54th Helicopter Squadron Groundbreaking Ceremony

5TH BOMB WING PUBLIC AFFAIRS

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D.

On August 15, 2023, Minot Air Force Base held a groundbreaking ceremony for a new facility for the 54th Helicopter Squadron, which will house the new MH-139A Grey Wolf. The Grey Wolf will replace the 54th Helicopter Squadrons' UH-1N Huey that has been in use since 1996.

The Grey Wolf is a multi-mission capable helicopter designed to protect intercontinental ballistic missile facilities and transport U.S. government officials and security

The new facility will consist of three maintenance hangar bays, six aircraft shelter bays and three hangar bays for aircraft on alert: in addition it will also contain offices, briefing rooms, storage space, aircrew flight equipment storage and four bays to house land vehicles for tactical response. The building, once fully constructed, will be approximately 133,000 square feet.

Col. Kenneth McGhee, 91st Missile Wing commander, provided remarks during the groundbreaking ceremony of the new facility and its positive impact to the Minot AFB mission set.

"Once constructed, this new facility will house 35 Airmen on 24 hour shifts, rotating day to day to launch our Airmen across the missile field to support convoy operations, missile field emergencies, search and rescue operations, and other future potential challenges", said McGhee, "That's the very definition of integrated lethality."

The 54th Helicopter Squadron helicopter provides response for the 91st Missile Wing located at Minot Air Force Base. The squadron supports emergency war order taskings by transporting tactical response force teams in support of launch facility denial, recapture, and convoy operations. The squadron also conducts priority passenger and cargo airlift, as well as search and rescue and medical evacuation operations.

"Right now our 54th Helicopter Squadron is unable to cohabitate on a day to day basis with our 91st tactical response force partners," said Col. Philip Bryant, commander of the 582nd Helicopter Group. "We need this new facility for integrated lethality. Instead of eight Hueys, we will have 11 MH-129s.

The 54th Helicopter Squadron's primary function is to provide aerial protection for the 91st Missile wing and all of its components. With the new location, the 54th HS will be able to ensure safety of 91st MW facilities in a more efficient, safer,

opportunity for those of you who love to hunt, hike and take photos.



It's Time You Make Some Scotcheroos

I lived in the Dakotans nearly a decade before making a pan of scotcheroos for myself. Looking back, I guess I was just coasting along on the kindness of others. I'm quite spoiled by a plethora of from-around-here friends. It should also be noted that I never miss a church potluck-and there are always scotcheroos at a church potluck.

Recently, however, that changed. In a perfect storm of events, I found Rice Krispies on sale at the commissary the same week a new family moved into our church from California. I wanted to give them a real Hotdish Land welcome, so we invited them to join us for dinner and immediately put Tater Tot Hotdish and Scotcheroos on the menu.

I looked up the recipe, got out the bowls, then stood at my counter-a little apprehensive. This is a North Dakotan's favorite dessert. This is an integral part of Hotdish culture. I'm not even from around here. Who am I to attempt such a culinary feat? What if I mess it up and the Californians are scarred against life in Minot forever?

To curb my nerves, I took to the friendly streets of Instagram. I put a quick post on my stories about my first scotcheroo attempt. Soon, notifications started pinging. There were locals spurring me on, and offering tips. Then there were transplants like myself some wanting to know the recipe.

Have you heard

Many simply asking, "What's a scotcheroo?"

I guess I just thought North Dakotans constantly were identifying newcomers and saying something like, "Hi. Welcome. Here, have a scotcheroo."

Well, the questions pouring in after posting about my baking attempt proved otherwise. So it's time to explain. As your resident Minot guru, I'll explain in "not-from-around-here" terms what exactly we're talking about.

A scotcheroo is kind of like a Rice Krispy treat, but with peanut butter, and topped with chocolate. It's also the official state dessert of North Dakota (okay, I made that part up.) But seriously, Hotdishers can't get enough of these. Just ask a local to tell you about scotcheroos, even mention you've never eaten one and watch the floodgates open. It's the perfect icebreaker.

For very passive people, NoDaks are nothing, if not passionate about their scotcheroos.

There are strong opinions surrounding what makes the best scotcheroo. Some will tell you it's best to make them with Special K instead of Rice Krispies. Others will tell you that doing so means you've made "Special K Bars," which is a completely different dessert. One local will swear by making the whole thing in the microwave, while another insists stovetop always turns out best.

