# Study Shows Higher Rates of Some Cancers in ICBM Personnel

The Air Force found increased rates of breast and prostate cancers in service members who worked on nuclear intercontinental ballistic missiles compared to the general population, according to a preliminary study of data publicly released on March 13.

"What we don't know is whether these rates specifically for breast and prostate are due to increased screening or access to care or whether these are due to unique military exposures," Col. Tory Woodard, a doctor and the head of U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine (USAFSAM), said in remarks at a Feb. 23 town hall, according to Air Force Global Strike Command, which maintains the nation's 400-plus land-based strategic missiles.

The Air Force is in the midst of a wide-ranging Missile Community Cancer Study, sparked by renewed concerns that surfaced in early 2023 of possible increased cases of non-Hodgkin Lymphoma, a blood cancer, at Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont. The service previously dismissed those concerns in 2001 and 2005 reviews.

The newly analyzed data does not show increased rates of non-Hodgkin lymphoma, the specific cancer that sparked the new study.

Missileers and other personnel working on decades-old Minuteman III missiles and older systems have long had health concerns related to their service, which often require them to work in underground

bunkers for 24-48 hours at a time. Security personnel, maintainers, and other individuals also worked at ICBM sites.

Air Force officials cautioned that the information was preliminary and drawn from a limited dataset of around 2 million military personnel, with a focus on 84,000 "missile community members" who were around ICBM facilities, including 8,000 missileers.

The data only includes Department of Defense electronic medical records from 2001-2021, capturing those who were diagnosed with cancer through the Military Health System (MHS), including through the Tricare health insurance program. Cases outside the Military Health System were not included in the analysis.

For the initial phase, the military was "unable to determine cancer cases diagnosed prior to 2001 or outside of the MHS/TRICARE," Woodard wrote in a March 6 memo. The Air Force anticipates the initial data makes up fewer than 25 percent of the total cancer cases that make be captured during the study.

"What is important to understand is that the epidemiology study is still nascent but progressing to eventually deliver responsible data to draw conclusions from at the end of the study," an AFGSC spokesperson said.

The results were presented during the town hall held by Air Force Global Strike Command boss

MAKING MORE POSSIBLE

Gen. Thomas A. Bussiere, along medical experts USAFSAM and AFGSC. USAFSAM is leading the Missile Community Cancer Study, which has been ongoing for the past year.

Comparisons of cancer rates between the ICBM community and the general population are "difficult at this time due to incomplete case counts within this data set," read a slide presented during the town

Subsequent phases of the study promise to include data from the Veterans Administration's cancer registry dating back to 1976, death certificates dating back to 1979, DOD cancer registry data dating back to 1986, and those diagnosed in the VA system dating back to 1991, along with data from state and other cancer registries.

That data is expected to come this summer, according to the Air Force. That review will also include data on personnel from bases that no longer have an active ICBM mission, the service says. The study team is also considering conducting a study of reproductive health in the missile community.

"We have five other data sets to study, and each additional data set will build our knowledge base and help to shape the larger picture," Woodard said. "That picture will not be complete until we complete all phases of this Epidemiology Review."

Breast and prostate cancers have long been a concern for service members in all fields and services, according to a 2023 study published in the American Cancer Society's medical journal. The study's authors analyzed cancer data for service members and found "higher rates of prostate and breast cancers, particularly in 40-to 59-year-olds" compared to the general population. However, the study authors did not say military service was the definitive cause of the cancers and "may result from

greater cancer screening utilization or cumulative military exposures."

Doctors from USAFSAM also led a study of Air Force pilots published in 2021 that found that "compared with the U.S. population, male fighter aviators were more likely to develop and die from melanoma skin cancer, prostate cancer, and non-Hodgkin lymphoma."

The Missile Community Cancer Study is also conducting environmental sampling of ICBM facilities. All three active ICBM bases-Malmstrom, F.E. Warren, and Minot air force bases, with Minuteman III fields spread out over Montana, Wyoming, North Dakota, Colorado, and Nebraska show "air, water, & soil samples below acceptable regulatory levels for any chemicals or hazards," according to a slide presented at the town hall.

