

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AFSVC announces winners of best dining facilities

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, Texas -- The Air Force Services Center recently announced the winners of the 2023 John L. Hennessy Trophy Awards for best dining facilities across the Department of the Air Force.

The annual awards program, established in 1957 and managed by AFSVC, recognizes the top dining facility operations in each of two regions, as well as the best in Air Force Reserve Command, small site award and missile feeding operation.

Earlier this year, four teams of Hennessy evaluators went on the road to get a closer look at the finalists to determine those that best demonstrate excellence in management, force readiness support, food quality and production, employee and customer relations, and training and safety awareness.

The three-person evaluation teams consisted of food service experts from the National Restaurant Association and AFSVC.

You could tell both military and contractor team members from the nominated bases take great pride in preparing and serving amazing, nutritious meals to the Airmen protecting our great nation," said James Gill, Food 2.0 Portfolio Management chief and evaluation team member.



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Air Force recognizes Lance P. Sijan Award winners

The Air Force recognized the Lance P. Sijan Leadership Award recipients from 2019 to 2022 during an award ceremony at the Pentagon, Arlington, Virginia, April 3.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. CQ Brown, Jr., spoke about the prestigious award, highlighting the accomplishments of the Airmen who embody Sijan's leadership and character in performance and standards of personal conduct.

"Your acts of courage and inspirational leadership is why we are all here today," Brown said during the ceremony. "You carry on a legacy of courage, resilience and dedication to duty that Capt. Sijan stood for."

The ceremony received a special legacy tribute as Sijan's younger sister Janine Sijan attended the event and accompanied Brown with the presentation of the awards.

"I thank you all so much from Sijans' past, present and future" Sijan said to the recipients. "You're my new family.'

An Air Force Academy graduate and combat pilot, Capt. Lance P. Sijan was the first Air Force Academy graduate to receive the Medal of Honor, awarded posthumously, for his bravery and courage while evading capture and during captivity as a prisoner of war in Vietnam.

THE 2019 AWARD **RECIPIENTS:**

Col. Carl F. Miller, Air Combat Command, distinguished himself while leading the combat advisory mission for a squadron of 20 joint and combined air advisors operating a fleet of 69 aircraft. He led the program execution and fielding of ten AC-208 aircraft, providing the first organic intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, and low-yield, precision-strike capability for the Afghan Air Force.

Maj. Justin L. Burrier, Air Force Special Operations Command, saved the lives of six aircrew and a \$98 million aircraft after experiencing a catastrophic dualengine failure. He also directed two large-force exercises as AFSOC's lead planner, including U.S. Special Operations Command's largest exercise in history with over 60 aircraft and 2,500 personnel.

Master Sgt. (retired) Michael J. Hurley, Air Education and Training Command, directed security operations for 98 military and civilian personnel during 16 indirect fire rocket attacks, securing 250 aircraft. He also validated a \$4 million contract to integrate 36 civilian security guards into airfield defense and led security operations for the first joint airshow at Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi.

Master Sgt. Jeffrey B. Fitzgerald, Air Force Global Strike Command, was instrumental to the rebirth of the 91st Security Forces Group's Tactical Response Force at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, which vetted 1,000 defenders for AFGSC. He also authored two chapters in the first-ever Security Force Nuclear Doctrine.

THE 2020 AWARD **RECIPIENTS:**

Lt. Col. Steven M. K. Cooper, Air Force Special Operations commanded Command, 525-person multi-national joint task force that spanned over five countries. His efforts eliminated terrorist safe havens within a 500-square mile radius.

Maj. Kasey Vaughn, Air Force Special Operations Command, led a team of intelligence specialists

supporting joint task force operations, and directed advanced digital forensics research and development for commercial and government applications for nextgeneration capabilities.

Senior Master Sgt. Jeremy D. Mapalo, U.S. Air Forces in Europe, led 78 warfighters while defending a nine-hour attack on Magogoni Airfield against 30 Al-Shabaab fighters. His actions allowed a joint-operator ambush that secured one missing soldier.

Master Sgt. Trevor J. Runyan, U.S. Air Forces in Europe, coordinated a reaction task for an urgent battlefield mass casualty evacuation, saving the lives of 30 coalition service members. He also oversaw the treatment of four special operations forces teams, treating 48 joint and Afghan partners.

