91st MW Roughriders celebrate Black History Month

A Missile Alert Facility fifty miles from Minot Air Force Base celebrated Black History Month with an all-black missileer crew. The crew tripped out for a week where they performed a crucial role in the 91st Missile Wings' nuclear deterrence mission, while also honoring the history and culture of black Americans.

"I celebrate Black History Month by first being proud of who I am," said 1st Lt. Bryana Terell, 742nd Missile Squadron missileer. "I love spreading the knowledge of my history and how people can consistently educate themselves. An all-Black alert is important to me because it is very rare to see an all-Black crew. Being able to be a part of something so unique, while highlighting our culture in the workplace, continues to illuminate how far we have come."

The crew of this alert hoped that their efforts would help educate and honor the history of black service members who served in the same capacity they do now.

"As an African American, Dr. Martin Luther King's vision for racial equality and justice has been a guiding force in my efforts to confront systemic issues," said Capt. Joshua Watson, 91st Operational Squadron "His dedication to breaking down racial barriers and promoting unity has inspired me to engage in conversations about race, challenge stereotypes, and work towards a more inclusive society. An all-black alert symbolizes that while we honor our heritage as African Americans, we also stand guard of our nation's 24/7/365 deterrence mission. It's our responsibility, and honor, to protect and defend the nation our ancestors worked to build and to support future generations to come."

Each member says they did this alert for a different reason. Their reason may come from a place of honoring a past relative who served or a proud history of a culture they want to bring more awareness to.

"My father, Retired USAF Master Sgt. Ronnie McCoy, has always been an important role model in my life," said 2nd Lt Evelyn McCoy, 742nd Missile Squadron Missileer. "Growing up, he showed me what it means to overcome adversity with poise and determination. As a black man from Phenix City, AL in the early 60s, he experienced blatant racism and discrimination during the period of desegregation that began in 1963. My father can still recount what it was like having to use "black only" amenities in public spaces."

McCoy said it's her father, who didn't allow adversity to stop him from serving his country for 20 years, that inspired her to be the officer she is today. McCoy says her dad will always serve as an inspiration for her.

While their reason for serving might differ, everyone on the team has a unique perspective that they bring.

"The emphasis on achievement is awesome because it indicates tangible progress," said Capt Andrew Gould, 742nd Missile Squadron flight commander. "Having the opportunity to serve under an all-black wing command team, meeting black General Officers, and seeing Gen. Charles Q. Brown lead as the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff have been markers of the increasing acknowledgment and normalcy with which we are being valued in the military. Understanding our past is necessary and showing up in the present is imperative."

Units encompassing the entire aviation resource management career field (1 Charlie/1C) across Minot Air Force Base secured the Sergeant Dee Campbell Outstanding Large Unit of the Year award. The award is granted based on contributions to unit initiatives, direct operational support and effective management of unit resources.

"As a team, we really strove to tackle the mission from the shadows. We, as 1C's, strive every day to check currencies and keep the skies safe while being on the sidelines. I can't find words to explain how hard every Squadron Aviation Resource Managers (SARM) and Host Aviation Resource Managers (HARM) work on the fine details and focus on the mission," said Airman 1st Class Brandon Carpenter, 54th Helicopter Squadron SARM office. Two years ago, I went to Missouri to visit my brother and instead of getting on I-29, I took the backroads through the states of South Dakota, Kansas and Nebraska. It took longer to get there, but was completely

Years ago I lived in Edgeley, but had forgotten most of what is east of there and it had been 40 years since I was in Wahpeton.

When you take trips like this, you get to see a lot of things and meet a lot of people you wouldn't otherwise meet on an interstate or major freeway. My schedule was such that I had plenty of time to get to Wahpeton for my meeting so I took full advantage of it.

Living northwest of Minot, I took Highway 83 to Bismarck, then took N.D. Highway 1804 from Bismarck south, connecting to an Emmons County road west of Hazelton. From there, it was back to U.S. 83 to Linton and N.D. Highway 13 which would take me all the way across the state to Wahpeton.

