# Food Summit looks to future of 27+ DAF stateside dining operations

DALLAS – More than 70 installation, Air Force Services Center and industry culinary experts gathered here April 11-13 to discuss current and future Food 2.0 dining operations with a goal of delivering better, faster menu options to patrons.

With the Food 2.0 Owners Summit held in an innovative kitchen environment, attendees also had the opportunity to see demonstrations of state-of-the-art culinary equipment and taste food prepared by seasoned chefs using various cooking methods.

Food 2.0 is a part of the AFSVC's Healthy Food Initiative, which delivers improved, healthier food options for Airmen, Guardians and any other patrons who can access an installation, said Jim Krueger, AFSVC's Department of the Air Force Food and Beverage Division chief.

"We modernize dining facilities and upgrade food options to deliver tasty food when, where and how Airmen and Guardians need it," added Jim Gill, AFSVC chief of Food 2.0 portfolio management.

This includes "finish in front" service stations like personalized pizza and deli stations, innovative technology to prepare menu items fast and fresh while patrons wait, and robust stations like breakfast yogurt bars, salad bars, and "grab & go" meals and snacks.

The DAF has 43 Food 2.0 locations at 27 installations, and the next roll-out is Davis Monthan AFB, Arizona, this summer. Additionally, the food team is in the planning stages to potentially convert another seven installations to Food 2.0

One summit attendee, Capt. Lily Dollarhide, is the 5th Force Support Squadron Sustainment Services Flight commander at Minot AFB, North Dakota. The captain said her customers appreciate the wide array of foods and speed of service that Food 2.0 provides.

"It delivers a lot of variety for our customers, so they can get anything from fish and shrimp to baked potatoes, vegetarian and vegan options in a location that's pretty remote," Dollarhide said. "A lot of our Airmen are working in the field (and) they're working in the cold, so that variety of eating somewhere for three meals a day with something different every time is huge.

"Just this morning, we received a comment on our Interactive Customer Evaluation system that said, 'the chicken shawarma is the best that I've had in multiple years, and I just love the variety and speed of service in the dining facility,' so

In North Dakota, you're not going to find much chicken shawarma and at a faster pace," she said.

Additionally, unlike legacy dining facility operations where the facilities are closed between traditional breakfast, lunch, dinner and midnight meals, Food 2.0 facilities are open 96 hours a week including between meals.

"The hours are a big deal," Gill said. "If an Airman can't make it in for breakfast or the lunch meal, for example, he can come in between meals or grab a 'Simply to go' meal at any time throughout the day with Food 2.0."

Not willing to rest on their accomplishments, the AFSVC food and beverage teams plans to expand the program with new installations and innovate at installations already operating with 2.0.

'Right now, we're going through a pilot program at Barksdale AFB (Louisiana) where we've been weighing salads and to this point, it's been very successful. Customers seem to like it and it has a better effect on our cost of goods at the DFAC," Gill said.

The team is currently working funding and plan to roll salad scales out to every Food 2.0 operation in the future.

Gill and his team also have a pilot program underway at Seymour Johnson AFB, North Carolina, for

reusable takeout containers.

"Every year, we spend thousands of dollars on disposable carryout containers. They're not only expensive but they're bad for the environment as well," Gill said.

If the six-month trial continues to be successful, "we plan to roll that program out to the other installations as well," he said.

In addition to nutritious, tasty options for patrons in the front of DFACs, Food 2.0 delivers advanced culinary training for military and civilian food service professionals in the back of DFACs with an executive chef at each location, provided by industry partners Aramark or Sodexo.

"One of the things I appreciate as a chief master sergeant is that these Food 2.0 platforms are also warfighting platforms for our services Airmen to get the critical culinary skills they need to help us project air power in the field. That means when they go down range, they know how to produce quality meals for our Airmen in the field,' said Chief Master Sgt. Learie Gaitan, AFSVC senior enlisted leader.

Outside of the DFAC, Airmen and Guardians can also take advantage of campus dining at nonappropriated fund locations at various installations. This includes places like bowling centers, golf courses and clubs.

