Airmen Receive Red Cross Lifesaving Awards

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, ND. - Two Airmen were presented with the American Red Cross Lifesaving Award for Professional Responders at Minot Air Force Base, June 12, 2023.

Airman 1st Class Damian Cordoba from the 5th Medical Group saved a life while offduty and working a shift at local restaurant, The Starving Rooster,

November 8, 2022. It was while he was working that he realized one of the restaurant's patrons was choking, and without hesitation began performing abdominal thrusts on the man. After several attempts the object was still in place so he proceeded to perform a throat sweep, dislodging the obstruction.

Staff Sgt. Nicholas Thompson

from the 5th Security Forces Squadron saved the life of a fellow Defender while posted at Minot AFB's South Gate, December 20, 2022. In an attempt to open a bucket of ice melt with the knife part of a multi-tool, an Airman cut his forearm. Thompson was manning the gate when he heard a loud crash and returned to see the Airman on the ground with what

appeared to be a minor cut. Upon further inspection, Thompson realized the Airman had sustained a severe arterial cut on his forearm. He instructed the Airman to apply pressure on the wound while he applied a tourniquet to stop the bleeding until Emergency Medical Services arrived on scene.

These Airmen's contribution to the safety of their fellow citizens

reflects the spirit of the Red Cross by using action to alleviate human suffering in the face of emergency. Thanks to their Red Cross and emergency training, as well as their quick response and professionalism, Cordoba and Thompson were able to save two lives in their community and earn one of the highest awards given by the American Red Cross.

The base pool is now ready and waiting for swimmers of all ages to come and soak up the sun for the summer! The pool opened a little later in the season than usual because of some construction work that needed to be done on the building structure. But now, it is open and plans to be so through the summer until August. The exact date of closure will depend on weather and the availability of lifeguards, when some of the summer hires go back to college.

In the meantime though, Minot AFB's pool, complete with slides, snack bar (which is not yet open but is rumored to be opened sometime next week) and kiddie pool will be available M-F 11am-6pm, Saturday 11am-3pm and closed all day on Sunday.

The experience at the pool is relaxing with a limited number of lounge chairs and umbrellas available for use. There is also a small and fenced in shallow pool available for kids 6 & under. To add to the kick-backed atmosphere, the pool plays a local country music station and takes an "adult swim" break every quarter hour for 15 minutes. During this time, only residents ages 16+ are allowed to be in the pools, which forces kids to take a much needed rest break.

Something that makes Minot AFB's pool unique is that it is also completely FREE for base residents. Unlike most bases, which require a small yearly membership pass or daily fee, this pool allows guests to utilize it for absolutely no cost. This is very unique amongst Air Force bases and is allowed because of special funding due to the remote nature of this base.

The refreshing pool is one of the base's most popular summer activities which is evident by the numerous visitors throughout June, July and August every year.



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

On May 22, Gov. Doug Burgum announced the Pembina Gorge State Recreation Area will be developed and become North Dakota's 14th state park.

A total of \$6 million in funding for this venture has been secured by the North Dakota Parks & Recreatikon Department during the 2023 legislative session. \tilde{A} matching \$2 million will come from a federal grant.

The park, just west of Walhalla in both Pembina and Cavalier counties, is a sight to behold. It starts at the Canadian border and runs in a bit of a southeasterly direction toward Minnesota.

There's hiking, four-wheeling, birding, photography and big game watching opportunities. There are trails all over the place, including

Pembina Gorge State Park...

in the deep woods that doesn't at all seem like it's in North Dakota,

And one thing a lot of people forget is the winter beauty of the future Pembina Gorge State Park. The only other winter place like it in North Dakota is Lake Metigoshe. It has plenty of winter recreation opportunites, however, it doesn't have a lake.

Instead, the Pembina River is the lure in water. It starts on the Canadian side, runs southeast of Walhalla cutting into the gorge then, much like the Souris River at Minot, makes a turn to the northeast and heads up toward Neche and Pembina.

