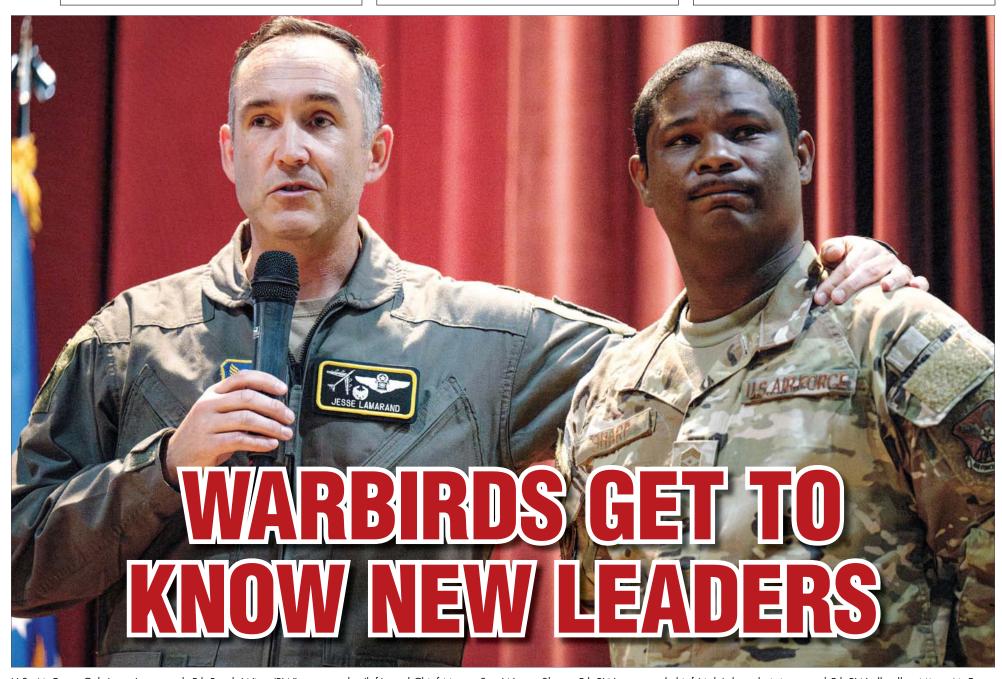

69th Bomb Squadron Helps to Revive Historic Legacy

Loring Air Force Base, ME – When the former Strategic Air Command (SAC) superbase closed its gates in September 1994, approximately 3,500 employees left, leaving a significant void. However, thanks to the Loring Museum and its dedicated volunteers, the "Sleeping Giant" awoke for a few days to honor the cherished 42nd Bomber Wing nearly 30 years after its closure.

After considerable effort, the museum secured a B-52 Stratofortress from Minot Air Force Base to land at Loring on July 31st for the 2024 Loring Open House Event. Fans and former Loringites traveled from far and wide to witness the event, meet the aircrew, and relive fond memories.

The Minot crew was ecstatic to be

part of this historic event, engaging with locals and witnessing firsthand what the 42nd meant to Aroostook

"Being able to bring this jet here and meet with everyone is a pretty cool experience," said Captain Matthew Siebert, a Weapons Systems Officer for the 69th Bomb Squadron and a crew member aboard the Minot B-52, affectionately known as the B.U.F.F. (Big Ugly Fat Fellow). "Loring was the last wing to house the 69th before it moved to North Dakota. The history and heritage here are very noticeable, especially when talking with the veterans who served here. It's great."

Loring AFB, once the northeasternmost base in the United States, was a vital asset due to its proximity to Europe and the Arctic.

During the Cold War, it played a crucial role in national defense against the Soviet Union.

The Loring volunteers, mostly former personnel stationed at the base, still hold immense pride in Loring's role in national defense. When the opportunity arose to have a Stratofortress land at the old SAC base, it was all hands on deck for the former Airmen.

For SSgt Kaylie LePage, a Flying Crew Chief originally from Winterport, the Loring Open House was a homecoming. Inspired by her mother, who joined the MAINEiacs in 2016, LePage joined Active Duty. "I love my job. I love working on planes. This is a 70-year-old aircraft, and here I am in 2024 doing the same thing that some of these crew chiefs did when Loring was open.

It's pretty amazing," LePage said. "You can feel the history here."

The event featured several ceremonies and activities to honor the former wing and its Airmen. There were food, activities for kids, base tours, and live music, breathing life back to the dormant superbase.