Growing up in Hazelton, seeing my hometown and Linton wasn't anything new because I'm so familiar with both communities. But from there, it seemed like quite an

My first stop was Stan's Super Valu in Wishek which has the best sausage in the world. Step into that store and you immediately smell the wood chips smoking the sausages. Wishek is also home to Barney the Badger, a statue representing the high school mascot.

From there it was onto Lehr, a unique little community that sits in two counties; Logan and McIntosh. Between Kulm and Edgeley there's a massive wind farm that certainly wasn't there when I lived in Edgeley.

Twenty miles east of Edgeley is LaMoure which boasts the Omega Tower, a Navy communications tower that is capable of the relay of radio signals from one ocean to the other. It's an amazing site just west of town.

From there you wind up in Verona and either have to go north to Lisbon or south to Oakes. And because N.D. 13 took me south, that's where I went, almost all the way to Oakes before turning east. That's also where I met N.D. Highway 1, which

"I think it'll be best if I go for a quick walk," I said in my calmest, creamiest voice. Years ago, I read a magazine article about hiker safety. When it came to animals, there was one overarching tip. If you couldn't remember what to do, speak in a calm, soothing voice. An angry animal will mimic your response: you scream and shout, they become more agitated; you calmly leave, they calmly leave. And, never turn your back on an angry animal.

I'd never heard him speak of a farm before. I'd been friends with his daughter for nearly five years and never heard her mention it either. "Classic North Dakotan," I thought. With wet pavement and ice crunching underfoot, my mind generated a montage of other Hotdishers talking about "the farm."

"I can't come, I've got to go out to the farm that weekend."

"He's not coming because he has to be at the farm."

"We'll do our family photos out at the farm."

"We're leasing part of the farm."
"Oh, sure—it's over at my grandparents' farm."

"We're branding at the farm that day."

"I always wanted my wedding held at the farm."

Suddenly, it occurred to me: The Farm, is just a less wet version of The Lake. Everyone knows where The Farm is—unless you're not from around here. Everyone seems to have a Farm to go to through the year, just as everyone seems to have a Lake to go to in the summer. People you've known for years may casually drop The Farm into conversation one day—causing you to rethink everything you knew about them.

Your friend the mortgage broker? Your coworker with perfect nails? That guy you met that one time at that thing? If they are from around here, they've all got one thing in common: The Farm. Eight out of ten Hotdishers have a family farm or are closely tied to someone who does. (Okay, I just made up that stat.)

Where is it? If you're not from around here, it might be best not to ask. As with directions to The Lake, directions to The Farm always involve mentioning several landmarks ("...the old KOA, I'm not sure what it is now...") and at least one town you've never heard of. Trying to actually understand where these places are is typically a fool's errand. Chances are you'll never need to drive to The Farm, so don't strain yourself trying to understand its exact location.

Sometimes I wonder what happens at The Farm. I mean, most of the people who talk to me about The Farm are not, in fact, farmers. For all I know, The Farm is hypothetical place locals claim to be going when they want to politely get away from nosy transplants, like me. "Sorry, Amy—I can't answer all your questions about lefse...I'm going...to The Farm. Yes, I'll be at The Farm. Definitely, that's where I'll be." The Farm may be even more mysterious than The Lake.

So what's the takeaway? There are two. First, if you want to fit in in Hotdish Land, you'll need to add talking about The Farm to your list of NoDak lexicon. Second, just when I thought I couldn't love this place more something like this occurs to me and a swoon all over again.

About five or six years ago I began counting each cast I made with a fishing rod. Not every day on the water, but many of them. This I did without the knowledge of my fishing companions, except mumbling occasionally numbers aloud that made no sense to my fellow fishermen who understandably surmised they should choose their fishing partners more carefully.

Clever or Quirky, Wise or Weird...Hmmm

It was just over four years ago, and several fishing companions later, that I came clean. I purchased a counter and wore it in such a fashion that it soon became part of my casting regimen. Every time I made a cast I pushed the button on the counter. At the end of each fishing day, I simply read the number off the counter and entered it into a journal.

Weird behavior, I know, especially since I had no idea what I was going to do with the information. As I soon discovered however, fishermen being as they are, that is, always trying to outwit and outsmart their fishing companions with some new lure or technique, became intimidated by what they perceived as a completely surprising and innovative tactic.

