



# **AFGSC Commander approves formal assessment to** investigate missile community cancer concerns

Thomas Α. Bussiere. Gen. commander, Air Force Global Strike Command, approved a comprehensive study design by the U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine to conduct a formal assessment that addresses specific cancer concerns raised by missile community members across related career fields and also examines the possibility of clusters of Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma at intercontinental ballistic missile

"Air Force Global Strike Command and our Air Force takes the responsibility to protect Airman and Guardians incredibly seriously, and their safety and health continues to be my priority," said Bussiere. "We also continue to be committed to remaining transparent during this process and we pledge to continue to maintain an open dialogue with members, their families and stakeholders throughout this

The study will have two study teams and be divided into multiple pieces allowing for a better focus on specific needs, prioritization of the study focuses, and enables the best use of resources and time.

"Both parts of the study (evaluating NHL or multiple cancer sites) will follow a phased approach," said Col. Tony Woodard, USAFSAM commander. "Phase 1 is separated into three parts due to requests from different sources that house potential case identification data. Each of these sources is owned by different agencies that will have variable processing times."

This study design affords the shortest overall timeline while maximizing relevant information. This also ensures a comprehensive look across multiple Air Force Specialty Codes, locations and possible additional cancers.

"Once each study is completed, each team will then move to the next study in the sequence," Woodard said. "Some data overlap will occur potentially saving time with future study completion.

It is still too early to tell exactly how long the study will take, according to the AFGSC Surgeon General, Col. Lee D. Williames. He said phase one will include Department of Defense medical data, analyzed DoD and Department of Veterans Affairs Cancer Registry data/VA medical data. Phase two includes investigating mortality data and evaluate cancer registries.

In addition, there are different data sources for study phases, Williames

be requested simultaneously, but analysis for each can be performed independently of each other Woodard said

Phase 2 of the study will be conducted if Phase 1 does not show an elevation in cancer incidence (occurrence) or mortality (death) risk, Woodard said.

"If, at any point, an elevation in either cancer incidence or in cancer mortality above expected rates is noted, further phase progression will end, leadership will be notified, and the study team will move to the next study," Woodard said.

Woodard also noted the team charged with this extraordinarily important responsibility is a highly experienced team that previously completed the USAFSAM's Fighter Aviator Cancer Study. In addition, he highlighted the existing synergy available to the team as USAFSAM already maintains access to DHA and AFPC databases, saving significant request processing time that could be accrued in working with outside agencies.

top-notch professionals are uniquely positioned within the DoD and DHA enterprise to conduct this analysis efficiently and effectively," Woodard said, noting USAFSAM also has a number of critical pre-built relationships with outside partners who can assist in this vital effort including the Air Force Personnel Center, the Defense Health Agency Armed Forces Health Surveillance Division, the Uniformed Services

University of Health Sciences, and the Department of Veterans Affairs. "As we move through the various phases of assessment and review, we will continue to provide updates, including pertinent information, as and when such information is discovered or identified," Bussiere said. "While we continue to work through this process, service members, their family members and former service members who may have concerns or questions

are encouraged to speak with their healthcare providers.'

"It is my personal pledge to all Strikers, Airmen, Guardians and family members - past and present - to remain transparent throughout this process and we will continue to maintain an open dialogue," Bussiere said. "This is my priority."

# More than a maintainer

Tactical Response Force: the words themselves bring forth images of Security Forces Defenders clad in tactical gear, rushing to a missile alert facility in a UH-1N "Huey", prepared to do whatever it takes to defend the 91st Missile Wing's Airmen and assets. For Senior Airman Kody Uden, a missile and space facilities maintainer for the 91st Missile Wing, becoming a TRF assaulter was something he always wanted to do.

"I've always been interested in the tactical aspect of the military," said Uden. "TRF gives me an opportunity to try it out in case I didn't like it, but I thoroughly enjoy it."

Uden decided to undertake difficult process becoming a member of TRF and was presented with unique challenges. Most TRF candidates are former Security Forces Airmen who are more familiar with TRF's training requirements.

"Out-processing and processing to a new unit with a different culture was a shock. they just do things differently," said Uden. "You have to learn fast because all of the Security Forces guys have that base level through tech school, so I really had to pick up the pace."

Although he did not have prior training with Security Forces, Uden possessed a unique perspective that only a prior maintainer could provide


"I give them an insight on how launch facilities and missile alert facilities work, so I can adjust their tactics based on what I know of the functions of the facilities," said Uden.

