Minot Task Force 21 Examines Nuclear Deterrence and Addresses Sentinel Project at Nuclear Triad Symposium

MINOT AREA CHAMBER EDC

Area Chamber EDC (MACEDC) Task Force 21 presented the first North Dakota Nuclear Triad Symposium to over 200 attendees at the Clarion Event Center in Minot on April 23. Local and national military leaders, experts, and government officials spoke about the importance of nuclear modernization, educated community members on nuclear deterrence, and discussed the effects it has on the United States' adversaries at the half-day event.

After an introduction by MACEDC President | CEO Brekka Kramer and Minot's Mayor and Task Force 21 member Tom Ross, the symposium's keynote speaker kicked off the event. Career space and missile officer

Lt. Gen. Michael J. Lutton, Deputy Commander, Air Force Global Strike Command (AFGSC) and Deputy Commander, Air Forces Strategic-Air, U.S. Strategic Command, Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana, delivered a briefing on Air Force Global Strike Command.

"It is critical to remember that when we deliver deterrence and long- range strike capability that we do not have allies and partners with ballistic missile forces or longrange bombers." says Gen. Lutton. "We provide that unique capability in Air Force Strike Command to not only our nation but also all of those allies and partners.

That capability is no more evident than at Minot Air Force Base."Lt. Gen. Lutton also emphasized the influence of Minot Air Force Base as the only military installation that supports two legs of the nuclear triad. "Minot has a national level responsibility. Minot has a national level mission and if you want to feel that you just need to walk into those gates. There's no greater importance to nuclear capabilities than Minot Air Force Base. There's no place our adversaries can go, there's no place that they can hide that we can't go."

Following the keynote address, an overview of "America's Strategic Posture: The Final Report of the Congressional Commission on the Strategic Posture of the United States," was presented by Bill Chambers, Maj. Gen. United States Air Force (retired), Commission Executive Director, Institute for Defense Analyses. This report is important as it highlights strategic challenges facing the country that require urgent action, and studies our adversaries while suggesting changes that will address their

The National Defense Industrial Association (NDIA) President & CEO Hon. David L. Nordquist addressed our adversaries. The NDIA Northern Tier Chapter, which includes the states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, and Minnesota, is an event partner who presented briefings on China and Russia. James P. (Phil) Wisecup, Vice Admiral, US Navy (retired) spoke on China, and Dr. Anna Batta, Associate Professor of International

Security Studies Air War College at Maxwell Air Force Base, is an expert that spoke about Russia.

Ū.S. Representative Kelly Armstrong and North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum discussed their perspective about the importance of nuclear modernization and the role North Dakota and its military installations play in protecting the nation. U.S. Senator Kevin Cramer and U.S. Senator John Hoeven also shared their thoughts virtually through a pre-recorded address.

"The missions that we talk about here matter not just to the City of MInot, the State of North Dakota, but actually to the entire world." says Gov. Doug Burgum. "We know that when we're strong as a nation that's how we achieve peace, that's always been how it works.

Col. Tytonia S. Moore, Deputy Director of Intercontinental Ballistic Missile Modernization, Site Activation Task Force spoke about the modernization and implementation of the Sentinel project. Sentinel is the weapon system to replace the aging Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) system, representing the modernization of the land-based leg of the U.S. nuclear triad. What makes Sentinel unique is the off-base construction and footprint it covers, including

15 missile alert facilities and 150 launch facilities.

"The current strategy of record for the Sentinel Program is we will use as much of the Minuteman III infrastructure as we can." explains Col. Moore.

Task Force 21 Chair Mark J. Jantzer finished off the event with closing remarks. "Thank you to the Task Force 21 members, the Minot Area Chamber EDC staff for providing this opportunity for us to educate and advocate for our

airmen." says Mark Jantzer. "Today we had a look at the world situation with China and Russia and where we fit in it as a community.'

Task Force 21 will host their second nuclear triad symposium for 2024 in Washington, $\bar{\mathrm{D}}.\mathrm{C.}$ on September 20.



