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# Honor • Educate • Inspire North Dakota Plans For Military Gallery

The state of North Dakota is only one of 4 states that does not, to this date, have a military museum. But according to Jackie Huber, ND National Guard Foundation President "we have a great story that needs to be told, and it needs to be told through a statewide effort like the Military Gallery that is planned to be built on the south side of the ND Heritage Center and State Museum on the State Capitol Grounds in Bismarck."

This is the message that Huber and a group of members of the ND Military Gallery Executive Committee brought to Minot on Monday night. "The state of Norh Dakota has a rich and diverse military history. Our military history and stories need to be presented and shared" according to Huber "and in talking to people around the state and here in Minot we hear, it's about time.'

With a base funding of \$39 million dollars approved by the North Dakota State Legislature and signed by Governor Kelly Armstrong during the last legislative session, the task at hand is to raise a total of \$78 million dollars. According to a brochure that was distributed to the group gathered for the Minot

presentation Huber ads "As Americans we need to remember that the freedoms we enjoy today are due to the sacrifices of those who have served in our Armed Forces. The North Dakota Military Museum will ensure our military history is shared with the hope that a whole new generation is inspired to serve our great nation."

If the committee is successful in their fund raising efforts, the doors to this new Military Gallery and Museum will open in 2027. "I just noticed that construction signage has gone up at the site" says Huber.

There was a short video presentation to open a short information program. After that various members of the Executive Committee took turns talking about the Military Gallery and how it would feature the great military heritage of North Dakota histories of the Native American nations in North Dakota.

From the Minot Air Force Base Col's Mike Taylor, Deputy Commander of the 5th Bomb Wing and Col Mike Suden of the 91st MW operations Group spoke on behalf of Minot Air Force Base. "We have in Minot, and North Dakota" according to Col Taylor, a very unique relationship

between not only Minot Air Force Base and the community of Minot, but also a unique relationship between all of our military and the state of North Dakota.'

There was a bit of humor as Executive Committee member Bill Peterson spoke of wanting to bring a Minuteman III missile home with him to feature in the museum "which is something we can't do" said Col Taylor with a smile, "but we may in the future be able to provide a different

As far as education, Huber talked about how those who toured the gallery would experience all of the military history in North Dakota and will serve as a place show our kids the sacrifice and heroism of North Dakotans who have proudly served their state and nation.

The new Military Gallery will feature an outdoor amphitheater, several indoor galleries that will include an All-Šervices exhibit, a Native American military history exhibit, a Regimental/Conference room, a catering kitchen along with administrative offices. Included will be an event center that will be used of military functions such as large presentations and events like military balls. There will be theater areas that will also be used to tell the North Dakota military stories.

On the ND Historical Society website, the description of the new Military Gallery explains and

promotes this very worthwhile endeavor. This 67,000-square foot (20,000 encompassing the Military Gallery) addition to the North Dakota Heritage Center & State Museum on the state Capitol grounds will be bursting with fascinating narratives to help us understand the military's and North Dakota's influence around the world. You will encounter the first Native American military societies, acts of bravery, secret

missions, humanitarian aid, and pivotal moments in history. It includes a 20,000-square-foot Military Gallery plus ample space for large events, a North Dakota National Guard Regimental Room, expanded food service, and an outdoor courtyard and amphitheater.

Yes, North Dakota, it is about time that we do honor the military heritage of our great state.

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# Minot Air Force Base celebrates the opening of the Airmen Ministry Center

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - Minot Air Force Base celebrated the grand opening of its new Airmen Ministry Center, a space designed to foster connection, relaxation and camaraderie among Airmen of all ranks. After a year and a half of dedicated planning, coordination and preparation, the center is now open and ready to serve as a hub for recreation and relaxation.

The Airmen Ministry Center was created to provide a welcoming environment where Airmen can unwind, connect and engage in activities they enjoy regardless of their position or rank. Overseen initially by the Minot AFB Chapel Team, the long-term vision is for the center to be operated by volunteers through the HOPE Program, encouraging peer leadership sustained community involvement.

"The Airmen Ministry Center is a place of connection for Airmen to go where they can relax and connect with people," said Senior Airman Keolani Tran Copas, a religious affairs Airman. "It's a place where you can go and play games, relax after work or build connections.'

Inside the center, visitors will find a variety of amenities aimed at promoting relaxation and entertainment. Including an area to watch games or movies, a space with gaming computers and an area for tabletop board games. There are also spaces for eating and lounging designed to encourage casual conversation and connection.

