

Minot AFB Gears Up for Winter with Annual "Snow Rodeo"

On September 19, the 5th Civil Engineer Squadron (CES) Pavement and Equipment section, known as the "Dirt Boys," hosted the annual Snow Rodeo, a spirited and practical competition designed to showcase the skill and readiness of Minot AFB's snow removal teams ahead of the harsh winter season.

The Snow Rodeo wasn't just a fun competition. It simulates the real-world challenges Airmen face during the long North Dakota winters, when clearing snow quickly and efficiently is vital to keeping the base operational. Crews were timed as they maneuvered snowplows and other heavy equipment through a realistic obstacle course, replicating the demanding conditions they encounter during winter storms. "The Snow Rodeo is an

educational experience," explained MSgt Ryan Powell of the 5 ČES. "It shows leaders what it's like inside the cab, what kind of visibility we actually have, and the distractions we deal with on the road. That way, when we talk about safety concerns. like people passing us too closely, they understand where we're coming from."

Snow removal is more than just keeping the base clean, it's critical to maintaining Minot's mission: providing global strike capabilities 24/7, in any weather.

"The men and women of Minot AFB are responsible for Global Strike, anytime, anywhere, in any weather," said Col. Jesse W. Lamarand, 5th Bomb Wing Commander. "We rely on 5 CES and our snow removal teams to ensure our aircraft can get off the ground. We can't do it without them.'

This level of preparation is no small feat. According to Lt. Col. Khary Davis, 5 CES Commander, about 70 Airmen make up the snow and ice removal team during winter, a mix of trained operators and volunteers. "Roughly a third of our snow removal team aren't heavy equipment operators by trade,' Davis said. "They're engineers who volunteer because they believe in the mission. That's a testament to the commitment of our Airmen."

What sets the Snow Rodeo apart is the participation of base leadership. This hands-on event allowed commanders and senior leaders to step into the boots and into the cab of the operators who keep the base running through the coldest months.

"This gives us a chance to experience, even if just for an afternoon, what these guys do in the worst conditions," said Col.

James L. Schlabach, Commander of the 91st Missile Wing. "It's fun for us, but these are the folks out there at 3 a.m., in minus-10 temperatures, with five inches already down and five more coming. They're doing this so first responders can get out, so aircraft can launch, so the mission keeps moving."

One of the newest additions to the team, SrA Jaden Semmler, arrived at Minot in June 2025 from RAF Lakenheath in the UK. While he has experience with winter equipment, this is his first time operating in the intense conditions of North Dakota.

"I've worked on some of the same equipment, mostly in preventive operations like salting and chemical prep," Semmler said. "But I'm excited to get out there and operate the snow fleet. The biggest challenge will be visibility, remembering where the curbs and lights are under feet of snow."

Keeping the base functional during winter isn't just about plowing snow; it's about enabling the larger mission and protecting the Minot AFB community. As such, safety is a top concern.

"We want residents to give our equipment space," said Lt. Col. Davis. "You'll see our teams out at

all hours, please don't crowd the equipment. And if you see one of our operators, thank them. They're working through the night so you can get to work and keep the mission moving."

Command Chief Master Sergeant Wayne Sharp, 5th Bomb Wing, emphasized the team's importance, "We love our Warbulls. They're critical to the mission, 24/7, 365. We count on them to keep things moving every day."

Snow Rodeo scores are still being calculated, including the name of the member who earned top marks in speed, safety, and technical precision. The winner's name will be released at a later time by 5 CES.

More than just a competition, the Snow Rodeo served as a reminder of the grit, professionalism, and behind-the-scenes work that enables Minot AFB to maintain its global strike mission even under the harshest conditions.

"This event is a fantastic opportunity," added Col. Schlabach. "It helps us understand just a little bit of what these folks do, and gives us even more respect for their role in keeping this base, and our mission, moving forward.'

That 2012 Olive Garden Review Still Matters



SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE

Last week, I got a DM that said, "You may have heard of her, but Marilyn Hagerty just died at age 99. She was an absolute legend—North Dakota food critic and friend of Anthony Bourdain."

Anthony Bourdain."

I'll be honest—I had no idea who she was. But I was intrigued.
Until last week, I didn't know Marilyn's name or that she wrote a long-running column for the Grand Forks Herald. I didn't know she'd gone viral in 2012 for her review of the newly opened Olive Garden in her city. At the time, I had just moved to Minot for the first time and wasn't paying much attention to viral local news.