THE 2021 AWARD **RECIPIENTS:**

Lt. Col. Nicholas R. Wabeke, Air Force Special Operations Command, led 200 Air Force and Army members to provide security and airfield management ensuring the success of three aviation organizations. His efforts enabled 2,000 missions with over 36,000 hours and included a successful hostage rescue and the retrograde of American forces from Somalia.

Capt. Charles E. Aly, Air Combat Command, led more than 200 personnel from 12 Air Force Specialty Codes that enabled the rapid deployment capability of Immediate Response Forces. In addition, as the deployed director of operations at Air Base 201, Niger, he oversaw more than 150 personnel and over 30 programs supporting Operation Juniper Shield.

Chief Master Sgt. Jefferey J. Brown, Air Force Global Strike Command, led 291 military and civilian personnel while accomplishing 3,000 job orders, and his leadership was vital to sustaining 2,500 facilities and 27 aircraft at Minot Air Force Base. He also led 124 members and oversaw the successful completion of 6,000 jobs while deployed to

Tech. Sgt. Jennifer H. Weigl, Education and Training

Command, led the Department of Defense's largest microbiology department and managed a \$5.2 million equipment account while supervising 63 joint military members. She also fortified the Air and Space Force's Basic Military Training mission by shifting 110,000 Coronavirus tests to Brooke Army Medical Center, averting a \$1 billion training platform pause.

THE 2022 AWARD **RECIPIENTS:**

Lt. Col. Morgan H. Laird, Air Force Special Operations Command, commanded forces assigned to the joint tactical exfiltration of Bagram Air Base, Afghanistan, that ensured the last 727 joint service members safely collapsed security and boarded 15 aircraft to depart. He led his squadron through three crisis response deployments, evacuating 1,100 American citizens and safeguarding a U.S. embassy.

Capt. Christopher T. Locke, U.S. Air Forces in Europe, was selected to lead one of five evacuee camps during Operations Allies Refuge at Ramstein Air Base, Germany. He managed 1,000 joint service members supporting a camp with over 9,000 Âfghans.

Senior Master Sgt. Karla J. Pelavo, Air Combat Command, led nearly 600 Airmen and directed the largest logistics hub supporting operations Inherent Resolve, Spartan Shield and Enduring Sentinel. Her leadership was critical during the historic non-combatant evacuation of more than 57,000 personnel from Afghanistan directly supporting Operation Allies Refuge.

Tech. Sgt. Connor J. Hamilton, Air Combat Command, led nine joint teams and 50 members during Operation Inherent Resolve and Allied Refuge. He equipped senior leaders with courses of action that resecured Hamid Karzai International Airport enabling history's largest evacuation of 124,000 refugees. He also led a combatant command planning group fusing State Department and military strategy deploying 1,000 warfighters to rescue 5,000 personnel.

North Dakota, more diverse than you think...



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

It seems that every time we see information about North Dakota agriculture, it's about the 11 crops that the Ag Department maintains as No. 1 in the nation.

In one sense it paints a good picture for us, but in another it's deceiving because anyone who farms or knows someone who more diverse than that.

What about those crops that are No. 3 or No. 6, or even No. 10 in the nation. If you dig deep into the United States Census of Agriculture, you'll find that even those crops or livestock we consider minor here in North Dakota, show sometimes far greater yield than other states.

One example is maple syrup. Vermont, New Hampshire, Minnesota, Michigan, yes, but maple syrup is being produced on four farms in Griggs and Eddy counties. There's a farm in Stutsman County that is growing dill for its oil not for pickles. Fiftyseven farms have llamas, 23 have elk and six have rabbits.

Following is a rundown of some of the crops and livestock that we don't often think about. Out of sight, out of mind, right. There are a lot of statistics, but 2017 is the the most recent year for complete numbers across the board.

Thirty-nine farms grew buckwheat with the most, seven, in Golden Valley County. Dunn had five and Kidder had five. There were five farms in Divide County that grew emmer and spelt.

We often think of lentils as Idaho and Washington agriculture. In 2017, there were 462 farms that grew lentils in North Dakota. Leading the way was Williams with 167, followed by Divide with

Twenty-nine farms safflower led by eight farms in Bowman County and seven in Divide. Six farms grew triticale. Mountrail, Ransom and Dickey all had the wheat type grain.

Somewhat surprising was winter wheat. Only 170 of some 26,000 farms grew winter wheat in a state in which winter wheat works well. Ward County led the state in that department with 18 farms.

Do you know what vetch is? It's normally a forage crop, but there was one farm in Dickey County that grew it for commercial seed

production in 2017.