Last week I spent a couple of weeks on the road traversing North Dakota, looking for signs that spring would soon transition to summer. With such a mild winter with limited snow, there are not a lot of water filled potholes (Definition: Pothole- the spot on a field that is lower than the rest of the topography around it, and thus tends to gather water from melting snow and spring rains) that will slow down spring

planting for area farmers. Moisture is only one of the determining factors in the spring planting schedule, the other is soil temperature. Different crops require different soil temperatures to germinate, but farmers normally like to have a good solid week of warm weather before they take to the fields to plant their crops. In the Red River valley there were quite a number of farmers in the field; I even saw a couple of large seeders hard at work seeding crops, but for the most part it seemed like the start of spring seeding was still a few

Food Truck Season Is Upon Us I serve on quite a few boards, and when we begin to plan events one of the first concerns is the availability of local food trucks to service the events. I will take a page out of Amy Allender's journal and talk about the first food trucks on the prairie, they were called cook cars. These cars were built to accompany threshing machines, the forerunner to today's combines, as they travelled from field to field harvesting small grains. Now we aren't talking trucks in the field, but horse drawn wagons. Large crews of men would be divided into teams to accomplish the task of bringing in the harvest. Out in the fields they would cut the wheat with horse drawn sickles (in earlier days they would use large hand cutters (scythes) swung by men. The cut grain would be gathered into bundles and transported to the area where a large threshing machine would separate the grain from stems. A long explanation of why these crews were made up of many men, doing different jobs to



bring in a summer's crop.

Well, you had to feed them all, and thus the cook cars serving at least a couple of meals a day to these crews. If you want to see a real cook car, and for that matter a threshing operation, look for the Makoti Threshing Show, which usually takes place the weekend after the 4th of July in Makoti, North Dakota. It's only about 30 miles south of Minot.

Food Trucks and trailers are like cook cars. Inside is everything you need to prepare a great meal. However, cook cars were more not themed like today's Food Trucks. Nope, just plain good old food from Hotdish Land. Seems like every time I turn around there is a new food truck working at an event. Jamaican, Mexican, Greek Orthodox, and hot dogs, just to name a few. But there never seems to be enough food trucks to go around. How can that be? Might be a pretty simple explanation. We, the food consuming public, have become adventurous in the food we consume. Rather than stop at one food truck and order our meal, we wander and do a little grazing. Maybe we'll start with an appetizer here, go to the main entrée' over here...no, let's do a couple of entrées, and finally there's dessert. It took 4 different food trucks to satisfy my hunger. If you are looking for a second income and want to meet a lot of people, let me suggest a food truck. I have been pondering a bit on a food truck that serves hotdishes. I am pretty sure it

would be a big success. **BEST KEPT SECRETS**

Food deserts are increasing...

There was a report in North Dakota newspapers a couple of weeks ago regarding the closure of a Crosby grocery store. For months there were efforts to save it, but the closure happened and forced the shuttering of several other Jason's Super Foods stores on the northern tier.

Crosby is a community of more than 1,000 people and is the Divide County seat. The residents are now faced with having to travel if they want to visit a bonafide grocery store. Crosby has a Dollar General and another business called the Depot, but neither can replace the grocery store, which was

once a Super Valu retailer. Given Crosby's location in the extreme northwest corner of the state, residents in Divide and part of Burke County now have to travel to get their groceries.

Estevan is the closest principal community to Crosby which is 32 miles north and in Canada. American shoppers could get most supplies there, but there are some restrictions such as meat and produce.

Williston is 68 southwest of Crosby. It has several grocery stores, so nearly all needs can be met, with the downside of having to be on the road for two hours.

Minot is roughly 125 miles southeast of Crosby. Most people who live in Crosby and Divide County say they travel to Minot, but it's not something they do or want to do on a weekly basis.

Other communities nearby include Tioga, Stanley and Westby, Mont., but every one of them translates to travel.

A situation like this really effects the elderly who either no longer drive or prefer not to drive. Instead of getting in the car and driving a few blocks, it's now up to two hours plus on the highway.

This is happening all too often across North Dakota and unfortunately follows what happened to numerous schools across the state.

Food deserts have been talked about for years. A task force was developed to address food deserts, but closures continue to happen for whatever reason. Bill Patrie of Bowdon, wrote a book about food deserts several years ago that opened a lot of eyes to this reality.

us have the means and the time to travel. Others don't. And no matter what community you live in from Crosby to Fargo, there is a percentage of people who are elderly, disabled or otherwise unable to travel without assistance.

There are solutions, but they aren't easy and they don't come cheap.

One example is to find a buyer who can get the retail business back on the road to recovery. As an example, ownership of Kenmare Jack & Jill purchased Jason's Super Foods in Mohall to keep it open so Renville County would have a grocery store.

Private ownership a possibility, but a lot of interested parties have little experience in retail and often struggle with success.

Sometimes local economic development groups will get involved to save the hometown grocer. Two cases in North Dakota that come to mind are in Wimbledon and Hazelton. Local grocery stores were saved thanks to an influx of community development dollars.

