearing to ignore what is happening in the southwest?

Experts say it's because farmers on the northern Great Plains are established and have spent beaucoup dineros on equipment. There is, however, an answer for

There is, however, an answer for that. Professors at the University of California-Davis have gone on record to say they would be willing to assist with transition, at least with their knowlege of what they know from growing crops in California. It's unclear what the Williston Research Extension Center's stance is on this issue today. But, if enough people were interested, they would certainly take the lead from UC-Davis to get things up and running across the northern Great Plains, one would think.

There are a few producers who have been successful growing vegetables on a large scale in North Dakota. Onions, cabbage, carrots, pumpkins and even mint have all grown well here. So why doesn't it continue? It's just a lot easier to take wheat and barley to the elevator.

In reality, farmers don't have the means to establish markets themselves or to process said products for shipment. That might be over the heads of leadership at UC-Davis, but that's what needs to happen in this chicken and egg scenario.

Potentially there's a lot of money that could be made. As an example, the net gain on an acre of wheat is about \$40 and barley is \$27. The net gain on an acre of onions is \$1,200. The net gain on garlic is \$2,100. Net gain on cabbage is about \$4,300. And pumpkins have a wide range of profit potential, from \$1,500 an acre up to \$6,000.

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

In early February 1978, a massive blizzard blanketed New England in 27 or more inches of snow accompanied by winds up to 90 miles per hour. On February 8, 1978, Air Force cargo aircraft from units across the country began flying Army personnel, snow removal equipment, and other resources to the areas affected. Over the

# Australia, Japan, U.S. stand up multinational task force for Cope North 23

JOINT BASE PEARL HARBOR-HICKAM, Hawaii --

Air forces from Australia, Japan, and the United States have begun arriving in Guam to establish the command and control multinational task force for Cope North 2023, which runs Feb. 8-24, 2023.

CN23 is a multilateral U.S. Pacific Air Forces-sponsored field training exercise focused on trilateral airborne integration for largeforce employment, agile combat employment, and humanitarian assistance and disaster relief training.

Operations will take place at Andersen Air Force Base, Won Pat International Airport, and Northwest Field, Guam; Commonwealth Northern Mariana Islands including Rota, Tinian, and Saipan; Yap in the Federated States of Micronesia; Iwo To, Japan; and the Republic of Palau.

CN23 objectives aim to further integrate the contributions of allies and partners to enhance security and stability to maintain a free and open Indo-Pacific region. Specific tactics, techniques and procedures planned during the exercise include accomplish precise and challenging trilateral planning, execution, and debrief training in large force exercises; stress, validate, and improve U.S. and trilateral ACE capabilities in dispersed locations; enable combat air forces and ACE training requirements via seamless coalition airlift and logistics operations; and demonstrate safe and effective conduct of combined and synergistic HA/DR operations.

Approximately 1,000 U.S. Airmen, Marines, and Sailors will train alongside 1,000 combined Japan Air Self-Defense Force, Royal Australian Air Force, and French Air and Space Force service members in CN23. About 100 aircraft from the United States, Australia, Japan, and France will fly 1,200 sorties across seven islands and 10 airfields.

The exercise concludes with a HA/ DR event that reinforces the militaries' combined ability to support any type of disaster in the Indo-Pacific region, including the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Republic of Palau, and Yap in the Federated States of Micronesia.

Established in 1978 as a quarterly bilateral exercise held at Misawa Air Base, Japan, Cope North moved to Andersen AFB in 1999. It is U.S. Pacific Air Forces' largest multilateral exercise.

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# When Life is the Opposite of Awesome...

This article is going to be brutally honest. January, February and March- the winter months, sometimes referred to as "the worst months of the year"- can be hard. This time of year can be just plain difficult. It is unbearably cold, the dark days seem endless, the cheer of the holidays are over and we are just stuck here, trying to be productive, but secretly wishing we could waste the day away on the couch watching Christmas movies and eating cookies with no guilt.