Seven farms in Bottineau, Cavalier, Rolette and Ward grew asparagus commercially. Ten farms led by Cavalier and Kidder grew broccoli, 26 farms grew cabbage with Burleigh leading the way

This one is a bit surprising. There were 30 farms in 2017 that grew cantaloupe and honeydew melons. Richland and Ward counties had three each, while Barnes, Cavalier and Dunn had two each.

Forty-two farms grew carrots, six being in Burleigh, five in Cavalier and four in Morton. Five grew cauliflower, two grew celery, 58 grew cucumberts, 11 grew eggplant and 13 grew garlic, with three in Burleigh and two each in Ward and Griggs.

It seems every farm has horseradish in their tree lines. As it turned out three farms; two in Cavalier and one in Ward grew horseradish commercially in 2017. Two farms grew parsley, one grew okra, 26 grew bell peppers and 43 grew onions with Ward having

nine farms that grew dry onions. Continuing, 36 farms grew pumpkins led by Burleigh, six

grew radishes, eight grew rhubarb, 30 grew watermelon led by Ward and 64 counties grew tomatoes including nine in Burleigh, nine in Ward and five each in Cass, Griggs and Morton.

I'll bet you didn't know that Cavalier County has five apricot farms, five pear farms and five plum farms. North Dakota had 43 farms growing apples, that's double from 2012 and 32 farms grew and harvested cherries.


Turning to livestock, we seem to have such a shortage of eggs, yet 743 farms grew layer hens in 2017. There were 191 farms that had meat goats, 164 had milk goats and 20 had angora goats.

A total of 573 farms had sheep, not exactly on the Ag Department's radar yet sheep continue to be a major livestock in North Dakota.

There are numerous other aspects of agriculture and we'll get into some of those numbers

Sometimes a person needs to listen to the silence.

Our world is filled with sounds of all sorts, so much so that most of us don't even realize it. There's cheering and chatter, the closing of car doors, noise of traffic, televisions. ring tones of cell phones -- even our own footsteps.

It seems there's always the sound of a siren, dog barking in the distance, traffic starting and stopping, dishwashers, vacuum cleaners, lawn mowers, snow trains, planes, and hundreds upon hundreds of other sources of daily noise.

The Silence of the Owl

Sometimes, I think, a person needs to listen to the silence. Much easier said than done. It takes some effort and some time, especially for those of us who are city dwellers. We've become so accustomed to hearing so many sounds every day that we don't even pay attention to most of them.

For many, silence, real silence, is somehow troubling. Scary even. We need sounds, from any source, and conversations too. Anything else is simply too removed from the norm, a change that is difficult to embrace.

Spring is a good time to give it a try though. Get outdoors, away from the sounds of everyday life. One of my favorite places to listen to the quiet is the shoreline of a frozen lake.

The silence can be deafening. Your ears strain to hear sounds that are not there. It's weird, but pleasant too. Think of it as yoga for the mind.

There will still be occasional sounds, of course, such as the

cracking of ice as spring breakup begins. Birds too. Not just delicate and pure bird songs, but the sounds made by their wingbeats. The goose flies with an easily recognizable "whoosh" of air pushed by its large wings. A sharptailed grouse flies with a snapping wingbeat followed by a glide.

Ducks, blackbirds, doves, robins, larks, birds of all kinds, have their unique sounds in flight too. It takes silence to hear them, if you can find

There's a notable exception in the bird world though. The owl flies in silence. There is no audible sound of air rushing through or over its wings. The owl is gifted with wing feathers that do not interlock tightly, allowing air to pass through quietly so as not to alert its prey.

Take the time to go outdoors and find a quiet place, even for a few minutes. It will be memorable, rejuvenating, and soothing. And, if you are fortunate, you'll hear the silence of the owl.

Conversation with Col & Mrs. McCarty

That Minuteman Missile. Its role is pretty important on a global scale. Because of this, the three Groups in the 91st Missile Wing complete their daily mission: "to defend the nation with a combatready nuclear force." The Wing consists of the 91st Operations Group, 91st Maintenance Group and 91st Security Forces Group. In order to understand the essential functions of each group in the Missile Wing and get an in-depth life and career perspective from Team Minot's senior leaders, the Northern Sentry is running a series

of articles talking to the people

who understand the most about the importance of their group: the

Group Commanders themselves. The first in this series of interviews is Col Anthony McCarty, Commander, 91st Security Forces Group. In order to get a more personalized view of the mission, he and his spouse Dawn McCarty agreed to be interviewed and share some of the personal aspects of what the 91 SFG is about, why it's important and what they have both gone through to get to this position in their AF journey.

