"OPERATION CHRISTMAS KIDLIFT" **BRINGS SOUTH KOREAN ORPHANS TO SAFETY DECEMBER 20, 1950**

During the Korean War, Air Force Chaplains Lt. Col. Russell Blaisdell and Col. Wallace Wolverton set up the Seoul Orphanage Reception Center to provide food, clothing, shelter, and medical aid to approximately 4,000 orphans in the South Korean capital. When Chinese forces began pushing towards Seoul, the chaplains feared for the children's safety in the midst of a war zone. Operations. Along with Lt. Gen.

William Tunner, Commander of Combat Cargo Command, they were able to call in 12 C-54 Skymasters from the 61st Troop Carrier Group. Over 1,000 orphans were airlifted to safety on December 20. Nurses and medics from the 501st Air Evacuation Squadron also provided aid to the children, and most of them were able to make it out of harm's way because of the valiant efforts of the Airmen involved.



History of Christmas in North Dakota

Now that the Christmas season is upon us and we're inundated with commercial advertising, seldom do we think about what Christmas was like before TV, before radio and before North Dakota was a state.

Christmas has been around a long time, our state hasn't. But, this territory now known as North Dakota, has some Christmas traditions that go back at least to the time of Lewis and Clark and perhaps before when fur traders wandered the prairie.

Nowadays it's shop-til-you-drop, attend craft shows, see the Holiday Train, open presents, get stuffed and watch football. It hasn't always been that way and following is a glimpse of what Christmas was like for prior generations.

1.) It is written in the Lewis and Clark journals that on Christmas Day 1804, the men of the expedition, located at Fort Mandan, "celebrated by firing their weapons in the morning, followed by a drink of rum and the raising of the flag. The men then danced, ate their best food and celebrated until 9 o'clock."

2.) In 1834, the Christmas Eve dinner at Fork Clark consisted of meat pies, bread, fricasseed pheasant, boiled tongues, roast beef and coffee, made by Toussaint Charbonneau. People who shared the fine supper included Native people, Canadians, women and children.

3.) In 1868 at Fort Rice, German soldiers formed a singing group, entertaining on Christmas Eve. In addition to traditional songs, there was a supper and "weak" homemade beer.

4.) In 1872 in what is now Bismarck, with no tree to be found, pioneer Linda Slaughter decorated her husband's mounted elk horns with ribbons, fringes and gifts. The Slaughters welcomed 11 children into their log home that Christmas Eve for songs and games. The next day, a military officer at Fort McKeen hosted a Christmas dinner of roasted pig with a bottle of catawba, a sweet, fruity wine with

hints of grape, pineapple and floral. 5.) In 1917, the Gackle Republican

newspaper ran a full-color front page drawing of Santa Claus holding up the earth and passing out gifts to children around the world, children of Allied nations that is, which reminded everyone that the United States was at war.

6.) In 1929, 80 students, parents and visitors attending a Christmas program at Herr School No. 2 in Sheridan County were stranded overnight in the schoolhouse because of a snowstorm. Parents led the group in games and songs amid the storm. Women and children slept on the floor or on desks

pushed together.
7.) In 1932, Selvig's Store in Plaza included the following special prices; 25 cents for a 2-pound jar of peanut butter, \$1 for men's dress shirts and 7 cents a pound for fancy lutefisk. Christmas trees sold for 20 to 65 cents each.

8.) From 1922 to 1955, Harold

and Eva Case were congregational missionaries at Elbowoods. Their mission helped eight churches on the Fort Berthold Reservation celebrate Christmas with candles, carols, trees and gifts from Santa Claus.

9.) In 1943, the state Capitol declined to put up a real tree, instead paper was used to shield windows, lit from inside, to create the image of a tree, a tradition that continued for decades.

Because most immigrants to North Dakota were German or Norwegian, some of their traditions continue to this day. As an example, Germans are credited with popularizing the indoor "tennenbaum," or Christmas tree. Those early trees were decorated with candles, handmade ornaments and treats.

On St. Nicholas Day, Dec. 5, German children would place their boots outside their door to be filled with nuts, candy and small gifts by St. Nicholas.