During his time with the team, Uden found that his transition to TRF improved his performance as a leader and Airman.

"TRF has benefitted my career by giving me a lot of leadership opportunities and capabilities,' said Uden. "Being put in situations where you have to lead a team in high-stress scenarios, I found that invaluable for me personally because I've never been in situations like that."

Uden admitted the path he took to TRF wasn't easy or fast, but persistence was the key for him to ultimately achieve his

"Some advice I would give to prospective TRF candidates would be just keep trying," said Uden. "It took me a while to ioin because of admin issues.

#### A VIEW FROM **OUR SIDE**



# Give recognition where recognition is due...

Ever since a recent Monday night football game in Cincinnati when Damar Hamlin collapsed and went into cardiac arrest, we've been seeing news segments of the team of first responders, doctors and nurses who worked a miracle to keep a 24-year-old from dying on the field.

That's all good and well. They absolutely deserve recognition because of life saving measures. This isn't something easy like buttering toast or taking out the trash. Saving a life is a difficult and often traumatic experience, primarily because the survival rate isn't 100 percent.

So yes, congratulations to Cincinnati first responders, but in my opinion, there are first responders, nurses, doctors, law enforcement and fire fighters all over this nation who do this every day. They too deserve to be recognized for their work.

I think being a first responder is similar to being a teacher. They don't get paid enough for what they do because of the importance of their work. It's really none of my business what they do receive in their paycheck, but it's not enough for saving someone's life or educating the lot of us.

I'm sure you've heard the phrase in the past, there's no amount of money worth someone's life?

But here they are, performing medical miracles more often than we rotate the tires on our car.

Some of us witness this in indirect ways. The farmers' market that I belong to is held on Trinity Hospital property in Minot. And there isn't a Saturday that goes by during the season that we don't see ambulances, fire trucks and/or life support helicopters taking off.

It's not just us, the vendors, at this market. It's the customers too. There have been times we've seen the life support helicopter take off from atop the hospital building and land three times during our three-hour farmers' market.

They are responding to heart attacks, farm accidents or car wrecks. Imagine jumping in that helicopter not knowing exactly

what you are going to see when you get to the scene of a farm accident? An arm ripped off in a baler, a leg caught in a power take off, getting burned in a combine fire? Or, in one situation several years ago in Ransom County, a man's entire body was sucked into his combine, killing him.

First responders see this all the time. Could you handle it? In 2006, I was involved in a combat lifesaver course at Fort McCoy, Wis. We spent more than a week in that class and we saw some gory details of what can happen on the

None of us in my detachment had to deal with that during our 15-month mobilization, but many Soldiers do and it's very similar to the mental trauma that nurses and paramedics deal with, especially if they know who the victims are like many do here in North Dakota.

I think it's safe to assume that most of us would have difficulty dealing it. But, there are people who thrive on this activity, believe

Our oldest daughter earned a nursing degree from South Dakota State University and went into practice. Shortly after she left the

college campus, she found a job in the Williston hospital during the peak of the oil boom.

Heidi has seen a lot of what I mentioned in her young life. And even though she prepared for it in a classroom environment, it's never the same in the actual situation.

She told us one time that sh became a nurse to treat the elderly and bring new babies into the world, not treat gunshot wounds. But that's what she did for a short time in her career... treat gunshot victims.

Again, is that something that you could handle? Most of us can't really answer that question until we are thrust upon it.

What I can tell you is that Heidi's salary as a registered nurse doesn't warrant what she and the tens of thousands of other nurses in this country receive in compensation.

Unfortunately, that's probably not going to change. What can change is that we give these people the recognition they deserve. Let a nurse, doctor, paramedic, firefighter, cop or even helicopter pilot or ambulance driver know that they are always appreciated for the difficult work they do.





What are your interests/hobbies?



# Six leaders fired from Air Force nuclear base in North Dakota

Six leaders — including two commanders and four of their subordinates — were fired from a key Air Force nuclear base in North Dakota without explanation Monday.

Col. Gregory Mayer, who ran the 5th Mission Support Group at Minot Air Force Base; Maj. Jonathan Welch, the 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron commander; and four unnamed subordinates lost their jobs due to a "loss of confidence" in their ability to lead, Air Force Global Strike Command said in a release Monday.

