Agile Combat Employment teaches Minot Civil Engineering Airmen survival skills

On June 15, 2023, Airmen from the 5th Civil Engineering Squadron participated in a unique training concept, transitioning from computer-based training to a 12-hour hands-on, outdoor classroom environment. They learned lifesaving capabilities such as finding food, water, and shelter in the wilderness.

"These are life skills that can be used in and out of the military," said Tech. Sgt. Travis Krebill, noncommissioned officer in charge of 5 CES power production and cadre of Agile Combat Employment training. "The tools and skills we are trying to teach can and will save lives."

The goal of transitioning from CBTs to a hands-on approach is to effectively instill lifesaving abilities. These talents enable Airmen to be more multi-capable and effective when deployed to an area focused on ACE.

"We are all learning," said Krebill. "Instructors and trainees. We are taking a concrete thing; our old CBTs, and changing it to a more hands-on experience." Roughly 150 5th CES Airmen

Roughly 150 5th CES Airmen were driven to an Army National Guard training area in northern North Dakota, where they were trained by 12 cadre. The Airmen split into tiers of ranks enabling the group to work with their peers and take leadership roles, rather than relying on rank to make decisions.

"When the trainees came together and learned what we taught, it was phenomenal," said Krebill. "Significant improvement was made within hours. It was amazing to see them work together. Team building, communication, leadership, making new friends... these weren't our main objectives, but they were still accomplished."

Airman 1st Class Xavier Sansores-Medrano, a structural apprentice with 5th CES, said he learned much more from the course than from clicking through a CBT. He said he was happy to be grouped with his peers because he didn't feel pressured to just follow someone's guidance; but was enabled to lead with his group.

"Everyone there had a great time," said Sansores-Medrano. "I wasn't afraid to make decisions or voice my opinion to my group. We worked really well together; the teamwork was amazing."

The Airmen split into six groups and had to navigate a map and compass to locate different stations across the designated training area. At these stations, they learned skills such as fire building, shelter building, filtering water, and catching and cooking wild game.

on a map then send them on their way," said Tech Sgt. Ryan Powell, section chief for the 5 CES expeditionary engineering and cadre of ACE training. "From there they would have to finish the class at that location, then find the next destination. However, the groups came together and shared information, so they wouldn't have to struggle to find the next location. It was cool to see some outside the box thinking. It's exactly what we were looking to achieve."

Chief Master Sgt. Steven Millerd, senior enlisted leader for the 5th CES, says that CE is a special career field where they need to be prepared for anything. CE Airmen could be deployed to a location under adverse and austere conditions. While there, they may have a need for basic outdoor survival experience, and Millerd thinks it could even save their life.

"The 5th CES Engineers are experts when it comes to using advanced technology to establish, maintain and recover an air base," said Millerd. "We are adding to our lethality by providing tangible training to where we can operate in a contested, under resourced, and undermanned environment with very little support."

Millerd says he plans to continue these unique training events so the squadron can keep improving on their ACE concepts.

"We are going to continue to push our squadron to build each month to where we gain strength from the pain of discipline to eliminate the pain of regret of not being ready," said Millerd. "I am really proud of the cadre that spends an extensive amount of time developing realistic scenarios to prepare each Airmen to be able to problem solve and have the confidence to make a decision."

Millerd and Airmen from the 5th CES believe if any of their Airmen were to find themselves in a situation where they needed to hunt for food, build shelter, and find or make potable water, these lifesaving survival skills could be their ACE in the hole.

Boat dogs are the best, something that a lot of North Dakotans know. Including your dog, or dogs, on the water may not improve your fishing success but you'll be better for it. Sharing such times with a dog somehow improves what seemingly can't be improved. In addition to being incredible friends, dogs are magical animals. When a person tells me they are thinking of buying a boat and seek my opinion on what to look for, my response is, "What kind of dog do you own?" To me, you see, boat dogs are that important. They are perfect fishing companions, never complaining about anything, and give you a gentle nudge of encouragement or put their head on your lap to lift your spirits when the "big one" gets away. No sense in brooding over it or sharing four letter words with others on the lake. Just catch another fish. My dogs taught me that. A few years ago, I owned a dog that I took fishing every time I would go. He would often curl up in the bow of the boat, patiently enjoying partaking in the outing, a much better option than staying at home. But he did what dogs do that most of us scarcely notice,

farmers and ranchers. It's organic certifiers and organic inspectors.