Of course, they could only speculate in their clouded minds how I must be utilizing the information to further my fishing success. I could see their nervousness grow with each click of the counter. So certain were they of their fishing prowess, they dared not inquire, an act that might reveal their true wisdom as fishermen.

Ahh, the joy that was mine as

they struggled to decipher this mystery method that I alone understood, which I did not. No matter. At last, I had realized a use for the goofy habit of counting casts! The silly practice elevated me considerably in the eyes of fellow fishermen and confidence is the name of the game on the water.

Really though, intermittently studying data accumulated from 45,627 casts from January 1, 2020, to December 31, 2023, several patterns emerged that I have used to my advantage. Things like making too many casts with a lure that is not producing results. With few exceptions, 25 casts per lure without catching a fish is my limit

Muskie fishing statistics are particularly telling. Several times I've caught two or three muskies in 15-20 casts, then none for several hundred more. An example - one time I caught muskies on cast 8 and 14, then went zero for 356. There it was on paper, proof that stubbornness doesn't always work when fishing.

My advice to anglers is to buy a simple counter, use it and say nothing. Your fishing partners will believe you have an advantage over them and will lose focus trying to

figure out exactly what it is. The hook is set. Priceless.

FIRST BLACK AVIATORS GRADUATE FROM ARMY

AIR SCHOOL AT TUSKEGEE, ALABAMA MARCH 6, 1942



In the early 1940s, the United States War Department began training black pilots at Tuskegee Army Airfield in Tuskegee, Alabama. While the center was treated with hostility from many people at the time, it marked an important milestone for African Americans in the military. The

First 5 African American pilots (USAF Photo) first class at the school included 13 cadets of various experience. In the end, only five of those cadets would go on to graduate on March 6, 1942, making history as the first black Army Air Corps pilots. Those five pilots were:

- Capt. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., who would go on to become the Air Force's first black general and played a key role in the desegregation of
- 2nd Lt. Lemuel R. Custis, who became Hartford, Connecticut's first African American police officer in 1939
- 2nd Lt. Charles H. DeBow Ir., who commanded the 301st Fighter Squadron in Italy and flew 52 combat missions in the European Theater
- 2nd Lt. George S. Roberts, who became the first black officer to command a racially mixed unit at Langley AFB, VA

•2nd Lt. Mac Ross, who became Group Operations Officer for the 100th Squadron The desegregation of the Air Force didn't come about until 1949, but

B-52 Makes Emergency Landing After Engine Fire, No Crew Injured

A B-52H bomber at Minot Air Force Base, N.D. executed an emergency landing due to an engine fire early Feb. 23.

All crew members are unharmed, a base spokesperson told Air & Space Forces Magazine. Asked if the base's runway remains open, the spokesperson declined comment but said bomber operations at the base are continuing as usual as of Feb.

A single engine fire lead the pilot to land the bomber at approximately 12:52 a.m, and the base fire department arrived on the scene and extinguished the aircraft fire, according to the base's host unit, the 5th Bomb Wing. The bomber is powered by eight engines and is designed to fly and land safely in the event of up to two engine failures.

'First and foremost, the 5th Bomb Wing is incredibly thankful to all our Airmen who made it home safely," 5th Bomb Wing Commander Col. Daniel Hoadley said in the statement. "I would like to recognize our outstanding base fire fighters for their expeditious response."

popular unofficial Facebook page "amn/nco/ first reported incident, with an anonymous, unconfirmed post that "a CSD (Constant speed drive that runs the generator) caught fire on landing and burned through that engine and part of the wing." The page later posted a purported image of the engine, showing extensive damage.

It is currently unknown what caused the fire, and the incident is under investigation, following standard protocol for accidents involving military operations.

The last major public B-52 mishap was in 2017, when an engine fell off the aircraft during a training flight at Minot. The pilot successfully landed the bomber without incident and all Airmen on board were unharmed, but one of its Pratt & Whitney TF33-P-3/103 turbofan engines crashed in an unpopulated area.

