54th Helicopter Squadron secures Team Minot's missile fields from above

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. Minot AFB hosts several tenant units that are critical to the success of our mission. These units all play a role in Team Minot's daily operations and provide unique capabilities to Team Minot's skill set. The 54th Helicopter Squadron is one of these units.

The 54th HS is a geographically separated unit from the 582nd Helicopter Group, headquartered at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming. Since 1993, the 54th HS has been assigned to Minot AFB where they provide helicopter response capabilities in support of 91st Missile Wing operations.

The support the 54th HS provides to the 91st MW includes contributing rapid security response capabilities to Team Minot's missile fields, providing overwatch security during convoy operations, as well as executing search and rescue and medical evacuation operations.

"The primary mission of the 54th HS is nuclear deterrence and nuclear surety," said Capt. Matthew Weaver, 54th HS aircraft commander. "We're heavily involved with the 91st MW and supporting their mission.'

"We provide a skill set and dynamic support that only helicopters can provide," said Senior Airman Daniel Barker, 54th HS special missions aviator instructor.

The 54th HS also integrates with Security Forces units on the ground to provide comprehensive security throughout Team Minot's missile fields, which cover approximately 8,500 square miles of North Dakota. This includes Tactical Response Force, Convoy Response Force, and in-field Security Forces teams. "The TRF, CRF, and in-field

Security Forces teams all have Forward Observers out in the missile fields that communicate directly with us," said Barker.

"The assets that we control here

are extremely important to defend," said Weaver. "If anyone was to try to gain access to those, we're going to respond as quickly as possible."

The 54th HS currently employs the UH-1N Iroquois as its primary aircraft in daily operations. The UH-1N Iroquois, however, is slated to be replaced in the coming years by the MH-139 Gray Wolf.

"The UH-1N is a very reliable aircraft and it's worked well for our mission set," said Barker. "In the next few years, we're switching to the MH-139 which is going to enhance our capabilities into the far future.'

The combination of capabilities that the 54th HS brings to table is an indispensable asset to Minot AFB. Their vigilance and determination in rapidly responding to and neutralizing potential security threats validate Team Minot's commitment to nuclear deterrence. They are Team Minot's eye in the sky.



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

Because we aren't most people who go to Grandma's house for Christmas, it was a traveling holiday to Rapid City, S.D., and back.

It's a long trip, nearly 1,000 miles round trip and just to do something different, we took U.S. Highway 85 from Watford City to Spearfish, even though it's a little out of the way. We did that just to break up the monotony of the road, basically from Reeder to Sturgis.

Too small or just right?...

Bowbells where the Burke County Courthouse had 24 employees.

So that is what I'm basing that number on. It may or may not be true, but if it is, it's certainly an oddity in North Dakota.

But then, that's not the only town of less than 100 with a county seat. Go north from Amidon about a hundred miles and you'll find Manning, the Dunn County seat with more than double the population of Amidon with 47.

One would be hard pressed to find that many employees in the Dunn County Courthouse, so Amidon is most likely the only community with such a distinction.

Manning and Amidon are the only two of the 53 counties in North Dakota that have less than 100 population in the community, however there are three others that have fewer than 200 and one with fewer than 300 people. guessing most of us think that Medora is probably bigger than it is. We usually go there in the summer and the town is just crawling with people.

The fact is, most of them don't live in Medora proper, but go there to work. Aside from that, there are many seasonal workers who come from all over the nation to work in Roosevelt National Park or the Medora Musical or in the service industry.

When it comes to conducting county business, the courthouse is in a community of 121 people.

The next smallest county seat is Fort Yates, in Sioux County. It has approximately 176 people and is not only the Sioux County seat, but is also home to the Standing Rock Sioux Tribal Administration. If you don't know about Minnewaukan, it is on the west shore of Devils Lake and 40 years ago was much larger than it is today. Forty years is used as a benchmark because that is about the time Devils Lake began to rise rapidly, forcing a lot of people out of the community.

The Benson County Fairgrounds on the east side of town even took on water and was destroyed. So the community went from 461 in 1980, to the most recent of 199, mostly because Devils Lake rose some 40 feet in those 40 years.