Let's put the politics aside. Since that first effort, I've made two more batches. They've all turned out great. Nothing to be nervous about. I even had a chance to offer one to an Estonian exchange student, who promptly asked me to write down the name of the dessert so she could make them for her family back home.

That's the magic of bars. Am I right?

Here's the recipe I used. It's ridiculously easy, and simple to commit to memory. Now you, too, can make your own-and dazzle your far-away friends and family

with this North Dakotan delicacy. You'll need:

6 cups of rice cereal

1 cup sugar

1 cup light corn syrup 1 cup peanut butter

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

1 cup butterscotch chips Here's what you do:

Melt the sugar and corn syrup together. You can do this on the stovetop or in the microwave. Get it hot enough that the sugar begins to dissolve-but if you're using a stove just be sure to take it off the heat when it looks like it's going to boil. (If the sugar gets too hot, it'll get too hard.)

Mix in the peanut butter.

Then gently mix the peanut butter sauce into the cereal. Once it's evenly distributed, pour the mixture into a 9x13 pan that you've sprayed with cooking oil. Press it down a bit.

Now, put the chocolate and butterscotch chips into a bowl and microwave them in 30 second bursts-stirring between each oneuntil melted and smooth. Pour that on top of the cereal mixture and spread it out.

Next is the hardest part. Let it firm up. This has to happen at room temperature, so it'll take 2ish hours. Putting it in the fridge can be risky, because it'll make the caramel in the bars rock hard. The wait is excruciating.



I realized there are a lot of you that have never eaten a scotcheroo. It's time to fix that.

Here's a couple tips:

Spray your 1 cup measuring cup with cooking oil before measuring the corn syrup and peanut butter. It makes for an easier release.

Don't pack the cereal down too firm. That makes for a hard bar.

What about you? Have you had scotcheroos? Have you made them? Do you have scotcheroo secrets we need to know? Definitely let me know if you use this recipe!

A step too far.

As newspaper editors and reporters, we do this all the time. We don't take any pleasure in it, but it is part of our job which is to inform the public.

What I think might have happened here is the city council, or county commission, I'm not sure at this point, hired the police chief without thoroughly looking into his background. Then, somehow the publisher received a tip about the police chief.

Again, this is my opinion, but it appears likely that the publisher was attempting to prove the council/commission made a mistake in hiring the police chief.

The only time I've ever heard of anything remotely close to this is about 30 years ago in New Hampshire, a weekly newspaper editor was shot dead on a street because of negative articles he had written about someone in that community.

Back in the days when I worked in Langdon, I often confided in Lynn Schroeder, the publisher of the Cavalier Chronicle about police and legal matters. He told me something one day that is quite simple, but makes a lot of sense.

"If you don't want your name in the paper, don't break the law."

People get really angry in a small town when their name appears in the local newspaper for a crime or an arrest or conviction or something like that.

I've had a number of situations in my career in which I reported exactly what the publisher did in Marion County, and although the people were angry with me and the newspaper, nobody ever raided the

I've also had some death threats while I was working on a tribal election and it didn't even have anything to do with my opinion writing. One candidate didn't want the other to run ads in our paper and so he had some of his people try to intimidate me into pulling the opponent's ads.

That didn't happen. And there wasn't a snowball's chance in Tucson that I was going to bend because I wasn't going to put my integrity in jeopardy.


Sure it was scary, but as a Soldier who has been in two separate hostile areas, I can tell you my training kicked in at that point... don't take the same route every day. check under the car for explosives, make sure someone knows where

you are at all times... be vigilant.

Looking back on all the negative articles I've written about politicians, prominent business people, athletes and even clergy in my 31-year career, if I had to do it all over again, I would do it exactly the same way because there were no assumptions, no opinions, no revenge, just facts as they emerged.

I was doing my job as a journalist should do their job, which is why I think the publisher of the Marion County Record should file the biggest lawsuit ever filed in rural Kansas because what happened was uncalled for and was purely meant to be intimidation.

And, in the most recent update, the police chief has agreed through the newspaper's attorney to return all the seized items and has rescinded his search warrant. That is likely because of public backlash.



U.S. Air Force representatives from the Sentinel System Program Office and Minot Air Force Base attended the Mandan-Hidatsa-Arikara Nation's Little Shell Celebration in New Town, N.D., to provide outreach on behalf of the Sentinel weapon system (formerly known as the ground-based strategic deterrent) project, Aug. 10-13.