There are a number of people who didn't want -+-+y that is provided in the current recreation

But the North Dakota Parks & Recreation Department has assured everyone, including those in the Walhalla area who dissented, that development will be done with as little disturbance as possible, so as not to diminish what the gorge already is and has been for

The plan for the park will include underground utilities, roads, a 35site campground, six all-season, full-service cabins, a comfort station, shop and season staff accommodations. In the future, the park may include a visitor center with indoor and outdoor learning areas and retail and office space.

A few additional things to remember that are indirectly related to this new state park. Frost Fire Ski Area and Summer Theater is located west of Walhalla, Langdon is about 35 miles southwest, the Pembina State Museum is 28 miles, almost straight east, Icelandic State Park is located near Cavalier, 25 miles southeast and the GingrasTrading Post of territorial days is located just to the north and east of Walhalla. In addition, Winkler, Manitoba is approximately 30 miles northeast of the park.

Back in the 1990s, the North Dakota State Geological Survey began digging for dinosaur fossils in the Pembina Gorge. Today, the digs are more structured with fees attached, but if your interested in digging for Mosasaur bones, this might be your gig.

There's plenty of evidence pointing to the Mosasaur living in the gorge area a long time ago. To


find more information about that, the Canadian Fossil Discovery Centre is located in nearby Morden, Manitoba, just 40 miles northwest of Walhalla. It's a great site to learn about marine reptiles.


So there is a lot going on in the northeast corner of North Dakota that will be taken up a notch when the gorge gets its state park status.

To some, this is a long time coming. There are numerous people living in Pembina and Cavalier counties who believe the gorge should have been a state park 30 or 40 years ago. But, it's never too late and many of those same people strongly believe the state park status will bring an uptick of tourism, not only to Walhalla, but to Pembina, Cavalier and Langdon; those four communities are known as the Rendezvous Region.

Whatever the case is, it would behoove you to visit, if you haven't already been there. You just have to see it and experience it. Describing it doesn't do justice.

Just do yourself a favor, gas up the car and go visit. You'll be glad you did and you'll wonder why you didn't do it sooner.

"You're so flexible." Unbelievably, the words were directed at mespoken while standing in a shady driveway I know well. The voice, too, was familiar. A soft, comforting tone that conjured up memories of high school antics, college summer vacations long past, and cold cookies that always seemed to materialize from the freezer at just the right moment.

The words came from Connie. In high school and college her daughter was my dearest friend. In the years since, we've drifted apart and are no longer integral parts of each other's lives. But there is something irreplaceably dear about people who knew you when you were young. Something intangibly sweet about those extra parents who made it clear that there was always room for you at their table, and in their home.

On the last day of a recent trip to my hometown in Indiana, I had a quick chance to swap life news with Connie, and her husband Bob.

Our week outside of Hot Dish Land had been wonderful. Maybe it has to do with the fact that this was our first trip without a stroller or diapers in tow. Maybe it was that we're at a stage where night wakings are rare, and naps can be skipped without triggering a meltdown akin to a fire in a wax museum.

"You're so flexible." As soon as the words were uttered my eves rolled so far back into my head they threatened to stick.

"Ugh," I replied with disgust. "I hate being flexible."

This is true. I often joke that I like adventure-but only if I can meticulously plan it first.

Among other bull-headed traits, it's this aversion to out-of-mycontrol-adventure and disdain for flexibility that have made my life as a military spouse particularly challenging. In the military lifestyle the only thing you can ever truly count on is ever-changing plans. The only certainty is that there will be precious little certainty.

The plans change. The details are foggy. Someone else always seems to be in control.

I am not flexible by nature. Rather, I am flexible out of necessity.

It doesn't matter if you are affiliated with the military or not, I think most of us would relish a little more control and fewer unforeseen circumstances. Desiring complete control is foolish. Bemoaning a lack of control will only spin the proverbial wheels until they've created a deep rut. But wanting a bit more control is simply human.

