# Bomber Task Force 23-2: 23rd EBS Returns to Morón

MORÓN AIR BASE, SPAIN – The 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron out of Morón Air Base, Spain, began their Bomber Task Force operations Feb. 24, 2023.

BTF operations are U.S. Strategic Command's means of conducting Dynamic Force Employment in support of the National Defense Strategy and familiarizes aircrew with air bases and operations in different geographic combatant command areas of operations.

"Our team has hit the ground running here in Morón," said Lt. Col. Ryan Loucks, commander, 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron. "We are excited to be working with our NATO Allies and Partners here in Europe again."

On their way to the United States European Command area of responsibility, the 23rd EBS conducted a low approach flyby of 2 B-52H Stratofortress aircraft in Tallinn, Estonia, in celebration of Estonia's Independence Day. While flying sorties in Northern Europe, the 23rd EBS participated in a bi-lateral training exercise with Royal Air Force F-35s and performed close-air-support training with Norwegian Joint-Terminal Attack Controllers.

"This week we worked hand-inhand with our Norwegian allies to develop robust training and promote interoperability," said Lt. Col. Joseph Cangealose, Director

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# 891st MSFS achieves new heights

The 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron was awarded the 2022 Security Forces Squadron Outstanding Large Unit Award at the Major Command level for the first time in the unit's history, and will go on to compete for the award at the Air Force level. The award recognizes the importance of the mission the 891st MSFS supports and the lengths the Airmen assigned to the unit went in order to ensure that mission was accomplished.

"This is a unique win," said Maj. Chase Shields, 891st MSFS commander. "I don't remember the last time an MSFS has ever won this award in Air Force Global Strike Command. So to be selected for this award is not just a win for the 891st MSFS, but it's a win for all missile security forces squadrons. On top of that, it's also a win for the 91st Missile Wing.'

Just from reading the 891st MSFS's unit name, one can assume the Airmen assigned there are charged with an immense responsibility; safeguarding some of the nation's most sensitive assets and greatest deterrents against potential adversaries. Airmen assigned to the 891st MSFS went beyond those responsibilities on multiple occasions, ensuring Minot AFB's mission-and the protection of the United Statesdid not fall into jeopardy.

One of those instances in which 891st MSFS Airmen went above and beyond was during their snow removal efforts around the missile launch facilities following Blizzard Haley. The Airmen dug snow trenches for a combined distance of 18 miles in an effort to prevent the snow from melting into the missile launch facilities.

"We got the notification and at first we all went 'We're doing what? What's happening?," said Tech. Sgt. Christopher Moore, 891st MSFS non-commissioned officer in charge of training. "We were told we needed to remove the snow in order to keep the mission and assets operational. So we got out there at the break of dawn, rolled up our sleeves and went to work. It wasn't very glamorous work but the camaraderie this unit already had helped us come together and get the job done." In addition to the 891st MSFS's snow removal efforts, the unit also had many more notable accomplishments such as sending Tech. Sgt. Jennel Edwards, 91st Security Forces Group security forces evaluator who was requested by name to represent the U.S. Air Force, to the Philippines to lead a tactics exchange with members of the Philippine Air Force.

that we utilize in air base defense and security," said Edwards. This in turn enhanced the preparedness of U.S. coalition partners against near peer threats and allowed the PAF to enhance their air base defense and security measures.

As the 891st MSFS Shadow Warriors march forward, they can use lessons learned and accomplishments achieved in 2022 as a blueprint to build upon and achieve even greater heights.

"Every single person in this unit played a role in us getting this award," said Edwards. "It brings pride not just to the unit or security forces as an enterprise, but to each individual person. It's another reason to walk with your head held high.'

Reservations for the Cross Ranch yurts and cabins are on their web site but let me give you a hint to plan ahead. These facilities are booked out into 2024 already.

