THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

MINOT AFB RECEIVES FIRST KC-135A STRATOTANKER **SEPTEMBER 23, 1959**



The first KC-135A Stratotanker, dubbed "Miss Minot," arrived at Minot Air Force Base in 1959. (Courtesy Photo)

The first plane to be permanently assigned to Minot Air Force Base, N.D., was a KC-135A Stratotanker named "Miss Minot, which arrived on September 23, 1959. Over 300 base and community guests attended momentous occasion that would mark the beginning of the jet era in North Dakota. Miss Minot was the first of 10 jets assigned

to the 906th Air Refueling Squadron under the 4136th Strategic Wing and Strategic Air Command. Their mission? To provide air refueling for northern air defense operations and other missions. The Stratotankers remained in Minot until 1994 before being relocated to Grand Forks AFB as Minot moved away air refueling and focused fully on their mission supporting two legs of the nuclear triad and strategic deterrence.

OPERATION Valhalla Strike sharpens 891st MSFS defenders' readiness

"Eight! Nine! One!" shouts Chief Master Sgt. Christopher Klein, 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron's (891MSFS) senior enlisted leader. "HELL YEAH!" shouted back

over 200 voices, defenders' gear at the Airmen's feet, ready to tackle

That rallying cry set the tone for OPERATION Valhalla Strike, a weeklong training where the 891MSFS from Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota, traveled to Camp Ripley Training Center, Minnesota, Aug. 24-29, 2025. The advanced training focused on air base ground defense and nuclear security tactics — the bread and butter of the squadron's mission.

The training, called OPERATION Valhalla Strike, allowed the unit to complete requirements not possible at Minot AFB, including fulldistance live-fire exercises.

"Our mission is to provide armed security to the missile field, as well as provide armed responses to all of the launch facilities that are in the Minot area of responsibility and inside the missile field," said U.S. Air Force 2nd Lt. Maiszon Balboa, 891MSFS's Alpha Flight commander. "What we're doing here is a simulated, squad-level deployment where we come out, we do drills, training, everything that would prepare us for a base ground defense mission in a deployed environment."

The crack of gunfire echoed the woodland-covered ranges of central Minnesota as the defenders conducted intensive training at Camp Ripley to enhance their ground combat skills. Camp Ripley provided full-distance firing ranges which allowed defenders to hone their rifle marksmanship and machine gun proficiency, exceeding the capabilities of standard Air Force 25-meter training ranges.

The 891MSFS is a squadron of more than 250 dedicated Airmen and civilians supporting the 91st Missile Wing's global deterrence mission by defending the United States with the world's premier combat-ready intercontinental ballistic missile force. They are responsible for providing protection of Minuteman III ICBMs and Minot AFB's missile alert facilities, covering an 8,500 square-mile area in central North Dakota.

During OPERATION Valhalla Strike, defenders rotated through training blocks designed to sharpen every aspect of their skillset. On the ranges, the crack and thud of rounds came from M240 and M249 machine guns, the steady pop of the M4 carbine and the deep percussion of grenadiers training with 40mm systems.

Partnership was also a theme. The 891MSFS trained alongside the 54th Helicopter Squadron, integrating air support with ground maneuvers. Rotor blades overhead and defenders advancing on the ground offered a vivid picture of how air and land forces can converge in combat to overwhelm

"Our goal is for each defender to leave Camp Ripley as a warrior that can shoot, move and communicate better than any adversary we may face in our area of responsibility," said U.S. Air Force Maj. G. Chase Abrams, 891MSFS commander.

The squadron also practiced squad movement, close-quarters (CQB) and casualty evacuation (CASEVAC) procedures, integrating skills in realistic field scenarios. CQB and CASEVAC reinforced the 891MSFS' mission to defend the 91st Missile Wing's missile complex and respond to threats against nuclear security.

The first three days built toward a full-day field training exercise on Aug. 28, which tested the unit across all mission sets. Security Forces Airmen conducted defensive operations, casualty care and coordinated maneuvers under simulated combat conditions.

As buses pulled away from the Minnesota training grounds at week's end, the echoes of gunfire faded into the pines. What remained was something quieter but enduring: a squadron sharper, stronger and more unified, returning home ready to defend one of the most critical missions in the nation.

"The skills we developed at Camp Ripley reinforce our ability to defeat potential adversaries at Minot,' said Abrams. "Our proficiency makes our adversaries decide each morning when they wake up that today is not the day to test the United States of America."