The facility was brought to life through months of collaboration to ensure the space met the needs of the Airmen while also upholding the standards of the base. Rules have been put in place to maintain the integrity of the center, including a strict noalcohol policy, an emphasis on mutual respect across all ranks,

2) Cross Ranch State Park-Located about 90 minutes south of Minot along the Missouri river, this park lets you walk amongst tall cottonwood trees that are over 100 years old. Follow the path along the river and soon you will be taken up into what was once native North Dakota prairie to the Cross Ranch. Cross Ranch is located along the only free-flowing section of the Missouri River in North Dakota. The river is bordered by some of the most extensive floodplain forests left in the state. Farther away from the river are uplands that are covered by mixed-grass prairie, a small remnant of what once covered millions of acres before agricultural development. Although the natural flow of the river has been greatly altered by the operation of Lake Sakakawea, several endangered species are found in the river and along its banks. Least terns, piping plovers and fall-migrating whooping cranes still use the sandbars in the river, Pallid sturgeon cruise its channels and bald eagles fish the waters.

Pembina Gorge The Recreation Area & Icelandic State Park- Located in the north eastern tip of North Dakota, the Pembina Gorge recreation area, and soon to be Pembina Gorge State Park has become a top destination for adventure seekers throughout North Dakota and the surrounding states. The Pembina Gorge State Recreation Area encompasses over 2,800 acres of public land in the Pembina River Gorge. With steep valley cliffs towering over small, isolated prairies and pocketed wetlands surrounded by the largest continuous, undisturbed forest in North Dakota, its stunning beauty is simply unmatched.

Looking for recreation trails?

With over 30 miles of trails, the Pembina Gorge provides visitors with an exceptional outdoor experience. The trails at the Pembina Gorge are open to horseback riding, hiking, kayaking, mountain biking and off-highway vehicles (OHV). There are also opportunities for non-motorized recreation on groomed trails in the winter season. Kayak rentals and transportation are available by contacting the on-site staff.

When fall comes to the Pembina Gorge, so do the fall colors. It's a photographers' dream.

4) Fort Ransom State Park-Maybe the longest trip, closer to 3 hours, Taking its name from a 1860s military fort, Fort Ransom State Park is located in the midst of the scenic and heavily wooded Sheyenne River Valley. The river provides abundant opportunities for canoeing, fishing and bird watching, while within the park can be found a short segment of the North Country National Scenic

During the summer, horseback riding and camping are favorite activities, while crosscountry skiing is a popular winter sport. A farmstead within the park is the setting for the annual Sodbuster Days celebration with

demonstrations and exhibits of homesteading life.

Check out the many rental opportunities in the park including the modern yurts and The Percheron Wagon. The Percheron Wagon is a one-ofa-kind experience. While the Percheron has a rustic exterior, the interior is quite homey. The wagon has a king bed and a set of twin bunk beds. It also includes a refrigerator, microwave, four barstools around a wagon wheel table, heat and air conditioning.

It's no question that Norwegian and German heritage get a lot of attention in North Dakota. But, there is a small building on the west side of Villard Avenue in Dickinson that packs a powerful punch when it comes to European heritage in North Dakota.

Here you'll find the Ukrainian Cultural Institute, which houses the history, the good will and of course, the culture, of the Ukrainian immigrants and their descendants who landed in western North Dakota.

Native dress, wheat fields, ethnic food, the North Dakota Ukrainian Hall of Fame, how religion tied into the settlers, traditional furniture and art; let's not forget art, especially those special Easter eggs; are all

on display here that includes a small gift shop.

There is one particular "artifact," however, that is catching a lot of attention and it has to do with the war that is currently happening in the old country.

A military flag from the Ukrainian Third Separate Assault Brigade is currently on display, autographed by Ukrainian Soldier Yurry Shyshuck, who is currently serving on the front lines near Kharkiv, a community that has been pounded by Russian aggression.

Inscribed on the lower right of the flag, and written in Ukrainian, is "To actors from Les Kurbal Theater" from Yurry Shyshuck. Since the invasion in February 2022, that particular theater has been used as a shelter for displaced people.

The flag found it's way to Dickinson in a way that many of us who embrace cultural heritage will understand.

Ihor and Iha Kuchynsskky came to visit their daughter Ilona who has lived in Canada since 2022. They also came to visit Carol and Bill Kulish and together, they paid a visit to the Ukrainian Cultural Institute in

Dickinson June 23 and 24.

The special flag was then presented to the institute by Bill Kulish who was representing Shyshuck, his nephew.

Ihor Kuchynsskky presented a booklet from the Les Kubas Theater from 1988 with the inscription, "Warmest regards and best wishes to UCI community and members in Dickinson and North Dakota. Glory to Ukraine, Glory Heroes!"