The MAINEiacs supported the event with top-notch customer service. The 101st ARW A.G.E. (Aerospace Ground Equipment) Shop provided the necessary equipment to support the B-52. Operations conducted a spectacular flyover with a KC-135, and maintenance troops supported an Arizona ANG tanker that was scheduled to be on display, but didn't quite make it to Loring due to mechanical issues.

Perhaps the most notable MAINEiac team were the Defenders from the 101st ARW Security Forces Squadron sent to secure the aircraft around the clock. For one Defender, this job was especially meaningful because his grandfather served at Loring. "When I was younger, my grandfather would bring me here to show me the base. It meant a lot then and it means a lot now," Senior Airman Matthew Burgess said. "He

taught me a lot about the history and what went on here and that's pretty special to me." Burgess has been in Security Forces for roughly three and a half years and it's clear after talking with him that he takes that seriously and wears his uniform with pride.

The 101st Air Refueling Wing has always emphasized family and values. The volunteer crews, former Loring Airmen, and their families coming together for the 30-year reunion demonstrated that Loring Air Force Base held the same ethos.

The 2024 Loring Open House Event was more than a nostalgic reunion; it was a powerful tribute to the enduring legacy of the 42nd Bomber Wing and the men and women who served at Loring Air Force Base. As former airmen and new generations came together to celebrate the history and camaraderie that defined this pivotal base, it became clear that Loring's spirit remains alive and well. This gathering not only honored the past but also inspired hope for the future, demonstrating that the bonds formed in service to our country are timeless and unbreakable.

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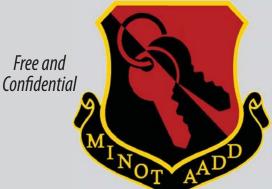






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A Little, Well Actually a Lot of, Nuts

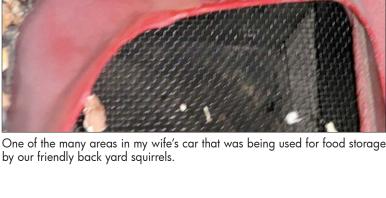

A couple of weeks ago KFYR-TV in Bismarck reported North Dakota now has only 29 grade A dairy farms, down from 53 in 2020.

That seems unusual given that milk is the official North Dakota beverage. The number of dairy farms has been sinking for many years with no recourse to keep the industry from spiraling out of

Back in the 1950s there were thousands of dairy farms in the state. Thousands might be a little misleading because back then, any farm with 10 or more milk cows was considered a dairy. And, let's face it, there were a lot more farms in the '50s.

In a recent announcement, Riverview Dairy of Morris, Minn.,

hopes to build a 25,000-cow dairy near Hillsboro and a 12,500-cow dairy near Wahpeton. Despite the number of cows that would bring back to the state and the amount of milk they would produce, mathematically it's only two new dairy farms.

The bigger issue may be that these dairies, should they come to fruition, would be considered confined animal feeding operations (CAFOs). That type of farming has been met with a lot of skepticism and controversy in the

You might remember a hog CAFO just to the west of Larimore a number of years ago. That was tied up in litigation a long time before the facility was actually built. It has now been operating several years with little dissent.

Since that time, other hog CAFOs have been built across the state near Cando, Tower City and Westhope. You don't hear a lot of complaining, at least not in the news. I can just imagine how the residents of Larimore must feel when there is a northwest wind blowing.

The owners of these new dairy

farms will surely see the same dissent that surfaced when the other CAFOs were built, even though these aren't about hogs.

This has traditionally been a state of family farms and even though Riverview is bringing a lot of economic development, iobs and new money into two of our counties, it reeks of corporate

That's why there's going to be protests when this thing gets under way. It may be OK in Minnesota, but North Dakota's thinking is quite different. But last year, Gov. Doug Burgum had a goal to loosen corporate farm ownership for the 2023 legislative session.

Then, during the session, the Legislature passed a bill that made it easier to bring in outside capital in modern livestock operations.

That upset some people across the state, and without naming names, existing dairy farmers have something to say about Riverview upsetting the apple cart.

There are a number of subsequent pros and cons to this scenario. Where is the feed going to come from to feed 37,500 cows? Where is the water going to come from to keep the cows from getting thirsty, number one, and number two, if you've ever been on a dairy farm, you know a lot of water is needed to keep the cows and barn clean so the milk can pass inspection.

Then, there's the processing. Who is going to process the milk? Who is going to make cheese? who is going to separate it into milk and cream? Will it have to be shipped?

