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Knighthawks Return Home from BTF 24-3

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - The 69th Bomb Squadron's Knighthawks have returned home to Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota from their Bomber Task Force deployment to Royal Air Force Base Fairford, UK, June 26,

BTF 24-3 was composed of 213 Airmen and four B-52H Stratofortress strategic bombers. The Knighthawks racked up hundreds of flight hours during 24 sorties across three geographic combatant commands over the course of the six week deployment. The missions executed allowed for the squadron's aircrews, maintainers, and support personnel to integrate with numerous NATO Allies and partners for military exercises.

"BTF 24-3 has been a great success. We executed a diverse set of missions and exercised muscles that we don't often get to back home." explained Lt. Col. Brandon Wheeler, commander of the 69th Bomb Squadron. "Simply put, we've achieved every objective and goal that we came out here to accomplish."

The deployed force provided U.S. and NATO leaders with strategic options to assure and enhance military relations throughout the NATO Alliance. The regular

and routine deployment of U.S. strategic bombers provides critical touchpoints to train and operate alongside Allies and partners.

"The ability to integrate and work alongside our Allied nations and partners cannot be understated," said Wheeler. "Building these relationships now is why the NATO Alliance will continue to operate as a strong, cohesive force well into the future."

BTF 24-3 directly integrated and worked with 16 Allied and partner nations over the course of the deployment. Participating countries included Bahrain, Canada, Cyprus, Denmark, Eygpt, France, Germany, Lithuania, Morocco, Norway, Poland, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Sweden, the United Arab Emirates, and the United Kingdom.


The strategic relationship between the U.S. and its Allies creates interoperability that is critical to promoting international peace and security cooperation. BTF 24-3's missions directly functioned to strengthen that shared foundation of values, experiences, and vision for the future.


"I couldn't be prouder of the Knighthawks and every one involved that made this deployment a definitive success," said Wheeler.

If you are into day trip hiking, the Fort Union area is a perfect destination. There are several overlooks on the bluffs around the confluence and Fort Union area. There are several unmarked trails.

we have never seen before, you stood your ground, spoke loudly, and the bottom line is you care for your community. Thank you.



NOTES ON BEING SAFE

WHAT IS **LOCK OUT/TAG OUT?**

Have you ever been to a job site, or even a local business when you hear someone call out "Hey Joe, be sure to lock and tag out that piece of equipment?" or "You better deenergize that system before you work on it!"

This common practice is known throughout the industrial and non-industrial world as Lockout/ Tagout, better known as LOTO. So what is LOTO?

Lockout-Tagout is a safety procedure which is used in industry and research settings to ensure that dangerous machines are properly shut off and not started up again prior to the completion of maintenance or servicing work. It requires that hazardous power sources be "isolated and rendered inoperative" before any repair procedure is started. "Lock and tag" works in conjunction with a lock usually locking the device or the power source with the hasp, and placing it in such a position that no hazardous power sources can be turned on. The procedure requires that a tag be affixed to the locked device indicating that it should not be turned on.

Modern machinery can contain many hazards to workers, from things like electrical, mechanical, pneumatic or hydraulic sources. For example a typical industrial machine may contain things like hot fluids, moving presses, blades, propellers, electrical heaters, conveyor belts with pinch points, moving chains, ultraviolet light, etc. Disconnecting or making safe the equipment involves the removal of all energy sources and is known as isolation. The steps necessary to isolate equipment are often documented in an Isolation Procedure or a Lockout Tagout Procedure. The isolation procedure generally includes the following tasks:

- 1. Identify the energy source(s) 2. Isolate the energy source(s)
- 3. Lock and/or Tag the energy
- source(s) 4. Prove that the equipment

isolation is effective

Modern safety manufacturers provide a range of isolation devices specifically designed to fit various switches, valves and effectors. For example most modern circuitbreakers have a provision to have a small padlock attached to prevent their activation. For other devices such as ball or gate valves, plastic pieces which either fit against the pipe and prevent movement, or

clam-shell style objects, which

completely surround the valve and prevent its manipulation are used. A common feature of these devices is their bright color, usually red to increase visibility and allow workers to readily see if a device is isolated. Also, the devices are usually of such a design and construction to prevent it being removed with any moderate force. That is to say that an isolation device does not have to stand up to a chainsaw, but if an operator forcibly removes it, it will be immediately visible that it has been tampered with.