The people at the institute are very proud of this flag that came from the front lines, not only because it came to Dickinson, straight from a war zone, but despite all the chaos going on in eastern Ukraine, Shyshuck took the time to think about people he has a special bond with in western North Dakota.

If you are not familiar with Ukrainian heritage in North Dakota, a large number of immigrants from Ukraine settled in southwest North Dakota, more specifically in Dickinson, Belfield, Fairfield, New England and the rural areas around these communities.

We don't often see it in other

parts of the state, but there is a strong spiritual and heritage connection to the old country, just like with Scandinavian heritage at the the Norsk Hostfest in Minot, or Sauerkraut Day in Wishek that showcases German heritage, or August the Deuce in Mountain that keeps Icelandic heritage alive in North Dakota.

There are a number of events the institute puts on annually showing the Dickinson region important Ukrainian heritage is to North Dakota. There are numerous workshops and meals throughout the year showcasing the best of Ukraine. The events include a booth at Pride of Dakota showcases in Dickinson and Bismarck.

- N.D. Game & Fish Dept. game wardens:
- Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Continued good numbers of small walleye pulling nightcrawlers and bottom bouncers in 20 to 25 feet. Move around to locate larger fish.
- Lake Darling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: Not much activity on Lake Darling.
- Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: Continued fair bluegill and crappie activity. Try early morning or late evening for walleye.
- Lake Šakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: East end of Lake Sakakawea producing walleye in 10 to 20 feet using a variety of presentations. Move around with generally fair success throughout the area, including the bays themselves.
- Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Decent walleye bite around 7 Sisters and Mallard Island on the east end of Lake Sakakawea using plain snells and bottom bouncers with nightcrawlers or minnows. Try Riverdale Bluffs working over to Deadman's Bay in 70 feet and deeper for salmon. Lake Audubon fair to good for smallmouth bass using top water swim baits or tubes. Work the weeds with plain snells and bottom bouncers with nightcrawlers or minnows for some decent walleye activity.

Resort, Garrison: Try the south side across from the resort in 25 to 35

East end of Lake Sakakawea spotty for walleye with fish scattered in a variety of depths, likely due to inconsistent weather. Try Wolf Creek, 7 Sisters, or Centennial, Douglas, or Steinke bays. Continued smallmouth bass success working bays and rocky points Try Fisherman's Point in Sakakawea State Park or rocky areas along the dam from shore for smallmouth bass, as well. Salmon remain spotty with most numbers coming from 70 feet and deeper. Try Government

going are finding some walleye success using crankbaits. Also try spinners and nightcrawlers. Try White Earth Bay or Hofflund Island. **5th Munitions** Squadron is ready for **AFCOCOMP 2025** 

5TH BOMB WING PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The 5th Munitions Squadron (5MUNS) is ready to compete in the Air Force Combat Operations Competition (AFCOCOMP) at Beale Air Force Base, California, from Aug. 11-15.

AFCOCOMP is an annual competition that pits conventional munitions maintenance Airmen from major commands across the Air Force in a battle against one another for munitions supremacy. This year, nine teams will face off in a nine-event contest designed to test everything from teamwork and precision to endurance and adaptability.

This competition prepares us for the bigger fight," said Tech. Sgt. Joshua Richardson, conventional maintenance section chief and returning team lead. "If we were called to action and you needed a team to go out there and build a munitions conveyor, put together a bunch of bombs, and deliver them to the flightline as fast as possible, you'd want this team.

The Minot AFB 5MUNS team, representing Air Force Global Strike Command for the second year in a row, is aiming to win first place. After narrowly missing first place last year by a single point to Seymour Johnson AFB, the team is determined to take the top spot

"This year, we're coming back sharper," said Senior Airman Kerry Harrington, a conventional maintenance crew chief. "We're cutting down our times, reducing deficiencies, and dialing in our team coordination. We've trained

hard for this."

The team has been conducting repeated Munitions Assembly Conveyor (MAC) builds, trailer crossloads, spontaneous ordnance build drills, and constructing munitions such as GBU-54s, GBU-56s, and MK-82 conicals - many of which could appear in competition

One of their most recent drills featured a timed assembly of 12 conicals and two GBU-56s, the kind of mission-critical repetition that turns muscle memory into wartime readiness. "It's more than just speed," said Harrington. "We're focused on proficiency, safety, and doing things the right way the first time."

Éach AFCOCOMP team consists of 10 members, ranging in rank from Airman Basic to Master Sergeant. The events test not just technical know-how, but the ability to operate efficiently under pressure in simulated contingency environments.

