

91 MW participates in SELM test

Airmen and Sailors from the 625th Strategic Operations Squadron, Offutt AFB, Neb., 576th Flight Test Squadron, Vandenberg Space Force Base, Calif., the 91st Missile Wing, Minot AFB, N.D., and the Navy's Strategic Communications Wing 1, Offutt AFB, completed a simulated electronic launch minuteman (SELM) test at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., Sept. 17.

Twice a year, SELM tests the Minuteman III in its deployed environment at various missile wings without an actual launch occurring.

"SELM tests the selected ICBMs from day-to-day operation to issuance of the first stage ignition signal," said Maj. Raun Carnley, assistant director of operations, 625th STOS. "Commands up to and including launch commands are sent to the test configured launch facility from configured launch control centers and the Airborne Launch Control System (ALCS) onboard a Navy E-6 Mercury."

SELM tests are vital to the health of the ICBM fleet as it ensures the system will do what it is commanded to do if needed and provides sustainment data to Air Force Global Strike Command and U.S. Strategic Command.

"As updates to software and hardware are fielded, testing helps verify the system continues to work as designed," said Carnley. "A SELM test validates the combat capability of our fielded ICBM weapon system...while saving the taxpayer money, and without the risk of escalatory messaging that the equivalent number of operational test launches would require to accomplish the same

From the 576th FTS running the tests to the 91st MW providing ground operations and maintenance support to SCW-1 providing the aircraft and aircrew, each organization plays a pivotal role to ensure the launch process is reliable and ready.

A major player in a SELM test is the 625th STOS. The squadron is aligned under the 8th Air Force and provides everything from the targeting package on the missile, to the systems that simulate the flight of the projectile, to the launch track and range safety coordinates, to the training that prepared the team and the ALCS operators that provided the key

"We ensure the ALCS is able to fulfill its role as the backup to the launch control centers and ground crews in the case it is ever needed," said Carnley.

With so many moving parts, scheduling these tests doesn't occur overnight, they are planned out years in advance.

"We are currently on a five-year construct," said Carnley. "Specific preparations on the side of the 625th STOS start approximately four months in advance to coordinate our pieces of the mission. With two tests a year, as soon as one is complete, planning and preparation for the next one begins.'

Ălthough a SELM test isn't as visible as an operational test launch, it provides a great deal of value to the various organizations supporting the mission.

One such supporting organization is the Joint-Nuclear Operations Center (JNOC) at Barksdale AFB, La.

The JNOC has six divisions and the ICBM division monitors and observes each SELM test and assists as necessary explained Senior Master Sgt. Matthew Tobey, JNOC senior enlisted leader.

"Ensuring the sustainment and capabilities of our nuclear forces not only allows U.S. citizens to sleep soundly at night but provides global stability which also helps foster economic prosperity," said Carnley. "It's also a message to our Allies and adversaries: The ICBM leg of the nuclear triad is viable and ready at a moment's notice to defend our freedoms and those of our Allies.'

Part II of our recent trip would take us to the Outer Banks of North Carolina. When investigating possible events and destinations we discovered that Kitty Hawk, where the Wright brothers made their first assisted power airplane flight, was indeed located on the Outer Banks. Strange, because we went through Indiana and there was a tourist information sign that noted that Dayton, Ohio was the home of the Wright Brothers. How in the world, and more of a question, why in the world did they travel all of those miles to do the test flight? According to information at the Wright Brothers Memorial near Kitty Hawk would suggest that they needed wide open spaces, preferred a sandy soil for their landing and most important, a consistent wind. All of those factors were present in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina.

It would need to be accomplished with an engine that drove a propellor which pushed the vehicle forward with enough force for the carefully manufactured wings to create enough lift to overcome

gravity and the other forces of nature. They queried multiple states for possible locations, but only North Carolina made them an offer. Their conditions and the location near Kill Devil Hill, the actual location of the first flight, seemed to fit the bill perfectly.

WAS THIS REALLY THE PLACE?

