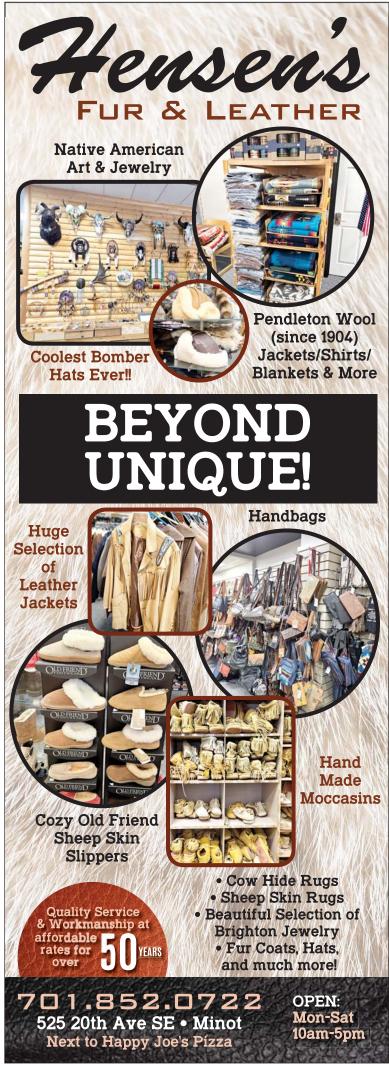

91st Security Forces Group Defender Challenge keeps Airmen sharp

MINOT AIR FORCE BASE, N.D. - The 91st Security Forces Group (91SFG) ran a four-day defender challenge Sept. 23-24 and Sept. 29-30, putting Airmen from its four squadrons through weapons, field and endurance events to sharpen skills outside of formal inspection

Two teams from each squadron four competitors and one alternate per team—represented the 891st Missile Security Forces Squadron (891MSFS), 91st Missile Security

Operations Squadron (91MSOS), 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron (91MSFS) and 791st Missile Security Forces Squadron.

The competition opened with an M4 carbine firing event that paired stress with precision. Teams ran three laps around the Combat Arms Training and Maintenance facility in full gear, performed a one-minute duck walk around a truck while memorizing the colored shapes plastered around the vehicle, then fired 10 rounds at targets according to what they had memorized.

"The purpose of the firing portion is to challenge them physically and mentally under stressful situations,' said U.Ś. Air Force Master Sgt. Ryan Duran, 91MSOS Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of operations.

The second event of the challenge dismounted operations. Mounted operations are when defenders are aboard a vehicle, while dismounted operations are procedures that defenders can do on foot in the event mounted operations are ill-advised or impossible.

Teams cycled through seven jobfocused stations for the dismounted operations portion: M240B machine gun disassembly and reassembly, Tactical Combat Casualty Care, apprehension and procedures, pushing a high mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicle, PRC-152 radio calibration, a knowledge test and A-Circuit unlocking.

The third and final event was the physical endurance competition at the base's track. Each team ran a quarter-mile lap in kit, then loaded a manikin onto a litter for a second lap, then each member shuttled ammo cans downfield, rapidly broke down and reassembled an M4 carbine then returned with the cans before the next member repeated the sequence.

"When we're not in an inspection, it's great to get a chance to come out here, train, practice and stay sharp," said U.S. Air Force 1st Lt. Curtis Covington, 91SFG executive officer. "There's always competition between all four of the squadrons within the SFG, so we thought it would be really good to keep ourselves sharp, grounded and have some fun by making a challenge out

The challenge's rules required each team to include at least one junior Airman, a way for younger defenders to get meaningful reps in a high-pressure setting.

"The commander's intent for this is to put our defenders through a stressful environment where they can push themselves while testing their job knowledge," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Brandon Trinidad, 91SFG chief of weapons and tactics. "It'll also inherently prep them for other defender challenges at higher

The teams were given only a broad outline in advance, such being informed that there would be a weapons disassembly portion, but not which weapon they would be working on. That forced teams to practice across systems and close knowledge gaps before game day.

"I think there are a lot of people that I work with who provide the shoulder to lean on in situations I don't have where all knowledge that other people have," said Airman 1st Class Anthony Turek, an 891st MSFS defender. "I think today is a great example of that. There are certain people on my team who have been in longer than I have, or have been to other locations. I think collectively, we can get the job done.'

