It's Back, Baby: Freedom Fest Returns to MAFB

This year's Fourth of July festivities were initially scheduled to be festive but straightforward: A fireworks display put on by MUM Pyrotechnics from Sawyer, ND scheduled for the evening of 27 June 2025. According to Matthew Balas, Deputy Director of the 5th Force Support Squadron (FSS) this is their third year handling the display for MAFB. No strangers to dazzling a crowd, MUM pyrotechnics has been in charge of regularly putting on the City of Minot's firework show at the NODAK Speedway since 2014. With all of that experience at the helm of the fun, MAFB's Fourth of July celebrations are certain to inspire patriotism in freedom-loving hearts everywhere.

Originally there were no other events planned beyond daily operations at the Library, Outdoor Pool, Golf Course, and Bowling Center because of the BUFF Bash and Base Open House scheduled for June 13th and 14th. Since their unforeseen cancellation, 5th FSS has pivoted toward putting their many

resources into Freedom Fest 2025: a fun, family-friendly event that some may remember from years past.

The fun will begin at the base library from 1400-1600 with hands-on patriotic themed STEAM activities. According to the 5th FSS these include film bottle rockets, saltpainted fireworks, a mini education information fair, and the extremely popular explosive Coke and Mentos demo, which will take place every hour on the hour.

The excitement will then move to the Rockers parking lot from 1800-2200. Planned events will include a kid zone, face painting, axe throwing, mini golf, yard games and more. While this year's event will not feature a live band, a DJ will be spinning all the latest hits. Additionally, Rocker's Bar and Grill and some of the base's Private Organizations will be on hand to sell food and beverages. The MAFB Spouses Club, for example, plans to sell both cotton candy and drinks as part of their ongoing mission to raise funds for their various

charitable endeavors which includes a scholarship fund for base spouses and dependents. Some private organizations and events will be operating on a cash only basis, so don't forget to visit the ATM before you come out.

After the conclusion of Freedom Fest, attendees can head over to the firework show, which is scheduled to take place roughly at dusk. "There will be bleachers set up in the grass by Bud Ebert Park where people can safely view the Fireworks," noted Mr. Balas. Those familiar with fireworks in North Dakota, known for its longer summer daylight, will know that this often takes place as late as 2300. In case of inclement weather, the alternate date for fireworks will be on 28 June Any changes will be announced through base PA and the 5th FSS Facebook Page.

What Can Happen **In A Career**

A VIEW FROM **OUR SIDE ROD WILSON** northernsentry

I may have shared with you that I began my journalism career at a local hometown newspaper. Perhaps I was around 10 years old when the publisher would catch me on my bike and offer me a quarter, or it could have even been a nickel. to sweep the floors and haul out the trash. As I can remember there was a lot of newspaper scraps on the floor and crumpled up pieces of paper in the trash cans.

There were a couple of desks with these odd looking machines on them...I would soon learn they were typewriters. I took an interest in one of the reporters as he was punching what seemed to be random keys on these machines to create words. Next to his typewriter was what looked like chicken scratching. Later down the road I would learn this was shorthand, a kind of hieroglyphic form of creating a news story document.

Typewriters, of course, would take a revolutionary path through the 60's, 70's and even into the 80's. In general, typewriters became a lot smaller than these metal monsters on the desks of the



reporters at the Maddock Standard. Our first typewriter at home was blue in color, as I remember it, and quite a bit smaller; and yes, it was still a manual typewriter, which meant you had to really push down hard on the keys to create a typewritten document.

But now a quick digression to the Maddock Standard. All of those crumpled up sheets of paper in the waste backets? Well, those were news, or sports stories gone wrong. I would watch the reporters as they would write (or type) their way into a corner and with the flip of their wrist remove a sheet of paper from their typewriter, crumple it up and quickly toss it into the waste basket. No white out or erase tape here. From what I could tell from my stool where I would stop to take a short rest, no story was completed without a termination. A termination? That would normally be a few terse words and then the ripping sound of a sheet of paper being torn from the typewriter.

I didn't work very long at the Maddock Standard, however my older brother did...but he once told me that when the newspaper closed they hauled most of those front line, manual, non-correcting typewriters to the city dump west of town. I have often seen typewriters in museums that resembled those typewriters at the Maddock Standard. And you know what? We had a few of them in our typewriter lab at Maddock High School where I took my first typing class.

Somewhere in my high school days, the Maddock High School purchased new typewriters... They were not only electric, but gone was



the row of metal bars with letters attached that actually did the typing. They were replaced with a ball that rotated and printed a letter once you hit a key. Amazing!