So why bother, Rod? If we can't book the cabins and yurts, the Cross Ranch may not be an option. Saturday's weather was such that packing the family up and heading to the Cross Ranch for a day of family fun in the North Dakota outdoors was certainly worth the trip. The cross ranch is less than 90 minutes from Minot. An early morning departure will get you there around 10 AM. Of course, you will have packed a lunch to enjoy either in your car, or out on the trails. There are also restaurants in Washburn, but the Cross Ranch is six miles from Washburn as the crow flies, probably closer to 20 miles by car. But it's up to you. Whatever works.

Once at the Cross Ranch your options are many. First, there are a lot of trails that they keep groomed for cross country skiers. One of those trails parallels the

Another option, snowshoes that are available to rent at the visitor's center. I kind of put this activity with ice fishing and curling. #### UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

According to the Centre of Research & Analysis of Migration in London, approximately 19 million Ukrainians have fled the country as of Feb. 13. However, nearly 10 million of them have returned over the past year.

The exodus for at least 8 million are other countries in Europe, mostly Poland, while the United States has taken in 220,000, Canada 132,000, Australia 4,000 and New Zealand 4,000. Ironically, more than 2 million have fled to Russia. Here in North Dakota the number is approximately 280, according to North Dakota Refugee Services with most settling in Bismarck (34 perecent). The state of North Dakota says all Ukrainian refugees here since Putin's "special military operation' started last Feb. 24 have approved sponsors in the state. Holly Triska-Dally is the North Dakota Refugee coordinator. She works with Lutheran Immigration & Refugee Service in Fargo and Bismarck Global Neighbors to settle displaced Ukrainians. According to Triska-Dally, there is no cap regarding the number of sponsored Ukrainians who may arrive here. She said the vast majority are women and children because men between the ages of 18 and 60 are prohibited from

#### leaving.

According to Triska-Dally, sponsor support through a federal program called Welcome US, is especially critical during the first 90 days and begins with an application process and a declaration of financial support. The North Dakota Office of Refugee Services connects newcomers to a case manager who supports their skill, development, workforce outcome and community integration.

But hardly any have come to North Dakota through that program.

North Dakotans who don't necassarily have a connection to Ukrainian refugees can help. filling out an I-134 form through the Department of Homeland Security shows a financial means to support refugees for a period of time.

There seems to be an anomoly here. A North Dakota Job Service report in late December showed the state had 16,133 job openings while only 230 Ukrainians have come to the state. Some are accountants, lawyers, truck drivers and engineers. Others are capable of filling most job openings.

#### Looking at our neighbors, 1,000 Ukrainian refugees have come to Minnesota, only six have landed in South Dakota, according to the Black Hills Pioneer in Spearfish, and it's hard to pin a total number down in Montana. Instead reports there show refugees in localities like Kalispel, Whitefish and the Flat Head.

On the Canadian side, Manitoba has accepted 12,500 of the refugees and 2,000 have fled to Saskatchewan. Most of the Ukrainians who have come to Saskatchewan have been offered some kind of employment while all of them are offered adult English lessons.

This could be a golden opportunity for North Dakota. If you know Ukrainians, you can tell by their resolve in the war, that they are resourceful, hard working, intelligent and most do speak some English. It would not be difficult for them to fit in. Regardless, there is a war going on and there are refugees who need sanctuary. But it isn't just Ukrainians. Apparently there have been reports of as many as 700,000 Russian men have gone on the lam since the war began, with most of them showing up in Finland, Sweden and Norway.

Sweden and Norway. A Norwegian TV reporter recently interviewed a Russian defector who fled to Norway. He said there are war crimes and autrocities happening all the time. He told Norwegian TV that 40,000 of the 50,000 fighters in the Wagner Group (Putin's private army) are convicts. If they live through six months of the war, they receive pardons. If they decide they don't want to be there, they are executed on the spot.

But here, Ukrainian refugees are being welcomed into our state as much as sponsors will allow them to be. There are already Ukrainian enclaves in North Dakota that could be expanded, especially when it comes to the farm sector.

Many of the Ukrainians coming to the United States are dairy farmers, cattle ranchers and grain farmers. And it seems every rural property in this state needs workers. Refugee children could help prop up some of the rural schools' dwindling populations.