Toxic chemicals known as polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB) were found in some isolated places

at those bases, but AFGSC says those facilities are in the process of being cleaned and made safe or have already reopened. The production of PCBs were banned in the United States in 1979, and Air Force officials said the removal process began in the 1980s.

It is unclear how long and at what level the PCBs were present before the current mitigation efforts. The study team recently finished environmental sampling at Vandenberg Space Force Base, the Minuteman III test launch facility, but the Air Force says it has not yet received results.

"There remains a significant level of interest and engagement," Bussiere said at the town hall. "I ask that you be persistent in highlighting areas that need to be highlighted to help us to get things right, but that you also be patient because there is still a lot to be

# UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

My intent this week was to write about a special restaurant in downtown Bismarck and the people who operate it. However, there is a more pressing issue that needs to be addressed.

Another friend was lost to cancer last week and what appears to be remarkable about his case, is that it could have been preventable.

A family friend from back home, who we called "Soup Bone" when we were kids because he was so skinny, died last week at the age of 62 from kidney cancer that had spread to his lungs.

Kidney cancer spreading to the lungs is exactly what I experienced. But thanks to a persistent public health nurse named Melissa Burud and Mayo Clinic, I was saved. But it could have been much worse.

In fact, a cardiologist in Minot who first diagnosed my small cell renal cell carcinoma, asked me if I had any blood in the urine. I told him no and there wasn't any pain, no pinching, no buldge in my lower back, nothing like that.

Sometime after the surgery, in a consult with the doctor who removed my kidney, I asked him, what would have happened if there was blood in my urine. "By then, it's too late," he told me.

# Losing a childhood friend...

And I suspect that is what happened to "Soup Bone." I'll bet he didn't even know he had cancer until it was too late. I'll bet the warning signs were so subtle that he wasn't even aware of what was going on.

But there are signs, there are clues and most of all, those of us on the street don't know enough about medicine to even make an educated guess. Some little thing will happen to us and we'll pass it off as an allergy, a nasty cold, a cut that doesn't want to heal as fast as it should. No matter, we're aging and our body doesn't heal as quickly as it used to heal.

The real problem is, we think we are 10 feet tall and bullet proof until we're not. And my point here today is that as we age, we need to start paying closer attention to our bodies.

In my case, it was chest pain that led to an x-ray that found a spot on my left lung. I could have passed it off as working too hard. I could have

taken a break to "catch my breath," and gone right back to work. Instead, I went to the clinic in Kenmare and the x-ray revealed something I didn't want to see.

That happened four days before my 59th birthday. By the time you read this article, I will have turned 65. So, in another consult with my doctor at Mayo Clinic last year in June, I asked him what would have happened if I had refused medical attention.

He told me point blank, I'd either be dead or close to it.

That's why it's so important to have someone take a closer look at any warning signs. Just two weeks ago, my wife and I were on the beach in Florida and she told me there was a weird looking spot on my back that was dark and irregular. That's a classic sign of melanoma, and my dad had melanoma. So, as soon as we got back to North Dakota, I made an appointment.

The doctor did a biopsy right in

her office to get positive proof of what that spot was. As it turned out, it is called seborrheic keratosis, which is harmless and is caused by aging and damaged skin.

But, it could have been much worse. My dad disregarded the early signs of his melanoma and as he went from his 70s to his 80s, the dermatologic procedures became more frequent to remove the recurring melanoma.

Because of doctor/patient confidentiality, it's near impossible to get information like this, unless it's your own and you are volunteering the information. And that's what I'm doing here.

I'm hoping that anyone who finds those subtle signs that appear to be nothing more than annoying, please get it checked out. I feel terrible about losing my childhood friend "Soup Bone," whose real name is Joey Brunner. I hope we can all learn something from his passing.

### THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY "DUDETTE 07" AIRMEN MAKE HISTORY AS THE

FIRST ALL-FEMALE COMBAT TEAM IN AFGHANISTAN MARCH 30, 2011

On March 30, 2011, at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, a team of female Airmen made history by performing the first combat sortie involving only women. Maj. Tracy Schmidt, Capt. Kimberly Volk, Maj. Christine Mau, and Capt. Jennifer Morton provided close air support for coalition and Afghan ground forces as a part of "Dudette 07," which consisted of two F-15E Strike Eagles. The mission, which was

planned in honor of Women's History Month, included female pilots, weapons officers, mission planners, and maintainers from the 389th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron and 455th Air Expeditionary Wing. The Air Force officially permitted women to train as pilots in 1976, but they were not allowed to fly combat missions until 1993. "I thought it was kind of cool and something that I have never seen before," said Staff Sgt. Tamara Rhone, a 455th Expeditionary Aircraft Maintenance Squadron crew chief. "The women throughout time have paved the way for us today and they made it possible for us to be equal as well as respected as individuals. Females are a rare breed on the flight line." As women continue to pave the way in the military, events like this are important reminders of the dedication, solidarity,

# Minot AFB Introduces USA Sled Hockey to Curling

MINOT – The USA Paralympic Sled Hockey team watched intently as Minot Air Force Base curling teams tangled on league semi-final night. They were eager to have MAFB players introduce them to the sport after the last rock was

Curling is not a sport played by many, but it has a rich tradition and fascinating appeal to those who seek out the opportunity to play. That list includes MAFB participants in the only military curling league in the U.S., several of whom shared time on the ice with USA Sled Hockey players.

The respect between the two groups was evident immediately. Several Team USA members making their first try at curling were veterans of military service, making for an appreciative bond readily understood by all participants.

"There's so many people all around the country that want to put that USA jersey on, many of them military guys who fought for our country and made sacrifices,' said Declan Farmer, Olympian from Boulder, Colorado. "It's definitely a privilege. It's something special."

Jen Yung Lee, San Antonio, Texas, and goal tender for the USA team, was among those watching through the glass as the MAFB curlers finished their games. The Army veteran lost his legs in 2009 and did his rehabilitation at Fort Sam Houston in Texas.

"I tried curling and fell in love with the sport and the camaraderie," said Lee. "Being in the locker room with guys from the Air Force, Army, Marines, and Coast Guard is a team bonding that has really helped me stay with sled hockey.'

The USA team's introduction to curling happened at the curling club located on the State Fairgrounds in Minot. The following day the USA Men's Sled Hockey team routed Team Canada in an exhibition game at Minot's MAYSA Arena.

Having MAFB airmen volunteer to introduce USA Sled Hockey players to curling didn't come as a surprise to Chris Douglas, Minot. Douglas moved to Minot from Orlando, Florida, eight years ago.

Noting the kind assistance of airmen from MAFB, Douglas said, "The atmosphere in this town is what we were looking for. Minot is one of the greatest communities I've ever seen.'

Douglas made the USA Team in 2014 and remains on the roster today. He credits Prairie Grit, an organization dedicated to assisting handicapped in various endeavors, with making a big difference in

"It is what everyone dreams of having," remarked Douglas. "My wife and I are going to call Minot home for a very long time."

USA Team Captain Josh Pauls, Green Brook, New Jersey, had his legs cut off at the knees when he was 10 months old. He made his first national team in 2008-09

and was part of the first world championship team for the U.S. in games held in the Czech Republic. In all, he has been on five gold medal winning teams.

"It never gets old. One of the best traditions we've kept is that we always put that USA jersey on together," said an emotional Pauls. "It's really a sense of pride, especially having military veterans who thought they'd never be involved in the sport. They are inspiring the next generation.'







# **Local Teacher Awarded Innovation Grant**

Lory Keller, a fifth grade English Language Arts and Science teacher at Dakota Elementary, has recently been awarded the North Dakota Teacher Innovation Grant. Lory proposed to purchase a CO2 3D laser cutter, which is a cutting tool that uses a beam of light to precisely cut a wide range of flat materials, to provide the fifth graders at Dakota Elementary with the opportunity to capitalize and learn more about science, technology engineering, and

The students will be able to use this laser cutter as a foundation to build up and be better prepared for a future in STEM careers. When asked how Lory felt about winning this grant, she emphasized that she was thrilled to have won but her main focus is always how this can benefit the students. In her own words she stated, "at the end of the day it's about the kids, it's about what's good for them and what helps them for their future."