Don't know about all of you, but I certainly didn't envision the first powered flight to have taken place on a strip of land about 2 miles wide, right next to the Atlantic Ocean. As you enter what was the venue for Wright brothers historic flight, your eyes are automatically drawn to the top of Kill Devil Hill where the actual monument that commemorates the occasion is located. It is not, however, the exact location where the first flight occurred. Close? Yes, but Kill Devils Hill was used to test the wing design of the gliders that resembled the powered vehicle. The actual flight started and ended on flat land. The Wrights wanted total power assisted flight, so as not to confuse people with "nothing but a glider with a motor" scenario. This had to be the real thing, the start of a new generation that would develop and use powered

THINKING IT OVER

Orville Wright completed the first powered flight of a heavierthan-air aircraft known as the Wright Flyer in 1903. In 1948 the Boeing company began design of the B 52. Yep, only 45 years after the Wright brothers flew at Kitty Hawk. The B 52 did not begin service until 1955, still only 52 years after the first flight. The Wright brothers had a tough time selling their Wright Flyer design to anyone. It appeared that powered flight was not all that important. Turn the page to 2024 and realize where we are today. We have built planes like the B 52 that will be part of the Air Force arsenal until 2050. Not museum pieces, but actual online weapons. It truly is amazing. What was the dream of the Wright brothers at Kitty Hawk? Their first flight was less than a minute, and it was

steaks. What they were doing was taking part in the parade with a team of draft horses and giving rides to people after the parade. They had just finished an exhausting farmers' market in downtown Minot and three hours later had a team and wagon hitched up to recognize the Carpio Fire Department's **UPSIDE DOWN UNDER** achievement.

The parade had a fleet of Model T's, REO Speedwagons and other cars from the 1920s and '30s, which in and of itself was impressive.

But what was most impressive about this parade is what one person watching the parade from a Main Street sidewalk said. "Just think, these are all volunteers."

That's what we need to focus on here. Yes, we all love a parade and some of the firefighting equipment that rolled down Carpio's Main Street was as modern as any department, but yes, those involved are all volunteers and they are unique

They all have jobs outside the fire department and if the whistle blows or pager beeps, they will drop what they are doing at a moment's notice, get to the fire hall as quickly as possible and do their level best to put out any

It could be a grass fire, a combine, something gets hit by lightning and catches fire, or worst yet, someone's house is on fire, including their own.

It's the same with ambulance crews. We've seen that all across the state of North Dakota. Ambulance crews are short staffed and need volunteers to step up and be part of something bigger than themselves.

And on Saturday, Sept. 14, the parade in Carpio assured us that the local fire department and those in the surrounding communities are resolute in their duties. The parade was a lot of fun and it showed the pride in their polished trucks, but it also told us a whole lot more about these volunteers.



I Think Lefse is Lackluster, but I Love it Anyway

"I think we're going to the Høstfest this weekend. What should we be sure to see?" The word came out "HOST-fest," an easy giveaway that I was new in town. I asked the question to fill time but wasn't prepared for the deluge of information that followed.

At the time, I was volunteering as a high school youth group leader at our church. Discussion had wrapped up for the night and given way to small talk. I had heard about the big Scandinavian festival. It seemed like the perfect time to ask for input from some locals.

"This is so exciting. It's your first Høstfest!" said the other leader, who had been raised in North Dakota.

Then, the teenage girls chimed in. They all started talking at once, mostly about the foods I had to try. The names were hard to pronounce—and even harder to remember.

"Obviously, get lefse," one said.
"But it's got to be from the right place," added another. She then proceeded to tell me to get the lefse from the stand near the thing—not the kiosk with the sign near the stand selling the other thing. I nodded as though I understood, even though I didn't.

"Ooooh—get rømmegrøt! It

tastes exactly like a Cinnabon cinnamon roll!"

"No, the best is aebleskivers. Skip everything else."

"Get Swedish meatballs—and krumkake."

In the end, the only words I could recall were "lefse" and "meatballs." The rest were scrawled phonetically on the back of a spare Sunday bulletin I found in the pew.

