Quebec. I'm trying to trace some of that down to point out that probably half of us who grew up there have Canadian roots.

Just about everyone there believes they have a German background and many do. But not everyone does. For instance, one parent was a German immigrant and the other Canadian. One parent might have been British and the other German and so on. So, in a way, they're not wrong, it's just that they're half right.

Germans from Russia came here, Norwegians came here, some Russians settled here and so did some people from Denmark. But so did many from Canada. And I guess I didn't know this until I started working in Langdon. I found out that even now, numerous North Dakotans, especially on the nothern tier of the state, are married to Canadians. Two of the vendors at our farmers' market are Canadian; one from Saskatchewan and one from Manitoba.

I'll bet if you stop somebody on the street in Carrington or Jamestown and ask them if they know where Weyburn is, they probably won't know. Yet, nearly all the semis that go through Carrington and link up to Interstate 94 at Jamestown that have Canadian license plates, pass through Weyburn, which is in southern Saskatchewan roughly 30 miles from the Portal port of entry.

Some years ago, I found a spring about a mile from the Canadian border in Rolette County that at one time was considered Holy Water, by Father Bellecourt, a priest who came from Canada and who the town of Belcourt is named after. I don't remember the entire story, but I wanted to find it, and I did, after a four-mile hike through the bush, so that I could photograph it.

Everyone in Carrington and Sysketon are aware of Travis Hafner. But does everyone else in North Dakota know who this guy is, even if you aren't a baseball fan? Do people in Crosby or Bowman know who Darin Erstad is? And here's another baseball trivia question. John Olerud, who played for the Toronto Blue Jays, has a North Dakota connection. Does anyone know what it is?

I think what part of the issue is, is that when we are in high school and college, we are all taught exactly the same things. It's like a cookie cutter education. George Washington, check; Washington, D.C., is the nation's capital, check; North Dakota became a state in 1889, check; the largest lake in North Dakota is Sakakawea, check;

Teachers and professors should be strongly encouraged to go off that script and teach some of these interesting things that many of us know nothing about. It would

take some research and I'm pretty sure there are lot of educators who don't want to go there.

We all know about wheat and canola and the oil industry. But do we know that once upon a time, since statehood, thousands of cherry trees were producing fruit in this state? What happened to those orchards?

It's pretty obvious to us that North Dakota is a major honey producer. The state Ag Department keeps us up to speed on that. But, does anyone know that there are people in North Dakota, using North Dakota trees, to produce maple syrup? We have a vendor at our farmers' market who does just that. And classes are taught on how to make syrup at Cross Ranch.

I could go on and on; Margaret Thatcher has visited Fargo, Randy Bachman of Guess Who and BTO fame, played an impromptu concert in a Fargo bar, Bryan Adams got booed at the North Dakota State Fair for pronouncing Minot wrong. And, Minot has 14 radio stations, yet it was Estevan station CKSE-FM that introduced Adams to the Minot concert crowd.

North Dakota is full of quirky facts like this and obscure histories that more of us should know about. Perhaps there will be more next week.

Good idea? Not so sure? Supposed to be. Feel good about it. Don't want to mess with it? Give it a try.

Ahhh. The recycling age has begun in Minot. Yup, some real trash talkin' has descended upon the city. Those blue top, supersized recycling carts are the talk of the town. Well, that might be stretching it like a drawstring, but maybe not.

Citizens are being asked to sort trash like they sort their laundry. But instead of whites, colors, delicates, hot or cold, it's cardboard, paper, plastics. Huh?

Glass? Styrofoam? Nope. Okay. There's a bit of learning to do, but the instructions are right on top of the recycling cart, complete with helpful pictures. That helps. Sort of, and it's all about sorting. Turns out trash is that important. At least disposing

Trash is not necessarily trash anymore. Some of it, a lot of it, has been elevated to recycling status. Of course, that means some changes in the household. Such as, you can put trash into a bag, but you can't put a bag into the trash, at least not the recycling cart.

Putting trash bags in the recycling cart is a no-no. Turns out plastic trash bags foul up sorting equipment. Bags of trash, not the recycling kind, go into the trash cart as usual. There is a bit of a difference due to the implementation of recycling.