Col McCarty commands Security Forces Airmen, or Defenders, whose main responsibilities are to protect, secure and defend the intercontinental ballistic missiles assigned to Minot AFB. On any given day there can be between 150-250 Defenders committed to missile field operations by "posting out" to Missile Alert Facilities (MAF), executing convoy operations, directly supporting

missile maintenance activities, or on a standby alert status. Three of the four squadrons rotate missile complex security responsibilities, spending one of every three weeks posted out. The fourth squadron supports the other three with logistics and communications; postures Tactical Response Force (TRF) teams on-alert for a week at a time, teaming with helicopter crews from the 54th Helicopter Squadron to provide specialized, rapid response capabilities to the complex; and fueling the Convoy Response Force (CRF), which plans and executes overland movements across the 8,800 square miles of North Dakota to ensure the 91st Missile Wing meets the readiness levels set from US Strategic Command.

NS: Please explain in your own words what the 91 SFG does and how each of the squadrons work together:

Col McCarty: First and foremost, the Security Forces Group is composed of four squadron level organizations. [91st Missile Security Operations Squadron, 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron, 791st Missile Security Forces Squadron & 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron] We total over 1000 personnel. Our responsibilities are to provide security and protection for all the 91st Missile Wing nuclear assets and operations. It is literally required by policy to have security forces personnel and capabilities at the installation to support whatever is going on.

NS: What would happen to the base if your group could not perform its functions?

Col McCarty: We represent a pretty significant portion of the Missile Wing so we're about 3/3 of the enlisted forces here. The Missile Wing would not be able to function and would not be able to meet those wartime or peacetime missions. The SFG is absolutely a linchpin to the wing being able to accomplish its job.

NS: What is the most important foundation of your command leadership philosophy?

Col McCarty: People...I really try to focus on the human aspects because being a security forces member is very much a people business. I'm a firm believer in if you take care of the people and their families, if you take care of the Airmen, that they will take care of the mission.

NS: Can you tell me more about what taking care of people means

Col McCarty: I work very very hard to make sure we've got connective tissues with our key spouses with the command teams in each of the squadrons. So that we can keep a very open dialogue about what is going on and what our airmen and their families need. Because if we are able to help support and balance some of these things, I think the Airmen then can focus a little better on what we're asking them to do in support of their nation. I try to be accessible. We have a very large organization and I like to hear what's on our families' minds. My door is wide open, come talk to me and that is the same to the families and

NSy: When in your AF career did you realize being a group commander was a goal?

Col McCarty: It was never really a goal. I always tried very hard to just do the best job that I could. Sometimes that had me doing jobs that I had no intentions of ever





doing. I have had a vast career. I've done some things that are fairly unique in the Air Force, and I just try to do the best job I can possibly do. Then, as we came out on the Group Command list, we were actually really excited!

NS: So, what comes next in your

career?

Col McCarty: We're not completely sure. As far as what I will do beyond Group Command, it's still very much up in the air. I don't know what I want to be when I grow up. I'm born and raised in Indiana, and Dawn has fallen in love with Indiana. We bought land there several years ago and that's where the forever home will go.

NS: What do you want spouses and families in the 91 SFG to be aware of or prepare for when stationed at Minot AFB?

Mrs. McCarty: To realize that it's cold, but bloom where you are planted. A Wing Commander spouse gave me a flower one time and said, 'bloom where you are planted'. It's the people [that matter] so get out, meet people that are in your squadrons. Don't just sit back and wait. Don't be afraid to reach out and grab somebody in the community or ask questions because they are always willing to

Col McCarty: Embrace that it is 'small town living'. It is different for many of our Airmen and their families from what they've never experienced before. Look at it as an opportunity and find what you really love about the area.

NS: Looking back on your AF career, what is something that you wish you had known, personally or professionally?

Mrs. McCarty: Don't be afraid to talk to a senior leadership spouse. I was always told when I was an enlisted spouse 'don't ever approach a general!' almost like it was a crime. But now I tell [younger] spouses to go and ask them questions. They want you to say 'hey.'