Last weekend my family spent a few days in the suburbs north of Detroit, MI. The reason feels like a dirty secret, but I'll say it anyway: we were there because my husband had been recruited for a job interview.

While my husband, Derek attended the interview, I planned to visit a few nearby communities with intention of feeling out whether they'd be a good fit for us.

We had about three hours to explore, but I soon discovered finding my way around to be challenging. First of all, the roads weren't laid out in a neat grid. Roads seemed to go every which way—and none of them were labeled by number and quadrant (ie 3rd Ave SE.) Indeed, there were no quadrants to these towns. I literally couldn't not get my bearings.

Next, each time I punched a possible destination into the maps app on my phone, I was met with

the bad news that everything seemed to be 30 minutes away. Thirty minutes?! Excuse me, but who has time for that kind of commute? Who has that kind of endurance? My children do not have that kind of car-riding stamina. We brace ourselves for the weekly trip to base for grocery pick up. If we go south of 20th Ave South, we pack snacks.

Not knowing exactly where to go, or what to do, we spent an hour in the hotel room. I hoped my littlest would nap, but the boys ended up jumping on beds, while I furiously Googled towns nearby that might be worth a drive through.

Turns out, the opposite side of the Midwest is much more densely populated than NoDak. Everything bleeds together into one big blob of populated area. How does one choose where to live? What if you live in Farmington, but decide you want to go to church in Rochester, and you discover your new best friend lives in Brighton—and they are all 30 minutes away from each other? Limitless options, limitless stress. It all seemed very high stakes for someone who struggles to decide whether to get the kneophla from Schatz Crossroads or Kroll's Diner.

Eventually, armed with a list of small communities, I buckled my boys into their car seats and boldly drove away. Only 30 minutes to destiny.

We drove through one commercial district. Then another. And another. And another. By the time we reached our intended destination, my youngest was asleep, and it was obvious this wasn't a place I wanted to live. I'd chosen poorly.

There was no time to try again. We needed to pick up my husband. Again, I watched the scenery going by, noting of the endless choices of places to shop, worship, eat, and live. I was completely overwhelmed. Then I remembered—this is normal. This used to be normal to me. My parents each commuted 30 minutes to work—each in different towns.

When I first moved to Minot, the shock was the lack of options, not the fire hose of choices.

A few days I read options from a list on my laptop, "It says here the fee for twice-weekly arts camp is only \$15. Or you can do t-ball again. The Y has day camp. Or we could look into soccer, or zoo camp."

"This is the stuff we need to consider when we talk about moving. It's not just the place, but the quality of life we can have there. Even if a town has more choices, would we really take advantage of them if the commute is long, or it's too expensive?" my husband replied.

He's right. It's not that we'll never move, but right now Minot, ND is good to us. Right now, it's a good fit. Right now, nothing seems better than a place where run into friends when we go out. A place where we can easily afford summer activities, zoo memberships, tickets to the symphony, or the community pool. A place with more free fun than we can take advantage of through parks programs, library activities, downtown events, brass band concerts, and a myriad of playgrounds-all within a tenminute drive.

For now, I'm happy to be right here in Hot Dish Territory. I'm happy to laugh at my misadventures in the Michigan suburbs, and smile at how accustom I've become to place that once seemed so vastly different. I'm not from around here, but I sure have gotten used to it.

#### **SLICE OF LIFE** KIM FUNDINGSLAND

Once was – maybe. Maybe yet today.

I've always had an interest in the history of our state, mostly the early days before roadways and fences and towns. The period when Dakota Territory was the "Old West". Sometimes I wish I'd lived back then, just to say I saw it.

When I travel in the state today I see landmarks on the countryside and wonder what meaning they played in the early days prior to statehood. What might have happened there? Was it of any importance? If a vivid imagination doesn't bring an area to life, a little research usually will.

A favorite spot of mine is the often overlooked Dog Den Butte near the tiny town of Butte, located southeast of Velva just inside the McLean County line. A few miles to the west of Dog Den Butte is Strawberry Lake, a popular body of water ringed with cabins.

