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# 5th Bomb Wing Conducts Base-wide Readiness Exercise

From Aug. 7-11, 2023, the 5th Bomb Wing conducted Warbird Week, an exercise that stress tests the overall capabilities of 5th BW units, and how effectively they perform their missions.

"The intent of exercises is to prepare our Airmen for their worst day. When you exercise you are reinforcing training," said Donald Hoobler, Inspector General exercise program specialist. "It links that baseline training that every Airman gets, and exercises are validating whether that training really took. It also gives confidence to our Airmen whenever they receive that training, they implement that training and they can really judge their performance on 'did I do that correctly'. When you deploy down range, you see the value of exercising. When you're in the heat of a response, whether it's a natural disaster or you're in combat operations, you don't want to figure this out for the first time, when you're in the heat of it. It is sort of like football, you don't want to go out there and your first game is the Super Bowl."

The exercise included simulations of a nuclear generation, natural disasters, an active shooter event, and other scenarios to test multiple facets of the Wing to measure overall response.

"When it comes to planning the exercise, it is us three as the leads, and we use all of the wing inspection

team (WIT) members to liaison back and forth with the office," said Hoobler. "When it comes to the inspection time, I believe I used 56 WIT members across the 5th Bomb Wing to help us to implement the inspection and make sure all of the injects flowed into the units and we were able to observe as much as we

Although Warbird Week had a broad focus on testing the 5th Bomb Wing as a whole, the 5th Medical group also conducted their own exercise: Ready Eagle. Ready Eagle calibrated the 5th MDG's focus on medical training requirements based on scenarios presented by Warbird Week.

"During Ready Eagle Capstone, our first responders, Bioenvironmental team and Field Response team recovered victims of the tornado who were exposed to hazardous materials," according to Tech. Sgt. Sarah Wilson, 5th MDG Medical Readiness & Commander's Support Staff Flight Chief. "We also had Military Treatment Facility operations in the Medical Group, which consisted of triage, decontamination, patient movement, patient tracking and treatment of casualties."

Exercises like Warbird Week and Ready Eagle are crucial to ensuring Team Minot's response to worstcase scenarios are as proficient as they can be and, ultimately, save as many of our most important assets, our Airmen.

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## Glove prototypes heat up innovation at Minot AFB

The weather isn't the only thing heating up this summer. The Minot Air Force Base innovation cell, also known as Atomic Spark, the IGNITOR working group and the 5th Contracting Squadron partnered with the 54th Helicopter Squadron, maintenance and security forces units from the 5th Bomb Wing and 91st Missile Wing to bring another innovative solution to Team Minot.

"Innovation can start with any Airman; they are the subject matter experts and know how to solve the problems," said Capt. Matthew Matuszak, 91st MW director of Atomic Spark. "Atomic Spark helps refine and elevate the Airman's idea so that it can be seen by a decision

Atomic Spark is an agency that accelerates grassroots innovations within Minot, providing both a voice and conduit to turn powerful ideas into operational capabilities. What is the newest innovative solution brought forward to the cell? Gloves.

With frigid winter temperatures that can reach 50 below zero, Airmen working outdoors are exposed to extreme weather. This makes gloves an essential item in the winter. The standard-issue gloves currently used by many Airmen may protect them from the elements, but don't offer the dexterity and movement needed to perform some duties more easily. A custom heated glove was identified as a potential solution by the 54th HS during a recent IGNITOR outreach project with their unit. This is because no glove that was commercially available offered the right amount of dexterity, comfort and warmth the squadron was

"You can't effectively employ your weapon system or the hoist if you can't feel your fingers in the winter," said Staff Sgt. Mathew Brown, 54th HS flight engineer. "The previously-issued version had some limitations, so it was determined that an improved glove was needed."

These issues were brought to the IGNITOR group, a working group whose goal is partnering with Team Minot units to identify feasible contractual, facilities or process improvement solutions to tactical problems.

The group saw the need for a custom heated glove opportunity that spanned several career fields across both the 5th BW and the 91st MW. Atomic Spark brought the idea for custom heated gloves to base leadership and assisted with drafting the required documents to request innovation funds at the Air Force level. As a result custom heated gloves are now being developed to not only help Airmen assigned to the 54th HS, but all base personnel working in extreme weather conditions.