Over the 50 plus years of my Journalism career I would encounter at least 20 more "newest & best" typewriters, the last having a key that allowed you to just kind of back space and erase what you just typed. You could literally erase an entire line of misguided print. But really, you still could write yourself into a corner on an article or story and the wrist rip and crumple motion became your only option.

So why this walk down memory lane? My granddaughter, who is 8 years old, accompanied her dad to work one day at The Lights complex in West Fargo. Scheduled to go on the stage at The Lights this summer is the Broadway play "Newies". If you are not familiar with Newsies, it is about newspaper boys who deliver papers in New York and consequently go on strike.

As one would expect, there would be a typewriter on the set of Newsies, which would lead my granddaughter to question her Dad as to just what this machine is? Without a whole lot more of written rhetoric, let's just say

that from the back room of the Maddock Standard to the text messaging, (and several of our Northern Sentry reporters have used their cell phone text message features to write articles) phones of today has been quite a leap. One day Addely and I will have to sit down and talk about "what BePa does for a living." In the meantime, we booked our tickets to Newsies and the typewriter on set surely won't be a question to me...

MAYBE YOU SHOULD...

Think about attending Military Days at Fort Stevenson State Park south of Garrison. Frontier Military Days at Fort Stevenson State Park will be held on June 28th and 29th. The event will take place from noon to 4:00 PM both days on the Guardhouse Interpretive Center lawn. It's a free event open to the public, offering a glimpse into 1870s military life. There's a lot to do and see, but the highlight each day for me is the firing of the cannon at 12:00 Noon and 3:30 PM. All events are free with a vehicle pass to the park.

Life is a journey. It's just that some take the interstate while the rest of us discover all the dead ends.

North Dakota ghost towns in northern Emmons County and held the county seat for a time, and when the railroad was built three miles west, people moved there and started the community of Hazelton.

Winona was in the southwest and was directly across the Missouri River from Fort Yates. It was once a major stopping point on the stage coach from Bismarck to Sturgis, but when Linton was established in 1899, the town quickly died out.

One of the communities on this list is Old Sanish, in Mountrail County. Another is Elbowoods in McLean County. Of course these two places are barren because they are both at the bottom of Lake Sakakawea. Many of you will recall that before Garrison Dam was built, these two towns were moved to higher ground to a place now called New Town. There was another place submerged by Lake Sakakawea that many of us don't know about and that was Beaver Creek in Williams County. It was located east of Epping and was completely abandoned in 1955. Independence, Lucky Butte, Nishu, Red Butte and Shell Creek were additional small communities that were flooded when Garrison Dam was built.

Baden, Brisbane, Charging Eagle, Dogtooth, Hample, Ives, Leipzig, Lynwood, Mose, Petrel, Pierce, Sanger, Schmidt, Sully Springs and Three V Crossing are all places that truly are ghosts. Nothing remains but history, no buildings, no roads, although in some cases cemeteries remain

Hollywood tends to portray ghost towns as those that have buildings and are abandoned. North Dakota has some of those too. Those places are classified as abandoned sites as a subcategory of ghost town.

If you're on of those people out there who actually like to chase ghosts, you might consider the following; Old Fort Rice and Fort Buford. Old Fort Rice is in Morton County, south of Mandan and has quite a history as a U.S. Army reservation. Even more so is Fort Buford, in Williams County, There's an historic fort there now, but if you dig into the history of the actual Army post Fort Buford, you'll find Soldiers didn't just die in prairie raids, more of them died from disease and mental health issues than from bullets or arrows. When those two forts existed. there was a lot of uncertainty with Dakota Territory, communities and doctors were far apart and winters

were more brutal than anyone could have imagined.

There's another place, not a military post, that is supposedly haunted and that is San Haven, in Rolette County. It was a tuberculosis sanatorium and later state hospital north of Dunseith, near the Canadian border. It was built in 1913 and closed in 1987.

There, you have a massive building with broken-out windows, asbestos contamination and can you imagine the number of people who died there in the 75 years the place existed?

There's one place on the ghosttown list that has perhaps as much civilian history as do the two Army posts previously named.

Schafer was the McKenzie County seat before Watford City existed. The town may have still existed had it not been for a land dispute between the Schafer family and the Great Northern Railway. Watford City was founded in 1914 leaving Schafer with nothing more today than the old McKenzie County jail. There are a lot more, Temvik, Tagus, Baden, Banks, Carbury, Clyde, Hartland, Heaton; in effect, too many to mention. But if any of these places could talk, oh the stories they could tell.