To the best of my knowledge, only a handful of companies will certify farmers organic in North Dakota, which isn't even close to enough.

In recent years there's been a reduction in the number of organic farms in North Dakota from 140 to 117 and part of the reason for this is so few certifiers to consider.

For many years a company in Medina called International Certification Services Inc., catered to farmers and ranchers in North Dakota and South Dakota, but in late 2020 it was sold to a Colorado company called Where Food Comes From.

The protocol at Where Food Comes From is quite different than ICS resulting in numerous farmers quitting the program or looking elsewhere to be certified.

Unfortunately, only two other certifiers are easily available to certify a farm organic in North Dakota. One is called OCIA, which stands for Organic Crop Improvement Association. It's headquarters are in Lincoln, Neb., and has certified numerous producers in the state.

What's unique about OCIA is it has local chapters of which you would be affiliated should you choose to certify through OCIA.

The other company that is easily available to certify producers in North Dakota is called Pro-Cert, which is located in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. Like OCIA, it has certified numerous North Dakota producers.

There are several others that may operate in the state, but are much more difficult to work with based on logistics and cost.

Many people have heard of California Certified Organic Farmers. As you might imagine, because California has more than 10 fold the certified organic farms as North Dakota, it is quite difficult to land an inspector. In addition, the cost to travel to North Dakota can be prohibitive.

Oregon Tilth is another option and has a sterling reputation as a certifier. But like CCOF, it can be a logistical nightmare for someone new to land Oregon Tilth as their certifier.

Several certifiers lesser known to North Dakota are available but often come with conditions that aren't favorable to a local farm or ranch.

When you look up certifiers in North Dakota, you'll find a longer list than what has just been provided. But when you contact many of them, they will tell you they don't certify farmers in North Dakota. They include the Minnesota Crop Improvement Association, Montana Organic Association and MOSA – Midwest Organic Services Association.

Organic farms and ranches continue to grow nationwide at a double digit pace but continue to slip in North Dakota. There's no doubt there are plenty of "fence sitters" in the state who would be willing to become certified organic if it was more easily accessible.

Maybe OCIA and Pro-Cert should step up their game within the state to let people know they are willing to work with you and get you certified. And maybe, just maybe, they should attempt to train more inspectors to make it more time efficient for producers.





Hemp, CBD, THC8, THC9, and Marijuana

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE STAFF JUDGE ADVOCATE

The possession, distribution, and/or ingestion of hemp products, cannabidiol (CBD). delta-8tetrahydrocannabinol (THC8), delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC9), and marijuana are illegal in the military and are cause for discharge from the United States Air Force. Use of these substances is preventable and has real consequences. This article focuses on THC8 and THC9 and is intended to provide transparency and education concerning its consequences.

WHAT IS THC8?

THC8 is an isomer (two molecules with the same formula but different structure) of THC9. THC9 is the molecule that is the source of marijuana's inebriating effect. THC8 exists naturally in the cannabis plant, but at very low levels. THC8, such as that available for purchase at local vape and smoke shops, is often produced through synthetic conversion of hemp-derived CBD. THC8 is a psychoactive cannabinoid that causes users to experience a level of euphoria like that of THC9; thus, is considered an intoxicating substance.

WHAT IS THC9?

THC9 is the cannabinoid molecule in marijuana. It is the main psychoactive ingredient that causes a user to experience a euphoric sensation. The use of THC9 stimulates the release of dopamine in the brain which causes effects on the user's body. Like THC8, it is also considered an intoxicating substance.

LAW AND REGULATION

Article 112a, Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), codified at 10 USC 912a, prohibits the wrongful use, possession, and distribution of marijuana and its derivatives. Under Article 112a, UCMJ, "Use" means to inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body, any controlled substance. "Use" includes such acts as smoking, sniffing, eating, drinking, or injecting. "Possess" means to exercise control over something.

