provide help transparency on Team Minot military justice and adverse actions, 5 BW/JA periodically publishes summaries of military justice and adverse actions occurring across Team Minot. This is done to provide greater overall transparency and education concerning the military justice and adverse actions processes, as well as misconduct and its potential consequences.

NONJUDICIAL PUNISHMENT

Nonjudicial punishment provides commanders with an essential and prompt means of maintaining good order and discipline outside of the court-martial process. It is intended to promote positive behavior changes in service members without the stigma or a court-martial conviction. The punishment reflects the commander's determination of an appropriate punishment after considering the circumstances of the offense and the member's record. The maximum punishment for an Article 15 action depends on the rank of the member being punished and the rank of the officer imposing punishment. Typical punishments include, but are not limited to, reduction in rank, forfeiture of pay, extra duty, restriction to base, or a reprimand. The commander can also choose to suspend any portion of the punishment. The suspended punishment acts as a probationary period for up to six months. During this period, if the member commits further misconduct, the suspended punishment can take effect. Between 1 October 22 and 31 December 22, Minot AFB commanders administered the following nonjudicial punishment actions under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice

Six Team Minot Airmen received nonjudicial punishment for violating Article 92, Failure to Obey Order or Regulation, UCMJ. Underlying misconduct included wrongful use of THC/delta-8 THC. Punishments included a reprimand, extra duty, forfeiture of pay, restriction to base and reduction in rank.

Eleven Team Minot Airmen received nonjudicial punishment for violating Article 92, Dereliction of Duty, UCMJ. Punishment included a reprimand, extra duty, forfeiture of pay, restriction to base, and reduction in rank.

Seven Team Minot Airmen received nonjudicial punishment for violating Árticle $11\overline{2}$ a, *Wrongful* Use/Possession of Controlled Substances, UCMJ. Underlying misconduct included wrongful use of marijuana. Punishments included a reprimand, extra duty, restriction to base, forfeiture of pay, and reduction in rank.

One Team Minot Airman received nonjudicial punishment for violating Article 117, Provoking Speeches or Gestures, UCMJ. Underlying misconduct included wrongfully using provoking speech/words. Punishments included a reprimand and reduction in rank.

One Team Minot Airman received nonjudicial punishment for violating Article 120c, Indecent Exposure, UCMJ. Punishment included a reprimand, extra duty, and reduction in rank.

One Team Minot Airman received nonjudicial punishment for violating Article 134, Disorderly Conduct/ Drunkenness, UCMJ. Punishment included a reprimand, extra duty, and reduction in rank.

Two nonjudicial punishment actions were dropped by commanders after review of the Airmen's responses.

ADMINISTRATIVE DEMOTION

Between 1 October 2022 and 31 December 2022, the following administrative demotion actions were closed under DAFI 36-2502, Enlisted Airmen Promotion and Demotion Programs. Per paragraph 6.3.4 of DAFI 36-2502, Airmen may be demoted for failing to fulfill Airman, Noncommissioned Officer, or Senior Noncommissioned Officer responsibilities under The Enlisted Force Structure.

Six Team Minot Airmen were administratively demoted for failing to fulfill responsibilities by driving under the influence of alcohol or other intoxicant. DUIs occurred at various locations off-base and BACs ranged from .113 to .216. These actions were in addition to prosecution by local civilian authorities.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively demoted for failing to fulfill responsibilities by using

One Team Minot Airman was administratively demoted for failing to fulfill responsibilities by communicating a threat and driving under the influence of alcohol.

Two Team Minot Airmen were administratively demoted for failing to fulfill responsibilities by assaulting another person.

ADMINISTRATIVE SEPARATION (DISCHARGE)

Between 1 October 2022 and 31 December 2022, the following administrative discharge actions were closed under DAFI 36-3211,

Military Separations. Administrative separates Airmen discharge who fail to meet standards of performance, conduct, or discipline. Administrative discharge service characterizations, from most to least favorable: Honorable, General, and Under Other Than Honorable Conditions.

