#### **HOLIDAY FIRE AWARENESS**

The holiday season is up on us again! That time of year when friends and family travel, decorations are hung and festive meals are prepared. In the mist of the holiday cheer and sprit, let us not forget about safety. This is something that must be on the forefront of the activities we have planned and are engaged in. When comes to lights and decorating; inspect the condition of the electrical cords for frayed wires, kinks and cracked sockets. Only use appropriate replacement light bulbs. Do not over load wiring with more than three light strands connected together unless the safety label for the lights states otherwise. poorly Overloaded and maintained electrical circuits and cords present a serious fire hazard.

Decorations should be nonflammable or flame resistant and placed away from heat, electrical or ignition- source. Paper chains, strung popcorn garland, homemade or crafted items are great. However, this is could become a problem is not displayed and cared for properly!

Live trees should be freshly cut and not dried out. Once your tree is in place, away from a heat source, ensure that it is kept well hydrated and the needles are hard to pull out of the branch. Should a tree catch a fire, it can quickly engulf a room and fill the air with toxic smoke and fumes.

One more tip to leave you with, scented candles fill the room and air with smells that places you in a cheerful mood. Never leave a burning candle unattended. Unattended candles have been the cause of many house fires. According to the United States Fire Administration, each year fires claim the lives of over 400 people, injure 1,650 more, and cause over \$990 million in damage over the holiday season

part to reduce these figures and the chances of an incidents occurring. By taking an extra second to practice personal risk management, this can mitigate a lot of these avoidable incidents.



I am going to end my column this week with a story that I have used several times...and it is a true story but still garners a laugh whenever I use it.

Our family was on the way to Thanksgiving Day dinner at grandma's house located on a farm just north of Velva, ND. I have 3 sons and we had been talking about them trying the oft maligned Norwegian holiday fish entrée, Lutefisk. If you don't know what Lutefisk is, ask around. Someone will eventually tell you it is the worst smelling and most undesirable dish on the Thanksgiving day table. Made from cod and soaked in lye, it is still a Thanksgiving day tradition on most Norwegian tables.

My middle son does not like fish, never has, never will. But we were nicely encouraging him to at least try a small piece of Lutefisk or he won't "get a piece of grandma's farm We sat down at the Thanksgiving day table. Ryan, my oldest, David, the middle son and Nathan, the youngest son. The Lutefisk was passed and each son, at the encouragement of their parents, took a small piece of Lutefisk.

Son #1 slowly ate his piece, and nothing drastic happened. Son #3 took his piece and really struggled to get it down, and the face he made told us this was not his favorite moment in time. And then son #2, after staring at his piece of Lutefisk and cutting it in half, put a very small piece in his mouth. As quickly as it went in, it came out...launched in a spitting motion. Even though we were a bit embarrassed what happened next even had us laughing. After spitting out the piece of Lutefisk and making the most horrid facial expression; David, son #2 exclaimed "Grandma can have the

## **Locating Radio Locator**

the coverage area at night most often are not the same. Many AM radio stations decrease their power at night to protect others on the same frequency.

There are numerous other features. You can find radio stations from your location. It will use your location, if it's known, to provide a list of radio stations in your geographical region. As mentioned, type in the city or call letters, find a station by format, and finally who is streaming and who isn't.

Let's say you like the Chicago Black Hawks hockey team. Radio Locator will help you find WGN, 720-AM which streams the Black Hawks. It can also tell you the power of said radio station that might help determine if you can receive it in your geographical area.

Just go to (radiolocator.com) and type in Chicago or the call letters, WGN, and it will tell you exactly where the transmitter is located, the format, the power, etc.

I recently found an unfamiliar radio station on 750 AM. All I knew was the frequency. After a Google search, it told me it was in Melfort, Saskatchewan. So, I typed in Melfort and found it to be CKJH. From that point, I was able to get its power output, 25,000 watts, the number of transmitting towers it

uses and it's grid coordinates. I also found out it serves the nearby city of Saskatoon.