"We're going to be challenged with building things like the GBU-32 and handling AIM-9X and AIM-120 missiles we don't use here," said Richardson. "But our team has experience. Several members, including myself, have worked with those systems before at other bases, so we're ready to

"This squadron has 13 different sections," said Richardson. "This group of Airmen doesn't usually work side-by-side. But over the last two months, they've become one unit: smooth, fluid, locked in. I'm proud of that."

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# A LOOK BACK

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

CAPT. JOSEPH KITTINGER BREAKS WORLD RECORDS **DURING PROJECT EXCELSIOR** 

**AUGUST 16, 1960** 



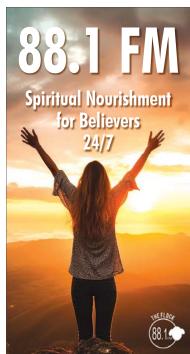

In 1959 and 1960, Air Force Capt. Joseph Kittinger performed a series of high altitude parachute jumps as a part of Project Excelsior, which tested the parachute system that would be used for pilots ejecting from high altitudes. Excelsior III was the final test on Aug. 16, 1960. Kittinger ascended to 102,800 feet by way of a helium balloon and unpressurized gondola. The ascent took over an hour. Kittinger free-fell from the gondola for 4 minutes and 36 seconds, setting the record for longest free-fall at the time. He reached speeds up to 614 miles an hour. Falling over the New Mexico desert at

17,500 feet, Kittinger deployed his parachute and drifted down for the remaining 9 minutes and 9 seconds. He also set the record for the highest parachute jump and highest speed of a human in the atmosphere.

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# Why is tire rotation so important?

Vehicle owners need to keep maintenance on the mind to ensure their cars and trucks are operating at peak capacity. Various components should be checked and serviced at key intervals. Oil changes and fluid top-offs are part of routine maintenance, but it can be easy to forget about other important parts of the vehicle, including tires.

Rotating tires is vital to their upkeep. Bridgestone Tires advises that tire rotation involves routinely repositioning a vehicle's tires in specific patterns from front to back and side to side. According to Big O Tires, the front tires tend to wear on the outside edges because the tire leans over when a driver turns a corner. The rear tires just follow the front ones, so they usually wear more evenly. By leaving tires in place, the outside edges on the front tires will wear down much faster than the rest and those tires will need to be replaced sooner. Rotation may be required by tire warranties. Rotation also keeps the tires working properly.

Experts generally advise tire rotation every 6,000 to 8,000 miles, even if they do not show any signs of wear. It is challenging to determine if weather treads are uneven or how much wear has been sustained just by looking at them. Rotating tires can prolong the life of tires and decrease how frequently they need to be replaced.

Rotating tires keeps the tread depth uniform and helps maintain traction and consistent handling across all four tires. Bridgestone says the tire rotation pattern that is best for a particular vehicle depends on the type of tire being used. Patterns are recommended by the standardizing body of the tire industry, called The Tire and Rim Association, Inc. Individuals can consult with professional mechanics about the proper way to rotate tires. Many tire manufacturers or automotive stores that have sold customers tires also will do tire rotations - some free of charge.

In addition to proper traction, minimizing uneven tire treads causes the vehicle to be more balanced, advises Wrench, a mobile auto repair and maintenance company. This enables the driver to have more control even when roads are slippery. Many auto service centers will then align and balance tires after they have been rotated. At this time the mechanic will likely check brakes as well, since it is easy to see and reach them when the tires are off.

Tire rotation is an important component of vehicle maintenance. Check with a qualified automotive professional to see if it's time to have your vehicle's tires rotated.