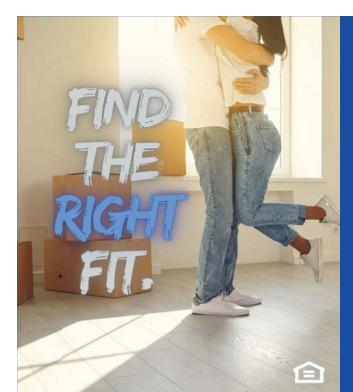

What a great teacher she was and she set the journalism standards I have followed throughout my career.

UPSIDE DOWN UNDER

One thing that North Dakota is blessed with are numerous airports that either get you where you need to go or connect you to flights that will get you to your destination.

There are nine "major" airports in the state with all nine of them having direct flights to at least one major hub city in the United States.

As I was thinking about writing this article, I wondered if it is possible to get a flight from Minot to Pretoria, South Africa as an example. Indeed, you can get connecting flights that would most likely take you to Atlanta, Newark

Blue skies every day

or JFK in New York to Johannesburg and then on to Pretoria. It would most likely cost a small fortune, but you could get there.

Many years ago, I got on a flight at Hector Field in Fargo with the destination Brisbane, Australia. It took 24 hours to get there, but it went like this, Fargo to Denver to Los Angeles to Sydney with a connecting flight to Brisbane.

Of the nine airports; Bismarck Municipal, Devils Lake Municipal, Dickinson Regional, Western Edge Aviation, Grand Forks Regional, Hector International, Minot International and Sloulin International in Williston, Hector Field offers the most direct flights to major U.S. hubs.

Fargo to Minneapolis on Delta, Denver and Chicago on United Express, Dallas with American Eagle and Allegiant to Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Orlando and Phoenix.

Bismarck offers direct flights to Minneapolis on Delta, Denver on United or Frontier, American Airlines to Chicago or Dallas and Allegiant will take you to Las Vegas, Phoenix or Orlando.

From Minot there are direct routes to Minneapolis on Delta, Denver on United and Las Vegas or Phoenix on Allegiant.

are interesting too, especially Williston, which has direct flights to Minneapolis on Delta and Denver on United.

Jamestown has direct flights to Denver, Grand Forks serves Minneapolis, Las Vegas, Phoenix and Orlando, Western Edge is a fixed base operator, Dickinson has daily flights to Denver and Devils Lake offers direct flights to Denver.

And anyone who travels knows, Denver, Minneapolis, Dallas and Los Angeles are major hubs that can get you anywhere in the world.

But there used to be other flights that have been discontinued, one would guess, because of lack of passengers.

We used to have direct flights from Bismarck to Tampa, Minot to Saskatoon, Fargo to Winnipeg, Fargo to Kansas City and Bismarck to Salt Lake City.

You can still get to those destinations, but getting there might take you on an unusual trip. For instance Fargo to Winnipeg is 225 miles, yet on a flight, you would first fly to Minneapolis, then on to Winnipeg. Bismarck to Salt Lake City would be easier; Bismarck-Denver-Salt Lake City.

Think about this for a moment. There are two airports listed as international so wouldn't it be interesting to have actual international flights out of Minot or Fargo. Toronto, Calgary, Reykjavik, Amsterdam, Oslo or even London would make it much easier for fliers.

Reykjavik is a major western European hub, Amsterdam and London are major world hubs, Calgary and Toronto connect to various trans Atlantic and trans Pacific routes and Oslo just because of all the Norwegian heritage in North Dakota.

That may or may not happen, but for now if you want to get away for awhile; see a Broncos game in Denver, go shopping in Chicago or take in a Broadway show in New York, you can get there.

As a kid, I was glued to the TV every fall.

I remember Hocus Pocus' premiere, I saw Casper in the theater, my mom taped the Olsen twins' Double, Double, Toil and Trouble and I'd anxiously read the TV listings to plan my life around every other Disney Halloween special the '90s had to offer. I loved the stories well enough, but what really captivated me was the scenery—the towns that went all in for fall. Streets lined with

pumpkins and corn stalks, houses decked out with glowing jack-o'-lanterns, trees wrapped in orange lights, porches stacked with hay bales and scarecrows.

The movies always showed small towns transformed into cozy autumn wonderlands, where everyone seemed to take part. I remember thinking how magical it would be to live in a place like that—where a whole community joined in to celebrate the season. In my Northern Indiana hometown, we carved a pumpkin or two, but our streets never looked like those movie sets. I assumed that kind of picture-perfect fall only existed on screen.