The region has a lot of history associated with it. The Totten Trail, a mail route from Fort Totten south of Devils Lake, to Fort Stevenson located south of present day Garrison, ran near the Dog Den. Mail carriers and others traveling on the frontier used Strawberry Lake to fill canteens and water horses in the unsettled region.

Dog Den Butte rises tall over the surrounding landscape, offering a superb view of the prairie below. It was a well-known landmark to early day travelers crossing land marked by few distinguishing

features. While the butte served as a lookout spot on the frontier, today it supports various communication towers.

In 1868 Col. Philippe Regis de Trobriand, commander at Fort Stevenson, traversed the Totten Trail with a military escort. He was seeking to find the remains of two mail carriers killed on the trail near Strawberry Lake. He found a bloody sock, nothing else, but he noted in his journal that some on the frontier believed that nearby Dog Den Butte was guarded by "snarling ghost dogs".

Although it cannot be said with certainty, one of the murdered mail carriers was believed to be dispatched by young Hunkpapa Sioux Sitting Bull who would later become a nationally known figure for his leadership at the Battle of the Little Bighorn and his fierce defense of the Indian way of life.

A much larger shooting scrape, known as the Battle of the Grand Coteau, occurred near the Dog Den July 13-14, 1851. A band of Metis on a hunting foray found themselves surrounding and greatly outnumbered by Sioux warriors. kim fundingsland photo

An eyewitness to the engagement described the land as where "bison grazed in peace" and hunters "were only worried by the passage of war parties, which were looking for scalps."

The Metis gathered their carts to form a defensive perimeter, placing the women and children in protective dugouts underneath the carts. The Sioux made several attempts to overrun the hastily built fortress but eventually withdrew. The defenders estimated they had killed a dozen Sioux. Despite "thousands of bullets" no Metis were killed in the fight, but a man taken prisoner by the Sioux was executed within view of the Metis fortification.

When I see the Dog Den today, I think about what it has witnessed throughout history, great herds of buffalo, early day inhabitants, and the like. There are many other landmarks in North Dakota that have very interesting stories associated with them too.

A little history and a little imagination make such landmarks come alive, no longer just another part of innocuous landscape passing outside a car window.

If your dog or cat moves too much or has anxiety on car rides, you may want to consider securing a crate for them somewhere in the car. Make sure your pet has access to fresh water, food, and the occasional fan or open window (thicker coated pets are prone to overheating in the car), and bring plenty of toys and treats to keep them occupied! If you are flying, it's important to make sure your pet has a sturdy crate and ample blankets to keep them warm (if flying in cargo). If your pet has never traveled with you before, you may want to begin preparing as soon as possible by getting them accustomed to a crate, getting in

the car, potty training, and even scheduling a check up with the vet in case any medications are needed. Some pets have so much anxiety over traveling that medication is necessary for their wellbeing!

 Have a Plan: Traveling with a pet can make plans a little more complicated, so it's best to get things squared away ahead of time. Make sure your hotels are pet-friendly, whoever you are staying with has a space for your pet to sleep and be alone (if needed), and it is never a bad idea to go ahead and find a local veterinarian in case of any emergencies. Make sure you bring any important documents you may need for your pet as well as any medications or special food. If you are staying with someone who has other pets, it is especially important to either make sure everyone gets along well or ensure your pet has a safe place to hang out while the festivities happen.

Have Fun: Traveling with pets should be fun!
 Stop off at a unique pet-friendly spot along the way or take them to a local park while you're home. Buy them some holiday themed treats or toys, and don't be afraid to let your pet munch on some of the (pet safe) holiday food. If you're bringing them along, chances are they are a big part of your family, meaning they deserve to enjoy the trip as well.

While traveling with pets can be a little more stressful, have your furry friend around for the holidays with the rest of the family is one of the best ways to spend the season. Have fun, be safe, and have a happy holiday season!





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# Military Women & The Month that Celebrates Them

For 36 years, Women's History Month has commemorated women. March has shined a light on women's contributions in both history and society while also ushering a new type of feminist awareness. This history month represents more than women today, but also women of the past and those yet to come who have or plan to make a difference in the world. This month celebrates them.