The most profound thing I've learned in my years as a military spouse is the quiet strength in maintaining control over my thoughts. No matter what is happening on the outside-whether a surprise deployment, unexpected PCS, unwanted assignment, or anything else-we always have the right to shape our inward perception. There is no need to grapple for power over things that are truly out of our control. Instead, our energy is better spent making intentional decisions with the information we have available, and living out our days with an "on purpose" mentality.

You are allowed to weave a narrative with the circumstances and facts at hand. While you cannot create a story from scratch, in which you have everything you want, you can choose your

your own story-and I pray that you'll write your role as that of the capable hero.

The truth is, I'm not really all that flexible. The truth is, I regularly struggle with jealousy, comparison, discontentment, and maintaining a positive perspective in the face of change.

While on vacation I found myself jealous of the homes we were welcomed into. I saw myself as less-than when compared with the work of others. When considering the multitude of attractions in such a tight radius, I felt a twinge of discontentment at our somewhat isolated NoDak lifestyle.

The truth is jealousy, comparison, discontentment and negativity circumstances. They only lead to a melancholy attitude and a yucky internal feeling.

The thoughts I experienced may have been true, but they were unhelpful. I replaced them with different truths that shaped a better story. Truths like:

- We love visiting Indiana and all the different things we enjoy while we're there.
- We are deeply satisfied with
- our quality of life. unbelievably Minot convenient.
- The military lifestyle gives us experiences we wouldn't have otherwise.

It may seem that way, but don't be fooled. I'm only flexible because I know there are things I can always maintain control over: the perception I choose, the actions I take, the narrative I shape, and the endless goodness I choose to see in everyday living.

Dog Gone International Incident

An international incident along the North Dakota/Saskatchewan border was resolved at least temporarily, in a Minot courtroom earlier this month.

The intriguing case involved a wandering dog, Rocco, who normally resides in Enniskillen, Saskatchewan, a small community located just north of the United States/Canadian border. Rocco decided to make a visit to the U.S. by crossing the border into Burke County. Rocco was apprehended in Flaxton by an area resident who took the dog to his farmstead near that community.

Enter the Burke County Sheriff's Department, who had a deputy make a visit to Rocco and, sometime thereafter, received a call from the dog's owner saying that his Anatolian Shepherd cross is known to wander. All of this happened in February of this year.

As this now international event unfolded, and the dog's owner sought to have Rocco returned to his custody, the matter became a legal fight. Amber J. Fiesel, Burke County State's Attorney, submitted a Petition for Disposition of a

neglected, abused, or abandoned animal to allow for Rocco to be placed for adoption.

What followed was a series of legal maneuvers, including attorneys, and a demand for a change of judge. The case was finally plunked down in front of North-Central District Judge Stacey Louser. Louser heard the civil case, which included witnesses, on June 1.

There was noticeable tension in the courtroom. At stake was on which side of the border would Rocco get his next bowl of food, and whether or not the matter would spark a full-blown international incident between two friendly countries.

After hearing both sides of the case, which didn't include an

appearance by Rocco, it was up to Louser to say whether Rocco might become a U.S. resident or be returned to Canada. The judge ruled in favor of the latter, ordering that Rocco be immediately returned to Enniskillen owner Chad Carlson.

End of story? Possibly. Then again, maybe not.

Louser also ruled that Carlson was liable for all costs of caring for Rocco from the time the dog was seized until released back to its owner, a period of nearly four months. However, Carlson may request a hearing to determine whether or not those costs are reasonable.

Rocco was unavailable for comment.

American history, serving as passage to the Pacific Northwest in the infancy of the 1800s, fur trading in the late 1700s, and was an integral part of the lives of American Indians who called the region home.

The river changed forever with the initial construction of Fort Peck Dam in northeast Montana, completed in 1937. Then Congress passed the 1944 Flood Control Act - including the Pick-Sloan Plan to tame the Missouri River with five additional dams in North Dakota and South Dakota. Massive Missouri River flooding in 1943 prompted Congress to attempt to tame the river.