In May 2016, during a routine training mission at Andersen Air Force Base in Guam, a mishap destroyed a B-52 bomber. The pilot, from the 69th Expeditionary Bomb Squadron sensed issues during takeoff and initiated abort procedures. However, the drag chute failed, causing the aircraft to exceed brake energy limits, overshoot the runway, and catch fire. All seven aircrew members escaped, with one

receiving treatment for minor injuries. The total loss of the aircraft was valued at \$112 million.

The Air Force anticipates upgrading B-52 engines in the late 2020s or early 2030s with Rolls Royce's F130 engine intended to be a oneto-one replacement of its current TF33 engines. The F130 is a militarized version of the company's commercial BR725, which the Air Force already operates on its C-37 VIP transport and E-11 BACN (Battlefield Airborne Communications Node). Rolls Royce will supply the engines, while Boeing, the original manufacturer of the Stratofortress, will integrate them onto the aircraft.

Four B-52s from Minot Air Force Base were deployed to Guam in late January to support Pacific Air Force's mission. The bombers have recently participated in several public missions, including the three-week multilateral Cope North exercise and a oneday exercise with Philippine fighters over South China Sea this month. Additionally, two of the bombers conducted flyovers at the Singapore Airshow last week.

B-52 Flies with Philippine Fighters over the South China Sea

A U.S. Air Force B-52 bomber flew alongside three Philippine FA-50 fighters during a patrol over the South China Sea in the Philippines' Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) on Feb. 19.

The Philippine Air Force announced the patrol as part of an ongoing Maritime Cooperative Activity between the Philippines and the U.S. The U.S. Navy previously announced its participation in the activity, but the Air Force has not publicly noted the B-52's involvement.

The South China Sea is a heavily-trafficked, heavily-contested area. International law states that the EEZ grants the Philippines exclusive rights to exploit natural resources within the 200-nautical-mile zone. China, however, claims sovereignty over much of the waters, including areas claimed by Vietnam, the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Indonesia.

The People's Liberation Army Southern Theater Command released a statement following the bomber patrol, accusing the Philippines of collaborating with outside countries "to stir up trouble in the South China Sea."

The statement added that the PLA's Southern Theater Command dispatched its frontline air and naval forces to closely monitor the region, emphasizing that the troops remain on high alert.

However, PAF spokesperson Col. Ma. Consuelo Castillo said in a statement that the patrol "is in no way directed towards any country and the activity is in accordance with the international rulesbased order, as we were operating within our territory and within the Philippines' EEZ," according to local media reports.

Armed Force of the Philippines' spokesman Col. Xerxes Trinidad added that the aerial patrol "demonstrates the commitment of both Armed Forces to enhancing interoperability and advancing regional peace and security in the Indo-Pacific."

The B-52 that led the patrol with Philippine fighters was from the 5th Bomb Wing of Minot Air Force Base, N.D., which deployed to Anderson Air Force Base, Guam, in late January. A total of four Stratofortresses arrived in the region, in part to support Cope North 24, a multilateral air exercise involving Japan, Australia, France, South Korea, and Canada. The three-week exercise extends to the islands of Tinian and Saipan, about 120 miles north of Guam, and is set to conclude on Feb. 23.

The nuclear-capable bombers have

kept a low profile in the contested South China Sea in recent years, but back in October, U.S. Indo-Pacific Command disclosed that Chinese fighter jet closed within 10 feet of a B-52 in a nighttime intercept in the region, deeming the incident "unsafe and unprofessional."

INDOPACOM has also noted B-52 flights over the South China Sea in 2020, 2019 and 2018.

More broadly, the U.S. continues to operate in the region—earlier this month, the USS Gabrielle Giffords (LCS 10) and an MH-60S Sea Hawk from the U.S. exercised in the region with the Philippine Navy, according to INDOPACOM.

This comes even as Chinese vessels and aircraft increase their "dangerous" and "unlawful" behavior, Pentagon officials have said. U.S. President Joe Biden has stressed that Washington's defense commitment to the Philippines is "ironclad," and any attack on Filipino aircraft, vessels, or armed forces will invoke the Mutual Defense Treaty with the Philippines.