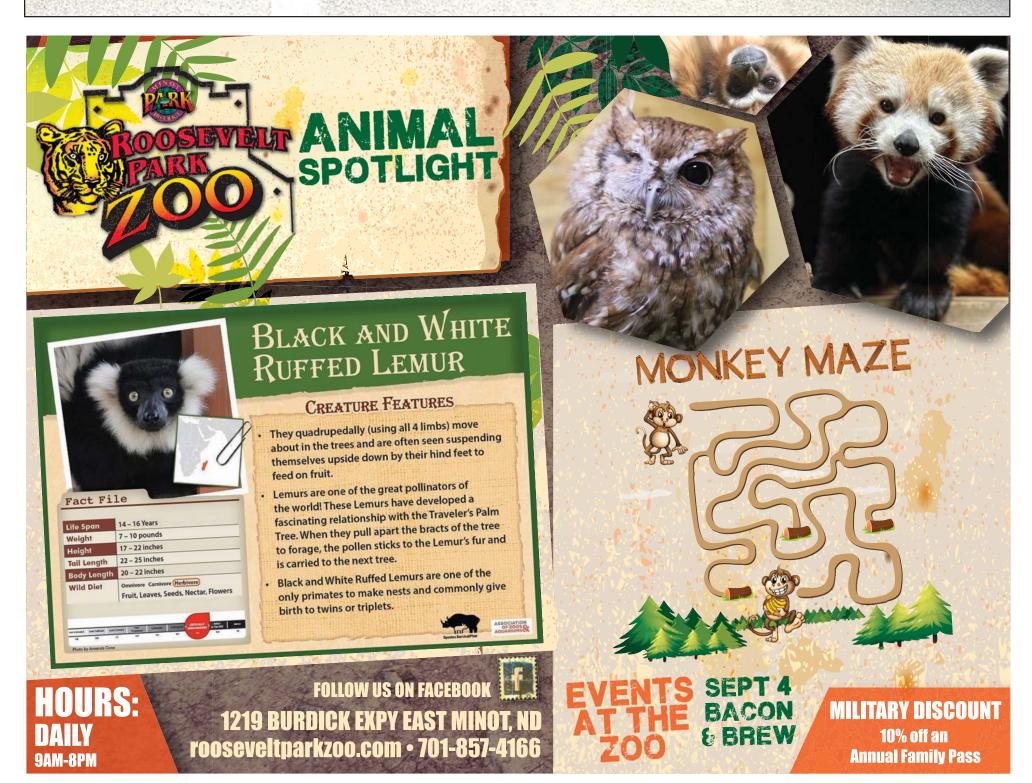

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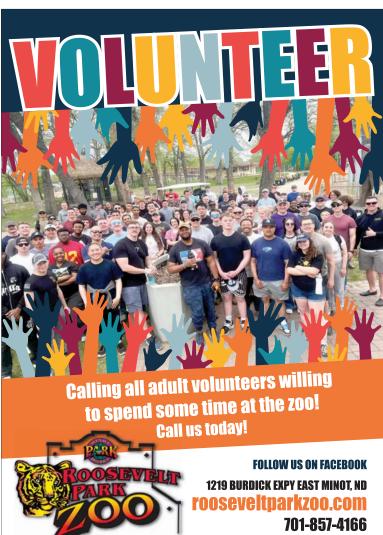

OK, it's not anywhere near the size of the nation's five Great Lakes. And, yes, other natural lakes across the United State make it seem, well, not all that massive of a water body.

But in all honesty, the first time a person drives across the U.S. Highway 83 embankment dividing Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon, that body of water on the west side of the highway - Lake Sakakawea - seems to stretch an awfully long ways.

And flying over it? It is kind of a large body of

Especially considering this is North Dakota and the Northern Great Plains. With the exception of Devils Lake, most of the state's natural lakes are small to mid-sized "kettles", typically created by receding waters from glaciers once blanketing the region.

The lake region in the Turtle Mountains has a nice share of small lakes, fishing treasures among its wooded hills.

Other larger lakes are generally earthendam reservoirs created by impounding rivers -like Lake Darling on the Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge, for example. Lake Ashtabula near Valley City is another mid-sized reservoir on the Sheyenne River. Likewise for Jamestown Reservoir, appropriately on the James River.

Even many of the state's smaller lakes are reservoirs although places like Buffalo Lodge Lake or Antelope Lake are natural water bodies dotting the prairie.

But back to Lake Sakakawea, named after the Shoshone Indian woman who helped guide the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804 through 1806 in search of a Northwest Passage.

The issue with the lake's name is its spelling differs from what many historians generally consider the proper spelling of her Shoshone name - Sacagawea.

Sakakawea is the spelling believed to be - sort of close to the Hidatsa meaning of "Bird Woman". The confusion stems from the fact that Hidatsa isn't a written language. North Dakota's official policy is to use the Sakakawea spelling, mainly based on early 1900s research of her name which translates into "Bird Woman" in both Shoshone and Hidatsa.

North Dakotans even pronounce it differently.

Lake Sakakawea is one of six Missouri River impoundments, a river beginning at the confluence of three southwestern Montana rivers - Gallatin, Jefferson, and Madison, near Three Forks, Mont. Roughly 2,341 miles long, the Missouri is the longest river in the U.S. – yes. even longer than the Mississippi.

Lake Sakakawea is the third largest man-made earthen reservoir in the country. It's also the largest of the Missouri River reservoirs starting with Fort Peck in northeastern Montana. South Dakota claims the other four - Lake Oahe, Lake Sharpe, and Lake Francis Case, with Lewis and Clark Lake touching both South Dakota and Nebraska.

