Wreaths Across America Honors Fallen Heroes in Minot, North Dakota

According to Major Jeffrey Slocum, Commander of the Magic City Composite Squadron, the Civil Air Patrol plays a vital role in honoring those who have served. Each year, the North Dakota Civil Air Patrol Wing contributes 15 cadets, along with many additional volunteers from the community, to help place the wreaths.

Due to the heavy snowfalls common in North Dakota, the

cemetery grounds are often blanketed, making it difficult to locate gravestones. To aid the volunteers, pre-placed crosses mark the locations of the fallen, ensuring that every tombstone can be found and appropriately honored. The Rosehill Memorial Park Cemetery in Minot is home to 944 veterans, whose graves will be adorned with wreaths in tribute to their service.

This is a great opportunity for anyone wanting to give back to the men and women who served our country, and it's especially meaningful for involving the younger generation in giving back to our nation's heroes. Volunteering for Wreaths Across America not only helps honor those who have given so much but also strengthens the bond within the community, ensuring that future generations understand the profound cost of freedom.

Firefighters from 20th AF Bases join to train for missile silo rescues

F.E. WARREN AIR FORCE BASE, Wyo.-- Fire Department members from F.E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyoming, Malmstrom AFB, Montana, and Minot AFB, North Dakota, coordinated together to train and streamline the processes for conducting rescues in the cramped spaces of a 87-feet deep missile silo during a series of training exercises and discussions at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming, Oct. 25, 2024.

The purpose of the exercise was to maximize rescue efficiency if a maintainer was to fall into the missile silo, while also standardizing the techniques and equipment used between the three U.S. Air Force bases.

"We wanted to have a streamlined sort of rescue effect when it came to any and all emergency operations within a missile field between F.E. Warren, Minot and Malmstrom," said Staff Sgt. Zachary Orr, 90th Missile Wing fire company lead. "We wanted to create a standardized operation, whether that be us assisting in other bases or receiving aid, depending on the location of the emergency itself."

On the first day, rescuers rappelled down the cramped, 87feet deep silo of the training missile launch facility. After reaching the bottom, rescuers packaged the training dummy onto a stretcher and hoisted it up slowly and safely. After the dummy reached the top, the rescuers climbed back up the silo to the entrance.

"I just played a rescue technician," said Orr. "I was an example of how we set it up. I put on the gear, I rappelled down the hall, I packaged the victim. I was just being the example of how we made the rescue happen."

The second day was dedicated to constructive criticism and feedback on the manner in which the rescue was performed the day prior and what equipment was used.

"It was good having the validation from our peers on our rescue setup with an emphasis on how streamlined it is," said Jeremie Barrett, 90th Missile Wing fire captain and facilitator of the exercise. "It did help us know that we were on the right track moving forward, and garnering that validation from the assortment of firefighters from all stretches of the country with the breadth of knowledge they brought, absolutely encouraged me."

The exercise provided not only a way in which to streamline rescue operations, but to also cooperate and strengthen the relationships with other bases. With participants from three different Air Force Global Strike Command bases, each participant had a different background with the common goal to provide further insight to maximize every part of a rescue.

SPRITZ COOKIES

(or sometimes referred to as Cream Cheese Cookies)

1 cup butter

3 oz cream cheese

- ½ cup sugar 2 cups flour
- Vanilla

When you have mixed the dough use a cookie press to form thin shapes on baking sheets

Bake at 375 degrees on lower oven rack for 4 minutes, move to

upper rack for 3-4 minutes Bake until they just start to turn brown

Remove the cookie and place on a cooling rack. Decorate to your heart's content. Sprinkles of color sugar, frosting, or a simple hard candy work well. Makes about 6 dozen

RBC in the United States is affiliated with the Charles Schwab investment firm and the Fargo branch is known as RBC Wealth Management.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

While on our way to Rapid City for Thanksgiving, we stopped at Hardees in Dickinson for a bite to eat before hitting those long stretches of highway in western South Dakota.

It had been more than a year since we took the route that took us through Dickinson and south on N.D. Highway 22 to Reeder and bevond.

But Hardees wasn't the suprise that day in Dickinson, it was a bank across the street. Bank of the West had been operating in that location for some time. Little did we know that Bank of the West, headquartered in San Francisco, changed hands in February 2023 and the Dickinson location was

Dickinson branch is operating just like any other bank in North Dakota. It is affiliated with Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., and is bound by other banking regulations.