Flooding was nothing new to the river, the "Big Muddy". But 1943 was different, even potentially impacting the nation's World War II efforts.

Today's Missouri River looks much different, yet continues to play a vital national role in everything from recreation to electric hydropower generation to threatened and endangered wildlife species protection, and even navigation.

And flood control.

Nowadays in North Dakota the Missouri River is mostly about recreating on Lake Sakakawea and below Garrison Dam. It's also about water supply for close to one-half of the state. It's irrigation and navigation.

And, yes, it's about flood protection. That was witnessed back in 2011 when almost 60 years after Garrison Dam was closed portions downstream of the earthen wall flooded due to heavy precipitation throughout the entire basin.

But how much do North Dakotans know about today's Missouri River System — or Lake Sakakawea, in particular?

Can anyone answer these test questions?

•No. 1: Name the six Missouri River reservoirs...not the dams - the reservoirs.

Oahe, Lake Francis Case, Lake Sharpe, and Lewis & Clark Lake.

•No. 2: What river mile is Garrison Dam on (admittedly it's a really tough question)?

•Answer: River Mile 1,389.9.

•No. 3: Where does Lake Sakakawea rank in the top 10 of largest United States reservoirs?

Answer: The National Performance of Dams

The Missouri River played a significant role in Program, Stanford University, lists Lake Sakakawea as the third largest behind Nevada's Lake Mead and Arizona's Lake Powell.

> •No. 4: What about Lake Oahe, where does that rank?

> •Answer: Lake Oahe comes in as the fourth largest manmade reservoir. Using capacity in cubic meters as the measuring stick, the Stanford report lists Lake Sakakawea's capacity at 27.92 million cubic meters with Lake Oahe close at 27.43 million.

> •No. 5: If one could still travel the river valley, albeit underwater, how many miles would Lake Sakakawea

> •Answer: Yup, another tough question but the answer is the lake covers 178 river valley miles. That's using Trenton, N.D. as the end point from Garrison

> •No. 6: What year did the N.D. Game and Fish Department first stock salmon in Lake Sakakawea? Answer: 1976.

> •No. 7: What year did the Game and Fish Department begin netting surveys of fish populations in Lake Sakakawea?

> •Answer: 1956, just three years after Garrison Dam's closure and the same year the first turbine unit began hydropower generation.

> •No. 8: How many different fish species were identified in the lake during that first netting survey? •Answer: 58.

> •And finally, Question No. 9 testing folks' Missouri River System knowledge: As the premier upper Missouri River tributary, what is the longest free-flowing river in the Lower United States, its headwaters just outside the country's first national park?

•Answer: Please, don't get this wrong — it's the Yellowstone River.

A quote from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Lake •Answer: Fort Peck Lake, Lake Sakakawea, Lake Sakakawea/Garrison Dam Boating and Recreation Guide might help put the role of the Missouri River into context within the Lower 48 United States: "Watershed for the Missouri River provides drainage for approximately one-sixth of the United States. From the headwaters in Montana to the mouth in Missouri, the "Big Muddy" flows through seven states. Its importance to the American economy and its history is unparalleled."

U.S. Air Force kicks off Radar Modernization for **B-52 Stratofortress fleet**

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO, Texas – A B-52 from the 307th Bomb Wing arrived at a Boeing Co., facility in San Antonio, on May 25, to begin receiving the Active Electronically Scanned Array system (AESA), as part of the Air Force's B-52 Radar Modernization Program.

"The arrival of this aircraft is a big deal, and signals the beginning of a key part of our effort to modernize the B-52 fleet," said Col. Louis Ruscetta, Senior Materiel Leader for the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center's B-52 Program Office, which is leading the Radar Modernization Program, and overall effort to modernize the bomber. "AESA will replace 1960s radar technology, and greatly increase the navigation and targeting capabilities of the B-52 in higher threat areas."