The post-holiday blues are no joke and can be hard anywhere, but it doesn't have to be. Samantha Mendoza, 5th Bomb Wing Community Support Coordinator, talks about how there are challenges here, but also a lot of ways to help people succeed. She said, "Minot AFB is a unique base that presents various challenges or situations that Airmen and families may not have experienced before. It's an isolated base located in a rural area with long winters which can be very difficult for Airmen and their families to adjust to. Families may experience relationship complications, feelings of loneliness and isolation, and financial hardships that can make it hard for them to function in their day-to-day life. Our greatest strength here at Minot AFB is the

embodied community, connection, and care we have for one another.'

It can sometimes be hard to see the light at the end of this dark frozen tunnel. We don't have all the answers to life's problems, especially for those who may feel stuck at a base they didn't choose. But we understand the struggle. Pretending that Minot is not a tough base sometimes is simply not helpful.

So what is helpful? How can we all get through these months until the summer gets here and brings a wave of Vitamin D and hope that we all desperately crave? The truth is it is going to be different for everyone. Some people can reach out to friends, make sure they get out of the house sometimes, go to the gym regularly and get plenty of sleep to get through. Others need a little bit more, and we've all been there. It's hard here, but not hopeless. The base actually offers many ways to help individuals struggling. If you're alone here, you don't have to struggle alone.

One could say a lot of negative things about the climate on the north plains, but that can't be said for the helping agencies available on base for both Active Duty and dependents. There is always someone willing to help, guide and stand by you, the base makes sure of it. But sometimes you have to be one to reach out. Don't struggle alone. You don't have to. You can do this. Asking for help doesn't have to be scary.

Mendoza said, "For some people asking for help can be a struggle because they are used to being the 'helper'. Throughout their lives or the way they were raised, they have experienced an unbalanced give and take, so their instinct is usually 'I'll figure it out on my own.' Most of the time they can and they do, as their self-reliance is all they've ever known, but for others they struggle in silence and could really benefit from the support of our helping agencies...If you are struggling or know someone who is struggling our installation has a team of helping agencies that stand by ready to help you navigate through these challenges. We have all been there at some point of our lives and understand the struggle. To improve access to services, we have designed a helping agency matrix that outlines support services available for various issues or concerns such as marriage and family relationships, new parent assistance program, financial, employment services, or help with suicidal thoughts or substance

# **Urgent Care?** No, Just Walk In

Most parents have been there. A sick child means sleepless nights and miserable days away from work and school. So an unplanned trip to the doctor's office becomes an inevitable need for most parents and people. Because of the load of patients seen at the base clinic, a day-of or next-day appointment can be hard to come by. So parents are usually faced with the option of either waiting it out for an appointment, or having their child seen at an urgent care facility. Both options require long waiting periods and more frustration. No one likes having sick kiddos.

But what if there were another option? What about a Walk-in Clinic? Triple C Clinic, located

in the Main Medical Building in downtown Minot, may have the answer. Nurse Practitioner Sue Collins opened Triple C Clinic a few years ago because she wanted more flexibility and to be able to serve people who really needed it without the bureaucracy of a large hospital organization. Sue offers care for pediatric patients as well as adults and has the luxury to provide walk-in care for anyone. Because she has a small practice, she is able to see patients with almost no wait times. As a nurse practitioner she can prescribe medication and send out labs. She said, "We'll take care of you at Triple C ".

Triple C Clinic accepts many

insurances and, although they are a non-network provider for Tricare, they will take the insurance. Nonnetwork means military members and families may have to pay a copay and possible labs and other fees after Tricare is billed, but it may be a small price to pay for the hours taken up waiting at an Urgent Care facility away from work. Plus, the personalized care and easy access facilities is an invaluable perk in itself.

Triple C Clinic is open M-Thurs 9am- 4:30 pm & Fridays 9am -12pm.

# **AFNWC breaks ground** on innovative software center for next-gen ICBM

KIRTLAND AIR FORCE BASE, N.M. --The Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center hosted a groundbreaking ceremony Jan. 19, 2023, at Hill Air Force Base, Utah, to mark the start of construction for a new software facility.


