Minot Airman becomes first enlisted person selected for Naval Postgraduate School's Emergence Program

Senior Airman Charles Dell, 5th Civil Engineer Squadron (CES) logistics manager, is pioneering as the first enlisted person selected for the Naval Postgraduate School's Homeland Defense and Security Emergence Program. The Emergence Program, conducted in collaboration with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), is a six-month distance learning endeavor that includes two week-long in-person sessions at the postgraduate school.

The program aims to bring together a diverse collection of local, state, and federal government officials to critically think about homeland security, explore emerging trends and initiate change in their organizations. Dell's inclusion in this selective group marked a pivotal moment not just for him, but the broader Air Force community.

"When I saw the email saying I was selected, it hadn't quite hit me just how big of a deal this was," said Dell. "It wasn't until people started explaining how there were five other people interviewed before me and they didn't make the cut. It made it clear to me how competitive just getting accepted into the program

Dell's eyes gleamed with a mixture of determination and excitement, reflecting on the transformative experience the program provided him. Not everyone gets the opportunity to work with multiple government agencies and that honor was not lost on Dell, who described how helpful the diversity of thought was.

"I have the Secret Service, Coast Guard, emergency management, FEMA, local law enforcement, Homeland Security Investigation, and Immigration Customs Enforcement (ICE), and border patrol all in my class," said Dell. "It's all people in public safety. I'm the only enlisted person in the course. So, we're all there to help each other. Each job's different, but we all tie into the bigger picture."

According to Dell, the experience broadened his perspective beyond Air Force personnel and firefighters. That diversity of thought allowed him to start contributing unique insights on nuclear deterrence and Minot AFB's mission within broader government context.

One of the program's focal points is the change initiative, which tasks participants with identifying addressing organizational challenges. Each person in the course identifies an area in their workspace that could be seen as a problem. Then, they work to address possible root causes to that problem before developing and implementing a solution.

This course forces you to start thinking not only about the big picture, but the day-to-day," said Dell. "I know in every workplace there is something that people do on a daily basis, or know about, that could be potentially damaging. Yet, nobody's doing anything about it because nobody wants to confront it. So that's the whole purpose of this course, to recognize those issues and develop solutions for them."

With a new outlook on problem solving instilled by the Emergence Program, Dell went about implementing his change initiative at the 5th CES. After giving it some thought, he noticed that his department did not have a standard operating procedure (SOP) for the program manager to be able to operate under.

"The rules and responsibilities of the program manager have been a gray area in our department," said Dell. "So that's what I'm attacking right now. Whether it's guidelines or something to benefit for continuity purposes, I'm going to be working with my leadership on making sure that there's an SOP in place for the next person to operate under."

While the change initiative is the kind of big picture thinking the program stresses, Dell also made sure to look at the day-to-day processes too, such as transitioning to electronic processes at his department for efficiency.

Taking on this program hasn't come without adversity. Dell's toughest challenge in taking on the program was time management. Balancing program demands with Air Force responsibilities and upcoming coursework can be overwhelming.

"It's graduate level coursework," said Dell. "Not to mention, I have this job, my firefighting responsibilities, I start Airman Leadership School (ALS) this month and then I start emergency medical technicians (EMT) training next month. I've got a lot of things on my plate, and I just have to figure out how to deal with it. Discipline is key. Even if your motivation is gone, if you are disciplined you will get it done. With the proper discipline you can attack everything."

Despite challenges, Dell has persevered as the first enlisted person to participate in this program. His journey serves as an inspiration, embodying the Air Force's commitment to pushing

boundaries and driving change. Dell's acceptance into a selective program and the change initiative he's implemented exemplifies the spirit of innovation and excellence within the Air Force community.