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

ET'S GO HUNTING

Whether you've hunted for years or this is your first time, each hunting adventure always brings a "new experience!" It can be good or bad depending on the WHO, WHAT, WHEN, WHERE, and HOW.

WHO you hunt with is important as far as their experience, habits, and general knowledge of wild game and its habitat. Normally, an experienced hunter will ask a potential partner tons of questions to determine whether they want to go hunting with them or not. This is especially important when you consider that around 40 percent of the hunters injured each year are accidentally shot by their hunting partner while another 35 percent figure out ways to shoot themselves! For the sake of your own safety -- as well as that of your partner -- make sure you take into account both parties' skill levels and knowledge base.

WHAT type of wild game are you planning to hunt? Some of the most common are deer, elk, bear, duck, turkey, quail, pheasant, squirrel, rabbits, grouse, fox, and raccoon -- not to mention skunk, boar, woodchuck, coyote, weasel, and porcupine! And guess what? The seasons overlap each other. So, if you're not careful, there's a big window of opportunity out there for you to become some hunter's trophy! Keep in mind, however, that the most serious accidents typically occur during deer season. This is mainly because of the greater shooting distance and destructive power associated with high velocity

WHEN are you going hunting? You may want to consider scheduling your foray when the level of activity for big game -- like deer or bear -- is low. Since the total number of hunters is highest when big game season first opens up, scheduling your hunt in the middle or last part of hunting season will reduce your risk of accidentally being shot by another hunter.

WHERE you hunt could be the difference between life and death! It would seem totally ridiculous for hunters to just jump in a 4x4 and drive for hours to hunt in a place they have never been before or haven't visited since last season, but it happens. You need to do some pre-hunt scouting to visually check the areas you plan to hunt. This includes checking to make sure the land is open to hunting; checking for trails, ponds, game, etc.; determining

locating occupied areas where telephones or help may be available; and talking with local officials and residents.

HOW you hunt will largely determine whether you succeed or not. Just as seasons overlap, the weapons you use to hunt with may also have some overlap. You can use muzzleloaders, assorted firearms, and the good old bow and arrow (archery), as long as you obey the rules and guidelines set by each state. Each state usually publishes their hunting regulations and includes pamphlets with special game permits that are a "must read" for all hunters. Cellular phones, twoway radios, etc., are very important in keeping hunters in contact and obtaining help in the event of an emergency. A backpack with food, water, first aid kit, flashlight, blankets, tools, etc., always comes in handy. It's not a bad idea to include signaling devices such as



mirrors, flares, etc., whether you are in a remote location or not! Most states also ask or require you to wear hunter orange clothing. This helps other hunters to be absolutely positive of their target. Consider what is behind your targeted game to ensure your projectile doesn't glide through buildings, people, or in the direction of a road. One of the oldest safety messages is the control of your firearm's muzzle. Also, ensure that your firearms are properly secured and stored on This can be accomplished through the Security Forces Armory.

To summarize, don't forget to communicate your planned courses of action for any potential situations, wear that hunter orange clothing, pick your hunting buddies with care, and "keep your gun barrel pointed in the right direction!

Scams abound



UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

There was a recent news report about an individual here in North Dakota who got scammed out of \$100,000. That's a lot of money and even though you would think a criminal mind could get a loot like that and run, it appears they can't resist the urge to come back

People being "taken to the cleaners" has been around forever, but in this day and age, the people behind the scams are getting quite clever and that's why we have to be on our toes.

We've heard of these "romance" scams that happens to people, especially widowed elderly people who are looking for companionship. If you check with the attorney general's office, you'll find there have been plenty of those types of scams across the state in the past 10 years and tens of thousands of dollars have been

Couple that with the fact that we (North Dakotans in general) are a trusting group of people, so when we meet someone who appears genuinely interested in our life situation, we tend to let our guard down. Unfortunately, that's when the bad guys go to

In the past year, I've been the target of numerous scam attempts. The most obvious has to do with "Amazon" and a laptop computer. Twice now, months apart, I've received a text message telling me that I need to call the number listed to confirm a charge of \$1,500 for a new Macbook Pro.

Now, to break that down, I recently purchased a Macbook Pro so initially, I thought I was getting charged a second time or something went wrong with paperwork. It seemed legitimate. And as I looked at the number, thinking I should call to not get charged twice, the investigative reporter in me took over. I attempted to trace the phone number.