"It can be difficult to get good training in ambient temperatures of 20 below zero or lower if you're only thinking about how cold you are, so anything that can help you focus on the task you're accomplishing in the aircraft only makes you and your squadron better," said Brown.

Team Minot's custom glove proposal was selected by Gen. Brown, Chief of Staff of the Air Force, as the recipient of a portion of his Momentum Innovation Fund. The next step in the process involves 5th CONS soliciting and awarding a contract for gloves to be delivered to the base prior to winter for the Airmen that need them most.

"This is something we began with the help from IGNITOR," said Matuszak. "Basically, IGNITOR takes a problem statement and

we work with the unit, as we have multiple different avenues for acquiring new technology or creating a custom solution."

The award winning Atomic Spark and IGNITOR teams at Minot AFB have shown no signs of stopping their streak of innovation, having acquired over \$45 million in Small Business Innovation Research funding in just under two years. These funds allow Minot AFB to identify small businesses that can provide solutions to the warfighter in a faster, more efficient manner.

"Atomic Spark is critical to Team Minot's innovation goals, having been extremely successful obtaining Department of Defense innovation funds," said Lt. Col. Stephen Kroft, 5th CONS commander. "The partnership between Atomic Spark and IGNITOR has been a key factor in turning Team Minot into a hotbed for innovation."

With more than 40 projects currently in the works amongst both Atomic Spark and IGNITOR, Team Minot Airmen are not short of new ideas to improve the Air Force. Custom heated gloves won't be the last innovation coming from Minot AFB as Airmen work hard to improve not only the base but the Air Force as a whole.

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

## What happened to ethanol?...

There was a time not so long ago that you could easily get ethanol (alcohol fuel) in North Dakota, but now you have to search for it and sometimes when you find an E-85 refueler, the place is "out of stock."

Why is this the case? The availability of ethanol is definitely lacking across the state. In fact, to the best of my knowledge, there are 14 (E-85) locations in North Dakota and eight of them are in Fargo and two are in Grand Forks.

You used to be able to fill with ethanol as far west as New Town and Richardton. In fact, there is an ethanol plant across the road from Cenex in Richardton, where ethanol was available. Now, it's not available at all in Richardton.

If you look at our neighbors, Minnesota and South Dakota, there are plenty of places to get E-85. In Minnesota, there are more than 400 locations in which you can purhase E-85. I've never counted the number in Soth Dakota, but there are numerous places in Rapid City, Pierre, Aberdeen and Mobridge, that I know of, that sell E-85, E-30 and even E-15.

But in North Dakota it's hard to find, even though about 30 percent of the vehicles on the road today are flex fuel vehicles.

One of the things critics continue to talk about is ethanol is no good because you lose gas mileage. Yes, you do lose gas mileage, but you gain the equivalent amount of torque in the process.

My own example is with a 2007 Ford F-150 I drive. Gas mileage is poor in any 4-wheel drive, but when I put E-85 in the tank, it provides plenty of giddy up... hard to quantify... but the zero to 60 easily compares with my 1985 Pontiac Trans Am.

Right now I'm paying \$1 less for E-85 than I am for gasoline. I'm losing 2 miles per gallon so that translates to about 40 miles for a tank of fuel. So when you put a pencil to it, my gas tank holds 22 gallons. Filling with gas costs \$81.18 cents right now. A tank of flawlessy for 15 years. Gee, it sure

E-85 is \$61.38.

Now, translate that to those 40 fewer miles. Sure, I'm losing mileage, but I'm saving \$20 on a tank of fuel and gaining enough torque to accelarate quickly when passing on a two-lane highway, plus, I'm putting less pollution into the air.

E-10 is easily available just about anywhere in North Dakota. But on a recent trip through Devils Lake, I found a place that advertises "no ethanol.'

Here's the talk about E-10. It's no good for your seals. It eats rubber seals and gums up your carburetor, if you still have one.

My testimonial to that is I've been commercial gardening for the past 18 years. I've had numerous small engines; lawn mowers, irrigation pumps, chain saws, rototillers and a woodchipper. I've always used E-10 in those engines and I've never had a problem.

In fact, I have two irrigation pumps that I purchased in 2009. They both have Briggs & Stratton engines. At the end of the season, I drain the water and put them in storage, but I don't drain the gas.

When I set them up the following spring, either one will start on the first or second pull.