Two Team Minot Airmen were administratively discharged with an Honorable discharge for Conditions That Interfere with Military Service, Personality Disorder or Mental Disorder Not constituting a Physical

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with an Honorable discharge for Conditions That Interfere with Military Service, Condition Not Constituting a Physical Disability.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with a General discharge for Fraudulent Entry and Conditions That Interfere with Military Service, Condition Not Constituting a Physical Disability.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with a General discharge for Fraudulent Entry and Conditions That Interfere with Military Service, Personality Disorder or Mental Disorder Not constituting a Physical Disability.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with an Honorable service characterization for Unsatisfactory Performance, Failure to meet minimum fitness standards.

Five Team Minot Airmen were administratively discharged with a General service characterization for Minor Disciplinary Infractions.

Five Team Minot Airmen were administratively discharged with a General service characterization for Drug Abuse.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with a General service characterization for Discreditable Involvement with Military or Civilian Authorities.

One Team Minot Airman was administratively discharged with an Under Other Than Honorable Conditions, service characterization for Drug Abuse and Discreditable Involvement with Military or Civilian Authorities

Two Team Minot Airmen were administratively discharged with a General or Under Other Than Honorable Conditions, service characterization for Commission of a Serious Offense.

Two Team Minot Airmen were retained after presentation at a discharge board.


COURT-MARTIALS CLOSED OUT IN THE FOURTH QUARTER

Between 1 October 2022 and 31 December 2022, the following court-martial actions occurred. Courts-martial occur at one of three forums, from least to most serious: summary court-martial, special court-martial, and general court-martial. Court-martial convictions are federal convictions and may carry the equivalency of a misdemeanor or felony conviction, depending on the forum and maximum potential punishment.

A Team Minot Airman was tried at a Special Court-Martial after

pleading not guilty for violating Article 112a, *Wrongful use of Controlled Substances*, UCMJ. The Airman was found not guilty by panel members.

A Team Minot Airman was found guilty by a summary courtmartial officer of violating Article 112a, Wrongful use of Controlled Substances, UCMJ. The summary court-martial officer sentenced the Airman to be reduced to the grade of E-1, confined for 25 days, and forfeitures of 2/3rd pay per month for one month. The Airman was subsequently discharged from the Air Force.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

In recent weeks I've had the opportunity to chat with two 10-year-old girls. One is my granddaughter and the other is the

granddaughter of my farm intern.
They come from completely different backgrounds; one lives in a city in South Dakota and goes to a private school and the other lives in rural North Dakota and is home schooled. They've never met, but they have one thing in common.

They both are able to hold short conversations in Spanish. These girls are 10 years old and they have already learned a foreign language. Last week I was talking to the girl from North Dakota and told her I only know enough Spanish words

to count on one hand.

She asked me what I knew and I attempted to say the words I know. Almost immediately, she corrected me because my pronunciation wasn't quite right.

Regarding the girl from South Dakota; the last time I spoke with her, I told her that sometime this summer she and I are going to do a video skit and it's going to be in French.

I already knew she knew some Spanish so I thought OK, let's try a bit of French and see where that takes us. I wrote down a few phrases, then sat down with her thinking I was going to be coaching her through a conversation that takes about a minute.

Was I ever wrong. She picked up those French phrases almost as quickly as I wrote them down. I was just amazed at her attention to detail. And she has never been exposed to French.

Ît's hard for me to imagine how these kids have learned a foreign language so early in their lives. I took French as a foreign language in college in order to get my degree, passed it with above average grades, then forgot about it for years.

After retiring, I took it up again, realizing I can read it with ease, I can write it quite well, but I continue to struggle to speak it, yet my granddaughter rattles it off with elequence. It's just amazing.

But it brings to light, once again, how important a second language is. It doesn't have to be Spanish or French. It could be German, Norwegian, Russian, Arabic, Dutch, and the list goes on.

In fact, I don't know if this is still in effect, but for a time the Army was offering huge sign-on bonuses for people who could speak Arabic.

Because of our presence in the Middle East, the Army was in serious need of translators and so the bonus became an incentive for people who could speak the language of Iraq and Afgahnistan. If I was in my teens or early 20s, I would have jumped all over that.

Russian is also a key language to know because, as we all know, we can't trust the Russians. And, in order to better understand what is being said on Russian media or with intercepted written communications, a strong command of the Russian language is necessary.