After further checking, the bank in Dickinson is the only BMO bank in North Dakota, but it was quite a surprise to see how many BMO ATMs are located in the state. There are 26 of them in Dickinson, Bismarck, Alexander, Anamoose, Beach. Beulah. Carrington. Dickinson, Dunseith, Fargo, Grand Forks, Tioga, New Town, Mandan, Hatton, Stanley, New Rockford, Lignite, Harvey, West Fargo, Pembina, Minot, Lidgerwood, Watford City, Northwood, Medina and Jamestown.

OK, if BMO is doing business in North Dakota, are there any other Canadian chartered banks doing business here.

chartered banks that aren't presently located in North Dakota, but have a presence across the United States. They include Toronto Dominion Bank, known in the United States as TD Ameritrade, Scotiabank, or the Bank of Nova Scotia and finally the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, commonly known as CIBC.

Toronto Dominion has 173 branches in the U.S. If you're a basketball fan and watch the Boston Celtics at TD Place in Boston; that arena is named for the Toronto Dominion Bank.

It's unclear how many Scotiabank locations are located in the U.S., but we do know that it operates branches in New York. California, Texas and Puerto Rico. Likewise with CIBC. It has branches in California, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri and

In the grand scheme of things, there are two reasons why the Canadian chartered banks have locations in North Dakota. According to Canadian banking publications, the No. 1 reason is because there is money to be made in North Dakota.

The No. 2 reason is to make it easier for Canadian snowbirds who may be traveling through North Dakota, or who may be staying in the state for an extended period of time. That's why you'll see hundreds of these banks in Florida, Georgia, Texas and California.

It's hard to say if the other chartered banks will open up shop here, but it's pretty clear that in 14 months, BMO has established itself and appears to be doing well.



OK, let's be honest – when it comes to one's image of North Dakota in the winter, downhill skiing isn't exactly in the picture.

Not even remotely in the background.

But it's true, winter sports enthusiasts don't have to drive to Canada, Montana, South Dakota, or even Minnesota to get their downhill skiing thrills in.

Admittedly, North Dakota's four ski areas – Bottineau Winter Park, Frost Fire Park, Huff Hills, and Thrill Hills – won't compete when it comes to high intensity mountainous downhill runs like Montana's Bridge Bowl or Red Lodge. Even Terry Peak Ski Area near Leads, S.D. has the Black Hills as a backdrop.

There won't be any high altitude skiing in North Dakota.

However, downhill skiers might be surprised when they check out any of North Dakota's ski areas. You know something - the state is not flat, after all.

A peek into each of the ski areas is kind of an opportunity to explore what's beyond North Dakota's rolling hills and rich, productive farm land.

For example, Bottineau Winter Park north of Bottineau is in the heart of the Turtle Mountains, an area rising above the prairie like a prized jewel encased in woodlands and dotted, not with diamonds, but small lakes and one a bit bigger – Lake Metigoshe.

It offers downhill skiing, snowboarding, and tubing runs, skiing and snowboarding lessons, and rental equipment – even snowshoes – along with an active military discount for lift tickets.

Check out Bottineau Winter Park's website, (www. skibwp.com),

Farther east, the Pembina Gorge is definitely a unique North Dakota area — literally a gorge in a prairie state and home to the Pembina River, wildlife, and forested areas, along with Frost Fire Park. Like Bottineau Winter Park, it's oh-so-close to the Canadian border and has rental equipment and lessons. and operated the arak since 2017. The foundation has a broad role in supporting not just Frost Fire Park, but the scope of the Pembina Gorge region as a whole with its array of cultural, natural, historical, and recreational opportunities.

Like Bottineau Winter Park and Frost Fire Park, Huff Hills Ski Area near the Missouri River south of Mandan has a decades-long history of providing skiing opportunities in the state. It's grown to become North Dakota's largest ski area, the vision of a Bismarck-Mandan area father who introduced his family to skiing at Bottineau Winter Park.

Look for snowboarding, skiing, rentals, and lessons with more information on their website, (www.huffhills.com).

Bottineau Winter Park is in close proximity to Lake Metigoshe State Park while Thrill Hills Ski Area in southeastern North Dakota is near Fort Ransom State Park. And, like Huff Hills, it's near a river, the Sheyenne, which feeds into the Red River of the North and ultimately Canada's Lake Winnipeg.