With all this information, you are probably asking yourself " How does this program apply to me?" Employees can be seriously or fatally injured if machinery they service or maintain unexpectedly energizes, starts up, or releases stored energy. OSHA's standard on the Control of Hazardous Energy (LOTO), can be located in Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 1910.147. This regulation spells out the steps all employers must take to prevent accidents associated with hazardous energy. The

standard addresses practices and procedures necessary to disable machinery and prevent the

release of potentially hazardous

energy while maintenance or servicing activities are performed. With this being said you may ask yourself "if I unplug a radio or microwave oven after use, do I need LOTO?' No you do Exposure to hazardous energy is controlled completely by unplugging the equipment from an electric outlet and where the employee doing the service or maintenance has exclusive control of the plug. This applies only if electricity is the only form of hazardous energy to which employees may be exposed. This exception encompasses many portable hand tools and some cord and plug connected machinery and equipment.

In closing, when dealing with LOTO and you are not sure, do not hesitate to ask for assistance. The shop supervisor, the person doing the actual work, or the Wing Safety office can provide more extensive detail concerning LOTO in your work center.





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Oil Change Tips

It is recommended that you get an oil change on your vehicle every 3,500 miles for regular oil and every 5,000 miles for synthetic oil. Checking and changing the oil is essential to keep today's engines working properly and efficiently. Check the oil level with the engine and the car parked on a flat surface. Open the hood, remove the dipstick, wipe off with a cloth towel or paper, then back into the oil tank. Pull it again and see if the level is within the acceptable range marked on the dipstick. If you add the oil yourself, do not overfill. Overfilling can damage the engine.

Most automobile manufacturers recommend oil changes every year or 7,500 miles of car and light truck gasoline engines. The usual recommendation is diesel engines and turbocharged gasoline engines every 3,000 miles or six

You'll find that a once-a-year (7,500-mile) oil change is for vehicles driven in ideal circumstances. Most of us think "normal" driving is "severe service" driving. This includes frequent short trips (less than 10 miles, especially in cold weather), stop-and-go city traffic driving, driving in dusty conditions (gravel roads, etc.), and sustained highway driving speed during the warm season. For this type of driving behavior, the recommendation is to change the oil every 3,000 miles or six months.

For maximum protection, most oil companies say to change the oil every 3,000 miles or three to six months regardless of what type of driving you do. Regular oil changes for preventative maintenance are cheap insurance against engine wear and will always save you money in the long run if you keep a car for more than three or four years. It's very uncommon to see an engine well-maintained with regular oil changes develop significant bearing, ring, cam, or valve problems under 100,000 miles.

What About The Oil Filter?

To reduce the costs of vehicle ownership and maintenance, many car makers say the oil filter only needs to be replaced at every other oil change. Most mechanics will tell you this is a false economy.

The oil filters on most engines today have been downsized to save weight, cost, and space. The "standard" quart-sized filter that was once common on most engines has been replaced by a pint-sized (or smaller) filter. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure out that a smaller filter has less total filtering capacity. Even so, the little filters should be adequate for 3,000-mile oil change intervals — but may run out of capacity long before a second oil change at 6,000 or 15,000 miles.

Therefore, replacing the oil filter every time the oil is changed is highly recommended.

Filter Replacement

If you do your oil changes, make sure you get the correct filter for your engine. Follow the filter manufacturer's listings in its catalog. Many filters that look the same on the outside have different internal valving. Many overhead cam engines, for example, require an "anti-drain-back" valve in the filter to prevent oil from draining out of the filter when the engine is shut off. This allows oil pressure to reach critical engine parts more quickly when restarted. Filters that are mounted sideways on the engine typically require an anti-drain-back

Used motor oil should be disposed of properly. The Environmental Protection Agency does not consider used motor oil to be a hazardous chemical, but it can foul groundwater and contain traces of lead. The best way to dispose of used motor oil is to take it to a service station, quick lube shop, parts store, or another recycling facility. Your old oil will either be re-refined into other lubricants or petroleum products or burned as fuel.

