How is this possible?...

the greenhouse so everything dries up completely. But the weeds keep growing.

Having been a gardener the past 19 years, I understand that weeds can have a deep root system, so they can draw moisture from much deeper in the soil than say an onion or a tomato plant.

But the plants themselves seem to not only grow, but thrive in some cases. Field bindweed, affectionately known as creeping jenny, is a good example.

How can it survive 165 degrees? I've stepped into the greenhouse at that temperature just to experience it and I have to tell you that it hurts just to breath. And I've never been in there longer than 20 seconds.

So you can imagine how that would drive mice out and when you look on the empty shelves, there are dead flies all over the place because they perish in the intense heat. Nor can spiders, mold or other fungus overcome that obstacle.

Twenty seconds isn't long, and it's unbearable to the human body. Those weeds are sitting there in the same position the entire day. Anything else would most likely bake before your eyes.

These weeds are super resistant to this heat and dry condition. It just baffles me that they can overcome this and I was reminded of that again last week when I cleaned all the dead weeds out of the greenhouse.

It's a good thing they can't survive the winter and finally die off. But again, in many of those cases, they will survive down to 28 and sometimes 25 degrees. It's just bizarre.

On Aug. 16, 2021, we reached 106 degrees outside and yes, it was 165 in the greenhouse. The reason I remember it so well is because I had to pick produce that day for the CSA. The most striking thing I recall about that day was watching a 280-foot row of bell peppers just wilt before my eyes. And those peppers were in the open air.

Yet, some of the weeds inside the greenhouse didn't flinch, while I could see some wilting in others, depending on the leaf structure.

Are there any plant scientists who can explain how weeds are able to flourish in an environment that is considerably harsher than Death Valley? Are there any explanations other than the deeper root system?

I'd like to know because I didn't think there were too many things that would surprise me at my age. But this one is completely baffling.

I should also point out that the entire floor in that greenhouse is black to absorb the heat from the sun in the early spring. That makes ground level just as intense.

are like that.

This past week I was cleaning the greenhouse to get it ready for the spring season and discovered some interesting finds, that quite frankly, I can't believe are possible.

To fully explain this, I have to first provide some background.

We are completely done in the greenhouse by the end of May, so it's largely left alone other than completely closing it up in July and August to essentially sterilize it and push out insects and vermin.

That's done totally by design and I often make light of the fact that on a hot, sunny day in July or August, the temperature has reached 165 degrees Fahrenheit. That's hot enough to fry a hamburger.

But weeds will survive in that environment. How is that even possible?

As I mentioned, we're done at the end of May, so from that point forward, there is no longer water in

I volunteered for the task, like it too. But it has come with some interesting moments. Perhaps some are too interesting. Maybe that's why I keep doing it.

Happy that Riley was communicating with me, progress I thought, I rose from a wonderful sleep and opened the back door for Riley. It was a teaching moment, even if it was 3:30 in the morning. A trembling Riley sat in place while

I held the door open, waiting for me to give her the okay. Outside she went. Good, I thought, though not 100%

convinced as to Riley's intentions or her further compliance with my gentle requests. So, in slippers, sleep pants, and a tee shirt I went outside to block the opening to the backyard to ensure Riley would return to the house.

It was winter. Far too cold for slippers and such but, shivering as I was, I knew this was a teaching moment that would greatly enhance Riley's training. About the same time that thought entered my mind Riley bolted past me about 100 miles per hour. I slipped on packed snow trying to grab her collar and she disappeared up the driveway and into the night.

Of course, thinking she would listen to me, shivering and shaking from the cold as I was, I went to the front of the house in time to see Riley running beneath the streetlight at the end of the block. I called to her in a voice I thought loud enough for her to hear but not wake the neighbors. Riley never broke stride. Uh-oh.

I went back inside, grabbed a coat, gloves, flashlight, dog treats, and keys to my vehicle. Off I went in pursuit of Riley. My shivering from the cold was replaced by the shaking of nervousness. You see, Riley was the prized dog of its owner and a loving favorite of three children and getting her back was imperative.

You can understand my predicament. There I was, driving slowly through the neighborhood in the dark of night, shining a flashlight in people's yards hoping to catch a reflection off Riley's eyes. A few lights came on inside homes. I suspected the arrival of a police cruiser at any moment.