A special Norwegian tradition that made its way to North Dakota, "Tulebukk," Christmas fooling. Groups of people would dress in masks and costumes, disguising their identities and go house to house in search of treats, drinks and merriment.

Norwegians celebrated "Julaften," Christmas Eve, with Christmas Day reserved for quiet family time and religious observances. Parties continued until Jan. 13, the 20th day of Christmas.

For both Norwegian and German immigrants, food on Christmas was important. Some of the Norwegian items included lutefisk, lefse and rommegrot, while for Germans it included goose, ham, potato dumplings, red cabbage (rotkohl) and sausage.



SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE

Last week, I didn't want to leave the house.

It was one of those cold, foggy mornings that convinces me staying inside with a good crossword puzzle is peak wisdom. The house was warm. The coffee was hot. But the to-do list was long. As much as I wanted to curl up on the couch, I knew I'd have regrets later. Not only would the list go unfinished, but I'd be restless and cranky if I didn't get out for at least a little fresh air.

So, I poured the coffee into a travel mug, threw some salt on my front stoop, and headed north of town to run a few errands on base.

As I drove, something shifted.

The fog was thick, low, and heavy, and as the road stretched out ahead of me, the landscape seemed to dissolve into it. Snowy fields melted seamlessly into the cloudy December sky. Everything felt still—like the world had paused

It reminded me of the scenery in those old Thomas Kinkade prints my grandmother loved. Soft edges. Muted colors. A kind of quiet beauty that doesn't demand attention but rewards it if you're willing to notice.

The fog had frozen overnight into hoar frost, coating every tree branch, pine needle, and stray leaf in delicate crystals. Things that are

there every day seemed different when highlighted that way.

It was beautiful in a way I didn't want to be distracted from, so I turned off the radio, willing myself to memorize it. I wanted something to recall the next time I was tempted to agree when hear someone describe North Dakota as a frozen, ugly wasteland.

I love an object lesson, and Minot is full of them.

Maybe it's because this place deals in extremes—weather, seasons, isolation, stillness—that it lends itself so well to these teachable moments. If you're paying attention, there's always something being revealed. The landscape teaches quietly, but persistently.

As I drove, I was reminded that this kind of beauty doesn't exist in places where the uncomfortable conditions that produce it don't occur. You don't witness hoar frost on a mild day. You don't see frozen fog clinging to branches unless temperatures drop and moisture hangs heavy in the air. This kind of beauty requires cold. It requires discomfort. It requires showing up when staying inside would be

In life, we often judge seasons both literal and proverbial—by how pleasant they look on paper. Comfort, Ease, Warmth, Clarity, Those are the conditions we're drawn to. We wait for them. We hope for them. Sometimes we even postpone living fully until they

But some of the most meaningful moments—the ones that shape us, soften us, or teach us something lasting-don't come from ideal circumstances. They come from the in-between. The foggy days. The cold mornings. The seasons that ask us to show up anyway.

That drive reminded me to look back on the proverbially cold seasons in my own life. Often, those were the times when something beautiful was revealed—something I wouldn't have seen unless the conditions were right. In the same way that pearls shine brightest against dark velvet, some of the best parts of life require contrast to be fully appreciated. Growth, more often than not, comes from endurance, not ease.

That doesn't mean romanticize hardship or seek it out unnecessarily. Cold is still cold. Fog still limits visibility. Hard seasons are still hard. But it does mean we don't dismiss them outright. We stay curious. We keep our eves open. We remember that not all beauty announces itself loudly, and not all value comes wrapped in comfort.

That morning, if I'd stayed home—if I'd let the cold and fog make the decision for me-I would have missed it. The stillness. The quiet awe. The reminder that sometimes the most extraordinary sights are reserved for those willing to step outside when conditions are less than ideal.

Minot has taught me that. So has life.