Col McCarty: I think the thing that I didn't have an appreciation for then, but have grown an immense appreciation for, is making your entire family feel like they are part of the AF family. You have to imbed your family in as much of the [AF lifestyle] as you humanly can. It's their adventure too. Try and bring them into the AF fold as best you can and try to make them as comfortable about what they're going through. I wish I would have had a better appreciation for how every PCS impacts the spouse and family. It wasn't until our kids got a little bit older and you started to really understand after two or three assignments. I wish I had learned that a lot faster.

NS: Can you explain some ways that Airmen can help do this for their families?

Col McCarty: Don't be nervous that your significant other or spouse is communicating with someone in the senior leadership chain and that it is going to bring some sort of negative light on you. I think when you're young, you really think that. But I think the vast majority of AF leadership wants to make their families as comfortable as possible. For the young Airmen, what I would ask them to do is just be comfortable with the fact that it's your family's PCS too and it's your family's gaining squadron, group, and wing too. Try to make them as much a part of the PCS as possible.

NS: What sacrifices have you made over your AF career? Personally, or professionally?

Mrs. McCarty: Family Time. Not with our immediate family, but the extended family and grandparents and our parents. Our kids have sacrificed that a lot.

Col McCarty: I think Dawn and my family have sacrificed a lot whether it be deployments, to the missile field, or deployments downrange, moving every 2-3

years, trying to inculcate into a new base, environment and schools. All of that comes with an immense amount of sacrifice. There is a tremendous amount of selflessness and sacrifice associated with an Airman serving, but it goes much further than just the Airman. It's the entire family that is impacted.

NS: Has there been anyone in the past that has specifically influenced you for the better?

Mrs. McCarty: Cathy Gathright. She was the deputy group commander spouse in Montana while we were a second lieutenant. She was probably my biggest supporter and mentor. She is phenomenal. She loves the troops.


Col. McCarty: So I will tell you I have had lots. Throughout my 30 years I've had coaches and mentors and people that really taught me a lot. I would highlight Dawn though as my key supporter because when I was enlisted, we raised our son when he was very young. I was a full-time student while on active duty trying to finish my education. 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NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Basic principals for safe lifting

You would never use a jack without also using a jack stand right!

The vehicle lifts that are supporting a vehicle you are working or being stored can represent one of the most productive tools in your shop, or one of the most dangerous pieces of equipment for you if not used and maintained properly. You'd never drive a vehicle that hadn't had the brakes inspected in years. Here are some basic and common sense principles apply to vehicle lifts in your shop and daily inspections are part of your job.

Whether you're using twopost lifts, parallelograms, mobile column lifts, drive-on lifts or inground lifts for servicing vehicles, you should follow these basic safety rules.

1. BUY CERTIFIED

LIFTS

There's only one nationally safety standard recognized for vehicle lifts: ANSI-ALI/ ALCTV/CE, administered by the Automotive Lift Institute (ALI/ ETL). ETL testing labs verify that a manufacturer's lifts meet the national safety standard for vehicles lift. The Automotive Lift Institute working through ETL testing procedures involves third-party verifying lift manufacturers comply with current ANSI requirements for lifts as defined by the International Building Code, which mandates that lifts be third party tested to meet these safety requirements. To verify equipment status, look for J/ETI next to the lift's controls.

2. BUY CERTIFIED LIFT OPTIONS

A commonly overlooked mistake is using an uncertified option or accessory on a certified lift. Doing so will void the lift's certification. It's simple: If the optional accessory isn't certified then the lift isn't certified. ALI/ETL standards (&ANSI standards & building code standards), require all accessories, such as drive-on lifts, rolling jacks and truck adaptors, to be certified. Although certification is good for the life of the lift, older models may not meet the most current standards. Complying with American National Standards Institute (ANSI), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health (PEOSH) requirements is the key to keeping vehicle lifts at the highest possible safety level.

3. NO LOCKS ARE LIABILITY

Always raise the vehicle and then lower it onto the lift's mechanical locks as required by ANSI. Refer to ALI safety manual lifting it Right or the manufacturer's operating instructions for detailed information. An easy way to visually verify the locks are being used is to include a weight gauge (a pressure gauge calibrated to the lift's lifting capacity) on your lift. A weight gauge can also be a great diagnostic tool. If using an old inground lift that doesn't have locks, it's time for a new lift. While some in-ground lifts can be retrofitted with an aftermarket lock, it's not the most cost-effective option, and your lift will still not be ALI/ETL certified to be compliant with ANSI rules and building code laws.