Then I moved to Minot.

There just might be as many houses decked out for fall and Halloween as there are for Christmas—and that's saying something. I'm not talking about a couple pumpkins on the stoop or a wreath on the door. I mean giant skeletons lounging in Adirondack chairs, webs stretched across rooftops with enormous spiders tangled in the strands, inflatable ghosts bobbing in the wind, and faux graveyards sprouting

in front lawns. There's something delightful about driving down a street at dusk and spotting a 12-foot Frankenstein waving from the yard.

Maybe it's not just Minot. Statistics show Halloween decorating is on the rise across the country, but even ten years ago-before the craze for giant skeletons-Minot was ahead of the game. My theory? Christmas decorating in North Dakota usually involves bitter wind, frozen fingers, and the risk of slipping on ice while stringing up lights. By contrast, putting up a giant spider or pumpkin display in September can be done in short sleeves. I suspect Minot's enthusiasm is partly because autumn décor goes up in fair weather, and partly because this community just loves a reason to celebrate.

And it's not just the houses. The whole city leans into the season. A quick scroll through the local events calendar shows at least five haunted houses, more than ten trick-ortreat events, not to mention all the other Halloween and fall festivities happening this month. For a town of fewer than 50,000 people, it's an impressive lineup.

I love this especially because North Dakota isn't exactly a fall-colors destination. But somehow, Minot delivers that same sense of small-town fall magic I used to dream about from my couch as a kid. The crisp air, the pumpkins on porches, the sense that everyone can be in on the fun—it feels like stepping into one of those TV-movie towns I used to envy.

I'm not really one for horror—so you won't catch me at a haunted house. But I love how Minot embraces each season. As a mom, I'm glad my kids get to grow up in a place where the neighbors' front yards spark their imagination and the community calendar fills with

playful events that bring people together.

Maybe the excitement around Halloween is partly fueled by the looming cold—we know what's coming, so we're determined to squeeze every last ounce of warmth and festivity out of autumn. Or maybe it's part of a bigger trend of people wanting to celebrate every season more intentionally. Whatever the reason, I'm grateful for it.

Because living in North Dakota has taught me something: when you embrace each season as it comes—whether that's glowing jack-o-lanterns in October, twinkling displays December, or the bistro lights on the patio in June—life feels a little richer. Every season here has its own flavor, and it's worth savoring.

Drive around after dusk, grab a pumpkin spice latte, and take in the giant skeletons, glowing ghosts, and cheerful jack-o'-lanterns. You might just feel like you've stepped onto the set of a classic Halloween movie. And for me, that's a childhood dream come true.

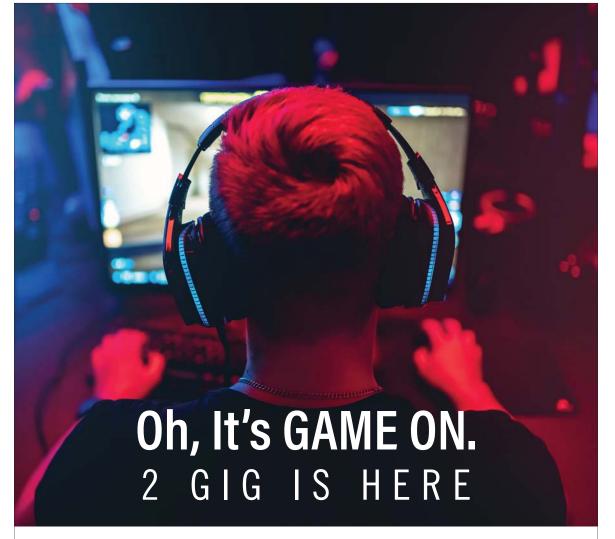

A LOOK BACK

THIS WEEK IN USAF HISTORY

USAF RESPONDS TO CUBAN MISSILE CRISIS OCTOBER 16-28, 1962

The Cuban Missile Crisis was a pivotal moment in Cold War history. After US intelligence became aware of the construction of Soviet missile sites in Cuba, Strategic Air Command sent two officers from the 4080th Strategic Wing to verify with the use of U-2 spy planes. The missile sites were only located about 90 miles from US shores, presenting a serious potential threat. President John F. Kennedy was notified of the missiles on the morning of October 16, 1962, and the

confrontation with the Soviet Union intensified as US military forces sprang to action. Within a week, the USAF shifted from peacetime status to full combat alert in preparation. Aircraft from all over the country were mobilized, missiles were placed on alert, and USAF airlift increased to support combat forces. After the military show of readiness and much negotiation over the next few weeks, the Soviets finally agreed to withdraw their missiles on October 28, 1962. Later on, President Kennedy credited Strategic Air Command with contributing greatly "to the maintenance of the peace and security of the United States..."