I got my first glimpse of Riley

about 20 minutes into my unscheduled nighttime adventure. She was crossing a roadway about a half block in front of me. Thankful there was no traffic at that early morning hour, I stopped in the street and called Riley's name. She turned and came right to me. Perfect!

Having cleverly opened the back door to my vehicle when I stopped, Riley jumped right in. Wonderful! Not quite. She jumped out again before I could close the door. Worse, I took a very nasty fall on an icy roadway trying to stop her.

Undaunted, and ignoring my new bruises, I renewed my mission. This time however, Riley proved to be difficult to find. Minutes passed. Then an hour. This was horrible. I kept prowling the neighborhood but was fast losing any hope of finding that dog and dreading making a phone call to Riley's owner.

At about 5:15 a.m., finally, I had a Riley sighting. She was happy to see me too. I produced a dog treat and she responded to my calling her name. As she reached for the treat in my hand I reached for her collar with my other hand. Unfortunately, I fell on the ice again. This time it was difficult to get up. Fearing a fractured kneecap, I could barely drive home. I was done.

I made that early morning phone call to tell the owner that I'd lost a member of his family that was in my care. Perhaps, I said, Riley would backtrack and show up once again. It was all I had in the way of an encouraging word in an ugly situation.

"I'm not going to wake the kids," he said. "I'll tell them when they get up. They're tired from swimming in the hotel pool."

It was then that the motionactivated light at my back door came on.



operations. The aircraft were key participants in the Son Tay Raid, where joint military forces flew a covert night mission to a POW camp in Vietnam to rescue American prisoners. By 1988, the HH-53s were modified to a new special operations configuration. In 2007, 66-14428 was retired to The Bonevard in Tucson, Arizona, and all of the models were withdrawn by September of 2008.

On March 15, 1967, the "Super Jolly Green Giant," or the Sikorsky HH-53B helicopter, made its initial flight. At the time, the HH-53B was the largest, most powerful, and the fastest helicopter in the United States Air Force. The maiden flight of 66-14428 took place in Stratford, Connecticut and was piloted by James R. Wright and Patrick A. Guinn. The helicopters were then sent to the 37th Air Rescue and Recovery Squadron at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida and Vietnam to perform combat search and rescue missions, as well as special

A First Sergeant Symposium was held at Minot AFB from Feb. 21-23. The symposium served as a platform for Non-Commissioned Officers and Senior Non-Commissioned Officers to acquire essential tools and resources necessary to step into the role of a first sergeant when called upon.

U.S. Air Force Master Sgt. Sarah Bordges, 5th Security Forces Squadron first sergeant, helped coordinate the event. She highlighted the symposium's role in preparing aspiring first sergeants for the transition into leadership roles.

"It's getting tech sergeants and master sergeants prepared for if they want to put on the diamond," said Bordges. "We're changing their thinking from being a standard supervisor or section chief, to having that first sergeant mindset."

During the event, guest speakers delved into various topics crucial for effective leadership, while focusing on the importance of emotional intelligence counseling and techniques.

Bordges emphasized the symposium's practical approach, which allowed attendees to apply their newfound knowledge and tools to devise effective solutions.

"One of the things that we do in class are counseling sessions," said Bordges. "We'll have a real-world situation that we bring up on the screen. The participants have to go through everything that they've learned through the class and figure out what's the best course of action."

Through interactive panels and discussions, attendees explored a myriad of topics ranging from the intricacies of handling authorized and unauthorized absences, to open Q&A sessions with chaplains, commanders, and experienced first sergeants. This helps provide valuable insights and perspectives

"Regardless if you are a first sergeant wearing a diamond or not," said Bordges. "This is all information that every supervisor should know.

Input collected through this survey will provide the department with a barometer on how to adjust policies and programs to address the needs of military families in the U.S. and abroad, said Lee Kelley, principal director for the Department's Military Community and Family Policy Office.

Past surveys have helped create data-driven policies with immediate impact for military families, she said.

For example, in 2021, active-duty spouses reported that frequent, permanent change-of-station moves, child care and spouse employment were among the biggest challenges active-duty families face, Kelley said.

According to that survey, 21% of spouses were unemployed in 2021, a statistic mentioned in President Joe Biden's Executive Order 14100, released on June 15, 2023 (https:// www.federalregister.gov/d/2023-12974/p-5). That executive order, which was based on survey results, listed various steps the administration has taken to address military family needs, she said.