That same bulletin was folded in my pocket as my husband, Derek and I wandered around the Høstfest for the first time. Other suggestions had ensured we'd been to the Viking Village for fighting reenactments, watched the accordion club, and visited the man who spins wool from angora rabbit fur. When it came time to eat, we consulted the list. Gradually, we decoded the words and found the vendors. We didn't find everything, but we did our best-even if we butchered the pronunciation of every item.

The aebleskivers were delicious. The meatballs were great. When we took a bite of rømmegrøt, I swallowed hard and checked my notes. "You know," I said to my husband, "I think the only thing that tastes exactly like a Cinnabon cinnamon roll is a Cinnabon cinnamon roll." He laughed and nodded.

The grand finale was finding the "right" lefse. Lefse seemed to be the cornerstone of culture for our local friends. They had tried to describe it, but insisted we just needed to taste it for ourselves. Honestly, I'll never forget that first bite. The build-up to this moment had been huge. I chewed. I swallowed. I took another bite.

"What do you think?" I asked. "It's good. You?" Derek replied.

There was an awkward pause as we stood there chewing. I lowered my voice and said, "But for real, it's not that special, right? Like, it just

tastes like a taco shell with butter."

Our disenchantment with lefse continues to be a joke to this day. I loved that first Høstfest, and I love looking back on that anticlimactic bite of lefse and rømmegrøt.

It serves as a reminder: I'm not from here. This is a place that's new and different. It comes with its own traditions, and I come with mine. This isn't just a place with few trees and cold winters—it's a place with deep roots.

To me, lefse tastes like a bland potato tortilla, and the amount of butter I see slathered on it leaves me slack-jawed. To my friends who were raised on lefse, it tastes like love and home. Jokes about my tastes aside, I have come to love lefse, too. Two lefse sticks hang in my kitchen. I aim for an annual lefse-making day with a friend. As with many things in life, it's not about the end result or immediate gratification. The sweetness is in the process and the tradition it holds.

If you're not from around here—take this as your warning: your first bite of lefse may be anticlimactic. But there's so much joy to be found in eating it anyway, in finding a way to appreciate the things that are special to those who are from here. I hope you go to the Høstfest and try all the things. Even if you didn't choose to come here, this is part of your life; part of your story. And you may be surprised by the traditions that become dear to you—even if life eventually moves you away.

CITY COUNCIL-THE WRAP

ALDERMAN MIKE BLESSUM

Although I have been involved in party politics and other grassroots activities over the last 25 years, this is my first time in elected office. Taking the leap into the city council race this spring was a new experience. Campaigning involves fundraising, candidate questionnaires, interviews, and public speaking, which is necessary to show your political brand and inform voters.

During a campaign you explain your positions and you make statements that effectively become campaign promises. Property taxes are on the minds of ND residents because preliminary bills are increasing and the constitutional measure is on the November ballot. My #1 priority during the campaign was to provide relief to property owners. The people of Minot have been particularly strapped by huge

long-term infrastructure projects (flood protection and NAWS), as well as growth from the oil boom. Increased property values and increased local spending have strained personal budgets to the breaking point.

Our budget hearing and work session occurred this week. Council members were able to hear from the public on the budget and bring amendments to adjust spending and taxation levels before final passage in October. I am proud to say we are delivering on our promise to bring relief. In addition to some smaller initiatives, I proposed returning \$3.6 million in general fund reserves to property owners by reducing our overall levy amount. As a result, a \$300k home should see an approximate \$200 decrease in the city portion of their property tax bill. This moves our city toward a more sustainable trajectory.

Much more work remains to bring meaningful and necessary long-term change to our local governments. I am proud of the work our council has done so far. I am encouraged by our unity and desire to meet the service needs of our city and its employees while doing what we can to push our tax levy downward. I am hopeful that the other priorities we laid out in our campaign become promises kept in the years to come.

When the letter arrives it's kind of like being invited to Biology 101 or a "citizen science" community event.

It's a request from the U.S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service Division of Migratory Bird Management, Branch of Harvest Surveys asking if you, as a potential waterfowl hunter during the 2024 season, would care to collect wing samples for them.

Well, for starters, that's a mouthful of official agency names.