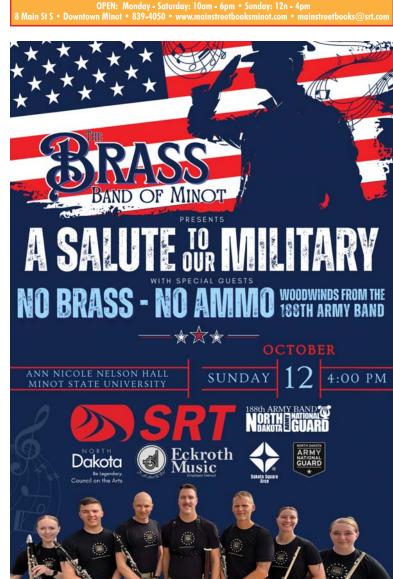

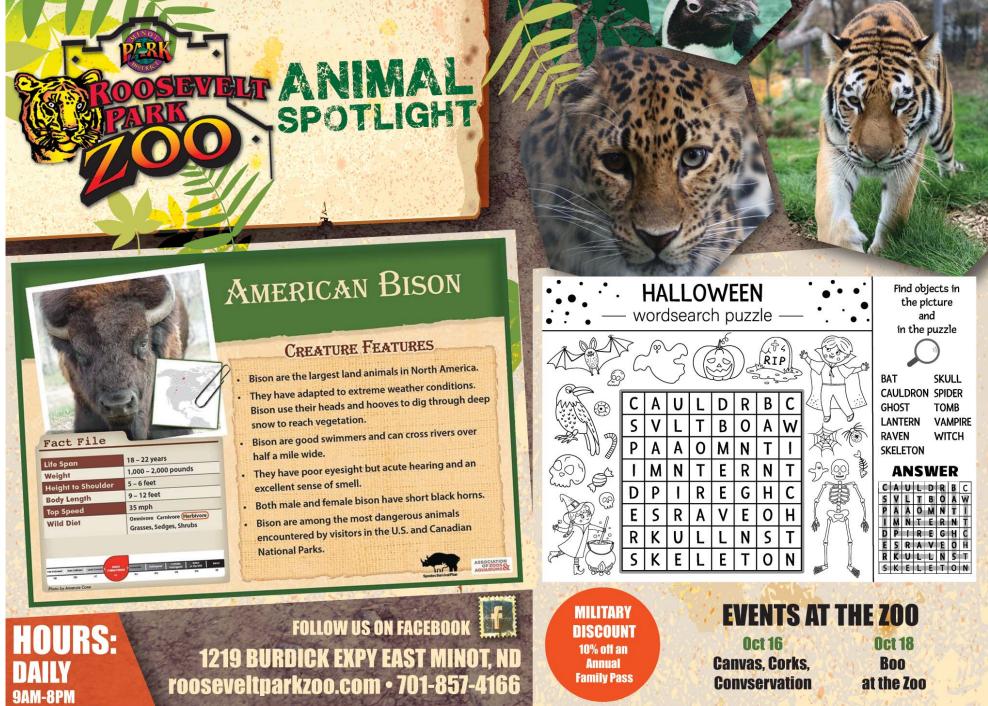

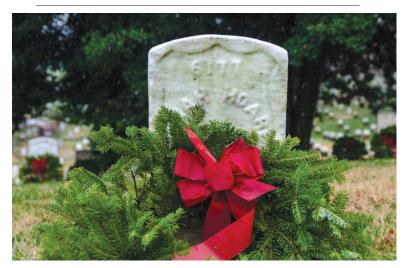






Magic City Civil Air Patrol Cadets Rally Minot Businesses to Support Wreaths Across America

The definition of "trophy" is truly in the eye of the beholder.

It could be a child's first fish, first pheasant, or first deer. It could be a whitetail doe or cow elk. It could be an elderly hunter's final opportunity to be afield. For a big game hunter a trophy could be that well-placed, one shot. Maybe it's a rooster with a 24-inch tail or a puppy's first retrieve.