In public schools in Canada, French is mandatory because the nation has two official languages. But for those living on the prairies, most of them forget about it like I did after college, since it is rarely used, other than maybe in sections of inner city Winnipeg.

A second language in the United States should be as important because otherwise, those kids are going to struggle like I did when they get to college and have to have a second language to earn a bachelor's and/or master's degree.

It's never too late though. There are two excellent foreign language courses that can teach you a foreign language. One, I'm sure you've heard of, is Rosetta Stone. Some of my Soldiers were learning Arabic through that course.

The other is Babbel, a European course that uses a different model than Rosetta Stone, but with the same outcome.

Turkish, Italian, Czech, Indian, etc., it's just amazing how easy it can be. The courses cost some money, but even if you want to get back to your roots in Germany or Norway, this is a great way to do it.

Mom made my favorite, Juneberry pie, from berries I picked there. She made wonderful chokecherry jelly too, gathered in the same area.

A portion of one side of the steep coulee was grassy and made for perfect cardboard sliding in the summer. In the winter, when the snow wasn't too deep, it was ideal for sleds and toboggans.

I grew up not far from there, near where Jim Hill Middle School is today. All the kids in the neighborhood used to play in the coulee where the Scandinavian Park is now located. As I recall, it was kind of a one-sided coulee meaning natural vegetation on the north slope, even extending all the way to the bottom in places.

The south slope was vastly different. It was there that concrete and asphalt chunks, dead trees and branches, loads of clay from some construction site, and who knows what else was dumped with regularity. On some days many trucks would come off 11th Avenue and dump their loads into the coulee.

Sometimes a few of us kids would be exploring the bottom of the coulee when we'd hear a truck back up to the edge, followed by that unmistakable sound of the truck bed being raised and a tailgate opening. We scrambled to get out of the way and watched the dust fly and "stuff" slide down the hill.

Now when I visit the beautiful Scandinavian Heritage Park, I can't help but be astonished at the marvelous transformation. Of course, despite the remarkable improvement, I also can't help thinking about what was once there

About where the colorful Dala horse proudly stands today was a narrow, dusty path leading into the coulee. It was made by people walking or on bicycles. There was a kind of shelf there too, about a third of the way down into the coulee. It was a good spot to leave bicvcles before continuing on foot.

When I see the statues of famed skiers Casper Oimoen and Sondre Norheim that are fixtures in the park today, I think they are located precisely in the appropriate spot. Best I can recall, they are about midway down the neighborhood's favorite old sliding and skiing

Of course, the slope there today is much different than it was before all those dump trucks filled in the

The steepest wall of the old coulee was up against where First Western Bank is today. There was a water pond at the bottom near there too. I remember cattails and ducks and frogs. The manmade pond at the Scandinavian Heritage Park is situated above, but eerily close to where the old pond was at the coulee bottom.

Yes, what was once a city dump is now a city showpiece.

I don't miss stepping in hornet's nests, getting stuck in snowbanks, or being pierced by thorns from wild plum trees, all of which happened in that old coulee. I thoroughly enjoy the Scandinavian Park today. It is incredible, even more so if you know the history of the location.

Juneberry pie? Still the best.



Every time I've gone to a Hot Tots or Tauros game, I've seen them recognize these host families who have agreed to let these players into their home for the season. It was something that seemed interesting but impossible on the base. That was until I talked to the Vasas family.

Northern Sentry: What led you to choose to sponsor a player?

Vasas': Going to baseball games during the summers here is one of our favorite outings to do as a family.

We discovered that you could be a host family when the former baseball team was playing at Corbett Field. We thought we lost the opportunity when the last league dissolved, so we were thrilled to see that the Northwoods League was coming to Minot. NS: What was the process like to get him approved to be on base?

Vasas': The process was very easy. We made sure our player had the proper documentation so that Security Forces could complete a background check at the Visitor Center. You need a Real ID- the one with a star), or two forms of ID. Our player used his Driver's License and Passport. Once the check was completed, we were to obtain a 30 day pass and sponsor him onto the base as a guest.

He stayed with us from Memorial Weekend until this past week when we began PCSing. In total, it was just about 30 days combined.

NS: What has been your favorite part of being a sponsor?

Vasas': We've loved becoming an extended part of what helps the league function for the summer and building relationships with the team, the interns, and our player.