Much like Frost Fire Park in the Rendezvous Region of the Pembina Gorge in northeast North Dakota, the Fort Ransom area is steeped in history, local culture, and outdoor recreation year-around.

Two families teamed up to share their love of winter and winter sports to create Thrill Hills with downhill skiing and tubing, lessons, and rentals. More information is available on their website, (www.skithrillhills.com).

Snow, cold, and wind is typically part of any North Dakota winter. However much of the state doesn't always get dosed in major amounts of snow and is actually considered semi-arid.

In other words, snow-making is important to the success of ski areas like Huff Hills and others. But

For performing arts, such as dance, music, and theatre, Minot has the Mouse River Players, Minot Symphony Orchestra, and the Rinat Mouzafarov Institute of Dance and Ballet Theatre. Mouzafarov, born in Alma-Alta, Soviet Union, is a brilliant ballet dancer and choreographer who owns, manages, and teaches at the Rinat Mouzafarov Institute of Dance and Ballet Theatre. How to make driving in inclement weather more safe

Impaired visibility can be a safety hazard while driving. Everything from sun glare to hail can affect a driver's ability to see the road and navigate it effectively. Before drivers get behind the wheel, they should make note of their local forecast and make a plan for what to do if rain, snow or other conditions make it challenging to drive.

The International Association of Traffic and Safety Sciences indicates that, based on an examination of crash test data conducted by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the "likelihood of a crash increases during periods of low visibility, despite the tendency for less traffic and for lower speeds to prevail

in the spring and summer. Use the front and rear defrost if condensation fogs up windshields and windows. Slow down. Foul weather can reduce drivers' ability to see far into the distance. Drivers should always drive slower in inclement weather in order to improve reaction time.

· Top off fluids. Always keep the windshield washer reservoir full and keep extra fluid in the trunk. In addition, look for a fluid that does not freeze in very cold temperatures.

· Learn how to drive in fog. Each year, more than 38,700 vehicle crashes occur in fog, states the Federal Highway Administration. Travelers Insurance recommends

during these times."

Drivers can take several steps to improve their visibility when driving in poor weather conditions.

· Inspect and change windshield wiper blades. Wipers are instrumental in clearing precipitation away from the windshield. If they're not functioning properly, wipers cannot do their jobs. Drivers should replace their wipers at the first indication that they are no longer effective. In some conditions, wipers can freeze or stick. Drivers should then pull over and clean the wipers manually.

· Clear obstructions. Always make sure the windshield is clear before driving. This can include removing ice and snow in the winter and cleaning off mud or bug splatter

slowing down, staying focused and using regular headlights and not high beams when driving in fog.

· Go out only if necessary. In snowy or icy conditions, drive only if it's absolutely necessary, as snow and ice can impair visibility and make roads slick, says AAA.

· Avoid driving at dusk and dawn. The human eye can have trouble adjusting to rapidly changing light and darkness conditions, which are common at dusk and dawn. If possible, drivers should make trips during the heart of the day, especially if poor lighting conditions typically make it difficult for them to drive.

Drivers can take steps to improve visibility when inclement weather makes roadways hard to navigate.

Holiday food safety tips

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Ohio -- Food is an important part of many celebrations. But, don't let foodrelated illness ruin your holiday.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, outbreaks of Clostridium perfringens – the most common cause of foodborne illness in the U.S., which cause nearly one million illnesses every year - occur most frequently in November and December.

"Practicing four basic food safety measures can help prevent foodborne illness," states Lt. Col Dan Anderson, AFMC Command Public Health Officer. He provides the following holiday food safety tips so you can cook with confidence this season.

CLEAN:

Wash hands before, during, and after food preparation. Remember to wash hands when switching tasks, such as handling raw meat and then cutting vegetables. Wash hands with soap in clean, running water for at least 20 seconds.

Wash surfaces and utensils after each use. Clean all surfaces with hot water, dish soap and clean (or paper) towels.

Rinse fruits and vegetables thoroughly under cool running water and use a produce brush to remove surface dirt.

Use different utensils for different tasks. Use separate spoons and forks to taste, stir, and serve food.

SEPARATE: Don't give

bacteria the opportunity to spread from one food to another (crosscontamination).

Keep meat, chicken, turkey, seafood, and eggs separate from all other foods at the grocery store and in the refrigerator. Prevent juices from raw meat, chicken, turkey, and seafood from dripping or leaking onto other foods by keeping them in containers or sealed plastic bags and preferably storing below ready to eat foods.