"In many cases, our NAF food

innovation and program changes on the horizon. service activities struggle to maintain solvency," said Brian DeCamp. AFSVC chief of NAF food and beverage. "With Food 2.0 campus dining, our patrons and NAF facilities are benefiting from the flexibility the program provides." "The Department of the Air Force is known for air superiority, but our


number one asset is not our planes, not our bombs, not our missiles ... it's our Airmen and Guardians," Gaitan said "So when it comes to fueling the force, the food our Airmen and Guardians eat every day is critical to how we're able to project air power for our nation.

"With Food 2.0, we've raised our game and when you go to a Food 2.0 location across the continental United States, you'll see our Airmen creating healthy, nutritious meals for our warfighters of all branches of service," the chief added.





# Another 'rare' animal shows its face...

Two weeks ago while I was watching huge chunks of ice pass by and the Des Lacs River quickly rise to flood stage, I saw a fur-bearing animal on the water trying to swim upstream.

I was able to get some pictures of it, but in using an iPhone, you don't have the option of changing lenses and the optic zoom on the phone is basically useless.

My first impression was that it was an otter. And in the process of putting that and several other pictures of the flooding on Facebook, some of my friends commented that it was a beaver or that it was a muskrat.

The responses are appreciated, but I've been gardening along the Des Lacs River since 2004 and I've seen plenty of beavers and plenty of muskrats and this animal I saw last Wednesday was

And the more I look at the photograph, the more I'm convinced it's an otter, an animal have never seen on the Des Lacs. It looked kind of like a mink or weasel, but was much larger... and had a longer body. A beaver, even the young ones, are fat and have the obvious flat tail. A muskrat bears more resemblance to a beaver than it does an otter.

As a result of the questioning, I took to finding out more information to see if otters exist in northwest North Dakota. Up until I saw that critter swimming on the Des Lacs, I assumed otters were only inhabiting the Red River, as far as North Dakota is concerned. But here is what I found out.

Because of urbanization, river otters are moving to more friendly and secluded confines, meaning places like Fargo, Grand Forks and Hillsboro are not places they want to be. As a result, they seek out tributaries, navigate the smaller rivers and streams until they find a spot suitable for them.

In this case, the entire stretch of the Des Lacs River, which starts in southeastern Saskatchewan to the confluence on the Souris River at Burlington, is reasonable habitat, save for Kenmare, which has a fair amount of traffic, livestock and other activities along the river and Des Lacs Lake.

According to the North Dakota Game & Fish Department, there is no evidence of river otters in the Des Lacs. However, an otter was recently trapped near the Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge and officials at the Des Lacs National Wildlife Refuge believe it's reasonable that otters would be on the Des Lacs.

According to the Nature Conservency, river otters are located in Saskatchewan, but their habitat is localized in the Qu'Appelle Valley, which is approximately 100 miles to the northeast of the headwaters of the

So that too is a possibility that otters could have migrated southwest as the Trans Canada Highway, which crosses that valley, becomes too busy for the playful fur bearer to feel comfortable.

I further discovered that otters like crayfish, something found in abundance in the Des Lacs especially during flood events like this April.

I'm sure there are going to be people who will dispute what I saw. It's kind of like three years ago when I caught a beaver stealing peas off a garden trellis, or when I saw a marten on the

river bank sunning itself and looking for prey.

Two years ago a mink hung around my garden all summer, but nobody disputed that.

I took a picture of the burglarizing beaver, but it was the same as the otter. I used an iPhone and although I have proof of it, the photo is really poor and becomes quite pixelated when I blow it up.

We've heard about this urbanization before. When I was working in Kenmare, I did an article about the rapid increase in the moose population in western North Dakota. Part of that had to do with a disease in the herd in the Walhalla area, but part of it was because of the urbanization of numerous communities in Saskatchewan, driving them

They're here, just like the marten and maybe I got a rare glimpse of it. That's part of the reason I like hanging out so much along the Des Lacs River.



# 705 MUNS supports Global Thunder 23

Global Thunder is the most extensive command and control exercise in which the 5th Bomb Wing participates, and the 705th Munitions Squadron plays one of the most critical roles in the exercise, which is U.S. Strategic Command's


Global Thunder, which involves all three legs of the nuclear triad, is conducted annually to assess the posture of the 5th BW and other USSTRATCOM units, and their ability to react to a strategic threat in a given timeline. During GT, the 5th BW's B-52H Stratofortress aircraft are put on alert status and Airmen assigned to the 705th MUNS are responsible for uploading munitions to the aircraft during that time.