North Dakota is a **Great Classroom**

I have the pleasure of reading Amy Allender's articles before all of you do. Please, take the time to read this week's column, where she talks about the Northern Lights. Her column gave me an idea for my column this week. Back when I was a kid, we would be sitting in the seat of a grain truck waiting for a beckoned call from the combine to unload. We didn't have cell phones back then, so we were in tune to what was going on around us. I only start at this point because it was sitting in a grain truck that I saw my first "all out" display of Northern Lights. I sat on the front of the truck in total amazement. Mother Nature had opened the door to her classroom, and the next day I got out an encyclopedia to learn more about what these Northern Lights were, how they were created, and most important; "will they happen

That memory gave me the idea for my article. You see, North Dakota, with its' four seasons, is truly a great classroom. Let's start with the spring. Right now, you can drive to one of three National Wildlife refuges, Des Lacs, Upper Souris, and J. Clark Sayler, and watch at the many waterfowl start their nesting season. Perched on stands in the middle of a pond of water will be the Canadian geese who have claimed the nesting stand to begin the process of laying eggs and hatching out what will hopefully be a clutch of about goslings. During the summer months you can return and see the mother goose followed by her young. In the fall the goslings will be full -fledged adult geese, ready to take flight and head south for the winter.

Sharing the pond area will be muskrats, who build houses of mud and twigs. Their larger cousins, the North American beaver, also build houses with entrances under the water line. With a pair of good binoculars, you can often catch a female muskrat or beaver leading a couple of youngsters across the water. Again, by winter they will be adults and ready to take on a North Dakota winter. There is so much to learn from a quick walk on one of the nature trails at these wildlife refuges, and with a cell phone you don't need to delay the learning process at all. I have a birding app on my cell phone. On occasion I will see a bird I don't recognize and within minutes can identify and learn about the bird on my cell phone.

Up on the prairie there is another classroom. I used to walk and look for wildflowers. This time of year, there are wild prairie roses, crocuses, wild sunflowers and even some berry plants that bloom before producing berries. Once in a while you will catch a glimpse of a white tail deer, and if you are really lucky,

a doe with a fawn, or even a couple of fawns.

Down at Fort Stevenson, there is a guite a herd of deer that live right in the park. Jump on one of the nature trails that run through the park and more than likely you will run into one of them. Last year one of the does had three fawns. Quite a family. Haven't seen a ringneck pheasant up close. Fort Stevenson is home to many. Also, with such a mild winter, the pheasant population has grown considerably. These are perhaps one of the most beautiful birds that are native to the North Dakota prairies.

I was talking about my classroom experience with the Northern Lights. Well one evening as I gazed out across the newly planted field (we needed to have a truck in the field for planting, too) I saw a female fox going into a hole in the ground. Back to the encyclopedia to learn that the red fox that are common to North Dakota, dig dens to raise their kits. No, not kids, kits. That summer I would make many trips watch as the 5 fox kits grew into adults. They were fun to watch. Soon they would wander away from the den, and the mother fox would be fast to grab and carry or herd them back to the den. It was kind of a sad day when I



returned to the den area, and the fox family was not around.

What is so amazing about our North Dakota outdoor classrooms, is that every year they change. Different animals and maybe a few more flowers change the classroom. Soon I would bring a camera with me to capture photos of the wildlife, or the flowers.

I just gave you a couple of the lessons that can be learned, and the locations of these outdoor classrooms. Truth is, North Dakota is full of classrooms. Your back yard could be a great classroom. Put out a bird feeder or build a bird house and you have a great classroom.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

Anyone who has studied North Dakota history knows that Pembina was the first settlement in what is now North Dakota in 1797. But there's a lot about Pembina that isn't common historical knowledge.

Most of this history can be found in the Pembina State Museum and it proves that Pembina, and the surrounding area have had a colorful past that actually goes back long before Dakota Territory existed.

One example is there is reference to the Red River ox carts that transported goods from St. Paul to Winnipeg. What isn't common knowledge is that this cart was invented in Pembina in 1801. A man named Alexander Henry wrote in his diary that his Metis employees at the Pembina trading post developed the cart.

That Metis cart was responsible

for trade for a lot of years until steamboats began to transport grain on the Red River. It was also responsible for the expansion of fur trade in the west and for the commercialization of the buffalo

The Metis, which are part French and part Chippewa, were never the United States, but are a tribe in Canada. In the early years, the Metis made up nearly the entire population of Pembina and nearby St. Joseph, which later became known as Walhalla.