We love it when our player hits the mound as well! It's been so much fun cheering him on & seeing our boys rooting for him. It's their favorite part, too and saying good morning at breakfast, their words.

One of our favorite and most laughable memories from this season is when our boys got their foul balls signed by our player after the game. They were thrilled, and we couldn't help but chuckle since they could have asked him to sign it at our house.

NS: Have there been any challenges through the process?

Vasas': Our experience has been smooth sailing, and we've had no challenges that we can think of.

If we had to pick something, it would probably be getting base passes after the Visitor Center has closed for the evening, and that's only because that can be a little time-consuming. Especially when

your cell phone is set to silent when they call to let you know the pass is ready. Oops!

NS: What advice would you give to other families that are interested in sponsoring?

Vasas': I would say, if you have the space, go for it!!

We had to "sacrifice" our home office/workout space for the summer, and it's been entirely worth it!

The idea of opening up your home to a stranger can be a little unnerving. The Host Family Coordinators do a great job of ensuring families are matched with players they think will fit well with their family dynamic. They also check in often to make sure everything is going well.

The experience has been the highlight of our summer & the host family benefits are beyond fantastic!


NS: Is there any other key information you would like to share about this experience?





Making A Difference: Pilots For Christ Chapter Has Helped Many

The annual email announcing the Pilots For Christ fund raiser in Maddock, North Dakota on August 6th arrived about a month ago. The Northern Sentry and other media outlets have given space and time to advertise the event, which is a fly-in/drive-in church service, lunch and family friendly event that includes free helicopter and plane rides, as well as a golf ball drop for prizes at Noon.

THE REST OF THE STORY

Paul Harvey spent a lifetime telling the other side of the story. He would leave you hanging as he teased you a topic, and then would take a 60 second commercial break before he would tell you The Rest of the Story. No commercial break folks, we'll get right to it.

The Pilots for Christ chapter in Maddock is named in honor of JT Rice, the son of John and Barb Rice of Maddock. I grew up with John Rice, he was one of, if not my best, friend. We lived a block apart, but we had two completely different lives. My parents' house was in the community of Maddock. John's house was on the far west edge of Maddock and kind of defined the edge of the Rice farm. Yeah, I was a city kid, and John was a farm kid. His Dad was a farmer who raised small grains and had cattle. It was on the Rice farm that I learned how to drive tractor, grain truck and toss bales of hay. Well not really toss bales of hay, just sort of boy-handle them up to

As a kid, Johnny (well that is what we all called him) was a true outdoorsman. He had a .22 way before any of us city kids who were still shooting BB guns, and it was Johnny who got his driver's license first and would take us all duck hunting after school. In the winter, he ran a trap line. No snowmobiles for transportation. He used to walk from trap setting to trap setting, no matter how cold the weather. Farm kid, outdoorsman, marksman, Johnny did it all. But his passion for life was most defined by his Uncle, Jerry Rice, who had a small Piper Cub airplane. Every kid in town would watch at the local airport (right on the edge of town) as Jerry would take flight. It was definitely a WOW moment whenever he flew.

Before I wrote this article, I gave Johnny a call. We talked about the Pilot's for Christ event, and eventually the conversation would be focused on Johnny, the pilot.

I asked John "when did you get your pilot's license?" He replied, "When I was 18. So, I am celebrating 50 years of flying". How can that be? Is it really 50 "Well add it up, Rod" he said with a laugh "how old are you and I?" Yes, the math was right. And of those 50 years, John did aerial application for 18 years.

But the rest of the story kind of starts after John married Barb Dwyer, from Alexander, North Dakota, and they had 5 children. Paul, Janna, Katie, Will and John Timothy, or JT. It is JT Rice that the Pilot's for Christ chapter is named after. True to their father's passion, all 5 of the Rice children earned their pilots' license. But it was IT who took flying to a higher level. JT was chosen to attend the Air Force Academy from 2006-2010, graduating with honors. From there JT enrolled at Texas Tech University pursuing a master's degree in Language and would have continued on to jet training at Sheppard Air Force Base. On April 17th of 2011 JT Rice

tragically lost his life in a single engine airplane crash near San Angelo, Texas. In his memory, and to leverage the God given talents of the Rice family and their passion for flying and service to others, the JT Rice Pilots for Christ Chapter was founded in Maddock, North Dakota.