The City of Minot will be making the rounds to empty recycling carts every other week. Those days replace regular garbage pickup, which has been reduced from four times every two weeks to three. Concerned? Here's where the "wait and see" and "give it a try" comes in.
What many households will

discover is that the amount of usual garbage items that you the recycling cart

old trash, which should equate to less need for picking up trash four times every two weeks. Three days should suffice just fine with one other day devoted to recycling.

While there's a certain "feel good" associated with recycling, doing something good for the environment, cutting back on landfill garbage etc., there might actually be a somewhat hidden cost saving.


If you always bag your trash before putting it in the cart, you'll be using fewer plastic trash bags mean you'll have far less regular plastic bags. And because of the

large number of recycled items destined for the recycling cart, you should find yourself needing and purchasing fewer plastic trash bags.

What the savings will be for each household, I cannot say. What is known is that the recycling fee charged by the city is \$2.50 per month. Given the current economy, it's a fairly safe bet that neither the price of plastic trash bags, nor the cost of recycling, will be coming down in the months ahead.

Canadian Wildfires Make For An Interesting Summer

A VIEW FROM **OUR SIDE**

Most of my immediate family are from Canada, more specifically Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Summertime usually meant packing up the family car and heading north for a week-long vacation visiting our Canadian relatives. Summers were a bit cooler, and once in a great while we would run into a smokey haze created by wildfires in the Canadian north country. There isn't much of a population base in those areas. It was explained to us that these fires would either burn themselves out, or Mother Nature would provide much needed precipitation to extinguish the fires.

A quick check of the Canadian Resources maps will give you valuable information as to why this year, 2013, is perhaps different from most of the previous years. First, most of Northwestern Canada is in a severe drought. Pretty much from the western edge of Saskatchewan north and west is labeled as severe, and the future does not look extremely optimistic that much is going to change, at least not very soon. Fires that are burning are slowly being contained, but the amount of effected forest area is massive. Record breaking according to my Canadian relatives.

Those of us who have endured previous smoke filled days have seen the likes of the ash and smoke from Mount St. Helens. During that eruption the smoke and ash were so thick that the streetlights turned on when it seemed almost like dusk in the middle of the afternoon. There have been fires in Montana that spread smoke eastward, across North Dakota and Minnesota. And then of course there have been other Canadian wildfire seasons that have filled our normally blue skies with white smoke, turning the sun orange and cooling the temperatures 10-15 degrees from what was, and is, normal.

So, what's your point Mr. Wilson? All of us are struggling with the extreme air quality. Well, what I want to say, and hopefully those of you who have just arrived in Minot, or have even been here a couple of years, will buy into the statement that "It's Normally Not Like This!" Really? Yes, really. Even when Mount St Helens erupted, we had a few days of extreme air quality, smoke filled skies and blotted out sun. But it started to improve, and the source of the smoke and ash, Mount St. Helens, was monitored closely and we could see that there was an end in sight. After about 30 days of smoke clouds from Canada, it does not appear that there is an end in sight for the smoke that has certainly affected our summer.

So on to my second point. My main job is not convincing new arriving citizens and tourists that this (the smokey condition) is not normal. Still, I was at Visit Minot just the other day and heard a visitor ask how far south the smoke went, because they just may alter their vacation and head to Bismarck.



I was almost ready to join in the conversation and let them know that we encountered the present smokey conditions all the way to the Black Hills. But the young ladv at the desk, who obviously had fielded many questions about the current situation, did a great job explaining that atmospheric conditions like wind, humidity and temperature greatly affected the amount of smoke, and the area that the smoke would affect. And then she said "you know, it's normally not like this. North Dakota has the most beautiful blue skies with

beautiful sunsets."

Let's hope and pray that conditions change in Canada, and the wildfires are soon contained. You can imagine what it is like living much closer to these fires. And when asked, remember, "It's normally not this bad." Say it with conviction folks, because it certainly is the truth.



Aerial Mosquito Spraying to take place on Minot AFB and surrounding areas

5TH BOMB WING PUBLIC AFFAIRS

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D.-Minot Air Force Base has requested assistance from the Youngstown Air Reserve Station 910th Airlift Wing to conduct aerial spraying for mosquito control between July 18-20, 2023, for Minot Air Force Base, and the cities of Minot, Williston and Burlington. Due to uncertain weather conditions the exact time and area to be treated cannot be determined in advance.