I found it! The number was registered to a telemarking firm in Boulder, Colo. That told me almost immediately it had nothing to do with Amazon or Apple. That was the first time. The second time I read the message and deleted it.

In another case, my wife and I were on our way to Rapid City one day and I got a text message asking me where I am right now? I recognized the area code as coming from southern Ontario (excluding Toronto), so I assumed it was a friend I have in Brantford, Ontario.

Should I respond, but then why would my friend in eastern Canada be concerned about where I am late on a Saturday morning. My next thought was OK, I'll wait until we get to Rapid City to sort it out. But before we got there, another text came.

"Quick, you need to get here, my dog is sick and I don't think he's going to make it. There are no other vets available today."

The point here is these people are going to throw anything at the wall hoping it sticks. And, in those two text messages, there was a bit of information that I had to consider, and that was to recognize where that number originated.

Often times that's what happens when people get hooked into these scams. These people have a playbook, just like a football coach. My guess is they have hundreds if not thousands of possible scenarios they will use to get you interested. Then, if several, or numerous parts of that conversation add up, you may seriously consider responding. I'm obviously not a vet and I don't live near Brantford so that got shut down right there.

But what if I was a vet. I recognized the number, I know people there, and someone has a sick dog. You see what I mean? The more information on that string that is correct, the more we're apt to respond.

Emails can be deceiving too. Scammers are using company logos, they're using language and page layouts that mimic the original. So had my first text message been an email; I would have seen the Amazon logo, I would have seen the Apple logo; it would have been very convincing.

It's amazing the extremes that bad people will go to screw you out of a dollar. If they would use their minds for something productive instead, they'd probably have far more money from a good income than trying to rip off their neighbors.

Stay vigilant!

· Library programs are back. September is also Library Card Sign-Ûp Month. There's no better time to get your card (you can get one at Minot Public Library, Ward County Library, Minot AFB Library—if you're military affiliated—and MSU's Gordon B. Olson Library, which requires an annual fee).

• Berry Acres Pumpkin Patch opens for the season. More than just pumpkins, it's acres of fall fun: a corn maze, obstacle courses, eccentric heirloom gourds, endless photo opps, and family activities of every kind.

• Festivals fill the calendar. September weekends are packed with special events taking advantage of perfect weather. A sampling includes Angelic Gardens Fall Festival, Festival on Main, MSU Homecoming festivities (parade, tailgating, and game), Boots Under the Big Sky line dancing downtown, farmers markets, Čaesar Fest, Norsk Høstfest, Logger Fest, Fall Fun Day at the Magic City Discovery Center, NOTSTOCK at MSU—a hands-on weekend of art for the whole community, and the opening performance from Mouse River Players. And that's just the

structured events aren't your thing, this is an ideal time to enjoy the changing season. The Bison Plant Trail and Denbigh Experimental Forest are two of my favorite trails to walk, soak in the fall colors, and breathe in the crisp air. Every time the calendar flips, we're given a reminder: each season brings its own kind of joy. And this month? September joy is everywhere—ripe for the picking.







Badlands Gaming Brings Card Culture to the Mall

A new kind of magic has arrived at Dakota Square Mall, one built on cards, gaming, and community. Badlands Gaming, Minot's newest trading card shop, is open for business and already making waves among collectors, casual fans, and competitive players alike.

Owned by longtime hobbyist and entrepreneur Joey Schilling, Badlands Gaming is more than just a place to buy Pokémon, Magic: The Gathering, or Warhammer 40K, it's quickly becoming a hub for community, competition, and nostalgia.

"Honestly, I opened this because I just love the hobby," Schilling said with a shrug. "I've been collecting since I was a kid. My dad used to give us Pokémon packs as rewards for cleaning our rooms. That's how it started."


Schilling made the move to North Dakota at the end of July 2025 from his hometown in Ohio, where economic hardships and high poverty rates weighed heavily. "Minot just made sense," he said. "Less crime, better economy, friendlier people. It's peaceful here. You drive 10 minutes out of town and it's just beautiful. Cold, but beautiful."

That combination of safety and scenery sealed the deal for Schilling, who saw Minot as fertile ground for his next venture.

Badlands Gaming sits comfortably inside Dakota Square Mall, and that choice was no accident.