93-year-old retired veteran pilot revisits the B-52

Nearly six decades after his last flight, retired U.S. Air Force Maj. Gary Lee stood on the flightline at Minot Air Force Base, marshaling in the modern iteration of the aircraft he once piloted: the B-52 Stratofortress.

Lee, 93, traveled from his home in South Carolina to visit Minot AFB on June 2025, to reconnect with the legendary bomber he flew during his two-decade career in the U.S. Air Force, which spanned from 1955 to 1975. Over the course of that time, he piloted several variants of strategic bombers, including the B-47 and B-52D, E and F models.

"The last time I flew was the summer of 1967," Lee said. "Back then, I was flying as an aircraft commander, we had a lot of deployments. We once had 18 airplanes and 18 crews on alert 24/7 for one Bomb Wing. It was kind of hectic.'

During his visit, Lee was given a guided tour to see the base's B-52H aircraft, the current model operated by the 5th Bomb Wing. For the veteran pilot, the experience was both nostalgic and enlightening.

Lee's early career began with the B-47 Stratojet as a copilot, where promotion opportunities were limited due to the presence of seasoned World War II veterans who dominated the ranks of Strategic Air Command.

"It was hard to get upgraded in those days," Lee recalled. "But at the Bomb Wing I was in, they finally got one quota to upgrade, and they gave that to me. I thought, 'Wow. I didn't know the wing commander liked me that much.'

Even in his copilot days, Lee juggled several roles. "I was also the [electronic countermeasure] operator, the tail gunner and the assistant navigator. Every now and then, they let me land an airplane, and I'd take it.'

Últimately, it was the B-52 that became his favorite to fly. When the B-47s were phased out, Lee was one of the select few in his

Wing chosen to transition to the newer bombers. That legacy still soars today, as the B-52 continues to evolve with modern upgrades while remaining the backbone of America's long-range bomber fleet.

"I'm very pleased I came," he said. "I found out a little bit about the B-52H model that I didn't know and it was all positive. I'd do it again, mainly because I'm back on an Air Force base with Air Force people and they haven't changed in the last 50 years, which is wonderful to know. It resumes my faith in my fellow man."


With lakeside ceremony space for up to 100 guests, reception seating for up to 400 guests, and customizable setups, we provide the ideal backdrop for any occasion."

All About Pets



As many Airmen and families already know, military life is not easy. Here are a few tips to help you make manage your busy Air Force life while also taking proper care of your pet!

•Get a low maintenance pet—snakes, certain varieties of fish, hamsters and other rodents, and turtles are just a few ideas of pets that are relatively low maintenance compared to your everyday dogs and cats. It's still important to provide adequate enrichment, environments, and food for them, but if you do all those things, these pets will be just fine during long work hours. Be sure to check with you housing authority first to make sure these pets are allowed.

 Find a "lazy" pet—high energy and working dog breeds are not recommended for owners who are away from home a lot and do not have the time, energy, and resources to keep their dogs fully enriched. You could consider bringing home a characteristically "lazy" breed instead. Basset Hounds, Boston Terriers, Bull Mastiffs, and Maltese are a few dog breeds that pop up often in the conversation around low-energy breeds. However, it's still important to note that all dogs are different. You may find a dog that is a couch-potato by nature, or you may find a "low-energy" dog that wants to go 24/7. Make sure you consider the needs of certain breeds and individual dogs (or cats) before adopting, and even if you have a low-energy dog, you still need to meet their basic requirements. Which is why working people should consider...

•Outside help-for shorter periods (a week in the field, a 12 hour day at work), it would

be beneficial to hire a pet sitter, dog walker, or even a neighbor or family member who is willing to help out. While some pets won't go crazy at home all day, they still need to be provided with socialization and enrichment. See if you can find someone to pop in every few hours to play with, feed, and let your pet outside! Doggy daycare is a great option for many canine parents, and while cats and other small pets are usually alright left alone, it's never a bad idea for them to have someone to play with. Don't be afraid to reach out to the base community through Facebook or your friends/family for help if you're feeling overwhelmed with your pet-parental duties. Chances are there is someone out there who is willing to help you and your pet out.

•For bigger challenges, consider finding a temporary foster home for your pet. Family members, close friends, and even willing community members are always options for long-term pet care instead of rehoming. There are also "deployed pet" help sites that can connect you with temporary fosters, such as Dogs on Deployment and Guardian Angels for Soldier's Pets. If you're thinking about rehoming your pet due to the cost of PCSing with them, consider applying for SPCA International's Operation Military Pets grant.