Those pumps have been runi

hasn't eaten the seals or gummed up the carburetor. I'm not sure where that myth comes from, but it sure hasn't affected my bottom

As long as the price of ethanol is reasonable, I'll continue to use it because it's better for the environment, it doesn't destroy engines and it supports farmers who raise corn. And, you can use marginal corn to produce ethanol. You can't always use it to feed your livestock.

I think the real problem is the price. I noted this several years ago at a downtown Minot E-85 location. The refueler quit selling it because "customers weren't buying it." It's no wonder, the price was 10 cents less than gas. At that point, it isn't economical.

Sixty cents is the benchmark and as long as it stays below that price point, it's saving me money. Alcohol might eat your rubber seals and gum up your carburetor, but it hasn't bothered mine.

And let's not forget the bitter cold of winter. I just chuckle when I see people adding isoproyl alcohol to keep their gas line from freezing. It's irrelevant. Most gas already has enough alcohol in it to prevent that. Even at 40 below zero, your fuel won't crystalize.

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## **Experiencing Fly-in Fishing**

I woke to the swaying movement of leafy branches casting distinctive shadows on the ceiling of the tent. The call of a nearby loon, the gentle lapping of water on a rocky shoreline, and smell of a fresh pot of coffee percolating on a Coleman stove made for a perfect morning.

It was a fitting welcome to day one of fly-in fishing in the wilderness of northern Saskatchewan. I had no idea what time it was. Didn't care either. Time was of little importance.

My short walk to the cook tent revealed only one other in our party of six was awake. He had started the coffee and was working on a homemade bucktail he planned to use when we got on the water.

Soon the others arose and were seated around the table in the cook tent. Pancakes, blueberry or chocolate chip; and sausage links were on the menu. The

talk wasn't about fishing, but rather about sleeping in fresh air, maybe a laugh about someone's unfortunate hand of cards from the previous night.

Pancakes. Sausage. Coffee. Good friends, morning smiles, and friendly conversation. Pleasant. Enjoyable. Wonderful. I knew when I got home and someone asked about fishing, a very logical question, that a simple "really good" would be my response, knowing there was so much more to a fly-in trip than casting, setting hooks, and reeling in fish.

Because gear for six guys for a week must be loaded on a float plane, packing light for such a trip is important. There's clothes, fishing tackle, sleeping bags, food, gasoline - all making for a huge pile of gear on the loading dock. Somehow the pilot secures it all inside the plane, along with six passengers. Then he taxis away from the dock, turns into the wind, races across the water, and the plane lifts off from the gentle waves.

The hour-long flight to our chosen lake takes us over the amazing Saskatchewan wilderness. Rivers and streams and lakes of all sizes dominate the landscape. Large swaths of land are blackened due to fires too remote to threaten any homes or communities.

The pilot banks the plane to the left on his approach to what will be our island home for five nights. The floats skim the

water effortlessly and we're soon unloading our gear and setting up camp. As we are doing so the plane lifts off and the noise of the engine fades away.

No cell service. No internet. Just a promise that the pilot will return at a designated time several days later, if the weather permits. Serenity. Solitude. Nature at its

The fishing is unmatched. All caught hundreds of fish, walleye and northern pike, big and small, in many different ways. As evening approached, we'd return to our island and share a few tales from the day. The friendly chatter was about bears walking the shoreline or swimming near one of our boats, bald eagles fishing and caring for young in a nest, and the ever-present loons.

On our island home the smell of pine trees was overtaken by our small campfire, then gave way to the aroma of mouth-watering barbequed ribs. A delightful salad didn't last long as the big stack of ribs was placed at the center of the table. Wilderness?

How was the fishing? Perfect in every way.

As with any team competition, cooperation and teamwork are crucial elements of the Global Strike Challenge which helps foster esprit de corps amongst the crews participating.


"Teamwork is very important in this competition," said Mutt. "Having that camaraderie and communication with your crew plays a huge factor."

"We do a lot around the local area such as Minot state football and basketball games, performing at the Nodak Speedway, 4th of July parades, and now we're recognized whenever we go out," Said Vandervoort.

As the program manager, he had to attend trainings to make sure he was properly trained on the movements so he could effectively teach the Guardsmen.

"We practice every day, and to break up the monotony, we'll do colors one day, fire party the next, we'll do pall bearing after that, always doing something,' Vandervoort said.

Vandervoort says that the application list for Honor Guard is always full, and that he has some advice for those trying to get accepted to fulfill the coveted spot.