"These personnel actions were necessary to maintain the very high standards we demand of those units entrusted with supporting our nation's nuclear mission," said Maj. Gen. Andrew Gebara, the two-star in charge of Air Force nuclear units under 8th Air Force, in the release.

The Air Force declined to say what led to their ousters or what disciplinary action they may face.

Mayer held the support group's top job for eight months after arriving at Minot last June. He has held leadership roles in the civil engineering community for the past several years of his nearly 25-year career.

At Minot, Mayer oversaw 1,900 airmen across six squadrons and a base portfolio worth \$4.3 billion. Minot is the Air Force's only installation that houses two legs of the nuclear triad.

Mayer's group supports daily operations of the base's B-52H Stratofortress nuclear-capable bombers, Minuteman III nuclear-tipped intercontinental ballistic missiles and launch control centers, and UH-1N helicopters, according to an official biography that was removed from Minot's website Monday.

The Air Force declined to provide more information about whether the other airmen were officers or enlisted, who will replace them, or whether they were all fired over the same incident.

"Our mission is foundational to our nation's defense, and we remain committed to the success of that no-fail mission," Gebara said.



# Col Michael Maginness In New Position

# Assumes Command of 5th Mission Support Group

Colonel Michael Maginness has assumed command of the 5th Mission Support Group at Minot Air Force Base.



# A Living Piece of Minot History: Oak Park Theater

The year was 1964. Those that were around could share some stories about The Beatles, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and other major historical events that changed life and culture. But in one small town in North Dakota there was a tiny, yet significant, event took place. The Oak Park Theater, located at 1500 4th Avenue NW, opened on March 18 and premiered Elvis Presley's movie, Kissin' Cousins.

Since that date almost 60 years ago, the Oak Park Theater has shown thousands of movies and been through some pretty extensive changes and renovations. A quick look back into the history of the building itself will explain that in the 1960s & 70s the theater showed matinee showings for only \$.75 per ticket! They showed classic films like The Hindenburg, starring George C Scott and Anne Bancroft, and the animated The Phantom Tollbooth, directed by the venerable Chuck Jones of Looney Tunes fame.

Current Oak Park Theater owner, Al Schon, described the theater back then, saying, "Back in the late 60s, the Oak Park Theater would have all-night shows on Saturday nights in the summer. The all-night shows tended to get a bit rowdy causing the theater to stop having them." By 1980 the theater was shut down and converted into a pool hall. "In 2000, it was then remodeled back into a theater seating 500 showing sub-run movies. It showed two features a day with separate admissions for each film. There was also a party room for birthdays and special occasions," explained Schon.

Since 2000, Schon has managed and operated the Oak Park Theater with success due to his vast experience in the theater business. Unfortunately, that took a rough turn when the theater flooded out during the devastating Minot flood of 2011. The flood caused hundreds of millions of dollars in damages in the community and the Oak Park Theater was among the many businesses that were rendered useless after.

With much dedication, the Oak Park Theater reopened its doors in 2017 when Schon bought the place. The theater had a new smaller seating design but offered a new atmosphere. Since then, the theater has shown sub-run movies, which Schon explained to be movies that are, "lower cost by waiting until the terms (percentage per ticket) of the movie come down in price making it affordable to run at a reduced orice usually 45-60 [days] later than a first run picture." Schon said business was great for the first few years, but in 2020 and the pandemic onset, things again took a turn. He said, "Since then it has become a slow recovery because of the studio releases not being what they used to be and the new screening platforms that arrived during the Covid years."

Today the Oak Park Theater shows movies weekly posts movie titles and show times on their Facebook page, https://www.facebook.com/ OakParkTheaterMinot. They are also available for groups to rent out the entire theater and are often flexible on what movies can be shown for a very affordable price. According to Schon, the theater is also considered an art house venue, which means they present some other performances other than movies like Blues concerts,

festivals, church rentals, etc.

The Oak Park Theater is also a proud supporter of MAFB and its organizations by donating to many squadron Holiday parties, and base events. For the Month of the Military Child in April, Schon plans to work with the Northern Sentry and offer military kids a free movie event.

Schon has decades of experience operating movie theaters and has inquired on what it would take to acquire the use of the shut-down


movie theater on MAFB to offer movies to the base population. Talks are still in the works, but only time will tell what next great project Al Schon at the Oak Park Theater will accomplish.






will also include young Airmen and Guardians who will share their experiences leading change and being at the forefront of progression and advancement for women and minorities."



openly about difficult circumstances to better understand each other's perspective builds connections and trust, an essential aspect of creating cohesive teams among Airmen and Guardians, both military members and civilians.