The new Software Mission Assurance Center will be a stateof-the-art software facility to support the LGM-35A Sentinel intercontinental ballistic missile program (previously known as the Ground-Based Strategic Deterrent). The groundbreaking also marks another large milestone in the modernization of the land-based leg of the U.S. nuclear triad.

The facility will be a collaborative space where government and contractor software developers will advance and create evolutionary products, using the most current

technologies and methodologies. According to AFNWC officials, the facility will be the first of its kind, and the technology that will be developed and used here is unlike anything the Air Force has built to date. The SMAC will allow Sentinel to remain a modular weapon system throughout its lifecycle, meeting the unique challenges posed by modern technologies.

The Air Force plans to replace the currently fielded Minuteman III weapon system with the Sentinel weapon system currently in development. The Sentinel acquisition program is focused on the delivery of a modular and flexible weapon system, capable of adapting quickly to the dynamic threat environment over the next 50-plus years.



• Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Hit-and-miss walleye success around Creel Bay but generally fair success in areas with good access and ability to move around on the lake. Lots of slush on the ice after the warm spell.

•Lake Darling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: Limited reports from Grano and Lake Darling. Anglers marking and catching walleye on Lake Audubon but they're small.

•Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: A few more anglers on Lake Metigoshe with somewhat improving access conditions. Fair for walleye and bluegill with nice pike spearing success.

•Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: East end of Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon

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# "Mid-Winter Pops" presented by Brass **Band of Minot**

The Brass Band of Minot presents a concert titled "Mid-Winter Pops" at 4:00 PM on Sunday, February 5th at Minot State University's Ann Nicole Nelson Hall.

The concert includes a variety of musical styles and tastes spanning the 20th Century, starting with the perennial John Philip Sousa favorite, El Capitan March from Sousa's comic operetta of the same name. Then, the band will zip forward in time to the 1930's with Malaguena. Malaguena, a flamenco style song, was originally composed by Cuban composer Ernesto Lecuona as part of his Suite Andalucia. It's been re-arranged numerous time since with several versions surging in popularity in the United States from the 1950's to the 1990's and beyond. Gustav Holst's First Suite in E-Flat will make for a quick style change. One of the first and most enduring pieces composed for the early 20th Century military band, First Suite takes a folk song like theme and presents it in different forms and styles. Next, the band will swing into the big band-era with an arrangement of Glenn Miller's In the Mood, possibly the most popular swingstyle instrumental ever recorded, followed by an arrangement of Rodgers and Hammerstein's Oklahoma! Oklahoma! was ground-breaking smash hit musical when it debuted on Broadway in 1943 and has remained popular ever since with numerous awardwinning revivals as recently as 2019. Unchained Melody was originally written by Alex North for the film Unchained, and it's had an enduring popularity ever since. The brass band arrangement features the

fluegelhorn. The fluegelhorn's dark, mellow tone is perfect for the piece. Next, the band will play a blues/gospel arrangement of the jazz classic, Stormy Weather followed by Leroy Anderson's iconic Blue Tango. The concert will conclude with John Barry's Born Free, written for the 1966 film of the same name.

As North Dakota's only British-style brass band, the Brass Band of Minot has been bringing British-style brass music to North Dakota since 1994 when it was created by a group of Minot area brass musicians. Some of the founders still play with the band today, joined by musicians of a variety of ages and backgrounds from Minot and the surrounding communities and lead by Wayne Schempp.

The British-style Brass Band includes instruments not found in the typical band; such as fluegelhorns, cornets, and altoniums; in combination with percussion and more familiar brass instruments to create a unique sound with a darker and more mellow tone than is usually found in other ensembles.

'Mid-Winter Pops" will be the third of this season's concerts for the Brass Band of Minot. The season will round off with another concert on April 2nd. Both performances will be at 4:00 PM at Ann Nicole Nelson Hall. Brass Band of Minot concerts are free and open to the public though cash and check donations are very welcome.

The Minot Symphony Orchestra invites the whole family to its afternoon performance, A Story to Tell, on Saturday, February 4th at 3:00 pm in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall located inside Old Main on the campus of Minot State University.