According to the Metis Museum in Winnipeg, there were approximately 5,000 Metis living in what is now Pembina County in the 1850s, which includes the communities of Pembina, Cavalier and Walhalla. That population was approximately equal to the Metis population of the rest of Rupert's Land, or Terre de Rupert as the Metis called it.

Rupert's Land was a huge British territory that included all of the Hudson's Bay drainage, including Pembina, so the concentration of Metis in that area was significant.

Several hundred residents of North Dakota continue to embrace the Metis heritage. Nearly all of them live in the northeastern counties including Pembina, Cavalier, Towner, Rolette, Walsh and Bottineau.

There may have been many more, but when the U.S./Canada border was established, many Metis relocated north to what is now St. Boniface, Manitoba, a French enclave immediately to the east of Winnipeg that was established in 1818.

In 1863 while the Civil V raging in other parts of the country, European settlers in the Pembina area were fearing attacks by the Sioux tribe following the 1862 Minnesota Uprising. Many Native Americans who participated in that attack were living along the confluence of the Red and Assiniboine rivers, now commonly referred to as the Forks, which is in the city of Winnipeg, 60 miles north of Pembina.

The settlers sent an urgent appeal for protection to Washington, D.C., and later that same year, a mounted battalion was organized to serve the area, that included a portion of northwest Minnesota.

In fact, the 300 Soldiers in the battalion were all Minnesota volunteers. The battalion, nicknamed Hatch's Battalion, reached Pembina on Oct. 6, 1863, and by January 1864, had completed construction of a military post.

Less than a year later, and after the capture of 400 Native Americans, the

post was abandoned. However, in 1870, the War Department directed a post be built on the Red River near the international boundary. Abandonment procedures for that fort began in 1891 and in 1895, a fire destroyed most of the buildings.

The community of Pembina was officially established in 1843 and the first post office was established in 1851. By 1860, one year before Dakota Territory was established; Pembina was the most populous place in what is now North Dakota.

It had roughly 3,000 more people than the city of Winnipeg did at the same time. Today, Winnipeg's population is equal to that of all of North Dakota. Today fewer than 600 call Pembina home.

Most of Pembina's earliest permanent settlers were from Canada, or were involved with Canada/U.S. trade operations. After the Treaty of Ghent established the 49th parallel as the international boundary, Pembina became a gateway of commerce between the two nations in the late 1800s.

Pembina continues to serve as a major port of entry between the U.S. and Canada and at times has been the fifth busiest port of entry along the U.S./Canada border.

"Sorry that took so long," my husband said as he came through the front door at 11:37 p.m. I was on the couch surrounded by freshly folded laundry, when he held out the keys and asked, "Are you going?"

"No. I'm too lazy and too tired," I replied.

"You waited up. I think you should go."

Two weeks ago, Minot was in the path of an epic solar storm. In all my years of living here, I'd never seen the northern lights—but I was determined that this time would be different.

My husband had needed to head into work "for a bit" around 9 p.m. I thought I'd stay awake and leave to see the lights upon his return. I was finally going to do it, and I was sure it would be magical. As the hours passed, my zeal faded. By 11 p.m., I had scrolled through Facebook groups, seen everyone else's gorgeous photos, and read captions about how easy the lights were to spot—even close to town.

By 11:30 p.m my eyelids were growing heavy, and I had convinced myself the lights were just as good seen through a screen while eating cereal in my PJs on the couch.

By the time the door opened, I had decided sleep trumped a natural wonder.

When I explained this to my husband, he just jingled the keys and said, "That's the lamest thing I've ever heard. Go put some shoes on."


So, I did. And it was a magical night, but not I the way I expected.

When I started driving north, the first thing I noticed was the traffic. The amount of headlights streaming out of the darkness was comical. Was everyone in Hotdish Land awake? There was an energy in the air, we were all out of bed, headed into the dark, driving home from the dark. All searching the sky for the same shared experience.

Near the base, I stopped. What I saw looked more like a mist than a light show. It was nearly 1 a.m., if I'd made it this far, I figured I might as well keep going.

Without a real plan, I turned toward Lake Darling. I fell in line with the other cars, still streaming

down the country road. We drove further into the blackness, still looking toward the sky.