The bigger issue, perhaps, is where is the manure going to go? It can certainly be put onto farm fields which is a natural fertilizer, something that was done before processed fertilizers came along.

We also have to consider that both of these new dairies would be expected to employ 150 people. That's great, but are there 150 people who would be willing to work on a mega dairy given that just about any place that employs people is currently shorthanded.

The good news, and the bottom line is, these dairies would more than quadruple the amount of fluid milk the state now produces.

Maybe then can we feel good about calling milk our official state beverage.

The preliminary City budget of 2025 was approved this week by the City Council, but the budget is a long way from being final.

City Council members held a special meeting on July 30 to question City department heads and others, including City Manager Harold Stewart, about aspects of the proposed budget. The meeting generated a lot of good back-and-forth discussion. Ultimately, the Council approved the preliminary budget, but there will almost surely be changes before the document is finalized.

And that's a good thing. The budget process is a long one, but it's open and transparent by law and by necessity. These discussions are held during public meetings, and Council members took part in several budget tours that included trips to various City departments and meetings with City officials, department heads, and employees.

By law, the total budget cannot go higher than the preliminary figures we just approved; the budget can be reduced, but it cannot exceed the approved total.

Some of the details of the proposed 2025 budget:

• \$227.7 million budget, up from \$199.29 million in 2024

• Estimated 115.07 mill levy for property taxes for \$28.52 million; 2024 budget included a 119.93 mill levy for \$28.7 million

• Estimated property tax per \$100,000 of home value is \$517.82, down \$21.87 from 2024 budget

• Roughly 71 percent of property taxes goes towards police, fire, traffic, and streets

The City Council meeting at 5:30 p.m. on Sept. 16 includes a public hearing, where residents can share their thoughts and opinions on the budget with me, Council members, and City leaders and department heads. I know not everyone is comfortable getting up at a City Council meeting, so you can always contact us in a variety of other ways.

I'd encourage residents who questions for Council members or department heads to let us know their opinion. Creating and adopting a City budget is a long, complicated, and arduous process. There will be disagreements among Council members, and among City staff and leaders. There will be disagreements among Council members and members of the public. There's no way around that fact.

I guarantee you not everyone will agree with the final budget, and that's okay. In any municipal budget, there will be give-andtake among departments, and disagreement among Council members. That's all good. That's how the process should work. In the end, we'll pass a budget that will in all likelihood not be perfect, but will represent the best document we can create to balance the needs of the community with the realities of the funds that are

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Cooperative care involves training animals to tolerate and even become willing participants in their own care procedures. Training pets in cooperative care is an effective way to make life easier and less stressful when it comes to vet visits, grooming, and other handling. When animals are put in situations where they are uncomfortable or fearful, it is not only traumatizing for the pet but it can be a dangerous situation for the humans involved. Here are some ways you can begin to teach your pet cooperative care!

• Pick an activity that your pet may not be fond of: this could include brushing, baths, handling paws, nail trimming, etc. As an example, many dog owners know how difficult nail trimming can be for certain dogs, so this is something they may want to work on. Dogs can be sedated or medicated to trim nails, and some may think it's easier for humans to just trim their nails and "aet it over with", but if you can work with your dog to desensitize them and counter-condition (change a negative emotional response to a positive one) those reactions, then why not

give it a try for their emotional wellbeing?

Give your pet the opportunity to say no: many pets have different fear thresholds, meaning that there is a certain amount of exposure to their triggers that they can handle before it becomes too much. In the example of nail trimming, be sure to start desensitizing slowly with indirect motions, like touching your dog's paw or having your pet hold their paw still in your hand. If you leap right into the triggered activity, it can put your pet over threshold very quickly and without the option to stop, it can set back your training progress. If your pet is showing signs of discomfort (pulling back a paw, yawning, lip licking, running away), stop the activity and try again later or find a less stressful way to begin. You can also teach your pet a "start button" cue, such as laying down on a mat in order to be brushed or offering a paw for nail trimming. Because we want our animals to offer consent and feel comfortable with these activities, training is often a lengthy process. You may only be able to train for 4 minutes before your pet is ready to be done for the day, but with time and persistence, you can work your way

• Mark the successful moments: high value rewards are KEY to cooperative care! When your pet performs even one action, such as offering a chin rest or sniffing the nail clippers that they may be scared of, mark the behavior with a clicker or a "yes" and give them a reward. I prefer to use hot dogs or freeze

Your favorite

dried treats for triggers, because they are the highest value to my dogs. But some animals are motivated by praise, others by toys. Find out what your pet likes best and reward them for even the smallest success.