In addition to increased situational awareness navigation and targeting ability, AESA is designed to be adaptable, so that new capabilities to address future threats, can be added via software modifications.

and knowledge of the platform is really critical to making sure we can get this [AESA] out as quickly as possible," he said. "We are also working with Raytheon on the radar side. Overall, the partnership helps ensure we have a government off-the-shelf solution that minimizes development and helps reduce both the development and test timelines."

Installation of AESA is one of the largest upgrades to the B-52 in the history of the fleet. The effort will cost approximately \$2.8 billion,

with initial operational capability

expected in 2027. "Sustainability is an important part of this effort, because the old radar is unsustainable," said Ruscetta. "The advancement in combat capability that AESA will bring is really critical in keeping this aircraft effective with our nearpeer adversaries. The new radar is an enabler for our long-range standoff capability and will prepare the aircraft for optimized lethality."

Minot Fire Department Provides Opportunity

For Fire Chief Kelli Kronschnabel, it was 2016 when she arrived from Grand Forks after 20 years with that department. Kelli is the first to admit there was an adjustment to move a family and learn a new community, but she said, "it's been good for us."

Kelli was born and raised in Fertile, Minnesota, and would attend college in Grand Forks.

The challenge of a growing city, and a growing Fire Department, is staffing. "We're always looking for staff," said Kronschnabel. "We like to have an active list, and we like to hire once a year, but sometimes we are required to (hire) more than once a year."

The active list was recently closed, and two firefighters were hired. And now the process begins with another round of recruitment. She said, "We'd like to hire three more off of this list." According to Kronschnabel, "that's to open the next fire station, Station 5. We need 12 people to fully staff that station. There are three battalions and four people per battalion."

When talking about opportunities for employment, Kronschnabel points out that when it comes to public safety in general "the Minot Fire Department hires on average three to four firefighters per year. If they have a background in law enforcement, the Minot Police Department is always looking to

hire law enforcement personnel. We also hire dispatchers. If they have an EMT or have a desire to get their EMT, it's a great springboard into getting a job as a firefighter. As an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) they can get on with Trinity Ambulance and if they desire to move on to being a firefighter, it's a requirement of the job to get it. It's just one of those things that you already have checked off that makes you a little more marketable, not only here but if you are moving around the country, you have that in your tool belt if you are going in for an interview.'

Looking at what it takes to be a firefighter, she explained "it's normally a younger person's job; you have to be in really good physical shape. And then we look at what [the applicants] bring to the table. I love farm kids because they bring that knowledge of how to run a machine, being able to work hard... that work ethic is huge." And normally firefighters have multiple talents. "I say that if you are looking for a side contractor, come to the fire department. We have a tiler, we have a roofer, we have an electrician, the normal handyman types, landscape guys, and you take them and put them together as teams."

The Minot Fire Department currently has 60 firefighters on shift. There are three prevention

people (inspections, investigations), three upper level staff, and two civilians, one who is an admin in the office and then a fleet mechanic. "An example is that the Minot Fire Department will be looking for a fleet mechanic in the next few years, when our current mechanic decides to retire," according to Kronschnabel.

"Something that might appeal to a person who has been in the military is our 48/96 schedule. They are on duty for 48 hours and off duty for 96 hours. "[The schedule] can be really appealing for single people, and it becomes really appealing for families once they get adjusted to it because you are home a lot more and

the employees have more quality time with their families on the

Looking ahead, Kronschnabel says that the new Fire Station 5 will open in mid-August with a ribbon cutting and promotional ceremony. "We're excited because of how the building turned out. I promised the people that our building would look like the neighborhood, and we think we met that goal. I want to be a neighbor, and a good neighbor."



Serving with Pride

HILL AIR FORCE BASE - The word 'pride' has many definitions; one being "respect and appreciation for oneself and others as members of a group...especially a marginalized group/solidarity with a group based on a shared identity, history, and

Celebrating Pride is about gaining visibility for LGBTQ+ individuals and provides a platform to erase social stigmas which surround the community. Celebrating Pride, at its core, is about human rights. It is a time to champion progress, while still acknowledging the challenges that remain in our quest toward equal rights for all humans, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

While pride is something to be celebrated all year, the month of June was designated 'Pride Month' in remembrance of the Stonewall uprising which occurred in June 1969 and was a pivotal moment in LGBTQ+ history.