When I finally got to Lake Darling, I turned into a crowded lot. It was after 1 a.m., and everyone was there. Honestly, as I leaned against my car, staring into the sky, I was underwhelmed. It was way past my bedtime, and I still couldn't see much more than a hazy glow. I'd come all this way, only to have missed it.

That's when it dawned on me. Maybe, on this night, the magic wouldn't be in the sky—but rather in seeing something so pure create so much awe. Maybe the magic would be seeing how nature has the ability to bring us together, creating moments—even in the middle of an otherwise mundane night—to cultivate conversation, relationships, and wonder. Maybe the magic would simply be the

reminder of how good it is to be human—to seek out the unique, appreciate the unusual, and revel in the smell of fresh, spring air.

For a long while, I just stood with my eyes closed, taking in the hum of activity and the stillness of the night. Then I climbed back in my car, ready to head home.

I circled back to Minot past Berthold. It was out there, near the sign pointing to DeLacs, that I glanced up at the sky and stopped again. That's where I finally laid eyes on the northern lights. For the first time in nearly a decade of NoDak living, I saw what all the fuss was about.

It's a night I'll never forget. Not only because of the lights but also the time spent searching for them with what seemed like everyone else in Hotdish Land. The sky was magical, but the real magic, for me, rests in the reminder of nature's ability to bind us together and help us feel fully alive.







Car Maintenance Guidelines

BATTERY

Today, most car batteries are maintenance-free, sealed, and can last more than three years. The first sign your battery should be replaced is often trouble starting the

TIRES

A car tire inflated to 35 pounds per square inch (psi) can lose one psi every month or for every 10 degrees Fahrenheit of temperature change, so your car maintenance checklist should include checking tire pressure. Find the recommended level in the owner's manual or sticker on the driver's side door jamb. And don't forget the spare.

Rotate tires every 6,000 miles to prevent uneven wear, replace them when they become worn and have the alignment checked if the car pulls to either side when driving or if you notice uneven tire wear.

ENGINE OIL

Checking and changing oil is critical to keep today's engines running properly and efficiently. Follow manufacturer guidelines for changing the lubricant generally, every 3,000 miles or three to six months.

Check the oil level with the engine off and the car parked on a level surface. Open the hood, remove the dipstick, wipe it clean with a cloth or paper towel, then return it to the oil reservoir. Take it out again and see whether the level is within the acceptable range marked on the dipstick. If you add oil, don't overfill, damaging the engine.

TRANSMISSION FLUID

Checking the automatic transmission fluid is another essential item on the car maintenance checklist. Look for a reservoir marked ATF (automatic transmission fluid) and follow the same steps as monitoring the oil level — only this time, with the engine running. Follow manufacturer's recommendations for change intervals, about every 30,000 miles.

ENGINE COOLANT

Replace most engine coolant or antifreeze every 30,000 miles - or every two to three years. Newer formulas,

however, may last up to 50,000 miles. Turn the car off and wait for the engine to cool to check the coolant level. Locate the coolant reservoir (usually a translucent plastic tank) and eyeball the level of the coolant against the full and low indicators.

POWER STEERING FLUID

Power steering fluid should be changed every three years or 50,000 miles. If you have a power steering fluid reservoir, check the level visually; otherwise, follow the dipstick method. Low power steering fluid may indicate a leak, so have your mechanic take a look.

BRAKES AND BRAKE FLUID

Check to ensure that brake fluid levels are within tolerance. How often you need to replace brake pads or other components depends on your driving and typical driving conditions. A brake problem warning signs include noise, vibration, or "grabbing" when you apply the brakes. Working on your brakes is a job probably best left to the professionals.

AIR FILTER

Basic car maintenance suggests changing your air filter each year or every 12,000-15,000 miles. A clean air filter can help your engine "breathe" better, improve gas mileage, and reduce harmful emissions.

FUEL FILTER

Replace it annually to help prevent debris from clogging your car's fuel line.

