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

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

Editor's note: The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline provides 24/7, free and confidential support via phone or chat for people in distress or crisis, resources for you or your loved ones, and best practices for mental health professionals. For the Military Crisis Line and the Veterans Crisis Line, dial 988 and press "1," or text 838255. For Spanish, press "2." Online chat is accessible from anywhere in the world.

Military families face unique Frequent stressors. moves, deployments, and separation from family can impact health and wellbeing. For anyone who may feel they need someone to talk to, the Military Health System is here to help.

"It's crucial for the military family to seek mental, emotional, and spiritual grounding to fully become a part of the U.S. military at its most ready," said Susan Orsega, deputy assistant secretary of defense for health services policy and oversight.

"Whether it's in-person or remote access, in groups, or one-on-one, therapy can help address these pressures and get the service member or families feeling better able to cope before they deepen into crisis," she said. "Therapy helps sustain readiness and gives service members the necessary mental health support they need during any transitions or challenges they may face."

Help is more readily available now than ever, Orsega said.

"This is particularly important when service members experience some challenges such as the loss of a sense of purpose, posttraumatic stress disorder, and other mental health symptoms," she said.

RECOGNIZE RISKS

Service members at risk of harming themselves may feel isolated, agitated, or anxious, according to Military OneSource, the Department of Defense's 24/7 gateway to family support programs and services for military members and families.

According to Military OneSource, times and events in military life when you can feel especially stressed include:

- Times nearing deployment or difficulty readjusting following deployment
- Loss of a family member, friend, or fellow service member
- Career setbacks, lack of advancement, or disciplinary actions
- Difficulty in relationships or

- Transitioning from military to civilian life
- Financial difficulty
- Major life changes
- Being young and unmarried without a supportive relationship
- Combat-related psychological
- Heavy drinking or problematic substance use
- Medical health problems
- Negative attitude toward getting help

Military OneSource provides confidential counseling and support to service members and family members at no cost, available via phone or in person on and off installations. This is just one of many resources the DOD offers to all service members, families and military retirees.

AVAILABLE MHS MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES

The MHS Mental Health Hub provides a comprehensive listing of mental health services available through the MHS. This includes ways to seek care, tips from experts, and in-depth information on available resources. You can connect directly to mental health support services near you with one click.

- Targeted Care: Many military mental health clinics are now using a process called Targeted Care. This connects you to the specific type of care you need after an initial evaluation - and can be an individual appointment, in-person group therapy or virtual group therapy, or virtual therapy. You can also receive referrals to nonmedical support such as a chaplain, financial advisor, or a military family life counselor.
- TRICARE covers mental health services through its worldwide network of civilian providers. To set up a mental health appointment through TRICARE, visit the mental health doctors and appointments
- page.

 Virtual care: The Defense Health Agency is also working to make mental health services available to service members at remote installations. One example is BRAVE, the DHA's Behavioral Health Resources and Virtual Experience. This program offers telemental health services at 84 locations around the world by connecting a service member with a counselor through virtual sessions.
- inTransition is a confidential program that offers specialized

coaching and assistance for active duty service members, National Guard and Reserve members, veterans, and retirees. It focuses on those receiving mental health or traumatic brain injury care who are experiencing disruption in their lives, like a PCS (permanent change of station) move, separation, or

- The Real Warriors Campaign is a DOD public health initiative. It strives to decrease stigma, increase psychological health literacy, and encourage early mental health helpseeking behaviors in the military community.
- CHAMP, the Uniformed Services University's Consortium for Health and Military Performance, offers dozens of fact sheets, articles, and infographics to help you strengthen your mental health and grow from adversity or crisis.
- Mobile apps are there whenever needed, providing tools for coping, monitoring your health, managing stress.
- The Brandon Act empowers service members to get the help they need confidentially by seeking a referral for a mental health evaluation through their commander or supervisor. This reduces the stigma associated with mental health.
- The Warrior Care Recovery Coordination Program, executed by the branches of service, provide holistic care to wounded, ill, or injured Service members and their families and caregivers. Recovery Care Coordinators serve as a guide through recovery, rehabilitation, and transition or reintegration by facilitating a comprehensive recovery plan. This plan covers needs associated with daily living, career, family, finances, health, legal, military, and spirituality.