"Our family concert is being re-imagined with young listeners in mind. This new relaxed environment is the perfect introduction for newcomers to the symphony. The performance will be shorter in length (approx. 1 hour), will not have an intermission, and will engage and educate listeners of all ages with a combination of familiar and classical works," said Executive Director Ellen Fenner.

The performance begins with the Toy Symphony written by Leopold Mozart (Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's father) a musical work from the 1760s which includes parts for a toy trumpet, ratchet, bird calls, triangle, chimes, drum, and glockenspiel. Enjoy the fun sounds of the toys played by young musicians from Erik Ramstad Middle School.

The featured soloist will be the winner of the annual MSO North Dakota High School Soloist Competition, Hannah Bohlen. Bohlen will perform the first movement of Felix Mendelssohn's Concerto in E Minor for violin.

Bohlen is a homeschooled senior from Bismarck. She takes music classes at Legacy High school where she is the concertmaster of the LHS Chamber Orchestra. She has been featured as soloist with the Bismarck Mandan Youth Symphony Orchestra and received the Outstanding Performance Award at the ND State Music Solo and Ensemble Festival. Hannah currently

plays as section violinist in the Bismarck Mandan Symphony Orchestra and is concertmaster of the Bismarck Mandan Symphony Youth Orchestra. Hannah plans to study violin performance after graduation.

The afternoon concludes with a journey through Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream as guest narrators walk through the enchanting story of the familiar play while listening to the incidental music written by Felix Mendelssohn. Dr. Eric Furuseth, MSU Associate Professor of Humanities, and Mya Temanson, MSU student, have teamed up to write text to accompany the performance and will narrate the piece while Sarah Nielsen, MSU student, provides American Sign Language (ASL).

"From a very young age, I've been drawn to Shakespeare. I've interacted with his writing through audiobooks, picture books, novels, the plays themselves, movies, documentaries, classes, recorded and live performances, art, music -- so many kinds of creative media. Bringing A Midsummer Night's Dream to life with the Minot Symphony Orchestra is an opportunity I'm tremendously excited to take part in. I'm currently applying to graduate schools, and the one thing I want to do with my studies is already in motion through this project: to reimagine Shakespeare in ways that touch audiences from all walks of life. It's by no means a new feat -- creative people have been doing this over the past 400 years -- but it is continuously being made anew," explains Temanson.

Pre-concert activities including an Instrument Petting Zoo and a pre-concert talk will begin at

2pm. Eckroth Music of Minot will be on site and will offer an Instrument Petting Zoo which will allow concertgoers of all ages the opportunity to try out a variety of stringed, woodwind, and brass instruments prior to the performance and again following the performance. The 30-minute pre-concert talk will provide an engaging overview of the works being performed, the story behind the music, the composer, and historical context will be presented at 2pm by Tim Baumann, Camp Director of the International Music Camp and member of the symphony.



# Instead of Declawing Your Cat...

While choosing to declaw your cat may come with short term benefits for you and your household, the procedure is not in the best interest of your feline friend. Declawing is the process of amputating the front knuckles of a cat's toes so that it can no longer use its claws, and many shelters and animal advocacy groups strongly advise against it. Felines have a natural instinct to use their claws to mark territory, stretch, play, and even defend themselves in dangerous situations. When their claws are removed, cats run the risk of developing chronic pain, lameness, and behavioral issues.

If you're having problems with your cat tearing up your furniture or your arms, here are some more humane options to curb unwanted scratching and prevent the need for declawing:

•Consistent nail trimming — every few weeks should be sufficient, depending on your cat.

•Nail caps or claw covers—Soft Paws is one recommended brand for caps that are glued on to your cat's claws and can help to alleviate excessive scratching.

•Provide enrichment — toys, playtime, and designated scratching posts are great ways to keep your cat happy! They won't need to scratch your couch when they have more fun things to do around the house.