• Be consistent: for some animals, cooperative care training is not an easy process. It may take months for your animal to make progress, especially if they already have prior negative experiences with the activities you are training for. Do not give up! Practice daily, and continue to mark their success even after they make significant progress. Also, practicing outside of the context of necessary situations is an important part of cooperative care. Train your pet to feel comfortable with the movements of an ear exam or putting on a muzzle so that when those become necessary, everyone is prepared.

While cooperative care actually has a list of guidelines and even a certification course developed by Deborah Jones, Ph.D, I like to use it on a broader scale. For my dogs and I, cooperative care goes hand in hand with basic training. Teaching my dogs to get in and out of the bathtub when it's time for grooming is just as important and stress-reducing as training for the actual grooming itself. Teaching an "up" command for our couch or any raised platform helps my dogs get up on vet tables and on the scale to be weighed. From there, we work on the actual cooperative care essentials:

- 1) Chin Rest (or Bucket Game)
- 2) Lie on Side
- 3) Restraint
- 4) Wear a Muzzle 5) Foot Handling
- 6) Mouth Handling
- 7) Taking Medication 8) Injection or Blood Draw
- 9) Eye Exam
- 10) Ear Exam

While these resources are meant for dogs, cooperative care principles can be applied to all sorts of animals from tigers to elephants in zoo settings! Cooperative care is a great way to strengthen the bond with your pets through training and trust building, and offers a healthy alternative to more stressful

During the all-call, Lamarand

"Teamwork is the basis for everything we do," said Lamarand. One teammate Lamarand relies on a lot is Sharp.

Sharp has served 26 years in the Air Force, and being a child of an Air Force family himself, he has much more Air Force experience

Like Lamarand, Sharp has done a fair share of moving. He has also served in many ways for the Air Force being a defender, an instructor, a 1st Šgt., the command chief of the 325th Fighter Wing, at Tyndall AFB, Florida and now the command chief of 5th BW.

This is not the first time Sharp has led Airmen of Minot.

From September 2017 to March 2019, Sharp was the 1st Sgt. for the 5th Maintenance Squadron, and from March 2019 to September 2019, he served as the superintendent of plans and programs for the 5th Security Forces Squadron.

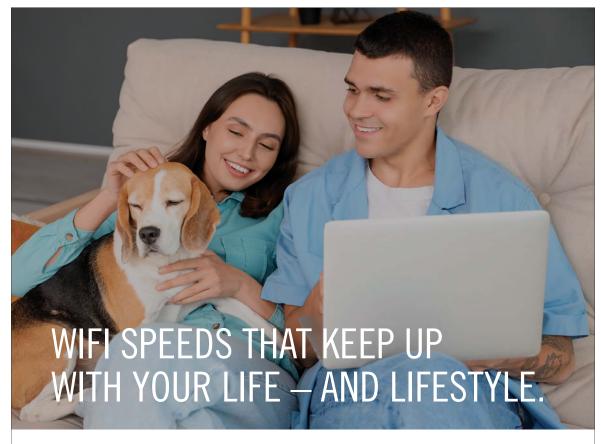

Devils Lake, ND - U.S. Army 2nd Lt. David Hooge, 231st Quartermaster Platoon, North Dakota National Guard, rescued a woman from a sinking car in Devils Lake, North Dakota, July 29, 2024.

While driving south of the city of Devils Lake, Hooge noticed a car behind him swerving back and forth before going off the road into the water of Devils Lake. He pulled over and went to help the woman. When he reached the vehicle, the water was already up to her waist.

Hooge had grabbed rock before entering the water and used it to break the back window. He unlocked the door, and the woman was able to exit the sinking vehicle from the back door. Hooge estimates that the

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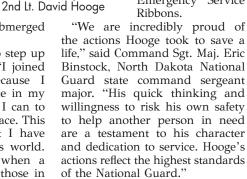
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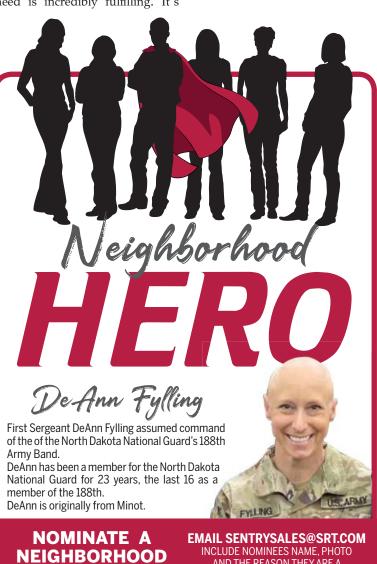