The 910th Airlift Wing will be applying U.S. Environmental Protection Agency registered pesticides. Adult mosquito control will occur between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 2:00 a.m. The applications will be made using a modified C-130 Hercules cargo aircraft flying 150 feet above ground level.

The purpose of the aerial spraying for mosquitoes is to protect public health, ease working conditions, and improve the quality of life for members working at Minot AFB and living insurrounding areas. Again, due to uncertain weather conditions the exact time and area to be treated cannot be determined in advance.

Minot AFB Public Health recommends humans and domestic animals remain indoors while the aerial spraying is occurring immediately overhead or upwind from your location and until the mist settles to the ground. These pesticides were selected because they pose minimal health hazards to humans and domestic animals with aerial application.

Minot combat crew comm team maintains security during Indo-Pacific deployment

ANDERSEN AIR FORCE BASE, Guam --

Whether training at home or supporting Bomber Task Force Airmen operations abroad, aboard 5th Bomb Wing B-52H Stratofortresses carry sensitive communication codes that are vital to mission accomplishment.

This critical communications security, or COMSEC, information is generated, packaged and delivered to aircrews before each flight by the 5th Operations Support Squadron's combat crew communications team.

The COMSEC package, or "crew comm kit," consists of electronic and physical cryptographic material that aircrews use to communicate securely during flight.

"Without the crew comm kit, aircrews wouldn't be able to properly identify themselves or communicate securely with friendly forces in the area," explained Airman 1st Class Zachary Thompson, 5th OSS combat crew comm technician. "The kits enable secure and open communication between allies and partners in the air and on the

ground without having to worry about adversaries listening in."

Each kit includes a simple key loader, which is an advanced secure cryptographic device enabling safe distribution and storage of COMSEC keys, electronic protection data and signal operating instructions through the use of encrypted codes. The kit also contains COMSEC operations guides, code books, and other documents necessary for secure communication with other aircraft and ground defense

Without these kits and the Airmen who compile them, aircrews would not have secure communication with friendly jets or air traffic control towers, which could lead to misidentification. Thompson said the lack of proper identification could lead to issues with training and possible fratricide.

"We couldn't do what we came here to do without the ceaseless efforts of our combat crew comm team," said Lt. Col. Ryan Loucks, Expeditionary Bomb Squadron BTF commander. "They

keep us in the fight by keeping us connected to the force and ensure our aircrews' communications remain secure and our mission remains uncompromised.'

U.S. Strategic Command units prepare to fight every day, around the globe together with allies, partners and other agencies within the Department of Defense. BTF missions empower the combat crew

comm team to maintain a high state of readiness and proficiency, and validate USSTRATCOM's alwaysready, global strike capability.

"Each BTF deployment is different and there's always something new to learn," said Thompson. "It's been a great opportunity to gain some real-world experience that I can take back to Minot to enhance our day-to-day operations there.'

Car care checklist for summer road trips · Part 2

It's time for a drive vacation. You mapped a route, booked hotels, and made a checklist of things to do before you go. AAA reminds you to also make car maintenance part of your summer road trip preparation. Use this car care checklist to ensure your vehicle is ready for summer travel.

Check belts and hoses

Reinforced rubber drive belts power the engine water pump and accessories such as the alternator and air conditioning compressor so you should inspect and replace any that are cracked, glazed or frayed. Note that modern multi-rib or drive belt materials do not show easily visible signs of wear. As a general rule, replace drive belts every 60,000 miles.

Inspect and replace worn, brittle, bulging or excessively soft radiator hoses. Check for leaks around hose clamps and at the radiator and

Keep the AC running cool

Take a test drive with the air conditioner running. If you notice a decrease in cooling capacity, take the car to an auto repair shop for diagnosis. Also have the cabin filter inspected and replaced as

On July 10, 2023, the 91st Missile Wing kicked off Operation Bully Stick, which generated the largest missile movement in 10 years.

Operation Bully Stick is an operation in which the 91st MW aims to load an intercontinental ballistic missile into a launch facility as safely, efficiently, and quickly as possible.

For Operation Bully Stick, Team Minot set out to demonstrate ICBM agile combat employment with rapid nuclear generation capability in support of United States Strategic Command while integrating total force support.

Agile combat employment is usually a term that is paired with deployments of aircraft across multiple theaters. Major Zachary Jones, director of the Wing Operations Center at the 91st MW, sets out to prove that his Airmen are ACE capable, and ready to face any challenges that oppose them.