But twelve years later, I sat at my kitchen table reading her words out loud for the first time. And I loved every line.

If you're unfamiliar, here's the

gist: she visited Olive Garden and wrote about it with unmatched gusto. She described the Tuscan farmhouse décor, the waiters' crisp uniforms, the warm breadsticks, the way the salad came with "several black olives." She treated the chain restaurant with the same attention and respect she might have given to a five-star destination.

The internet went wild. Some people thought her words were charming, some were puzzled, and others found the review laughably lame. It's undeniable that the column stirred a big reaction. And in the years since, that review has become legendary.

Marilyn's Olive Garden review is a masterclass in perspective. She took something others, in other places find ordinary—and saw beauty in it. It's a fitting reminder that we get to choose our perspective. Where others saw a mundane chain restaurant, she was able to paint this fabulous word picture.

Both perspective are accurate, but the virality of a review like this reminds me that seeing the good stands out. It's a reminder that we get to decide what perspective we pick up. And what perspective we share with others

Here's where it hits home for me: learning to take charge of my

own perspective saved my life.

For years, I carried a negative outlook. I viewed myself, my circumstances, and the world around me through a filter of criticism, fear, and despair. Eventually, it caught up to me in the form of anxiety and depressive disorders. The weight of my thoughts nearly crushed

Learning to reframe—learning that I could see the same world in a new way—changed everything. It didn't erase hardship or eliminate pain. But it gave me tools to look for good, to notice beauty, to embrace small joys. And that shift in perspective literally saved my life.

That's why Marilyn's Olive Garden review resonates so deeply. She reminds us that even the ordinary can be extraordinary if we choose to see it that way.

It is fitting that I stumbled onto her work in September—National Suicide Prevention Month. Because perspective isn't just about whether we roll our eyes at a restaurant chain or write about it with delight. It's also about the way we see ourselves, our future, and our place in the world.

We don't control every plot point of our lives. Hard things happen. Circumstances shift. But we do have a say in how we tell the story. We can emphasize despair or dignity. We can lean into criticism or celebration.

That choice isn't always easy. (I know from experience.) But it is possible.

It's possible in the little things—like how we talk about road construction or the weather. And it's possible in the big things—like how we view our worth and hope for the future.

Marilyn's review went viral because people were hungry for sincerity. It was refreshing—if also confusing—to see something so sincere, honest, and good. I think the same is true today.

Our world is full of negative voices, and unwanted circumstances will always arise. But the superpower within each of us is the ability to reframe—to see the same world in a new light.

So yes, you can see Olive Garden. Or you can see Marilyn Hagerty's Olive Garden.

Personally, I'd rather have lunch in the latter.

And if you're struggling to see the good right now, take heart. It's out there. Sometimes it takes practice, sometimes it takes help—but it's possible. And we're looking for it together.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

A recent report on CITC-TV, a Global network affiliate in Calgary, outlined a situation on the Mon-tana/Alberta border that is causing a lot of concern along the entire U.S./Canadian border.

There is a gravel road that separates Canada from the United States and more specifically, Toole County, Montana from the rural municipality of Warner No. 5 in Alberta. The Toole County seat is Shelby, where American farmers protested Canadian wheat coming into the United States in the late 1990s.

The people of Warner No. 5 and Toole County, nearly all ranchers, have put all that behind them and have been good neighbors to each other for the past 30 years. Recently, however, a memo from the Department of Homeland Security told local

law enforcement that to stop the flow of drugs into the United States from Canada, that gravel road that is the border, is now off limits to any Canadian, even if they live right next to it.

From a legal standpoint, the road was built on the American side a long time ago and several Alberta ranchers have used that road to get access to their property. Now, they will apparently be arrested if they are caught on that 30-mile stretch of gravel road because it's on the U.S. side.

This situation has numerous implications, not only for Montana and Alberta, but for North Dakota and Manitoba and others as well.

Those of us who live near the Canadian border know full and well that drugs coming across that border are quite rare. Once in a great while some knucklehead will try to smuggle marijuana into the country, but hard drugs into rural Montana?

Here's the thing. Everyone in Warner No. 5 and Toole County know each other and if someone or something suspicious was going on like an unusual car on that road or strange activity in one of the border communities, local law enforcement would be alerted.