"When the 5th BW is tasked to generate, 705th MUNS changes focus and our members are moved from their primary duties to perform a generation task," said Senior Master Sgt. Anthony Foerster, 705th MUNS air-launched cruise missile flight chief. "Events like GT allow our members to hone their skills as well as look for ways to increase proficiency and expedite operations.

Airmen with the 705th MUNS maintain operations around the clock during the exercise, ensuring they can safely transport strike packages to the flightline, load them, and get the aircraft to alert status without stopping. Due to the nature of their role, 705th MUNS' mission is an absolute no-fail mission, with every minute being significant.

"We maintain our 24 hour operations to ensure we can respond to issues on the flightline, bring additional weapons to the fight if needed, and be immediately available upon notification to stand down our alert status," said Foerster. "We could be asked to launch aircraft at any time and therefore we maintain a posture of being ready to execute.'

Although there are many components at play during GT, 705th MUNS holds a unique spot being the only munitions squadron in the Department of Defense that supports two wings. Their critical role at Minot Air Force Base ensures the 5th BW's readiness to confront uncertainty and maintain a safe, secure, effective and ready strategic deterrent force.

# **Global Thunder 23** concludes at Minot

Global Thunder 23, the most recent iteration of U.S. Strategic Command's annual nuclear command and control exercise, concluded April 19.

GT23 was designed to assess joint operational readiness and provide training opportunities for USSTRATCOM forces to deter, detect, and prevent strategic attacks against the United States and its allies.

During the exercise, Team Minot personnel executed and sustained a simulated alert status to validate and maintain an effective and ready strategic deterrence force. Defenders, aircraft maintainers, aircrew, munitions specialists, airfield management personnel, food service specialists, and various other Airmen in support roles worked around the clock to accomplish exercise objectives.


The 5th Bomb Wing is comprised of exceptional, mission-focused Airmen, and they absolutely nailed the execution of this exercise," said Col Daniel Hoadley, 5th Bomb Wing commander. "Strategic deterrence is anchored on a demonstration of credible combat capability, and

Global Thunder allowed us to do just that."

GT23 presented training scenarios that tested all USSTRATCOM mission areas to include Team Minot's 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing, with a specific focus on nuclear readiness. Airmen and B-52H Stratofortresses from the 2nd Bomb Wing at Barksdale AFB, Louisiana, integrated with 5th BW Airmen to conduct joint readiness operations.

"We always aim to practice the way that we will be expected to perform in combat," said Hoadley. 'To that end, we were able to wring out virtually every aspect of nuclear operations during this year's Global Thunder. We integrated with the 2nd BW to meet logistical requirements and crush all operations and maintenance tasks inside of tight timelines. Given the complexity of this exercise, the results were confidence building for the entire B-52 team."

The training opportunities provided by Global Thunder enable USSTRATCOM forces to maintain a high state of readiness and proficiency, and validates Team Minot's always-ready global strike capabilities.



#### WHAT IS CARBON MONOXIDE?

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless, tasteless, and deadly gas! When exposed to, CO inhibits your blood's capacity to carry oxygen throughout the body, actually suffocating your tissues and organs. CO can escape into your home's air through a faulty furnace, wood-burning stove, range, water heater, fireplace, or any device that burns combustible

#### WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS?

Carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms can often be confused with flu symptoms but can become much more serious. They include:

- Headache
- Fatigue
- Nausea Dizziness
- Irregular breathing
- Mental confusion
- Unconsciousness • Ultimately death

#### WHAT IS THE **SOLUTION?**

The key to protecting yourself and your family is prevention and the use of a quality carbon monoxide detector. Prevention is always the first and foremost important step to protecting your family from CO poisoning, but sometimes prevention tactics don't always prevent a problem. Thus, having the life-saving backup of a reliable, quality CO detector is extremely important. It can warn your family when nothing else will save them.