Lory described how her intention for this laser is to build a good foundation in STEM related education, so that her fifth-grade students are better prepared for the more challenging course work in the upcoming grades. The CO2 3D laser not only gives the students the advantage for building a better foundation in STEM related learning, but it also provides a way to expand the students creative and retail skills, and is a great way for the school to earn extra funding by selling the products the students help to create.

Students will be able to get a better understanding of what it takes to create a product from start to finish. Lory's hopes are that the students will be able to establish an idea for a product and work hard to follow through with that idea by creating their product and working through any mistakes. They will learn to adjust their thinking to problem solve, and finally will be able to sell their final product in the school store. By working through their mistakes and learning to try again when it isn't right the first time, the never give up attitude is reinforced, and the children will learn to try and try again until they succeed. 

The Air Force is dramatically scaling back its plans for the MH-139 Grey Wolf helicopter, cutting its projected fleet from 80 to 42 aircraft and reducing the number of bases that will host the new chopper.

For now, that means some units will continue to operate the aging UN-1N Huey, some of which have been flying since the Vietnam War.

The Air Force's original plan was to procure 84 helicopters to provide security and transport across sprawling ICBM fields, senior leader and executive airlift in the National Capital Region, and aircrew survival training.

That plan was later trimmed to 80 aircraft, and the service's 2025 budget documents now show a cut all the way down to 36. However, an Air Force spokeswoman told Air & Space Forces Magazine that the program of record would actually be 42 helicopters since six test aircraft were already delivered.

To accomplish such a reduction, the Air Force has decided to only field the MH-139 at its three ICBM bases:

- F.E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyo.
- Malmstrom Air Force Base,
- Mont.
   Minot Air Force Base, N.D.

All three bases will still get their originally planned 11 helicopters, added the spokeswoman. Malmstrom just recently received its first MH-139, welcoming the Grey Wolf on March 9. It is slated to receive its full complement by the summer of 2025.

In addition, the MH-139 schoolhouse will still be at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., which is slated to get its first chopper this month.

Previously planned locations Joint Base Andrews, Md.; Fairchild Air Force Base, Wash.; and Yokota Air Base, Japan, will all not receive any MH-139s now. The Air Force had already announced Andrews as the fourth location to get the Grey Wolf, with a projected fleet size of 25.

The cuts to the program came "due to fiscal pressures and considering remaining service life of the UH-1N Huey," the spokeswoman said.

However, budget documents note that the UH-1N Huey helicopters "have significant capability gaps in the areas of speed, range, endurance, payload capacity, and aircraft self-protection."

The MH-139, a joint venture

The MH-139, a joint venture with Boeing and Leonardo, is a militarized version of the AW139 helicopter that is capable of flying faster, higher, farther, and with more weight than the UH-1N. The program has had hiccups, though—issues with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) certification caused the Air Force to delay its fiscal 2021 purchase of eight helicopters and skip its 2022 buys completely. Even after it gained FAA certification, the Pentagon's Office of the Director of Operational Test & Evaluation

(DOT&E) warned in its annual report that the Grey Wolf might fall shore of "operational effectiveness requirements." The report noted concerns about with the automatic flight control system, sensor display, intercom system, cabin layout, and "restrictions on takeoffs in crosswinds or near obstacles."

The 2023 edition of the report similarly warned that the program "faces several ongoing risks to ... meeting operational effectiveness, suitability, and survivability requirements." While some progress has been made, the report authors noted that the MH-139 still requires some FAA certifications to start initial operational testing, which are not projected to be approved until the fourth quarter of fiscal 2024.

On top of that, the Air Force wants to add an additional radio to the aircraft, "but problems with internal communications persist," the report stated. The service also is adding an environmental conditioning system, but that system's effects on the helicopter's power and weight requirements is not fully known.

Despite all this, the Air Force wants to keep production high now and cut the program on the back

end—the service is maintaining its request for eight helicopters in fiscal 2025, then dropping to two each for the next four years to fill out the fleet. In its 2024 budget request, USAF projected a high buy of 15 helicopters in 2026, with smaller declines after that.

Air Force officials have noted that their procurement and research and development budgets took hits in the 2025 request due to spending caps set under the Fiscal Responsibility Act and the need to maintain operations and personnel accounts. The service is also curtailing its planned F-15EX and T-7 programs of record, though by far smaller amounts, and trimming its near-term procurement of F-35s.