To address spouse employment concerns, the Defense-State Liaison Office worked with state legislators to remove occupational licensing barriers to help spouses maintain employability after a PCS move, Kelley said.

In January 2023, the department introduced the Military Spouse Career Accelerator Pilot, a 12-week, competitive, paid fellowship with industry. Several new programs address PCS and child care challenges, including a tax-saving, dependent-care flexible spending program, enacted in November, to ease the cost of child care for activeduty families, she said.

In an earlier survey, a junior enlisted spouse shared that "...the amount that the lower ranks are getting paid isn't enough to support a family of three. With the amount he's getting paid, we can barely pay bills and have some money to buy groceries for a week and then struggle for another week until he gets paid again."

The DOD implemented a 4.6% basic pay increase in 2023 for all service members; and proposed pay raise of 5.2% for 2024, which

if enacted, will translate into more than a 10% basic pay raise over two years. The Department also increased the non-taxable basic allowance for housing an average of 12.1%, addressing significant increases in rental housing costs across the country. In addition, the DOD increased the non-taxable basic allowance for subsistence by 11.2%. These increases have resulted in an average overall increase in cash compensation of 7.1% for service members in 2023.

The 2024 survey, which should take less than 15 minutes to complete, can be accessed by visiting the DOD Office of People Analytics Survey portal at https:// www.dodsurveys.mil/. Once on the site, select the button at the bottom of the page which will direct respondents to enter the spouse's DOD identification number to access the survey.

The survey will be active until early April. Results from the current survey are available on MilitaryOneSource.mil and on OPA. mil.

A parallel, biennial survey for Reserve spouses was fielded in 2023.





# **Air Force Deploys Live Hypersonic ARRW** Missile to Guam

The Air Force has published images of an operational hypersonic Air-Launched Rapid-Response Weapon (ARRW) in Guam; a disclosure possibly meant to send a message to China but which raises questions about the future of the ÂRRW, which the Air Force insists it is not planning to procure in quantity.

The images, released by the 36th Wing, showed air and ground crews at Andersen Air Force Base, Guam, receiving "hypersonic weapon familiarization" with the AGM-183A ARRW on Feb. 27. The missile, which was mounted under the wing of a B-52H bomber, had yellow stripes, indicating it has a live warhead. Blue stripes indicate an inert weapon without a warhead, typically used for captive-carry tests or loading training.

The Air Force's unveiling of the ARRW in a forward location may be a message to China that the U.S. can now field a hypersonic capability in the Pacific. It may also be the simple familiarization described, but it would be unusual to take a highly limited test asset to a forward base without another purpose in mind. The Air Force did not disclose whether the missile would remain at the base.

Andersen is a key base in the Pacific, and Air Force bombers routinely deploy there for weeks at a time, engaging in training, wargames, and show-the-flag operations. These messaging include "freedom of navigation" flights through China's air defense identification zone. Such Bomber Task Forces (BTFs) have increased

in the last few years while at the same time China has stepped up the frequency of exercises in which it bluff-charges Taiwan's ADIZ with as many as 80 aircraft, a pattern seemingly meant to test Taiwan's air defenses but also potentially intended to reduce Taiwan's alertness with chronic false alarms of an invasion.

It's not clear from the photos released whether more than one missile was included in the training. All the photos showed a single missile mounted on a pylon under the aircraft's starboard wing. The Air Force has said a B-52 can carry up to four ARRWs on wing pylons.

About two dozen Air Force personnel were shown receiving the instruction.

The missile in the photos carries the serial number ÂR-AUR-005. "AUR" likely references The the term "All-Up Round," the nomenclature for ARRWs that have a live ATACMS booster and live warhead. The Air Force released images of a similar training event at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., last year, and the missile in those photos had the serial AR-AUR-004.

If the Air Force plans to testlaunch the missile in the photos in the Western Pacific, it would be the first time such a launch has occurred away from the coast of California, where all ARRW tests have been conducted so far.

The release said B-52 crews of the 23rd Expeditionary Bomb Squadron out of Minot Air Force Base, N.D., and the 49th Test and Evaluation Squadron out of Barksdale Air Force Base, La., conducted the

familiarization. Personnel received "expert academics and training on hypersonic fundamentals and participated in tactical discussion on hypersonic operations to increase operational readiness," the release stated. The instruction also included a discussion about logistics for hypersonic weapons.