Sometimes, the most brilliant beauty only becomes visible when we move through the bleak, the uncomfortable, and the inconvenient. And sometimes, the simple act of showing up-of turning off the radio, slowing down, and really looking—is enough to remind us that even in the coldest seasons, there is something worth







The Fun of Being On Stage Mouse River Players **Good Creative Outlet**

Dorian Garland works as a training officer for the 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron, and he is almost to the end of his tenure with the Mouse River Players. Allison Dickerson is a missileer with the 741st Missile Squadron, and she has just begun her time on stage with MRP. Their paths would cross in the recent MRP production of Scrooge. Dorian as the underpaid and overworked Bob Cratchit, and Allison as his loving and keep it all together wife, Mary.

For Dorian, it has been 5 years of being active in Mouse River Players, and other theater groups like the MSU Summer Theater, but Dorian will be leaving in March. Without much experience in theater, Dorian saw an opportunity to get involved and get involved he did. "Right now, I am Vice President of the Board of Directors at MRP, but I had my time as President and I've enjoyed the business side of MRP, too. I have had to recruit and organize volunteers, helping with the house...you know building set, lighting, sound." And just because Dorian and other board members may end up on stage during a production "you can't stop being a board member. You will need to be a peacemaker, manage personalities when needed, and just being more of an asset, doing those extra things. Being on the board comes with a lot of responsibility."

Allison has been in Minot since January of last year and was waiting for the perfect time to get involved "and Scrooge kind of ended up being perfect as far as timing goes and my job" which as a missileer can mean ending up under ground for an extended time. "And the director and other people in the cast made it easy to work around my schedule." But working with Allison's schedule was indeed a stroke of luck, because Allison would end up taking on the role of Christmas Past just a few days before opening night. "The other actor lost her voice, and I was able to step in and do the role" according to Dickerson.

Besides the challenge of doing a musical like Scrooge, there was also the challenge of working with younger actors or "the kids". "For them the time gets to be long" said Allison "and they get bored sometimes." But according to Dorian the young actors are in a different time in their lives. "It's amazing how quickly they can turn it one when it comes time to perform." For the most part the Mouse River Players work without on stage mics "which certainly is a challenge to make sure they can be heard" adds Dorian.

Both Dorian and Allison said that Mouse River Players is certainly a great opportunity for active duty military personnel, and their dependents and friends, to get involved. Dorian talked about "a fantastic opportunity to get to know another group of friends. You have your military group that you hang out with, but you have another group with not as much military on the brain. Having a couple of different friend groups keeps you from feeling isolated."

"When I came to Minot I wanted to get involved in the community" according to Allison "and it gives me a chance to show my talents to the community and of course to be creative. If you come here with a theater background it helps to keep up that passion."

For Dorian and Allison Mouse River Players is part of a steppingstone in their life "as I always try to get other people involved" adds Dorian. "I know that if they volunteer they'll have a good experience, at least that is what we want for them."

As in all theater productions, the actors in the audience appreciate a sold out and excited audience. Allison said she had several of her co-workers from the 741st attend the shows. "And if they just couldn't make it to the show, they were asking how it was going and showed a genuine interest in what I was

who get involved in Mouse River Players, but for Dorian Garland and Allison Dickerson "it's a great experience" says Dorian "it gets you involved" ads Allison.






"Much has been given to us, and so, much will surely be expected of us; and we must take heed to use aright the gifts entrusted to our care...So it is peculiarly incumbent on us here today so to act throughout our lives as to leave our children a heritage, for which we will receive their blessing and not their curse."

That quote spoken July 4, 1886 in Dickinson, N.D. was from a man who would later in life be known as Pres. Theodore Roosevelt. He would also be considered the "conservation president" for his role in natural resource conservation.

The word "conservation" has many meanings. One dictionary alone (Merriam-Webster) listed three, including "the careful use of natural resources (such as trees, oil, etc.) to prevent them from being lost or wasted."

Conservation is not preservation. Nor is it the blatant use of natural resources without regard to future generations.

Conservation, with all of its different interpretations, provides for the wise use of natural resources.

Perhaps we humans should think about the heritage and legacy we leave for future generations and that, too, is part of the meaning of the word "conservation".