Finally, Carson is the next smallest county seat with a population of 254, in Grant County.

The largest county seat is Fargo, in Cass County, with its population of 126,000, which represents

Along the way, we came upon Amidon and there is a sign on the outside of town that says "Nation's smallest county seat."

OK, that's interesting because the most current population of Amidon is 22, and I don't think that is counting the mannequin mountie who sits in his car on Main Street looking for speeders.

What that basically means is, and correct me if I'm wrong, but the Slope County Courthouse has more people working in it than the population of the community it is in.

Having spent a lot of years in journalism, I became familiar with numerous county courthouses across the state and from what I remember, the smallest was in The next smallest county seat is Medora in Billings County. I'm From there it's Minneawaukan. According to the most recent census, Minneawaukan, the county seat of Benson County, had a population of 199. roughly one-seventh of the entire state's population.

Oh, and if you're military you can also access the base library for even more choices!

5. While we're talking about libraries, make this the year you get to at least one Minot Public Library book sale. You've got to experience the passive-aggressive tension first-hand to really appreciate this event.

6. If you've got a yard, but hate spending money on it, make this the year you take advantage of Minot's free mulch. Yard debris collected in allocated dumpsters through the year are mulched and can be picked up at the landfill. Also, the forestry department mulches trees that they remove, and residents can access those woodchips as well.



All About Pets

Teaching cooperative care

Cooperative care involves training animals to tolerate and even become willing participants in their own care procedures. Training pets in cooperative care is an effective way to make life easier and less stressful when it comes to vet visits, grooming, and other handling. When animals are put in situations where they are uncomfortable or fearful, it is not only traumatizing for the pet but it can be a demacroup cituation for the put of the situation. dangerous situation for the humans involved. Here are some ways you can begin to teach your pet cooperative care!

• Pick an activity that your pet may not be fond of: this could include brushing, baths, handling paws, nail trimming, etc. As an example, many dog owners know how difficult nail trimming can be for certain dogs, so this is something they may want to work on. Dogs can be sedated or medicated to trim nails, and some may think it's easier for humans to just trim their nails and "get it over with", but if you can work with your dog to desensitize them and counter-condition (change a negative emotional response to a positive one) those reactions, then why not give it a try for their emotional wellbeing?

 Give your pet the opportunity to say no: many pets have different fear thresholds, meaning that there is a certain amount of exposure to their triggers that they can handle before it becomes too much. In the example of nail trimming, be sure to start desensitizing slowly with indirect motions, like touching your dog's paw or having your pet hold their paw still in your hand. If you leap right into the triggered activity, it can put your pet over threshold very quickly and without the option to stop, it can set back your training progress. If your pet is showing signs of discomfort (pulling back a paw, yawning, lip licking, running away), stop the activity and try again later or find a less stressful way to begin. You can also teach your pet a "start button" cue, such as laying down on a mat in order to be brushed or offering a paw for nail trimming. Because we want our animals to offer consent and feel comfortable with these activities, training is often a lengthy process. You may only be able to train for 4 minutes before your pet is ready to be done for the day, but with time and persistence, you can work your way

• Mark the successful moments: high value rewards are KEY to cooperative care! When your pet performs even one action, such as offering a chin rest or sniffing the nail clippers that they may be scared of, mark the behavior with a clicker or a "yes" and give them a reward. I prefer to use hot dogs or freeze

dried treats for triggers, because they are the highest value to my dogs. But some animals are motivated by praise, others by toys. Find out what your pet likes best and reward them for even the smallest success.

• Be consistent: for some animals, cooperative care training is not an easy process. It may take months for your animal to make progress, especially if they already have prior negative experiences with the activities you are training for. Do not give up! Practice daily, and continue to mark their success even after they make significant progress. Also, practicing outside of the context of necessary situations is an important part of cooperative care. Train your pet to feel comfortable with the movements of an ear exam or putting on a muzzle so that when those become necessary, everyone is prepared.