#### WHERE SHOULD I INSTALL A CO **DETECTOR AND HOW** MANY?

CO detectors should be installed near bedrooms, and homes with more than one living level should have at least one detector on each level. CO detectors should be installed between outlet level

and 6-7 feet high. CO Detectors should not be installed in garages, kitchens, furnace rooms or humid areas. Appliances in these areas can cause a detector to emit false


Always install detectors at least 15 feet away from a furnace or gas appliance and avoid installing detectors close to a fan, swamp cooler or other fresh or turbulent air sources as this may deter the unit from taking accurate readings. Practice Prevention! Prevention can be both easy and life-saving. Remember to follow these steps:

· Have your furnace and heating system inspected and serviced

- Never run an automobile in the garage or any other type of enclosed space.
- Have your chimney and flu cleaned professionally.
- Make sure that the burner flames on your furnace and stove burn blue, not yellow-orange, and never use your gas range or oven for
- Never use grills or hibachis inside your home.

# **Keeping Minot On Track**

It was a chilly afternoon. Mayor Tom Ross and I had played a round of phone tag, but we finally found time to meet in Mayor Ross's office at Elison Assisted Living in south Minot. As Mayor and Executive Director at Elison, Tom has learned that each day will present a challenge. Even today, permission was given for the Mayor to do a bit of multi-tasking as he would answer those "important" emails in between my questions and his answers. Still, as a journalist I could certainly appreciate the time I was afforded to review Tom's first nine months in office.

Today's interview would begin by discussing his relationship with Col. Daniel Hoadley, Commander of the 5th Bomb Wing at Minot Air Force Base. "You know, it's been unbelievable," starts Mayor Ross, "learning about him, learning about his family, his kids and mostly learning about his duties as commander of the 5th Bomb Wing... his love and passion for all things Air Force."

Ross and Hoadley are alike in that they would rather shine the spotlight on someone else. "We're not ones that need the spotlight on us," according to Ross. "We're more comfortable shining the spotlight on someone else... [we try to] empower that and make that happen. That's a cool thing that Dan and I have in common.

Mayor Ross was not completely new to the base's Honorary Commander Program, having served as an Honorary to the 5th Operations Support Squadron commander, and he said that he had met some great individuals who are still good friends to this day. "We're watching their families grow, and they're watching us grow. I have experience of being in the Honorary program for, I dare say, 10 years.'

This long-standing program strengthens partnerships between Minot and Minot AFB leaders

by assigning a civilian Honorary Commander whose job and role in the community align with a wing, group, or squadron commander at the base. Mayor Ross believes that the Honorary Commander Program is critical and vital to the relationship between the community of Minot and Minot AFB. "Hey, we're eight miles from the base, but by having a group of volunteers who are passionate and understand, they get why they need to take part in it. They don't [become Honorary Commanders] because their arms are being twisted or there is someone out there begging them, they do it because they love it! They want to get involved and they want to build that relationship," he continues.

According to Ross, the relationship between Honorary Commanders is unique in that it is relatively shortterm. Most commanders on the Air Force side are assigned to Minot for only two years. That two-year relationship builds a bridge, and that relationship continues on both sides, long after their tenure. "We still keep the relationships of the past, while forging new ones," says Mayor Ross.

"I'll go out on a limb and say that the relationship between the City of Minot and the Minot AFB is the strongest it's ever been," continues Ross, "and it will continue to get stronger and stronger." The Mayor is afforded the opportunity to sit down with Col. Hoadley and 91st Missile Wing Commander, Col. Kenneth McGhee, over a cup of coffee and have open conversations about life. "That's what builds the relationship and makes it stronger. They know they can call me at a moment's notice... And conversely, Mayor Ross feels comfortable calling either Col. Hoadley or Col. McGhee to ask for a favor. "I have yet to hear the word no from either one of them, or I would hope they could say the same thing for us."

There are challenging days ahead for the City of Minot and the surrounding communities, which has moved the city to put in a request for \$900,000 from the legislature for base retention. SB 2240, as of this writing, is still being debated and probably will end up in a House/Senate

conference committee.