Do not dump used motor oil on the ground, down a drain, into a storm sewer, or place it in the trash. Many landfills will not accept used motor oil even if it is in a sealed container because it will eventually leak out into the ground. If you can't find an environmentally-acceptable way to dispose of the stuff, maybe you shouldn't change your oil. Service facilities that do oil changes have storage tanks and recycling programs to dispose of used oil.

It is recommended that you get an Oil Change on your vehicle every 3,500 miles for regular oil and every 5,000 miles for synthetic oil. Checking and changing the oil is essential to keep today's engines working properly and efficiently.

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

Dip fish fillets first in the flour mixture, then the eggs and then the panko mixture.

Place fish sticks in oil and fry for about 3 to 4 minutes, or until they reach an internal temperature of 140°. Enjoy!



MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - You've entered a lobby full of diverse characters, and everyone is eager for the match to start. You start to feel at ease as the announcer counts down. That day's stressors wash away with each victorious scream and every defeated wail. Here in the arena, everyone can be a competitor regardless of background.

Over 86% of Airmen between the ages of 18-34 identify as gamers. Air Force Gaming was started as an initiative to help Airmen and Guardians of all ages, ranks and backgrounds find common ground through video games, promoting mental acuity, fine motor coordination and competitive excellence.

For some, video games have become a way not only to destress but also to increase their communication skills. At Minot AFB, a team of four Airmen, U.S. Air Force Capt. Nicholas Gutierrez, Senior Airman Jacob Bass, Senior Airman Angel Garcia, and Airman 1st Class Luke Townsend, are using learned and refined communication skills to create an Esports team, which has been competing nationally against teams from other Air Force bases.

Their first tournament together as a team was a very surreal but awesome experience, explained Bass. It was his first time meeting his teammates, Townsend and Garcia, in person but the gaming setup made connecting as a team much easier. They did not lose a single match in that entire tournament. Win after win, it seemed like Team Minot would be an unstoppable

The Minot AFB Esports team's achievements are a testament to their hard work and skill, demonstrated well at the 2024 Eastern Regional **Esports** Invitational, hosted at Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi, where they qualified for the Continental United States Championship.

The 2024 EREI attracted over 1200 attendees, who witnessed eight Air Force Gaming teams compete. Each team was made up of Airmen from different bases who had proven their skills in communication and teamwork. The success of the EREI left fans excited for the next stage of this competition and future events in an ever-growing sport. The west qualifiers will be held on July 12-13 at Hill Air Force Base, Utah, and the finals are not too far away in August.

According to the Air Force's core value of "Excellence In All We Do", teamwork is essential to triumph at every level. Airmen amid an intense battle against a competing team must be able to maintain good communication. Some might say that the winner of a competitive Esports match is the team that communicates the best.

"Just like the real world, if your comms are not on point and you and your team aren't on the same page, bad things can happen such as fratricide," Bass said. "During the tournament when I had a moment where I did not communicate that I was throwing a nade [grenade] and stuck my teammate, Nick in the back of the head leading to a

Communication skills can be developed in many ways. Some gamers have found that video games can be the catalyst to honing those skills and becoming more effective communicators in their careers and everyday lives.

"Every day I have the opportunity to work with people from all over the world, and through gaming I've had previous experience with all sorts of backgrounds," said Gutierrez. "So, I've leveraged these experiences to work well with individuals from all walks of life successfully."

Each member of Team Minot's Esports plays a major role in the global deterrence mission. From a defender securing one of the nation's most important assets, a B-52H weapons system operator who, if called upon, is prepared to utilize said asset, to the maintainer

who ensures the tools needed for the mission are ready at a moment's notice. All these jobs require precise communication in a very highstress environment with many different members from different organizations and backgrounds.