Secondly, certainly as a potential waterfowl hunter potentially bagging any one of the duck, brandt, or goose species in the area, collecting and submitting wing samples would be an honor and a privilege. Your lucky name and address was randomly selected as someone who HIP — Harvest Information Program registered when purchasing hunting licenses.

It's kind of like being able to be back in Biology 101, digging into the "guts" of things. OK, this is just wings but it does bring flashbacks of Biology classes.

It's also kind of like knowing that you as John or Jane Doe Hunter can play a role in helping those who spent a great deal more time in biology-type classes than you did learn more about the waterfowl species we know and love.

Yup, it's "citizen science".

First, the initial letter asks if would be interested in participating.

And then the weeks and months go by. Any recollection of that correspondence has long disappeared from the

And then, because you said "yes," a large manila envelope arrives in the mail. Yup, it's from the U.S. Branch of the Interior. . . . and so on until you remember that, oh yeah, should you go waterfowl hunting and actually harvest said waterfowl, someone Flint Hill National Wildlife Refuge in Hartford, Kan. would appreciate it if you would send them wings (and feathers from geese) that have completely dried of any moisture or blood, and inside one of two envelopes so they can freeze them to be analyzed once hunting seasons have closed across the country.

You see, the Flint Hill National Wildlife Refuge is the gathering site where Central Flyway state migratory bird management biologists meet to look at wings and feathers to determine the species, sex, and age of harvested birds.

It could be likened to a good ol' fashioned guilting bee of the 1800s but with feathers rather than cloth and sewing needles.

Feathers provide that information to those in the "know" when it comes to migratory birds.

The information is just part of what the Fish and Wildlife Service gathers in making their annual migratory game hunting season regulations for states and flyways.

Reports of the data gleaned from wing bees throughout the country are available on the website, (fws.gov/program/migratory-bird-harvest-surveys/

It's really not complicated and if a person participates, it really doesn't take that much more time:

- Save duck wings and goose wing and tail feathers from birds taken throughout the season — by you, the participating hunter, not any friends, relatives, or other acquaintances. Just what you harvested.
- Let them dry and never play in a plastic bag or wrap in plastic. Otherwise, sending damp, icky samples will likely smell, rot, and not make the U.S. Postal Service employees handling the packages happy — at all — and that's understandable.
- Use two envelopes for each wing an inner and outer envelope. Put samples from one bird in each inner envelope, complete the information on the outside of the outer envelope, and pop it in the mail with its prepaid postage.
- · If possible, send samples for every bird harvested throughout the season.

Should extra envelopes be needed, that's any easy fix by mailing in a prepaid request card or going online, (migbirdapps.fws.gov/hipweb).

It's kind of a fun way to feel like as a hunter, you can play another role in species management.

And by the way, the N.D. Game and Fish Department also collects wing samples for pheasants, turkeys, partridge, and ruffed and sharp-tailed grouse. Go to their website, (gf.nd.gov) and type in "wing samples" in the search box for articles and information about receiving wing collection envelopes.

It's Biology 101 Revisited and Citizen Science rolled into one — and it is interesting to realize just how much information a simple wing or feather can reveal.

"It's how the 5th Bomb Wing ensures the safety, security and reliability of not just the weapons on base, but the human weapons systems that are involved in maintaining, sustaining and executing our president's nuclear options.

These training operations enable crews to maintain a high state of readiness and proficiency, and validate the always-ready, global strike capability. The VIGILANCE series also enhances the safety, security, and reliability of the bomber leg of the U.S. nuclear

"Col. Lamarand says all the time that even though this is for practice, people are watching," said Chief Master Sgt. Wayne Sharp, 5th Bomb Wing command chief. "These training operations let our adversaries and allies know that we operate in safe and reliable conditions, and we're ready to go at any given time."


PV/BV 24-4 once again demonstrated Air Force Global Strike Command's airpower and capabilities, ensuring Team Minot and Team Barksdale Airmen are prepared and ready to execute such a vital mission. Hundreds of Airmen including aircraft maintainers,

PV/BV operations are regularly planned and are not scheduled or conducted in response to any specific geopolitical conditions or situations. These training missions are routine and occur multiple times per year.

