First Ever MAFB Health Fair Offers Walk-In **Sports Physicals on a Saturday**

Major Julianne Legierse, Pediatric Element Leader of the Clinical Operations at Minot AFB Clinic, had an idea that is becoming a reality. She and the Pediatric Team at the base clinic have put their heads, hearts and time into planning and pulling off the first ever (according to recent history) MAFB Health Fair on Saturday, August 5th from 10am -2pm, right inside the base clinic at the Medical Group Atrium.

As the first event of its kind, the Health Fair hopes to build community and bridge the gap with access to medical care for the base population. Maj Legierse explained that the idea of the Health Fair was uncovered through the means of "Evidence Based Practice," which takes into consideration research, clinical experience and patient preference, all together finding new ways to better medically serve

The main goal of the Health Fair is to offer a fun experience for Tricare Prime families to come get their school-aged kids sports physicals at one easy time and for free. Sports physicals are usually required for students to participate in any manner of extracurricular activities and they are valid all year. So, Maj Legierse recommends those playing winter and spring sports to go ahead and get theirs now before school starts and life gets hectic. If high school students already have their NDHSAA Physical Form, Maj Legierse requested that parents bring the form already filled out to save time. However, no need to worry if it gets forgotten because there will be blank forms available at the Health Fair as well. If patients are on a strict time schedule, Maj Legierse advises calling and scheduling an

appointment for the Health Fair ahead of time, to guarantee less wait times, but walk-ins are also perfectly acceptable. Appointments can be made by calling the regular 5th Medical Group Appointment line: (701) 723-5633. But she also mentioned that she will personally guarantee that every child receives a sports physical that needs one and is there before 2pm.

Even though the main goal of the Health Fair is to perform sports physicals for students, and spread the word about health options, adult patients can also visit the Women's Health Clinic and receive a walk-in pap smear or get advice from a nurse practitioner about contraception options on Saturday, August 5 during the Health Fair. Any other medical appointment needs will still need to be scheduled through the 5th Medical Group and

attended during regular business hours.

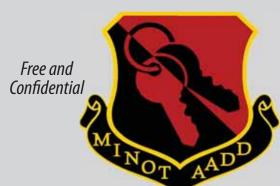
Having the event on a Saturday means that every single person working the event will be volunteering their time and expertise to make this happen. Maj Legierse confirmed that there will be nine medical providers present. Four of these providers will have a calendar and take scheduled appointments. The other four are available for walk-in physicals on the day-of.

Maj Legierse said that this fair is for everyone that is a Tricare Prime beneficiary, even those not looking for a sports physical on that day. She said there will be representation from many of the base organizations,

including the Chaplains, who will be providing donuts and drinks for guests. In addition to the CPR station, face painting and book giveaways, outside in the parking lot will be ambulances and first responder vehicles open for kids to explore and learn about. This is a fun & beneficial community event for the entire base. She made a point to say that the creation of this community health outreach was only made possible by the huge amounts of effort and work from the entire team at the 5th Medical Group. Maj Legierse hopes for this event to become an annual smashing success and gets care for as many base kids as possible.

If you're looking at a map of North America, I guess it's in the neighborhood, but in reality it's three states away and approximately 800 miles.

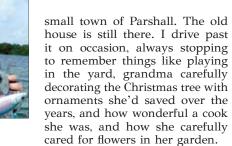

Talk to Grandma



We had a few visits that remain in my memory. Grandma wasn't what you'd call long-winded, but there were some real gems. I wish I had been far more inquisitive than I was and had written a few things down.

One day, guessing sometime around 1970, I asked my grandmother about construction that was underway at the old O&M elevator in Parshall. My grandfather managed elevator for a few years, so my grandmother was familiar with it.

She told me that trucks bringing grain to the elevator were getting bigger and the new construction would accommodate them. Of course, there were a lot of the older, much smaller farm trucks in use at the time as well, something I mentioned to grandma.