"I've had stores in malls before, it works," Schilling explained. "You've got built-in foot traffic. People are already here to shop, so it just makes sense. Yeah, it's more expensive, but you get what you pay for."

The store has been in a soft opening phase since August 1st. While still completing its full layout and signage, it already boasts a growing inventory of booster packs, singles, miniatures, and gaming

supplies. A grand opening event is expected within the next few weeks.

Today, Badlands Gaming deals in everything from sealed products to rare singles cards. One of the most exciting acquisitions so far? Just last week, a full Evolving Skies Pokémon Masters Set was purchased from a walk-in customer for \$4,000. "It's worth around \$4,800 to \$5,000," Schilling said. "That kind of stuff walking in the door? That's what makes this fun."

Customers will also find high-end cards like an \$1,800 Lillie Lillie is a popular Trainer Supporter card from the Sun & Moon series of the Pokémon TCG, known both for its strong gameplay effect and highly sought-after full-art versions, and sealed booster boxes from older sets, the kind of products collectors dream about.

Badlands isn't just about buying and selling, it's about playing. The store already has a major Warhammer 40K event scheduled for September 20, expected to bring in 15–20 players for a full day of battles. And the best part? No entry fee. "I'm not charging people just to play here," Schilling said. "I pay for the space already. Unless it's a structured tournament with prize support, it should just be about having fun."

He also plans to host "Magic: The Gathering" events regularly and wants to introduce trading nights, where players can swap cards freely, a rare feature in modern game shops. "As long as people aren't trying to undercut the store right in front of me, I don't care if they trade. It's part of the culture. I want people to feel welcome here."

So who's coming into Badlands Gaming? According to Schilling, it's a split crowd. "For Magic, it's mostly players. For Pokémon, it's all collectors. Out of every 50 people who buy Pokémon, maybe one actually plays. The rest are chasing their nostalgia."

And for those just getting started in the hobby? "Protect your cards. Sleeve them. Keep them away from your little cousins," said Joey. "Or

your brother, in my case," joked a customer in the store.

Schilling isn't looking to franchise or expand anytime soon. His goal is simple: stay rooted, grow slowly, and serve the community. "I want to stay right here in this spot, in this mall. I'm not looking to be bigger, just better."

That includes partnering with other local game stores.

to ensure events don't overlap and divide the player base. "I don't want to compete with other stores. I want to complement them. This isn't about taking over, it's about building something together."

While the in-store experience is the heart of Badlands, the store also has an online storefront through TCGPlayer https://www.tcgplayer. com/search/all/product?seller=15d 72bff&view=grid, offering Magic, Pokémon, Flesh and Blood, Star Wars Unlimited, and more, with Yu-Gi-Oh! singles likely coming soon.

Shelving upgrades, books, plushies, and additional merchandise are all in the pipeline as the shop finalizes its setup for the grand opening.

Badlands Gaming is more than a card shop, it's a love letter to the hobby. Whether you're a long-time collector, a Friday Night Magic regular, or someone just curious about what's behind the shiny booster packs, Badlands welcomes you to the table.

Warbird Week strengthens lethality across the 5th Bomb Wing

The 5th Bomb Wing (5BW) wrapped up Warbird Week, a regularly scheduled exercise, which challenges Airmen to operate under demanding conditions.

From Sept. 2-8, units across the 5BW faced a series of scenarios designed to assess their ability to generate combat airpower, sustain mission operations and respond to unforeseen obstacles.

"Warbird Week is a multi-layered group of exercises designed to prepare 5th Bomb Wing Airmen to succeed in generating combat power during their worst day,"

said U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Connor Klein, 5BW Inspector General. "We must always be ready to execute long-range conventional strikes and achieve the strategic objectives of the president of the United States, even when facing a difficult or hostile environment.

In addition to testing the 5BW's ability to maintain simulated alert procedures, other training scenarios included an unmanned aerial drone event, first emergency response and unauthorized base entry.

Through realistic, high-pressure training, Warbird Week keeps the 5BW sharp, adaptable, and

mission-ready. The scenarios push Airmen to perform at their peak while identifying opportunities to enhance overall performance.

"These exercises stress teams and individuals while improving decision-making at all levels, creating a stronger Warbirds organization with every iteration," said Klein.

Readiness exercises like Warbird Week are a cornerstone of the 5BW's mission to produce combat mission ready Airmen who are always ready to support, execute and defend global strike capability - at any time, from anywhere.