These stores often partner with others in the region to make larger buys as a way to help shoppers save some money.

The situation in Rothsay, Minn., is completely different. Even though it is close to Fergus Falls and Moorhead, when the local grocery store was in jeopardy, local high school students stepped in and now operate the town's only

It may be unique and it's unclear where the financing is coming from, but it appears to

be working.
Finally, there are local farmers' markets. They can help fill a void, but aren't open every day and most items are than 1,000 people should be seasonal. They do help, but





THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

LT. COL. JOE JACKSON SAVES A THREE MAN COMBAT CONTROL TEAM

MAY 12, 1968 -

During the Vietnam War on May 12, 1968, former Lt. Col. Joe Jackson was commander of an unarmed C-123 transport aircraft. The plane was flying an emergency mission in South Vietnam after a special forces camp at Kham Duc was overrun by the enemies, who were in complete control of the area. Over the radio, Jackson learned that a three-man combat control team had been accidentally left behind after the camp was evacuated. Jackson

made the decision to respond and descended to the landing strip of the camp under heavy fire. After landing, enemy forces dropped a rocket near the plane, but fortunately it was a dud. Jackson was able to rescue the CCT and bring them to safety in Da Nang. Despite the amount of enemy fire during the rescue, the C-123 was found to have no damage or bullet holes upon arrival. For his heroism, Jackson received the Medal of Honor on January 16, 1969. He passed away on January 12, 2019.












Air Force to begin accepting warrant officer applications

SECRETARY OF THE AIR FORCE PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Air Force is now accepting applications, from April 25 to May 31, for Airmen aspiring to become the inaugural cohort of warrant officers in the information technology and cyber career fields.

Plans to re-introduce warrant officers to the Air Force was announced by Secretary of the Air Force Frank Kendall at the Air and Space Forces Association's 2024 Warfare Symposium in conjunction with the Department's plan to Reoptimize for Great Power Competition.

"We need operational units with all the capabilities they need to deter and compete with our pacing challenges and ready to enter a conflict on short or no notice," Kendall said. "In those units we need the right mix of skills necessary for high end combat and to ensure technological superiority, particularly in information technology and cyber."

This announcement marks a significant milestone for the initiative and presents an opportunity for up to 60 selected candidates, who will play a crucial role in addressing the multifaceted challenges of today's dynamic security landscape. This decision signifies a pivotal moment in Air Force history, representing a strategic shift towards bolstering technical proficiency and operational effectiveness.

"The reintroduction of the warrant officer career path reflects the Air Force's commitment to expanding and retaining technical excellence, essential for maintaining a strategic advantage in an era defined by Great Power Competition," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David Allvin. "By investing in talent management programs that preserve proficiency and competence in our perishable and highly technical skills, the Air Force aims to ensure its readiness to stay ahead of rapidly advancing threats and safeguard national security interests effectively.

THE HISTORY AND ROLE OF **WARRANT OFFICERS**

The Air Force dissolved its Warrant Officer Corps in 1958 following the creation of the senior master sergeant and chief master sergeant ranks, who took on warrant officer responsibilities. These SNCOs took on specific technical duties, but were never relieved of their institutional requirements.

The reintroduction of the Warrant Officer Corps career path in the Air Force aims to address critical operational needs, while maintaining highly perishable skills, and leverage the unique expertise and capabilities of warrant officers. They will serve as technical experts, functional leaders, advisors, professionals, and risk managers, contributing to the overall proficiency of their organizations.

APPLICATION **REQUIREMENTS**

This first cohort of active duty, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve candidates must hold the rank of at least staff sergeant and have one year of active federal service. Notably, applicants must meet specific experience and proficiency requirements outlined for each warrant officer specialty, ensuring a highly skilled and

capable cohort. The Air Force created two new Air Force specialty codes for warrant officers, reflecting the critical role these officers will play in the realm of cyber and information technology. The first AFSC, 17W - Warfighter Communications & IT Systems Operations, designates individuals as subject matter experts and trusted advisors on the planning, deployment, employment, securing of enterprise and warfighter

communication systems. These warrant officers will provide technical guidance to commanders and staff, ensuring the efficient operation and management of

communication assets at all echelons. Additionally, they will play a pivotal role in mentoring and developing cyberspace personnel, contributing to the overall cybersecurity posture of the Air Force.