Similarly, DAFMAN 44-197, Military Drug Demand Reduction Program, dated 23 September 2022, paragraph 1.2.2.1, prohibits "the use of products containing, or products derived from hemp, including but not limited to delta-8-tetrahydrocannabinol (delta-8-THC) and cannabidiol (CBD)" and "Failure . . . to comply . . . is a violation of Article 92, UCMJ.' Ingestion of hemp products, CBD, THC8, THC9, and marijuana can be punished under both Article 112a, UCMJ, and Article 92, UCMJ. Article 92, UCMJ, prohibits violations of lawful general orders, failures to obey lawful orders, and derelictions of duty. Moreover, lack of knowledge of general orders is

not a defense: "Knowledge of a general order or regulation need not be alleged or proved as knowledge is not an element of this offense and a lack of knowledge does not constitute a defense."

CONSEQUENCES

Commanders retain full discretion over administrative, nonjudicial, and judicial action under the UCMJ and Air Force regulations.

Under Article 15 of the UCMJ, codified at 10 USC 815, a commander may impose nonjudicial punishment on members of their command for violations of the UCMJ. Nonjudicial punishment provides commanders with an essential and prompt means of maintaining good order and discipline outside of the courtmartial process. It is intended to promote positive behavior changes in service members without the stigma of a court-martial conviction. The punishment reflects the commander's determination of an appropriate punishment after considering the circumstances of the offense and the member's record. The maximum punishment for an Article 15 action depends on the rank of the member being punished and the rank of the officer imposing punishment. Typical punishments include, but are not limited to, reduction in rank, forfeiture of pay, extra duty, restriction to base, or a reprimand.

Under Article 112a, UCMJ, the maximum punishment for wrongful use and possession of marijuana and its derivatives is a dishonorable discharge, 2-5 years of confinement, reduction to E-1, and forfeiture of all pay and allowances. Under Article 92, UCMJ, the maximum

punishment for violations of lawful general orders is a dishonorable discharge, 2 years of confinement, reduction to E-1, and forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

Finally, under DAFI 36-3211, Military Separations, dated 24 June 2022, paragraph 7.43, "Drug abuse is incompatible with military service and members who abuse drugs one or more times are subject to discharge for misconduct." In accordance with paragraph 7.43.1, "Drug abuse for purposes of this regulation is the illegal, wrongful, or improper use, possession, sale, transfer, or introduction onto a military installation of any drug. . . and any intoxicating substance, other than alcohol or tobacco." Thus, ingestion of hemp products, CBD, THC8, THC9, and marijuana is cause for discharge.

CONCLUSION

The bottom line is that possession, distribution, and/or ingestion of hemp products, CBD, THC8, THC9, and marijuana is illegal and carries serious consequences. While these products might not be illegal under state law, they remain illegal for military members. Thus, military members must exercise extreme caution with regard to the products they purchase and ingest. Just because a product can be purchased locally does not mean that product is legal for use by military members. In the past year, cases across team Minot involving drug abuse resulted in serious consequences: 40 resulted in discharge, 47 resulted in nonjudicial punishment, and 5 resulted in a court-martial conviction.







IT'S A CHICK'S LIFE

it doesn't slow down much moving into July.

By mid-June the peak sharp-tailed grouse hatch has already come and gone. Based on 55-plus years of North Dakota data, most sharptail chicks hatch between June 5 through June 11.

True, there are some early birds as well as stragglers, but generally that's when most chicks are on the ground feasting on insects.

June 12 through 18 is North Dakota's peak pheasant hatch in any given year, while partridge tend to hatch later from June 26 through July 2.

Those little chicks are just now getting their "sea legs" to maneuver through grass and other vegetation.

However, just because those are the peak hatch dates, it doesn't mean that's when all upland nesting hens are busy herding and tending their feathered puffballs on toothpick legs.

Once an egg in a clutch hatches, hens tend the chicks regardless of the number of eggs not hatching.

However, if a nest is lost for some reason – predation or human or weather-related destruction, for example – hens will attempt to re-nest, even as late as into August.

Upland game birds in North Dakota have one brood a year, regardless of the number of chicks that hatch. There could be a variety of reasons that in some years early season hunters find numerous young pheasant chicks when they're afield later into the fall: Things such as drought could mean a hen nests later. Or thunderstorms.

Or it's possible predation could have been higher. That could occur with increased predator populations or especially in dry years when there is less cover protecting nests and a nest is lost, forcing hens to make another nesting attempt

June is a busy month for people and wildlife alike but year chicks are on a mission to find insects. Pheasant chicks feed strictly on insects for the first 10 days of their life.