Actually, the United States has done guite well in that regard and Pres. Theodore Roosevelt laid much of the groundwork. When he was one of the founders of the Boone & Crockett Club, it wasn't to recognize the "big bucks" hunters are so enthralled with today.

Instead, it was to establish the concept of fair chase and setting a standard for the ethical manner of hunting. In turn, that helped conserve wildlife because, as hunters, it can establish a distinct connection to wildlife and the need for conservation.

As president, he created national wildlife refuges, parks, and forests.

In his belief that natural resources should be used wisely, he supported creation of several dams for water supplies.

He didn't believe in preservation that would keep or prevent the public from accessing the very land they owned - national parks, national forests, or national monuments, for example - because preservation ultimately is detrimental to wildlife and natural resources.

After all, how can someone appreciate, respect, and value something when they have no access to it to understand it?

Equally, he didn't believe in abusing the nation's natural resources.

When a person thinks about everything used in one's daily life, the source comes from one place -Planet Earth.

It's obtained by only two means - it's mined or dug and grown.

Everything comes from the soil or below the soil. Plastics, wood, materials used to manufacture clothing, the material in products such as aluminum, steel, and iron.

Everything we eat; everything we wear; everything we use to power our lives – jets, trains, electricity, food, etc. - comes from either the soil or what's below the soil.

Conservation isn't about preservation.

But, equally, it isn't about going off the deep end of environmental extremism.

Conservation is about using the resources we have been blessed with wisely.

It's about using those resources so they are available for future generations.

Conservation is about giving back and it's about thinking beyond today.

It can be subtle things like picking up a piece of garbage so it's not polluting a wetland. It can be planting trees, native grasses, and plants that benefit wildlife of all sizes as well as people. It can be recycling products.

Conservation can be volunteering and dedicating part of yourself and your time to organizations that advance the definition of conservation, which coincidentally, ties in nicely with the role of being hunter. After all, hunters can and should be the leaders in conservation.

Perhaps that should be a New Year's resolution to bring a little conservation into your life and



Keeping Christmas Alive, One Storefront at a Time



do Christmas.

Long before glowing screens and online carts, this stretch of the city was the place where the season came alive. Where errands turned into experiences and shopping felt like celebration. It was where you ran into your neighbors, friends, and business acquaintances during the hustle and bustle of the season, but still took the time to catch up. Downtown Minot has long been a hub of memory lane.

In December of 1965, Downtown Minot proudly called itself "the heart of the area's largest and most complete shopping district," home to nearly 700 businesses offering what they promised was the perfect trifecta: variety, service, and price. Their motto said it all, "If it's in town, it's downtown." With all these benefits, Christmas shopping wasn't a chore, it was a pleasure.

You can almost hear the jingle of the doorbells and feel the cold air brushing past wool coats as shoppers moved from store to store. At S&L Department Store in the early 1960s, practical met festive with fleece-lined snow boots for under four dollars, stylish leather boots for less than nine, mohair sweaters for \$12.95, and holiday dresses ready for Christmas Eve dinners and church services. Just down the street, The Jupiter Store tempted families with bicycles for under thirty dollars, board games like Sorry

Downtown Minot has always known how to and Monopoly, aluminum Christmas trees, rolls of wrapping paper, and cans of mixed nuts. Nearly everything you needed to make Christmas morning feel full and bright.

But the magic of Christmas downtown didn't start in the 1960s. It goes all the way back to 1886, when Minot itself was barely more than a beginning. With no churches yet built and only a handful of established congregations, the town gathered on the corner of what is now Main Street and Central Avenue. That's where holiday spirit so let's take a little trip down Minot's first Christmas tree stood, decorated with care and hope. Gifts were hung from its branches, and every person, every single one, left with at least a bag of candy. It was messy and imperfect and exactly what a community looks like at the start.

> Fast forward to present time and now, when I stand in my shop downtown and talk with people searching for Christmas gifts, the goals remain the same: something meaningful. something nostalgic and something that feels just right, I feel that same thread pulling through time. The prices have changed. The storefronts have evolved. Gone are the days of S&L Department Store, JCPenney, Sears, Woolworths, and Jupiter, But the heart? The heart is still here.