"Get with your leadership, express that you're interested in Honor Guard, and work hard," Vandervoort said.

Even when Guardsmen finish their time serving this special duty, they go back to their assigned duties.

Vandervoort states that even though an Airmen may be done with Honor Guard, Honor Guard is not done with the Airmen.

"When the Guardsmen go back to their unit, they'll notice an increase in their attention to detail, and everyone will treat them as the subject matter expert on uniform codes, regulations, and courtesies," Vandervoort said.

One thing is sure, if you want to join the Minot Air Force Base Honor Guard, you'd better aim high Airman.

Between Aug. 16-21, 2011, Airmen from the 23rd Bomb Squadron at Minot Air Force Base, N.D., embarked on a historic flight to Russia. Taking off from Minot AFB, the B-52 Stratofortress crew flew over the geographical North Pole on their way to the 2011 Moscow Space Aviation Salon in

Russia, becoming the first B-52 bomber to fly over the top of the world. The distance to Moscow was actually shortened by flying over the North Pole versus taking typical routes, and while the B-52 was made to withstand those types of conditions, the route had never been attempted before. Once they made it to MAKS 2011, the air crew noted that the Russians were especially impressed by the B-52's age and superb condition. Aircraft, crews, and support personal from United States bases all over Europe and the U.S. were in attendance at the Salon.





## Wheel Alignment Tips

Have your Wheel Alignment checked every other tire rotation and always when installing new tires. Wheel alignment sometimes referred to as tracking, is part of standard automobile maintenance that consists of adjusting the angles of the wheels so that they are set to the car maker's specification. The purpose of these adjustments is to reduce tire wear, and to ensure that vehicle travel, is straight and true (without "pulling" to one side). Alignment angles can also be altered beyond the maker's specifications to obtain a specific handling characteristic. Motorsport and off-road applications may call for angles to be adjusted well beyond normal for a variety of reasons.

#### **Primary Angles**

The primary angles are the basic angle alignment of the wheels relative to each other and to the car body. These adjustments are the camber, caster and toe. On some cars, not all of these can be adjusted on every

These three parameters can be further categorized into front and rear, so summarily the parameters are:

Front: Caster (right& left) Front: Camber (right & left) Front: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Camber (left & right) Rear: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Thrust angle

#### **Secondary Angles**

The secondary angles include numerous other adjustments, such as:

SAI (left & right) Included angle (left & right) Toe out on turns (left & right) Maximum Turns (left & right) Toe curve change (left & right) Track width difference Wheelbase difference Front ride height (left & right) Rear ride height (left & right)

Setback (front & rear) is often referred as a wheel alignment angle. However setback simply exists because of the measuring system and does not have any specification from car manufacturers.

#### Measurement

A camera unit (sometimes called a "head") is attached to a specially designed clamp which holds on to a wheel. There are usually four camera units in a wheel alignment system (a camera unit for each wheel). The camera units communicate their physical positioning with respect to other camera units to a central computer which calculates and displays how much the camber, toe and caster are misaligned.

Often with alignment equipment, these "heads" can be a large precision reflector. In this case, the alignment "tower" contains the cameras as well as arrays of LEDs. This system flashes one array of LEDs for each reflector whilst a camera centrally located in the LED array "looks for" an image of the reflectors patterned face. These cameras perform the same function as the other style of alignment equipment, yet alleviate numerous issues prone to relocating a heavy precision camera assembly



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




















# **FCC Providers Grand Opening**

## **NOTES ON BEING SAFE**

## The Second impact is often the deadliest

Americans love football, hotdogs, apple pie and wearing seat belts. Well, maybe Americans aren't too thrilled about wearing seat belts.

In fact, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Transportation, in 2017 (the most current data year) there were 17,452 fatalities in which restraints were not used, or an average of 349 deaths annually per state.

What many people fail to realize is that during most vehicle accidents, occupants experience two separate impacts. First, there is the initial impact. This occurs when the vehicle hits another object, but this impact alone may not be enough to cause serious harm. The second impact is the culprit behind most

Sir Issac Newton's first law of motion comes into play here. Simply put, the law states that every object will remain in motion until acted upon by an outside force, and the results can be deadly.