The Philippines' FA-50 fighter is an upgraded version of South Korea's supersonic T-50 trainer jet, manufactured by Korea Aerospace Industries with development support from Lockheed Martin.

B-52 Flyover Highlights US Presence at Singapore Airshow

Two B-52 Stratofortresses from the 5th Bomb Wing conducted a flyover at Changi Air Base during the Singapore Airshow late last week. The BUFFs, currently deployed to Anderson Air Force Base in Guam, flew to Singapore to be featured at the biennial event, which concluded

The air show is recognized as one of the largest defense exhibitions in the Pacific, with this year's iteration hosting over 120,000 trade and public visitors. While the bombers were the only American aircraft to conduct a flyover, other U.S. aircraft, including the F-35A, MQ-9, and P-8, were also showcased at the exhibition.

It has been a busy few weeks for the B-52s since they deployed to Guam in late January for a Bomber Task Force rotation. They took part in Cope North 24, a multilateral exercise including Japan, Australia, France, South Korea, and Canada. One of the bombers participated in a bilateral patrol drill with three Philippine FA-50 fighters over the South China Sea within the Philippines' Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ). And last week, members of the Senate Armed Services Committee staff visited Andersen to discuss B-52 operations in the Pacific with the 23rd Expeditionary

Bomb Squadron.

At the Singapore Airshow, the Stratofortresses were not the only military aircraft to conduct demonstrations. The Republic of Singapore Air Force showcased their F-15SG fighters and AH-64D Apache attack helicopters. The Republic of Korea's T-50s, a supersonic trainer jet built by Korea Aerospace Industries and Lockheed Martin, performed a team demonstration as well. And the Indian Air Force's HAL Dhruv multi-role helicopter, manufactured in India, and the Indonesian Air Force's KT-1B training aircraft, imported from South Korea, performed

synchronized air maneuvers.

The event also featured solo flyovers by commercial aircraft, marking the debut of C919 by Commercial Aircraft Corporation of China (COMAC) in front of a global audience for the first time. The German manufacturer Airbus, Boeing's main competitor in the international commercial plane market, also showcased its A350-1000 flyover.

The U.S. and Singapore routinely engage in military exercises as well, with their air forces conducting annual three-week training in November 2023. Andersen Air Force Base in Guam is currently

preparing for potential infrastructure upgrades to accommodate up to 12 Singaporean F-15SGs, with plans to expand approximately 209 acres of Guam over the next three to seven years to provide training facilities for the fighters and potentially other DAF service components or partner nations' aircraft or missions operating from the base in the future.

The USAF B-52s were featured in the last iteration of the Singapore Airshow in 2022, alongside the F-35 A and B types, the RQ-4 Global Hawk, the KC-46 Pegasus, and the P-8 Poseidon


The design of the patch centers

Added to the bottom are the call signs of both wings, the Warbirds and the Roughriders, and added are the globe and the thunderbolts of Air Force Global Strike Command, which both wings serve under. The year that the Minot Air Force Base opened, 1956, is also embroidered into the patch.

The patch was submitted for approval in January, with authorization needed by both wings.

"Now that the patch is officially authorized, it can be worn on Fridays and special events" according to Silva.

As a way of raising money for the First Sergeant's Council, the patches will be sold on base and online at reaperpatches.com. "Once you get to reaperpatches.com, type in Minot, and there are many patches that come up that are for sale" says Silva. "The money that we make from the sale of the patches will go to fund Operation Warm Heart: Airmen helping Airmen in need."





says Silva. A spin off from the original patch is a patch that will only be worn by First Sergeants. It has all of the elements of the original patch, with a diamond in the middle.

The original order of patches has been placed and "they say it will take 4-6 weeks for them to arrive" and at that point the First Sergeant's Council will look for ways to market and sell the patches "whether it be at the commissary or other events on base, we want to make them available" says Silva "and the goal is to show unity".

The cost of the new patches online is \$6.99, but they will be sold on base for \$5.00 "and the purchaser can save the cost of shipping.






Winter Driving Tips

BEFORE YOU GO

GET YOUR CAR SERVICED

Visit your mechanic for a tune-up and ask them to check for leaks, badly worn hoses, or other needed parts, repairs, and replacements.