 Outside time — most people probably don't think about letting their cats outside since they can often be difficult to catch. But outside is a great place for cats to explore and hunt! Some cats will naturally




come back to their owners once they've satisfied their wanderlust, which is great for enrichment. If you're not sure if your cat will return or you're worried about their safety in a busy area, try a cat harness with a lightweight leash to take your friend on all the adventures!

•Make unwanted scratching objects unattractive — putting aluminum foil on furniture or other popular scratching areas has been said to deter some cats from going to town with their claws. Other options to deter your cat from scratching can include double-sided tape or unpleasant fragrances such as citrus.

•Training and behaviorists—if all else fails, work with your cat to deter him from scratching unwanted items. A spray bottle or a clapping noise can interrupt their behavior so that you can properly redirect them to an appropriate toy and reward them for using that instead. As a last resort, it may even be helpful to find an animal behavior specialist who can help you determine other solutions for your cat's scratching.

It is possible for a cat to have medical problems that declawing would fix, but it's important to consult with your vet to find any other possible solutions before making that decision because it can affect your cat for the rest of its life. As pet owners, it's our job to make sure our animals have everything they need to live their best lives. Instead of declawing your cat, try these alternatives to give your furry friend its best shot.

#### **SALMON WITH SPRING VEGETABLES AND PESTO**



**INGREDIENTS** 4 (4 OZ EACH) SALMON, SKIN-ON, PIN **BONES REMOVED 2 TABLESPOON OLIVE OIL** 

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 500°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. Place a piece of parchment paper on a large baking sheet or in a roasting pan. Rinse the salmon and pat dry. Brush all sides of the salmon with olive oil, and sprinkle generously with salt and black pepper on all sides. Place the salmon pieces skin-side up on the sheet trav leaving 2 inches between each piece. Place the asparagus, snap peas, and cherry tomatoes in a bowl. Gently mix the vegetables with the remaining tablespoon of olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt and a fresh grinding of pepper. Scatter the vegetables evenly onto the sheet pan. Place the sheet pan on the grill. In addition, place the lemons cut-side down directly on the grill grate towards the front of the grill. Close the lid and cook for 5 minutes. After 5 minutes, remove the lemons from the grill and stir the vegetables. Close the lid and cook for 5 more minutes, or until the fish reaches an internal temperature of 140°F and can be flaked with a fork. Remove the sheet pan from the grill. Place the fish and vegetables on a serving platter and drizzle with the pesto. Squeeze the grilled lemon over the top of the fish and vegetables. Sprinkle the lemon zest over the fish and add a few basil leaves for garnish. Serve immediately. Enjoy!

The CAC allowed Erin to reclaim her voice and begin her journey to healing; she has spoken at more than 250 CAC events.

In 2008, Erin began writing legislators to require personal body safety be taught to kids in school, what is known as Erin's Law. Erin's Law is the first US child sexual abuse prevention education law requiring children be educated in schools. Erin is author of Stolen Innocence, Living for Today and An Unimaginable Act. Following Erin's presentation will be the live auction and raffle for the diamond bracelet.

Founded in 2007, a Bottineau location was opened in 2020 and in Williston in 2021 making services more accessible for our rural areas.

#### A NEW WINTER ADVENTURE Patricia Stockdill

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery does more than work with endangered species and raise game fish like walleye, trout, northern pike, and salmon for stocking in lakes in North Dakota and beyond.

They bring the area adjacent the hatchery to life for public use.

The Missouri River woodlands near the hatchery offer a glimpse into bygone days before massive Garrison Dam was created.

Hatchery staff developed hiking trails complete with information kiosks melding the area's history, its ties with the Lewis and Clark Expedition to the Pacific Northwest, and its environmental and wildlife importance along the Missouri River.

The beauty of the trails is that they're not just for summer hiking.

They're great for snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, and ski-shoeing. When snow conditions allow retired hatchery manager Rob Holm volunteers to groom the trails for cross-country skiing.

Plus there is no charge to enjoy the trails for its birding, hiking, and winter activities - it's free throughout the year.