The second impact inside the vehicle after the force from the initial impact turns the occupants into flying projectiles, slamming them into the dashboard, windshield, or other hardened parts of the interior. Imagine this: A car traveling at 50 miles per hour (MPH) hits a stationary object and comes to a complete and sudden stop. An unbelted occupant and everything inside the car not secured will continue to travel at 50 MPH. Go a step further and compute the force with which the occupant will hit a stationary object inside the car--the vehicle's dash for instance. An occupant weighing 160 lbs traveling at a speed of 50 MPH, the force generated at the point of impact will be 8,000 pounds! Not too many bones in the body can withstand that kind of punishment; you can only imagine the damage to internal organs and soft tissue from a blow of 4 tons. Unlike a vehicle that can be repaired or replaced, the human body isn't easily repaired and is impossible to replace.

Nothing can prevent the second collision; it's a law of physics. The only thing that can be done is to reduce severity. Fortunately, there is a device inside your car that is designed for just that purpose: your seat belt.

The seatbelt wraps across the torso and waist of the driver and passenger to give the body something softer to absorb the impact. It also helps protect your body from being injured by the unyielding hard surfaces of metal and plastic on the inside of your car. Seatbelts keep you behind the wheel where you can continue to drive and possibly take further evasive action, and also prevent you from being ejected from the vehicle--one of the biggest causes of motor vehicle fatalities.

Many new cars come with airbags and this feature gives some motorists a false sense of security. Airbags are passive devices, not active systems like seatbelts that require your action to latch. Passive can be good, because it's easy, but may not necessarily be as effective. Statistically, fewer injuries and fatalities occur in crashes of vehicles equipped with airbags, (overall, airbags reduce driver deaths by 14 percent and passenger deaths by 11 percent) but the deployment of an airbag alone during a high-speed collision may not be enough to save the life of an unbelted occupant.

Although some new cars offer side airbags, many do not. Dash mounted airbags offer no protection at all from side or rear collisions, only from the front. Supplemental don't offer during roll-overs, either. Wearing a lap belt keeps you anchored to the car seat and your shoulder belt keeps your upper body

from pitching forward and hitting the airbag as it deploys. Remember, airbags are designed to compliment seatbelts, not replace them.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, seat belt usage across the United States is on the rise and recently topped 80%. Seat belt compliance rates on most bases is over 99%, but the fact that Airmen continue to lose their lives off base by failing to buckle up suggests that off-base use still has massive room! for improvement. Supervisors are often faced with a tough job changing the ingrained habit patterns of Airmen who may have spent 18 or more years of their lives not wearing seatbelts. Persistence, sincerity, example, and constant awareness are the keys to success.


What choices do we have? Without the belt, people can look forward to skull fractures, facial lacerations, broken teeth, ribs and other nasty internal injuries and in the worst case, even death. The final decision is up to you. I know the choice I'll make. Remember, if the first impact doesn't get you the second one just might.

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## We Couldn't Discover It All!

Grandkids arrived from West Fargo, and as is normal with grandparents, we have their day booked with lots to do. We want them to go home amazed at how fun it is at Grandma and BePa's house in Minot. Their ages? Carter is 12, Charlie is 9, Addely is 6 and Silas is 3. Yeah, that's a pretty big age span...what can you do that can keep them all occupied and interested for a couple of hours, at the minimum.

Having toured the Magic City Discovery Center on several occasions, it was first on our list of destinations, and the Discovery center certainly did not disappoint. We'll sum it up it quickly, we discovered, but we didn't have time to discover it all. Walking in the door the energy level went from zero to a 10, well maybe a 10+. Kids and adults, of all ages, were busy jumping from exhibit to exhibit. The young man at the front desk welcomed us and promoted the 4 floors of exhibits, and be sure not to miss the water exhibits downstairs. Having been on a couple of tours of the MC Discovery center, I was wise to the water exhibits. How is that? We had adults get absolutely soaked on one of our tours, so the water exhibits would be our last stop.

We started with mirrors. Our 3 year old grandson was just amazed. Soon he drug grandma through the exhibit. Over here BePa (my granddaughter's name for me) as I felt a tug on my hand. Look at this. She had made an airplane and now was trying to fly it into a target. Then

there was the parachute game. Hook the parachutes to a pulley system and lift them to the ceiling where they are released and float softly to the ground. My oldest grandson, Carter, soon mastered the art of hooking up 3 or 4 parachutes and watching them race to the ground.