WINDSHIELD WIPERS AND WIPER FLUID

Windshield wiper care is one of the most neglected basic car care tips. Replace the blades every six to 12 months or whenever the rubber becomes worn. Check the wiper fluid reservoir every week or so and keep it full.

HEADLIGHTS AND BRAKE LIGHTS

With your car running and parked, have someone walk around to see that your lights are working - headlights, brake and tail lights, turn signals, etc. Replacing bulbs in today's vehicles can be a challenge. Have a mechanic do the job, mainly replacing and aiming headlights. A pro also knows if the problem is a blown fuse, not a burnedout bulb.

Town Hall Rundown

The town hall meetings are the perfect place to find out about a lot of the upcoming changes coming to Minot AFB. Here's what was discussed at the recent Town Hall meeting on May 16 by Col. Hoadley, Col. McGhee, and Minot's own Mayor Tom Ross.

There were many concerns brought up both virtually and in person. Questions like will the commissary expand, do Minot's local businesses have plans to extend their hours, will we get a Chick-fil-A, and more was asked. There were also some more sensitive concerns brought up about what more could be done to help combat alcohol misuse and mental health issues facing airmen, as well as a concern about an incident someone witnessed firsthand. Every issue brought up was addressed and taken seriously. Those with issues that needed greater attention were also asked to stay after the meeting to discuss the problems more throughly. Mayor Tom Ross stated, he needs the issues brought up to him so that they can be addressed immediately. That is why these town meetings are so important, if base leadership and the Mayor are not informed of any concerns or problems they cannot work to resolve the matter.

Col. Hoadley, Col. McGhee, and Mayor Tom Ross were excited to share the progress and news of what's been going on and what changes were happening at Minot

Hoadley announced that while the Commissary is looking at possibly providing a door dash type delivery to bring sandwiches to the flight line, there are no current plans to expand the commissary or exchange facilities.

Some improvements coming to MAFB facilities includes the new track that is projected to be finished by the end of June. It will also be gaining a bubble covering that will keep it open for use during all four seasons with air conditioning in the summer and heat in the winter. The Turf will also be getting some additional workout equipment.

Unfortunately, the work force shortage has affected many local businesses and therefore they cannot extend their hours. Mayor Tom Ross stated that while the Chamber and State are working together to try to find a solution, the shorter hours are the "new normal" for now.

There are no immediate plans for a Chick-fil-A here in Minot. For now it looks like we can visit Bismarck or Fargo for our Chick-fil-A needs, but we can always hope that one day Chick-fil-A does come to Minot.

The issue of suicide prevention and alcohol misuse is being taken extremely seriously. Mayor Tom

Ross mentioned that community partners are working on organizing a one-day symposium, at MSU on September 30, which will provide educational training to professionals. It will focus on working with Veterans, Active Duty, and First Responders.

The base had a team of specialists from AFPC, Air University, and headquarters Air Force come and make recommendations on what could be done differently. Some of the recommendations included restructuring data on risk factors, creating action plans, restructuring the sponsor program, and issues with manning in mental health and the chapel, and the cold weather

Col. Hoadley and Mayor Tom Ross mentioned the success of Home for the Holidays. Last year 115 airline tickets were purchased to

send Airmen home for the holidays. There was also talk of Northern

Neighbors Day being planned for

next year, which will hopefully involve rebuilding the air show.

At the end of the meeting the audience was told they could stay back and ask any other questions they preferred to ask one on one. Every voice matters, every concern is taken into careful consideration. One example of how your concerns are truly heard is that a woman in the audience shared her gratitude to Col. Hoadley and Col. McGhee for fixing a need she expressed at a previous Town Hall meeting. She stated that her family, as well as other families on base, would benefit from a fenced in park for smaller children to play. She thanked them for how quickly they addressed that need and installed that fenced in playground. So don't miss out on the next Town Hall meeting, whether in person or virtually your concerns could be shared by many and bringing attention to them could help leadership make this base a better place for everyone.

However, with springtime comes another nuisance for pet owners: bugs. There are a variety of pests that can be detrimental to your furry friend's health, and it's important to take the proper precautions to be sure no unwanted critters are making it into your home or on your pet!