The first Pride March took place in June 1970, one year after the events of Stonewall. Now, 53 years later, Pride Month has remained a time dedicated to the uplifting of LGBTQ+ voices, celebration of LGBTQ+ culture and the support of LGBTQ+ rights.

Throughout military history, the LGBTQ+ community has faced unique challenges, from policies which explicitly banned gay men and women from their ranks, policies where same-sex relationships were criminalized and considered cause for discharge, and policies which classified being gay as a mental illness, therefore disqualifying them from service.

In 1993, "Don't Ask, Don't Tell"

was enacted, allowing closeted LGBTQ+ people to serve. Under this policy members would not be asked about their sexual orientation but could be discharged for disclosing it. This remained in effect for 18 years, until Congress repealed the policy in 2011, allowing LGBTQ+ members to serve openly.

Further barrier removal came in 2013, when spousal and family benefits were extended to same sex married couples in the military and again in 2021 when the ban on transgender individuals' ability to serve was rescinded. Despite this progress, acceptance of LGBTQ+ members in the military is fairly new. It is important to acknowledge that cultural change takes time, stigmas may linger, and barriers do still exist for these members.

I joined the Air Force in July 2017, a still closeted 23-year-old woman. Fast forward six months, I arrived at my first duty station; Minot AFB, ND. It was here my journey

my 'pride' truly began. I met my best friend while at Minot AFB and right away he made me feel comfortable, loved, and accepted before I even came out to him. In a word, he knew.

It was during that first year in the military I decided to come out to some of my close friends and family; however, I still wasn't publicly open outside of small circles.

To my surprise, the more fellow service members I got to know, the more I felt the love and acceptance everyone deserves, and suddenly found myself surrounded by a military family that had no hesitance to see me for me, allowing me to be my authentic self. That's not to say I still didn't have reservations about serving openly. It took me over a year from that point to even say the words out loud "I am gay."



It is my hope that every LGBTQ+ service member finds such people in their own lives and within our military family.


The DoD has openly recognized

Wheel Alignment Tips

Have your Wheel Alignment checked every other tire rotation and always when installing new tires. Wheel alignment sometimes referred to as tracking, is part of standard automobile maintenance that consists of adjusting the angles of the wheels so that they are set to the car maker's specification. The purpose of these adjustments is to reduce tire wear, and to ensure that vehicle travel, is straight and true (without "pulling" to one side). Alignment angles can also be altered beyond the maker's specifications to obtain a specific handling characteristic. Motorsport and off-road applications may call for angles to be adjusted well beyond "normal" for a variety of reasons.

Primary Angles

The primary angles are the basic angle alignment of the wheels relative to each other and to the car body. These adjustments are the camber, caster and toe. On some cars, not all of these can be adjusted on every

These three parameters can be further categorized into front and rear, so summarily the parameters are:

Front: Caster (right& left)

Front: Camber (right & left) Front: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Camber (left & right) Rear: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Thrust angle

Secondary Angles

The secondary angles include numerous other adjustments, such as:

SAI (left & right)

Included angle (left & right) Toe out on turns (left & right) Maximum Turns (left & right) Toe curve change (left & right) Track width difference Wheelbase difference Front ride height (left & right) Rear ride height (left & right) Frame angle

Setback (front & rear) is often referred as a wheel alignment angle. However setback simply exists because of the measuring system and does not have any specification from car manufacturers.

Measurement

A camera unit (sometimes called a "head") is attached to a specially designed clamp which holds on to a wheel. There are usually four camera units in a wheel alignment system (a camera unit for each wheel). The camera units communicate their physical positioning with respect to other camera units to a central computer which calculates and displays how much the camber, toe and caster are misaligned.