And, yes, sometimes it's even an animal that makes a Pope and Young Club, North Dakota Big Game Records Book, or Boone and Crockett Club's awards category.

In reality, every animal is a trophy as defined in a hunter's mind. For many hunters, the first thing they do after ensuring the animal is no longer alive is to capture the experience with a photo. There are some right ways and some wrong ways to go about defining that moment aesthetically.

Before delving into the right ways, the first and foremost thing every hunter is required by law to do is tag a deer, elk, moose, and pronghorn – and, yes, a turkey. The exception is bighorn sheep, which in North America are plugged in the horns by the state or provincial wildlife management agency.

However, many hunters forget that little detail about "tag first, then photograph." It's completely understandable being caught up in the moment and adrenaline rush of the experience. Some hunters don't want a tag distracting from the photo. But, seriously, the Number One "Tip to Photographing Hunting Photos" is to tag that big game animal, turkey, or swan after ensuring it's dead.

Secondly, animals deserve respect. They gave their life for the opportunity for hunters to experience the hunt, provide food, and lifelong memories.

Treat that animal with respect: Wipe away as much blood as possible from the mouth, nose, and entrance or exit wounds. If photographing after field dressing, don't have an open chest cavity in the photo. Instead, move in and photograph the upper body of the animal and hunter. Put the tongue inside the mouth rather than hanging doggedly.

It's easy to get blood on clothing and hands, so try to have enough water available to wipe away

blood, if possible, and position the hunter so as little of stained clothing is visible as possible.

Watch the placement of shotguns, rifles, or bows when displayed with an animal. Oftentimes someone looks at a photo later only to realize the angle makes it appear as if an arrow or firearm barrel is pointing at the hunter, dog, or photographer, for example.

Don't place any firearm's barrel into the ground, either

Watch background. It's easy to focus on the animal and hunter only to discover a tree, fencepost, vehicle, or some other distraction seemingly growing out of the hunter or animal's head in the background.

Show that hunter's smiling face by removing sunglasses. While many hunters (and anglers, for that matter) don't like removing hats or caps, at least position them so they don't shade a person's face. And don't have them squinting into the sun. Watch so the photographer's shadow isn't also part of the photograph.

Take a few minutes to smooth feathers and position the head properly when photographing birds and smooth vegetation in front so it doesn't conceal part of the bird – or have blades of grass, twigs, and cattails cover it.

Be sure to have that favorite four-legged Hunting Maniac looking relaxed and happy, not as if it's panting in exhaustion. Sometimes it's necessary to let the dog rest and settle before taking a photograph, especially if their main focus is still on retrieving - or plucking and de-feathering the bird. Show as much of their face as possible. Some dogs - like people - love the camera and seem to know when they're being photographed, especially with their pride and joy - a retrieved bird - if they're a Hunting Maniac. Others, namely my Hunting Maniac, Eider, prefer to hide and just have the bird photographed. It's easy to read her mind: "Can you just please photography my pheasant and your shotgun and leave me alone?" But dog or no dog in a photo, above all enjoy the moment. And smile. Regardless of the size or species, it's a trophy and a special moment in

The Rise of the Sourdough on Base

North Dakota, long since remembered for its frontierhomestead life back in the 1800's, has undoubtedly now made a turn back to some of its forgotten past. In a nod to simpler times and simpler ingredients, the residents of Minot AFB are fully embracing the traditional task of breadmaking, and more specifically, sourdough. From purchasing it, to baking it, and to selling it, the popularity of sourdough here in the 21st century and here on base is rising . . . much like the bread.

Jenetta Marie Sawyer, a mil spouse and owner of Jenetta's Simple Treats, explained that she has purchased sourdough for many years, but it has been significantly easier to find people who bake sourdough since Covid. She started purchasing sourdough due to the freshness of the bread and she now jumps at the opportunity to buy a fresh loaf whenever she can. A friend of Jenetta's once mentioned to her the problem with store bought bread: "Your store-bought bread can last weeks and still be safe to eat, which is not normal." That sentiment has

stuck with Jenetta ever since.

A similar view was shared by Suzanne McGuire, a mil spouse, baker and seller of sourdough. "I believe that sourdough is so popular because America's food is heavily processed with so many different preservatives in it that at the end of the day, it's not healthy." Suzanne went on to say, "It [the bread packaging] might say it's organic and it might say that it's gut healthy, but are 15 ingredients that you can't pronounce really gut healthy?"