Another station was found on 1060 AM. Not being familiar with it, I listened until I heard a commercial about Grossenburg Implement, a John Deere dealership. I know there is a Grossenburg Implement in Winner, S.D., so I thought it must be in South Dakota someplace. Winner is close to Pierre so I typed "Pierre" into Radio Locator and there it was, KGFX, 1060 AM in Pierre.

It has a classic country format, uses 10,000 watts of power and uses four towers to broadcast. And after looking at a daytime coverage map, it shows the fringe area reaching just to the north of Bismarck. I live 155 miles northwest of Bismarck. Yes, it surprised me because I shouldn't be getting KGFX where I live

FM is a bit different. Because FM radio waves don't travel as far as AM radio waves, we most often know what those radio stations are on our dial. However, sometimes we can be surprised by this as well.

This time I'll use KQZZ, 96.7 FM in Devils Lake as an example. It broadcasts from a tower just to the west of Fort Totten and its fringe area to the west reaches just to


Drake and Towner and north and east to Langdon and Park River.

According to Radio Locator, KQZZ transmits 38,000 watts of power, yet I'm able to receive it on any given day and I live roughly 75 miles northwest of Drake.

On the other hand, there is another radio station in Devils Lake on 102.5 FM called "Cruiser 102," and legally called KDVL. I like that radio station and even though it broadcasts 100,000 watts from just east of Fort Totten, I'm seldom able to receive it. KPPD, Prairie Public Radio in Devils Lake, is on 91.7 FM and is always available on my radio dial, but it is farther north and west, near Minnewaukan, so the logic there makes sense.

Streaming from overseas can provide good results. Let's say there's something important going on in a city in Belgium that you absolutely need to know about. You can find Belgian radio stations and Radio Locator will tell you if the station broadcasts in English or French and whether it provides an Internet stream.

Radio Locator is free to use, but there is a limit of 25 entries in a 24-hour period. There's also a premium option that you pay for and can get unlimited access.

# A Season of Gratitude, Minot AFB Family Finds Strength in Community

As families across the country gather to reflect on what they are thankful for this Thanksgiving, one Minot Air Force Base family says their gratitude runs deeper than ever this year. For the Aggen family, the past few months have been marked by fear, uncertainty, and ultimately overwhelming support from a community that refused to let them face hardship alone.

In early September, Kali and her husband, Elias Aggen, who is assigned to the 91st Missile Security Operations Squadron, experienced every parent's nightmare when their 4-year-old son suffered a severe neck injury after falling from a swing at a local park. What began as a simple afternoon outing quickly turned into a medical emergency that would change their lives. Their son was first airlifted to Fargo and then transported again to a children's hospital in Minneapolis for specialized care.

The journey didn't end there. In October, he required a more extensive surgery, sending the family back to Minneapolis for another round of treatment, anxiety, and hope.

Throughout it all, Kali says one thing became unmistakably clear: they were not alone.

"This community here. This base. Our church. Our friends who have been family, everyone stepped up to carry our family through this," she shared. "I don't think we will ever view life the same again.'

From meals, to messages of encouragement and constant prayer, support poured in from every direction. Minot AFB families rallied, their church community embraced them, and friends, near and far wrapped them in comfort. But the kindness didn't stop at the gates of the base. After their son's story was shared online, people across the country sent messages, donations, and prayers. Kali says she wants to make sure those distant supporters are not forgotten.

Today, their son is healing, and with him, the family is beginning to heal as well. The road ahead is still long, but progress comes a little more each day, and for that, they are profoundly grateful.

This Thanksgiving, the Aggen family is thankful for more than recovery, they are thankful for a community that held them up when they could not stand on their own. They are thankful for a base that feels like family, a network of friends who became their lifeline, and strangers from across the country who reached out with

In a season centered around gratitude, their story is a powerful reminder of the strength of community, the resilience of family, and the way love can reach across miles, circumstances, and even fear.