While the month covers women from all walks of life, the base gives a special nod to the female military members specifically during this month. In today's gender equality armed forces, it is sometimes easy to forget that women have not always been allowed to serve their country in this capacity. However, digging through history will produce story after story of women who un-officially fought for their countries. There are those who disguised themselves as men to sneak into battle, and there are those who selflessly rushed into dangerous situations to nurse injured soldiers. Women have always been around the military, but it wasn't until WW1 and the turn of the century when women began to be more than a background in the military.

In 1901, the U.S. Army Nurse Corps (ANC) was formally established allowing women to serve in the military as nurses. By the time WW2 rolled around, becoming an Army nurse was a popular way for women to serve. Additionally, when the U.S. military found themselves in need of the jobs filled by the Military back home, they allowed women to officially join the Armed Forces, in non-combat roles. According to the United Service Organizations (USO), "In total, nearly 350,000 American women served in uniform during World War II." By 1948, President Truman signed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act into law which officially allowed women to serve in all branches of the Armed Services.

the Vietnam War, During approximately 11,000 women served overseas as Army nurses. Many volunteered to go. "In 1967, President Lyndon B. Johnson opened promotions for women to general and flag ranks and in 1972, women were allowed to command units that included men." Additionally, just one year later, pregnant women were finally allowed to remain in the military. The Gulf Wars in the early 1990's led to 40,000 women deployed to combat zones, even though they still were not allowed to fight in combat, but they could engage as flyers or advisors. In 2015, the ban for women in combat was finally lifted., "This historic change opened up hundreds of thousands of jobs for women in the military and essentially ensured that as long as female service members completed the necessary training and requirements, they could now serve in almost any role in the U.S. Armed Forces." Why the truncated history lesson about women in the military? Because that is what Women's History Month is all about. It is about celebrating women famous or unknown and learning about their contributions. This is exactly the concept of the organization, Women Inspiring the Next Generation (WINGS), does all year long, but especially in the month of March. Staff Sgt.



On March 15, 1967, the "Super Jolly Green Giant," or the Sikorsky HH-53B helicopter, made its initial flight. At the time, the HH-53B was the largest, most powerful, and the fastest helicopter in the United States Air Force. The maiden flight of 66-14428 took place in Stratford, Connecticut and was piloted by James R. Wright and Patrick A. Guinn. The helicopters were then sent to the 37th Air Rescue and Recovery Squadron at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida and Vietnam to perform combat search and rescue missions, as well as special

operations. The aircraft were key participants in the Son Tay Raid, where joint military forces flew a covert night mission to a POW camp in Vietnam to rescue American prisoners. By 1988, the HH-53s were modified to a new special operations configuration. In 2007, 66-14428 was retired to The Boneyard in Tucson, Arizona, and all of the models were withdrawn by September of 2008.

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# The Key Word Is Community

Jason Zimmerman is a Minot native, and a member of Task Force 21, the organization tasked with maintaining the connection between Minot and Minot Air Force Base. However, as they sometimes say his real job is President of the Minot Area Community Foundation whose mission is to enrich the quality of life for the people of this area by: Encouraging philanthropy, by providing attractive solutions to donors, being a catalyst for community cooperation and serving as a resource for Minot area charitable organizations.

"What do we do that benefits base families? You can take pretty much any quality of life project in Minot, and we've probably been involved, big or small. Everything from the Roosevelt Park Zoo, the big cat exhibits, the tiger exhibit, the Amur Leopard exhibit that is coming online shortly; those are pretty substantial gifts of over half a million dollars between the two. Then there is our biggest and most notable, the Magic City Discovery Center. The concept of a children's museum came from one of our giving circles, Give 360, about eight or nine years ago the group got together and said, wouldn't this be great" according to Zimmerman.

So, the Give 360 group did some initial seed funding to kick off some studies "and now 20 million dollars later up on North Hill.