THE MHS IS HERE TO HELP

"The U.S. military wants to support you in your mental health journey. We're there for you if you need to talk to someone, hit low points, or don't know where to turn," Orsega said.

"Together, we're building a supportive military that knows strength includes the specific support you need, at the moment you need it most. Every service member, veteran, and family member should know: The MHS is here to help, because no one fights alone.'





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

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER MARVIN BAKER

When something is out of sight, it's out of mind, right? That's true to a point, but as North Dakotans we sometimes get a glimpse of what it's like elsewhere and the reality is, we don't have it so bad.

As we all know, North Dakota has been growing for several years. Driven by oil, the western third of the state has really expanded, bringing with it lots of spinoff opportunities that most places don't have.

As an example, the city of Williston has nearly doubled it's population in the past 20 years. It doesn't seem so long ago that a group of people was working on ways to urge people to move to Williston, Watford City, Crosby, Ray and Tioga. Time simply changed all that.

And when a community like that grows, it brings with it lots

of opportunities in jobs, housing, health care and other amenities not found previously in that community. The hospital in Williston has been advertising for medical professionals, nurses and CNAs. The school system has grown so much... if you think there's a teacher shortage in North Dakota in general, go to a Williston School Board meeting sometime and then we'll talk.

The last time I checked on North Dakota Job Service, Williston had several hundred jobs available along with hundreds of housing opportunities. Jobs you can basically pick from in a city of 30,000? Granted, not all of them are going to pay \$100,000 a year, but in order to keep up with the oil industry, everyone else has to pay better wages or they simply won't get workers.

We also know that money is a motivator and where else do you know where Walmart can pay up to \$32 an hour? With that kind of wage, yes, a lot of people are going to want to work at Walmart. But that's the reality, or Walmart wouldn't have anyone to keep the store open.

The opposite can be true in other places. The economy can be so depressed, hardly anything moves and I'll use the example of eastern Indiana and the community of Connersville.

A shield from reality

This is a community about the size of Jamestown that sits 14 miles from the Ohio state line and is also about 70 miles from Indianapolis and 100 miles from Cincinnati. It's unfortunate, but about the only jobs you will find in Connersville are health care positions. Little else exists right now. Unfortunately, alongside that is a

cost of living that is parallel to just about every place else and taxes in Indiana are quite high, especially for young families wanting to buy a house and have a decent car to drive. Unemployment is also high and with high unemployment comes an increase in crime.

Suffice to say, if you want to make a livable wage there, you would have to live and work in Indianapolis or Cincinnati or you will most likely continue to struggle financially.

I think the opposite is true here and more specifically in Beulah. In fact, we've seen numerous surveys that indicate Beulah, Hazen and Mercer County have among the best wages in North Dakota that translates into a much better quality

I'm using the examples of Beulah and Connersville not only because Beulah has half the population and more than twice the jobs, but because I have a niece who lives in Beulah and a granddaughter who

lives in Connersville.

Granted, my niece is a little older than my granddaughter, but the way they live is completely different and it's all based on economics. My niece recently moved into a new house, had a baby and she doesn't have to work because her husband works at one of the power plants earning more in his early 30s than I did as a full-time Army first sergeant.

My granddaughter struggles every day to pay the bills. For her, finding a job is useless because if she did go to work, more than half her salary would be eaten up in daycare costs. Her boyfriend has a job that pays a paltry salary even though he is way overqualified for what he is doing.

Numerous other examples like this can be found comparing communities, even economically depressed ones, to those in other states. North Dakota is a place of opportunity right now and that's why young people continue to move here despite the "cold, harsh winters.'

If my granddaughter was here, not only would she not worry about daycare, but she would most likely have a choice of jobs to pick, a choice of a living wage and a choice of a better quality of life. And most employers are flexible enough that she could work and go to college to work for a better life.







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Northern Sentry Beginning Leads to Professional Career

During summer 2020 when Covid regulations were heating up and we were adjusting to that "new normal", a new MAFB mil spouse discovered her life was about to change in a very unexpected way that had nothing to do with the pandemic. Abigail Kinder was about to randomly start working as a Reporter for the Northern Sentry. It was a job she never knew she wanted and for which she had little experience, but it changed her life for the better and ultimately led her to a highly established civil service position at the 5th Bomb Wing Public Affairs office just a short time later.