To our right was what you see from the outside as you head north on Broadway, the now famous Climber exhibit. Now back in the days of the VIP tours, it was an oil derrick, a wind mill and a B 52. Makes perfect sense, oil, agriculture and the Minot Air Force Base. All very important to Minot. However, one could never imagine the activity level of the kids as they conquer the various climbing challenges of this exhibit. Carter is normally afraid of heights, but was amazed when he climbed into the B52 and could overlook Minot. Each kid was able to experience a different level of climbing, and that is what makes the Magic City Discovery Center so

I thought we would spend the most time at the water exhibits, but I can honestly tell you that the Air Force area with their silk-multicolored kerchiefs and the soft balls that would move around a ginormous tube, held all 4 of the kids' attention for at least 30 minutes. As kids will do, they stretched the boundaries a bit. I watched kids gather a handful of kerchiefs and fling them into the blower that pushed them up, up and over the glass. We all laughed together as they came back to earth on top of someone's head.

#### WATER-WATER EVERYWHERE

So down we go, to the glass, stainless steel and puddle area referred to as Water World. I just can't explain everything that happens here, except that the Magic City Discovery Center has wisely provided water proof aprons for the kids. I helped a youngster with one of the exhibits that I call the plumbers world. Getting water from point "A" to point "B". He was doing real well until he turned the water pressure up, and well I got soaked. Out of the corner of my eye I caught my youngest grandson about ready to pour a scoop of water onto his sister's head. Hey, it's only water, I guess. Roughly 30 minutes later, we had a very tuckered 3 year old that was ready for his afternoon nap (heck grandpa was ready for an afternoon nap, too). So we bid the Magic City Discover "farewell", with a promise that we would, for sure, have to return and spend another 3 hours there.

Having worked in Minot and raised my family here, I am always happy when I catch accolades from out of state visitors about something special in the Magic City. I know there are other discovery type exhibits in other cities, but as one lady from Canada said on our short elevator ride to the top floor, "What a fun place, even for people our age, eh?" Yes, what a fun place, for people of any age. The Magic City Discovery Center, a tribute to the vision and tenacity of those who have worked hard to bring this dream to reality.

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## **All About Pets**





Having a dog who is a picky eater can be one of the biggest challenges for pet owners. Like all pets, dogs have specific nutritional needs that must be met and if they are fussy eaters, fulfilling those needs can be difficult. Here are a few tips to help you find the right solution for your pet.

 Health problems: If your dog has suddenly developed an aversion to certain food or you have been dealing witih pickiness for a while, try speaking with your veterinarian. Your dog may have an underlying health issue that could be creating the pickiness. In that case, your vet may be able to recommend the best food for your dog's situation. Some dogs also have food allergies, and your vet can perform tests or offer suggestions to help you identify what they are.

 Stick to a routine: Domesticated dogs are creatures of habit. Stick to a set routine to avoid messing up your dog's schedule. For example, feed at 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. every day and take uneaten food away after some time. However, it is important to keep in mind that some dogs do actually prefer to graze throughout the day. Free feeding works great for some dogs, so monitor Fido closely to figure out what works best.

 Boredom: Some dogs will simply refuse to eat if they are bored of what they're getting. Eating the same food out of the same bowl every day can be monotonous, and humans wouldn't want to do that either. If your dog doesn't seem interested in its food, try switching up the method of feeding. For normally food-motivated dogs, kibble can be used during training sessions to make it more fun. You can also try other more mentally-stimulating methods of feeding such as scatter feeding, snuffle mats, puzzle toys, etc.

Believe it or not, some dogs actually like to work for their food! You can also encourage your dog to eat by adding in supplements such as fresh or frozen fruits and vegetables, canned pumpkin or vogurt, wet food, no salt added, plain chicken broth, eggs, or if you're into it, freeze dried or raw meat supplements. Some dog owners even prefer to feed entirely raw diets. It should be noted that you should consult your veterinarian before making any major changes to your dog's diet, and when it comes to feeding raw, consulting a nutrition specialist is very important to make sure your dog is getting all of the necessary nutrients.

• Stress: Picky eating can also be caused by stress and anxiety. Especially in changing environments, such as rehoming situations, moving, or bringing another pet into the home, your pet may not feel like eating. If you suspect your pet is not eating due to stress, try returning your routine back to normal as much as you can. You can try to reduce stressors by allowing your dog to eat in a quiet, calm space in the home, or by separating them from whatever they are triggered by. In some instances, all it takes is time and trust building to get your pet to start eating. This is where it can be especially important to try different foods and toppers to encourage your dog to eat, even just a little bit.