The same can be said about a

road that borders Pembina County and the rural municipalities of Montcalm and Rhineland in Manitoba. In this case, the road is actually on the Canadian side and although it's been the subject of controversy for years, many Pembina County residents use that 30-mile gravel road.

Montana/Alberta road

That controversy stems from Pembina River flooding. Canadians built the farm-to-market road, but American officials say it's a dike to only protect Manitoba farmland.

In case you don't know, the towns of Neche, North Dakota and Gretna, Manitoba are less than 2 miles apart and there is a lot of commerce between these two small communities. Based on what is about to happen in Toole County, Montana, Manitoba officials could just as well shut off the border road with Pembina County that would effectively force people from the Neche area to have to make longer trips to either go west and south to Walhalla and back north then east or south and east to Pembina back north and then west to their destinations.

There are other similar situations like this brewing along the U.S./Canada border with most of them being along the Washington/British Columbia border.

And that's perhaps where Homeland Security should focus there attention. Seattle and Vancouver are both big cities, close together and there have been a lot of drug seizures along that stretch of border. Buffalo and Toronto are close together, Detroit and Windsor are as well. And in most cases, if and when drugs are coming into the U.S. from Canada, it's going to happen on a waterway, not along some lonely rural road in remote northern Montana.

There are, however, other areas where someone could conceal themselves well. They include the Lake of the Woods area, parts of western New York, the entire Maine/New Brunswick border and nearly all of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, not this part of Montana where there is no place for cover or concealment.

Local law enforcement knows this yet they are being mandated to make these drastic changes that are completely unnecessary and will most likely affect the commerce between Warner, Alberta and Shelby, Montana and quite possibly between Neche, North Dakota and Gretna, Manitoba.

If it ain't broke, don't fix it!

Minot AFB modernizes fleet with up-armored Ford F-350s for enhanced security

Minot Air Force Base will receive up-armored Ford F-350 patrol trucks over the next two years as part of a phased replacement of its Humvees and BearCats. The transition marks a modernization effort aimed at enhancing safety, efficiency and sustainability for the defenders who rely on these vehicles every day.

For many years, the Humvee has been a valuable asset to the Air Force. Its lightweight, fourwheel-drive design allowed it to operate in diverse terrain and transport Airmen, cargo and weapons systems.

"I like the Humvee because it's a proven platform that's served the Air Force well for decades," said Tech. Sgt. Zachary Horton, 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron Commander's Support Staff noncommissioned officer in charge. "It's versatile and we can configure it for various mission requirements. It handles rough terrain better than most standard trucks, and since many of us have trained on them, there's already a familiarity that makes them effective in the field."

The BearCat, another longstanding vehicle in the fleet, has proven reliable for emergency response in rough terrain and natural disaster scenarios.

These vehicles have become increasingly difficult and costly to maintain, with heavy wear on components, high fuel consumption and reduced overall

The introduction of the uparmored Ford F-350 patrol truck offers a balance between protection, adaptability and costeffectiveness. Outfitted with an armored crew box in the rear, independent climate control and intercom systems and offroad handling enhancements, the trucks are designed to meet Team Minot's security and defense requirements. The F-350 also provides increased passenger capacity, improved survivability in non-combat environments, and readily available parts for faster, cheaper maintenance.

The F-350s offer reliable transportation for patrols, convoy operations and rapid response, while also providing a safer platform for our Airmen.

Readiness 5th Logistics Squadron (5LRS) vehicle maintenance Airmen have also played a key role in evaluating and preparing for the fleet transition. Compared to Humvees, which often require extensive repairs and specialized parts, the F-350 is expected to streamline operations.

"From maintenance perspective, this is a big win," said Senior Airman Alexis Garnigan, vehicle maintenance apprentice. "The turnaround is usually quicker, depending on the job, so it saves time and resources for other missions in need.'

The first shipments just arrived this month, with full delivery expected to be completed by 2027.

Minot's For defenders maintainers, the fleet modernization underscores a commitment to keeping Airmen safe, sustaining readiness and investing in the future of the



THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

USAF CREW PARTICIPATED IN RESCUE OPERATIONS FOR BURNING LUXURY LINER IN THE PACIFIC

October 4, 1980

On October 4, 1980, a fire erupted in the engine room of the Holland America Line luxury cruise liner Prinsendam as it was voyaging through the Pacific Ocean off the coast of Alaska. The United States Coast Guard performed a search, rescue, and evacuation operation for over 500 passengers and crew over the course of 24 hours. Participating in the evacuation was Air Force Capt. John J. Walters and his crew, who rescued 61 people by airlifting them to a

supertanker with the help of their HH-3 Jolly Green Giant helicopter. The rescue of the Prinsendam was particularly significant because of the distance traveled by the rescuers, over 130 miles off the coast, and the fact that all 519 passengers and crew were rescued under challenging environmental conditions without loss of life or serious injury.


emergency vehicles up close and learn about the community heroes who keep Minot safe.