CHECK FOR RECALLS

NHTSA's Recalls Look-up Tool lets you enter a Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) to quickly learn if your vehicle has a critical safety issue that has not been repaired, and how to get that repair done for FREE. Check www.nhtsa. gov/recalls.

KNOW YOUR CAR

Read your vehicle's manual to familiarize vourself with the safety features on your vehicle—such as antilock brakes and electronic stability control—and how the features perform in wintry conditions. When renting a car, become familiar with the vehicle before driving it off the lot.

PLUGITIN

For electric and hybrid-electric vehicles, minimize the drain on the battery. If the vehicle has a thermal heating pack for the battery, plug your vehicle in whenever it's not in use. Start your vehicle and preheat the interior before you unplug your vehicle in the morning.

PLAN YOUR TRAVEL AND ROUTE

Before heading out, make sure to check the weather, road conditions, and traffic. Don't rush through your trip, and allow plenty of time to get to your destination safely. And always familiarize yourself with directions and maps before you go, even if you use a GPS system, and let others know your route and anticipated arrival time.

STOCK YOUR VEHICLE

Carry items in your vehicle to handle common winter driving related tasks, and supplies you might need in an emergency, including:

- Snow shovel, broom, and ice scraper;
- Abrasive material such as sand or kitty litter, in case your vehicle gets stuck in the snow;
- Jumper cables, flashlight, and warning devices such as flares and emergency markers;
- Blankets for protection from the cold; and
- A cell phone with charger, water, food, and any necessary medicine (for longer trips or when driving in lightly populated areas).



This occurs when the vehicle hits another object, but this impact alone may not be enough to cause serious harm. The second impact is the culprit behind most car injuries.

Sir Issac Newton's first law of motion comes into play here. Simply put, the law states that every object will remain in motion until acted upon by an outside force, and the results can be deadly.

The second impact occurs inside the vehicle after the force from the initial impact turns the occupants into flying projectiles, slamming them into the dashboard, windshield, or other hardened parts of the interior. Imagine this: A car traveling at 50 miles per hour (MPH) hits a stationary object and comes to a complete and sudden stop. An unbelted occupant and everything inside the car not secured will continue to travel at 50 MPH. Go a step further and compute the force with which the occupant will hit a stationary object inside the car--the vehicle's dash for instance. An occupant weighing 160 lbs traveling at a speed of 50 MPH, the force generated at the point of impact will be 8,000 pounds! Not too many bones in the body can withstand that kind of punishment; you can only imagine the damage to internal organs and soft tissue from a blow of 4 tons. Unlike a vehicle that can be repaired or replaced, the human body isn't easily repaired and is impossible to replace.

Nothing can prevent the second collision; it's a law of physics. The only thing that can be done is to reduce severity. Fortunately, there is a device inside your car that is designed for just that purpose: your seat belt.

The seatbelt wraps across the torso and waist of the driver and passenger to give the body something softer to absorb the impact. It also helps protect your body from being injured by the unyielding hard surfaces of metal and plastic on the inside of your car. Seatbelts keep you behind the wheel where you can continue to drive and possibly take further evasive action, and also prevent you from being ejected from the vehicle--one of the biggest causes of motor vehicle fatalities.


Many new cars come with airbags and this feature gives some motorists a false sense of security. Airbags are passive devices, not active systems like seatbelts that require your action to latch. Passive can be good, because it's easy, but may not necessarily be as effective. Statistically, fewer injuries and fatalities occur in crashes of vehicles equipped with airbags, (overall, airbags reduce driver deaths by 14 percent and passenger deaths by 11 percent) but the deployment of an airbag alone during a high-speed collision may not be enough to save the life of an unbelted occupant.