Some of the most common bugs that can cause harm to your pet include ticks, mosquitoes, spiders, and fleas. And just like humans, some animals can be highly allergic to stings and bites from everyday bugs. Here are a few measures you can take to help protect

 Prevent fleas and ticks with one of the many veterinar ian-approved products available. There are a variety of applications, including collars, shampoos, topical treatments, and even pills/chewables. Consult a specialist to determine which method is best for your pet.

Check your pets! It's especially important to give them a once-over after they've spent time in grassy or wooded areas, but even a trip to the dog park or trail can warrant a look. Be sure to check in all the nooks and crannies, feel for abnormal bumps, and keep an eye out for itching, swelling, or lethargy.

 Regularly clean your house and keep your yard mowed and maintained to prevent bugs from nesting. If your pet has a hypersensitivity to bee stings, it may

 When in doubt, contact your vet. It you notice symp toms of an allergic reaction (itching, swelling, difficulty breathing, vomiting, etc.) be sure to call immediately. It's important to have an emergency veterinarian set up just in case your pet is having a severe reaction. Some clinics that offer emergency services nearby include: Pinkerton Animal Hospital, Core Veterinary Clinic, and Rugby Veterinary Services. Due to the amount of pets in Minot versus the number of emergency vets available, it's imperative to catch any reactions as soon as possible to give yourself time to drive to an emergency clinic further away, if need be. Early detection can also prevent worse conditions that can seriously harm your pet if left untreated.

In North Dakota, the most common types of ticks are the Black Legged (or Deer) Tick, the American Dog Tick, and the Brown Dog Tick. Venomous spiders include the Western Black Widow and Brown Recluse, but they are not seen too often in household settings. Fleas are often transmitted from other carriers such as other pets or wild animals. And as many residents know, North Dakota is full of mosquitoes and other biting/stinging bugs, so it's never a bad idea to stay vigilant, not only for the health of your pet, but for your home and family







When the team was deciding their name back in November, they looked to the Minot community for name suggestions. They wanted a name that was fun, unique, highlighted a key aspect of Minot culture, and a name that symbolizes female empowerment. While the queen bee took the cake of the official team name, the Minot Bombshells was a clear second place, highlighting all of those key characteristics.



Minot Air Force Base Spouses' Club **To Award Scholarships**

Program Resumes After Two Years

For Desiree Ottinger the expense of having kids in college is real, and so is the search for scholarships to help defray the expense of going to college. That reality was perhaps part of the driving force behind her helping to get the Minot Spouses' Club scholarship program back on track and awarding \$12,000 in scholarships this year.

"We have about 40 members and are honestly in the middle of rebuilding the Spouses' Club" shares Ottinger "before 2020 it was a very thriving club, and then 2020 hit and everything just kind of stopped because it had to. We're still kind of building back from that.'

But there was an upside to the lack of activity, that being that the Thrift Store, which the Spouses' Club runs, kept making money, but there were no scholarships, or really any activity "we had this fund that just kind of built up so this year we had about \$15,000 ear marked for scholarships" continues Ottinger "and it was important to put that scholarship money out, because that's part of our purpose."

But the scholarships are not the club's only purpose "we do so many other things, but the scholarships are a huge part of what the club does, giving back to our dependents."

The Thrift Store, as the name implies, sells consigned items, used and new, at a greatly reduced rate. "We have everything in the Thrift Store streamlined, like it's \$3.00 for anything that is adult clothing, any clothing. For our toddlers and infants there is a different price. The nicest things you find in the Thrift Store is something nice that someone had donated, and you'll find if for about 10% of the online cost; like say if it was something that was \$200.00, the most you are going to pay is \$20.00" according to Ottinger.


During PCS season the back room will get full, and the staff, all volunteers, try to get it out on the floor as soon as possible and in Ottinger's opinion "we have some really great stuff.'

Besides scholarships the Minot Spouses' Club has a summer reading program and just recently partnered with FSS for the family fun night on base, "We just sponsored the purple chords for the graduating military children. We took part of the \$15,000 and paid for purple chords this year and hopefully next year." The donation makes sure that all graduating military family seniors will receive a purple chord on graduation day at no charge.