One Word To Describe AFA Conference...Amazing

My goal in coming to the Air & Space Forces Association (AFA) convention and conference was to learn and experience what is happening with our Air Force, and our Air Force Base. After less than 24 hours at the AFA conference, held on the historic banks of the Potomac River in Oxon Hill, Maryland, I feel like I indeed had stepped up to attempt to "take a drink of water from a fire hose."

Our first keynote speaker was new Secretary of the Air Force, Troy E. Meink. In his first major speech as Secretary of the Air Force, Meink said he was surprised by the extent to which the Air Force's readiness is suffering after years of under-investment in sustainment accounts-and the speed at which China has been innovating for years now and according to Meink "we just can't have that. We need to do better so we can be better."

It was a great start to what I anticipate will be 3 days of learning and networking. As I took my seat for the keynote speech I caught a glimpse of Col Jesse Lamarand and his wife Nathalie just a few rows ahead of me. The contingent from Minot Air Force Base also included the Lamarand's and CMSgt Sharp, along with Col Jimmy Schlabach and his wife Monica, CMSgt Becky Thomas and 91st Ops Commander Col Michael Suden. Having both Col Schlabach and Col Lamarand as resources during the conferences was something that I didn't expect, but it is certainly appreciated.

Then Gen David Allvin, would introduce the standing room only audience to what has become a very common theme in the sessions I have attended, "the changing character of war." Gen Allvin pointed as an example to the over 267 days of Bomber Task Force activities in the past year. These activities are aimed at not only establishing a collaboration with other allied forces, but to continue the necessary deterrence of our adversaries. "There is a need to not only exceed in technology, but also in the mindset" continued General Allvin. And is the Nuclear Triad still relevant? "It is the bedrock of our national defense, not only today but in the future" according to Allvin "nothing can replace it."

MODERNIZING THE TRIAD: THE IMPERATIVE FOR THE **B-21 AND SENTINEL**

Panel Member Lt. Gen Michael J. Lutton, Maj. Gen Brandon D. Parker, Brig. Gen William "Buck Rogers, and Ben Davis (Northrop Grumman)

This panel would talk extensively about the importance of bringing the Sentinel and the B 21 into relevance as a deterrent to our adversaries as well as keep the United State ahead of the now global Chinese, and to a lesser extent the North Korean,

Gen Lutton mentioned a photo he had seen in his travels, of Guam and there were over 300 B-52's lined up on the ground in the photo. "Now that number is more than our total U.S. bomber fleet." Gen Lutton pointed to the task at hand is to provide what we need for national security "and to have more and faster.'

From the Northrop Grumman perspective, there is a mandate to produce the B 21 Raider at a faster

rate. With over 30 Million square feet and over 20,000 workers, Northrup Grumman is poised to meet the challenge according to Corporate Vice President Ben

Col Lamarand echoed the theme of the morning that the United States has not kept up with the changing character of war when it comes to providing the resources that the U.S. Air Force has need to maintain aging weapons systems over the past several years. "They have finally recognized that we haven't provided the resources and the manpower as a nation to keep up" said Col Lamarand "they need to remain committed to that (providing the resources) goal.

As the Northern Sentry goes to press on Wednesday, we will be on the last day of the AFA conference, with many of us staying in DC for the Nuclear Symposium sponsored by Task Force 21 on Friday. Intermixed with the AFA conference will be visits to Congressional staff

All About Pets





Betta fish are one of the most popular types of fish for pet owners all over. While fish don't often require the same type of care as a dog or cat, they still need proper care to make sure they can live a satisfied life. Here are some tips to set you and your betta fish up for success!

 Make sure you have a proper size tank-it is possible for betta fish to live in tanks of at least three gallons of water, but if you want your fish to live longer and be happier, opt for a tank that holds at least five gallons of water or more per betta. They need plenty of space to move around, and a larger tank will also take longer to build up to toxic levels of ammonia and other waste than a small tank will.