"If our command shows our ICBMs can be agile, it affects our adversaries in some way," said Jones. "What we are proving with this operation is while the weapon system is not intrinsically agile, it's capabilities can be. If our near peer

adversaries have plans that are to respond to our current capabilities of the ICBM, we are hopefully changing their calculus."

Jones says he sees ACE as a proactive and reactive maneuver. He says he aims to have his Airmen execute mission goals within strict timelines in order to deter our adversaries.

Operation Bully Stick is typically completed over a three-day period, often over the course of several weeks. This time however, Jones says his team aimed to complete a full silo load in a 24-hour period.

Operation Bully Stick was completed within the timeline with time to spare, but only with the full support of the wing and other outside entities. The 219th Security Forces Squadron provided assistance and manpower in order to complete the goals for the exercise. Their assistance is providing the 91st Security Forces Group the ability to fully embed their defenders into the exercise.

Senior Airman Samantha Hughes, missile security operator for the 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron, says it was a great opportunity to see maintenance and defenders work together to get the mission done in a timely manner

"It was really unique to see all this unfold so quickly," said Hughes. "My part of the mission was to provide defense and overwatch for the maintenance crews. It went smoothly, and I'm very proud of my teammates and I."

Jones says Operation Bully Stick is unlike other exercises since this operation showcased Team Minot's ability to generate to alert status as if in a wartime environment.

"A typical job of this nature may take anywhere from three days to 2 weeks, we completed the task in 18 hours," said Jones. "Additionally, we were enabled in our efforts from the 219 SFS, a North Dakota National Guard Unit certified to defend our nation's nuclear assets."

Jones says this is a special case of showcasing an ICBM unit's capability to generate full nuclear power without losing capability in other capacities, making it a true total force integration operation.

"The Airmen were able to complete the mission," said Jones. "It highlighted the tenacity, focus and resolve our young maintainers, defenders, operators as well as supporting agencies across all of Team Minot."



Minot Airmen maintain aircraft, ensure readiness during Bomber Task Force deployment

To those outside the flightline observing Bomber Task Force missions from the ground, the procedures appear simple. The aircraft take off, the aircraft return for landing a few hours later, and then they do it again.

What happens on the flightline between landings and take offs, however, is anything but simple. Teams of highly-skilled aircraft maintainers work tirelessly around the clock to ensure the 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron's B-52H Stratofortresses can safely and reliably meet mission requirements.

"We're responsible for ensuring the aircraft are primed for their taskings," explained Master Sgt. Luke Gilmore, 23rd Expeditionary Aircraft Maintenance Unit production superintendent. "While on deployment, it is challenging to know what comes next at times, therefore flexibility is the key to our success."

Approximately 150 Airmen assigned to the 5th Maintenance Group at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, including avionics specialists, crew chiefs, and aerospace ground equipment specialists, accompanied the 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron on their most recent Bomber Task Force deployment to Andersen Air Force Base, Guam. The maintenance team is responsible for nose to tail care of four B-52Hs for the duration of the BTF deployment, performing extremely technical, high-stakes tasks every day and every night.


"We brought about 98 tons of aerospace ground equipment and supply parts with us on this deployment," said Capt. Dylon Schwahn, 23rd EAMU officer in charge. "We have all the Airmen and equipment we need to keep the jets flying. When packing, we built in a few extra pieces of AGE and some flyaway parts kits to ensure we are able to forward deploy if necessary and continue to get the job done wherever we're needed."

U.S. Strategic Command's BTF operations ensure the command can provide decisive response against any threat when called upon by national leadership. The practical experience gained during BTF deployments enhances the combat-ready 5th MXG, ensuring its Airmen are ready to support a response to any potential crisis or

challenge across the globe.


"BTF missions like this enhance our teamwork, give us a better understanding of our true mission, and validate that we can perform our jobs anywhere," said Gilmore. "Anywhere the Air Force needs the jets to go, we can go too."

What happens on the flight line between landings and take offs is anything but simple, the aircraft maintenance Airmen supporting the BTF just make it look that way.





THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

5TH BOMB WING ACTIVATED AT MINOT AFB



5th BW Emblem Meaning Green & black: the colors of the Air Service at the time the wing was activated. Vertical line: symbolic of the clouds in the sky. Winged death's head: represents function of aerial bombardment. 'Kiai O Ka Lewa' means 'Guardians of the Upper Realm' (a Hawaiian saying

often used as a war cry).