The program is meant to "prepare multiple Air Force aircraft communities for hypersonics, including the Hypersonic Attack Cruise Missile," ARRW, and "other programs under development,' according to the release. It did not provide further details.

Lockheed Martin Missiles and Fire Control is the prime contractor for ARRW-a boost-glide type of hypersonic weapon-while Raytheon is developing the HACM, which is a smaller, longer-ranged, air-breathing weapon, the engine for which is being developed by Northrop Grumman.

The ARRW has a checkered track record in Air Force tests, with at least two outright launch failures as well as test glitches during the captive-carry phase of evaluation. The first test reported as a full success of the all-up round was flown on Dec. 9, 2022; two others were flown in August and October last year, apparently successful. The Pentagon's Director of Operational Test and Evaluation, in his recent report about 2023 activities, said the all-up ARRW flown last August had some problems with telemetry in the endgame but otherwise flew a nominal mission and achieved successful warhead detonation.

Air Force officials said there is one formal ARRW test yet to go.

Just a year ago, Air Force acquisition executive Andrew Hunter told the House Armed Services Committee in written prepared testimony that the Air Force "does not intend to pursue follow-on procurement" of ARRW. However, he said there is "inherent benefit to completing All-Up Round test flights ... to garner the learning and test data that will help inform future hypersonic programs and potential leave-behind capability."

Air Force budget documents said closeout testing of the ARRW would take place in fiscal year 2024, during which the flight envelope for launch will be further expanded, flying qualities will be assessed, and the weapon will be tested against ground targets.

Much about the ARRW contract is classified, but the Air Force has acknowledged that Lockheed Martin was to conduct design and development, produce a certain number of missiles for test, and produce an undisclosed number of "leave behind," or left-over assets after testing that could be used operationally. Lockheed was also to demonstrate that it could produce the ARRW at scale, something the company has said it accomplished.

Subsequent to Hunter's comment, Air Force Secretary Frank Kendall said the Air Force has shifted its focus to the HACM, which will be a smaller, longer-ranged weapon that could be carried by fightersized aircraft. The ARRW can only be carried by bombers.

It's not clear if the Air Force is changing its procurement position on ARRW. William LaPlante, undersecretary of defense for acquisition and sustainment, deferred questions on hypersonics and ARRW in particular during a House Armed Services Committee hearing in mid-February, asking for a closed session to discuss the subject in a secure facility.

Asked why ARRW isn't being

procured, despite being the only successfully-tested U.S. hypersonic weapon so far, LaPante said, "Let's just say there is a plan. It's not something we can talk about in this open session."

Air Force officials said ARRW plans will become more clear in the budget request that will be forwarded to Congress on March 11.

Last March, the Congressional Budget Office pegged the unit cost of an air-launched hypersonic missile "similar to" the ARRW at between \$15 million and \$18 million across a production run of 300 missiles, but a ground-launched version would cost three times as much, due to the special launch infrastructure and additional boost capacity required. The CBO said it used the term "similar" because the actual numbers are classified.

Kendall has said that while hypersonic missiles match well to China's operational concepts, they are less critical to USAF's concepts of fighting and are important but not a top priority for investment.

A hypersonic ground-attack missile is best suited for striking high-value targets like commandand-control centers from long range, at high speed. Such weapons derive their destructive force both from a warhead and from the kinetic force of striking the ground at five times the speed of sound. Defense against hypersonic missiles, particularly if they are maneuvering, is difficult.

China is known to have deployed an undisclosed number of hypersonic DF-17 missiles with a long-range, tactical capability, while it has also developed hypersonic weapons to be mounted on intercontinental ballistic missiles. The DF-17 has been called a "carrier killer" and is also suited to a strike on a base like Guam.

"The Department of Defense is developing hypersonic science and technology to ensure the U.S. can rapidly field operational hypersonic systems," the USAF said in its

release about the familiarization program in Guam. The Air Force specifically "will continue to invest in researching, developing, testing, producing and fielding cost-effective

weapons," it continued. "These weapons are a mix of stand-off, stand-in hypersonic and subsonic precision-guided munitions. The Air Force also continues to

develop revolutionary advanced weapon capabilities to maintain a competitive advantage over the pacing threat."