•Choose a gentle water filter-filters are important to aerate water and keep things clean. Bettas do best with a gentle, low flow power filter so that they don't get knocked around by strong currents.


•Decorate the tank-decorations are a great source of enrichment for your betta fish, plus they are super fun for the family to set up together. Some people opt for gravel or sand as a base for their tanks, and many use fake rocks, decorations, and plants to fill space. However, consider using real plants for your betta! Not only will real plants help maintain the quality of your tank's ecosystem, but it will make your tank look great and keep your betta fish extra happy. Java ferns, java moss, cryptocoryne petchii, anubias nana, moss balls, and amazon sword plants are just a few of the live greens you could use in your tank. Bettas also love to hide, so small caves, logs, or other nooks and crannies are recommended

•Avoid direct sunlight for your fish tank, and try to place it in an area that has a well regulated temperature.

 Pick your betta's tank mates wisely-betta fish are notoriously aggressive and territorial to certain types of fish. It is possible to have more than one female betta in the same tank, but you should keep an eye out for aggression between them. Do not put more than one male betta fish in the same tank!! Some fish that bettas can coexist with include mystery snails, ghost shrimp, feeder guppies, cory catfish, harlequin rasbora, and african dwarf

 Maintain the environment-this includes using a water heater, freshwater testing kit, water conditioner, thermometer, etc. Bettas are considered tropical fish and need to live in water temperaures between 75 and 80 degrees with a relatively neutral pH level to reduce stress. Water conditioner can help you make sure that the water you use in your betta's tank is safe for them to live in.

Like any other pets, betta fish need proper care to live a long, fulfilled life. There are many myths surrounding betta fish care, so make sure you do your research and truly take the time to do what's best for your fish.



Volunteer Emergency Pilots Train for All-Weather Missions

CIVIL AIR PATROL, U.S. AIR FORCE AUXILIARY

When severe weather strikes or a hiker goes missing, trained volunteer pilots are ready to launch—thanks to rigorous allweather training like Saturday's event in Moorhead. Fourteen Civil Air Patrol pilots, from across North Dakota gathered Saturday for annual advanced training. Lt. Col. Chad Smith was happy to host the event at his squadron's hangar at Moorhead Municipal Airport. "This is one of the few times we all get to gather in one place, get to know each other, and just talk aviation for the day," said Smith. Squadrons from Grand Forks, Jamestown, and as far away as Minot assembled a total of four CAP aircraft to support the day of training. Additionally, CAP-USAF Liaison Jeremy Aamold visited from St. Paul maintaining the relationship with CAP as the Auxiliary to the United States Air Force.

The day's weather was far from typical for search-and-rescue or aerial photography—CAP's most common North Dakota missions. Instead, low clouds and reduced visibility prompted Smith to focus training events on topics and flight plans applicable to instrument flight rules. "It ended up being the perfect weather for that," said one of the pilots Maj. Jeffrey Slocum. "Cloud cover was low enough to provide real-life training but high enough off the ground to allow a safe margin of safety." Most of Civil Air Patrol's emergency response flights occur with good visibility required for photography and visual search, however, crews may need to travel through clouds between their designated mission area and their servicing airport.

The full day of training fostered many conversations amongst volunteers in between scheduled flights. Experienced members shared stories of search and rescue practice exercises and realworld flooding response missions. Capt. Fred Remer, a Civil Air Patrol pilot and retired professor from University of North Dakota, presented an overview of modern forecasting tools available to all pilots. According to Remer, "These models don't count as the 'legal' forecast, like the terminal aerodrome forecast, but they are updated much more frequently allowing crews to make real-time decisions during mission flying operations."

People interested in volunteering to serve with Civil Air Patrol in the air or on the ground can visit gocivilairpatrol.com/join to find out more and connect with the nearest squadron. The newest CAP pilot

Car care checklist for summer road trips • Part 1

It's time for a drive vacation. You mapped a route, booked hotels, and made a checklist of things to do before you go. AAA reminds you to also make car maintenance part of your summer road trip preparation. Use this car care checklist to ensure your vehicle is ready for summer travel.

Check tires and tire pressure

Inspect all four tires and, if you have one, the spare tire as well. Look for cuts, gouges or sidewall bulges. Insert a quarter upside down into grooves to check tire tread. If you see the top of George Washington's head, it is time

Check tire pressure when the car has been idle and tires are cool. Inflate as needed to the vehicle manufacturer's recommended pressure. You will find it listed in the owner's manual and on the sticker of the driver side door jamb. Do not use the number on the tire sidewall.