It all started when Abigail's husband, Airmen First Class Konner Kinder at the time, brought home a Golden Ticket one of his co-workers had discovered inside the Northern Sentry newspaper. Each ticket has a monetary prize value and the co-worker didn't have time to collect it. Abigail took charge and texted the number on the ticket to set up a time to claim the prize at Margie's Art Glass Studio. After meeting Ted Bolton, the Northern Sentry Owner, and collecting her cash, Abigail couldn't stop thinking about how interesting it would be to work for the newspaper. "I kept telling [my husband] how cool it would be to work for a newspaper, as reporting was something I had always wanted to try." A little bit later she actually got a text from Ted asking her if she was interested in doing creative work for the Sentry. She accepted and explained, "From there, the rest is history. The Northern Sentry was my first job in Minot, and I loved every moment of working with that team."

Abigail went in with little relevant job skills, a strong work ethic and only a few years of adult life experience under her belt, but was determined to make the best of the kismet opportunity. "While settling into military life, I was focusing on artwork and selling commissions; I had always been passionate about writing as well.

competitive salary and

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I was 21 with no degree and I had no idea what I wanted to do with my life, but reporting and graphic design were careers I was interested in. Ted really took a leap of faith in hiring me, but I knew my work ethic and was determined to give it my all."

Abigail's job responsibilities at the Northern Sentry covered both design work and reporting, resulting in varied weekly hours. She helped with formatting layouts for the weekly periodical as well as special editions, while also tackling local news stories. "I was covering everything from a Simulated Electronic Launch Minuteman III to on-base school events to the Medora Musical."

Abigail explained that the job had a lot of flexibility, besides meeting weekly deadlines, but that she could work when and where she needed. "The job allowed for a lot of flexibility and Ted gave me the freedom to suggest and pursue many ideas and passion projects to improve the paper."

Abigail spent time over the next nearly two years learning about the base, its mission and the people. She shared some of her most memorable times reporting was during the 91st Missile Wing SELM in 2021. She was bussed out to the field and waited for what happened next. "We spent hours in the middle of nowhere waiting for the two second culmination when the launcher closure door blasted open. Like most military operations, it was a lot of 'hurry up and wait,' but as a reporter with little knowledge of the mission, it was a once in a lifetime experience that really highlighted the Roughriders' proficiency and credibility."

As Northern Sentry reporter, she was required to be in close contact with MAFB Public Affairs. She learned the system and people pretty well. By 2022, when the PA Chief of Media Ops/Community Relations position opened up, Abigail was ready to try her chances in the General Schedule (GS) world and applied for it on

USA Jobs.


She was hired on as a GS-11 in 2022 and to this day still credits her roles at the Northern Sentry as the start to her professional career. "Joining Team Minot really set my life on a new trajectory, and I always attribute that back to my roots at the Northern Sentry. As a young, brand new military spouse, those jobs helped me get acquainted with the community, learn about the unique mission at Minot AFB, and find my passion."

Abigail and her husband moved away from Minot AFB a few weeks ago, but she hopes to continue working for Public Affairs in the future as she explained that it truly is her passion. "I didn't know what I wanted out of life when I was 21, but when I look back on the past 5 1/2 years of the most incredible experiences, it all goes back to that leap of faith text from Ted Bolton in 2020. Everyone's experience is going to be different, but I think my Northern Sentry job led to the best possible outcome of my experience at Minot AFB - from the friends I made to the career I started."






The Golden Ticket that started it all. A1C Konner Kinder and Abigail on August 15, 2020.

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A LOOK BACK

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THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

PRESIDENT BUSH ENDS B-52 ALERT OF COLD WAR September 27, 1991

September 1991, President George Bush ordered the termination of the Strategic Air Command alert that had been initiated in October of 1957 as a result of the Cold War. This halt signaled the end of the war, which would officially come in December with the collapse of the

communist state. As a result of the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty with Russia, hundreds of B-52 Stratofortresses were dismantled at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona. In the years following the Cold War, the Air Force implemented a downsizing trend that permanently closed many bases around the country. Because of its strategic location and continuous support of the nuclear triad, Minot AFB remained a pivotal location for strategic deterrence, and while the 5th Bomb Wing B-52s were taken off alert, they remained poised for action on a moment's notice.