The trails encircle the hatchery's rearing ponds, which are laden with fish in the spring and summer. They meander southward along the river with spurs taking people into its woods and south towards the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Downstream Campground.

While the campground bursts with campers, anglers, and children at play in the summer, it's a quiet wildlife haven in the winter.

It's a hidden winter gem that the hatchery staff and Central Flyway Chapter of the North Country Trail wants to share with others.

Together, they're sponsoring Winter Fun Day on Feb. 18.

The hatchery's Visitor Center serves as the restrooms are available.

Central Flyway Chapter member Glee Mayer, Minot, said the event is an opportunity to experience the magnitude of Garrison Dam, the river bottom's serene winter beauty, its cottonwoods more than a century old, and its wildlife, especially bald eagles calling the area home. "To watch all of the eagles soaring around because of the open water...there's just so much to see," Mayer described. Hardy Canada geese and ducks linger, as well, as long as the river doesn't freeze over.

People's reaction to hiking, skiing, or snowshoeing the area and its trails for the first time are often, "How did I not know about this?"" Mayer continued.

That's one of the goals of Winter Fun Day - to introduce people to the area's unique setting and its trails.

The Central Flyway Chapter sponsors summer hikes on the hatchery trails and added signage in 2022.

The hatchery trails are now officially part of the North Country Trail, a national trail extending from New York to its western terminus at Sakakawea State Park near Pick City.

Hike sponsors would like to see the event become an annual activity. Participants can hike if there's not enough snow for using winter equipment.

Be prepared by dressing in layers with a moisture wicking base layer and enjoy another unique way to experience winter in North Dakota.

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# Father – Daughter duo makes history

AIRMAN 1ST CLASS LANDON GUNSAULS, 90TH MISSILE WING PUBLIC AFFAIRS

PINE BLUFFS, Wyo. --

For the last 64 years, sitting underground inside a concrete pill, F.E. Warren's missileers have stood alert, responsible for the world's premier nuclear arsenal 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Families of all kinds have served on F.E Warren, but never before have a father and daughter been together on alert in the capsule.

Ŏn Jan. 6, 2023, Lt. Col. Raymundo Vann Jr., and his daughter Capt. Gabriella Graham, stepped into the launch control capsule at Echo-01 missile alert facility and assumed the alert together.

For Vann, the decision to make the jump from enlisted to officer and the request to be a missileer

was an easy one. Growing up down the street from Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, during the height of tensions between the Soviet Union and the U.S., where nuclear war was consistently in the news, helped guide Vann's decision to serve as a missileer.

Graham grew up in a much different climate to her father, but still chose to follow in his footsteps. She became a legacy missileer, stepping into the community that she considers the best kept secret in the Air Force.

"I decided to follow in his footsteps and I put 13N as number 1 on my dream sheet," said Graham.

The duo was given the opportunity to go on a 24-hour alert together before Graham attends the Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. Following SOS, she will begin her maternity leave.

"Being able to pull the first ever father-daughter alert was amazing,' said Vann. "There has never been any parent-child alert ever, and this kind of event is something other career fields really celebrate but it has never occurred in ours, so I'm glad we got to be the first to do it and spread the word that ICBMs is family business. It is amazing to know that two generations of ICBM operators, three when we count her baby due in May, were proudly providing nuclear deterrence for our nation.'

To Graham, being a missileer is being a part of a quiet, even underground

community, providing security to the nation. To Vann, it's incredibly humbling to know that he owns the operational readiness of the world's most powerful and stabilizing force, and in the words of President Theodore Roosevelt, conducting the mission of speaking softly while wielding the most powerful stick.

Never in the 64 years of F.E. Warren's history has an alert been jointly carried out by two family members in the same capsule and it's an event that both members are proud to have accomplished.

"It is such a unique situation to both be on active duty together and pulling alert was even more

unique, knowing that we had three generations in the capsule together," said Graham. "It's a story that I'm sure I'll share with baby when they are older."

Graham recognizes the awesome responsibility put on the shoulders of the missileers commanding the ground leg of the nuclear arsenal, as well as her father's role in that over the course of his career and how that influenced her.