The celebration, which was hosted by the Three Affiliated Tribes or MHA Nation, is the tribe's largest powwow and gathers attendees from across the U.S. and Canada. At the event, the Air Force team manned an educational booth spreading awareness of the Sentinel project, which aims to replace the aging Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile system with the LGM-35A ICBM by the late 2020s.

While Minot Air Force Base will be the last installation to receive Sentinel, current outreach events like this are a key opportunity for the Air Force to answer questions from residents on the Fort Berthold Reservation. MHA Nation hosts 16 91st Missile Wing facilities on tribal land, making them a key


stakeholder in the program.

"This event demonstrated more than community outreach," said Lisa Lone Fight, Senior Science Advisor for MHA Nation, Office of Chairman Fox. "Our collaboration with the Air Force not only highlights the MHA Science Department/USAF Sentinel joint research team's capability but

also showcases our tribe's capacity to work with the military, extract key lessons, and share them broadly.' MHA Nation is not only a

military. Tribal members served in the Spanish American War, World War 1, and many other conflicts despite not being recognized as citizens. It wasn't until the Voting Rights Act in 1965 that Native Americans were allowed to vote, yet members of MHA Nation still served in all branches of the military with pride and dignity, providing the highest rate of service of any demographic in the U.S.

Today, the MHA Nation continues to celebrate their military heritage through ceremonies, dances and recognition at powwows. Many of these members can be identified by their distinctive American Legion, Auxiliary or Veterans of Foreign Wars uniforms.

Through the Little Shell Celebration, Air Force representatives were able to immerse themselves in the rich culture and traditions

of MHA Nation while showing their support and respect for the sovereign nation. This firsthand learning and respect for the tribe's people and land will pave the way for more cultural awareness from the Air Force and its representatives.

"It was truly an honor for me to attend the Little Shell Celebration and partake in a culturally rich experience," said Col. George Chapman, 91st Missile Wing deputy commander. "The color guard formation and grand entry reiterated to me the special place our activeduty members and veterans hold in our communities." He went on to say that as the emcee honored Native veterans, both past and present, he felt touched while reflecting on Staff Sgt. (ret) Ira Brown, a Native veteran of the United States Air Force and his wife's grandfather, who was laid to rest 18 months ago.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to serve in the 91st Missile Wing where we share such a special relationship with the MHA Nation, one I hope to see grow as we move together, confidently into the future...a future that would make SSgt. Brown and the veterans of MHA Nation proud,' Chapman said.

Celebrations began Thursday night with traditional ceremonies of the flag folding by American Legion and VFW members, as well as giftgiving ceremonies to honor members of the community. Throughout the weekend, more than 5,000 people gathered to watch and participate in traditional dance and song. The Air Force representatives provided information to many members of MHA Nation and were even invited to participate in a gift-giving ceremony and flag raising in honor of the nation's veterans.

According to Robbie Knight, Sentinel System Program Office, National Environmental Policy, Test Program Manager, the team was attending the powwows as a followup to the Environmental Impact Statement Public Hearing with the MHA Nation in summer 2022. "We were asked by community members to hold additional forums where they could ask questions and receive additional information on the Sentinel program," Knight said. "The booth at the powwow has been a great way to interact with the public, answer questions, and deepen our understanding of the concerns of the members of the MHA Nation and residents of the Fort Berthold Reservation."

The Sentinel team's attendance at the event marked the second Air Force engagement at an MHA Nation powwow, the first taking place at

the White Shield Celebration in July. Both celebrations allowed the Air Force participants to meet the community, have a meal together and experience the diverse culture of MHA Nation.

"The collaboration at the Little Shell Celebration with the U.S. Air Force signals mutual respect and reaffirms our vision for shared progress," remarked Mark Fox, Chairman of the MHA Nation. With continuous outreach and learning, the team will have the opportunity to strengthen relationships with Minot's neighboring nation now and into the future.