This training operation not only demonstrates the wings' ability to stand alert if needed to deter or respond to an attack, but it demonstrates their ability to project lethal combat power across the

USAF CREW PARTICIPATED IN RESCUE OPERATIONS FOR **BURNING LUXURY LINER IN THE PACIFIC**

October 4, 1980

On October 4, 1980, a fire erupted in the engine room of the Holland America Line luxury cruise liner Prinsendam as it was voyaging through the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Alaska. The United States Coast Guard performed a search, rescue, and evacuation operation for over 500 passengers and crew over the course of 24 hours. Participating in the evacuation was Air Force Capt. John J. Walters and his crew, who rescued 61 people by airlifting them to a

supertanker with the help of their HH-3 Jolly Green Giant helicopter. The rescue of the Prinsendam was particularly significant because of the distance traveled by the rescuers, over 130 miles off the coast, and the fact that all 519 passengers and crew were rescued under challenging environmental conditions without loss of life or serious injury.



Hello Autumn and **Goodbye Summer**

This year's 101 Critical Days of Summer has come to an end. As we shift to the crisp mornings of Autumn, remember to navigate the hazards of both seasons carefully.

In some areas of the world, high temperatures linger far past the end of summer and can cause dehydration, sunburns or sunstroke when not prepared. Be vigilant and wear sunscreen, hats, sunglasses and make sure to stay hydrated. In contrast, other areas shift to cooler weather, rain, fog and ice in some instances. Be ready for the dangers that come with these conditions.

The Department of the Air Force reinvigorated the 101 CDS last year to help reduce off-duty injuries and fatalities during the summer months. During the 101 CDS campaign the Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. David W. Allvin kicked off the Integrating Risk and Readiness campaign to better prepare all Airmen to make riskinformed decisions in complex combat environments.

The IRR campaign aims to revive a mindset of operational discipline in everything we do by focusing on the fundamentals. Disciplined operations set the baseline for a ready force that can then utilize risk-informed decision making to employ the right formation at the right time and place.

Weaving operational discipline and risk management into the fabric of an Airman's every day duties encourages a commitment to safety which can also be carried over to off-duty activities.

Consistently during summer months, the top areas of concern for the DAF are motorcycle and four-wheeled vehicle accidents. From Memorial Day to Labor Day in 2024, we lost 11 service members to summer activities, with five of those being motorcycle and four-wheeled vehicle accidents. This is down from the 18 service members to off-duty activities in 2023. Speeding and alcohol continue to be the main factors in these fatalities. Although we saw a 33% reduction this year, our goal will always remain zero. One service member is one too many and their loss touches the mission,



their families and friends.

Based on five years of off-duty injury data gathered by the Air Force Safety Center's occupational safety traffic and outreach branch, 12 of 15 categories saw a decrease in injuries during this year's 101 CDS campaign. Water related activities were down 26%, while outdoor activities experienced a 33% decrease. Pedestrians/ bicycles, however, saw an 85% increase of injuries. Be vigilant when in parking lots or when walking or bicycling on roadways to avoid being hit by a motor vehicle. Overall, there was a 29% decrease in all injuries from 2023, with 518 injuries in 2023 to 363 in 2024. The data gathered for a fiveyear look back shows a down trend of over a 21% decrease in injuries.

By incorporating DAF Risk Management into the 101 CDS, Airmen, Guardians and civilians have the tools and resources to assess their decisions and use sound risk management in off-duty activities.

"Labor Day weekend was the unofficial end of summer, but warm weather can linger well past the holiday. If you plan to travel before the weather changes, create a plan and incorporate risk management into it." said David Brandt, chief of traffic and outreach branch at the Air Force Safety Center. "Keeping risk management in your plans will help you make sound decisions."

As summer draws to an end, consider the hazards and how to mitigate them. Weather can change quicker than expected, so don't get caught unaware. Be prepared for any type of weather -- from frost and fallen leaves making walking surfaces slippery to driving home

Tire maintenance keeps drivers safe

Maintaining tires is an important component of safe driving. Tires are some of the hardest working parts on a car or truck and are subjected to wear and tear every time rubber meets the road.