While cooperative care actually has a list of guidelines and even a certification course developed by Deborah Jones, Ph.D, I like to use it on a broader scale. For my dogs and I, cooperative care goes hand in hand with basic training. Teaching my dogs to get in and out of the bathtub when it's time for grooming is just as important and stress-reducing as training for the actual grooming itself. Teaching an "up" command for our couch or any raised platform helps my dogs get up on vet tables and on the scale to be weighed. From there, we work on the actual cooperative care essentials:

- 1) Chin Rest (or Bucket Game)
- 2) Lie on Side
- 3) Restraint 4) Wear a Muzzle
- 5) Foot Handling6) Mouth Handling
- Taking Medication
- 8) Injection or Blood Draw
- 9) Eye Exam
- 10) Ear Exam

While these resources are meant for dogs, cooperative care principles can be applied to all sorts of animals from tigers to elephants in zoo settings! Cooperative care is a great way to strengthen the bond with your pets through training and trust building, and offers a healthy alternative to more stressful practices

Sleep Center Recruits Staff with Free Training TRINITY HEALTH

With the competition for healthcare workers at an all-time high, the Trinity Health Sleep Center is offering free training and job opportunities to anyone interested in becoming a sleep technologist.

Sleep technologists are healthcare specialists who work in a sleep facility to provide comprehensive evaluation of patients undergoing assessment for a sleep disorder such as sleep apnea or narcolepsy.

Trinity's Under program, participants will have the opportunity to become a sleep technology trainee and, after successfully completing the training

program, begin a career as a sleep technologist working under the supervision of a medical director at a salary range of \$27 to \$38 per hour.

Jutta Schmidt, RRT, RPSGT, manager of Trinity's Sleep Center, says the hope is that laypersons or healthcare workers in other fields will take advantage of the opportunity to learn new skills.

"We're excited about this program," Schmidt said. "At our expense, participants will be able to attend a two-week immersion course that develops their knowledge base about sleep medicine and teaches

the professional skills required of a sleep technologist."

DOD Releases 2024 Basic Allowance for Housing Rates

Basic allowance for housing, or BAH, rates for 2024 will increase by an average of 5.4%. The new rates, which are paid to all U.S.based active-duty members of the uniformed services when government quarters are unavailable, take effect Jan. 1.

"The proposed 5.2% basic pay increase plus the 5.4% increase in the basic allowance for housing build upon DOD's support of military members and their families. These increases ensure the military compensation package remains strong and competitive with the private sector and supports the economic security of our service members and their families," said Jeri Busch, DOD's director of military compensation policy.

BAH is a valuable component of the overall pay package and is designed to help offset the rental housing expenses service members may face when living off base in local communities. BAH rates are aligned with the housing costs of civilians with comparable incomes to each pay grade (with and without dependents) to ensure the military community can afford to rent adequate, suitable and available homes in safe neighborhoods, wherever and whenever they may be assigned," said Kevin Scott, a housing economist within DOD's Military Compensation Policy Directorate.

"The Department pays about \$27.9 billion in BAH disbursements to over 1 million service members each year," he said.

"Considering the large footprint and wide-ranging impact of BAH on the well-being of military families, the department is committed to ensuring BAH data collection and housing estimation processes are driven by industry-leading data sources, innovative methodologies and proven quality assurance techniques," Scott said.

The 2024 BAH rates were determined directly from verified local housing listings collected in about 300 housing markets, including densely populated metropolises, suburban and rural duty stations, he said.

The BAH rate-setting process relies on a wide variety of data sources that include:

U.S. Census Bureau survey data Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index

Industry-leading commercial subscription rental cost databases

Trusted online rental listing websites with verified listings

Local market expertise from the services and local military installation housing offices

Housing data include median market rents for a variety of housing sizes. Electricity, heat and water/ sewer are also averaged in the computation.

BAH rates are then calculated for each pay grade, both with and without family members, based on the cost of adequate housing for civilians with incomes comparable to each service member pay grade grouping.

BAH rate changes will vary depending on a member's housing choices. Members who rent a median-priced property may have to pay a small amount above their BAH rate (because of the out-ofpocket rate adjustment). Members who choose to economize in their housing choices may have all their housing expenses covered by BAH.