The Magic Climber Exhibit is the single largest gift to date from The Foundation of \$750,000 dollars." With other gifts and endowments, the MACF has a total of \$1.3 million dollars into the Magic City Discovery Project. Other notable gifts have funded the trail system with infrastructure including bathrooms on the trails. "There's also other smaller gifts" according to Zimmerman "including The Fun Zone, a Minot District project

over at the armory. Not a whole lot of money, \$6,000 dollars, but in the winter months it's a place for parents to take kids, younger kids especially, for a little activity."

The MACF recently awarded \$40,000 for remodel of the Children's Library at the Minot Public Library. Knowing that a lot of the community and military families are big hockey fans, the MACF invested in the third rink, more commonly known as The Pepsi Rink at the MAYSA arena. "There's a lot of different things that we have had our fingers in that benefit not only the citizens of Minot, but our friends and families, really, on the Minot Air Force Base.

The MACF wants to encourage philanthropy in the Minot They community. establish endowments on behalf of their many donors. Those donors can advise their funds on an annual basis when they are alive. The profits from the endowments are funneled back into the community to the various non-profits who use the money on the many projects throughout the community. There are also discretionary funds "Which is pretty unique for a foundation of our size" says Zimmerman "we have eight or nine endowments that 100%

discretionary. We have a group of community individuals called our community invest advisors that meet every month and make recommendations on grant requests for those dollars. Those are the funds that we use for larger projects like the Discovery Center, the zoo projects, because we are able to pool some resources."

The MACF has up to a 3-year carryover allowing donors to hold their funds up to three years allowing them to make a larger donation to a particular project or initiative.

Community Foundations like the MACF help to fund projects that to a better community and that helps to sell Minot as a positive community in which to live. "Base families are always looking for a better quality of life, and family activities and we are always looking for the niche to help out only the Minot community, but the Minot Air Force Base" according Zimmerman.







## NOTES ON BEING SAFE The Second impact is often the deadliest

Americans love football, hotdogs, apple pie and wearing seat belts. Well, maybe Americans aren't too thrilled about wearing seat belts.

In fact, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Transportation, in 2017 (the most current data year) there were 17,452 fatalities in which restraints were not used, or an average of 349 deaths annually per state.

What many people fail to realize is that during most vehicle accidents, occupants experience two separate impacts. First, there is the initial impact. This occurs when the vehicle hits another object, but this impact alone may not be enough to cause serious harm. The second impact is the culprit behind most car injuries.

Sir Issac Newton's first law of motion comes into play here. Simply put, the law states that every object will remain in motion until acted upon by an outside force, and the results can be deadly.

The second impact occurs inside the vehicle after the force from the initial impact turns the occupants into flying projectiles, slamming them into the dashboard, windshield, or other hardened parts of the interior. Imagine this: A car traveling at 50 miles per hour (MPH) hits a stationary object and comes to a complete and sudden stop. An unbelted occupant and everything inside the car not secured will continue to travel at 50 MPH. Go a step further and compute the force with which the occupant will hit a stationary object inside the car--the vehicle's dash for instance. An occupant weighing 160 lbs traveling at a speed of 50 MPH, the force generated at the point of impact will be 8,000 pounds! Not too many bones in the body can withstand that kind of punishment; you can only imagine the damage to internal organs and soft tissue from a blow of 4 tons. Unlike a vehicle that can be repaired or replaced, the human body isn't easily repaired and is impossible to replace. Nothing can prevent the second collision; it's a law of physics. The only thing that can be done is to reduce severity. Fortunately, there is a device inside your car that is designed for just that purpose: your seat belt. The seatbelt wraps across the torso and waist of the driver and passenger to give the body something softer to absorb the impact. It also helps protect your body from being injured by the unyielding hard surfaces of metal and plastic on the inside of your car. Seatbelts keep you behind the wheel where you can continue to drive and possibly take further evasive action, and also prevent you from being ejected from the vehicleone of the biggest causes of motor vehicle fatalities.

Many new cars come with airbags and this feature gives some motorists a false sense of security. Airbags are passive devices, not active systems like seatbelts that require your action to latch. Passive can be good, because it's easy, but may not necessarily be as effective. Statistically, fewer injuries and fatalities occur in crashes of vehicles equipped with airbags, (overall, airbags reduce driver deaths by 14 percent and passenger deaths by 11 percent) but the deployment of an airbag alone during a high-speed collision may not be enough to save the life of an unbelted occupant.