SPEEDING CATCHES UP WITH YOU

Speeding endangers everyone on the road: In 2020, speeding killed 11,258 people. We all know the frustrations of modern life and juggling a busy schedule, but speed limits are put in place to protect all road users. Learn about the dangers of speeding and why faster doesn't mean safer.

For more than two decades, speeding has been involved in approximately one-third of all motor vehicle fatalities. In 2020, speeding was a contributing factor in 29% of all traffic fatalities.

Speed also affects your safety even when you are driving at the speed limit but too fast for road conditions, such as during bad weather, when a road is under repair, or in an area at night that isn't well lit. It not only endangers not only the life of the speeder, but all of the people on the road around them, including law enforcement officers. It is a problem we all need to help solve.

Seeding is more than just breaking the law. The consequences are farranging

Greater potential for loss of vehicle

control. Reduced effectiveness of occupant

protection equipment. Increased stopping distance after

the driver perceives a danger.

Increased degree of crash severity

leading to more severe injuries. Economic implications of a speedrelated crash; and even increased fuel

consumption/cost. Speeding is a type of aggressive driving behavior. Several factors have contributed to an overall rise in

aggressive driving: Traffic congestion is one of the most frequently mentioned contributing factors to aggressive driving, such as speeding. Drivers may respond by using aggressive driving behaviors, including speeding, changing lanes frequently, or becoming angry at anyone who they believe impedes their progress.

Some people drive aggressively because they have too much to do and are "running late" for work, school, their next meeting, etc...

A motor vehicle insulates the driver from the world. Shielded from the outside environment, a driver can develop a sense of detachment, as if an observer of their surroundings, rather than a participant. This can lead to some people feeling less constrained in their behavior when they cannot be seen by others and/ or when it is unlikely that they will ever again see those who witness their behavior.

The vast majority of motorists rarely drive aggressively, and some never do. For others, episodes of aggressive driving are frequent, and for a small proportion of motorists it is their usual driving behavior. Occasional episodes of aggressive driving—such as speeding and changing lanes abruptly—might occur in response to specific situations, like when the driver is late for an important appointment, but is not the driver's normal behavior.

If it seems that there are more cases of rude and outrageous behavior on the road now than in the past, the observation is correct—if for no other reason than there are more drivers driving more miles on the same roads than ever before.



Speeding behavior and aggressive drivers may not only affect the speeder—it can also affect other drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists. Here are some tips for encountering speeders on the road:

If you are in the left lane and someone wants to pass, move over and let them by.

Give speeding drivers plenty of space. Speeding drivers may lose control of their vehicle more easily.

Adjust your driving accordingly. Speeding is tied to aggressive driving. If a speeding driver is tailgating you or trying to engage you in risky driving, use judgment to safely steer your vehicle out of the way.

Call the police if you believe a driver is following you or harassing

Virgil Hill Returns to **His Home State to Promote Lopez Twins Pro Debut**

I'm a gym rat at heart. I love just watching, and I'll certainly answer any questions that people have for me.'

And for the Lopez twins, they are standing on the threshold of what could prove to be careers very much like Virgil Hill. North Dakota is their home, and in North Dakota sports fans are quick to become fans of local talents like the Lopez brothers.

And in their corner they will have arguably the most talented boxer that North Dakota has ever produced. Once a kid from North Dakota, and then an Olympic Silver Medalist and pro boxer from North Dakota, and now a fight promoter who loves coming back to his home state, Virgil "Quicksilver" Hill returns to perhaps start the Lopez twins on their dream journey, to the top.

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

Minuteman ICBMs 'Feasible' Until 2050, Air Force Says, **But Risks Would Be High**

The Air Force believes it could continue to operate its Minuteman III missiles until 2050 if needed, according to a newly released report from the Government Accountability Office—but doing so poses serious challenges to sustain their aging technology.

Congressional watchdog GAO completed a classified report on the transition from Minuteman to Sentinel in April, and only put out a public version Sept. 10.