Listen to and feel the brakes

If you hear a grinding sound or feel a vibration when applying the brakes, take your vehicle to an auto repair shop for a brake inspection. A service professional will check the brake system for fluid leaks, and the pads, rotors, shoes and drums. If repair or replacement is needed, use the Repair Cost Estimator to help anticipate costs.

Secure and test the battery

Check the car battery to be sure cable connections are clean and tight, and the hold down hardware is secure. Have a service professional do a battery check to determine remaining capacity. AAA members may request a free battery check.

Top off engine oil and other fluids

Check that engine oil, coolant and brake, transmission and power steering fluids are at the correct levels for safe vehicle operation. When adding fluids, use products that meet the specifications listed in the owner's manual. Note that newer car models may have sealed automatic transmissions without a dipstick, and electric power steering that may not use fluid.

Replace wiper blades and replenish windshield

Rubber wiper blades naturally deteriorate over time. If wipers streak or fail to clear the windshield thoroughly. replace the blades. Fill the windshield washer reservoir with fluid formulated to remove insects and other debris, and test to make sure the nozzles spray adequately.







Tough walleye bite on the east end of Lake Sakakawea with most coming from deep water of 30 feet. Work points, 7 Sisters, or Steinke Bay using spinners and heavy bottom bouncers. Work the south shore either side of the dam in 30 feet or less for salmon. Anglers Lake Sakakawea, Indian marking them but the bite is slow. Lake Sakakawea/northwest

N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Try 12 feet with crankbaits for walleye with best success still from Lund's Landing to White Earth Bay on the upper end of Lake Sakakawea. Also try nightcrawlers and spinner baits. Look for a mix of pike, catfish,

and walleye from shore using minnows. Trenton Lake continues producing crappie and catfish. Yellowstone and rivers producing catfish with occasional walleye around the confluence.

• North-central/central N.D. lakes, Towner Hdwe. Hank, Towner: Little activity throughout area lakes with the Souris River

HUNTING:

- Cranes: Cranes starting to move into the northern tier of N.D. but none as far south as alona the midsection of Lake Sakakawea early in the week.
- Upland: Hunters finding limited grouse but fair partridge
- Waterfowl: Look for fair duck numbers in the northwest with only local ducks and geese throughout the state and no migration yet.



GUN SAFETY PROPER USAGE AND STORAGE IS ESSENTIAL

In our daily lives, firearms of all types are featured in T.V. shows, movies, video games, and in a large majority of our homes. Since firearms have become such a large part of today's society, "Firearm Safety" cannot be overlooked. The purpose of Firearm Safety is to eliminate or minimize the risks of unintentional death, injury or damage caused by improper handling and storage of firearms. If you choose to maintain firearms, you must become fully aware of the risks exposed to not only you, but friends and family. Although studies show that firearm related injuries peak in adolescent groups; adults are just as likely to have a firearm mishap.

Unfortunately, tragedies occur on a daily basis involving unlocked firearms, which make them easily accessible. The first rule of firearm safety is simple and important: Know why you have a weapon in the house, and act accordingly. Keep your weapons secure where no one can access them and cause accidental harm to themselves or others. After all, how often are you going to hunt deer or shoot targets in your home? In the event of a fire or natural disaster, would you want the loaded, unlocked firearm to wound or kill the emergency response personnel who are there to rescue you?

Here are a few basic guide lines to help keep firearms safe and away from unauthorized access.

- Always remove ammunition from firearms.
- Assure no unauthorized persons have access to your firearm.
- Place ammunition in a locked location, separate from firearms. When deciding where to store ammunition, remember to select a secure place that is out of sight and

- Secure unloaded firearms with a gunlock, gun alarm or other type of tamper-proof device, these might render the gun inoperable.
- · Store unloaded firearms, in lockable gun cabinet, safe, or locked vault. Remember to place a locked storage case where children cannot



find it.

• Keep firearms storage unit keys away from the "every day" keys.

Remember that proper storage or firearms and ammunition can significantly decrease injuries; the consequences of an accidental discard can be devastating.



There are some things in life that a person – and a dog – simply doesn't need to get acquainted with

When it comes to hunting and hunting dogs –or pets in general – that includes any encounter with a wild animal.