Cohesive teams with diverse perspectives are force multipliers and warfighting imperatives that enable a competitive advantage against adversaries. The symposium is only one event for the Department of the Air Force's Office of Diversity and Inclusion to ensure the DAF remains adaptable to assist in recruiting, retaining and fostering a ready and stronger force.

"The results are clear: a diverse team is a stronger team. It enables us to leverage different perspectives formed from various life experiences and backgrounds—that is what we need to solve our Nation's toughest problems-and it is what our competitors lack," Kendall added. "We have made great strides with personnel policies and have shown getting the details right matters. It proves we value our people and respond when policies have grown outdated.'

The Department of the Air Force

has a distinguished heritage built by highly skilled and dedicated Airmen and Guardians breaking barriers and leading air and space power dominance. As senior leaders call on the force to continue breaking barriers and changing policy, day three of the symposium will discuss how to lead change. Panelists will share vignettes, best practices, obstacles, and meaningful wins changing in their organizations, including perspectives from other branches of the military.

The 2022 WASP symposium attracted 3,400 registrants for the three-day event; this year's volunteers hope to more than double that number. The accessibility to the virtual platform should usher that, as total force members do not have to pre-register this year. Members can view and ask questions during the symposium via the event page.

# **Extension Cord Safety:** What to Do and What to Avoid

Electrical hazards are an area of major safety concern in construction and account for a large number of injuries and fatalities. workers that aren't electricians are going to be using electricity every day to do their job, and something as seemingly harmless as an extension cord has it's own hazards. Extension cords can be found in any location, safe use of extension cords is as important as safety training on electrical tool use.

In addition, office buildings, warehouses, and manufacturing plants are corporate and industrial environments where electrical equipment and outlets will definitely be found and can pose unique hazards to employees who work

Cable protectors offer a quick solution to protect cables and hoses from pedestrian and vehicle traffic. Consider light- to medium-duty cable protectors to prevent trip hazards in an office or warehouse, while heavy-duty cable protectors might be a better choice on job sites with construction equipment or heavy pedestrian traffic.

No one should take electricity for granted. No matter how small the task, how temporary the project or how trained the staff, everyone should be using safe work practices, especially when using electrical tools and equipment. Extension cords should be selected carefully and be approved by a laboratory such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL). The extension cord below shows the (UL) stamp clearly.

During the weekly safety meeting or morning safety huddle on electrical safety, the following tips on safe use of extension cords should be discussed:

- Always inspect your electrical tools and extension cords before
- Don't use an extension cord that

is wet and never plug an extension cord into an electrical device with wet hands.

- Never unplug an extension cord by pulling on the cord; pull on the
- Never use extension cords that have broken or missing ground pins those are there for your safety!
- Use only properly rated extension cords for a construction site and UL (or similarly) approved



Never run cords through windows or doors where they could be pinched or damaged.

Ensure extension cords are kept out of walkways to avoid potential trip and fall hazards.

Remove frayed, damaged, or severely kinked extension cords from use immediately.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

FIRST BLACK AVIATORS GRADUATE FROM ARMY AIR SCHOOL AT TUSKEGEE, ALABAMA MARCH 6, 1942



In the early 1940s, the United States War Department began training black pilots at Tuskegee Army Airfield in Tuskegee, Alabama. While the center was treated with hostility from many people at the time, it marked an important milestone for African Americans in the military. The

First 5 African American pilots (USAF Photo) first class at the school included 13 cadets of various experience. In the end, only five of those cadets would go on to graduate on March 6, 1942, making history as the first black Army Air Corps pilots. Those five pilots were:

- Capt. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., who would go on to become the Air Force's first black general and played a key role in the desegregation of
- 2nd Lt. Lemuel R. Custis, who became Hartford, Connecticut's first African American police officer in 1939
- 2nd Lt. Charles H. DeBow Jr., who commanded the 301st Fighter Squadron in Italy and flew 52 combat missions in the European Theater
- 2nd Lt. George S. Roberts, who became the first black officer to command a racially mixed unit at Langley AFB, VA
- •2nd Lt. Mac Ross, who became Group Operations Officer for the 100th Squadron

The desegregation of the Air Force didn't come about until 1949, but even in the face of hardships, these five pilots set an important precedent for future generations of African American pilots.