# All About Pets

The scoop on dog grooming

Whether you go to the groomer or do it yourself at home, grooming your dog is essential. Every dog's needs are different, but here are a few pointers to get you started at home or in between visits to a professional!

•Bath time: the ASPCA recommends bathing your dog at least once every three months. If your dog has skin problems or spends a lot of time outdoors, you may need to bathe more often. However, bathing too often can lead to more skin irritation and dryness, so use your best judgement and be sure to keep an eye on your dog's condition. If you're bathing at home, be sure to do your research on the best bathing method for your dog's coat. Keep the water warm but not hot, and use a shampoo and conditioner that is best for them (medicated, puppy formula, detangling, etc.). Make sure to keep water out of your dog's ears and use a wash cloth or towel to gently wipe their face clean.

•Brushing: Regular fur brushing will help spread natural oils throughout your dog's coat, remove dirt, and prevent tangles and matting. Slicker brushes will help remove loose fur and detangle all coat types, but are best for medium-long haired dogs. Don't use too much pressure with a slicker, as this can cause discomfort. Pin brushes are like slickers, but they have pins tipped with plastic or rubber. These are great for longer, silkier, or curly coats. A bristle brush is a great option for a dog with a short or wiry coat and will remove excess fur and give your dog's coat a beautiful shine. Rakes are designed to penetrate a thick undercoat and remove tangles and debris in long-haired dogs. Make sure you pick the best brush for your dog's coat and brush them at least every few days. Brushing is also a great time to check out your dog's skin for signs of irritation, skin conditions, or bugs. •Dental care: Dogs need their teeth brushed teal. You can use a toothhuich /finger brush

too! You can use a toothbrush/finger brush and dog safe toothpaste and you can also keep your dog's teeth healthy by providing a healthy diet, plenty of chew toys/bones, and treats that are specially formulated for their dental needs. It is best to brush their teeth every day, but even three times a week is better than none. Just like brushing fur, it gives you a chance to check out your dog's condition and find any signs of illness or irritation.

•Ear care: Regularly checking your dog's ears is important, especially for those who produce excessive earwax! If your dog's ears are dirty,

you can gently clean them with a cotton ball dampened in a liquid ear cleaner. You may want to contact your vet before doing this to make sure that you are using the proper technique/products and not accidentally

Nail trimming: Many dogs are uncomfortable having their nails trimmed, but trimming your dog's nails is one of the most important things you can do to keep them happy and healthy! Nails should be cut when they almost touch the ground when your dog walks. This could be every week or every few weeks, depending on the dog and its activity level/type. You can use scissor or guillotine type clippers, a nail grinder, and some owners even opt to train their dog to use a scratch board for light nail maintenance. Be careful not to cut your dog's quick, as this can cause bleeding and lots of pain. If your dog is really struggling with feeling comfortable during nail clipping, be sure not to force them to continue or you can risk putting your dog off from it completely. Some owners are able to clip all their dog's nails in one sitting, some can only do one nail a day. Either way, with the proper training, plenty of patience, and rewards, you can teach your dog to tolerate nail maintenance. If you are unable to train your dog to tolerate it, contact a professional groomer or event a veterinarian immediately. If your dog's nails get too long, it can cause discomfort, pain, or injury.

•To shave or not to shave: There are many reasons why a dog may need to be shaved, especially in severe cases of matting, but you should try to avoid this if possible. A dog's coat serves a purpose to insulate them in hot or cold temperatures and protect from sunburn, among many other things. If you have a double-coated dog, it is especially important not to shave as it can cause more damage than good! A light trim is acceptable to make their coat more manageable or presentable. If you think your dog might need to be shaved, be sure to ask a professional for their input. There may be other ways to resolve the problem before resorting to that.

With the right tools and research, you can successfully groom your dog at home. However, be sure to consult your vet or a professional with any questions you may have! And if you don't have the time or knowledge to groom at home, make sure you keep up by taking your dog to the groomer regularly.





# Senators Implore Secretary of the Air Force to Enforce **Cold Weather Pay for Air and Space Force Members**

WASHINGTON – The Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization (NDAA) Act provided language authorizing special duty pay to servicemembers assigned to cold weather locations to address the mental health crisis among members serving in northern locations. According to the FY 2024 NDAA, cold weather locations are defined as any location where the temperature reaches -20 degrees Fahrenheit or below. Qualifying military stations in North Dakota include Minot Air Force Base, Cavalier Space Force Station, and Grand Forks Air Force Base.