Camping... Tips on How to Play it Safe!

three, almost like a largely overgrown the warm weather suppresses to a comfortable temperature, our tendency to spend time outdoors becomes more often since winter is around the corner. If you think poison oak has come From beaches to lakes to high mountain trails, packing up the family for a trip into nature proves a wonderful warmweather venture. Special health and firstaid precautions, however, are necessary, especially when kids are involved, and Cuts and Scrapes: Any cut that especially if you plan to camp. While the following advice may ring familiar, read on: The value of a jogged memory

is well worth the effort. THE ESSENTIALS

 Take along plenty of water, especially when traveling to remote areas or those with a hot climate.

· Always carry a small first-aid kit, even when taking day hikes.

· Kids get hungry quick, especially with the open energy of the great outdoors. Pack plenty of non-perishable, calorie-dense food, such as granola bars, trail mix, hard fruit (apples are especially good), chocolates, and nuts.

 Make sure you know the route, and bring detailed maps of the area. **CAMPGROUND BASICS**

Scope out the surrounding area for any potential hazards, and identify a "kid-safe" zone that is within eyesight of your main camping area. Tell everyone that an adult must always accompany younger children when going further out, and older kids must leave notice of where they are heading.

Protect yourself and your kids against otential hazards of the woods: Wear long pants, closed shoes, and socks to avoid contact with poisonous plants and stinging creatures. Never let kids run barefoot in the woods, as this leaves the skin vulnerable to insect and snakebites, ticks, poison oak, and the general hazard of stepping on sharp objects. Always protect yourself and your children against the sun with sunscreen, hats and sunglasses, keeping in mind that harmful rays can penetrate even thick cloud covers. As with all other camping rules, be sure to explain to children why it is important to follow these safety procedures, instead of simply requiring them to do so.

Keep all food in tightly sealed containers to avoid attracting unwanted flies and other insects. Also keep your food stash out of reach of prowling animals. Emphasize to your children the importance of not leaving any food out in the open, and of cleaning up after themselves in the woods (remind them--and yourself--never to carry out less than you carry in; this includes all trash).

Ensure to keep the campfires at minimum circumference to where it won't spread. Always keep a bucket of water close by and always ensure the fire is out before you leave the camp grounds

HIKING

When hiking with children, make frequent stops to rest, have a snack and water, and to observe the various plants and wildlife of the surrounding area. Make a game out of trying to identify the most unusual-looking species of the wild (by sight, never by touch!).

Encourage children to carry their own daypack and water. Also equip each child with a whistle, which can be used in case of separation from the group.

OUTDOOR SAFETY

Poison Oak: Teach your kids this simple rule: "Leaves of three, let it be." Poison oak leaves grow in groups of clover. Another poison oak indicator is the roughness of the leaves' edges, which look like a small child has cut

into contact with the skin, wash the area with soap and cold water (hot or even lukewarm water will open pores and increase absorption of the irritant).

punctures the skin may become infected; this tendency only increases in hot, humid weather. Make it a general rule to treat any cut or graze with an antiseptic, and refrain from using creams or ointments, as they merely keep the wound greasy. Also remove bandages and Band-Aids after bleeding has stopped; they keep wounds wet and prevent healing. If you don't have antiseptic on hand, clean and sterilize the wound by washing it with salt water.

Insect Stings: Bee, yellow-jacket, and wasp stings are generally more painful than dangerous. To relieve pain and swelling, use Calamine lotion or ice packs (ice wrapped in cloth will do just

Mosquitoes: In addition to wearing protective clothing, avoid highly perfumed products and dark or brightly colored clothes, as strong fragrances and colors attract insects. Always make generous use of insect repellent, especially once dusk arrives. Remember to reapply repellent every few hours, and after swimming or exposure to rain.

U.S. Department of Agriculture studies indicate that the most effective repellent ingredient against mosquitoes, ticks, fleas, and biting flies is diethylmeta-toluamide, commonly known as DEET. Look for DEET in topical insect repellents, and avoid repellents with a DEET content that is higher than 20 no more is necessary, and higher concentrations can irritate the skin.

Non-chemical alternatives for warding off mosquitoes include Avon Skin-So-Soft body oil and pure vanilla extract.