Then she responded with somewhat of a surprise to me, saying those old farm trucks were a big improvement from the days when horse-drawn wagons would bring grain to the elevator. Grandpa heard part of that conversation and recalled a few of the best teams of horses in the region. It was a reminder of just how important horses were at one time.

remembered grandpa's comments, in general anyway. I've

A few years later I came across an old Bismarck Tribune story while doing research for a book I was writing. A sheriff and a marshal drowned while crossing a frozen Missouri River with a wagon and team. While the story noted the loss of the two lawmen who were "swept under the ice", there was at least as great an emphasis in the article, if not more, on the very tragic loss of two good horses. Grandma and Grandpa would have understood.

One time when grandma was outside, she looked up at an airplane passing high overhead. Then she told me a short story about when she witnessed the first airplane in Parshall and how it scared most of the people in the area who'd never seen such

She said the plane was flown by a "barnstormer" who was among some of the earliest flying enthusiasts in the United States. It landed at Parshall, roadway or field, I can't recall if grandma said which it was. I do remember she said it was a cause for great excitement and that people were somewhat cautious about approaching it. She laughingly called it the first UFO in Parshall.

Grandma shared a few other things too, so did grandpa, but those are the ones that are first on my list. They just struck me. I think about those memories of memories from time to time. Mostly, I wish I had asked more questions, which is the reason for

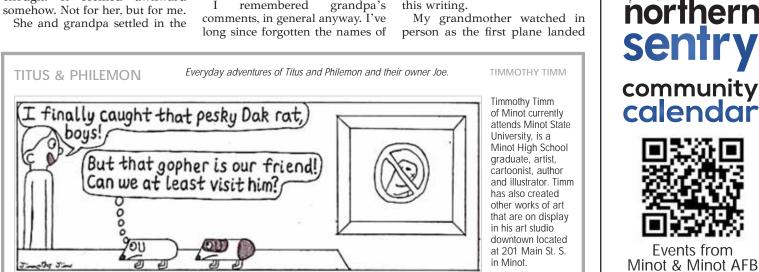

The Northern Sentry has been proud to be part of the AADD team at Minot Air Force Base. There are a lot of other members on the AADD team. On The Run provides \$10.00 gas cards for volunteers. SRT donates the cost of the phone lines, and there are a lot of other businesses who donate in kind so volunteers can be rewarded for their outstanding efforts as drivers. They use their own cars to provide the rides, and they stay on duty until 3 AM in the morning to make sure that everyone who requests a ride is accommodated.

This past week Col Daniel Hoadley and Col Kenneth McGhee took time out of their schedule to come to a recognition for 5 of the AADD volunteers. Besides the recognition coins handed out by Col Hoadley and Col McGhee, each of the volunteers received an envelope with gift cards from local businesses. staff to learn about bike safety and show off their racing skills.