Heck, even something as small as an irate wasp can be an unfriendly encounter.

Avoiding unfriendly critters is especially true when it comes to wild carnivores. Even though most wild animals normally prefer to run or avoid an encounter, they're typically not going to back down if cornered.

There is a lot of truth in the old adage, "don't mess with the bear" – even if that bear isn't a bear but some other wild critter.

Hunting dogs will be afield on a more regular basis now that grouse, partridge, and waterfowl hunting seasons are underway and the Granddaddy of upland season – pheasants – about to open.

That means there is more potential for encounters with critters with attitudes.

Badgers seem to top that list of critters with bad attitudes just because they look like they're having a bad day 24/7. When they show those teeth and snarl those lips, that's a definite indication that, yes, they are not a happy camper. They want you and your dog to be on an entirely different planet.

Sadly, a badger can quickly kill a dog. They're not alone.

Raccoons can be equally as dangerous. Even encounters with normally docile beavers could result in a painful wallop from a hefty tail.

The spread of diseases are another reason to keep Fido away from wild animals.

Any mammal can get rabies, including small mammals. It's less common in some species but more common in skunks, raccoons and coyotes,

All dogs and cats should have up-to-date vaccinations, especially for rabies.

Any salivary contact between dogs (or cats) and wild animals should be avoided because rabies can be spread through contact. If there is a dogwild mammal encounter, the dog owner should immediately contact their veterinarian to

determine if a rabies booster or other treatment is necessary.

It could be beneficial to have the wild animal tested for rabies if it is dead and can safely be retrieved without any contact. That way if it's negative there is no need to have a rabies booster. However, never touch a wild animal without gloves or skin protection and only after making certain it is dead.

Lyme disease, which has been identified in North Dakota, is another potential problem for hunting dogs. So even though autumn weather is here it's still important for dog owners to keep flea and tick preventative up-to-date for their hunting dogs.

Most wildlife encounters are likely to occur in dusk and dawn hours when wild animals are typically most active. Activity during daylight hours would be unusual for some, but not all wildlife species, especially if a dog works cover where a wild animal could be resting.

Porcupines are another concern for dogs. Quills can break off easily and problems develop unless properly removed. They can also move throughout a dog's body and serious issues can develop if quills become lodged, including piercing a vein or artery.

In most situations, the dog owner is better off to have their veterinarian remove quills rather than attempting to do it themselves.

Another reason for having a veterinarian remove quills is that the dog is more likely to appreciate and forgive you if you let someone who knows what they're doing pull them - plus they will likely struggle less. Let a veterinarian and technician have the pleasure – they know how to ease the misery in a safe manner.

The only consolation with porcupine quills and dogs is quills contain a natural antibiotic so a dog is less likely to get infections from a quill. Problems result when quill get broken or the wound gets dirty.

Hunters should have their veterinarian's contact information when they take their dogs afield. If hunting in a new area or out-of-state, to be prepared and find out if there is a local veterinarian available, getting their contact information, as well.



AFGSC Missile Community Cancer Study advances with burn tests and expanded Phase 2 epidemiologic analysis

AIR FORCE GLOBAL STRIKE COMMAND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Air Force Global Strike Command continues its partnership with the Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine in making significant progress with the Missile Community Cancer Study (MCCS) — a comprehensive investigation into potential health risks associated with service in the missile community.

One specific area which the MCCS is studying, is the discontinued practice of burning classified materials in launch control centers. To address these concerns, the 711th Human Performance Wing is conducting a detailed burn test to analyze emissions produced by the historic disposal process.

The emissions from this controlled test will be carefully measured and evaluated. Findings will be used to inform a comprehensive health risk assessment, which is expected to be completed and released later this year. This data-driven approach aims to provide clarity and transparency regarding past practices and their potential impact on the health of service members and support personnel.

In addition to this, the next phase of the epidemiologic study is continuing. This current phase — Phase 2 — marks a substantial expansion of the study's scope, leveraging state and territorial cancer registry data. Phase 2 includes the analysis of hundreds of thousands of anonymized cancer cases and comparison populations, allowing researchers to compare incidence in the missile community to the rest of the Department of the Air Force and the U.S. general population. This comprehensive dataset significantly enhances the ability of the study team to detect patterns that may not have been detected in the more limited datasets used in earlier phases.