### **All About Pets**

As the chilly weather sets in, the need for proper care and quick action for stray animals is of the utmost importance, especially here in North Dakota. So what can you do if you find a stray animal during the winter?

• Call your local shelter: There are a few shelters in the Minot area who can guide you through the challenge of finding a stray animal. Souris Valley Animal Shelter (701-852-6133), Hairball Haven Feline Rescue (hairballhavenfr@gmail.com), or For Belle's Sake (701-300-8182) may be able to offer you tips on how to catch or care for a stray. If the animal is a lost pet, they may even be able to help you find the owner!

• Bang on the hood of your car: This is something we hear a lot when winter time rolls around. Some feral cats will seek warmth and shelter in the nooks and crannies of your car as it gets colder, so banging on your car can give them time to move to a safer location

before it starts up. Provide shelter: If you are willing or able,

you can provide shelter and at home care for a stray animal until you are able to find a place for it. If you can lure it into your home or garage (treats and food are the best lures), you give the animal a safe place to rest and warm up until you are able to see a veterinarian or contact a shelter. If you want to help but don't want to bring strays into your home, you can also provide makeshift shelters for them that you can leave on your porch, in

vour driveway, or anywhere else a stray might come. You can DIY shelters using plastic bins that contain blankets, food, water, and some type of insulation.

• Povide sustenance: At the very least, you can also provide food and water to a stray animal. If you are able to keep water in an environment where it will not freeze, this is ideal for below-freezing temparatures.

 Be careful: Carefully handling stray animals is important any time of year. Some animals will be more comfortable around humans than others, so keep an eye out for uncomfortable or aggressive body language to keep yourself safe. If you do not feel comfortable approaching a nervous or aggressive animal, call a local shelter to notify them of the stray and either stay nearby or let them know the location of the sighting. You can also contact Minot's Animal Control. Stray animals may also carry diseases that you do not want to bring home to your own pet. This is where it may be a good idea to keep them in the garage for safety until you are able to have them checked out by a veterinarian.

It takes a caring heart to take care of stray animals, especially in winter conditions. Whether you catch and bring one into your home for care, provide outdoor shelter, or even just make a phone call to someone who is able to help, you are doing a great service to the lost and wandering animals in Minot.



For anyone who loves the thrill of discovery or who just wants to relive a chapter of their childhood, 3D Relics promises a trip down memory lane every time you walk through the door.

















The lights from this park can easily be glimpsed while driving down Broadway; however, a quick



### **USAF B-52 Bombers**, **Navy Fighters Fly Near** Venezuela

Multiple B-52H Stratofortress bombers flew off the northern coast of South America Nov. 20, U.S. officials told Air & Space Forces Magazine, the latest show of force by U.S. bombers in the region as the Trump administration builds up its military power in the Caribbean.

The B-52s took off from Minot Air Force Base, N.D., on the lengthy, nearly daylong flight, which a U.S. official said was a "presence patrol."

At the same time that the B-52s were operating in the region, the U.S. also dispatched Navy F/A-18 Super Hornets embarked on the USS Gerald R. Ford, the world's largest aircraft carrier, and a U.S. Air Force RC-135 Rivet Joint signals intelligence aircraft.

All the aircraft, including the fighters, switched on their transponders for parts of the mission, making them visible on flight tracking data. Doing so shows the U.S. was not attempting to hide the mission. RC-135s, which can gather data on land targets such as enemy radars, have flown mulitple missions during this campaign, dubbed Operation Southern Spear. The F/A-18s entered the Caribbean Sea with the Ford on Nov. 16.

Air Forces Southern (AFSOUTH) confirmed the B-52 and fighter flights, without specifying the type, on social media, calling the mission a "bomber attack demo," a term the U.S. military has used for other recent bomber sorties near South America.

The Pentagon referred questions to U.S. Southern Command which declined to answer questions about the mission. AFSOUTH did not comment beyond its public statement. Neither command addressed the RC-135's operations.