Often with alignment equipment, these "heads" can be a large precision reflector. In this case, the alignment "tower" contains the cameras as well as arrays of LEDs. This system flashes one array of LEDs for each reflector whilst a camera centrally located in the LED array "looks for" an image of the reflectors patterned face. These cameras perform the same function as the other style of alignment equipment, yet alleviate numerous issues prone to relocating a heavy precision camera assembly on each vehicle serviced.





Many new cars come with airbags and this feature gives some motorists a false sense of security. Airbags are passive devices, not active systems like seatbelts that require your action to latch. Passive can be good, because it's easy, but may not necessarily be as effective. Statistically, fewer injuries and fatalities occur in crashes of vehicles equipped with airbags, (overall, airbags reduce driver deaths by 14 percent and passenger deaths by 11 percent) but the deployment of an airbag alone during a high-speed collision may not be enough to save the life of an unbelted occupant.

Although some new cars offer side airbags, many do not. Dash mounted airbags offer no protection at all from side or rear collisions, only from the front. Supplemental don't offer during roll-overs, either. Wearing a lap belt keeps you anchored to the car seat and your shoulder belt keeps your upper body

from pitching forward and hitting the airbag as it deploys. Remember, airbags are designed to compliment seatbelts, not replace them.


According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, seat belt usage across the United States is on the rise and recently topped 80%. Seat belt compliance rates on most bases is over 99%, but the fact that Airmen continue to lose their lives off base by failing to buckle up suggests that off-base use still has massive room! for improvement. Supervisors are often faced with a tough job changing the ingrained habit patterns of Airmen who may have spent 18 or more years of their lives not wearing seatbelts. Persistence, sincerity, example, and constant awareness are the keys to

What choices do we have? Without the belt, people can look forward to skull fractures, facial lacerations, broken teeth, ribs and other nasty internal injuries and in the worst case, even death. The final decision is up to you. I know the choice I'll make. Remember, if the first impact doesn't get you the second one just might.







SECAF SHEILA E. WIDNALL FLIES ON MINOT B-52 BOMBER JUNE 24, 1996





During a global power mission on June 24, 1996, Secretary of the Air Force Dr. Sheila E. Widnall had the opportunity to fly on a B-52 Stratofortress assigned to the 5th Bomb Wing, Minot Air Force Base, N.D. Three of Minot's bombers were involved in the exercise which began at Andrews AFB, Md., and was a joint operation with Canada and the US Navy. The mission took eight hours and included Long Range Anti-Surface Cruise Missile operations in the north Atlantic, live Mark 82 bomb drops at Gagetown Range in Canada, an aerial refueling over western New England, and fighter intercepts. The mission was a successful

demonstration of the Air Force B-52 bomber fleet's capabilities. Widnall, who was previously a Professor of Aeronautics and Astronautics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, became the first female Secretary of the Air Force in 1993. Also accompanying Widnall on the mission was another female figure to make history, Lt. Kelly Flinn. Flinn, a copilot of the 23rd Bomb Squadron at Minot AFB, was the first B-52 combat-qualified woman in the nation's history. Widnall's focus as SECAF was on emphasizing Air Force values, supporting its mission in space, F-22 Fighter funding, and the development of women in the Air Force and other professional fields. 



INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 CUP HONEY 1/2 CUP BROWN SUGAR
- 1/2 CUP BUTTER
- 1 PINCH SALT 2 TEASPOON VANILLA EXTRACT
- 2 TEASPOON GROUND CINNAMON
- 1/2 TEASPOON ALMOND EXTRACT 5 CUP OATS, STEEL-CUT
- 1 CUP SUNFLOWER SEEDS
- 1/2 CUP WHEAT GERM 1 CUP MIXED NUTS, TOASTED
- 2 CUP FRUIT, DRIED

When ready to cook, set the grill temperature to 300° and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes.

Bake the granola until lightly browned, about 1 hour. Let cool, then break into chunks in a large mixing bowl.

Stir in the coconut and dried fruit. Store in an airtight container. Enjoy!