Tires affect many components of driving, including handling, braking and the comfort of the ride. Maintaining tires makes driving safe not only for drivers and their passengers, but also for fellow motorists.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that, in 2017, 738 fatalities occurred because of tire-related crashes. Many of those crashes were no doubt preventable, and that only highlights the importance of maintaining tires and monitoring their performance.

Poor tire maintenance can lead to premature wear and potentially result in a blowout. The automotive group AAA notes it is important to visually inspect tires as often as possible. Drivers should look for overall tread wear. Pay special attention to tread wear on one edge of the tires, which could indicate poor alignment. Erratic tread wear may mean tires are out of balance.

Drivers also should pay attention to how their cars drive and sounds. Unusual vibration or thumping noises suggest issues with the tires. A car that pulls in one direction also may be experiencing tire problems. Vehicle owners should be aware of the routine maintenance steps that can keep them safe and improve the life expectancy of tires.

- · Tire pressure: The NHTSA says only 19 percent of consumers properly check and inflate their tires. Keeping tires properly inflated is one of the most important steps to maintaining them. Tires lose around 1 psi per month, and underinflated or overinflated tires can contribute to unusual wear, blowouts and even excessive fuel consumption.
- · Rotation: Check the owner's manual or recommendations from the tire manufacturer, but know that most mechanics advise having tires rotated every 5,000 to 8,000 miles. Rotation helps distribute wear more evenly on tires.
- · Balancing: AAA says balancing also helps minimize uneven wear and tear. Balanced tires are achieved by using small weights attached to the wheels to limit vibration of the tire and wheels as they turn. New tires should be balanced, and tires also should be balanced after one or more is removed to repair a puncture.
- · Alignment: Vehicles have wheel alignment measurements that pertain to manufacturers' specifications. Alignment that falls outside of the range can impact handling, fuel economy and tread wear. A drift or pull suggests alignment problems and should be addressed.

Vehicle owners should keep tire inspection and maintenance in mind as part of their overall car care plan.

boat and shore with better success at night using crankbaits. Continued fair catfish success. East end of Lake Sakakawea continues producing salmon from both boat and shore casting crankbaits or spoons. A deep bite with down riggers continues but look for that to slow as fish move shallow. Most success is as deep as 60 feet depending on time of day. Try Government or Scoria bays. Also try the spillway area. Better success in morning or evening or overcast days. Continue working deep for walleye on the east end of Lake Sakakawea.

• Lake Sakakawea/northwest N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Montana rains muddied up the Yellowstone and Missouri rivers but should still provide nice fall walleye activity when it cleans up. Try Lund's Landing or Tobacco Garden on the upper end of Lake Sakakawea for walleye using crankbaits or minnows. Work variety of depths and move around with fish also on the move. Look for nice catfish bite.


Music at North Plains is really starting off right! From making meter monsters to using basketballs to perform rhythmswho knew music could be SO fun?

Did you know that nearly 90% of child safety seats are used incorrectly! The two minutes you take each time you buckle up your child correctly can save their life.

Infants: An infant may be restrained in an infant seat or a convertible seat. An infant seat is designed for children birth to one year and about 20 pounds. A convertible seat is designed for children birth to about 40 pounds.

Children less than one year and up to 20 pounds (check your seat's manufacturers instructions for exact weight limits) must be restrained rear facing in the car.

Some infants will reach 20 pounds before one year of age outgrowing their infant seat, but are still not ready to face forward in the vehicle. In this situation, the child should be restrained rear facing in a convertible seat designed to hold children up to 28-30 pounds rear facing. More and more convertible seats are being made to hold heavier infants rear facing. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.

Adjust the seat so that the child is reclining at about a 45 degree

Harness straps should be in the slots at or below the infant's shoulders and should be snug against baby.

Place the retainer clip at armpit level to keep the harness strap on baby's shoulders.

Never place an infant in a front seat with a passenger-side airbag. Harness baby in snugly and then cover the baby with a blanket.

Make sure the seat is installed as tight as possible. Get in a kneel on the seat while tightening the belt. A child safety seat should not move more than one inch in any

Always use a federally approved child safety seat and not a regular household carrier.