A NEW CHAPTER

Although it may be a bit of a pun on words, the Rice family with John (or Johnny) as the lead pilot, have certainly taken their passion and resources for flying to a new level. Sons Paul & Will are both commercial pilots, and daughters Janna and Katie are private pilots. 'Although they both have babies and haven't been as active in flying lately" explains John "It's hard to handle both a baby and the stick at the same time." They Rice family owns a twin engine Beechcraft Baron, a Cessna 172 and a Robinson R44 helicopter.

The JT Rice Pilots for Christ chapter can and has done a number of Mercy Flights for those people in a bone fide need of assistance for transportation to, or from a medical facility They also proved ground transportation for those who cannot otherwise be helped, ambulatory medical flights for medications that need a lift, missionary transport for missionaries and ministry staff. Events like the one in Maddock help to provide funds to make it all happen through the various Pilots for Christ Chapter.

In addition, these events help in recruiting volunteers, pilots, mission assistants and donors. IT DOESN'T STOP THERE

At several points in my conversation with my friend John, his voice would reflect the excitement and pride of what the T Rice Pilots for Christ chapter has accomplished. "You know we raise enough money to do

a food packing event for Feed My Starving Children. We pack hundreds of packages to be sent all over the world" he explains "and by getting kids involved, we introduce and encourage young kids to get involved in aviation. I tell them that get your license and you are guaranteed a job flying somewhere."

At the August 6th event, the community hangar at the Maddock Airport will be cleared to make room for the community church service held at 10 AM. "It's amazing how you can raise the hangar door and have a great view of God's creation...right out there" according to John.

As a Pilot for Christ volunteer, John says he flies about 10-15 hours a year. When there is a need for assistance an email goes out to the many volunteers and the other Pilots For Christ chapters in 17 states. "Sometimes a volunteer is headed to a destination, and they will help someone out" and according to John, there is normally a way to get it done once people make a request.

And Now You Know, The Rest of the Story

Building a service community from a tragedy. The story of a family that lost a loved one but keeps his name alive. A small town in central North Dakota, that is home to an outward reaching organization that provides what some people do not have the resources to afford. That is what the JT Rice Pilots For Christ Chapter is all about. And now you know, the rest of the story. Their website sums it all up; The Lord's Air Force...in the name of Christ we serve



NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Basic principals for safe lifting

vehicle lifts that are The supporting a vehicle you are working or being stored can represent one of the most productive tools in your shop, or one of the most dangerous pieces of equipment for you if not used and maintained properly. You'd never drive a vehicle that hadn't had the brakes inspected in years. Here are some basic and common sense principles apply to vehicle lifts in your shop and daily inspections are part of your job.

Whether you're using twopost lifts, parallelograms, mobile column lifts, drive-on lifts or inground lifts for servicing vehicles, you should follow these basic safety rules.

1. BUY CERTIFIED

LIFTS

There's only one nationally safety recognized standard vehicle lifts: ANSI-ALI/ ALCTV/CE, administered by the Automotive Lift Institute (ALI/ ETL). ETL testing labs verify that a manufacturer's lifts meet the national safety standard for vehicles lift. The Automotive Lift Institute working through ETL testing procedures involves rigorous third-party testing verifying lift manufacturers comply with current ANSI requirements for lifts as defined by the International Building Code, which mandates that lifts be third party tested to meet these safety requirements. To verify equipment status, look for the gold ALI/ETL verification tag next to the lift's controls.

2. BUY CERTIFIED LIFT **OPTIONS**

A commonly overlooked mistake is using an uncertified option or accessory on a certified lift. Doing so will void the lift's certification. It's simple: If the optional accessory isn't certified then the lift isn't certified. ALI/ETL standards (&ANSI standards & building code standards), require all accessories, such as drive-on lifts, rolling jacks and truck adaptors, to be certified. Although certification is good for the life of the lift, older models may not meet the most current standards. Complying with American National Standards Institute (ANSI), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health (PEOSH) requirements is the key to keeping vehicle lifts at the highest possible safety level.