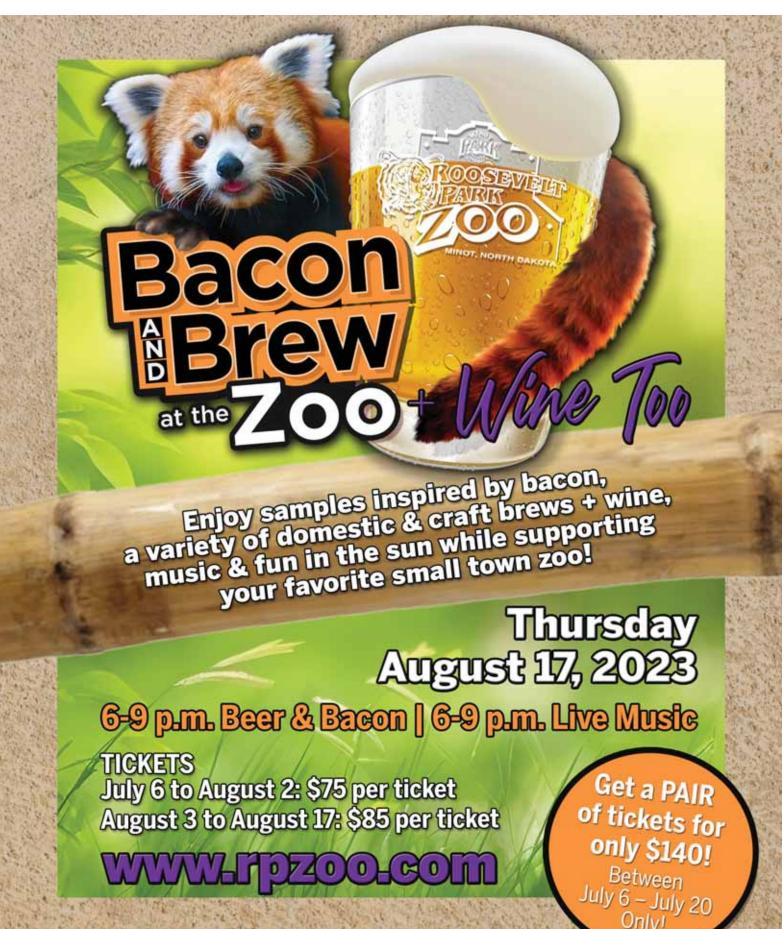

Mayor Tom Ross Backs "Home for The Holidays" Program

Budweiser Donates Motorcycle For Raffle

It's always nice to be able to spend time with family during the holiday season, if you have the time and the resources to do so. Mayor Tom Ross was having a conversation with Col Daniel Hoadley and Col Kenneth McGhee about the challenges of having the highest percentage of first year Airmen of any Air Force base in the United States. Couple that with the fact that travel to and from Minot, because of the northern location, is a challenge when it comes to booking airline flights. "For most of these Airmen, driving is out of the question" according to Mayor Ross "Col. Hoadley and Col. McGhee shared with me that they had undertaken a project of sending as many Airmen home for the holiday season as possible." The first year of the program limited funds were raised, but several Airmen were given resources to allow them to go home."

Still, the idea of sending Airmen Home for the Holidays stuck with Mayor Ross, and in the back of his mind he kept thinking that he could use his position as Mayor of Minot to help garner additional funds for the next holiday season.

Fast forward ahead to the Prairie Warrior auction where Ross, Hoadley and McGhee would once again have a conversation about the challenge at hand. Brekka Kramer and the staff of the Minot Chamber/EDC had the idea to sell corporate tables at the Prairie Warrior auction for the Home for the Holidays initiative, the results being an additional \$15,000 raised and donated to Minot Air Force Base to assist Airmen in their travel for 2023 and 2024.

"But I kept thinking we could do more" said Ross "I made a promise at the Prairie Warrior auction that I would deliver and additional \$150,000 to Home for the Holidays' and Mayor Ross began planning a way to make that promise a reality. "At first, we were focused on some type of large entertainment event, but soon we had to abandon our

efforts because we just didn't have time to plan and execute that type of event by the end of 2023. Not that we have completely abandoned that idea, it's just that we need more time to plan something that large.'

Then an opportunity presented itself. "Budweiser wanted to spend additional promotional and marketing funds in the market, and so we came up with the idea of a motorcycle raffle. We thought if they (Budweiser) purchased the motorcycle we would be able to sell raffle tickets with the result being an additional \$150,000 for Home for the Holidays."

Long story short, Magic City Beverage, the local distributor for Budweiser, and Budweiser corporate bought into the promotion hook, line and sinker, and the motorcycle was purchased, branded with a Budweiser wrap, and the raffle tickets are now on sale at local vendors of Magic City Beverage.

"We'll sell 3,000 tickets for \$50.00 each. The winning ticket will be drawn on the Minot City Hall steps on September 15th. We'll present the Harley Davidson to the lucky winter, and a check for \$150,000.00 on Saturday night of Norsk Hostfest.