"I try to tell the legislators that if we lose oil in North Dakota, it would be devastating. But if we lose the base in Minot, it would be impossible to replace a 600 million dollar impact. If the base-related and other military spending left, Minot would be a much smaller community. You just can't replace 600 million dollars in economic impact. If you could spend 1.5 million dollars to get 100 million back, would you, do it? In a heartbeat," says Ross. "Our city has benefitted from the culture of the Minot AFB more so than any other city in the state. It's the culture and diversity we get from the military personnel, and more importantly, their families that are intertwined with what we have going on here

in Minot."

The conversation would continue for a few more minutes as we discussed the importance of the Minot AFB to our community, and the many construction projects that will take place at the Minot AFB, including the proposed Sentinel missile modernization project.

Mayor Ross will continue to deal with challenges in the City of Minot, including a shortage of daycare and the never-ending challenge of workforce shortages. And we look forward to reporting an "all on board" attitude from Mayor Tom Ross and the rest of the City of Minot when it comes to working together to continue to strengthen and grow the relationship with Minot AFB.





Over the past several years — even stretching into decades - the N.D. Game and Fish Department has adopted a philosophy that suits most anglers just fine - the idea of having fishing regulations be as broadbased, simple as possible.

That's not to say regulations don't change as needs arise and more biological information and science becomes available. Nor does it mean that every lake is considered a cookie cutter and that all lakes are the same.

There can be and are specific regulations to meet specific needs.

However, the guiding philosophy means it's possible the Game and Fish Department doesn't have to issue fishing proclamations each year. Rather, its regulations cover a two-year period.

If a situation or need arises to adjust regulations, it is done through gubernatorial approval amending an existing proclamation.

North Dakota has more than a century of fishing regulations. It's intriguing to see how things like walleye and sauger limits and size restrictions evolved in the time since automobiles were a novelty.

A century ago, anglers across the state generally fished for northern pike, bullheads, and sauger. Walleye were considered a prize because while native to a few of the state's waters, they were more like a treasured novelty than an expectation.

In reality, it wasn't until the 1970s that walleye moved into the "top dog" spot in angler's hearts.

Regulations changed to reflect changing times, management strategies, growing science, and evolving landscapes — both on and in the water.

Here's a look at just some of those changes over the

- Statewide daily walleye limits varied from five to 15 fish between 1911 and 2023.
- What hasn't changed for decades, though, is the current five-fish daily walleye limit.
- In 1968 the Missouri River system didn't have walleye or sauger limits. That's not a size limit, that's quantity. Yup, in 1968 anglers on the Missouri River and Lake Sakakawea could catch any number of walleye they wanted in a day.

- Most walleye length restrictions were minimum size limits, not slot or maximum restrictions, and typically ranged from 8- to 16-inch minimums.
- While the Game and Fish Department's management philosophy in recent years has been to try to keep size restrictions to a minimum for specific lakes or fish species, three southeastern lakes have a 14-inch walleye minimum size limit in 2023. There is also a length minimum for keeping muskie. However, there was a 30-year span when there weren't any size limits on any water body anywhere in North Dakota.
- The statewide daily limit from 1911 through 1914 was 15 fish. However, that included a combination of bass, crappie, perch, northern pike, trout, and walleye.
- There was also an 8-inch minimum walleye and sauger limit statewide from 1911 through 1914.
- Daily and possession limits remained the same from 1915 through 1930 while the statewide walleye and sauger minimum length restriction increased to a 10inch minimum.
- Daily and possession limits changed in 1931 and until 1948 anglers had a 10-fish daily limit for a combination of walleye, sauger, and pike. Possession limit those years was 20 for the three species.
- The statewide minimum walleye and sauger length changed to 14 inches from 1949 through 1954 while daily walleye, sauger, and pike limits dropped to five with 10 in possession.
- Statewide walleye and sauger length limits were removed in 1955. Length restrictions weren't put on again until 1987 and that was only for two specific lakes.
- Since 1987 at least one lake has had some type of walleye and sauger length restriction but at no time have more than 12 lakes throughout North Dakota had length restrictions since then.
- Missouri River System walleye and sauger daily and possession limits generally mirrored statewide regulations with the exception from 1968 through 1980 when daily limits varied from none (1968) to 10 (1976