3. NO LOCKS ARE LIABILITY

Always raise the vehicle and then lower it onto the lift's mechanical locks as required by ANSI. Refer to ALI safety manual lifting it Right or the manufacturer's operating instructions for detailed information. An easy way to visually verify the locks are being used is to include a weight gauge (a pressure gauge calibrated to the lift's lifting capacity) on your lift. A weight gauge can also be a great diagnostic tool. If using an old inground lift that doesn't have locks, it's time for a new lift. While some in-ground lifts can be retrofitted with an aftermarket lock, it's not the most cost-effective option, and your lift will still not be ALI/ETL certified to be compliant with ANSI rules and building code laws.

4. IT'S EASY TO **OVERLOAD**

Manufacturers of the most common two-post side by side lifts mandate that none of the four swing arms be overloaded. As an example: Some may think that a 15,000 pound rated lift that's loaded with a 14,200 pound


ambulance isn't near capacity. They're wrong! It's easy to see why two-post side-by-side lifts are often overloaded, even though the total lift capacity hasn't been exceeded.

5. INSPECT **EQUIPMENT ANNUALLY**

ANSI/Automotive Lift Institute ALCTV Standard for Automotive Lifts-"Safety Requirements for Construction, Testing, and Validation" requires technicians to perform a daily operational safety check. The code also requires an annual inspection by a qualified individual. Failing to do so could expose your shop to liabilities that could be associated with an injury if an accident were to happen.

6. TRAINING AND **TESTING**

Contact the Automotive Lift Institute, your lift supplier, or a local lift inspection company for a copy of the 20-minute lifting it Right video hosted by legendary. Like any product, lifts vary in style, type, capability, longevity and

Air Force reinstates special bonuses, pays, most PCSs

SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE PUBLIC AFFAIRS

ARLINGTON, Va. (AFNS) --

With additional support from Congress on several pending reprogramming requests, the Air Force will restore funding to most military personnel programs that were suspended or closed last week.

The Air Force will restore the Selective Retention Bonuses and the Aviation Bonus program beginning next week.

Additionally, beginning next week the Air Force will resume authenticating paused PCS orders for moves in fiscal year 2023, with the target of Airmen having orders in-hand at least 30 days before departure date. Before the end of July, Airmen awaiting orders with departure dates in August or later will begin to receive their orders.

The previously announced DEROS extension for Airmen on overseas long tours with a DEROS between October and December 2023 remains in effect. These DEROSs have been extended to January through March 2024. Airmen can request an exception to policy from their wing commander, for Air Force Personnel Center commander consideration if needed.

The SRB program will be reinstated this month for all eligible career fields. Eligible Airmen reenlisting or extending for a

bonus can immediately take action to contract for a bonus. Airmen previously eligible for a bonus who extended until October 1, 2023, may now work with their Military Personnel Flights for exceptions to policy to now take action to contract for a bonus.

The Aviation Bonus Program that opened on June 5 and was paused July 11 is scheduled to re-open in the next week. All aviators who were previously eligible but had not contracted will remain eligible. Aviation bonuses remain offered on a first come, first serve basis until FY23 funds are exhausted.

Finally, Assignment Incentive Pay and Foreign Language Proficiency Pay agreements paused July 11 will be reinstated. This includes Airmen receiving new or recertifying existing foreign language bonus pay or initiating new assignment pay at all locations.

While most of the benefits have been reinstated, the Air Force will continue to communicate with Airmen whose PCS orders have not been completed, specifically those with PCS moves in FY24.

HOT DOGS

We knew it was coming sooner or rather — summer

After the initial first reminder way back in June that summer is coming, North Dakotans largely missed the blistering days reminding us that, yup, winter has its advantages at times.

But OK, we got the memo that North Dakota can and does heat up just as it can and will cool down — a lot.

While Nestle Purina is all about pet food and nutrition, they're also keen on proper pet care, in this case keeping Fido safe and cool now that summer temperatures have truly arrived.

Instead, let them drink small quantities - a few ounces at a time - to absorb the water and move out of their stomach.

Then let them drink another small amount about 15 minutes later.

Too much water can cause vomiting, bloat, and other

Rest Fido in the shade to cool down even if he or she doesn't appear overheated.