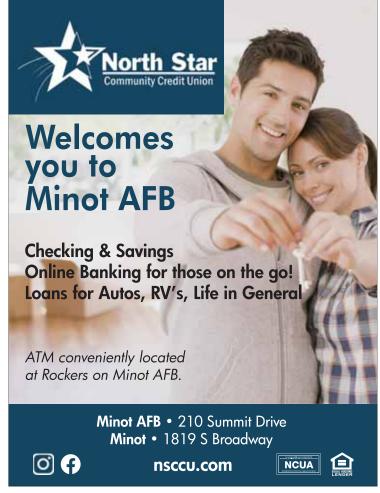
A LOOK BACK

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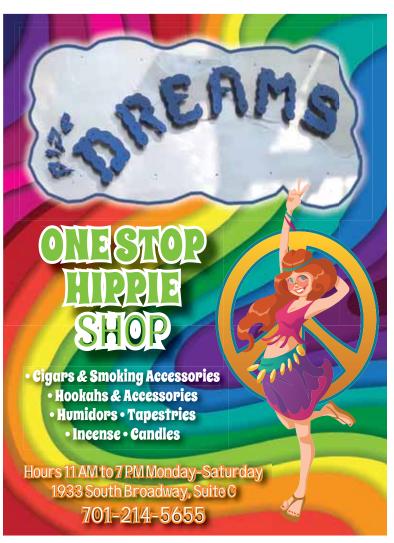

FISH CAMP AND MORE

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery is all about fish — walleye, rainbow trout, northern pike, and the unique pallid sturgeon, just to name some of the species biologists work with.

But it's more than raising young fingerling-sized fish so they can be stocked by N.D. Game and Fish Department fisheries biologists in lakes across North Dakota or elsewhere.

It's also about Kids Fish Camp.

The hatchery, tucked downstream of Garrison Dam on the Riverdale (east) side of the dam, hosts the free daily camp for children ranging in age from kindergarten through sixth grade.

This year's day camps will be held July 31 through Aug. 4, described hatchery spokesperson Toni Ganje.

It's been popular among children and parents alike in the five years of the program, providing opportunities for children to learn about fish and so much more that's going on in the Great Outdoors. "It's just about nature and wildlife. It's about having fun," Ganje added.

Game and Fish Department biologists will present a mix of activities.

In addition, children will learn about Mandan and Hidatsa American Indian culture and history from the Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site staff on another day of camp. The farming tribes lived along the Missouri River for generations.

The young "campers' will tour the hatchery, although all of the fish other than rainbow trout have now been stocked in their lake homes. But the Touch Tank is available.

And the turtles will be there to touch. "The kids love the turtles," Ganje continued.

There are games, activities, and hikes on portions of the North Country Trail adjacent to the hatchery. The hikes allow camp participants to get out and explore nature and wildlife in their real world setting, complete with waterfowl on the nearby Missouri River, bald eagles, and furry animals like deer.

A different topic is featured each day, Ganje explained, and children can attend as many days as they want.

Past activities included the popular Fish and Wildlife Service's "Let's Go Fishing" program with participants earning their "Let's Go Fishing" badge and learning about aquatic nuisance species, even looking for it on a boat.

One day an activity might include fun outdoorrelated games like fish relays. Or maybe face-painting. Children can learn about the endangered monarch butterfly and how important habitat is for all wildlife - whether it swims, flies, or walks on land.

While hatchery staff plays a large role in bringing the camp to life for its participants, volunteers help make it a success, as well, Ganje described.

Every summer people from throughout the United States volunteer at the hatchery to help with everything from conducting hatchery tours to assisting with Kids Fish Camp and wherever else they're needed. In addition, area residents also volunteer at Kids Fish Camp.

VACATION READY CAR CARE

Car care checklist for summer road trips • Part 1

It's time for a drive vacation. You mapped a route, booked hotels, and made a checklist of things to do before you go. AAA reminds you to also make car maintenance part of your summer road trip preparation. Use this car care checklist to ensure your vehicle is ready for summer travel.