Wheel Alignment Tips

Have your Wheel Alignment checked every other tire rotation and always when installing new tires. Wheel alignment sometimes referred to as tracking, is part of standard automobile maintenance that consists of adjusting the angles of the wheels so that they are set to the car maker's specification. The purpose of these adjustments is to reduce tire wear, and to ensure that vehicle travel, is straight and true (without "pulling" to one side). Alignment angles can also be altered beyond the maker's specifications to obtain a specific handling characteristic. Motorsport and off-road applications may call for angles to be adjusted well beyond "normal" for a variety of reasons.

Primary Angles

The primary angles are the basic angle alignment of the wheels relative to each other and to the car body. These adjustments are the camber, caster and toe. On some cars, not all of these can be adjusted on every

These three parameters can be further categorized into front and rear, so summarily the parameters are:

Front: Caster (right& left) Front: Camber (right & left) Front: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Camber (left & right) Rear: Toe (left, right & total) Rear: Thrust angle

Secondary Angles

The secondary angles include numerous other adjustments, such as:

SAI (left & right) Included angle (left & right) Toe out on turns (left & right) Maximum Turns (left & right) Toe curve change (left & right) Track width difference Wheelbase difference Front ride height (left & right) Rear ride height (left & right) Frame angle

Setback (front & rear) is often referred as a wheel alignment angle. However setback simply exists because of the measuring system and does not have any specification from car manufacturers.

Measurement

A camera unit (sometimes called a "head") is attached to a specially designed clamp which holds on to a wheel. There are usually four camera units in a wheel alignment system (a camera unit for each wheel). The camera units communicate their physical positioning with respect to other camera units to a central computer which calculates and displays how much the camber, toe and caster are misaligned.

Often with alignment equipment, these "heads" can be a large precision reflector. In this case, the alignment "tower" contains the cameras as well as arrays of LEDs. This system flashes one array of LEDs for each reflector whilst a camera centrally located in the LED array "looks for" an image of the reflectors patterned face. These cameras perform the same function as the other style of alignment equipment, yet alleviate numerous issues prone to relocating a heavy precision camera assembly on each vehicle serviced.







The Date Is Set! Minot's Lopez Twins To Make Pro Debut

The boxing ring at the Lopez Gym north of Minot is the training home to twin brothers Jose and Rafael Lopez. The gym is also the training ground for several young aspiring boxers, and it was one of those kids who looked up at the ring and excitingly said "Wow! That is a big ring!"

I spent several minutes watching the Lopez brothers warming up with one of their coaches, Gary Hundal, and I thought to myself about how small a boxing ring will look inside the Minot Auditorium on October 25th when Jose and Rafael step into the ring for their first pro boxing matches.

Behind the scenes, as promoter of the October 25th fight will be North Dakota native Virgil Hill. In Virgil's trophy case there is an Olympic Silver Medal. There are also several World Championship

belts in that trophy case as Virgil is a world champion in two weight classes, having held the World Boxing Association (WBA) light heavyweight title twice, from 1987 to 1997; the International Boxing Federation (IBF) light heavyweight title from 1996 to 1997; and the WBA cruiserweighttitle twice, between 2000 and 2007.

Helping as his partner promoting the event on October 25th is Virgil's wife, Denine. Although the Hills live in California, where Virgil has a boxing gym and manages an amateur boxing team, according to Denine "Virgil always wants to bring boxing back to his home state whenever possible, and this is a great chance for us, and for the Lopez brothers."

The Hills were able to see Jose and Rafael fight in Dickinson, and it was shortly after that the decision was

made to schedule and promote a fight card in Minot. "Normally you would have a couple of amateur fights before you go pro, but for the twins (Jose & Rafael) they made the decision to go to a pro card" says Denine. "Right now, we have 11 fighters, of which 3 are women, so it will be a great card" continues Denine.

The Lopez graduated from high school last spring and have been hard on task training for their pro debut. Their coach Gary Hundall took them to Toronto, Canada to up their game a bit and "expose them to some high quality sparing partners" says Hundal. Anyone with a drive and passion for perfection in a sport certainly understands where the Lopez twins are in their careers. "The gym is their life" according to their father Alejandro Lopez. "The twins, they are different" says



Alejandro, "Jose is more of the thinker, and Rafael, he is more the take action person."