LOOK BACK THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

HURRICANE KATRINA RELIEF OPERATIONS BEGIN AUGUST 30, 2005

Military and civilian services began relief operations on Aug. 30, 2005, after Hurricane Katrina devastated the southern U.S. First Air Force commander Maj. Gen. M. Scott Mayes, the task force's joint forces air component commander, set up 1st Aerospace Expeditionary Task Force-Katrina at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida. The task force set up various air expeditionary groups for a massive disaster relief operation, and 8,000 Air Force, Air Force Reserve, and Air National Guard were deployed by September

7. Helicopters (including a UH-1N Huey from Minot AFB) flew 648 sorties and rescued 4,322 people. Other USAF aircraft from bases all over the country flew 4,095 sorties. The AF evacuated 26,943 displaced people and provided aeromedical evacuations for 2,602 patients. AF medical personnel at the New Orleans International Airport treated 16,714 patients, and transport personnel airlifted 11,450 tons of relief supplies.

91st SFG Conducts Bully **Knight Exercise**

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. imperative to ensure timely actions

The 91st Missile Wing conducted an exercise simulating the retaking of an intercontinental ballistic missile launch facility, Aug. 8, 2023. The exercise, called Bully Knight, focused on the 91st Security Forces Group and was conducted in the hours of darkness, forcing the Defenders to use specific tactics in order to achieve their goal.

"Due to nighttime operations, command and control

as well as mitigating confusion during the integrated response," said Tech. Sgt. Kyle Shaw, 91st Missile Wing inspector general

The exercise event consisted of the recapture of the launch facility from hostile forces and involved airborne insertion of tactical response forces via the 54th Helicopter Squadron. The exercise itself was designed to prepare Defenders and allow the 91st MW the opportunity to validate

their strengths and identify their weaknesses.

"Honing our response skills to eliminate hostile threats will sustain and bolster the credibility of our security forces and the nuclear mission," said Shaw.

Due to the lack of light, defenders employed the use of night vision as well as overhead surveillance provided by the supporting 54th HS aircrafts.

Although the mission conditions were unorthodox, Defenders from the 91st SFG rose to the occasion, and ultimately recaptured the

"[some of the positives I saw werel Defenders not rushing to judgment and making sound tactical considerations in order to effectively execute tasks based on the situation presented," said Shaw. "Some of the responding Defenders were new to the ICBM mission, however, their motivation and assault tactics were key during a less-than-ideal

After neutralizing the simulated threats, the defenders reviewed their performance of the exercise and how they can improve in the future.



Fire In The Hole

Fire Departments Hold Joint Practice

Fire Protection specialists can deal with everything from brush fires to burning rocket fuel and hazardous material fires, which makes frequent training like these a necessity.

The training grounds for the Minot Air Force Base fire department are specific to the mission of Minot Air Force base. As you enter there is a model of a plan that resembles the body of a B-52. There is also another model of an H1 Huey helicopter, and finally a building that resembles a residential structure such as a home or apartment.

On this particular night there would be a training exercise that would use both the building structure and the B-52 model. Poised and waiting for the training event to start was a Minot AFB fire truck, and several members of the Minot AFB fire department. But tonight, this training event would also include the Glenburn rural fire department, one of 23 rural fire departments that would respond, if needed, to a fire that might take place at any one of

the missile control structures.

The training on the simulated B-52 would also take place "because you never know when we might need help with a B-52, or one may land in their back yard" according to Keith Salzman, Assistant Chief of Training from the Minot AFB fire department. Salzman has over 21 years of experience as a firefighter and more recently as a trainer. "With these fire departments we have mutual agreements" explains Salzman, "We call them, or they call us. We are here to help each other out." The training these volunteer departments receive is crucial says Salzman, "allowing them to use our facilities is really beneficial. It's something we get to do all the time, and they (the volunteer departments) don't. They really enjoy it.'

As fate would have it, the MAFB

fire department unit that was on the scene for the training was dispatched to a fire on base at one of the dorms. The training exercise began without them as the Glenburn fire department took turns practicing on a transitional attack. "What they are trying to do here is start on the outside of the structure, and eventually transition their way in to fight the first" continues Salzman.

Eventually the truck from the Minot AFB fire department returned to mutual drill, and so did Fire Department Superintendent MSgt. Timothy Butler. MSgt Butler was able to share details about how scheduling and implementing a training like the Monday night event takes place. "It takes about 30 days to organize and event like this. As with anything, you are trying to develop a team, and within that

team build leadership skills. The two fire departments (Minot AFB & Glenburn) work together. You may have a unified command when you're outside the gates of Minot AFB as we work together to battle a fire, such as a wildfire; we've had a lot of those lately. When individuals come together to work, we know what capabilities each individual and each department has. We don't want to find out where our terminology might be different, or capabilities might be different out there on a major incident. We want to find out those differences here.