U.S. long-range bombers have been conducting flights near Venezuela on a virtually weekly basis as the U.S. seeks to pressure Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro to cede power. It has also

conducted at least 21 airstrikes on vessels in the Caribbean Sea and eastern Pacific Ocean, which the Trump administration says are transporting drugs, killing at least 83 people since Sept. 2.

The legal authority for those strikes has been questioned by some lawmakers and former officials, but the Trump administration holds that the president has the authority to attack because drug cartels are terrorist organizations that threaten the U.S. and the hemisphere.

Multiple U.S. Air Force MQ-9 Reaper drones have been operating from Puerto Rico, and at least one AC-130J Ghostrider gunship has been spotted in both Puerto Rico and El Salvador.

The Ford also has EA-18 Growlers, which specialize in electronic jamming and are armed to destroy enemy defenses; its air wing adds to the 10 U.S. Marine Corps F-35s currently stationed in Puerto Rico, along with AV-8 Harrier jump jets and AH-1 Cobra attack helicopters operating aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Iwo Jima, which is also in the

The U.S. military has declined to say which U.S. platforms are conducting the strikes. In addition to the RC-135s, other intelligence-gathering assets, such as Navy land-based P-8 Poseidon maritime surveillance aircraft, are also operating in the region.

On Nov. 24, the U.S. will designate Cartel de Los Soles, a Venezuelan criminal group, as a "foreign terrorist organization" that is headed by Maduro and other high-ranking Venezuelan government officials.

"It gives more tools to our department to give options to the president," Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth told the outlet One America News in an interview that aired Nov. 20. "Nothing is off the table, but nothing is automatically on the table either."

North Dakota has a long and proud hunting, fishing, and trapping heritage. It's even in the state's Constitution protecting its residents' right to legal, regulated hunting, fishing, and trapping activities. Regulations for each is specific and for a purpose,

regardless of whether it's hunting, fishing, or trapping. While trapping isn't a common outdoor activity, some areas do have traps set for animals such as coyotes and mink, including N.D. Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas (WMA) unless posted as closed to trapping for management reasons.

That means hunting dogs could potentially encounter a set trap, including during late season

As with any potential in-the-field injury, it's better to be proactive, educated, and prepared when it comes to dealing dogs and injuries, including if a dog becomes entangled in a trap or cable device when trapping season is underway for several furbearing

One of the best ways a dog owner can become educated is to go to the N.D. Game and Fish Department website page, (gf.nd.gov/hunting/ trapping-and-dogs), and download each of three pamphlets: "Foothold Traps - Identification, Use, & Removing A Dog", "Cable Devices - Identification, Use & Removing A Dog", and "Body-Grip Traps -Identification, Use, & Removing A Dog".

Each one begins with basic information to identify if it's a cable device or what type of trap. Perhaps most importantly, it describes how to safely and properly remove a dog with as little trauma and injury as

There is no doubt about it - finding your dog (or any animal not intended to be trapped) in a trap or cable device can be gut-wrenching.

However, perhaps the singular best thing a dog owner can immediately do is to remain calm. That alone can help a person focus quickly and competently to remove the dog from the device. In addition, the dog is less apt to sense your stress if it's possible to remain as calm and reassuring as

It helps to understand that a cable device works much like a dog collar. Sometimes the cable's lock can be slid to enlarge the loop and remove the dog. Or, by carrying a cable cutter designed to cut galvanized aircraft cable a person can also cut the wire to remove the dog.

Education is important, but so, too, is awareness. Public lands such as Game and Fish Department Wildlife Management Areas are meant for multiple

user groups, including trapping and snaring. It's a good idea for all dog owners - not just hunters but anyone simply hiking in the outdoors on a WMA – to become familiar with trapping regulations, seasons, trap and cable device types, and release techniques

Trappers with traditional foot-hold or body-grip traps and cable devices are required to obtain written permission from private landowners. When a hunter has the opportunity to contact the landowner to ask for permission to deer, waterfowl, or upland game hunt, it doesn't hurt to ask if they are allowing trapping or the use of cable devices so a person is aware of their potential presence.