> Weather conditions are critical the first month of their little lives; in large part because it takes two to three weeks for chicks to be strong enough to regulate their own body temperature. They're dependent on protection from mom for shelter on hot days and in thunderstorms or cold nights.

> When chicks are young and temperatures dip below 45 degrees, it only takes five to 10 minutes before they die from exposure if the hen can't shelter them. Toss in wind and rain and it's even deadlier, which makes June and even July thunderstorms potential

> problems for pheasant chicks. However, sharptail grouse are little better equipped

to handle storms. Upland chicks, like dogs, pant to regulate their

internal body temperature.

But being a native species surviving Northern Great Plains weather for thousands of years, sharptail grouse chicks have the ability to regulate their body temperature at a younger age than pheasant and partridge chicks. They tend to handle weather extremes better.

If there could be ideal upland game bird nest and chick habitat as they grow to adulthood, it would likely look like a pollinator plot – a mix of a variety of native plants flowering throughout spring and into the fall, native grasses, and even something like alfalfa.

That type of habitat provides an overhead canopy of shelter from weather extremes and predation.

Chicks on skinny legs maneuver better among open spaces along the ground offered by flowers rather than stumbling through thick mats of grass. Yes, upland birds can nest in strictly grass. But they enjoy higher nesting success in habitat with a mix of plants and grass.

As the calendar rapidly pushes deeper into July, those pheasant, grouse, and now partridge chicks are and will be feasting on insects, providing vital protein for strong bones, feather development, and skin. Pheasants are an "edge species". They like grass and cover along ditches and field edges and this time of

In other words, native prairie is pretty darn good habitat for upland birds, especially native sharptails.

Stock up on vehicle breakdown supplies

Unforeseen situations can crop up at any time. Anyone who has had a roadside breakdown in their car understands this. A flat tire or an engine malfunction is something no driver wants to experience, but those with a well-stocked vehicle emergency kit and breakdown strategy can get through most situations rather easily.

A 2017 survey from AAA found that 40 percent of drivers in the United States are not ready to handle a typical roadside emergency breakdown. • First aid kit: The first aid kit will celebrate its 133rd birthday in 2021. The Johnson & Johnson company began commercializing first aid kits in 1888. Having a first aid kit in the car to treat minor injuries can be helpful in the event of an accident or even after injuring oneself during a breakdown.

• Fire extinguisher: Cars are full of various mechanical parts and are susceptible to catching on fire. The National Fire Protection Association says vehicle fire extinguishers need to be rated for Class B and C fires.

• Jumper cables: A weak or dead battery is often the culprit in breakdowns. Jumper cables enable drivers to get a charge from another motorist, and may help get a person back on the road quickly. If possible, get a set of cables that also comes with safety gloves and heavy duty clamps, offers Defensive Driving Online, a defensive driving course.

• Mobile phone/charger: A mobile phone is essential for calling for assistance, but the phone is only useful if it's charged.

• Traction aid: Non-clumping kitty litter or sand can provide the traction needed to get off of a slippery area of roadway.

· Flashlight: A flashlight can help keep you visible and able to see your surroundings in dark conditions.

· Flares: Should a breakdown occur in the dark, flares can alert other drivers.

• Snacks and water: Water and food that stores well, such as emergency rations, granola bars or trail mix, can quell hunger pangs and provide an energy boost while waiting for help.

· Rope/bungee cords/tarp: These items can be used in various situations to secure a vehicle.

While drivers can gather these items separately, many companies offer all-in-one vehicle emergency kits. A safety kit is essential for all drivers.

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Basic principals for safe lifting

You would never use a jack without also using a jack stand right!

The vehicle lifts that are supporting a vehicle you are working or being stored can represent one of the most productive tools in your shop, or one of the most dangerous pieces of equipment for you if not used and maintained properly. You'd never drive a vehicle that hadn't had the brakes inspected in years. Here are some basic and common sense principles apply to vehicle lifts in your shop and daily inspections are part of your job.

Whether you're using twopost lifts, parallelograms, mobile column lifts, drive-on lifts or inground lifts for servicing vehicles, you should follow these basic safety rules.