All About Pets





Having a baby can be a big change for the entire family, and your dog is no exception. Especially if you are having your first child, your dog may experience a number of new sights, sounds, and smells, some of which may be stressful to your fur-baby. Here are a few tips for preparing your dog to meet the baby so that everyone stays happy, safe, and healthy.

•Make sure your dog is trained before the baby arrives — teach your dog basic obedience skills such as sit, down, place, leave it/drop it, etc. It is very important to make sure your dog has a firm grasp on bite inhibition and how to be gentle around humans. Teaching your dog not to jump on you is also a good idea so that you don't run the risk of your dog accidentally knocking you over while holding the baby. If you have a dog that is extra mischievous, you can train them to leave baby belongings/toys alone and play with their own toys instead. Also, training your dog to stop barking on command can be a very useful tool that will come in handy down the road (wouldn't want to wake up the baby!).

•Socialize your dog—spend more time with your neighbors, walk your dog near the local playground, and make sure your dog starts to get a feel for being around children and babies. If your dog has not already been socialized to children, it would be a good idea to recruit a professional dog trainer who can help you learn the proper ways to safely introduce and socialize dogs to children. •Expose your dog to new things — before you bring home your baby, you want to expose your dog to the new sights, sounds and smells that

they will encounter. Let your dog see the diapers and wipes, sniff your baby's crib or stroller, let your dog spend time in baby's room around all the toys, clothes, and whatever else. Try taking your dog for a walk alongside the stroller. If you know someone with a baby or children, you can ask if you can bring your dog by their house to sniff and look around. There are also a variety of online resources where you can find common baby noises to play for your dog to familiarize them.

•Change your dog's routine if need be — if you anticipate your dog's routine changing due to your new baby, get your dog started on that schedule beforehand. Maybe you'll need to feed them or go for walks at a different time. Make sure you're getting your dog used to the new routine.

●Prepare your house — give your dog a special place that they can go when they need a break from baby, such as the bedroom, a crate away from the chaos, etc. If you have rooms that you would like to be off limits to your dog once baby arrives, go ahead and buy gates and familiarize your dog with them.

There are a million-and-one things that you can do to prepare your dog for a new baby, but the moment of truth will come when you bring baby home. It's incredibly important to prepare your dog for that moment not only for the health and safety of your dog, but for the child as well. If you have any safety concerns, contact a trainer immediately to work through them beforehand. And just like anything else with your dog, make sure to take it slow and give them time to adjust to a new way of life.



The boys tennis team had a challenging week, dropping a 0-9 match to Minot High before battling in a close 3-4 loss to the Braves.


On the football field, Minot North picked up a convincing 28-7 win over Fargo South. The Braves controlled both sides of the ball to secure the victory and continue their strong season.

A NEW AND DIFFERENT SEASON

It doesn't seem possible that hunting season is here - the 2025 sharp-tailed grouse and partridge season opens Sept.

Where, oh where, did summer go?

Granted, the Early Canada Goose season began Aug. 15 but in all honesty that doesn't quite seem like a traditional hunting season opening date. There's something about September that just feels right when it comes to the start of autumn, hunting, school, and things like fall sports.

Yup, September is when it all begins.

There's a Magnum in the household who, albeit only 3 ½ years of age, knows it's time to hunt. She's a Brittany in a house of hunters.

She would hunt 24/7 if she could and we haven't guite been able to explain the reasons why she can't to her.

But she's ready. Yes, there already are a few hours afield for

doves since it opened Sept. 1. She's happy with that. But there's something special about the sharptail and

partridge opener and the prairie in the fall. And somehow, Magnum knows the opportunity to find ducks,

geese, and pheasants will follow.

There's a subtle smile reflecting back about her first unofficial hunt, a dove hunt when she was a mere 8 weeks old Admittedly, the hunt consisted of carrying her on a N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Area to set dove decovs in a lonely tree.

She played with blades of grass.

She slept.

She played with pebbles and small rocks.

She slept.

She romped along the muddy shoreline so someone – me didn't have to carry her, decoys, and a shotgun back to the pickup, reveling in her first life experience of soft, squishy mud between her toes.

Notice there is no mention of carrying any doves.

That was her first hunt.

And I'm convinced she loved every second of it.

She tagged along as best she could on her first sharp-tailed grouse hunt.

She played with blades of grass.

She slept, not in the field on my lap as she did on her dove hunt, but in the pickup on my lap on our journey home.