The National Institutes of Health describes there being several health benefits of sourdough due to the fermentation process involved. They further mentioned that fermentation can often improve digestion and enhance the body's capability to be able to absorb nutrients.

The apparent health advantages of sourdough are part of the reason contributing to its popularity on Minot AFB, but there are other factors too. Sourdough making has been creating its own dedicated community of people. Hannah Rojek, mil spouse and local seller

of sourdough, described the feeling she got when baking sourdough and how she felt empowered to nourish the community around her. "Selling sourdough has created a beautiful community and been able to connect me to the Minot Farmers Market. I am one of the people who loves it here and I think becoming involved with things outside of base is a huge part of that."

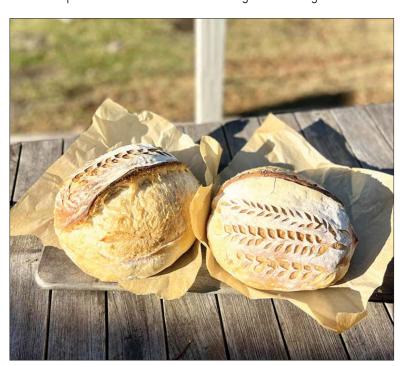
Hannah first discovered sourdough in 2021 after her son was born. She began baking it for herself in 2022. She explained that, "it was a learning process and something to do for myself." Hannah started gifting her sourdough bread to friends who encouraged her to start selling it. "It was a huge leap for me, but it has been so rewarding.

The interest in perfecting the baking of sourdough is very much present in town too. Gourmet Chef, a kitchen supply store in Downtown Minot that also offers hands on cooking classes, are hosting a Sourdough Ladies Night on October 16th. Denise Lindbo, owner of Gourmet Chef, explained "We have a ladies night every quarter and thought this would be a great theme to go with for the fall. We currently have 60 ladies signed up for the event. So many bakers love sourdough and want to learn more about how to improve the experience of making it".

Sourdough has certainly made its mark on the MAFB community and surrounding areas. Proving that the day-to-day tasks of the past may indeed resurface in the future's

NOTES ON BEING SAFE

PREVENTING FROSBITE & **HYPOTHERMIA**

I hate to say it but winter is around the corner! With this being said are you prepared for possible cold temperature exposures?

Prolonged exposure to low temperatures, wind or moisturewhether it be on a ski slope or in a stranded car-can result in coldrelated illnesses such as frostbite and hypothermia. The National Safety Council offers these tips to help you spot and put a halt to these winter

How to detect and treat cold-related illnesses

Frostbite is the most common injury resulting from exposure to severe cold. Superficial frostbite is characterized by white, waxy, or grayish-yellow patches on the affected areas. The skin feels cold and numb. The skin surface feels stiff but underlying tissue feels soft and pliable when depressed. Treat superficial frostbite by taking the victim inside immediately. Remove any constrictive clothing items and jewelry that could impair circulation. notice signs immediately seek medical attention. Place dry, sterile gauze between toes and fingers to absorb moisture and to keep them from sticking together. Slightly elevate the affected part to reduce pain and swelling. If you are more than one hour from a medical facility and you have warm water. place the frostbitten part in the water (100 to 105 degrees Fahrenheit). If you do not have a thermometer, test the water first to see if it is warm, not hot. Rewarming usually takes 20 to 45 minutes or until tissues soften.

Deep frostbite usually affects the feet or hands and is characterized by waxy, pale, solid skin. Blisters may appear. Treat deep frostbite by moving the victim indoors and immediately seek medical attention.

Hypothermia occurs when the body's temperature drops below 95 degrees Fahrenheit. Symptoms of this condition include change in mental status, uncontrollable shivering, cool abdomen and a low core body temperature. Severe hypothermia may produce rigid muscles, dark and puffy skin, irregular heart and respiratory rates, and unconsciousness.

Treat hypothermia by protecting the victim from further heat loss and calling for immediate medical attention. Get the victim out of the cold. Add insulation such as blankets, pillows, towels or newspapers beneath and around the victim. Be sure to cover the victim's head. Replace wet clothing with dry clothing. Handle the victim gently because rough handling can cause cardiac arrest. Keep the victim in a horizontal (flat) position. Give artificial respiration or CPR (if you are trained) as necessary.