4. IT'S EASY TO OVERLOAD

Manufacturers of the most common two-post side by side lifts mandate that none of the four swing arms be overloaded. As an example: Some may think that a 15,000 pound rated lift that's loaded with a 14,200 pound


ambulance isn't near capacity. They're wrong! It's easy to see why two-post side-by-side lifts are often overloaded, even though the total lift capacity hasn't been exceeded.

5. INSPECT EQUIPMENT ANNUALLY

ANSI/Automotive Lift Institute ALCTV Standard for Automotive Lifts-"Safety Requirements for Construction, Testing, and Validation" requires technicians to perform a daily operational safety check. The code also requires an annual inspection by a qualified individual. Failing to do so could expose your shop to liabilities that could be associated with an injury if an accident were to happen.

6. TRAINING AND TESTING

Contact the Automotive Lift Institute, your lift supplier, or a local lift inspection company for a copy of the 20-minute lifting it Right video hosted by legendary. Like any product, lifts vary in style, type, capability, longevity and warranty.

From frozen rain to scorching heat, Team Minot has a wide variety of different environmental challenges. Senior Airman Christina Long, 5th Operations Support Squadron weather forecaster, is the Airman responsible for making sense of the constantly changing North Dakota weather.

"I love when I get a correct forecast," said Long. "When I'm briefing the bombers, hueys, or security forces squadrons, it feels good to nail a forecast."

Weather can be our greatest ally or strongest adversary. That's why accurate weather forecasting plays such an integral part in the success and safety of missions at Team Minot. Air Force Weather and Environmental Services Officers perform, manage and direct weather operations that have a direct effect on the activities of U.S. military forces.

"We can forecast up to 10 days out accurately, but just one small change can drastically alter what actually comes our way," said Long. "It's frustrating when people don't understand that forecasting the weather is a testy thing.'

A weather Airman's duties primarily involve integrating current and forecasted atmospheric and space weather conditions into operations and planning. Weather and Environmental Services Officers also develop, direct and coordinate meteorological weather studies and research.

"Personally I am a very black and white person," said Long. "I like to have yes or no answers in my life. However, the weather rarely works in certainties like

Countless factors can contribute to the outcome of a mission, including something as seemingly simple as the weather. It's the job of weather specialists to keep a constant watch over the forecast and conditions that can affect the safety of pilots and aircrew.

"This job would be perfect for curious people," said Long. "I have learned so much about the science behind the weather. I find it all so interesting.

Weather forecasters utilize the latest technology to predict weather patterns, prepare forecasts and

communicate weather information to commanders and pilots so that every mission goes as planned.

"The hardest part about being a weather forecaster is getting it wrong," said Long. "I have to struggle with people who are usually pretty upset at me. I've learned how to have confidence in myself and how to communicate.



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Gen. Bussiere briefs senior leaders on missile community cancer study process

Recently, Gen. Thomas A. Bussiere, commander, Air Force Global Strike Command, along with Col. Lee Williames, AFGSC Command Surgeon, briefed Secretary of the Air Force Frank Kendall, Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gen. C.Q. Brown, Jr., and other key U.S. Air Force and Space Force leaders on the ongoing study of cancer cases from the missile community.

"Our obligation to care for our Airmen and Guardians is sacred," said Kendall. "We are committed to maintaining an open dialogue, remaining transparent, and continuously providing updates to our members and families throughout this study."

The study, conducted by the U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine in coordination with the Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Cancer institute, and other civilian academic institutions, covers all career fields within the missile community, past and present.

"The scope of this study is intentionally broad, looking over time, multiple locations, and career fields with similar exposure risks" Bussiere said. "We don't want to miss any Airman or Guardian who might have been affected, or who could be affected in the future."

That action has already begun, with previous studies at Malmstrom Air Force Base in 2001 and 2005 being cross-checked against new medical literature that may have emerged since those studies were completed. If the research teams finds an increased incidence of cancer, the next step would then be to determine causation.

"The findings of the incidence study will be critical when looking at next steps," Williames said. "It will create a roadmap for evaluation of cause and ultimately informed mitigation strategies."

In addition to reviewing existing studies, the research teams developed plans to visit active intercontinental ballistic missile bases, orienting themselves to the day-to-day mission environment to be able to identify potential exposure concerns, while also working alongside local public health and bioenvironmental engineering members to develop a plan for long term monitoring going forward.

"Our Airmen, Guardians, and families -- past and present -- deserve the highest level of diligent attention to the specific cancer concerns raised by missile community members across related career fields and we are committed to the formal assessment that is underway to address and investigate those concerns," said Kendall.