"Being able to do what we both love together was really cool," said Graham. "I think a lot of people watch their heroes from a distance and aspire to be like them. I was lucky enough to go on alert and watch mine in action."

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

# Aim High application gets updated feature to help any Airman become a recruiter


Air Force Recruiting Service's Aim High application has a new update that will interest Airmen around the Total Force.

The app, originally launched in June 2020, became a valuable recruiting tool during the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic helping recruiters connect with potential applicants in a virtual environment. But with continual improvements, now the app has a feature that will help all Airmen, or any of the app's more than 270,000 users, to become a recruiter of sorts for the Air Force, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve.

allows "The new feature anyone who has the app to play an important role in filling the uniformed vacancies in our force," said Capt. Michael Bambarger, the Aim High app functional manager. "No longer does a military member approached in public have to refer someone to the local recruiting office, or a friend or family member have to convince someone they know who's interested in joining the military to

seek out a recruiter.'

The app update, which was pushed Jan. 10, allows any app user to assist in the Air Force's recruiting efforts.



"Users now have the ability to send that individual's information directly to the Lead Refinement Center in San Antonio, where it in-turn will be sent back to the local recruiter in the area of initial

request," Bambarger said. "Anyone interested simply needs to go to their mobile device app store, and search "Aim High" and download the app. App users can send a referral on behalf of any interested party.'

In the "more" tab dropdown menu, users can click "refer a friend" to get the Refer a Friend Form that asks for name, email, phone number, zip code and advanced interest (optional).

AFRS hopes all Airmen will consider sharing the app while attending outreach events. For example, Airmen who are approved for the We Are All Recruiters program can use the app at the events they attend and have a direct positive influence on recruiting no matter their geographical location.

The Aim High app was developed to inspire users through a variety of unique experiences, attracting the most talented individuals and educating them on Air Force career opportunities. Users can participate in events, share content, and invite family and friends to follow their initial training experience.

U.S. Space Force career content

will be integrated into the Aim High app soon. In the meantime, hopeful Guardians can use the app to connect to a recruiter, learn about the requirements to join and get an

idea of what they can expect at basic military training.

The Aim High app can be downloaded on Android or iOS.



#### NOTES ON BEING SAFE



North Dakota winters have a tendency to be severe, and bad weather came come on very fast, with little or no warning!

Even the experienced and safest drivers can find themselves temporarily stranded on North Dakota roadways, whether they be interstates, highways, or county roads. The Safety Office offers the following life-saving tips drivers should remember if they're trapped in their vehicle during a blizzard or stranded on the road during severe cold weather.

Stay in the vehicle. Don't leave the vehicle to search for help. The highway patrol advises to stay put. It is very easy for people to get disoriented when battling blowing and drifting snow. Being lost in open country during a blizzard is extremely dangerous. In a vehicle, people have shelter from the elements and are most likely to be found a lot faster. Be seen. Display a trouble sign on the vehicle. Hang a brightly colored cloth on the vehicle's radio antenna and raise the hood. Using the headlights also makes the vehicle more visible to emergency crews, but use them sparingly to avoid draining the batterv. Avoid overexertion and exposure. Overexertion from trying to push a vehicle out of a snow drift, shoveling heavy drifts and performing other difficult tasks during strong winds, blinding snow and bitter cold may lead to a heart attack -- even for people who are in good physical condition. Beware of carbon monoxide poisoning. Run the engine sparingly. Keep a window open

for ventilation, and ensure the vehicle's exhaust pipe isn't blocked with snow.

Conserve your vehicle's fuel. Allow the vehicle to run only long enough for the interior to get warm.

Keep moving. Use minor exercises to keep up circulation and stay warm. Try not to stay in one position for too long.

Make us of your winter survival kit. That is why you packed it

in your vehicle in the first place, to make use of it. Remember if you have used it, replaced used items as soon as possible!

Always remember when traveling during winter months use risk management practices as you would on the job, a little common sense goes a long way, especially when your stranded during a blizzard!