Ticks: Ticks are efficient transmitters of disease: always check your kids' and your own body after walking through a tick-infested area. If you do find one or more ticks on your own or your child's

body, follow these simple steps.

The best way to remove a tick is to pull it steadily away with blunt, curved tweezers. If you don't have any tweezers, protect your hand with a plastic bag and grasp the tick with finger and thumb tips as close to the skin as possible. Do not jerk or twist the tick. When removing ticks make sure its body stays intact and is removed entirely. Any part left behind in your skin will cause inflammation and infection.

Other remedies such as Vaseline, alcohol, chlorine bleach, or oil will often persuade a tick to let go, as will a lighted cigarette end (but be careful not to burn the skin). Another removal method is to coat the tick with fingernail polish (clear or colored), which will cause it to suffocate and die. Afterward, it will either fall off or can be brushed away or gently pulled with a pair of tweezers.

Once a tick has been removed, disinfect the affected skin with alcohol and wash hands with soap and water.

Snakes: When hiking or walking through undergrowth where snakes may be present, be sure to dress yourself and your children in boots or thick shoes with socks and long pants. Warn children not to stick their hands into holes or cracks in the ground, and always be careful while exploring. If a poisonous snake does bite someone, don't panic (snakebites don't cause instant death), but do seek medical help

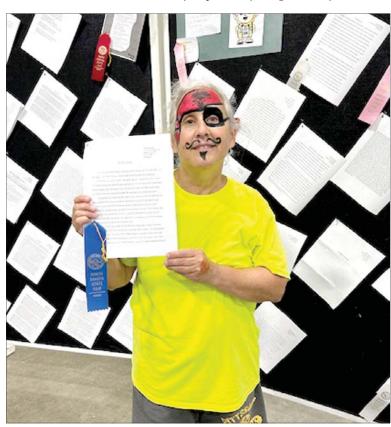
"Thank you," I said. "I enjoy it a lot."

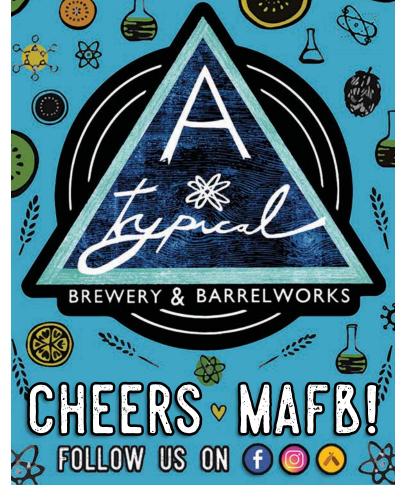
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Spouses Welcome on the Road, Everything You Need to Know

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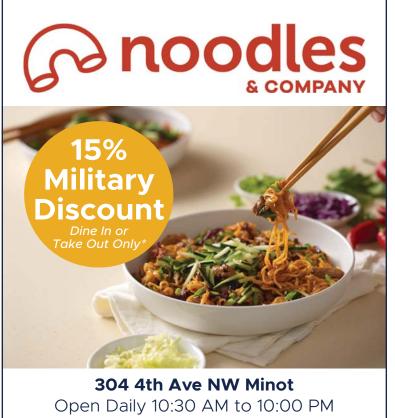
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Hot Tots And Honeybees Auction Off Alternate Jerseys for a Good Cause

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Oil Change Tips

It is recommended that you get an oil change on your vehicle every 3,500 miles for regular oil and every 5,000 miles for synthetic oil. Checking and changing the oil is essential to keep today's engines working properly and efficiently. Check the oil level with the engine and the car parked on a flat surface. Open the hood, remove the dipstick, wipe off with a cloth towel or paper, then back into the oil tank. Pull it again and see if the level is within the acceptable range marked on the dipstick. If you add the oil yourself, do not overfill. Overfilling can damage the engine.

Most automobile manufacturers recommend oil changes every year or 7,500 miles of car and light truck gasoline engines. The usual recommendation is diesel engines and turbocharged gasoline engines every 3,000 miles or six

You'll find that a once-a-year (7,500-mile) oil change is for vehicles driven in ideal circumstances. Most of us think "normal" driving is "severe service" driving. This includes frequent short trips (less than 10 miles, especially in cold weather), stop-and-go city traffic driving, driving in dusty conditions (gravel roads, etc.), and sustained highway driving speed during the warm season. For this type of driving behavior, the recommendation is to change the oil every 3,000 miles or six months.