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

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


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OOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

THE DOOLITTLE RAID

- APRIL 18, 1942 -

After the attack on Pearl Harbor, the United States Army Air Forces and Navy began formulating a plan for a reprisal attack on the Japanese Empire. They recruited Col. James "Jimmy" Doolittle to train the pilots who would be a part of the raid. On April 18, 1942, 16 B-25 Mitchell Bombers from the 17th Bombardment Group, led by Col. Doolittle, took off from the Navy's USS Hornet 650 miles off the coast and made a path towards Tokyo.

The bombers hit targets in Tokyo, Yokosuka, Yokohama, Kobe, and Nagoya. On the way back, fifteen of the aircraft crash-landed or had crews bail out due to low fuel and one made it to Russia. Three crew members died and eight were taken as Japanese POWs. According to Pacific Air Forces, Doolittle thought that he would be court-martialed upon his return. However, the Doolittle Raiders received the Congressional Gold Medal in 2015 and Col. Doolittle received the Medal of Honor for one of the greatest surprise attacks of the time. While the damage left by the raid was not severe, it was a serious morale booster for the US.



CITATION

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Airman First Class Pitsenbarger distinguished himself by extreme valor on 11 April 1966 near Cam My, Republic of Vietnam, while assigned as a pararescue Crew Member, Detachment 6, 38th Aerospace

Rescue and Recovery Squadron. On that date, Airman Pitsenbarger was aboard a rescue helicopter responding to a call for evacuation of casualties incurred in an ongoing firefight between elements of the United States Army's 1st Infantry Division and a sizeable enemy force approximately 35 mile east of Saigon. With complete disregard personal safety, Airman Pitsenbarger volunteered to ride a hoist more than one hundred feet through the jungle, to the ground. On the ground, he organized and coordinated rescue efforts, cared for the wounded , prepared casualties for evacuation, and insured that the recovery operation continued in a smooth and orderly fashion. Through his personal efforts, the evacuation of the wounded was greatly expedited. As each of the nine casualties evacuated that day was recovered, Airman Pitsenbarger refused evacuation in order to get more wounded soldiers to safety. After several pick-ups, one of the two rescue helicopters involved in the evacuation was struck by heavy enemy ground fire and was forced to leave the scene for an emergency Airman Pitsenbarger stayed behind on the ground to perform medical duties. Shortly thereafter, the area came under sniper and mortar fire. During a subsequent attempt to evacuate the site, American forces came under heavy assault by a large Viet Cong force. When the enemy launched the assault, the evacuation was called off and Airman Pitsenbarger took up arms with the besieged infantrymen. He courageously resisted the enemy, braving intense gunfire to gather and distribute vital ammunition to American defenders. As the battle raged on, he repeatedly exposed himself to

enemy fire to care for the wounded, pulled them out of the line of fire, and return fire whenever he could, during which time he was wounded three times. Despite his wounds, he valiantly fought on, Simultaneously treating as many wounded as possible. In the vicious fighting that followed, the American forces suffered 80 percent casaulties as their perimeter was breached, and Airman Pitsenbarger was fatally wounded. Airman Pitsenbarger exposed himself to almost certain death by staying on the ground, and perished while saving the lives of wounded infantrymen. His bravery and determination exemplify the highest professional standards and traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.





BAKED CHEESY CORN PUDDING



INGREDIENTS

- 3 CLOVE GARLIC, CHOPPED 3 TABLESPOON BUTTER
- 6 1/4 OUNCE WHOLE KERNEL CORN
- **8 OUNCE CREAM CHEESE** 1 CUP CHEDDAR CHEESE
- 1 CUP PARMESAN CHEESE
- 1 TABLESPOON KOSHER SALT
 1/2 TABLESPOON BLACK PEPPER
- 1/2 CUP PARMESAN CHEESE 1/2 CUP BREAD CRUMBS
- 1 TABLESPOON THYME, MINCED 1 TABLESPOON ROSEMARY, CHOPPED



In a large sauce pan, sauté the garlic with the butter over medium heat for 3 to 4 minutes. Add the corn, cream cheese, cheddar cheese, 1 cup of the parmesan cheese and salt and pepper. Heat until the cheese is melted then pour into a baking dish.

In a separate bowl, combine the remaining 1/2 cup parmesan cheese, bread crumbs and fresh herbs. Spread bread crumb mixture evenly over cheese and corn.

The winter of 2022-2023 seems to want to live on and on and on, even with an occasional hint of spring at times. Hopefully it arrives in full force and with it the marvel that is migration.