Taking care of pets is a big responsibility, but when we bring them into our home, it's our duty to treat them with the care and love that they give us as well. Military life can make it more difficult, but there are so many resources out there to help.

In 1960, the Belgian Congo, a colony in West Central Africa, was granted independence and became the Republic of the Congo. Due to a power-sharing struggle between two opposing political parties and continuing unrest, a civil war broke out. The United Nations deployed troops to help keep the peace as the nation was torn apart. In order to evacuate refugees from the Belgian colony, Operation NEW TAPE began on July 8, 1960. The operation evacuated over 300 American civilians, delivered more UN troops, and flew other humanitarian relief missions. USAF in Europe provided

medical air support. The 317th Tactical Hospital Detachment from Evreux Air Base, France, even set up a dispensary. C-130s and C-124s from various American and European squadrons were used to airlift over 1,000 tons of food and over 2,500 refugees. Operation NEW TAPE lasted four years and at the time, became the biggest airlift since the Berlin Arilift. 

A TAILRACE ADVENTURE

The Missouri River tailrace lies below 66.5 million cubic yards of Fort Union clay shale earthen fill and 1.5 million cubic yards of concrete comprising Garrison Dam and its spillway.

The dam holds back water from the Missouri River and its tributaries – Little Missouri, Yellowstone, and Milk rivers – squeezing through six hydropower generating units before returning to the modern version of its former self.

The tailrace below Garrison Dam has become a fishing treasure in the decades since the dam closed in 1953 creating Lake Sakakawea.

Much of the fishing focus on the lake, a massive water body that is the third largest reservoir in the United States, centers around boat fishing.

But anglers don't necessarily need a boat when fishing the tailrace. Yes, they can launch off the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers concrete boat ramp on the east side of the river and head near the chutes or downstream.

But there's good reason for shore-fishing's popularity in the tailrace: It's typically a nice place to catch a variety of fish.

And you don't need a boat.

While walleye are the most abundant – and most popular– it's possible to catch catfish, northern pike, rainbow trout, salmon, and at the "right" time of year, even ling.

Anglers tend to focus on two access points when casting a line from shore, described Pick City's Scott Hobbs– the area around the ramp or rocks lining the river's shoreline, which protect against erosion north of the ramp.

The longtime owner of Scott's Bait and Tackle, Hobbs offered some tips and tricks to tailrace shore-fishing: Try casting jigs with live bait such as nightcrawlers or minnows or artificial bait during the day if fishing around the boat ramp. "Walleye are nocturnal feeders so they tend to be deeper during the day," he added. Try light jigs – about 3/8-ounce – in the calm, slack water around the ramp.

But don't hesitate to try a slide weight presentation such as a Lindy rig if fish are a bit finicky about jigs. Casting crankbaits farther out into the faster water coming from the power plant chutes is another popular technique, especially at night when fish tend to feed. Oftentimes the best night fishing finds anglers fishing from the rocks. Just be cautious when trekking over those humungous boulders.

Bobber fishing tends to be less popular because the river's fast current scoots it to shore so quickly.

Yet another tailrace fishing opportunity isn't for those

Yes, it's possible to reel it in but anglers familiar with fishing the wing walls came up with an ingenious method – a basket.

It's not any basket. Nor is it just a fish net.

Nope, it's a basket most anglers make themselves using a good ol' bicycle tire rim, fish netting, a rock, and hose clamps.

Yes, Hobbs described: Clamp netting around the rim and add a rock to keep the net from floating when it's in the water to enjoy the easiest way to bring up a catch.

Flood protection and water supply are two major purposes for Missouri River System dams and reservoirs but its hydropower plants also provide vital electricity for the country's electric energy grid.

Because of that, river levels below Garrison Dam fluctuate based on electrical needs throughout the day, time of year, or in periods of drought and floods.

Typically, though, it doesn't interfere with an opportunity to cast a line in the summer and catch any of the variety of fish that call the tailrace and downstream Missouri River "home".

Another nice thing about shore-fishing the tailrace is the opportunity to observe other wildlife, especially bald eagles, a variety of ducks and water birds, and critters living in the remnant river bottom forest.

Accessing the tailrace is a matter of taking N.D. Highway 200 to Riverdale, head west crossing Garrison Dam spillway – use caution because there could be construction creating one-way traffic until it's completed – and taking the paved road off to the left when starting to cross the dam.



afraid of heights – the wing walls on the west side of the power plant tunnels. It's a long way to the water from the concrete walls.