Taking safety and awareness a step farther, it can also be beneficial to find out what other state and federal agencies allow – or don't allow – on public land they manage when it comes to trapping and cable devices.

Regardless of land ownership, dog owners should keep track of their dogs and not let them out of their sight for prolonged periods of time, whether hunting or hiking.

The idea of developing the trap removal information evolved because of dog/trap encounters in neighboring states as well as occasional situations in North Dakota.

Each link describes the device and how it works on its intended target, whether a body-grip trap, any of the various types of foothold traps, or a cable device – and perhaps most importantly - explains techniques for safely and efficiently removing a dog from the device, including illustrations demonstrating devices and removal techniques.

It's also possible to download the three pamphlets are available directly from the North Dakota Fur Hunters and Trappers Association, (www.ndfhta. com/educational-brochures). Scroll down to obtain high- or low- resolution copies. The organization partnered with the Game and Fish Department to develop the pamphlets as well as conduct the Fur Harvester Education program and training course. A dog owner doesn't have to be a trapper or biologist to know what to do. They simply need to get the pamphlets and become educated and aware. Share the information, as well. It could help save a



During my research, I found students who weren't exposed to the outdoors at an early age were less prepared and, more gravely, less successful in school. Fortunately, we have exciting NEW opportunities right here in North Dakota for young students!

Firstly, Minot Head Start was recently approved to receive a grant titled, "Supplemental funds for Nutrition and Healthy Eating for Head Start Children and Families." In the Spring, they will get an 8 x 12 greenhouse and four raised beds so children and families can garden together. Additionally, they hope to partner with NDSU Extension to offer a class on cooking with the foods they grow. Our earliest students will soon benefit from that special opportunity, but this isn't the only

early childhood program focused on nature.

Secondly, local Family Child Care (FCC) programs offer specialized opportunities amid low studentto-teacher ratios. Minot Air Force Base's 2025 Family Child Care (FCC) Provider of the Year, Ms. Tena Holmgren, offers numerous on-going natural learning opportunities for her students. One such opportunity is birdidentification, as she showcases a large poster of local birds in her living room near her giant front window and encourages curious students to name their feathered visitors. In addition, Ms. Holmgren has obtained certification with the Children's Environmental Health Network. It is a dedication to complying with a list of environmentally healthy best practices to create a toxic-free early learning setting. Some of these best practices include playing with non-toxic art supplies, improving air quality in the home, using EPA

registered cleaners, and reducing lead exposure.

Thirdly, on Minot AFB, Dr. Lynda LaFond, Biological Scientist, Mr. Robert Bohlender, Minot Public Schools' Facilities Director, and I are working on a Public Schools on Military Installation (PSMIs) Grounds Initiative to maximize educational opportunities for our on-base military-connected students. Back in August, we surveyed the PSMI grounds, toured Dr. LaFond's prairie garden at North Plains Elementary School, and brainstormed how to utilize and enhance all existing natural resources and man-made structures to encourage student and educator engagement. To strengthen our efforts, I registered to attend the "Beyond limits: Creating impactful outdoor adventure-based experiences" free youth development webinar on April 1st, 2026 offered through the University of Minnesota Extension. To register, please visit: https://

North Dakota Parks and Recreation's outdoor educators have recently expanded their Campfire Series, which showcases short, engaging videos on virtual adventures filled with native wildlife, plants, and ecosystems. Their target audience: elementary students.