Although some new cars offer side airbags, many do not. Dash mounted airbags offer no protection at all from side or rear collisions, only from the front. Supplemental don't offer during roll-overs, either. Wearing a lap belt keeps you anchored to the car seat and your shoulder belt keeps your upper body from pitching forward and hitting the airbag as it deploys. Remember, airbags are designed to compliment

seatbelts, not replace them. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, seat belt usage across the United States is on the rise and recently topped 80%. Seat belt compliance rates on most bases is over 99%, but the fact that Airmen continue to lose their lives off base by failing to buckle up suggests that off-base use still has massive room! for improvement. Supervisors are often faced with a tough job changing the ingrained habit patterns of Airmen who may have spent 18 or more years of their lives not wearing seatbelts. Persistence, sincerity, example, and constant awareness are the keys to success.

What choices do we have? Without the belt, people can look forward to skull fractures, facial lacerations, broken teeth, ribs and other nasty internal injuries and in the worst case, even death. The final decision is up to you. I know the choice I'll make. Remember, if the first impact doesn't get you the second one just might.

#### **KNOW YOUR CAR**

Read your vehicle's manual to familiarize yourself with the safety features on your vehicle—such as antilock brakes and electronic stability control-and how the features perform in wintry conditions. When renting a car, become familiar with the vehicle before driving it off the lot.

#### **PLUG IT IN**

For electric and hybrid-electric vehicles, minimize the drain on the battery. If the vehicle has a thermal heating pack for the battery, plug your vehicle in whenever it's not in use. Start your vehicle and preheat the interior before you unplug your vehicle in the morning.


#### **PLAN YOUR TRAVEL AND ROUTE**

## **SALMON WITH SPRING VEGETABLES AND PESTO**

4 (4 OZ EACH) SALMON, SKIN-ON, PIN

When ready to cook, set Traeger temperature to 500°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes. Place a piece of parchment paper on a large baking sheet or in a roasting pan. Rinse the salmon and pat dry. Brush all sides of the salmon with olive oil, and sprinkle generously with salt and black pepper on all sides. Place the salmon pieces skin-side up on the sheet tray leaving 2 inches between each piece. Place the asparagus, snap peas, and cherry tomatoes in a bowl. Gently mix the vegetables with the remaining tablespoon of olive oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt and a fresh grinding of pepper. Scatter the vegetables evenly onto the sheet pan. Place the sheet pan on the grill. In addition, place the lemons cut-side down directly on the grill grate towards the front of the grill. Close the lid and cook for 5 minutes. After 5 minutes, remove the lemons from the grill and stir the vegetables. Close the lid and cook for 5 more minutes, or until the fish reaches an internal temperature of 140°F and can be flaked with a fork. Remove the sheet pan from the grill. Place the fish and vegetables on a serving platter and drizzle with the pesto. Squeeze the grilled lemon over the top of the fish and vegetables. Sprinkle the lemon zest over the fish and add a few basil leaves for garnish. Serve immediately Enjoy!

# 2023 Prairie Warrior Auction

This event started out with just a couple of community members who cared about the relationship between the Minot community and the Air Force Base. The first year it consisted of a murder mystery dinner with an auction. It was a hit! The next year, Mrs. Betty Fedorchak, one of the founding members, became the chairperson for the event and carried that position for 31 years. Every year it grew more successful and more fun.

This annual event, now called The Prairie Warrior Auction, consists of a social, a silent and live auction along with a 50/50 raffle with the proceeds supporting events and team-building activities for the squadrons of Team Minot and their families. The donations for the auction come from our member investors in the community as well as members of the military community. What would Minot be without our military families? This is our way of helping where we can. Over the past 36 years, the auction has raised over \$680,000! We are very proud of this annual event and the fact it keeps getting bigger each year.

Sometimes the saying "the Big Three" conjures images of the three largest auto manufacturers in the United States.