Noting that the Air Force previously concluded "Minuteman III would reach the end of its service life in 2036," the GAO report said the Air Force had since revised its calculus. "Now, facing delays to Sentinel, the Air Force is evaluating options to continue operating Minuteman III through 2050. The Minuteman III Program Office concluded that operation of Minuteman III until 2050 is feasible."

The Air Force has 400 Minuteman IIIs on alert in silos spread among five states. Sentinel would replace Minuteman on a one-for-one basis, following a phased approach such that the last Minuteman III would only come offline when the 400th Sentinel is armed and ready. Full operational capability for Sentinel had been set for 2036, but schedule delays mean some Minuteman missiles may need to be operational beyond that time.

Keeping Minuteman until 2050 would carry significant risk, and would require overhauls for certain subsystems. Given the aging technology, sourcing parts will only get more difficult, and sustaining flight tests would also be a challenge.

It's not just the missiles that are at issue. "Air Force officials told us that although they are confident that Minuteman III can be used beyond 2030, even out to 2050, they acknowledged there are unknowns such as ground electrical subsystems and electronics-for example, diodes, resistors, and capacitors—which could degrade to unacceptable levels," the GAO authors wrote.

More specific details on sustainment risks were deemed classified and not included in the public report.

An Air Force spokesperson told Air & Space Forces Magazine that the Minuteman III program office regularly conducts reviews to determine how long the ICBM fleet could feasibly serve and that the 2050 date is not tied to any delays with Sentinel.

The first operational Minuteman III missiles were deployed in 1970 with an expected service life of 10 years. They have been extended time and time again, and pushing them to 2050 would make them among the oldest and longestserving weapons in the Pentagon's inventory.

U.S. Strategic Command and Air Force officials have repeatedly argued Minuteman III must be replaced without delay and point to its outdated parts, electronics, and launch facilities as serious risks to the ICBM enterprise and by extension, U.S. nuclear deterrence.

Yet Minuteman's planned replacement, Sentinel, has suffered major cost and schedule overruns, raising serious doubts as to whether it could meet a requirement by STRATCOM to have an initial operational capability by September 2030.

The Sentinel program is currently being restructured following a Pentagon review. Lead contractor Northrop Grumman said in July it had agreed with the Air Force on an "approach which will lead to re-establishment of the program baseline."

Most of Sentinel's problems stem from the infrastructure, not the missiles. Early plans to update existing silos ran into trouble, and officials now believe it's cheaper to build new than try to retrofit 50-year old structures. The Minuteman facilities date back even further than the missiles, and while the Air Force originally planned to refurbish them, officials now say they have determined it will actually be cheaper to build entirely new launch control facilities and silos, complete with miles of cables, pipes, and wires.

Anti-nuclear activists and some thrift-conscious lawmakers have

called for canceling the program. But Kyle Balzer, a fellow at the American Enterprise Institute, said that would be a mistake.

"The Air Force has done an extraordinary job extending its life, but as this report pointed out, there's still major risks involved in that, major unknowns, primarily with the electronics, the ground subsystems, the degradation of those component parts," Balzer told Air & Space Forces Magazine. "And I mean, former STRATCOM commander [Adm. Charles] Richard has testified that we can't keep extending the life of Minutemen. Our Air Force maintainers are extraordinary at their job, but you know, these component parts are going to eventually degrade, and there's going to be age-related attrition."

Retired Air Force Col. Jennifer Reeves, a former commander of an ICBM wing, also argued that the 2050 projection in the GAO report doesn't fundamentally change the need for modernization.

"Listen, man, at some point we have to go to a new weapon system, and each time we delay, it's going to get more expensive," she said. "We're definitely going to do what it takes to keep Minuteman going as long as it absolutely can. But the weapons system gets a vote. ... Things will eventually just break."

When that happens, the U.S. cannot afford to be without a viable land leg of its nuclear triad, Balzer said.

"Deterrence is very much fundamentally about political resolve. And I think if we were to cancel Sentinel, we would ... send a wrong signal to China and Russia about our national will and

The GAO report does not call for Sentinel to be abandoned. Rather, it recommends that the Air Force develop a risk management plan for its transition from Minuteman to Sentinel and plans for how it will manage personnel and flight testing during that transition, as well as several other points.

The Air Force concurred with the report and the recommendation.



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Why is tire rotation so important?