> Now we find locally owned antique shops, specialty stores, coffee stops, restaurants, art studios, jewelry stores, boutiques, and more right in the heart of our community. These businesses are the heartbeat of the holiday season and keep the magic of this slice of




our city going strong and provide shoppers a unique experience that feels like a moment of nostalgia at every stop.

Recently, I visited with a lady who moved to Minot just a few weeks back and was looking for special gifts to send back home and to family around the country. She loved the opportunity to shop local and was enjoying the chance to make Minot feel just a little more like home. I also helped a long time customer finish up her holiday shopping with a handful of hand picked gifts for some tough to shop for people on her list. These are just a few of the opportunities I have to create community. It feels magical to know that we are a part of the history of our downtown and

are able to keep the spirit of the holiday alive one shopping experience at a time.





Forging Ahead... **JEFC Trains Our Next Leaders**

The 91st Missile Wing is forging the next generation of nuclear professionals! To prepare future Noncommissioned Officers for the unique demands of the deterrence mission, leaders from across the Missile Wing hosted the Junior Enlisted Foundations Course 300 in partnership with the 5th Bomb Wing Professional Development Center.

The Enlisted Force Development Model – Enlisted Airmanship Continuum (100–900) – connects institutional, functional and base delivered education, training and experiences. The Enlisted Airmanship Continuum is first introduced at basic military training, reinforced by foundational competencies in each AFSC's career field education and training plan, and embedded throughout the entire continuum.

The curriculum was enhanced with content focused on Minot AFB's unique mission, technological enhancements, and intelligence briefs on our nation's competitors. This initiative graduated 28 mission-ready Airmen from the 5 BW and 91 MW, ensuring our force is equipped with the knowledge and skills required to lead in a complex global environment. This is how we develop lethal, ready, and mentally tough leaders to execute our nation's most critical mission.

The Junior Enlisted Foundations Course 300 bridges the gap between tech school and Airman Leadership School. The course provides students with the foundational skills and knowledge needed to conform to standards, customs and courtesies, and offers guidance to help enhance the students' focus on becoming highly efficient career field and 5-skill level agents.
The JEFC300 empowers Airmen

to reflect on their behaviors in relation to the Airman Leadership Qualities. It facilitates the journey to developing supervisory and leadership skills, developing the competency of leading individuals and teams, and understanding the guardrails and guidelines of supervision.

The JEFC was created by the Air Force in late 2023, and as of 31 December 2025, it is a prerequisite for the Airman Leadership School (ALS). Airmen cannot attend ALS without first graduating from the JEFC 300. The next ALS is planned for January 2026. Typically, the 5 BW hosts the JEFC 300 course, but with the number of students who needed to complete it before the next ALS class, the 91 MW offered to host a course.

probing questions allowed this class' subject matter expert instructors to share detailed, relevant, locationspecific information that cannot be captured in a curriculum intended for the broader Air Force.

The standard curriculum is good and was designed for this exact purpose: to allow expert instructors to tailor it to base-specific needs. We plan on hosting several more in 2026, but we don't have exact numbers yet. The volunteer instructor cadre is growing by the day, so we have many Airmen (instructors and students) who would like this course to expand and continue.

Foundations Courses replace our base-level professional enhancement seminars beginning October 2023 and become prerequisite courses for EPME in FY25. Content for all foundations courses will be updated and standardized by the Barnes Center, with the intent to remain current and relevant to maintain our competitive advantage. Foundations courses will be administered by base development advisors with support from local NCOs, SNCOs and subject matter experts. The duration for each level is five days: four days standardized content and one day MAJCOM/WG specific focus.

Minot North basketball faced a challenging slate of games over the past week as both the boys and girls teams continued early-season play against strong competition.





When comes to lights and decorating; inspect the condition of the electrical cords for frayed wires, kinks and cracked sockets. Only use appropriate replacement light bulbs. Do not over load wiring with more than three light strands connected together unless the safety label for the lights states otherwise. Overloaded and poorly maintained electrical circuits and cords present a serious fire hazard.