According to MSgt Butler "trust is an important factor in the two departments, or any two departments working together. That trust allows us to build a better team." There are 59 assigned members

of the Minot Air Force Base fire department. 80 per cent of those members are military, and 20 percent are civilian "and each and every civilian we have here is a former Air Force firefight" says Butler.

The Glenburn Fire Department is all volunteer, and on this night there were 10 firefighters along with three additional administrative staff.

Speeding endangers everyone on the road: In 2020, speeding killed 11,258 people. We all know the frustrations of modern life and juggling a busy schedule, but speed limits are put in place to protect all road users. Learn about the dangers of speeding and why faster doesn't mean safer.

For more than two decades, speeding has been involved in approximately one-third of all motor vehicle fatalities. In 2020, speeding was a contributing factor in 29% of all traffic fatalities.

Speed also affects your safety even when you are driving at the speed limit but too fast for road conditions, such as during bad weather, when a road is under repair, or in an area at night that isn't well lit. It not only endangers not only the life of the speeder, but all of the people on the road around them, including law enforcement officers. It is a problem we all need to help solve.

Seeding is more than just breaking the law. The consequences are farranging:

Greater potential for loss of vehicle

Reduced effectiveness of occupant protection equipment.

Increased stopping distance after the driver perceives a danger. Increased degree of crash severity

leading to more severe injuries. Economic implications of a speedrelated crash; and even increased fuel

consumption/cost. Speeding is a type of aggressive driving behavior. Several factors have contributed to an overall rise in aggressive driving:

Traffic congestion is one of the most frequently mentioned contributing factors to aggressive driving, such as speeding. Drivers may respond by using aggressive driving behaviors, including speeding, changing lanes frequently, or becoming angry at anyone who they believe impedes their progress.

Some people drive aggressively because they have too much to do and are "running late" for work, school, their next meeting, etc..

A motor vehicle insulates the driver from the world. Shielded from the outside environment, a driver can develop a sense of detachment, as if an observer of their surroundings, rather than a participant. This can lead to some people feeling less constrained in their behavior when they cannot be seen by others and/ or when it is unlikely that they will ever again see those who witness their behavior.

The vast majority of motorists rarely drive aggressively, and some never do. For others, episodes of aggressive driving are frequent, and for a small proportion of motorists it is their usual driving behavior. Occasional episodes of aggressive driving-such as speeding and changing lanes abruptly-might occur in response to specific situations, like when the driver is late for an important appointment, but is not the driver's normal behavior.

If it seems that there are more cases of rude and outrageous behavior on the road now than in the past, the observation is correct—if for no other reason than there are more drivers

driving more miles on the same roads than ever before.


Speeding behavior and aggressive drivers may not only affect the speeder-it can also affect other drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists. Here are some tips for encountering speeders on the road:

If you are in the left lane and someone wants to pass, move over and let them by.

Give speeding drivers plenty of space. Speeding drivers may lose control of their vehicle more easily.

Adjust your driving accordingly. Speeding is tied to aggressive driving. If a speeding driver is tailgating you or trying to engage you in risky driving, use judgment to safely steer your vehicle out of the way.

Call the police if you believe a driver is following you or harassing
















Carol Everett to speak at Dakota Hope **Banquets in Minot and Bottineau**

Celebrating 10 years of service

DAKOTA HOPE CLINIC

Dakota Hope Clinic, a pregnancy help center in Minot, with a satellite in Tioga and another satellite soon to open in Bottineau, will hold 2 fundraising banquets in September. Carol Everett, whose life has been entrenched in women's reproductive choices since her unplanned pregnancy at age 16, is the keynote speaker for both events.

The Minot banquet will be Monday, Sept. 18th, at the State Fair Center. The following evening, Tuesday, Sept. 19th, the second banquet will be held in Bottineau at the Cobblestone Inn. Guests will

have the opportunity to partner with Dakota Hope to save and change more lives with a onetime gift and/or a pledge for monthly giving.