Use separate cutting boards, plates, and utensils to avoid crosscontamination between foods that are ready to eat, and raw meat, poultry, seafood and eggs. COOK:

Food is safely cooked when it reaches a high enough internal temperature to kill harmful bacteria.

Color is not a reliable indicator of doneness. Use a food thermometer to ensure meat, poultry, and fish are cooked to the food-specific, safe internal temperature to kill germs.

Bring sauces, soups, and gravies to a rolling boil when reheating. Cook eggs until the yolk and white are firm.

Don't eat uncooked cookie dough. Uncooked dough and batter made with flour or eggs can contain harmful germs, such as E.coli and Salmonella. CHILL:

Refrigerate quickly foods

because harmful bacteria grow rapidly at room temperature.

Do not leave foods at room temperature more than two hours. After you are done eating, divide the remaining food into small containers and either refrigerate or freeze.

Set your refrigerator at or below 40°F and the freezer at 0°F. Check both periodically with an appliance thermometer.

Don't taste food that looks or smells questionable. A good rule to follow is, when in doubt, throw it out.

Leftovers should ideally be used within three to four days, but no later than seven days.

Food is a popular holiday gift that can be sent safely in the mail if carefully chosen, properly packaged and delivered in a timely manner. Anderson recommends sending items that ship well including dried foods such as nuts, crackers, spices, teas or granolas. Avoid items with perishable fillings such as cream or custard, and soft, moist cookies that may mold quickly during the shipping process.

Sharing food is a classic winter holiday tradition - and by ensuring food safety, you can protect your family and friends and have an enjoyable holiday season.



Winners from each of the local competitions across North Dakota will be invited to take part in the state finals. for prizes worth at least \$50,000 during the national championship in the Fall of 2025.

"It's never too early to get involved in the community, and we're eager to be spearheading this initiative for our local middle school students," said Brekka Kramer, MACEDC President | CEO. "Not only is this an opportunity to help young people better understand civics and make personal connections to the area, but it offers a unique perspective on what they find important and how they believe in bettering their communities. We look forward to reading the essays that are submitted and hope it sparks inspiration for a lifetime of learning about civics.'



All About Pets

As the chilly weather sets in, the need for proper care and quick action for stray animals is of the utmost importance, especially here in North Dakota. So what can you do if you find a stray animal during the winter?

• Call your local shelter: There are a few shelters in the Minot area who can guide you through the challenge of finding a stray animal. Souris Valley Animal Shelter (701-852-6133), Hairball Haven Feline Rescue (hairballhavenfr@gmail.com), or For Belle's Sake (701-300-8182) may be able to offer you tips on how to catch or care for a stray. If the animal is a lost pet, they may even be able to help you find the owner!

 Bang on the hood of your car: This is something we hear a lot when winter time rolls around. Some feral cats will seek warmth and shelter in the nooks and crannies of your car as it gets colder, so banging on your car can give them time to move to a safer location before it starts up.

 Provide shelfer: If you are willing or able, you can provide shelter and at home care for a stray animal until you are able to find a place for it. If you can lure it into your home or garage (treats and food are the best lures), you give the animal a safe place to rest and warm up until you are able to see a veterinarian or contact a shelter. If you want to help but don't want to bring strays into your home, you can also provide makeshift shelters for them that you can leave on your porch, in

Your favorite neighborhood store serves your driveway, or anywhere else a stray might come. You can DIY shelters using plastic bins that contain blankets, food, water, and some type of insulation.

 Povide sustenance: At the very least, you can also provide food and water to a stray animal. If you are able to keep water in an environment where it will not freeze, this is ideal for below-freezing temparatures.

• Be careful: Carefully handling stray animals is important any time of year. Some animals will be more comfortable around humans than others, so keep an eye out for uncomfortable or aggressive body language to keep yourself safe. If you do not feel comfortable approaching a nervous or aggressive animal, call a local shelter to notify them of the stray and either stay nearby or let them know the location of the sighting. You can also contact Minot's Animal Control. Stray animals may also carry diseases that you do not want to bring home to your own pet. This is where it may be a good idea to keep them in the garage for safety until you are able to have them checked out by a veterinarian.

It takes a caring heart to take care of stray animals, especially in winter conditions. Whether you catch and bring one into your home for care, provide outdoor shelter, or even just make a phone call to someone who is able to help, you are doing a great service to the lost and wandering animals in Minot.