Here are some quick facts underscoring the size of Garrison Dam:

- Not counting the dam's spillway on its east end, the dam itself is 11,300 feet long; it's maximum height 210 feet.
- The maximum width at the dam's base, including its berms, is 3,400 feet wide.
- Fort Union clay shale lays beneath the dam and embankment, which consists of 66.5 million cubic yards of rolled-earth fill – a lot of dirt.
- The dam has 1.5 million cubic yards of concrete.
- Its 1,336-foot-long spillway has 28 tainter gates, each one measuring 40 x 25 feet.
- The dam has one intake structure, 179 feet wide and 249 feet high. It's 540 feet long.
- There are five hydropower generation tunnels and three regulating tunnels. Five tunnels are 24-feet in diameter, one is 26-feet, and two are 22-feet in diameter.

Here's a look at Lake Sakakawea:

- Four major tributaries feed the reservoir Missouri, Milk, Yellowstone, and Little Missouri
- Its upstream drainage basin covers 123,900 square miles.
- Lake Sakakawea is 178 miles long at full pool -1,850 feet above mean sea level (MSL).
- Its shoreline covers 1,340 miles when its elevation is only 1,837.5 MSL.
- · Maximum depth is about 180 feet

It's not a great ocean or amazing natural watery wonder.

But it's North Dakota's "Big Lake" prairie gem.



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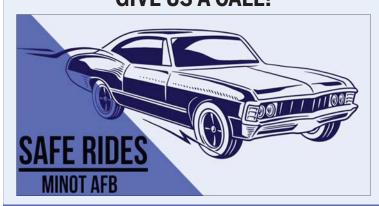
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# "Handshake Across the Border": **Where Neighbors Meet**

On the morning of August 9, 2025, beneath a gray, drizzling sky, a quiet sense of anticipation settled over the International Peace Garden. The day began with rain, but almost as if nature itself understood the significance of the event, the clouds began to part just as the event was set to begin, clearing the way for a celebration that would bring two nations quite literally hand in hand.

This year marked the first Handshake Across the Border, a symbolic and heartfelt gathering at the garden that sits directly on the U.S.-Canada border, between North Dakota and Manitoba. The purpose was simple yet powerful: to bring

people from both countries together in a moment of unity, reflection, and

Despite the early morning rain, spirits weren't dampened. As the event officially began, the drizzle slowed to a light mist, and soon smiles, laughter, and conversation replaced the quiet sound of falling

The International Peace Garden, founded in 1932, has long stood as a living testament to the enduring friendship between Canada and the United States. It spans 2,339 acres of manicured gardens, natural forest, and symbolic monuments, with no fencing dividing the two countries, just a physical and emotional reminder of peace and

This year's Handshake Across the Border felt especially timely as international relations have been marked with tension and division recently.

Tim Chapman, CEO of the International Peace Garden, shared the vision behind the event in an interview with the Northern Sentry.

"This was something we wanted to put together this year, given the political rhetoric of both nations," Chapman explained. "This place is meant to bring people together, and we felt it was time to create something that symbolized that in a very real, human way."

When asked whether an event like this had ever been held before, Chapman said no one on the current staff could recall anything similar. "Maybe a few decades ago there was something close, but not quite like this. We hope it becomes an annual tradition."

For Chapman, the importance of the event goes beyond symbolism.

He highlighted real-world examples of cross-border cooperation that often go unnoticed. "Our military and first responders are a great example of how the U.S. and Canada work together. Things like NORAD, joint disaster response, and fighting wildfires, Canada helps America, and vice versa."

One of the most powerful aspects of the event was the wide range of people who came from both sides of the border, each with a unique story and reason for attending. Many came out of curiosity. Others, like two women from Bismarck, North Dakota, came with deeper intentions.

"We haven't been to the Peace Garden in years," one of them shared, "but the handshake event is what brought us back today."

Her voice trembled slightly as she explained further: "I just feel awful about the way Canada has been treated lately. We're here to support our neighbors because they have been great neighbors for a long

The emotion in her words captured the essence of the day: this wasn't about politics or policy, it was about people. About showing up, reaching out, and being human together.

Another compelling voice at the event was Ken Pilon, a United States Marine Corps and National Guard veteran with deep ties to both countries. His story is a living example of the interconnectedness that defines the U.S.-Canada relationship.

"I served four years in the Marine Corps and three years in the National Guard during the Desert Storm era," Pilon shared. "I'm originally Canadian. My mom

married a U.S. immigration officer, so we moved here, and I've been here ever since.'

When asked what brought him to the event, Pilon didn't hesitate: "Just to show people that we can still get along. Things are kind of divided nowadays. I have family in Canada and the U.S., so I see both sides.'