BAH rates not only reflect geographic market variances between duty stations, but because BAH rates are re-evaluated each year, BAH is also responsive to recent market changes, Scott said.

"As housing markets nationwide soared in 2022, BAH rates kept pace, increasing by a historic 12% between 2022-2023 rates. This year, housing markets cooled from their unprecedented growth and reset to strong, but more typical, growth. As such, BAH rates followed these trends in lockstep, increasing by an average of just over 5% between 2023-2024. Viewed from a wider lens, BAH rates have maintained a robust average annual growth rate of 7%+ over the past three years, compared to typical average annual changes of 3 to 4%," he said.

The goal is to obtain high-quality, accurate, current-year housing cost data.

An integral part of the BAH program is the provision of individual rate protection to all members. No matter what happens to measured housing costs - including the outof-pocket expense adjustment - an individual member who maintains uninterrupted BAH eligibility in each location will not experience a BAH rate decrease unless the member receives a reduction in paygrade or change in dependency status. This ensures that members who have made long-term commitments in the form of a lease or contract are not penalized if the area's housing costs decrease, according to the Allowance Division.







NOTES ON BEING SAFE SLOW DOWN, AND **BE CAREFUL**

Although it may seem a bit intimidating at first, it doesn't take much time for firsttime winter drivers to learn to properly tackle snow-packed and icy roads in the local area. Patience is key when heading out on winter roads for the first time, many people end up in accidents each year because they drive too fast for the conditions. The following are things drivers should remember when the snow and ice starts to fall.

For maximum power when starting cars in cold temperatures, turn off all accessories, including the radio and heater, before turning the ignition key. For carbureted cars, depress the accelerator once and release it. For fuelinjected vehicles, don't touch the pedal. Turn the key and hold it for about 20 seconds. Don't over grind the starter; it can damage it. Let the engine run for at least a minute before driving. Don't accelerate too quickly for at least a mile or two.

Not all vehicles handle in winter weather conditions the same, and it's important for people to know how to handle their vehicle in demanding winter weather. It's a good idea for people to carefully practice slow-speed maneuvers on an empty snow- or ice-covered parking lot. The vehicle owner's manual also outlines handling characteristics.

Front-wheel-drive vehicles generally handle better than rear-wheel-drive vehicles on slippery roads because the engine's weight rests on the drive wheels to improve traction. The back end of rear-wheel drive vehicles, especially pick-up trucks, tends to slide from side to side when turning on icy roads. To compensate, people with rear-wheel drive should add weight in the trunk or truck bed to give the wheels more grip.

again for pedestrians and vehicles cars on cross streets. If you're having trouble stopping, they probably will too. Prepare for drivers sliding into intersections from the side, then decide if you can safely get through the intersection or stop to avoid hitting an oncoming vehicle. After stopping, press the accelerator slowly to get going again. Vehicles with manual transmissions should start in second gear to keep the wheels from spinning.

When approaching an icy hill, find a path with the best traction. Watch the cars ahead of you, and steer clear of spots where people are spinning their wheels or sliding backward. Try driving on unpacked snow; it sometimes offers better traction.

Build speed gradually while you're still on level ground. If you have shift-on-the-fly four-wheel drive, shift into it before you reach the hill. When you reach the crest, begin to decelerate slowly, shifting into a lower gear to allow engine drag versus your brakes to cut your speed.

Slow down before you enter an icy curve. Any sudden acceleration or deceleration in a turn could send you into a skid.

Controlled speed and smooth steering and braking helps prevent skids. If your wheels lose grip, gradually release the pressure from the pedal you're using. Smoothly steer in the direction you want the car to go.

People who get stuck in snow, ice or mud often do the wrong thing and stomp on the gas pedal and end up spinning their wheels and digging in deeper. To free your vehicle, try turning the steering wheel gently from side to side and use light foot pressure on the accelerator. Then rock the vehicle forward and backward while pointing the front wheels straight ahead. It's a good idea to check the owner's manual first because this procedure can damage the transmission on some cars. If you're still stuck, stay with your vehicle and make use of your winter survival kit until assistance arrives!