Anglers typically drop a jig and minnow down for eatersized walleye with morning hours usually offering the best success.

Should a fish decide to take the bait the challenge then becomes how to skinny it up the high concrete slab without it flipping to freedom.

Flat Tires may create the rim of the wheel to rest on the tire tread or on the ground possibly triggering in loss of control of the auto or irreparable damages to the tire. One of the most usual source for a flat tire is penetrating of the tire by a sharp object, such as a nail, allowing air escape. Depending on the size of the puncture, the tire could deflate slowly or swiftly. Which may lead to the following concerns:

- Failure of or damages to the valve stem;
- Allowing air to escape from the valve or triggering damages through intentional puncturing
- Rubbing of the tire versus the roadway, tearing the tire, or splitting up of tire and rim by collision with additional objects;
- Too much wear of the tire tread causing explosive tire failing or permitting roadway fragments to tear through it
- Some tires, particularly a slow leakage, may be fixed and re-inflated; others, particularly those from worn tread, have to be changed.

Here are some simple methods to catch tire troubles before they become pricey or unsafe. Take a good examination of each tire in a well lit atmosphere. Examine for uneven tire wear, which can easily be created by:

- Too much or insufficient air pressure
- Issues with tire alignment or tire balancing
- Troubles with the suspension
- Unequal tire wear could be an indicator that you may have to have your tires rotated

These could suggest you need brand-new tires-- soon. Driving with a flat tire, specifically at high speeds, may cause a fatal accident. These troubles have the possibility to create a blowout, causing a loss of control that may be incredibly harmful.

- Fracturing or bulging treads or sidewalls that may suggest there is wear or weak point
- Foreign items that pass through in to the tire (nails, screws, glass)
- Tread tearing away from the body of the tire

Celebrating World Giraffe Day

Roosevelt Park Zoo is making bold strides in animal care, conservation, and community engagement this summer with two extraordinary milestones. The grand opening of the African Plains Building, a stateof-the-art indoor giraffe facility, was celebrated on June 21, coinciding with World Giraffe Day, while the birth of four critically endangered Amur tiger cubs on May 19 marks a historic achievement in wildlife preservation. Combined with the release of a new children's book spotlighting a real-life tiger cub's journey to North Dakota, it's clear that the zoo's mission extends far beyond its gates.

On World Giraffe Day, Roosevelt Park Zoo officially opened its doors to the brand-new African Plains Building, a transformative addition to its African animal exhibits and one of the most advanced giraffe care facilities in the region. At 7,300 square feet, the indoor giraffe habitat was designed with intention and innovation, built to promote both physical health and mental enrichment for its long-necked residents.

The facility was customengineered to support giraffe-sized bone health, especially important during our long North Dakota winters, from the high ceilings to the specially installed pulley-based feeders, every aspect encourages natural movement, stretching, and foraging behaviors.

Beyond the visible features, the giraffe habitat includes complex enrichment systems and husbandry tools that enable zoo staff to provide world-class care. The pulley feeders encourage giraffes to reach and stretch in ways that mimic their natural browsing patterns, promoting strong joints and healthy postures.

The zoo's giraffe conservation doesn't stop at the enclosure. Roosevelt Park Zoo has proudly partnered with Save Giraffes Now, an international organization committed to protecting giraffe populations in the wild. Together, they're working on an active conservation project in the Swara Plains of Kenya, a vital ecosystem for wild giraffes currently threatened by habitat loss and poaching.

Guests can enjoy interactive giraffe feeding experiences daily at 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., offering upclose encounters that help spark empathy, education, and awareness in visitors of all ages.

While the giraffes reached new heights, Roosevelt Park Zoo also marked a landmark achievement in tiger conservation this spring. On May 19, the zoo's resident Amur tigress gave birth to four healthy cubs, a rare and significant event for a species listed as critically endangered. There are estimated to be fewer than 500 Amur tigers remaining in the wild, making each birth an essential step toward the species' survival.

"These cubs represent a major positive step forward in our effort to support the global population of Amur tigers," said Dr. Logan Wood. "Having four thriving cubs and a mother who is successfully raising them is a true testament to the dedication and care provided by our incredible team."


This is not only a biological milestone, but also a success story in terms of mother-reared cubs, which is always preferred in conservation breeding efforts. When mothers raise their own young without intervention, it's an encouraging sign of maternal health, stress-free environments, and effective habitat design.