The MH-139, however, is taking the biggest cut. In terms of procurement, the move reduces the program's estimated budget from \$2.55 billion to \$1.42 billion. It does, however, raise the unit cost per helicopter from \$34.47 million to \$39.37 million. That rise of 14.2 percent puts the program very close to a Nunn-McCurdy breach—the law requires Congress be notified of any program that has its unit cost rise 15 percent above current estimates.

# Rebranded Key Spouse Program allows flexibility to support families

The Department of the Air Force announced the Key Spouse Program is changing to the Commander's Key Support Program, at the annual major command spouse conference, March 13-15.










# When should I get tested for cervical cancer?

AFMS - MINOT - 5TH MEDICAL GROUP

The PAP test is one of the most reliable and effective cancer screening tests available. The PAP test is recommended for all women between the ages of 21 and 65 years

If you are 21-29 and your PAP test results are normal, you will not need another PAP test for 3 years. If you are 30 years old or older, you will need a Pap/HPV test every 5 years if the results are normal.

For all women aged 21-65, it is important to continue getting a Pap and/or HPV test as directed by your doctor—even if you think you are

too old to have a child or are no longer sexually active.

Women who are older than 65 and have had a normal Pap or HPV test for several years may not need a PAP test.

Women who have had your cervix removed as part of a total hysterectomy for non-cancerous conditions, like fibroids may not need a PAP test.

Cervical Cancer may be prevented by the HPV vaccine. It protects against the types of HPV that most often cause cervical, vaginal, and vulvar cancers. It is recommended for preteens (both boys and girls) aged 11 to 12 years but can be given as early as age 9 and until age 26.

Talk to your medical provider if you have questions. Early intervention and testing is important!





# **Basic principals** for safe lifting



right! vehicle lifts that are The supporting a vehicle you are working or being stored can represent one of the most productive tools in your shop, or one of the most dangerous pieces of equipment for you if not used and maintained properly. You'd never drive a vehicle that hadn't had the brakes inspected in years. Here are some basic and common sense principles apply to vehicle lifts in your shop and daily inspections are part of your job.

without also using a jack stand

Whether you're using twopost lifts, parallelograms, mobile column lifts, drive-on lifts or inground lifts for servicing vehicles, you should follow these basic safety rules.

#### 1. BUY CERTIFIED LIFTS

There's only one nationally recognized standard safety vehicle lifts: ANSI-ALI/ ALCTV/CE, administered by the Automotive Lift Institute (ALI/ ETL). ETL testing labs verify that a manufacturer's lifts meet the national safety standard for vehicles lift. The Automotive Lift Institute working through ETL testing procedures involves rigorous third-party verifying lift manufacturers comply with current ANSI requirements for lifts as defined by the International Building Code, which mandates that lifts be third party tested to meet these safety requirements. To verify equipment status, look for the gold ALI/ETL verification tag next to the lift's controls.

#### 2. BUY CERTIFIED LIFT **OPTIONS**

A commonly overlooked mistake is using an uncertified option or accessory on a certified lift. Doing so will void the lift's certification. It's simple: If the optional accessory isn't certified then the lift isn't certified. ALI/ETL standards (&ANSI standards & building code standards), require all accessories, such as drive-on lifts, rolling jacks and truck adaptors, to be certified. Although certification is good for the life of the lift, older models may not meet the most current standards. Complying with American National Standards Institute (ANSI), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health (PEOSH) requirements is the key to keeping vehicle lifts at the

highest possible safety level.

#### 3. NO LOCKS ARE LIABILITY

Always raise the vehicle and then lower it onto the lift's mechanical locks as required by ANSI. Refer to ALI safety manual lifting it Right or the manufacturer's operating instructions for detailed information. An easy way to visually verify the locks are being used is to include a weight gauge (a pressure gauge calibrated to the lift's lifting capacity) on your lift. A weight gauge can also be a great diagnostic tool. If using an old inground lift that doesn't have locks, it's time for a new lift. While some in-ground lifts can be retrofitted with an aftermarket lock, it's not the most cost-effective option, and your lift will still not be ALI/ETL certified to be compliant with ANSI rules and building code laws.