Check tires and tire pressure

Inspect all four tires and, if you have one, the spare tire as well. Look for cuts, gouges or sidewall bulges. Insert a quarter upside down into grooves to check tire tread. If you see the top of George Washington's head, it is time for new tires.

Check tire pressure when the car has been idle and tires are cool. Inflate as needed to the vehicle manufacturer's recommended pressure. You will find it listed in the owner's manual and on the sticker of the driver side door jamb. Do not use the number on the



Listen to and feel the brakes

If you hear a grinding sound or feel a vibration when applying the brakes, take your vehicle to an auto repair shop for a brake inspection. A service professional will check the brake system for fluid leaks, and the pads, rotors, shoes and drums. If repair or replacement is needed, use the Repair Cost Estimator to help anticipate costs.

Secure and test the battery

Check the car battery to be sure cable connections are clean and tight, and the hold down hardware is secure. Have a service professional do a battery check to determine remaining capacity. AAA members may request a free battery check.

Top off engine oil and other fluids

Check that engine oil, coolant and brake, transmission and power steering fluids are at the correct levels for safe vehicle operation. When adding fluids, use products that meet the specifications listed in the owner's manual.

Note that newer car models may have sealed automatic transmissions without a dipstick, and electric power steering that

Replace wiper blades and replenish windshield cleaner

Rubber wiper blades naturally deteriorate over time. If wipers streak or fail to clear the windshield thoroughly, replace the blades. Fill the windshield washer reservoir with fluid formulated to remove insects and other debris, and test to make sure the nozzles spray adequately.

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Air Force delays some PCSs, bonuses

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

The Air Force is experiencing a shortfall in the FY23 Military Personnel Appropriation driven by higher-than-projected personnel

Headquarters Air Force is directing actions to be taken now to avoid exhausting funds. AFPC is currently approving PCS orders for Airmen with projected departure dates in July.

For all other Airmen awaiting PCS orders with projected departure dates of August or later, orders are being reviewed and approved on a priority basis. Some PCS order authentications will be delayed.

Effective July 11, 2023, the Air Force will suspend the FY23 reenlistment program but will allow Airmen who would have been eligible after the deadline to extend their current enlistment into fiscal year 2024. This allows most Airmen to still access an SRB program with the FY23 rules until the FY24 program starts. Airmen who reach their maximum extensions by law on their enlistment can also be accommodated through constructive re-enlistment. Airmen should be on the lookout for AFPC messaging and work with their servicing MPF.

The Air Force is also temporarily pausing the Aviation Bonus

program that opened on June 6, 2023, to restructure the program to continue offering bonuses to aviators. Within the next 14 days, the Air Force expects to reopen a restructured AvB, at which time officers who did not already elect to sign the AvB contract will be able to do so as long as funds remain.

Additionally, the Air Force is pausing new Assignment Incentive Pay; this includes Airmen signing contracts or initiating new pay at non-contract locations until the beginning of FY24. Airmen already receiving AIP will continue to receive that pay.

Finally, Airmen on overseas long tours with a DEROS between October – December 2023 will have their DEROS extended to January – March 2024.

AFPC will continue to prioritize and authenticate orders for mandatory moves and will consider ETP requests on a caseby-case basis.

The Air Force continues to work through additional options to avoid the funding shortfall and will provide more information when available.