Guests eager to meet the new feline family will be able to see the tiger cubs for the first time during their official public debut on July 29, which fittingly coincides with World Tiger Day. At that event, the zoo will also reveal the cubs' names, chosen with care to reflect their heritage and personalities.

Until then, the zoo continues to monitor their growth and milestones closely, preparing the habitat for increased public visitation.

Adding a literary touch to an already inspiring summer, Roosevelt Park Zoo is proud to feature a brand-new children's book now available at the zoo gift shop. Titled "A Family for Zoya: The True Story of an Endangered Cub", the book was written by Debra Kim Wolf and beautifully illustrates the emotional and physical journey of a young tiger who eventually made her home at Roosevelt Park Zoo.

Zoya's story is not fictional, iit is rooted in real events. Born at the Philadelphia Zoo, Zoya faced an uncertain start to life. After being orphaned, she was adopted by a Sumatran tiger family at the Oklahoma City Zoo, a rare crosssubspecies surrogate experience that helped Zoya learn the social and

survival behaviors she would need as an adult.

Now, Zoya lives at Roosevelt Park Zoo in Minot, where she continues to thrive and inspire. Her story has become a symbol of collaboration between accredited zoos, and her book serves as an educational tool for young readers learning about species survival and the global efforts needed to protect endangered animals.

Between the debut of a worldclass giraffe facility, the arrival of four rare tiger cubs, and the release of an inspiring children's book, Roosevelt Park Zoo is not just preserving species. NOTES ON BEING SAFE

Obeying the law, prior planning key to fireworks safety

The Fourth of July is right around the corner and most of us are probably planning a special event of some type, some folks might even be looking forward to setting off their own fireworks display. More than 11,000 people are injured in the United States each year from fireworks. Most injuries are the result of the lack of adult supervision and misuse of the fireworks. If you plan on using fireworks to add to the celebration this year here are some important reminders:

• Observe local laws. The sale of fireworks is legal from June 26 until July 5 and they may not be purchased by persons under the age of 12.

• Fireworks Permitted on Base Are; Sparklers, fountains, smoke devices, snake and glow worms, trick noisemakers such as party poppers, string poppers or snappers, and toy pistol caps.

· Fireworks Specifically Prohibited on Base Are; Explosive or aerial fireworks, roman candles, and rockets or similar devices. If prohibited fireworks are discovered in your possession on the base, the fireworks will be confiscated and you will face administrative/ disciplinary actions.

• Fireworks are allowed in Ward County but NOT within in the city limits of Minot. If you are caught within city limits with fireworks you will have to appear in court, pay a minimum \$150 bond and be fined between \$50 to \$75. It is also a Class B Misdemeanor.

· People should watch what clothing they wear when using fireworks. Loose clothing can catch fire, and shouldn't be worn while handling fireworks.

• Never try to re-ignite fireworks that have malfunctioned. Wait 20 minutes before soaking them with water and throwing them away.

Alcohol and fireworks do not mix. Have a "designated shooter."

The transportation and storage of personal fireworks on Minot AFB is prohibited. The fact is there are no safe and sure ways to use fireworks - it's that simple! In 2008, according to the National Fire Protection Association, fireworks caused an estimated 22,500 reported fires. These fires resulted in one death, 40 injuries and \$42 million in direct property damage. Fireworks, even the smallest of firecrackers, are explosives and very unpredictable. Some have very short fuses and some have hard to light fuses that can suddenly begin a rapid burn. Rockets and cones tend to have no programmed guidance system, making people and buildings unwanted targets.

Each year thousands of Americans, many of them children, are victims of fireworks accidents. In 2008, U.S. hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 7,000 people for fireworks related injuries. These accidents are not minor; they include the loss or disfiguration of fingers, hands, arms, faces, vision, hearing and severe burns. Sparklers, which can burn as hot as 1000 degrees have caused countless tragic injuries to small children since parents assume they are safe for children to use.

By observing these reminders, people can help prevent unfortunate accidents. Remember, in case of an emergency, call 911.

• Use fireworks outdoors only.

• Never let children handle or light fireworks. Even sparklers can be dangerous if unsupervised. 16 percent of those injuries involved sparklers. That number increases to 33 percent of the injuries to children, five or younger, when they used sparklers. Those injuries could've been avoided if adults provided adequate supervision.

 Never ignite fireworks while holding them. Only light one at a time, and move away quickly.
 Make sure there's enough room to ignite fireworks, and keep them away from buildings, vehicles and flammable materials.
 Have a full bucket of water