"The communication skills I have improved through gaming on such a lethal team, is always telling your team what you see, what your current actions are, and what you are going to do," said Bass. "Being Security Forces, if I don't communicate my actions well to my team the consequences could be deadly. Re-capture exercises can be very chaotic but gaming with my team in a similar but different environment has helped prepare me to use the smooth and decisive communication needed for a successful mission."

Gaming has offered a unique and engaging platform for honing communication Through strategic collaboration in multiplayer games, navigating complex narratives, and adapting to unforeseen challenges, players can unknowingly cultivate their abilities to communicate in a real-world setting crucially and effectively. Whether you're a seasoned gamer or new to the world, consider the untapped potential within your controller or keyboard—the power to level up not just within your character, but within yourself.









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No More Ops Groups, Allvin Says, Promising First 'Combat Wings' in '26

The Air Force is eliminating grouplevel Operations and Maintenance streamlining makeup of squadrons and wings, Chief of Staff Gen. David W. Allvin said June 14, revealing the latest twist in the drive to more effectively project combat power.

Dozens of such commands, usually led by colonels, exist today across the Air Force. But as Allvin oversees the "re-optimization" of Air Force combat power for great power competition, leaders group-level commands don't have a place in a structure where wings could deploy as a unit, then disperse squadrons or smaller units in a "hub-and-spoke" agile combat employment scheme.

"We're talking about having a doctrine of mission command that means empowering at the lowest competent level, giving left and right limits-commander's intent-and letting them leverage their initiative," Allvin said. "Those squadrons need to be able to exercise that. And sometimes, if there's another level of command between the squadron commander and the wing command, the group command maybe might be helping them out too much.

"If you're a group commander, what do you want to be when you grow up? A wing commander. How do you do that? Well, you make sure your squadrons are all the best. So maybe you might be helping them out and succeeding and not letting them fail forward in training.

The colonels that previously commanded groups will instead move to wing staffs, where they will focus on "the operational warfighting and joint warfighting functions," Allvin said. The aim is to help them become better joint leaders, something Allvin believes is necessary for the Air Force to take a leading role in the future of warfare.

"I think it's our responsibility not only to be good participants in the joint force, but I also think the Air Force should start having maybe perhaps a greater leadership role,"

The change is not a small one, Allvin acknowledged, and will require the service to revamp some of its processes. Officers' career paths may have to change, and professional military education will have to shift to emphasize the operational level for commanders and their staff.

Doing so, though, will help align

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the Air Force better with the other services Allvin predicted. It will also make sense for the service's new combat wings, the "unit of action" leaders first unveiled in February as part of their "Re-Optimization for Great Power Competition."

At the AFA Warfare Symposium, officials said they will break down all of the Air Force's operational wings into three categories:

Wings: Deployable Combat Complete units that can deploy together, with their own native command-and-control, mission, and support elements

In-Place Combat Wings (ICW): Complete units with command, mission, and support elements that fight from their home station.

Combat Generation Wings (CGW): Units that provide force elements to Deployable Combat Wings, whether those elements entail command and control, mission, or service support elements.

The goal, leaders explained at the time, is to move away from the current system where Airmen are pulled from dozens of different units to fill out one expeditionary wing, only meeting and working together once they arrive in theater. Eventually, entire wings will train and deploy as one singular unit. The service is taking a phased approach to get there, first introducing Expeditionary Air Base teams pulled from a smaller group of bases, and now planning to move to Air Task Forces, who will pull forces from only two or three bases.

The locations of the first six Air Task Forces were announced in May and are scheduled to start deploying in late 2025 and early 2026. The timeline for implementing combat wings is "pretty dynamic right now," Allvin told reporters, but the goal is to have enough in place ready to

go when the Air Task Forces start to wrap up-sometime around the fall of 2026.

Like the Air Task Forces, some of the first combat wings will deploy to the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility. But make no mistake, Allvin said, they are not designed for the typical CENTCOM structure of large central bases from which all airpower is generated.

"We're optimizing for the pacing challenge. So this construct is best suited for going over and doing deterrence exercises or actually having to go over and employ Agile Combat Employment against the pacing challenge of China," Allvin said June 13 at an AFA Warfighters in Action event.