1. BUY CERTIFIED LIFTS

There's only one nationally recognized safety standard vehicle lifts: ANSI-ALI/ for ALCTV/CE, administered by the Automotive Lift Institute (ALI/ ETL). ETL testing labs verify that a manufacturer's lifts meet the national safety standard for vehicles lift. The Automotive Lift Institute working through ETL testing procedures involves rigorous third-party testing verifying lift manufacturers comply with current ANSI requirements for lifts as defined by the International Building Code, which mandates that lifts be third party tested to meet these safety requirements. To verify equipment status, look for the gold ALI/ETL verification tag

2. BUY CERTIFIED LIFT **OPTIONS**

A commonly overlooked mistake is using an uncertified option or accessory on a certified lift. Doing so will void the lift's certification. It's simple: If the optional accessory isn't certified then the lift isn't certified. ALI/ETL standards (&ANSI standards & building code standards), require all accessories, such as drive-on lifts, rolling jacks and truck adaptors, to be certified. Although certification is good for the life of the lift, older models may not meet the most current standards. Complying with American National Standards Institute (ANSI), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health (PEOSH) requirements is the key to keeping vehicle lifts at the

EFMP PCS Tips

Moving with school-aged children can be stressful, but planning ahead can allow for a smoother transition. If you child is enrolled in EFMP, extra steps should be taken. Consider the following tips as you plan your move with a school-aged child enrolled in EFMP:

1-Update the Individual Education Program (IEP) with your IEP team at the school where child attends or the 504 with designated school staff. Although the 504 is not transferrable, it is important to have possible accommodations and modifications listed so you may share ideas that have worked in the past.

2- Request and obtain copy of educational records from your current school or district office, prior to your move.

3- Contact the Minot AFB School Liaison for transition support (mafb.school.liaison@us.af.mil).

CITATION For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. As pilot of an F-105 aircraft, Lt. Col. Thorsness was on a surface-to-air missile suppression mission over North Vietnam. Lt. Col. Thorsness and his wingman attacked and silenced a surface-to-air missile site with air-toground missiles, and then destroyed a second surface-to-air missile site with bombs. In the attack on the second missile site, Lt. Col. Thorsness' wingman was shot down by intensive antiaircraft fire, and the two crewmembers abandoned their aircraft. Lt. Col. Thorsness circled the descending parachutes to keep the crewmembers in sight and relay their position to the Search and Rescue Center. During this maneuver, a MIG-17 was sighted in the area. Lt. Col. Thorsness immediately initiated an attack and destroyed the MIG. Because his aircraft was low on fuel, he was forced to depart the area in search of a tanker. Upon being advised that two helicopters were orbiting over the downed crew's position and that there were hostile MIGs in the area posing a serious threat to the helicopters, Lt. Col. Thorsness, despite his low fuel condition, decided to return alone through a hostile environment of surface-to-air missile and antiaircraft defenses to the downed crew's position. As he approached the area, he spotted four MIG-17 aircraft and immediately initiated an attack on the MIGs, damaging one and driving the others away from the rescue scene. When it became apparent that an aircraft in the area was critically low on fuel and the crew would have to abandon the aircraft unless they could reach a tanker, Lt. Col. Thorsness, although critically short on fuel himself, helped to avert further possible loss of life and a friendly aircraft by recovering at a forward operating base, thus allowing the aircraft in emergency fuel condition to refuel safely. Lt. Col. Thorsness' extraordinary heroism, self-sacrifice, and personal bravery involving conspicuous risk of life were in the highest traditions of the military service, and have reflected great credit upon himself and the U.S. Air Force.



In a small bowl, add the wine and whisk in the tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce, and thyme. Pour the wine mixture over the vegetables. Add the tomatoes and beef broth, and bury the bay leaves in the vegetables.

Lay the brisket fat-side up on top of the vegetables. Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Place the roasting pan directly on the grill grates. Close the lid and cook for 3 1/2-4 hours, or until the meat is fork-tender. Halfway through the cooking time, carefully lift the foil and turn the meat over. Replace the foil.

Remove the brisket from the grill, and let the brisket rest for 30 minutes. Remove and discard the bay leaves from the vegetables and skim any visible fat from the liquids. Transfer the brisket to a cutting board and slice into 1/4-inch-thick slices. Garnish with parsley, as desired. Enjoy!