All of these improvements

### **Backpack Buddies:** Adopt a Student, Change a Life

SOURIS VALLEY UNITED WAY/BACKPACK BUDDIES

Every Friday during the school year, hundreds of children across Minot head home with something small in their hands but powerful in its impact: a plastic bag filled with weekend meals. Inside are simple, easy to prepare items like mac and cheese, granola bars, oatmeal packets, tuna, and fruit cups. To an adult, it may look like a few groceries. To a child facing food insecurity, it means the difference between going hungry and having enough to get through the weekend.
This is the mission of Souris Valley

United Way's Backpack Buddies program: to make sure no child in our community goes hungry when school is not in session. The need is growing rapidly, and this school year is the largest expansion in the program's history.

At the peak of last school year, Backpack Buddies fed 481 students every week. Already this year, that number has climbed to 560 students in Minot's elementary schools alone. The program also stocks pantries serving approximately 50 students in two Minot middle schools, ensuring older students can discreetly access the food they need to get through the weekend. And, for the first time, Backpack Buddies expanded onto Minot Air Force Base, now serving children at Dakota and North Plains Elementary.

For many of these students, school meals are their most reliable source of nutrition. When the weekend arrives, food at home can be limited or unavailable due to a wide range of circumstances, whether it's financial strain, unstable housing, or inconsistent family support. Backpack Buddies steps in to fill that gap so every child can start the week nourished and ready to learn.

The cost to provide these meal bags is surprisingly modest: \$8 per week per student. Over the course of the 33 weekends in the school year, that adds up to only \$264 to feed one child for an entire school year.

This is where the "Adopt a Backpack Buddy" opportunity becomes transformative. Community members, including families and personnel from Minot Air Force Base, can adopt a student for a year, sponsor a quarter, or contribute any amount to supports weekend meals. While the identities of students who receive Backpack Buddies is kept confidential, school staff often share that these bags relieve stress, build confidence, and give students a sense of security. Children frequently express excitement over the items they receive, or relief simply from



knowing they won't be hungry.

As the program grows to meet rising needs, so does the financial strain of keeping up with food costs. Bulk purchasing helps stretch every dollar, but feeding more than 600 students each week requires consistent, reliable community support. Donations allow Backpack Buddies to plan ahead, purchase food in large quantities, and respond quickly when schools identify new students who need help.

For readers who want to see the impact firsthand, Souris Valley United Way hosts community packing nights where volunteers help pack the weekend bags. These events offer a behind-thescenes look at how much care and coordination goes into the program. The next community packing night will take place open house style on Tuesday, December 9th from 4:00 to 6:00 PM at the Souris Valley United

Way office. Families, groups, and individuals are welcome to attend. It's a meaningful opportunity to learn about food insecurity in our area and see exactly how Backpack Buddies operates.

Backpack Buddies is more than a food program. It is a promise to children that their community sees them, cares about them, and believes they deserve to thrive. It is an investment in their physical health, their emotional well-being, and their success in school. And for families under stress, it is one less thing to worry about as they work to build stability at home.

OPERATION SUN RUN BREAKS TRANSCONTINENTAL **SPEED RECORDS NOVEMBER 27, 1957** 

On November 27, 1957, USAF pilots of the 363rd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing completed "Operation Sun Run" and broke three transcontinental speed records. Sun Run included six pilots, six McDonnell RF-101C aircraft, and the new KC-135 Stratotankers that would perform the mission's in-flight refueling. Each flight took place between

McDonnell RF-101C Voodoo, named "Cin-Min" (USAF)

Los Angeles and New York, with two of the aircraft making a full round trip. Lt. Gustav Klatt set one record, flying from L.A. to New York in 3 hours, 7 minutes and 43 seconds. Capt. Robert Sweet established the new round-trip record of 6 hours, 46 minutes and 36 seconds, as well as the New York to L.A. record of 3 hours, 37 minutes and 32 seconds. "At that time the Air Force was only 10 years old, and this operation was an early endeavor to showcase the capabilities, speed and range of the first supersonic photo reconnaissance aircraft refueling from the first et tanker," said Christopher Koonce, the 20th Fighter Wing historian Shaw AFB, SC. "It was an early display of the three effects of airpower: global vigilance, global reach and global power."