While a wet dog typically equates to a smelly dog, it also equates to the ability to cool down. Wet dogs are cool dogs. Swimming and playing in water, even sprinklers —

However, be aware of water conditions and quality before letting dogs in a lake. Conditions could also be ripe for deadly blue-green algae. Keep dogs and people of all ages out of discolored water.

The N.D. Department of Environmental Quality website, (deq.nd.gov) provides information updates on water bodies under investigation, low toxin levels, advisories, and warnings. Check it out before heading to a favorite lake regardless of its size.

It's good for humans and canines alike to exercise but

when it's hot, or especially hot and humid, Fido should avoid mid-day sun. Exercise and train when cooler, if

Walking on grass is cooler on a dog's feet than pavement. Reynolds suggests people touch pavement to test its temperature before letting a dog walk on it – their pads can get injured on hot pavement. Another trick is pouring a little water on pavement – if it steams, it's too hot for Fido.

One of the most important rules when it comes to summer heat is the same as it is with children - never leave a dog in a parked vehicle. It's OK to have them travel with you while air conditioning has everyone cool and comfy but it doesn't take long before a parked vehicle heats up and it's deadly.

Keep Fido out of the doghouse — literally. Many doghouses don't have adequate air flow. Dogs can quickly overheat just as they can in a parked vehicle. If a dog has to be outside, provide plenty of shade and cool water — try adding ice cubes to keep water cooler longer.

Reynolds has tips to identify when heat is too much for

- Know your dog's body language and pay attention to it. If Fido has gone from excited and happy to languishing behind and disinterested, it's time to back off.
- If their tails and ears are droopy, it's time to back off.
- Observe their tongue. A dog is offloading heat when panting and is trying to shed even more heat when its tongue widens and elongates. At times it can't shed as much heat as is needed, Reynolds described.

Canine heat stroke can be deadly. It's even more dangerous for puppies, senior dogs, and those with health complications. Heat stroke signs include:

- Excessive panting and salivating.
- Obvious discomfort.
- •Vomiting and diarrhea.
- Disorientation.
- · Seizures.

Dogs with those symptoms need to get in a cooler environment. Cool their chest and armpits with water. Rinse their mouth with cool water. Soak or rub their paws in cool water, as well.

Reynolds also recommends contacting its veterinarian for additional information.

Not all heat stroke symptoms occur quickly. Watch Fido even after a hot summer's day excursion. Better vet, keep Fido cool and avoid the heat of the summer.



POT ROASTED BEEF BRISKET



INGREDIENTS

- 2 1/2 POUND FLAT CUT BEEF BRISKET TRAEGER PRIME RIB RUB
- 1 LARGE YELLOW ONION, SLICED 1 CLOVES GARLIC, MINCED
- 2 1/2 MEDIUM CARROTS, CUT INTO 2 **INCH SLICES**
- 1/2 STALK CELERY, DICED 1/4 CUP DRY RED WINE
- 1/2 TABLESPOON TOMATO PASTE
- 1/2 TABLESPOON WORCESTERSHIRE SAUCE
- 1/2 TEASPOON DRIED THYME 1/2 CAN (14.5 OZ) DICED TOMATOES
- 1 CUP LOW SODIUM BEEF BROTH 1 BAY LEAF CHOPPED PARSLEY, FOR GARNISH

When ready to cook, set the Traeger temperature to 350°F and preheat with the lid closed for 15 minutes. Trim the fat cap on the brisket to 1/4-inch. Season all sides generously with Traeger Prime Rib Rub. In the bottom of a large roasting pan, add the onions, garlic, carrot, and celery.

In a small bowl, add the wine and whisk in the tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce, and thyme. Pour the wine mixture over the vegetables. Add the tomatoes and beef broth, and bury the bay leaves in the vegetables.

Lay the brisket fat-side up on top of the vegetables. Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Place the roasting pan directly on the grill grates. Close the lid and cook for 3 1/2-4 hours, or until the meat is fork-tender. Halfway through the cooking time, carefully lift the foil and turn the meat over. Replace the foil.

Remove the brisket from the grill, and let the brisket rest for 30 minutes. Remove and discard the bay leaves from the vegetables and skim any visible fat from the liquids. Transfer the brisket to a cutting board and slice into 1/4-inch-thick slices. Garnish with parsley, as desired. Enjoy!