This year the scholarship program awarded 3-\$2,000 scholarships, 3-\$1,250.00 scholarships, and 3-\$750 dollar scholarships.

School advisors were made aware of the scholarship program. In addition, counselors at Magic City Campus, Bishop Ryan and several other high schools were contacted. The club also used social media for marketing the scholarships. "Being it was the first year back, we had to really get it out there" says Ottinger.

CITIZENS OF MINOT & MINOT AFB WORK TOGETHER TO FACE SOURIS RIVER FLOOD

MAY 31, 2011

In early 2011, concerns of flooding began as local rivers and creeks ran abnormally high due to high soil content, above average snow pack, and persistent precipitation. The city of Minot began emergency operations on May 23, and by the 31st, a mandatory evacuation began. Over 10,000 residents of Minot, including over 500 offbase Airmen and families, evacuated to higher ground. The city partnered with Minot Air Force Base

personnel and the North Dakota National Guard to set up flood walls and provide aid to displaced families in the area. According to FEMA, about 11,456 acres of Ward County land were covered in anywhere between two to 15 feet of water, causing nearly \$700 million in damages. Minot AFB provided temporary emergency shelter for military members, DoD civilians and families who were unable to secure other arrangements. The 2011 flood was a tragedy of its own, but it proved the strong partnership and sense of community that Team Minot shares with the city.







Consider this partial list of just a few summer activities, including some in area North Dakota State

•May 25 through 27: Sky Fest over Fort Stevenson: Heaven knows North Dakota has enough wind to host a kite festival, which is exactly what takes place Memorial Day weekend at Garrison's Fort Stevenson State Park. Go to the festival's website (www.skyfestnd.com) for details. While there is a daily park entrance fee (or N.D. Parks and Recreation Department statewide annual pass), the festival is free.

•May 25: Hatchery Fun Day is another Memorial Day weekend event, a tradition at Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery. Just head downstream of Garrison Dam west of Riverdale on N.D. Highway 200. The hatchery does some amazing things for sportfish and threatened and endangered fish species so it's a chance to see what their biologists do while having fun with a variety of family activities. It's free and starts at 9 a.m.

Speaking of the hatchery, free tours will be held from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays.

•June 8: Lewis and Clark State Park east of Williston celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2024, kicking off bright and early at 8 a.m. at its Dog Park with the Dog

Seriously, what better way to start a celebration than with one's favorite four-legged pooch, a morning at the

North Dakota might not be the mecca of big name Dog Park, and Lake Sakakawea? Canine participants can win prizes for the Best Dressed Dog, Waggiest Dog, and

> From there, it's the choice of a "Dinosaur Dig" at the park's Swim Beach or children can head to the marina for a Kid's Fishing Derby, both starting at 10 a.m.

> Hot dogs top the noon menu with park staff dishing out the summer favorite at Elk Point Shelter. Suzie Q's Ice Cream Truck serves from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. In addition, Jump 'n Fun Inflatables will be set up from noon to 8 p.m. along with a variety of family games.

No celebration is complete without music so Lewis and Clark State Park caps off its celebration with dancing and tunes beginning at 3 p.m. when the Mooncats take stage followed by Josie and the Whalers at 4 p.m.

Like other state parks, Lewis and Clark has a daily entrance fee or annual pass for admission but it's still pretty cheap family entertainment.

•June 20: Blue Goose Day is another North Dakota summer tradition. It's hosted by Audubon National Wildlife Refuge and features a variety of outdoor educational activities for children. It's also free and is held at the refuge's Visitor Center, which in itself is worth seeing.

The refuge is located a mile east of U.S. Highway 83 along the south shore of Lake Audubon. Look for the brown Visitor Center sign as well as the sign indicating the refuge hosts a segment of the National North Country Trail. Contac the refuge, (701) 442-5474, for details.

Whew, that's just a few things going on and it's not even beyond the month of June.

Don't forget other places like Theodore Roosevelt National Park, both the North and South units.

And don't neglect the Turtle Mountains. Yes, North Dakota has mountains but just remember it's all a matter of scale when it comes to mountains and elevation.