How to prevent cold-related illnesses

Avoid frostbite and hypothermia when you are exposed to cold temperatures by wearing layered clothing, eating a well-balanced diet, and drinking warm, non-alcoholic, caffeine- free liquids to maintain fluid levels. At all possible avoid becoming wet, as wet clothing loses 90 percent of its insulating value.

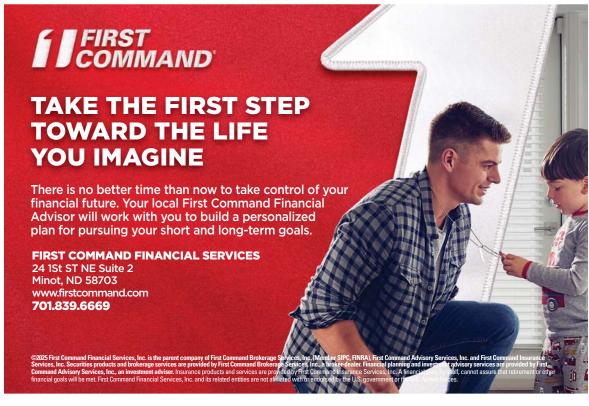

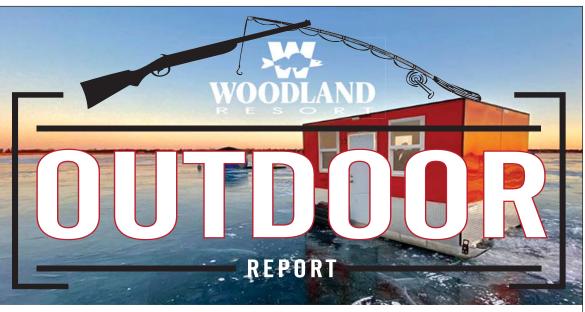

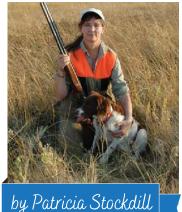

Work points, 7 Sisters, or Steinke Bay using spinners and heavy bottom bouncers. Work the south shore either side of the dam in 30 feet for salmon. Anglers marking them but the bite is slow.

 Lake Sakakawea/northwest N.D. lakes, Scenic Sports, Williston: Missouri Yellowstone rivers improving for walleye and sauger as water clarity improves. Try minnows in the rivers with crankbaits around the confluence. Better walleye bite is around Bear Den in 15 to 25 feet using jigging Raps on the upper end of Lake Sakakawea. Back bays remain fair to good for pike with fish running shallow.

 North-central/central lakes, Towner Hdwe. Hank, Towner: Limited throughout area lakes.

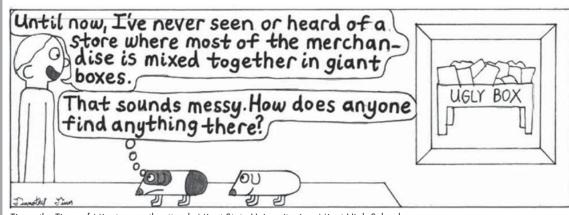

Both emergency rooms and urgent care clinics can help you with a medical issue. But they're different and serve your needs in different ways. When you or a family member needs medical care quickly, it's important to know the difference between the two.

"In times of stress or concernlike having a sick or injured family member-it can be difficult to know what the right course of care might be," said Jeannine Pickrell, RN, nurse director of Population Health, TRICARE Health Plan, at the Defense Health Agency. "Making the right choice will ensure you and your family receive the right level of care when you

WHEN TO GET **EMERGENCY CARE**

Emergency care means care for an illness or injury that threatens your life, limb, sight, or safety. If you reasonably believe you have an emergency, always call 911 or your international emergency number. Or, go to the nearest emergency room.

WHEN TO GET **URGENT CARE**

Urgent care is for medical issues that aren't emergencies, but still need attention within

24 hours—for example, a high fever or a sprained ankle. Urgent care providers help with issues that can't wait for a regular appointment but aren't so bad that you need to go to the emergency room. Urgent care clinics are often open late and can help with health problems that need care but aren't life-threatening.

GETTING ANSWERS

If you're still unsure about which type of care you need, call the Military Health System Nurse Advice Line. Nurses are available day and night to answer your questions and give you advice on where to go. Call 800-TRICARE if you're in the United States, Guam, or Puerto Rico. If you're overseas, visit MHSNurseAdviceLine.com to find your country-specific number.