"The larger and more diverse the dataset, the more robust our conclusions will be," said Col. Gregory Coleman, AFGSC command surgeon. "By analyzing data from hundreds of thousands of cases, we're not only strengthening the scientific rigor of this study, but we're also improving our ability to identify even subtle health risks associated with service in the missile community."

The data is being reviewed in coordination with universities, scientists, and public health experts across the country to ensure rigorous scientific standards are applied throughout the process.


Air Force Global Strike Command provided an MCCS overview and its current progress during briefings to Congress on Sept. 11.

The AFGSC and U.S. Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine commanders offered insight on the study's methodology, outcomes from environmental testing, and the rigorous analysis from outside agencies. "The

Force Missile Community Cancer Study is vital," said Gen. Thomas Bussiere, AFGSC commander. "We are committed to understanding the risks our Airmen face and taking action based on the study's findings. Investing in the occupational health of our missile community is not just a responsibility, it's an imperative for ensuring they are prepared to defend our nation in an increasingly complex world."

Looking ahead, AFGSC will host its next virtual town hall, Oct. 7, to provide the latest updates on the MCCS and address questions. This event is open to current and former service members, family members, and other stakeholders who want to hear directly from Air Force leadership and medical experts involved in the study.

Details on how to participate in the town hall will be shared through official Air Force communication channels in the coming weeks.

Paw Patrol: What to Do If You Lose or Find a Pet

Losing a pet is a heartbreaking and stressful experience, but acting quickly and thoughtfully can significantly increase the chances of bringing them home safely. Similarly, finding a lost animal and knowing what to do next can make all the difference in helping reunite a pet with its rightful owner. Whether it's a curious cat that wandered too far or a dog that slipped out of a yard, knowing the right steps to take is essential.

When a pet goes missing, the most immediate and effective action an owner can take is to begin searching the surrounding area. In most cases, especially if the pet hasn't been gone long, they're likely still nearby. Owners should check under porches, in garages, around bushes, and behind fences, anywhere a scared animal might hide. For cats, placing their litter box and food outside can help them navigate back home using familiar scents. Many cats are known to return to areas where they feel safe or recognize their scent, especially if they haven't been gone long.

searching, should also begin notifying their community. Posting photos and details of the missing pet on neighborhood social media pages, such as Facebook groups, or community message boards, is one of the fastest ways to spread the word. Posts should include a clear image of the animal, its name, any identifying features, when and where it was last seen, and how to contact the owner.

For those who find a lost pet, the first step should be to check for any visible identification. If the animal is wearing a collar with tags, there may be a phone number or address that can quickly lead to a reunion. If no ID is present, the next best option is to post a photo of the found animal on local social platforms. In many cases, pet owners may not even be aware that their animal is missing yet, so community posts can bring a happy reunion much faster than formal reporting channels.

For residents of Minot Air Force Base, there are specific resources available. Most pets living on base are registered with Minot AFB Housing. If someone finds a pet on base, they can contact Housing, which will check the registration records and attempt to reach the owner. If the pet is not registered through housing, the Minot AFB Veterinary Clinic may have the animal in their system and can help check for microchips.

Veterinary clinics such as the Minot AFB Veterinary Clinic and Pinkerton Animal Hospital in town are also equipped to scan pets for worldwide microchips. According to the staff at Pinkerton Animal Hospital, if someone finds a lost pet, they are welcome to take the animal in to be scanned. While Pinkerton cannot provide shelter, their team is happy to help check for a microchip and will make every effort to contact the owner if the pet is registered in the

worldwide database.

For pets who cannot be immediately reunited with their owners, the Souris Valley Animal Shelter, Minot's no-kill shelter accepts found pets as long as they were found within the Minot city limits and are delivered by Animal Control.

To avoid future heartache, pet owners are strongly encouraged to use modern tools like GPS tracking collars or Apple AirTags to keep tabs on their animals. While AirTags are not designed specifically for pets, many pet owners have found them useful in tracking a pet's location using

nearby Apple devices. However, it's important to follow safety recommendations to ensure pets don't chew on or ingest the devices. Using secure, pet-safe holders is critical to keeping pets safe while using this technology.

In any situation involving a missing or found pet, time is of the essence. Acting quickly, whether by searching the area, contacting local resources, or spreading the word on social media, can make a huge difference. Pets are family, and with the help of an informed and compassionate community, lost animals can often be reunited with the people who love them.