Toddlers: Child faces forward in car and in an upright position after 12 months and over 20

Most convertible seats are for

children up to 40 pounds (about 4 years old). Read manufacturer's instructions to check your seat's guidelines

A forward facing seat must have the harness straps in the upper most harness slots.

Built-in safety seats are federally approved and safe for children over 20 pounds and 12 months.

Always make sure the seat is installed as tightly as possible.

Older Children: Children from 40 to 80 pounds or 4'9" tall should use a federally approved booster seat.

A booster seat with a lap and shoulder belt combination is the safest. This can be done with a booster without a shield and one that has a removable shield. Always follow the manufacturer's


instructions for this.

Once children are over 4'9", and have outgrown their booster seat, they should use a safety belt in all seating positions.

Older children are ready to use vehicle safety belts when the lap belt stays low and snug across the hips, and the shoulder belt does not cross the face or in front of the neck.

The safest place for a child to sit is in the middle of the back seat. If the vehicle has a passenger side airbag, all children 12 and under should be restrained in the back seat. Airbags save lives when used with safety belts.

Minot Robotics Team is Waiting for You!

Did you know the Minot Robotics team is made up of not only Minot AFB teens but also local teens from the city of Minot? This community team, known at Team #10173, is one of only seven active FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotics teams within North Dakota. Through the teambased robotics programs, FIRST robotics prepares the youngsters with engineering and problemsolving skills that they can draw upon in situations they may encounter in the future.

An exciting development for Minot Robotics team #10173 is that they recently applied for the DoD STEM grant, which required at least a portion of the team to be affiliated with the DoD. They ended up receiving the grant which will benefit the entire team by helping with their funding for close to half of the season. Colonel John Burrell and his spouse Alicia Burrell are the lead mentors heading up the Minot Robotic Team #10173, their 17-year-old son Will and their 14-year-old daughter Izzie are also apart of the team.

The season typically begins in January and can run all the way through April. Students will be not only be competing for awards, but they will also be learning how to work together as a team, learning how to strategize, raising funding, learning to communicate better, and will also be learning about the concept of Coopertition. Coopertition is vital in FIRST robotics, it is about working together with the other robotics teams to help and inspire each other while at the same time also competing against them. Each Robotics team is randomly assigned partnerships for the three-on-three challenges with two other teams. They must work together to win although where it really gets tricky is the assigned partnered teams switch each match. Although the teams are all in competition with one another they also have to work together in the times they are partnered for a match. So during one match they need to work together and during another match they are again competing against each other.

Col. Burrell and Alicia Burrell further explained how a competition may look, "Typically, a team forms an alliance with two other teams, picked at random, to accomplish tasks for points. Each year is a different theme with different tasks which makes every year unique. A new robot must be designed to meet the challenge, making a more level playing field for old and new teams.'

Minot Robotics Team #10173 will be competing in a minimum of two tournaments during the 2024-2025 season. And if the team does well during the first two tournaments they may even advance to the regional championships! This year's Robotics competition theme, which launches on January 4th, 2025 is called Reefscape. According to the First Robotics Competition, the 2025 Reefscape challenge will have teams using their engineering skills to strengthen one of the ocean's most diverse habitats. When asked why having a Robotics team is so important, The Burrell's both agree that "we need to instill an education related to science, technology, engineering and math in the next generation of teens. We use technology every single day. Your phone, the apps on it, laptops, smart home devices, GPS, etc. That technology was unimagined, yet someone designed it, built it, tested it. Minot teens can help design what comes next!"


The Burrell's future plans for the Minot robotics team #10173 is to become a permanent part of Minot and for it to continue to provide Minot teens with an

outlet even after they move away. The Burrell's hope for the future is that, "Maybe one day there won't just be one team here, but multiple teams! This is our third time in the area and our eldest teen, Will, joined a FIRST Lego league in elementary school that was started by another military family on the base. This was his initial exposure to robotics and he just loved it. We actively sought out a team when we moved to Virginia and he found his place with like minded, creative, innovative individuals."


In the upcoming months the Burrell's will be holding a few interest meetings for anyone interested in joining the Minot Robotics team.