JULY 25, 1968 On July 25, 1968, the 5th Bomb Wing was activated at Minot Air Force Base, N.D. The wing dates back to the 2d Group which was activated in 1919 at Luke Field in the Territory of Hawaii. It was later renamed as the 5th Group (Observation) and soon became the 5th Group (Pursuit and Bombardment). The group had major involvement in saving the city of Hilo during the eruption of the Mauna Loa volcano and became the first U.S. military force to take flight after the attack on Pearl Harbor, during which many of their planes and personnel were lost. The 5th BG changed name and assignment several times in between 1947 and 1959. In 1959, the 5th Bombardment Wing (Heavy) was assigned its first jet planes while stationed at Travis AFB, Calif. In 1968, the wing assumed command of Minot AFB and flew missions

during the Vietnam and Cold Wars. The 5th BW continues as host wing of the base to this day and provides strategic deterence. Information courtesy of: minot.af.mil








Emergency Blood Shortage: Vitalant Issues Call for Donors

Blood supply down more than 25% since May

Blood donors needed after deadly shooting in Fargo, blood donors saves live

FARGO, ND — Nonprofit blood services provider Vitalant has an emergency blood shortage and urges all eligible donors to schedule a blood donation this month to prevent treatment delays for patients who need lifesaving transfusions.

Exacerbated by the Fourth of July holiday week, the ongoing seasonal drop in blood donations since May has sharply reduced the available blood supply for patients by more than 25%, resulting in a less than three-day supply of most blood types. Maintaining an adequate blood supply is critical to helping patients after accidents and other emergencies and to treat cancer and other chronic diseases.

"If not enough blood is available at any given moment, delays in patient care can have lifethreatening consequences," Vitalant Chief Medical and Scientific Officer Dr. Ralph Vassallo said. "By making an appointment today and donating tomorrow, next week, even a couple weeks from now, you become a lifeline for patients."


Fewer donors are available due to summer vacations - and fewer organizations host blood drives - yet the need for blood can also go up during what many hospitals refer to as "trauma season," when outdoor activities tend to rise along with accidents and injuries.


"Immediately following Fridays deadly shooting, blood was ordered stat to ensure the victims had the lifesaving blood products they needed," explains Jennifer Bredahl, Regional Director of Vitalant Blood Donation Center. "We are grateful that we had the blood that was needed in this tragic situation, but we need to make sure we replenish that supply here locally as soon as possible. It's powerful to think that if you have donated blood, your blood may have been what saved those that survived. We all have the ability to save lives by donating blood and it's just so simple to do. Donating on a regular basis, and not only during tragedies is what is important." If you cannot donate blood consider hosting a blood drive with a group of people.

"This community stands strong and will pull through together. We owe it to each other and rely on each other to do our part, this is one thing you can do to make a difference" Bredahl said. "Thank you to the good Samaritans that donate blood.

All blood types are needed, but especially type O, the most transfused blood type. O-negative can be used to help any patient in an emergency and O-positive can support anyone with a positive blood type. Platelet donations play a vital role for cancer patients and those undergoing open-heart surgeries and transplants. Platelets are constantly needed and must be used within a week of donation to ensure the best possible patient outcomes.

A HALL FOR THE LOVE OF FISHING

It all began in a log cabin on the prairie...

Well, OK, maybe that's not quite the way the story goes but it's still an interesting journey.

And, no, this isn't a story about Pres. Abraham Lincoln growing up in an Illinois log cabin.

Instead, it's a look at the North Dakota Fishing Hall of Fame. The fact that land-locked North Dakota has a Fishing Hall of Fame might be an indication of how fishing-obsessed its residents are.

It's also a tribute to how far the state of its fisheries has progressed over the years, providing renowned opportunities for not just residents but anglers across the United States.

Admittedly the North Dakota Fishing Hall of Fame didn't originate in a log cabin. Instead for years photos of Hall of Fame inductees lined walls in a log building in Garrison's Main Street City Park. Glasstopped display cases featured fishing memorabilia from decades past.

The brainchild of several Garrison residents, the Fishing Hall of Fame inducted its first honorees in

After years of residing in its City Park log building, the Fishing Hall of Fame now calls North Country Marine and Motorsports home, located in Garrison amidst shiny boats, high tech fishing equipment, and a litany of parts to keep those boats on the move.