He paused before continuing, adding a philosophical note: "It's kind of interesting to see both perspectives. Of course, we have ours, but they get upset with things too. I try to stay neutral, see things clearly. This event is nice because we get to see two nations come together. Sometimes I wonder, our border is so big and hard to protect... Should we even have a border at all, or should we just be one?"

His remarks struck a chord with many attendees who, like him, straddle two identities, two countries, and one deeply interwoven history.

Beyond the emotional and political layers of the event, Handshake Across the Border was also simply a joyful community gathering. Local vendors lined parts of the garden, offering handmade goods and delicious food. Families participated in a cross-border scavenger hunt, children ran among the flowers, and strangers struck up conversations that turned into friendships.

There were hugs, handshakes,

and photos taken right on the border line. People asked each other where they were from, discovered mutual connections, and shared stories of past visits to the garden.

It was clear that the event had touched something deeper, a desire for connection that transcends national identity. Many attendees lingered long after the official programming had ended, soaking in the atmosphere and submerged in conversation.

If Chapman and his team have their way, Handshake Across the Border is just the beginning.

"We're hoping that every year we can get it bigger and bigger," he said. "This event shows what's possible when we put human connection first. It's about neighbors showing up for neighbors.'

As the sun finally peeked through the clouds in the late afternoon, casting warm light over the border line that cuts through the garden, it illuminated more than just the landscape, it shone on a moment of hope.

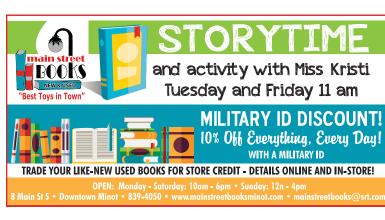
A handshake may be a simple gesture, but on this day, in this place, it meant everything.

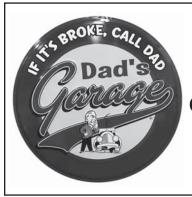

#### **NOTES ON BEING SAFE**

## **SUN AND SUMMER SAFETY**

Being outside on a warm, sunny day is one of life's great pleasures. The sun generates light which is the fuel that plants use for photosynthesis. This is the process by which plants create their energy. We, in turn, depend on plants for the food we eat and the oxygen we breathe. The sun's infrared rays keep us warm and its visible light is what we use to see by, but getting too much sun can be dangerous.

Some people feel that if they tan well, they're protected from the sun's harmful rays. But, while it's true that fair-haired, blue-eyed people are most prone to burning, and therefore are more susceptible to the sun's rays, even "healthy" tans are really damage control – they're your body's way of trying to protect itself from the sun. In other words, there's no such thing as a healthy tan.

The sun, however, is also very important to our health. It provides us with vitamin D (which we need for our bones), and it can lift our spirits. In fact, there's a form of depression called seasonal affective disorder (or SAD) that can happen when there's more darkness than daylight — sufferers feel "down" during the winter and much better when summer comes.

Along with visible light and infrared, ultraviolet radiation (UVR) is generated, which is useful, but at the same time it can be very dangerous to us. Excessive sun exposure can result in painful sunburn, but can also lead to other serious health problems. It is the cause of most skin cancers, many cataracts and 90% of the changes we see in our skin as we get older. (Nobody wants to look like an old saddle when they get older).

UVR is divided into 3 different bands: UVA, UVB, and UVC. Virtually all of UVC is filtered out by our atmosphere, so that none actually reaches the earth's surface. UVB and UVA both reach the earth in significant amounts. UVB is stronger than UVA

having a greater ability to cause skin damage. There is about 100 times as much UVA as UVB. Despite UVA being weaker, it's still dangerous!

Sunburn is caused by overexposure to Ultraviolet radiation, mostly UVB. During a sunburn the skin turns red, swells and, in severe cases, blisters. A sunburn continues to develop for 12 to 24 hours after exposure.

If, despite being careful, you still get burned, treat your skin as you would any other kind of burn:

- Apply cool, wet compresses for 24 to 48 hours.
- Don't apply skin creams within the first two days.
- Drink a lot of water to keep from feeling dehydrated.

Really severe burns, the kind that produce blisters, are often treated in clinics with dressings. If you're not sure if your burn is severe, have it checked. Severe sunburn can cause chills and fever and consulting a doctor would be wise. Keep sunburned areas out of the sun until the redness is gone.

The goal is to have fun outside but stay safe at the same time. Here are some basic rules:

Cover up whenever possible. A longer cotton skirt, for example, might feel cooler on a hot day than a pair of shorts, and will help guard you from the sun.

Babies under six months old should be kept out of the sun completely. They're too young for sunscreen, but their delicate skin can burn easily, so keep the baby in the shade and covered as much as possible.