The second AFSC, 17Y - Cyber Effects & Warfare Operations, designates individuals as subject matter experts and trusted advisors on offensive and defensive cyber operations assets and personnel. These warrant officers will be responsible for orchestrating, managing, and integrating cyberspace technical capabilities, delivering critical technical recommendations across various military and interagency platforms. Their expertise will extend to integrating cyberspace capabilities into warfighting functions to enhance combat effectiveness and maneuvering strategically in the cyber domain.

Although Airmen in any AFSC can apply, they must meet specific functional technical experience to ensure these individuals possess the requisite skills and experience to excel in their duties, contributing significantly to the Air Force's technical readiness and operational effectiveness in cyberspace operations.

the Warfighting Communications & IT Systems Operations (17W) AFSC, applicants must possess a minimum of 24 months of documented operational experience with enterprise IT or warfighter communications systems in areas such as voice and data internetworking, local and wide area networks, including terrestrial, satellite, and aerial systems, as well as network planning. Additionally, all applicants much hold a minimum Department of Defense approved industry certification commensurate with the requirements for the Information Assurance Technical Level II certification or higher.

Similarly, candidates for the Cyber Effects & Warfare Operations (17Y) AFSC must hold senior level proficiency in one or more U.S. Cyber Command work roles as defined in the Commands Job Qualification System, or National Security Agency equivalent. Additionally,

for those specifically interested in a Cyber Capability Developer work role, must be a certified Û.S. Cyber Command Senior Cyberspace Capability Developer or a Computer Network Operations Development Program graduate or have three years of experience in system level

Members are encouraged to read the Personnel Service Delivery Memorandum in its entirety to ensure they qualify to apply.

AFTER APPLYING

The selection board process, scheduled for June 24-28, will identify top candidates poised to assume critical roles as technical experts, functional leaders, and advisors within their specialized domains. Those selected for the first cohort will be notified in late July.

Candidates will comprehensive training at the Warrant Officer Training School starting in the fall of 2024 or early 2025, which will be located at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, and will focus on equipping them with the necessary skills to excel in their new roles.

Upon graduation from WOTS, will be warrant officers and will be reassigned to operational units across the Air Force. Their assignments will align with operational requirements and member preferences to maximize their effectiveness in enhancing technical readiness and operational effectiveness.

"These are highly in-demand, and also extremely perishable, skills in today's rapidly-evolving landscape," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force David A. Flosi. "As we navigate the complexities of Great Power Competition, our ability to adapt and innovate hinges on the expertise of our Airmen. Using our Airmen's full potential is not just a strategic advantage; it's a necessity for our Air Force's readiness and effectiveness in the face of a challenging strategic environment."





With the huge selection of fancy toys, puzzles, and enrichment items available to pet owners, it can be a daunting task finding the right activities on a budget. But there are many ways to DIY your pet's enrichment sitting right around your home! Here are a few ideas to get you started on budget friendly enrichment:

Cat owners know it doesn't typically take much to enrich their pets. Many cats will play with anything and everything, so one enrichment could be as simple as giving your cat a new (to them) household item as a toy, such as a hair tie, a shoelace tied to a doorknob, or that cardboard box that you were going to throw in the trash. 

TOP SYMPTOMS OF AN ENGINE OIL LEAK

Ugly, greasy stains on the driveway...a burning smell and smoke coming from your engine...and the oil light on your dashboard flicking on and off—yikes! This sounds like it could be an engine oil leak. Not only are these issues hard to ignore, but they're signs of a problem you can't afford to ignore. 

AFGSC: Vandenberg SFB **Environmental Sampling** Complete

AIR FORCE GLOBAL STRIKE COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Missile Community Cancer Study's (MCCS) environmental sampling at Vandenberg Space Force Base, California, found no instances of contamination above regulatory action levels, Air Force Global Strike Command reported today.

The sampling at Vandenberg SFB assessed the presence of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) and volatile organic compounds (VOCs), chemicals that pose a risk to human health.

Vandenberg SFB is home to AFGSC's 377th Test and Evaluation Group, which supports missile tests, and Air Education and Training Command's 532nd Training Squadron, which provides missile training to approximately 450 missile operations officers and enlisted missile maintainers every year. Training takes place in simulators that replicate the launch control centers and launch facilities used at AFGSC's missile bases. Early in the MCCS, members of the missile community noted that sampling efforts focused only on operational missile bases and did not include any tests at Vandenberg, where evaluators, instructors, cadre and students work in facilities and simulators that are similar to those at the three active missile bases and which could contain the same types of contamination.