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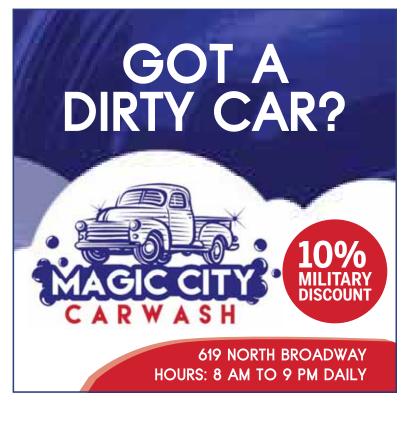


Fourth of July Turtle Race

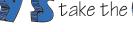












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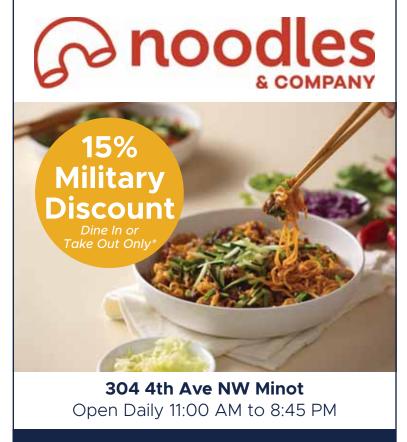




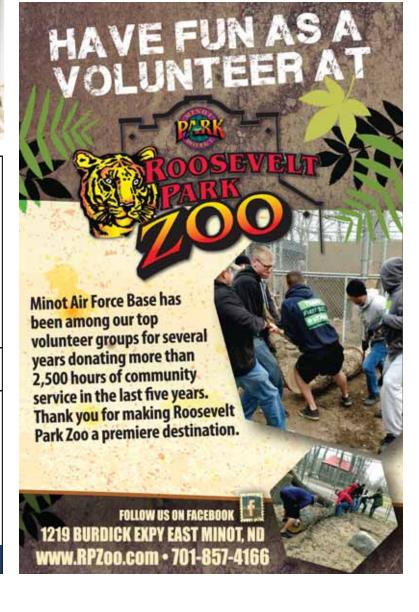


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Strategies to Beat "Summer Slide": Part 1

Summer is a time to rest, rejuvenate, and refresh from a long school year. However, there is also the potential of "summer slide" while on break. Summer slide refers to the loss of academic skills and knowledge that can occur during the summer break.

There are a few ways to address summer slide and encourage lifelong learning in students. This list is not exhaustive but can provide ideas on how to continue to engage students in learning while on summer break.

1. Read regularly: Encourage your child to read books of their choice during the summer. Set aside dedicated reading time each day to keep their reading skills sharp.

2. Visit the library: Our Minot AFB Library is incredible. Take regular trips to the local library and let your child explore different books and genres. Many libraries also offer summer reading programs with incentives and rewards.

3. Engage in educational activities: Look for educational programs, camps, or workshops in your

When ready to cook, set temperature to High and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes.

Scrub the potatoes under cold running water and pat dry with paper towels. Poke in several places with a fork.

Arrange the potatoes directly on the grill grate and bake for about 1

Use oven mitts to transfer the potatoes to a rimmed baking sheet. Let the potatoes cool slightly for 5 to 10 minutes. Turn grill temperature

Cut the potatoes in half lengthwise, and scoop the potato flesh into a bowl leaving a 1/4" shell.

With a mixer, whip on low speed for about 30 seconds. Slowly add the hot milk and melted butter. Increase the speed to medium-high and whip until the potatoes are fluffy and smooth, 90 seconds to 2 minutes.

Stir in the chives and bacon. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Lay the hollowed-out potato skins on a large baking sheet and fill each skin to heaping with the whipped potato filling. Top each potato half with a generous sprinkling of cheese.

Cook at 375° for 20 minutes or until golden brown and cheese is

Remove from grill and top with chives, if desired. Enjoy!

"There can be a lot of costs that

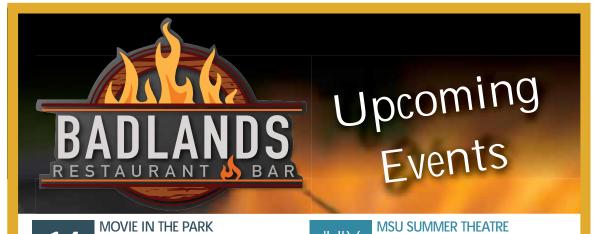