For maximum protection, most oil companies say to change the oil every 3,000 miles or three to six months regardless of what type of driving you do. Regular oil changes for preventative maintenance are cheap insurance against engine wear and will always save you money in the long run if you keep a car for more than three or four years. It's very uncommon to see an engine well-maintained with regular oil changes develop significant bearing, ring, cam, or valve problems under 100,000 miles.

What About The Oil Filter?

To reduce the costs of vehicle ownership and maintenance, many car makers say the oil filter only needs to be replaced at every other oil change. Most mechanics will tell you this is a false economy.

The oil filters on most engines today have been downsized to save weight, cost, and space. The "standard" quart-sized

filter that was once common on most engines has been replaced by a pint-sized (or smaller) filter. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure out that a smaller filter has less total filtering capacity. Even so, the little filters should be adequate for 3,000-mile oil change intervals — but may run out of capacity long before a second oil change at 6,000 or 15,000 miles.

Therefore, replacing the oil filter every time the oil is changed is highly recommended.

Filter Replacement

If you do your oil changes, make sure you get the correct filter for your engine. Follow the filter manufacturer's listings in its catalog. Many filters that look the same on the outside have different internal valving. Many overhead cam engines, for example, require an "anti-drain-back" valve in the filter to prevent oil from draining out of the filter when the engine is shut off. This allows oil pressure to reach critical engine parts more quickly when restarted. Filters that are mounted sideways on the engine typically require an anti-drain-back valve.

Used motor oil should be disposed of properly. The Environmental Protection Agency does not consider used motor oil to be a hazardous chemical, but it can foul groundwater and contain traces of lead. The best way to dispose of used motor oil is to take it to a service station, quick lube shop, parts store, or another recycling facility. Your old oil will either be re-refined into other lubricants or petroleum products or burned as fuel.

Do not dump used motor oil on the ground, down a drain, into a storm sewer, or place it in the trash. Many landfills will not accept used motor oil even if it is in a sealed container because it will eventually leak out into the ground. If you can't find an environmentally-acceptable way to dispose of the stuff, maybe you shouldn't change your oil. Service facilities that do oil changes have storage tanks and recycling programs to dispose of used oil.

It is recommended that you get an Oil Change on your vehicle every 3,500 miles for regular oil and every 5,000 miles for synthetic oil. Checking and changing the oil is essential to keep today's engines working properly and efficiently.

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

CAPT. JOSEPH KITTINGER BREAKS WORLD RECORDS **DURING PROJECT EXCELSIOR** AUGUST 16, 1960



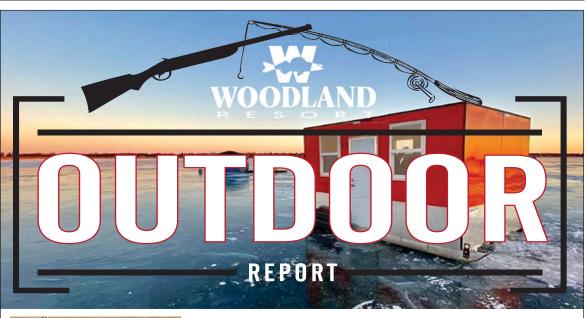
An automatic camera captured Capt. (later Col.) Joseph Kittinger just as he stepped from the balloon-supported Excelsion of 102,800 feet. (USAF Photo)

In 1959 and 1960, Air Force Capt. Joseph Kittinger performed a series of high altitude parachute jumps as a part of Project Excelsior, which tested the parachute system that would be used for pilots ejecting from high altitudes. Excelsior III was the final test on Aug. 16, 1960. Kittinger ascended to 102,800 feet by way of a helium balloon and unpressurized gondola. The ascent took over an hour. Kittinger free-fell from the gondola for 4 minutes and 36 seconds, setting the record for longest free-fall Gondola on Aug. 16, 1960, at an altitude at the time. He reached speeds up to 614 miles an hour. Falling over the New Mexico desert at

17,500 feet, Kittinger deployed his parachute and drifted down for the remaining 9 minutes and 9 seconds. He also set the record for the highest parachute jump and highest speed of a human in the atmosphere.