A central tenet of Agile Combat Employment is dispersing smaller teams to operate from remote or austere airfields-and Allvin told reporters that it makes sense for the combat wing's staff to act as the hub while squadrons go to the spokes.

"If we're going to actually expect these wings to go and be able to do these maneuver functions in the hub and spoke locations, then we need them to have a different set of specialties," Allvin said. That drove the decision to fold group commanders into the wing staffs.

Deployable Combat Wings will be the principal "units of action" presented to combatant commands, not every wing will be designated as such. Some will be Combat-Generation Wings, which might lack the command-and-control functions of a combat wing, but provide plugand-play combat capability to those wings that can deploy as a unit. Allvin said USAF leaders are still determining how much combat airpower each Deployable Combat Wing will need.

Still other wings will deploy in

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

place. These could include any wing that can operate globally from its home station, including bomber and cyber units, among others.

"We don't want to have a Deployable Combat Wing that's got two airplanes in it just because we've got to spread them around," Allvin said. "So finding the right number of platforms around which you can

do the command element and then the sustainment element is going to be key, but it starts off with, what are the requirements? And then what are we resourced to do?"

Service leaders plan to make a decision on how many Deployable Combat Wings they'll start with by this fall, Allvin told Air & Space Forces Magazine.

OPERATION NEW TAPE

JULY 8, 1960




USAF C-130 from the 40th Tactical Airlift Squadron loads up Swedish troops who were deployed to Congo on July 20, 1960. (UN Photo)

In 1960, the Belgian Congo, a colony in West Central Africa, was granted independence and became the Republic of the Congo. Due to a power-sharing struggle between two opposing political parties and continuing unrest, a civil war broke out. The United Nations deployed troops to help keep the peace as the nation was torn apart. In order to evacuate refugees from the Belgian colony, Operation NEW TAPE began on July 8, 1960. The operation evacuated over 300 American civilians, delivered more UN troops, and flew other humanitarian relief missions. USAF in Europe provided

medical air support. The 317th Tactical Hospital Detachment from Evreux Air Base, France, even set up a dispensary. C-130s and C-124s from various American and European squadrons were used to airlift over 1,000 tons of food and over 2,500 refugees. Operation NEW TAPE lasted four years and at the time, became the biggest airlift since the Berlin Arilift.

Try pitching jigs and minnows or plastics in 3 to 12 feet or pulling Lindy rigs in 20 to 30 feet. Fair pike shore-fishing activity in Steinke, Centennial, and Garrison bays. Work along weed lines in 15 to 20 feet on Lake Audubon for walleye with spinners or slow death hooks and n'ightcrawlers. Also try leeches on a plain Lindy rig with bottom bouncer. No muskie reports yet.

• Lake Sakakawea, Indian Hills Resort, Garrison: Work deeper water for walleye and mix up bait presentations with an inconsistent bite, likely due to weather fronts.

•Láke Sakakawea, New Town: Walleye activity slowed in the Van Hook Arm, possibly due to weather fronts, but somewhat improving success in the river portion of the lake

•Lake Sakakawea, Van Hook Bait & Tackle: Fair walleye bite with most success still on minnows, which is unusual for this time of year. Bite is inconsistent, probably due to weather fronts, but try working 16 to 22 feet throughout the Van Hook Arm.

• Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace continues producing walleye in the spillway channel and hole. Lots of small ones so sort through for the keepers. Try a variety of bait. Move around using crankbaits to locate bigger fish. Some catfish, as well. Try the chutes at night with 3-way swivels or from shore off the rocks using crankbaits. Walleye spread out in a wide range of depths on the east end of Lake Sakakawea, likely due to weather fronts. Look for confinued salmon activity along the face of the dam. Try nightcrawlers on Lake Audubon for fair walleye success.

• Lake Sakakawea/northwest N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Water clearing on the upper end of Lake Sakakawea as far down as White Earth Bay. Best success remains around New Town using nightcrawlers in about 20 feet but also try minnows yet. Springbrook

Dam producing some pike using spoons or frozen smelt. Blacktail Dam continues producing panfish success.