Wear a hat. Hats keep the sun's rays off the scalp, face, and back of the neck, prime areas for skin cancer. A good hat will also shelter and protect your eyes from the sun's powerful rays. Sunglasses are also a good idea.

Use sunscreen whenever you're outside, even if the sun doesn't seem particularly strong. Damaging ultraviolet rays can penetrate through clouds, so don't take a chance. Always

apply sunscreen with a minimum SPF (sun protection factor) of at least 15. Be sure to follow the directions closely and reapply the sunscreen on a regular basis throughout the day, especially after you've been swimming or perspiring (about every two hours).

Avoid the sun when it's at its peak. It's strongest between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., so use that time to do activities indoors if possible. If you have a choice, stay in the shade. Beach umbrellas will protect you from some of the sun exposure. They are actually very comfortable on sunny days.

If you take prescription drugs, check to see if they can make you more sensitive to the sun. If you're not sure, ask your pharmacist.

The number of skin cancer cases has been rising over the years, and experts say that this is due to increasing exposure to UV radiation from the sun, tanning beds, and sun lamps. More than 1 million new skin cancer cases are likely to be diagnosed in the U.S. this year. Malignant melanoma, now with a suspected link to UVA exposure, is often fatal, if not detected early. The number of cases of melanoma is rising in the U.S., with an estimated 38,300 cases and 7,300 deaths anticipated this year.

Remember that children's skin is even more sensitive that yours. They can start wearing sunscreen by the time they are six months old. Even so, minimize their exposure.

Watch for the UV Index. The UV Index, developed by the National Weather Service and the Environmental Protection Agency, provides a forecast of the expected risk of overexposure to the sun and indicates the degree of caution you should take when working, playing, or exercising outdoors. The UV Index predicts exposure levels on a

0 - 10+ scale, where 0 indicates a low risk and 10+ means a very high risk of overexposure to the sun.

Take care of your skin and it will take care of you.

STARBASE is a program that "provides 25-hours of hands-on, minds-on, high-tech discovery and inquiry-based activities to fifth grade students using a common curriculum that meets or exceeds a variety of National Standards. The 25-hours of STEAM instruction is carried out as an extension of the traditional classroom, where classrooms of students are brought out to a military installation and, along with engaging in STEAM activities, are given opportunities to engage with positive role models and the technological environment found on military bases and installations" (starbasenorthdakota.com).

At Minot Air Force STARBASE ND is located in North Plains Elementary School. But with the temperature reaching record highs so early in the season, it's important to take extra precautions to protect your four-legged friend. Since dogs are unable to sweat and cool down through panting only, here are a few things you can do to help them stay cool so you can all enjoy some fun in the sun:

- Stay off of hot pavement—if it will burn your feet, it will burn their paws. Try to take your dog for walks in the early morning or evening. Not only will the temperature be cooler, but the pavement won't be as hot. You can also opt to take them on walks through wooded forests or on dirt or grass paths. Some pet owners may use "dog shoes" when there's no other option, but most pets will probably not find this comfortable.
- Water your dog yes, you read that right. Not only is important to have a constant supply of fresh, cool water when outside on a hot day, but it can be beneficial to literally water your dog! Fill up a kiddie pool and throw in their favorite ball, turn on the sprinklers, take your dog to a lake or creek, or grab the sprayer and hose them down. Not only are these fun ways to enrich your dog, but they will keep body temperature down so everyone's happy. If your dog doesn't like water, you can slowly work up to it through desensitization and counter-

conditioning, or you can just provide them with a shaded area or leave them inside.

- Never leave your dog in the car—does this need to be said anymore? It still happens often, so yes. If you can't take your dog inside wherever you're going, leave them home. If you can't find a fully shaded parking spot and leave the AC on full blast, leave them home. If you're going to be gone for an extended period of time, leave them home.
- Find indoor activities sometimes it's too hot for anyone, pets or parents alike, to be outside. To keep your dog busy on days like this, try getting creative with your indoor activities. You can play tug of war in the living room, let them watch dakrats scurry by out the window, play hide and seek, work on some training... the possibilities are endless. If you really want to get out of the house, there are many dogfriendly businesses where you can bring your pet inside. Any pet stores, Tractor Supply Co., and Hobby Lobby are a few favorites. (Be sure to call your location first before bringing any pets in, and make sure they're mindful of their manners!)

Despite all our efforts, dogs are still at risk for heat stroke on a hot day. Watch out for excessive panting, confusion, vomiting, bright red gums, lethargy, body temperature over 104 degrees, and collapse, seizure, or coma. Take your pet to the vet immediately if you suspect they have excessive heat stress.