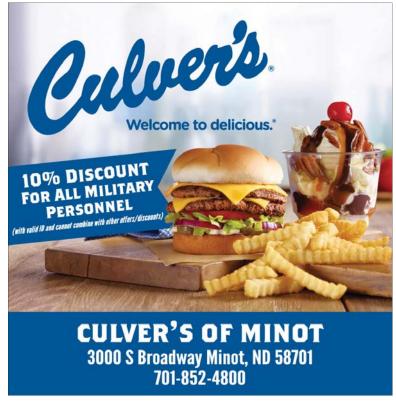

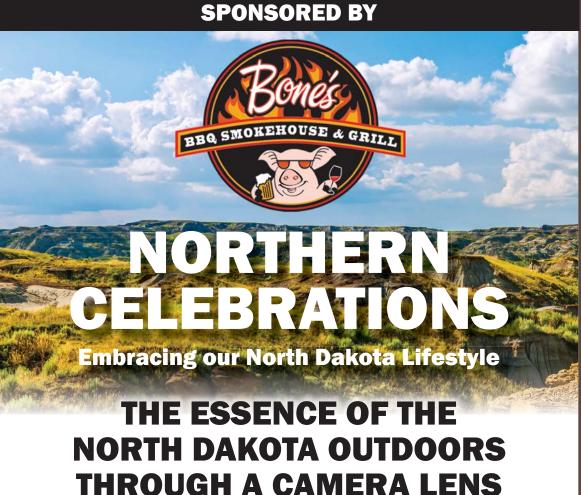

It began innocently enough: The 1987 North Dakota legislature established the Watchable Wildlife Checkoff.

It enabled residents to contribute a portion — or all — of their tax refund to the N.D. Game and Fish Department's Watchable Wildlife Program.

Hmmm, Watchable Wildlife – the critters that might not get a lot of people's attention.

Critters like little brown birds flitting across a pasture or nesting in one's yard. Critters that bring life to a marsh, like frogs, salamanders, and dragonflies.

Critters that pollinate a vast majority of food consumed by humans. They're out there but they're easy to overlook.

The Watchable Wildlife Checkoff is a funding opportunity boosting their importance.

What better way to highlight it than with a catchy photo on a poster? That's what launched the Game and Fish Watchable Wildlife Photo Contest in 1989. One winner was selected to be featured on an annual promotional poster.

But in a short few years, some things caught the attention of contest coordinators. First, a lot of good photographers — amateur camera buffs and seasonal professionals, alike — were photographing the Great North Dakota Outdoors

Secondly, there are too many good photos to pick just one. "We were getting so many good photos we decided to expand it and set up the three categories," described Game and Fish Department Conservation Biologist Patrick Isakson – nongame (non-huntable wildlife species), game (the huntables), and plants/insects.

In other words, showcase the diversity of North Dakota's wildlife, its fish, plants, and insects.

The caveat is they can't be anything domestic. So, yes, big bluestem native grass waving in the breeze is a possible subject. Nope, Karl Foerster

feather reed grass growing in the yard down the street is a definite "no".

The gorgeous palomino horse in western North Dakota's Badlands doesn't make the qualifying species list but a short-horned lizard, least chipmunk, or bushy-tailed woodrat (yes, that's a New World species found in southwestern North Dakota) would. So, too, would a hoary bat, barn owl, sphinx moth, prairie coneflower, and any of numerous insects flying and running around the state. "One year we picked an underwater photo of a fish," Isakson described.

And, yes, pronghorns, pheasants, bighorn sheep, and any other legally huntable species qualify in the game category.

Isakson said the contest continues to gain popularity, averaging about 375 entries in recent years. "It's definitely expanded," he added.

He attributes part of the increased interest to today's high quality digital cameras, including wireless phone quality. "I think digital photography has helped a lot," Isakson suggested.

Some of the basic rules — complete details are available on the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov/wildlife/watchable-photocontest), include:

• First — and perhaps most importantly — photos must be taken in North Dakota.

• Oct. 1, 2024 deadline.

- Digital photos in tiff, jpg, or jpeg format with a maximum size of 50 megabytes per image.
- · Limit of five entries per contestant.
- · Submit entries online, including photographer's name, telephone number, and email address.
- Photographers are granting the Game and Fish Department permission to use winning entries in the agency's magazine, website, and its social

Some of the most popular subjects include deer - especially whitetails - backyard birds, and fox pups (tough to pass up those adorable photogenic faces at a den). "Things that are very accessible to people," Isakson described.

However, photographers are creative. "A bobcat won it last year," he added. And more amphibians are catching photographer's eyes, although Isakson would like to see more entries featuring some of the state's lesser known inhabitants.

Some of those flying and running insects, perhaps.

Maybe a snake, although admittedly trying to photograph a prairie rattlesnake probably doesn't rank high on people's list of things they need to, want to, or should do in life.

Understandable. How about a green snake instead? They're not