Six years of selling abortions to other women to justify her own brought Everett to a crossroads. She experienced a lifealtering change when she came to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ in 1983. Since then, she has been a fierce advocate

for the life affirming movement, working to make this nation safe for unborn babies and their mothers. Carol's efforts have given her a platform to serve the unborn and those in pain from a previous abortion. Her story is detailed in the book, Blood Money - Getting Rich off a Woman's Right to Choose.

In addition to sharing a great meal and Everett's inspirational message, guests will hear another young woman's story of how Dakota Hope supported her during an unplanned pregnancy and now as a mom while continuing her

college education. The event will also highlight how the community has rallied to support and grow Dakota Hope in the last 10 years, so they can reach more moms and dads with their free life-affirming pregnancy, parenting and family services. Attendees will learn how small to large gifts of money, baby items, time and prayer have enabled the clinic to serve more than 2000 clients since opening in 2013.

Dakota Hope Clinic is a charitable Christian ministry providing free and confidential pregnancy tests, ultrasound, options consultation,

prenatal vitamins, and ĥolistic support during and after a challenging pregnancy. Clients can earn free diapers and other supplies needed for infants and toddlers by completing lessons on parenting and life skills. These and other support services such as programs for parents who receive a prenatal diagnosis, or women traumatized by a past abortion or abuse,

are available at all three Clinic locations in Minot, Tioga, and Bottineau.

Reservations are required by Sept. 8 for these adult only fundraisers and seating is limited. Table hosts are being recruited and their responsibility is to invite others to sit at their table. There is no cost to being a table host or to attend. Individuals are encouraged to reserve their own seat. An invitation by a table host is not required. INGREDIENTS

1/2 CIIP MAYONNAISE 1/2 CUP SOUR CREAM

1/2 TABLESPOON SALT

TO TASTE BLACK PEPPER 2 TABLESPOON DILL SEED

1 TABLESPOON SUGAR

2 TARLESPOON SRIRACHA 2 TABLESPOON WHITE WINE VINEGAR

1 HEAD CABBAGE, SHREDDED

1 LARGE CARROT, PEELED, SHAVED THIN AS NEEDED EXTRA-VIRGIN OLIVE OIL

1 1/2 POUND HALIBUT 1/2 CUP ALL-PURPOSE FLOUR

1 1/2 TEASPOON SALT

1 TEASPOON BLACK PEPPER

2 LARGE EGGS 1 1/2 CUP PANKO BREADCRUMBS

2 TABLESPOON PARSLEY, DRIED

1 TEASPOON DILL WEED, DRIED

Add mayonnaise, sour cream, salt, pepper, dill seed, sugar, sriracha, and vinegar to a small bowl and whisk to combine.

In a medium bowl, combine cabbage and carrots and fold in the mayonnaise mixture until the cabbage and carrots are coated. Set aside until ready to eat

When ready to cook, set temperature to High and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes.

Place a dutch oven inside the grill to preheat (about 10 minutes) with enough olive oil to fry fish.

Rinse all fish fillets and pat dry. Cut fillets into 1" strips.

In one bowl combine the all purpose flour, salt and pepper.

In a separate bowl, beat eggs.



New benefit gives military families more flexibility in paying for dependent care

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --In coordination with the U.S. Office of Personnel Management, the U.S. Department of Defense has expanded eligibility for a benefit that will provide military families with another financial option for reducing the burden of the cost of dependent care, ultimately bolstering military readiness. The Dependent Care Flexible Spending Account, or DCFSA, initiative provides accounts that allow eligible service members to set aside up to \$5,000 per household in pre-tax earnings for qualified dependent care expenses.

Qualified expenses include child care, preschool, and beforeand-after-school programs for dependents under 13 years of age, care for incapacitated family members of any age, and other eligible dependent care expenses that enable service members and spouses to work, look for work, or attend school full-time.

DoD estimates approximately 400,000 active component service members and members of the Active Guard Reserve on Title 10 orders have eligible dependents and thus may be eligible for this benefit. Additionally, this benefit is already available to DoD civilians. Dependent care is vital for maintaining military readiness as it enables service members and DoD civilians alike to focus on their duties with peace of mind, knowing that their loved ones are receiving quality care.

"The introduction of the DCFSA for military families is a significant milestone in DoD's ongoing effort to take care of our people. Helping families afford care for their loved ones while pursuing their career goals supports the economic wellbeing of families and a mission

ready force," said Ashish Vazirani, deputy under secretary of defense for Personnel and Readiness.