Or maybe the three largest Big Tech companies in the country.

Perhaps it's the Big Three of college NCAA FBS football, possibly Alabama, Georgia, or Ohio State in recent years — or from the FCS it's possibly North Dakota State University — despite getting thumped by rival South Dakota State in this season's FCS championship — or Sam Houston State, now in the mid-level FBS realm of competition.

However, to hunters around North Dakota, it conjures up images of the state's three largest big game species – moose, elk, and bighorn sheep.

They're the "Big Three" not just because of their size. They're the "Big Three" because they should be considered the most treasured license a North Dakota hunter can obtain.

Drawing a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep license is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to hunt that species in the state.

Hunters can't apply in the lottery again if they're unsuccessful in harvesting their moose, elk, or bighorn sheep should they beat the odds and draw a license. A hunter with a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep license has one chance to hunt that species in North Dakota.

The exception would be if someone truly beat the odds and won a moose or elk license from a special raffle available to non-profit organizations.

While those odds are steep, it can and has happened where a hunter is drawn for a moose or elk license through the standard lottery and had their name drawn in the raffle. But in reality, most hunters are just darn lucky to get a moose, elk, or bighorn sheep license in the state.

Applicants must meet North Dakota residency

In North Dakota, moose hunting is a tad different. For starters, moose seem to have missed the memo they live only in wooded areas dotted with swamps and wetlands, feasting largely on tender woody browse.

Instead, North Dakota's moose went exploring and adapted quite well to living in woody shelterbelts planted by humans to stop the wind. They also found cornstalks, cattails, and sunflowers substitute for woody browse.

In other words, moose in North Dakota expanded outside their historical range, which is north-central and northeastern North Dakota's Turtle Mountains and Pembina Hills. That's typical moose habitat.

Nowadays, though, more moose are in northwest and west-central North Dakota.

Someone drawing a moose tag will want to do their share of preseason scouting to make certain they can hunt private land.

Another option for those applying for units M10 or M9 is to consider hunting Upper Souris (M10) or J. Clark Salyer (M9) National Wildlife Refuges. Remember, though, hunters can't drive off-trail to retrieve big game on refuges so anyone with a moose tag for those areas will want to work with the refuge in advance.

With chronic wasting disease identified in deer in some moose units hunters should also consider the fact they must follow CWD transportation regulations for any member of the cervid family – elk, moose, and deer. While getting an entire moose out in one piece is rare, at best, in many other areas of North America, it's fairly common in North Dakota.

The odds of drawing one of North Dakota's "Big Three" are admittedly slim – and it's different hunting elk in the Badland compared to mountain states or hunting moose on the prairie compared to the Canadian forests – but it's still worth applying for a license.

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





# Air Force conducts Sentinel static fire test

#### AIR FORCE NUCLEAR WEAPONS CENTER PUBLIC AFFAIRS

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah

The Air Force and Northrop Grumman conducted a static fire test March 2, 2023, for the LGM-35A Sentinel weapon system at Northrop Grumman's facility in Promontory, Utah.

This open-air test is the first in a series of static fire tests that will validate the design and performance of Sentinel's threestage propulsion system during its development. The Stage-1 solid rocket motor (SRM) tested here is the largest of Sentinel's three stages and the first SRM to fire upon missile launch.

"This test is just one part of our comprehensive ground and flight test program designed to help us shake down the design as we approach its critical design review. By testing early, we reduce risk to the overall weapon system schedule." said Maj. Gen. John Newberry, Air Force Nuclear Weapons Center commander and Air Force program executive officer for strategic systems. The test results are currently


being analyzed by a team of experts from AFNWC and Northrop Grumman.

"This test shows that the Sentinel program is now in the phase of its development where physical hardware is being tested in realworld conditions," Newberry said. "It is further evidence that AFNWC will successfully deliver this capability to the warfighter."

The Air Force plans to replace the fielded Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile with the next-generation Sentinel system currently in development. The Sentinel acquisition program represents the modernization of the land-based leg of the U.S. nuclear triad.