In response to the concerns, Gen. Thomas Bussiere, Commander of AFGSC, directed U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine (USAFSAM) researchers include Vandenberg in its sampling efforts. The sampling was completed in

slightly different parameters than the sampling at AFGSC's missile bases. Soil and air organophosphate byproducts of agricultural operations and Vandenberg's simulators are not located near agricultural land. Drinking water samples of all types were not included, as Vandenberg SFB uses the off-base municipal water system.

PCB surface sampling was conducted using the same swipe method as facilities at active missile bases. Of the 116 swipes collected, three had detectable levels of PCBs, all below the EPA's threshold for remediation of 10 micrograms per 100 square centimeters. One sample in LF-09 detected 1.53 micrograms per 100 square centimeters, and two samples in MAF-01A detected 1.9 and 1.18 micrograms per 100 square centimeters. Because these are below regulatory cleanup levels, no additional remediation is required. These sites will be labeled and access limited to these areas to further limit risk to personnel.

Ninety-day radon sampling was also started as part of the study. Due to the length of time required to analyze those samples, they will be reported when complete.

"Ensuring the most comprehensive assessment of the operational environments our nuclear team operates in, the U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine's team added our test and training sites at Vandenberg to the MCCS," said Lt. Gen. Michael J. Lutton, AFGSC Deputy Commander. "Leadership remains committed to a comprehensive, science-based, transparent MCCS serving our nuclear force and families."

General Bussiere approved a comprehensive study design by USAFSAM in March 2023 to conduct a formal assessment that addresses specific cancer concerns raised across related career fields and also





POT ROASTED BEEF BRISKET



INGREDIENTS

- 2 1/2 POUND FLAT CUT BEEF BRISKET TRAEGER PRIME RIB RUB 1 LARGE YELLOW ONION, SLICED 1 CLOVES GARLIC, MINCED
- 2 1/2 MEDIUM CARROTS, CUT INTO 2 **INCH SLICES** 1/2 STALK CELERY, DICED
- 1/4 CUP DRY RED WINE 1/2 TABLESPOON TOMATO PASTE 1/2 TABLESPOON WORCESTERSHIRE
- 1/2 TEASPOON DRIED THYME 1 CUP LOW SODIUM BEEF BROTH 1 BAY LEAF

CHOPPED PARSLEY, FOR GARNISH

1/2 CAN (14.5 OZ) DICED TOMATOES

When ready to cook, set the Traeger temperature to 350°F and preheat with the lid closed for 15 minutes. Trim the fat cap on the brisket to 1/4-inch. Season all sides generously with Traeger Prime Rib Rub. In the bottom of a large roasting pan, add the onions, garlic, carrot, and celery.

In a small bowl, add the wine and whisk in the tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce, and thyme. Pour the wine mixture over the vegetables. Add the tomatoes and beef broth, and bury the bay leaves in the vegetables.

Lay the brisket fat-side up on top of the vegetables. Cover tightly with aluminum foil. Place the roasting pan directly on the grill grates. Close the lid and cook for 3 1/2-4 hours, or until the meat is fork-tender. Halfway through the cooking time, carefully lift the foil and turn the meat over. Replace the foil.

Remove the brisket from the grill, and let the brisket rest for 30 minutes. Remove and discard the bay leaves from the vegetables and skim any visible fat from the liquids. Transfer the brisket to a cutting board and slice into 1/4-inch-thick slices. Garnish with parsley, as desired. Enjoy!





NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Fall Protection at Work and at Home -**Ladder Safety**

As summer arrives, many people will be working outside of their homes or summer residences.

In an average year, 93,000 American are injured while using a ladder. In fact, falls are the second leading cause of accidental death for Americans after traffic collisions.


When working off the ground in any capacity you need the right mindset. Always think about safety and the safest way to accomplish the task at hand. Don't just jump on the ladder and go. Every time you use a ladder you need to inspect it, ensuring the base of the ladder is balanced and secure, the rungs are free from debris or liquids. If you are doing a high climb, it never hurts to have another person help balance the ladder - always error on the side of caution. Be sure to scan the work area for potential hazards especially if you're near electrical power lines. Never use a ladder if you are overly tired, injured or under the influence of drugs or alcohol. If you have any reservations about the climb don't do it.

When you begin to climb a ladder make sure that you make a three point climb and always face the front of the ladder, never climb backwards or sideways! For a lot of you climbing a ladder may be "oldhat" but you never know the moment when you will catch your toe and if your hands aren't on the side rails, it will be nearly impossible to catch yourself. Lastly, keep your weight centered between the rails and walk one rung at a time. Climbing a ladder is all about balance and in addition

ladders are designed for the three point climb.