During the Vietnam War on May 12, 1968, former Lt. Col. Joe Jackson was commander of an unarmed C-123 transport aircraft. The plane was flying an emergency mission in South Vietnam after a special forces camp at Kham Duc was overrun by the enemies, who were in complete control of the area. Over the radio, Jackson learned that a three-man combat control team had been accidentally left behind after the camp was evacuated. Jackson


made the decision to respond and descended to the landing strip of the camp under heavy fire. After landing, enemy forces dropped a rocket near the plane, but fortunately it was a dud. Jackson was able to rescue the CCT and bring them to safety in Da Nang. Despite the amount of enemy fire during the rescue, the C-123 was found to have no damage or bullet holes upon arrival. For his heroism, Jackson received the Medal of Honor on January 16, 1969. He passed away on January 12, 2019.





# MH-139A Grey Wolf makes first snow landing

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. -- The MH-139A Grey Wolf stood out against the austere landscape of evergreen trees and snow. As it moved toward the ground, the fiverotor downwash created a white cloud of snow that enveloped the aircraft and the aircrew inside. Upon touchdown, the horizon was barely visible through the snow cloud.

This landing was the culmination of the 413th Flight Test Squadron's austere landing testing at Malmstrom AFB, Montana, this year, during the month of February. The testing was supported by Air Force Global Strike Command's Detachment 7.

The 413th FLTS tested the MH-139A's ability to land in unprepared areas such as fields, a core capability of any rotary-wing aircraft. The 413th FLTS team developed an obstacle course and performed a rigorous test of the aircraft's landing gear at Duke Field, Florida, to prepare for the trip to Montana.

"Ŝince you can land to nearly any surface, you have to be prepared for potential ground obstacles as well as any variations in the surface, such as slopes," said Maj. Jonathan Palka, 413th FLTS test pilot. "The landing surface is evaluated from the air and the approach is typically flown more carefully than it would be to a controlled, paved surface such as a runway.'

After the Duke Field tests, the 413th FLTS and Det. 7 aircrew took the Grey Wolf north to mountains over 9,000 feet with single-digit temperatures. Since the aircraft will eventually be stationed in Northern-tier bases, the Grey Wolf's stakeholders were interested in testing its capabilities in cold weather and snow conditions that it will be operating in 4-6 months

each year.

Aircrew filmed the landings using helmet-mounted cameras as well as from cameras on the ground.

"Snow is a naturally unstable surface, and you don't always know what is underneath it," said Palka, who piloted some of the snow missions. "In deep snow, you're never fully on the ground like you would be on other surfaces, you need to be prepared for the surface to shift. It just means you land a little more carefully and respect the potential of the surface to change."

Through both tests, the squadron learned more about the aircraft and provided data back to their customers and safely brought the aircraft home ahead of schedule.

The MH-139A is set to replace the Air Force's aging UH-1N Huey fleet. The new helicopter closes the capability gaps of the UH-1N in the areas of speed, range, endurance, payload and survivability in support of the Air Force Global Strike Command's ICBM missions. Other mission capabilities include civil search and rescue, airlift support, National Capital Region missions, as well as survival school and test

A joint team of Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen and Navy aircrew launched an unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile equipped with one test re-entry vehicle from aboard the Airborne Launch Control System April 19 at 5:11 a.m. Pacific Time from Vandenberg Space Force Base, California.

This test launch is part of routine and periodic activities intended to demonstrate that the United States' nuclear deterrent is safe, secure, reliable and effective to deter twentyfirst century threats and reassure our allies. Such tests have occurred over 300 times before, and this test is not the result of current world events.

"Strategic deterrence is the most critical mission in our Air Force and the cornerstone of America's defense," said Gen. Thomas A. Bussiere, commander, Air Force Global Strike Command. foundation of our command and our ability to execute our mission is because of Striker Airmen, and I have full and unwavering confidence in their abilities.

"This test launch reinforces what our allies and partners already know - we're always ready to defend the United States with combat ready nuclear forces anytime, anywhere, on order, to conduct global strike."

Airmen from the 625th Strategic Operations Squadron out of Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, were aboard the U.S. Navy E-6 aircraft to demonstrate the reliability and effectiveness of the ALCS system.