While waterfowl hunters likely focus on fall migration, spring migration signals the arrival of warm weather, the awakening of plants and trees, and arrival of our avian friends - some just passing over while others stay to entertain throughout the summer until they opt to head back south in the fall. .

The big question this spring might be if migration will ever occur given what seems like a never-ending winter.

But in thinking positive, how about testing one's knowledge of spring duck migration and nesting? In other words – how well do you really know your ducks? Ponder this:

Question No. 1: What ducks arrive earliest in North Dakota each spring?

•Answer: Mallards and pintails return in late March and early April. Hmmm, well, that didn't happen this year. Just remember, though, that's when they typically arrive. This isn't a typical spring — not that "typical" usually happens in North Dakota.

Question No. 2: How late into summer will mallards attempt to re-nest if it's destroyed by weather or predation?

•Answer: Mallards will attempt to re-nest as late as June, especially if their nesting area continues holding shallow water into late spring and early summer. This year we might still have ice in early summer. Or maybe even late summer. But back to the quiz...

Question No. 3: What species tend to arrive after mallards and pintails?

 Answer: Shovelers and blue-winged teal. Shovelers tend to be slightly ahead of blue-winged teal. However, maybe they'll look at the weather and let everyone else go ahead of them.

Question No. 4: How important are adequate water conditions to pintails when nesting?

•Answer: Pintails will almost give up nesting if water conditions aren't adequate. Thanks to replenishment of drier wetlands with this winter's snow, pintails might not have to worry about poor water conditions. At the very least those water conditions improved over a broad area of the state compared to last year.

Question No. 5: Do any duck species nest as late as August?

 Answer: Yes, gadwall and lesser scaup will attempt to nest that late into the summer. Heck, this year a lot more than gadwall and lesser scaup might be nesting in late summer. But, again, let's think positive...

Question No. 6: Most ducks nest in grass. Do any species nest over water in North Dakota?

•Answer: Yes, but it's generally just canvasbacks. Occasionally mallards will nest on a mound over water but they prefer grasslands. Hopefully by the time everyone arrives they will find it...but think positive. Question No. 7: How far from where she nests will a hen duck take her brood to water?

•Answer: Those little ducklings had better be prepared to get their exercise and have their hiking boots securely laced. Documentation shows hens will take broods 1 ½ miles from a nesting site to water. That's a lot of waddling on short little legs.

Question No. 8: How fussy are ducks about who nests nearby?

•Answer: Ducks tend to be more territorial with each other than other species. Usually, "home turf" is expressed on wetlands rather than nesting uplands.

Question No. 9: Are there any ducks that lay their eggs in other duck's nest?

•Answer: Yes, redheads. The practice is called parasitizing, when a species lays its eggs in another nest leaving unsuspecting "adoptive" parents to raise the ducklings. Redheads also tend to nest later in the spring.

And, finally, perhaps the most important question of all: What is it about North Dakota's Prairie Pothole Region that makes it so extremely important for ducks – and other wetland and grassland nesting birds?

 Answer: Its high wetland capacity and history of nesting habitat. The region historically had an abundance of native prairie grasslands coupled with grassland habitat through federal Farm Bill Conservation Reserve Programs.

One can only hope that abundance of nesting cover

And that ducks and other grassland species will find grass — and not snow and ice — to nest this spring. It will come — think positive and be patient.

Minot Hosts ND Wing Search and Rescue Exercise

CIVIL AIR PATROL, MAGIC CITY COMPOSITE SQUADRON

Civil Air Patrol members from all four corners of North Dakota Wing gathered in Minot, Saturday March $\bar{2}5$, to participate in their largest search and rescue exercise (SAREX) since 2019. Operations included aerial search from one of the wing's Cessna 182 aircraft and ground search teams mobilized with CAP vehicles. Cadets from Minot and Bismarck practiced direction finding, with the instruction of senior members, to be able to find emergency locator transmitter (ELT) beacons. The beacons send a constant radio signal from downed aircraft and/ or some distressed hikers equipped with handheld beacons which allows CAP teams to triangulate and/or home in the beacon's location.

Crews earned valuable training throughout the day by integrating the air and ground portions of search and rescue in real time using radio and cellular communications. ND Wing Group 2 Commander, Maj. Noah Warren, acting as safety officer for the day said that he was glad to see, "We're able to perform ground team exercises today. Which is a first here at Minot."