Vehicle owners need to keep maintenance on the mind to ensure their cars and trucks are operating at peak capacity. Various components should be checked and serviced at key intervals. Oil changes and fluid top-offs are part of routine maintenance, but it can be easy to forget about other important parts of the vehicle, including tires.

Rotating tires is vital to their upkeep. Bridgestone Tires advises that tire rotation involves routinely repositioning a vehicle's tires in specific patterns from front to back and side to side. According to Big O Tires, the front tires tend to wear on the outside edges because the tire leans over when a driver turns a corner. The rear tires just follow the front ones, so they usually wear more evenly. By leaving tires in place, the outside edges on the front tires will wear down much faster than the rest and those tires will need to be replaced sooner. Rotation may be required by tire warranties. Rotation also keeps the tires working properly.

Experts generally advise tire rotation every 6,000 to 8,000 miles, even if they do not show any signs of wear. It is challenging to determine if weather treads are uneven or how much wear has been sustained just by looking at them. Rotating tires can prolong the life of tires and decrease how frequently they need to be replaced.

Rotating tires keeps the tread depth uniform and helps maintain traction and consistent handling across all four tires. Bridgestone says the tire rotation pattern that is best for a particular vehicle depends on the type of tire being used. Patterns are recommended by the standardizing body of the tire industry, called The Tire and Rim Association, Inc. Individuals can consult with professional mechanics about the proper way to rotate tires. Many tire manufacturers or automotive stores that have sold customers tires also will do tire rotations - some free of charge.

In addition to proper traction, minimizing uneven tire treads causes the vehicle to be more balanced, advises Wrench, a mobile auto repair and maintenance company. This enables the driver to have more control even when roads are slippery. Many auto service centers will then align and balance tires after they have been rotated. At this time the mechanic will likely check brakes as well, since it is easy to see and reach them when the tires are off.

Tire rotation is an important component of vehicle maintenance. Check with a qualified automotive professional to see if it's time to have your vehicle's tires

Human Services (NDHHS) recently released a Suicide Prevention and Response Toolkit for Schools. Helpful for families, the toolkit has signs and behaviors to look for with regard to your child's demeanor, ways to stay connected, and how to develop protective factors that can help protect your child from suicide. 

THE EARLY SEASON CHALLENGE

It's a challenge North Dakota waterfowl hunters have long faced: The opening of waterfowl season – specifically ducks – means a couple of things in the state. For starters, it means hunting season truly is getting into high gear.

Secondly, it means welcome to the world of brown ducks.

And that's where the challenge lies.

You see the problem with North Dakota's resident waterfowl opener – Sept. 27 this year is a lot of ducks across the state are still brown. Welcome to the world of brown ducks.

North Dakota is a major player in duck production in the Lower 48 States. Its location in the heart of the Prairie Pothole Region provides a mosaic of wetland kettles in an array of sizes along with nesting cover grass. That combination means the state raises a significant percentage of mallards, gadwalls, blue-winged teal, and other species.

With a September opener for its homegrown ducks, many ducklings are still getting their adult plumage. Many adults are still molting. Duck identification is always critical to meet state and federal species and sex bag limits and

restrictions. It's just that in North Dakota, that can be especially tricky.

The N. D. Game and Fish Department helps make identification easier with photos or illustrations of the most common waterfowl found in the state on their website link, (gf. nd.gov/wildlife/id/waterfowl). Click the artwork to link to the species fact sheet.

Hunters can also visit the Central Flyway website, (www.centralflyway.org) for more information and details. Click "Education" on the home page and scroll down to "Online Resources" where "Waterfowl Identification in the Central Flyway" takes people to a pdf file of the identification booklet.

The booklet – which can be downloaded and printed for future reference – illustrates characteristics differentiating diver and puddle ducks. Legs of puddle ducks such as mallards are centered more in the middle of its body, for example. They tip upside down in the water to feed; rarely diving which is characteristic of diving ducks like canvasbacks.

The Central Flyway web page also provides

links to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service videos with actual wing samples illustrating species differences.

In addition to perusing the Game and Fish Department and Central Flyway websites, it helps to spend as much time afield as possible watching ducks in flight as well as simply watching ducks be ducks: Listen to ducks. Not all ducks sound alike. Just consider that diving ducks have a different quack. In fact, it's not really a quack; it's almost like a growl.