The ICBM's reentry vehicle traveled approximately 4,200 miles to the Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands. These test launches verify the accuracy and reliability of the ICBM weapon system, providing valuable data to ensure a continued safe, secure and effective nuclear deterrent.

"We have a unique ability to strike a target anywhere, at any time, should the commander-inchief deem it vital to our national security and the security of our allies," said Col. Chris Cruise, 377th Test Evaluation Group commander. "An Airborne Launch Control System test validates that capability, ensures we have redundancy in our weapons systems, and showcases the interoperability with our Navy counterparts."

The test launch is a culmination of months of preparation that involve multiple government partners. The Airmen who perform this vital mission are some of the most skillfully trained and educated the Air Force has to offer.

Airmen from the 341st Missile Wing at Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana, were selected for the task force to support the test launch. The missile bases within Air Fore Global Strike Command have crew members standing alert 24 hours a day, year-round, overseeing the nation's ICBM alert forces.

The ICBM community, including the Department of Defense, the Department of Energy, and U.S. Strategic Command, uses data collected from test launches for development continuing force evaluation. The ICBM launch program demonstrates the operational capability of the Minuteman III and ensures the United States' ability to maintain a strong, credible nuclear deterrent as a key element of U.S. national security and the security of U.S. allies and partners.

Global Force Strike Air Command is a major command with headquarters at Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, in the Shreveport-Bossier City community. The command overseas the nation's intercontinental ballistic missile wings, the Air Force's entire bomber force, to include B-52, B-1 and B-2 wings, the Long Range Strike Bomber program, Air Force Nuclear Command, Control and Communications systems, and operational and maintenance support to organizations within the nuclear enterprise. Approximately 33.700 professionals are assigned to two Numbered Air Forces, nine wings, two geographically-separated squadrons and one detachment in the continental United States and deployed to locations around the globe. These requirements are detailed in your vehicle owner's manual, and your auto repair shop can provide information on your vehicle's recommended oil specifications as well.

Depending on vehicle age, type of oil and driving conditions, oil change intervals will vary. It used to be normal to change the oil every 3,000 miles, but with modern lubricants most engines today have recommended oil change intervals of 5,000 to 7,500 miles. Moreover, if your car's engine requires full-synthetic motor oil, it might

#### Oil Change Intervals – Older Cars

Older cars typically have oil change intervals based on mileage, and have two maintenance schedules, one for cars driven in "normal" operation and another for those used in "severe service." The latter category involves operating your car under one or more of the following conditions:

Primarily short trips (5 miles or less) Extremely hot, cold, or dusty climates Sustained stop-and-go driving

Carrying heavy loads or towing a trailer If your vehicle use falls under the severe service definition in your owner's manual, maintain your car using the more rigorous schedule. However, if you drive your car under normal conditions, be wary of spending hard-earned money on oil change services and other maintenance work your car may not need or benefit from.

#### Oil Change Intervals – Newer Cars

Most newer cars are equipped with oillife monitoring systems that automatically determine when an oil change is needed and notify you with an alert on the instrument panel. and maintenance manuals for many newer cars eliminate "severe service" recommendations altogether because the oil-life monitoring system automatically shortens the oil change interval when it detects heavy-duty operation.

Whenever you have your car's oil changed, the service technician should reset the oil-life monitoring system. If you change your own oil, you can reset the system by following the instructions in the vehicle owner's manual.

Less frequent oil changes on newer engines make it essential that you check the oil level monthly and top it up as needed. While many engines will use less than a quart of oil between changes, others can consume as much as a quart every 600 to 700 miles. Maintaining proper oil levels can help you avoid costly car repairs; engine wear or damage resulting from low oil levels will not be covered by your new-car warranty. Note that if you do not put many miles on your car, most automakers recommend an oil change every 12 months, even if the maintenance reminder has not come on.

Your vehicle counts on new oil and oil filters to keep it operating efficiently. Oil should be kept full, clean from particles and not burnt. Oil lubes crucial engine parts. Moving components create rubbing, and over time that heat wears the parts down. Oil or a synthetic lubricating substance can minimize the damage from the rubbing by those moving components. By performing a regular oil change schedule you will effectively increase your engine's efficiency as well as maintain the life of your car's


# **Earth Day**