The Hall of Fame is really about people and their passion for the outdoors, fishing, and doing what it takes to ensure resources have a future in the state.

It's about difference makers ranging from dedicated biologists, resource advocates, and anglers who simply loved to share their passion. Hall of Fame inductees come from all walks of life – fisheries biologists with master and doctorate degrees putting their training and education to work.

Business professionals and average citizens dedicated to a resource and doing something to protect, enhance, and continue opportunities for others.

Former N.D. Game and Fish Department directors are honored, including Dale Heneger (1981), Russell Stuart (1983), and Dean Hildebrand (2014).

Former U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery manager Tom Pruitt is in the

Hall. His successor, Rob Holm, joined in the same honor in 2021.

Heck, even an entire organization - the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress was honored the same year as

The Sportfishing Congress wasn't the first organization inducted, however. Instead it was the Fargo-based FM Walleyes Unlimited, Inc. inducted in 2015. Founded in 1977, the organization's mission is to promote conservation, sportsmanship, and education of walleye fishing in Fargo-Moorhead.

One of the 2015 inductees, Tolly Holtan, elevated Lake Sakakawea and McLean County's role as a tourist destination when she her husband, Byron, developed Indian Hills Resort. Her dedication to fishing and Lake Sakakawea helped put the Big Lake on the map for anglers throughout the multi-state region.

Fishing Hall of Fame inductions are held in conjunction with the North Dakota Governor's Cup Walleye Derby rules meeting, which kicks off the state's oldest fishing tournament.

The Governor's Cup grew out of a 1976 Garrison community event celebrating the nation's Bicentennial. Nowadays the tournament fields 261 teams, North Dakota's biggest fishing tournament.

The original 11-member Fishing Hall of Fame board of directors was comprised entirely of Garrison area folks. In 2012 the board of directors expanded to include a mix of local residents and people throughout

Fishing Hall of Fame inductions were held in 1981, 1983, and from 1988 through 1992. The board then took a hiatus from nominations until 2003, inducting five people between 2003 and 2005. The restructured board has inducted new Hall of Fame Members annually since 2013.

While the North Dakota Fishing Hall of Fame has evolved over the years and the log building houses another organization in Garrison City Park — American Legion Post 49 – inductee biographies and fishing memorabilia are on display at North Country Marine on N.D. Highway 37 on the east side of Garrison.

A visit provides fishing insight and its importance to those in North Dakota outdoors.



1/2 CAN (14.5 OZ) DICED TOMATOES

1 CUP LOW SODIUM BEEF BROTH

CHOPPED PARSLEY, FOR GARNISH

1 LARGE YELLOW ONION, SLICED

When ready to cook, set the Traeger temperature to 350°F and preheat with the lid closed for 15 minutes. Trim the fat cap on the brisket to 1/4-inch. Season all sides generously with Traeger Prime Rib Rub. In the bottom of a large roasting pan, add the onions, garlic, carrot, and celery.

In a small bowl, add the wine and whisk in the tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce, and thyme. Pour the wine mixture over the vegetables. Add the tomatoes and beef broth, and bury the bay leaves in the vegetables.

Lay the brisket fat-side up on top of the vegetables. Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Place the roasting pan directly on the grill grates. Close the lid and cook for 3 1/2-4 hours, or until the meat is fork-tender. Halfway through the cooking time, carefully lift the foil and turn the meat over. Replace the foil.

Remove the brisket from the grill, and let the brisket rest for 30 minutes. Remove and discard the bay leaves from the vegetables and skim any visible fat from the liquids. Transfer the brisket to a cutting board and slice into 1/4-inch-thick slices. Garnish with parsley, as desired. Enjoy!







Justice Department reinforces federal protections for servicemembers and their spouses in letter to state officials

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE OFFICE OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON (AFNS) --

Justice Department announced July 14 that it has issued a letter to all state licensing authorities about new employment-related federal protections for military families. The letter informs state licensing authorities about Congress's recent amendment to the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act that allows servicemembers and their spouses to use their professional licenses or certificates in new jurisdictions if they are relocating because of military orders and meet certain other requirements.