U.S. Senator Kevin Cramer (R-ND), a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee which authors the NDAA each year, joined U.S. Senators Lisa Murkowski (R-AK), Dan Sullivan (R-AK), and John Hoeven (R-ND) in a letter regarding recent reports servicemembers across North Dakota, Alaska, and Montana, have yet to receive this special duty pay for performing cold weather operations, more than a year after the pay was authorized in law.

The senators explain cold weather locations have long endured increased risks related to suicide, a trend which has manifested across the civilian and military population. The letter calls on the Air Force to implement

pay as Congress intended this to make it easier, not harder, for servicemembers and their families to live and thrive in North Dakota, Alaska, and Montana.

OFFICE OF U.S. SENATOR KEVIN CRAMER

"Airmen and Guardians in cold weather locations are asked to perform their duties in harsh environments, with temperatures that regularly dip below -20 degrees Fahrenheit during the winter," the senators wrote. "And while units often issue appropriate cold weather gear to the military member in order to continue operations through the winter, Airmen and Guardians are left to shoulder the financial burden of ensuring their families are appropriately equipped for the long winter season, a financial burden that a majority of our servicemen and women across the Department do not encounter. When you add up the cost of necessities such as coats, boots, and related gear, studded snow tires, snow blowers, engine block heaters, etc., the financial burden is not small. In cold weather locations these items are not just nice-to-have, they are necessities."

"This financial burden is unique to the north and has second and third-order effects beyond a servicemember's bank account. Should an Airman or Guardian feel financially unable to appropriately equip themselves or their families for a healthy lifestyle outside of work

and during the winter season, they are likely to favor more sedentary activities indoors, which can lead to increased depression and suicidal ideations," the senators continued. "Providing additional funds for our Airmen and Guardians in cold weather locations-installations that the Department directed they be assigned-is not likely to solve the Department's suicide problem, but it will assuredly help.'

## Workplace Safety for All of Us

'Workplace Safety Topics' - Maybe these 3 words put together in one sentence will make little sense to you. It is rare that we see workplace safety being given enough importance in our working lives. And that is why we talk about it! Workplace safety facts state that maintaining workplace safety is as important as maintaining safety at home. But why is safety at the workplace important? Think about it, we spend a major portion of our day at work so shouldn't we be assured of high levels of safety there? And how will you maintain those levels of safety if you don't know what you're supposed to maintain? That is why the following article will talk about some key safety tips and workplace safety topics that you should be looking into, if not already.

#### SAFETY TOPICS FOR THE WORKPLACE

For a start, take a look at the types of hazards that you may face in your office. Here is a list to help you out with determining what some of the workplace safety topics are.

#### SLIPS AND FALLS

Slipping, tripping and falling over are some of the most common accidents that can happen in the workplace. Why do these happen? of the electrical appliances has to be of primary concern for the matter of electrical safety. Too many wires plugged into one socket can lead to short circuits, frayed wires, and electric shocks become common place when there is no standard maintenance involved. That is why all employees need to be informed as part of workplace safety topics for meetings that they need to constantly be aware of the machines that they are using and if they find any problem with them, even if it is any doubt, they should inform the concerned personnel.

Along with that there need to be strict instructions given that there will be no inclusion of foods and drinks around the machines. Food and liquid spills can cause the malfunction to happen faster and put all the employees at risk. This could even lead to fires taking place, making this one of the most useful of workplace safety tips.

#### FIRE SAFETY

Fires might happen either due to negligence or due to a genuine problem. In case it is caused by negligence then the employees need to be given proper instructions on how to maintain fire safety (taking care of electrical appliances and wiring). In case of a fire, all employees should

Ergonomic in the workplace are an essential component of office life. It is not necessary that only physical factors like fire and tripping need to be cared for - the office structure and the arrangement of the different components in the office are equally important. The chair on which the employees sit, the brightness of their computer screen, the lighting, the frequency of breaks and other external factors like noise etc. have a direct effect on the performance of the employees. That is why ergonomics becomes so important.

These are some of the key workplace safety topics that you should not ignore at any cost. The maintenance of these will ensure not only the safety of the employees, but will also make them more efficient, which is ultimately all in favor of the company's progress.