Keep in mind that different dogs and different age groups need varying amounts of stimulation. By giving your dog the proper enrichment, you can ensure that they live their life to the



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


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Strategies to Beat "Summer Slide": Part 1

Did you know that North Dakota is one of only 11 states in the United States that uses a single area code for its entire state? On July 1st, North Dakota celebrates what is called, "701 Day." North Dakota is also known as the Peace Garden State because the International Peace Gardens borders between North Dakota and Canada. These gardens represent the pledge made in 1932 to never go to war with one another. Since the gardens fall on the border, you can actually walk from the United States to Canada and back.

Although it is an unofficial holiday, the Magic City Discovery Center has a few different ways to celebrate. From the dates of July 1st to July 21st, they will be hosting a postcard making contest for kids ages 2 - 18. The winners of the contest will have their postcards printed and sold at the MCDC gift shop. They will also receive a pack of their printed postcards and some MCDC merchandise. This contest is a way to celebrate the beautiful state of North Dakota and showcase kids favorite part about living here.

While it doesn't take a driver's license, nor does it take a boater education course for adults to operate motorized boats in North Dakota, becoming certified in boat safety is more than just a good idea; it's a smart one, as well.

And it could just be a life-saving idea.

Boating accidents happen every year across the state – whether it involves personal watercraft (PWC), small fishing boat, big fishing boat, sailboat, or yacht (yes, there are yachts on lakes in North Dakota — mainly Lake Sakakawea).

When it comes to children, though, North Dakota does require anyone 12 to 15 years of age operating a boat with a 10-horsepower or larger motor and any PWC by themselves to pass the state's Boat Safety Course.

A home study, hard copy manual of the course and mail-in completed exam is available at no charge from the N.D. Game and Fish Department. Just call the Bismarck headquarters, (701) 328-6300, or email a request to ndgf@nd.gov.

Another option is an online version, although that carries a fee because the course is done through a separate provider. Go online to (gf.nd.gov/ education/boating) for a link to a course provided by either Boat-Ed or Boater Exam. Both are accepted by

People of all ages can take the hard copy or online version. The beauty of the course is it's accepted by other states that may have certification requirements or simply recommend it for safety and education. All of the materials were developed to meet standards and requirements established by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators and Transport Canada and is recognized by the U.S. Coast Guard.

For example, South Dakota and Wyoming don't have boat education certification requirements but other states such as Delaware require it for everyone operating a motorized vessel born after Dec. 31, 1977. In California everyone, regardless of age, must be certified to operate a motorized vessel.

The law will be phased in over a period of years. Montana requires certification for 13- and 14-year olds operating a PWC with 10-horsepower or higher motors.

Regardless of which version a person opts to take - for themselves or a child - it can be completed at their own pace, although the online course has to be completed within 90 days of registration and payment.

Permanent certification cards will be mailed upon course completion whether taking the hard copy print or online version. And a temporary certification card is available until the "real deal" arrives, which is a good for a lifetime.

There's a lot to learn by taking a boat education course for novice or veteran boat operators alike: Topics include North Dakota's legal requirements, navigation rules, and rules of the road. Yes, just like there are rules of the road for vehicle drivers on real roads, boaters have their own rules of the road (water). Even the nuances of getting started are covered.

A major safety component of the course deals with accidents, basic first aid, and life-saving.

Weather plays a major role in highway accidents throughout the year - rain, snow, ice, and even wind. North Dakota's weather can change quickly and when boating, Mother Nature can unleash sudden wind, lightning, hail, and tornados.

Dealing with weather is part of the boat education course, as well.

The boat education certification isn't the same as a driver's license under State of North Dakota laws, even though certification is a legal requirement for certain age groups.

But the bottom line is that it comes down to boating smart and boating safely, regardless of age. Plus, once certified, a person is good to operate a boat across the U.S. and Canada.

Play it safe, get certified, and be legal regardless of


time at MCDC, but I look forward to relaxation, travel, getting caught up with projects, and having a personal life again in 2025."

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