Although some new cars offer side airbags, many do not. Dash mounted airbags offer no protection at all from side or rear collisions, only from the front. Supplemental don't offer during roll-overs, either. Wearing a lap belt keeps you anchored to the car seat and your shoulder belt keeps your upper body

from pitching forward and hitting the airbag as it deploys. Remember, airbags are designed to compliment seatbelts, not replace them.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, seat belt usage across the United States is on the rise and recently topped 80%. Seat belt compliance rates on most bases is over 99%, but the fact that Airmen continue to lose their lives off base by failing to buckle up suggests that off-base use still has massive room! for improvement. Supervisors are often faced with a tough job changing the ingrained habit patterns of Airmen who may have spent 18 or more years of their lives not wearing seatbelts. Persistence, sincerity, example, and constant awareness are the keys to success.

What choices do we have? Without the belt, people can look forward to skull fractures, facial lacerations, broken teeth, ribs and other nasty internal injuries and in the worst case, even death. The final decision is up to you. I know the choice I'll make. Remember, if the first impact doesn't get you the second one just might.

Chop the chipotle peppers, then combine them with the remaining chipotle ketchup ingredients in a mixing bowl. Refrigerate the mixture for at least 1 hour to allow the flavors to blend (making it one day ahead of time is even better if you can swing it).

When ready to cook, set temperature to High and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes

Place the potatoes in a bowl, drizzle with melted butter and sprinkle with Beef rub, toss to coat.







Spring is still officially more than two weeks away but it's never too late to think about spending more time outside and exploring the Peace Garden State, getting to know some of the creatures that call the state home.

One way to get a head start before getting out exploring and observing some of those critters is to check out the N.D. Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov).

The Game and Fish Department has identified several wildlife species as "Species of Conservation Priority". That program identifies species in the state in need of conservation measures to benefit their population, distribution, and habitat.

North Dakota has numerous grasslands bird. It's often a "must see" destination for birders from across the country in hopes of sighting a variety of those grassland birds.

Several grassland and wetland birds, as well as amphibians, toads, fish, insects, and mammals critters like bats and the black-tailed prairie dog- are in the Level 1 category, meaning they're the highest priority. They're typically facing declining populations or their North Dakota habitat plays a critical role within their breeding range.

For example, as grassland habitat is converted to other uses many native grassland birds face declining population concerns. Some grassland sparrows found in North Dakota include Nelson's, Baird's, and grasshopper

Their nests tend to be parasitized by the overly aggressive cowbird, as well.

And, no, grassland sparrows are not the same thing as the common, non-native English house sparrow that tends to annoy homeowners and birders alike.

it is other than something little, brown, and is a bird) that flit around in native prairie areas, such as Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas.

The greater sage grouse, a treasure of "big sage" habitat, is another bird listed on the Level 1 category. North Dakota is on the edge of historic sage grouse range. They're found in areas of "big sage" – tri-lobed

Sage grouse use big sage throughout the entire year. It's vital for nesting, food for chicks and adults alike, and year-around shelter. The problem is the birds aren't historically abundant in North Dakota given their specific habitat needs and face declining, fragmented sagebrush habitat that's deteriorating in quality. .

Greater sage grouse are fascinating birds – the largest grouse in the state. Seeing one in southwestern North Dakota is a special treat.

Birds aren't the only critters identified as priority species: Monarch butterflies have probably garnered the most attention, highlighting the need for pollinating plants and habitat. In the case of monarchs, that means milkweed flowers.

Their population decline has heightened awareness of the vital role all pollinating insects play in the food chain - and that definitely includes the food humans are dependent on. Without pollinating insects, many foods humans eat would be difficult, at best, to grow. .

The Game and Fish Department website has a section devoted to wildlife species identification, including those of conservation concern, common species, huntable species, and even species that while not found in North Dakota, could wander in - like a meandering black bear venturing in from Canada or Minnesota.

Some species included in the listings, such as eastern spotted skunk or black-footed ferret, haven't been identified in the state but there is a possibility of potential habitat in some cases.

Just go to the website, (gf.nd.gov), click "Conservation" on the home page, "Species", and scroll down to "Species

Grassland sparrows are those small Little Brown Birds The website also has a bird checklist that can be BBs when all else fails and it's tough to figure out what downloaded as a PDF file in addition to links to a wide variety of additional informational websites relating to everything from birds to insects to waterfowl identification and more.

> It's a great way to explore the critters of North Dakota as folks await the official arrival of spring.