#### 4. IT'S EASY TO **OVERLOAD**

Manufacturers of the most common two-post side by side lifts mandate that none of the four swing arms be overloaded.



#### 5. INSPECT EQUIPMENT **ANNUALLY**

ANSI/Automotive Lift Institute ALCTV Standard for Automotive Lifts-"Safety Requirements for Construction, Testing, and Validation" requires technicians to perform a daily operational safety check. The code also requires an annual inspection by a qualified individual. Failing to do so could expose your shop to liabilities that could be associated with an injury if an accident were to happen.

New North Dakota fishing licenses are needed beginning April 1 and 2024 also brings a new year of fishing regulations.

North Dakota does something that might be unique among states - it doesn't update its fishing regulations annually. Instead, the new regulations are good for two years beginning April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2026.

There is some history and solid science behind the reason for bucking the trend of annual – and often extensive and complex – fishing regulations, explained N.D. Game and Fish Department Fisheries Division Chief Greg Power.

The main reason for a two-year fishing proclamation (guide) is typically North Dakota doesn't change many regulations from year to year.

Admittedly, there are some new regulations but - as usual — it's not in any large number.

North Dakota is a state whose fisheries, regardless of size, location, or whether it's manmade reservoir or natural lake, whose success is often dictated by something far beyond the control of management strategy. Weather and the state's historical wet and dry cycles often drive fish

Weather cycles typically last anywhere from a year or two to long, multi-year periods. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, the state was gripped by one of those extensive dry cycles; drought taking a toll on angler numbers and participation to the point the Game and Fish Department took serious looks at how to increase fishing interest.

In 1993, the year the drought ended after near historic rains. The change resulted in numerous changes in the next round of fishing regulations to adjust to the change from famine – drought – to feast – dozens of new natural lakes full of water - across North Dakota.

The vast litany of changes included opening the entire state to year-around fishing with new licenses needed beginning April 1 each year. It increased the number of lines anglers could use on large lakes when ice-fishing, opened more lakes to fishing opportunities, and changed some management strategies.

As biologists looked at regulations over the years, they recognized there were few annual changes prior to the major revisions on 1993. In 1995, they simplified things even more by adopting two-year regulations. The caveat is the agency can still make annual changes if biological data

deems it necessary.

While many states often have complex, lake-by-lake or river-by-river — sometimes even based on creeks and creek sections — North Dakota went the opposite route.

What might make the fact the state stays with two-year regulations seem even more intriguing is its fisheries truly reflect the peaks and valleys of its wet and dry cycles, a polite way of saying North Dakota is on a rollercoaster ride of floods and droughts.

So, too, are the lakes and rivers the Game and Fish Department manages.

However, those peaks and valleys greatly influence fish survival with many lakes susceptible to both summer and winter kill due to low oxygen levels. While more notorious in the winter, it's also possible for lakes to have fish die-offs in the depth of a long, dry — and hot — summer. What it comes down to is the fact that fish are a resource that can't be stockpiled. In some situations – like severe drought anglers might as well go fishing and harvest fish because they possibly wouldn't survive, anyway.

It seems one would regulate for those fluctuations

And annually.

While North Dakota has strengthened its regulations relating to aquatic nuisance species as it, and other states, try to stave off negative impacts they can have on a resource, it's actually become more generous in many

For example, the use of live bait wasn't legal on more than 30 lakes in the early 1990s. Fast-forward three decades and the list is down to 10 lakes with restrictions.

With growing interest in bow-fishing, the Game and Fish Department legalized bow- and spear-fishing for catfish on the Missouri River System - Lake Oahe, Lake Sakakawea, and the Missouri River — up to the first tributary bridge.

In addition, bow and spear-fishing will be legal in darkhouse ice-fishing structures beginning next winter. The new two-year regulations also establish a daily and possession limit for channel catfish - 20 daily; 40 possession – west of N.D. Highway 1. There hadn't been any limit in the past.

So go out and get a 2024 fishing license — they're due by April 1 - pick up a 2024-2026 fishing guide, and get ready for open water fishing.