"Servicemembers and their families should not face unnecessary barriers to employment because of the sacrifices they make in service to our country," said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. "The guidance we are issuing today reflects the Justice Department's commitment to honoring our nation's servicemembers and their families not just with words, but also with action."

"Servicemembers bear great burdens to protect and advance our democracy and families of these dedicated military professionals often make sacrifices on our behalf, including frequent moves, childcare challenges and interruptions or barriers to employment," said Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke of the Justice Department's Rights Division.

resources that we are making available should empower many servicemembers and military spouses with professional licenses to better navigate the burdens that can result from frequently moving around the country.

In January 2023, Congress added a new provision to the SCRA — a law that provides servicemembers and their families with a wide variety of financial and housing protections — to make it easier for servicemembers and military spouses to have their professional licenses recognized when they relocate to another state due to military orders. The new SCRA license portability provision provides that servicemembers and military spouses can have their out-of-state licenses recognized as valid in the new state while they are stationed there so long as they meet certain requirements.

The letter to state licensing authorities explains how the SCRA's license portability provision reduces the administrative hurdles that servicemembers and their spouses face when they move across state lines. The documents explain the requirements servicemembers or their spouses must meet to have their license or certificate recognized as valid under this new law. The department is also releasing a fact sheet about the SCRA's license portability provision.



What is Lockout/ **Tagout?**



This common practice is known throughout the industrial and non-industrial world as Lockout/ Tagout, better known as LOTO. So what is LOTO?

work on it!"

Lockout-Tagout is a safety procedure which is used in industry and research settings to ensure that dangerous machines are properly shut off and not started up again prior to the completion of maintenance or servicing work. It requires that hazardous power sources be "isolated and rendered inoperative" before any repair procedure is started. "Lock and tag" works in conjunction with a lock usually locking the device or the power source with the hasp, and placing it in such a position that no hazardous power sources can be turned on. The procedure requires that a tag be affixed to the locked device indicating that it should not be turned on.

Modern machinery can contain many hazards to workers, from things like electrical, mechanical, pneumatic or hydraulic sources. For example a typical industrial machine may contain things like hot fluids, moving presses, blades, propellers, electrical heaters, conveyor belts with pinch points, moving chains, ultraviolet light. Disconnecting or making safe the equipment involves the removal of all energy sources and is known as isolation. The steps necessary to isolate equipment are often documented in an Isolation Procedure or a Lockout Tagout Procedure. The isolation procedure generally includes the following tasks:

- 1. Identify the energy source(s)
- 2. Isolate the energy source(s) 3. Lock and/or Tag the energy source(s)
- 4. Prove that the equipment isolation is effective


Modern safety manufacturers provide a range of isolation devices specifically designed to fit various switches, valves and effectors. For example most modern circuitbreakers have a provision to have a small padlock attached to prevent their activation. For other devices such as ball or gate valves, plastic pieces which either fit against the pipe and prevent movement, or clam-shell style objects, which

completely surround the valve and prevent its manipulation are used. A common feature of these devices is their bright color, usually red to increase visibility and allow workers to readily see if a device is isolated. Also, the devices are usually of such a design and construction to prevent it being removed with any moderate force. That is to say that an isolation device does not have to stand up to a chainsaw, but if an operator forcibly removes it, it will be immediately visible that it has been tampered with.

With all this information, you are probably asking yourself " How does this program apply to me?" Employees can be seriously or fatally injured if machinery they service or maintain unexpectedly energizes, starts up, or releases stored energy. OSHA's standard on the Control of Hazardous Energy (LOTO), can be located in Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 1910.147. This regulation spells out the steps all employers must take to prevent accidents associated with hazardous energy.

standard addresses practices and procedures necessary to disable machinery and prevent the release of potentially hazardous energy while maintenance or servicing activities are performed. With this being said you may ask yourself "if I unplug a radio or microwave oven after use, do I need LOTO?' No you do not. Exposure to hazardous energy is controlled completely by unplugging the equipment from an electric outlet and where the employee doing the service or maintenance has exclusive control of the plug. This applies only if electricity is the only form of hazardous energy to which employees may be exposed. This exception encompasses many portable hand tools and some cord and plug connected machinery and equipment.

In closing, when dealing with LOTO and you are not sure, do not hesitate to ask for assistance. The shop supervisor, the person doing the actual work, or the Wing Safety office can provide more extensive detail concerning LOTO in your work center.