And, oh how she pointed little birds, which I'm convinced in her world where grouse or perhaps a glitzy rooster pheasant, not grassland sparrows, meadowlarks, and blackbirds.

She ate grasshoppers – or tried to.

As weeks progressed, Magnum - AKA The Pistol, so nicknamed for her feisty attitude – found herself stretching her horizons. Tagging behind wasn't for this little Pistol. She was growing and gaining strength and confidence.

She was becoming a hunter.

That was 2022.

Fast-forward to 2025 and so much has happened, just as it has for everyone. She's a "big girl" now and a full-fledged Hunting Maniac.

But that subtle smile reminiscing about that year brings another reminder of how different things will be this season. Garnet, the other 12-year-old Brittany Hunting Maniac and Magnum's "big sister", was diagnosed with a condition that restricts, if not prevents her from hunting – a paralyzed larynx.

Yes, her larynx doesn't move and breathing is difficult.

Admittedly 12 is "getting up there" for a dogs, especially active hunting dogs and these two get as much time in the field as possible. But she's healthy otherwise and doesn't understand why she isn't on the same walks - officially training sessions - as her "little sister" Magnum.

She's relegated to short walks in cool weather wearing a harness with a leash.

Let's just say leashes aren't her "thing".

While she lives to actively hunt and pursue upland birds, the good news is she's equally happy sitting alongside her human in the field watching ducks and geese.

So that's the plan.

Lots of time spent sitting along a field spread of decoys for Garnet and her human.

And lots of time spent in pursuit of a treasured prairie bird, the sharptail, and even better, those glitzy, gaudy rooster pheasants for Magnum and her human.







Norsk Høstfest...Wait, What?

It's one of those Minot topics that floats around by word of mouth, starting in summer and rolling into fall. Locals toss around the term like it's as familiar as McDonald's or Walmart, like it's something everyone just knows. But to outsiders or first-timers in Minot, Norsk Høstfest might sound more like someone clearing their throat and sneezing than the name of a cultural festival.


This writer didn't even realize what she was hearing were actual words the first few times the term came up. So what exactly is this "Norsk Høstfest," and why is it so important to Minot? Also... what does it even mean?

If you're new to North Dakota, the second least populous state in the country, you might not yet know about the deep connection this region has with Scandinavian heritage, especially from Norway, Sweden, and Denmark. If the enormous and colorful Scandinavian Heritage Center off South Broadway didn't clue you in, here's a brief history:

According to North Dakota Tourism, "Immigrants came to North Dakota from Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Finland. Most settled in east and northcentral North Dakota, along the main line of the Great Northern Railroad, beginning in the 1870s. Today, 193,000 people of Norwegian heritage live in North Dakota. About 38% of the state's population is of Scandinavian descent, with about 33% being Norwegian. The continent's largest Scandinavian event, Norsk Høstfest, is celebrated each fall in

So yes, many people in this state can trace their roots back to Scandinavia.

One such Norwegian-American was Chester M. Reiten, a former Mayor of Minot and North Dakota State Senator. In 1978, Reiten sat down to discuss creating an event that would celebrate Minot's unique connection to

its Scandinavian roots. The idea for Norsk Høstfest (translated as "Norwegian Harvest Festival") was born. What started small has since grown into a major annual celebration that draws thousands of Scandinavian heritage enthusiasts from across the country and beyond.

Like anything meaningful, it's grown and changed over the years. Today, Norsk Høstfest proudly claims the title of "Largest Scandinavian Festival in North America!" It usually takes place over a weekend in late September or early October, packed with concerts, performances, traditional Scandinavian food, cultural exhibits, artisan markets, and the always-popular Familie Fjord, a vibrant playground of cultural exploration for kids and families.

This year, from September 24–27, the North Dakota State Fairgrounds will once again come alive with the sounds, smells, and sights of Scandinavian celebration. Festivalgoers can expect concerts from acts like Little Texas, The Killer Bees, and many more, alongside rows of authentic food vendors and artisan booths showcasing everything rosemaling to Viking gear.

All in all, Norsk Høstfest is a beloved annual event that's become part of Minot's cultural fabric. It's one of those quirkyyet-wonderful things that makes this town feel like home. So don't be put off by the strange-sounding name or how casually locals drop it into conversation. Go check it out! You might just find yourself counting down the days until next year's festival and throwing around the term "Norsk Høstfest" like a true Minotian.