Some dogs are just picky eaters by nature, similar to how humans have preferences in what they eat. If your dog has recently developed pickiness, it may be time to visit the vet to figure out the cause. Otherwise healthy dogs can go several days (with water) without food, but the best practice is to solve the problem before ever getting there.





· Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: Try morning and evening hours for walleye. Some nice-sized bluegills showing up along the docks and shallow water.

· Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: Work deep on the east end of Lake Sakakawea for walleye although occasionally a few fish are showing up shallow in the evening. No reports from Lake Audubon.

· Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Continue working 30 to 40 feet on Lake Sakakawea using jigging Raps or slow death hooks with nightcrawlers working from Douglas to Berthold bays along the north shore. Try chasing muskie on Lake Audubon but all muskie less than 48 inches must be released. Move around in deep water to locate muskie and fish suspended.

move into a little shallower water. Try 20 to 25 feet using jigging Raps or nightcrawlers. Also try crankbaits working deeper water. Work along the south shore from McKenzie Bay to Independence Point.

· Lake Sakakawea, New Town: No new reports

· Lake Sakakawea, Van Hook Bait & Tackle, New Town: Walleye activity slowing but anglers still finding some success. Better success farther south in the Van Hook Arm in 30 feet and deeper. Look for a shift to jigging Raps or deep-diving crankbaits but some fish are still coming with spinners and nightcrawlers.

• Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace remains slow from boats with occasional success at best during the day. Try the spillway channel but walleye are small. Some catfish from the wing walls but river is slow. Try using crushed smelt or small minnows. A few walleye taken at night from shore or from boats working the chutes. Lake Sakakawea fair for walleye on the east end with best success in 40 to 50 feet. Keep those fish when taken from deep water, however. A few coming from 20 to 22 feet but not many. Better success with slow death hooks in deeper water. Try 85 feet over deeper water with flashers and squids for salmon on the east end of Lake Sakakawea. Basically

work within 10 feet of the thermocline.

· Lake Sakakawea/northwest N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Upper end of Lake Sakakawea slowed somewhat for walleye with water dirtier in some locations. Anglers still catching fish but working harder.

· Lonetree WMA area lakes, Harvey: No new reports.

• North-central/central N.D. lakes, Towner Hdwe. Hank, Towner: Not much activity on area lakes.

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

Granted, the Early Canada Goose season began Aug. 15 but in all honesty, that doesn't quite seem like a traditional hunting season opening date. There's something about September that just feels right when it comes to the start of autumn, hunting, school, and things like fall sports.

Yup, September is when it all begins.

There's a Magnum in the household that begins her first official hunting season Sept. 1, the opening of North Dakota's dove season. True, she dove hunted in 2022 as an 8-week-old pup fresh from her home state as a Nebraska Cornhusker,

However, in all honesty, the hunt consisted of carrying her through waist-high cover on a N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Area to set dove decoys in a lonely tree.

She played with blades of grass.

She slept.

She played with pebbles and small rocks.

She slept.

She romped along the muddy shoreline so someone — me – didn't have to carry her, decoys, and a shotgun back to the pickup, reveling in her first life experience of soft, squishy mud between her toes.

Notice there is no mention of carrying any doves.

That was her first hunt.

And I'm convinced she loved every second of it.

She tagged along as best she could on her first sharptailed grouse hunt.

She played with blades of grass.

She slept, not in the field on my lap as she did on her dove hunt, but in the pickup on my lap on our journey home. And, oh how she pointed little birds, which I'm convinced in her world where grouse or perhaps a glitzy rooster pheasant, not grassland sparrows, meadowlarks, and blackbirds.

She ate grasshoppers — or tried to.

As weeks progressed, Magnum - AKA The Pistol (short for .357 magnum pistol), so nicknamed for her feisty attitude – found herself stretching her horizons. Tagging behind wasn't for this little Pistol. She was growing and gaining strength and confidence.

She was beginning to become a hunter.

She sniffed grouse and as September moved into October, she discovered the joys of ducks and giddiness of smelling

She looked at a Canada goose in wonder, uncertain if she wanted to come near a creature so much bigger than herself. But curiosity and instinct prevailed and she bravely inched closer to inhale her first scent of the prize.

The Pistol tip-toed into the chill of her first snowfall and then reveled in its white, pillowed mounds with the same