"OPM welcomes the opportunity to build on the Department's existing support of military families," said OPM Director Kiran Ahuja. "We wholeheartedly back their desire to ensure that military families have access to affordable, high-quality child care. In collaboration with the agency, OPM is expanding eligibility of DCFSAs, under the Federal Flexible Spending Account Program, to military personnel effective Jan. 1, 2024. OPM already provides this important, cost-saving benefit to the Federal civilian employees and looks forward to including military personnel."

DoD service members will be eligible to enroll in a DCFSA during the annual Federal Open Season from mid-November through mid-December. Specific enrollment beginning and ending dates will be announced by OPM.

In preparation for the annual Federal Benefits Open Season, DoD has developed educational materials to support service members and families in determining whether a DCFSA will benefit their family. DoD strongly encourages anyone considering a DCFSA to review these educational materials and to seek support from a tax consultant and financial readiness professional before enrollment. Tax and financial readiness consultations are provided at no cost to service members and families through Military OneSource and the DoD Office of Financial Readiness.

It's in the air and, no, it's not the eerie, foreboding smoke from Canadian wildfires that seemed to persist throughout the summer.

It's the cooler, crisper mornings and sunrises refusing to crease the horizon as early as they did just a few short weeks ago.

It's sunsets slithering below the horizon before we even realize it.

It's the sense of coming autumn days and another summer season soon to become a memory.

But, fear not, it also means hunting season is rapidly approaching and, fear not, there's still a lot of outdoor time to come.

While hunting means opportunities afield for feathered and furry species alike, let's focus on just the feathered ones for now:

Just in case a person missed it, North Dakota is already 10 days into one Canada goose hunting season, what is known officially as the August Management Take/ Early September Season on the N.D. Game and Fish Department website. That opened Aug. 15.

Depending on what part of the Great State of North Dakota a person hunts in, that early Canada goose season closes either Sept. 7, Sept. 15, or Sept. 22, just days before the "real" (AKA Regular) Canada goose season opens for resident North Dakota waterfowl hunters on Sept. 23. That's also when duck, coot, and merganser seasons open.

Nonresidents get to wait a week until Sept. 30 for ducks, geese, coots, and mergansers.

Just be sure to check hunting regulations if out and about during the Early and Regular Canada goose seasons - they differ. As if that's not enough, daily and possession limits vary among the regular season hunting zones — and even closing dates in the Regular Canada goose season vary with the zone.

It's enough to give a hunter a headache.

Another migratory bird season also rapidly approaches - fall crow season opens Aug. 19. It almost begs the question, "Does anyone really, truly hunt crows in the fall or any other time of the year?"

Sept. 1 is the traditional opening date for dove hunting in the state. Ironically, even opening as early as Sept. 1 many of North Dakota's home-grown doves have already started heading south. While a few hardy ones may linger until season end on Nov. 29 they tend to book flights early.

Those dates are within the hunting framework established by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the agency in charge of migratory bird management and the Game and Fish Department uses the maximum number of days allowed within those regulations.

Dove hunting regulations allow the harvest of both native mourning doves, the traditional dove sought by hunters for decades, as well as non-native Eurasian collared doves, which have established a home in parts of the state.

Things get busy in September with the Sept. 9 opener for sharp-tailed and ruffed grouse, partridge, and Wilson's snipe. There are also special seasons for young waterfowl hunters, as well as active military and special veterans on Sept. 16 and 17.

Just a word of caution — North Dakota raises a lot of ducks and early duck hunting often means lots of brown, immature birds.

Granted species identification at any point during any hunting season is a major part of a hunter's responsibility. However, early seasons can make identification tricky.

There is also the Sept. 16 opener for sandhill cranes; the Sept. 23 resident waterfowl opener, and don't forget woodcock season for the niche of hunters pursuing that unique migratory bird. That also opens Sept. 23.

There is a bonus teal season again this year running Sept. 23 through Oct. 8.

The grand-daddy of all upland seasons, so near and dear to many North Dakota hunters, begins Oct. 7 with pheasant season. The youth pheasant season is Sept. 30 and Oct. 1.

Fall turkey lottery license holders can head out beginning Oct. 14.

Go to the Game and Fish Department website, (gf. nd.gov) for all of the season opening and closing dates and regulations, clicking "Hunting" on the menu tab, then "Licensing/Regulations", and "Regulations".