When climbing down a ladder the same three point climb applies. Balance is even more important on the decent. Make sure that you climb down one rung at a time and make sure that your foot is securely on the rung before moving the other foot. Visibility is more difficult on the way down and you may be carrying something that you weren't on the way

Over the years there have been many fatalities caused through negligent ladder safety measures taken by the user. Because some people have successfully used ladders in the past without problems, they develop the attitude that "it can't happen to me". How wrong they are? This is when things do go wrong, and being over confident can be true folly. There is no place in the workplace for a slack attitude as it not only endangers the life of the person with that attitude, but fellow workers as well. If commonsense is used in regard to safety, ladders can be an asset in the workplace. Safety really depends on the user.





PEEKING INTO SAKAKAWEA' CRYSTAL BALL

After taking a peek into the N.D. Game and Fish Department's crystal ball with insight into open water fishing opportunities on Minot area lakes back in mid-April, it's time to bring out that crystal ball again.

This time it's a bigger crystal ball because, as the biggest water body in North Dakota - Lake Sakakawea - and it deserves a bigger crystal ball.

Actually, it's one of the biggest man-made reservoirs in the United States.

The "Big Lake", "Big Water", "Sak", or whatever an angler wants to nickname it, Lake Sakakawea ranks third in size among all manmade reservoirs spanning this great nation.

But back to that big crystal ball: For starters, Lake Sakakawea is one of the "Big Three" when it comes to destination fishing in North Dakota, along with Devils Lake and the Missouri River.

It's not just its size that makes a major fishing destination. It's walleye. Northern pike. Smallmouth bass. Catfish. Salmon.

But before the Big Reveal from the N.D. Game and Fish Department Fisheries Division's Big Crystal Ball, here's some insight into the Big Lake itself: Sakakawea relies heavily on mountain snowpack to fill its gigantic basin, which follows any spring prairie snow melt. Typically Wyoming and Montana mountain snowpack feeding the reservoir reaches its peak in mid-April and runoff begins after that. Sakakawea's elevation often peaks in June. .

This year the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the agency managing the river system, anticipates mountain runoff to be down about 25 to 30 percent overall from its long-term

That doesn't spell good news for the Big Lake but it's still possible more moisture could occur from early May snows or heavy spring rains.

There is good news in the fact that in April 2024 Lake Sakakawea is about 9 feet higher than it was in April 2023. But given the less-than-normal snowpack, "essentially we've (Lake Sakakawea) peaked right now (in elevation)," described Game and Fish Department Missouri River System Fisheries Supervisor Russ Kinzler.

But don't despair, all of that population sampling and research biologists conduct on the lake indicate good numbers of walleye for angling opportunities – the most

popular game fish among North Dakota anglers — in that nice eating size of 15- to 20-inches.

Plus, from a natural reproduction standpoint, population sampling shows about three good year classes of younger, smaller fish for future opportunities. And, yes, Kinzler suggested, there are still some trophy walleye out there. But generally look for more numbers of smaller ones than large lunkers.

Rainbow smelt are the kingpin for forage among most of Sakakawea's predator fish, especially highly desired by walleye and salmon. The good news is population sampling shows good numbers of smelt. The not-so-good news is they're running a bit smaller than usual.

Switching gears to a popular spring fishing opportunity northern pike — Kinzler said those numbers are currently below their long-term average - it might be a slower than usual spring pike bite.

Salmon aren't native to North Dakota and are stocked by the Game and Fish Department. Biologists anticipate they could run smaller size-wise this year. That may reflect the fact that smelt are smaller and they're salmon's primary food source.

But another bright spot, in addition to nice walleye numbers, is Sakakawea's good catfish population. For whatever reason - probably because walleye stole the show among anglers – the native fish just doesn't get the love it received before walleye became more abundant and

And one can't forget about smallmouth bass, which could be considered another underappreciated species among North Dakota anglers. Look for them along rocky or gravelly areas in bays and points for some fun action.

Admittedly, Sakakawea can be intimidating to fish with most anglers opting for boat-fishing rather than shorefishing. But give the "Big Lake", "Big Water", or whatever one calls it, a try.

Boat rentals are available at Fort Stevenson State Park, Garrison, with pontoon rentals at Lake Sakakawea State Park, Pick City, and Indian Hills Resort, Garrison.

And don't forget about shore-fishing. Just because boats tend to be the top choice among many anglers doesn't mean fish aren't catchable from shore or fishing piers.