Seriously, divers tend to sound like they're growling a guttural growl - not quacking like puddle ducks such as mallards.

They don't fly the same, either. Different ducks posture differently when coming into a landing. Wing and flight speed also vary. Just consider a canvasback in flight: They seem to be a mission to get from Point A to Point B as if they absolutely, positively have to be someplace at an exact moment. Plus, "cans" don't break flight into a landing until the last possible moment. That's much different from mallards that seem to enjoy circling around the block...again...and again...and again...and then change their minds.

One tip for hunters: Don't focus so much on breast feather coloration. Instead, study wings. For one thing, lighting changes coloration. Look for a side view to see as much of the wing as possible. In reality, looking at the wing is the truest way to identify ducks.

That, of course, always seems to happen over

one's decoys, never anyone else's decoys.

Also look at a duck's bill, if possible. If it's greenish-yellow bill, it's a mallard. Not only that, it's in range. Bill color also indicates if it's a mallard hen or drake –drakes have yellow-greenish bills while hens have an orangish bill with black mottling.

Mallards and shovelers both have orangish legs – that's why foot coloring isn't always a species indicator.

Proper duck identification is more than staying legal and hunting responsibly. It helps understand the nuances of the different species and perhaps above all, can heighten one's appreciation for the entire wetland experience.

Take heart, as the season moves later into the year those brown ducks – if they're still here – will have full plumage.

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

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20 AF reactivates ICBM Center of Excellence, completes inaugural Instructor Qualification Course

Twentieth Air Force achieved a significant milestone in June with the successful execution of the first Instructor Qualification Course under the newly re-established Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) Center of Excellence, or ICE. Held from June 2-6, 2025, the course marked a pivotal moment in enhancing instructional standards across the ICBM enterprise.

"The future of our deterrent force depends on the strength of our instructors," said Maj. Gen. Stacy Jo Huser, 20 AF commander. "The ICE sharpens our competitive edge by developing professionals who are ready to train, mentor and lead across every aspect of the ICBM mission.'

Bringing the ICE back after its retirement in 2019 began with a recommendation from the 20 AF Operations Cross Functional Team final report to address concerns about instructor development and standardize training across 20 AF's missile wings. The revamped ICE seeks to improve the proficiency of the crew force by providing new instructors and evaluators the foundation they need to continually hone the proficiency of 20 AF Airmen.

This isn't new territory for the ICE, which was originally established in 2001. At its peak, the first iteration of the ICE was accredited by the Community College of the Air Force and had its own unit designator, the 620th Missile Operations Flight. In an effort to empower lowerlevel leaders and provide greater flexibility to unit leaders to train their operators, 20 AF de-activated the ICE in 2019.

In the years since, ICBM leaders learned they still value this decentralization but also understand the need to provide standardized instructor and evaluator training as a foundation from which to execute the mission with the greatest proficiency. While the revamp of the ICE may not return to CCAF accreditation and a formal unit designator, its initial cadre is borrowing much from the original charter.

"The current plan is to have staff officers assigned to operations, security forces and maintenance teach courses that correlate with their expertise and current positions on staff," said Lt. Col. Thomas McKnight, 20 AF chief of training, test and evaluations. "This ensures instructors and course material are relevant and have a synergistic effect with current staff efforts.

The inaugural week-long instructor course included three days of classroom academics on instructional fundamentals, lesson planning and presentation techniques. The course culminated in practical teaching sessions where candidates instructed on diverse skill sets, followed by ICBM-specific lectures.

"The students were exceptional, and I received great feedback on how to make the course even better in the future," said Maj. Timothy "TIG" Dominice, 20 AF IMA to the branch chief, weapons, tactics and training. "The instructor candidates enjoyed and learned a lot from the course."

The class featured 11 students from across the ICBM enterprise. Feedback from the course was positive, with participants praising both the structure of the course and its impact on their instructional confidence.

"As a certified instructor, I have already gone through a local

As 20 AF continues to meet strategic deterrence challenges, the ICE program stands as a symbol of continued investment in proficiency and lethality.


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
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New Downtown Mural **Celebrates Minot Symphony's Centennial Season**