Also, if anyone sees any spills they need to inform the maintenance personnel and get them cleaned. There needs to be further instructions given like workplace safety slogans put up that tells employees to maintain certain decorum and make sure that their drawers and the like are kept properly closed in order to prevent anyone crashing against them and falling. PORTABLE LADDER SAFETY

Twice as many falls occur stepping down compared to going up ladders. The main cause of falls from straight and extension ladders is sliding of the ladder base. For self-supported ladders or stepladders, the main cause is tipping sideways. Just remember that many workers carrying ladders hurt their backs, as well. If possible, have two people carry ladders.

Where there are so many machines present, there is always the danger of electrical malfunction happening. Regular checkups and maintenance



Add flour, salt, and butter to the bowl, and with the hook attachment mix on low until well combined. Then mix on medium for about 5 minutes until dough is smooth and pulls away from the sides.

To make the Beer Cheese Sauce: In a food processor bowl, add cheddar cheese, cream cheese, Worcestershire sauce, Dijon mustard, garlic and paprika. Blend until finely chopped, add the beer slowly until is smooth.

When pretzels are done serve with the beer cheese sauce. Enjoy!



Walleye are the pride and joy among a vast majority of North Dakota anglers, although bluegill, perch, crappie, and smallmouth bass fans are out there, as well. There is even a niche of salmon, trout, and paddlefish anglers.

It's just that walleye get the most attention.

With many lakes are starting to offer open water edges along shorelines, another group of anglers are eagerly awaiting their opportunity for action – northern pike action, that is.

For as beloved as walleye are among North Dakota anglers, it may seem ironic that the northern pike is the state's official fish, not walleye. The reason is walleye weren't around much until the N.D. Game and Fish Department was able to fully implement a major walleye (and other species like panfish) stocking program

The state agency has a close, cooperative working relationship with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife National Fish Hatcheries in the state. Walleye aren't native to many lakes and rivers in the state and stocking was critical in their popularity gain.

Prior to the rise of walleye fame and popularity, pike were North Dakota's kingpin of fish. That's why they're the official state fish.

Despite walleye's grip on a vast majority of angler's affection, for some – young and old, alike – pike are still a treasured fish worthy of high honor.

Early spring is a great time to fish for pike. They spawn before walleye so ribbons of open water along shorelines provide early spring fishing opportunities, even if ice is still on the main part of a lake. Simply cast spoons or crankbaits from shore or even just hook up a bobber. Bait of choice could be frozen smelt or herring.

While pike are native to North Dakota, they are also stocked in some lakes. Populations fluctuate with the state's wet and dry cycles and fluctuating water levels, whether natural lake or reservoir. When water levels drop because of dry spells and drought, shorelines develop vegetative growth. Vegetation floods when water levels return with wet conditions and spring

runoff, providing excellent spawning habitat and increasing pike populations.

The Missouri River System (Lake Sakakawea, Lake Audubon, and the river itself), Devils Lake and lakes feeding into it, and many other lakes across the state offer pike opportunities.

Use a heavier 10- to 12-pound test line and leader rather than casting or bobber fishing with lighter line more commonly used with walleye or panfish, though, when pike fishing. Otherwise, a pike will simply snap that line without hesitation and anglers get to buy more fishing tackle.

The drawback to pike, whether it's a nice 4- to 7-pound eater or a big 20-pound monster is dealing with the notorious Y bones when it comes to fileting and eating them.

There is a technique to removing those Y bones, though, and it isn't too difficult. It all begins with a quality – sharp and flexible – filet knife. A sharp knife makes it easier to keep the proper angle when cutting through the meat and follow along the bones.

After removing the skin and rib bones, the technique is to make proper angled cuts to take out a filet of meat containing the Y bones. The result is two boneless strips of meat, one top filet, a bottom filet, and a waste filet containing the Y bones. While there is some meat on the Y bone filet, proper knife angle and practice helps reduce the amount of meat left with the Y bones.

A detailed article with photographs on removing Y bones from northern pike is available for download from the Game and Fish Department website, (gf. nd.gov). Open the home page menu, click "Fishing/ Boating", scroll all the way down to "More Fishing/ Boating", scroll all the way down – again – to "Other Fishing Resources", and – whew – you'll find "Removing Y bones from northern pike" and a link to print the downloadable guide or watch a video. There's even a link to pike recipes. Go pike fishing, practice the fileting technique, and enjoy.