On January 11, 1962, an eight man crew from Minot Air Force Base's 4136th Strategic Wing flew a record-breaking flight from Kadena Airbase, Japan to Torrejon Air Base, Spain. The flight, which was nicknamed Operation Persian Rug, broke several non-stop distance and speed records, some of which are still active. The B-52H Stratofortress and crew completed a nearly 22 hour nonrefueled flight that spanned about 12,500 miles across the globe.

It traveled at approximately 604 miles per hour. This historic flight, which took place nearly a year after the B-52 Model H was first unveiled, demonstrated the continual power and mission-ready capabilities of the bomber. The crew received awards for their accomplishment and were invited to Washington D.C. to be

Darkhouse spearing for northern pike and nongame fish may be a uniquely northern winter activity, but for many decades that didn't include North Dakota.

While popular in states such as Minnesota and Wisconsin, it wasn't done in North Dakota until enough winter angling enthusiasts encouraged the state legislature to legalize it back at the turn of a new century in 2001.

In what might be the most ancient form of winter fishing – a spear - essentially darkhouse spearing involves a windowless enclosure with anglers using a large spear to catch a fish through an even larger hole cut in the ice. We're talking a very large hole – about two to three feet wide – so it's big enough to get a pike out.

Gear is pretty basic – a spear, ice auger, ice saw to cut the ice, fish decoys or any legal live bait, and big ice tongs to help remove those cut out ice chunks. Use the auger to drill several holes, and then the ice saw to cut it into manageable chunks to remove them from the water. It helps to saw inward to provide a better view of fish as they swim into view.

The enclosure is dark so it's easier to see underwater while patiently studying the scene beneath the ice.

Just as duck or goose decoys can be elaborate or simple when waterfowl hunting so, too, can fish decoys. For some anglers, making their wooden decoys is an art onto itself. Or it could be something basic like a wooden stick.

Clear water is essential when darkhouse spearing, which can vary from lake to lake and even from year to year on a particular lake. It needs to be clear enough at least a few feet down to see the decoy and clearly identify a pike.

Another key component to darkhouse spearing is patience. Think of it much like archery hunting where a hunter must have an understanding of their quarry, knowledge to put themselves in the right location, and patience to wait for the moment when the quarry arrives on the scene and within close range. And then they have to control their adrenaline in order to make the right move for success. It's like archery in another way, as well: Just as a hunter can quietly observe the natural world around

them, other wildlife, and the sounds of the outdoors, a darkhouse spearer can quietly observe the underwater life that open water anglers don't see: Things like small prey fish, aquatic vegetation slowly waving back and forth, and antics of fish of all types as they encounter a decoy.

Fewer than 30 lakes opened to darkhouse spearing when it was legalized. Nowadays, though, only 10 lakes with muskie, a species similar in appearance to northern pike, along with the McClusky Canal are closed. Those lakes are listed in the current fishing quide.

Anyone with a valid North Dakota fishing license can darkhouse spearfish but they need to register - it's free – on the N.D. Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov).

Some other basic rules: The same daily and possession pike limits apply for both spearing and traditional hook-and-line fishing. In addition, possessing a spear while darkhouse spearfishing is considered a hookand-line. The spear has to be manually powered with a spear head no more than 12 inches wide with barbed points.

Only pike and nongame fish are legal and speared fish can't be released.

The exception is walleye can be taken from the Missouri River and Lake Sakakawea up to the first tributary bridges and the Stump Lake-Devils Lake system south of U.S. Highway 2.

While safety is paramount with any type of ice fishing, the large hole heightens the need for safety awareness. Anyone spearing should be tethered with a strong, unbreakable rope to something so they can pull themselves out if they fall into the water. The rope should be longer than the water depth, as well. And, as with any outdoor adventure, provide someone

with your location and anticipated departure time. Holes must be marked when leaving a darkhouse spearing hole. Markers have to a natural object, such as wooden stick or branches and visible from at least 150 feet away so that others on the ice can see there is potential for thin ice or open water from the large hole.
