Minot Air Force Base creates nearly \$1 Billion in Economic Impact in 2025, new analysis shows

MINOT AREA CHAMBER EDC

Each year, the numbers tell a familiar but powerful story: Minot Air Force Base is one of the most significant economic engines in North Dakota.

According to the latest Economic Impact Analysis Report by the 5th Bomb Wing Comptroller Squadron, the base generated \$956.7 million in impact during fiscal year 2025. The report was presented at the Minot Area Chamber EDC Military Affairs Committee meeting at the Grand Oasis Hotel on February 5.

"The annual economic impact report helps put numbers to what our community already knows," said Brekka Kramer, President | CEO of the Minot Area Chamber EDC. "Minot Air Force Base is essential not only to our economy, but to the character and vitality of our region. It reaffirms what we often say: Minot isn't Minot without Minot Air Force Base."

The 2025 total reflects an updated methodology for estimating indirect economic impact. The report also showed that the base directly employs thousands of active-duty service members and civilian personnel, with total on-base employment estimated at 6,957 jobs. That makes Minot Air Force Base the largest employer in Ward County.


Just as important is the base's population footprint. Including service members, family members,



and civilian employees, Minot Air Force Base is home to more than 11,000 people, whose presence fuels demand for housing, retail, child care, schools, and recreation in and around Minot.

"We are deeply grateful to the men and women who serve at Minot Air Force Base and who call Minot home during their time here," Kramer added. "Their families are part of our community, and we remain committed to supporting them, advocating for them, and ensuring Minot continues to be a place where they are welcomed and valued."

All About Pets

Contra-freeloading explained



Contrafree-loading is a term that many pet owners probably have not heard before. Coined in 1963, contrafree-loading is the concept that some animals prefer to work for their food instead of having it handed to them for free. When given the choice between free food or food that requires effort to obtain, giraffes, rats, monkeys, dogs, and even humans have been observed as choosing the work over "free-loading." Note that contrafree-loading is not consistent for every individual pet or species, but it is a very useful concept, especially for those pets that prefer to have a job to do such as working dogs. Also, it has been shown that most house cats prefer to be served instead of working for their food, and there is nothing wrong with that! Many people know how hard dogs will work for food. This motivation can come from two places: extrinsic motivation, which comes from the actual reward, and intrinsic motivation, or the feeling of achievement individuals experience having worked for the reward. Some dogs were bred by humans to have a job to do, so their motivation to work is going to be higher. These types of pets will often find effort to be rewarding, and a lack of meaningful activity to be stressful or boring, which can be detrimental to a pet's wellbeing. This goes hand in hand with enrichment, which is essential for your pet's quality of life. Animals like to have a sense of control over their environments, and working for food offers this. That sense of control can help your pet's confidence and willingness to explore the world and try new things. Instances of contrafree-loading tend to decline in times of food shortage or when the effort required to obtain the food increases too much, as well as with other factors such as old age. Also, some pets just do not have the motivation to work too hard for their food and prefer easy access, and others are just not



If you like astronomy, North Dakota can be a great place to view the night sky. After all, we have a lot of clear and cold nights, which translates to the colder it gets, the less diffusion of light. Said another way, if it's clear and 40 below zero, your viewing will be much better than clear and zero.

When it comes to winter viewing of the night sky, you need a lot of patience. You can't just step outside your door and expect to see a meteorite whizzing by. It's going to take a little more effort than that.

I got hooked on astronomy in the fall of 1984 when I found out Halley's Comet was on its way. I wrote a couple of articles for the college newspaper about the comet and took an astronomy class to

now the six to eight weeks of recovery, I knew I had the best.

Finally, even though it took me a bit by surprise, my boss, Ted Bolton, owner of the Northern Sentry, has single-handedly taken on the responsibility of covering for me. Why did it take you by surprise, Rod? This is North Dakota, and we are a very close-knit community.

LET ME FILL IN A COUPLE OF THE BLANKS HERE.

I tried to keep everyone in the loop—friends, business acquaintances, and others who knew me—that I was having this operation, with one small caveat: my thoughts were along the lines of, "Hey, I'll be back at my job in no time. I can write from home."

Most people were certainly more concerned than I was about my ability to just flip the switch after a couple of days in the hospital. Without a lot of extra talk, let's just say those who were skeptical of my ability to jump right back into my job were right. I ended up spending four days at Abbott Northwestern, followed by two days traveling back to Minot. Me being "right back on my computer" just wasn't going to happen. Even today's article, more than two weeks after surgery, had to be carefully orchestrated, allowing time for rest between thinking, planning, and writing.

THE REACTION TO TED'S MESSAGE WAS AMAZING!

The week before I left for surgery, Ted informed those who knew me

through the Northern Sentry and my other military ties about the challenge I had ahead. He asked for prayers and encouraged others to drop me a note when they had a minute. There must be a lot of people with a lot of minutes out there because my text messages and email inbox were very busy. Sue was able to keep people informed about what turned out to be a 10-hour surgery (it was originally planned for around six hours) and the outcome.

On my side, there were cards sent to the Northern Sentry office, a plethora of text messages sent to both Sue and me, and finally, since my return to Minot last week, Ted has been my POC (point of contact) for the many folks at Minot Air Force Base whom I have met and befriended. I even received a note that went something like this: "Hey Rod, I don't know you personally, but I hear you're in need of prayers. Know that I am sending them your way."

Indeed, that's where you get tears in your eyes and truly understand what it means to be part of a community. The words "North Dakota Nice" take on a larger-than-life meaning.

As much as I tried to make my surgery and absence from the Northern Sentry seem like a small "glitch" in my life, Ted wanted people to know the truth: Rod Wilson had a challenge ahead and needed thoughts and prayers.

AND TODAY...

Well, today, as I write this article, I have resigned myself to the fact that there is no magic switch to flip that will return me to a normal life at "warp speed." I have also accepted that a return to normal will take time and patience. Looking at my calendar, once-scheduled events now have question marks beside them. There may need to be a Plan B.

I don't know where to start in saying "thank you" to everyone for their concern, but I hope you all feel the special sense of community that exists between Minot and Minot Air Force Base, just as I did. My dad used to say, "There are no secrets in small towns." It probably had a slightly different meaning back when I was a kid, and that's OK. Having an entire community care about you—some not even knowing you all that well—is what defines us far beyond anything else that can be said.

Astronomy a great winter hobby

By January 1990, I was working

as a sports editor in Carrington and one cold night that wasn't a sports night, I was looking at Jupiter and there was a bump on the side of the planet. I thought it was frost or condensation on the telescope lens. After cleaning it, the bump was still there. So, I kept watching even though my toes were numb by now. It turned out to be one of Jupiter's moons emerging from behind the planet.

By March 1986, the comet had developed quite a tail and one cold, clear morning, I woke my roommate at 4 a.m., and we drove

south of Bismarck about 20 miles to look for Comet Halley. We found it with the naked eye, but it was a bit of a disappointment. We thought it would be brighter and it had a short, fat tail behind it.

In late fall 1988, while a student at UND, I invited several of my colleagues from the Dakota Student newspaper over to my apartment to look at Mars. It was at perihelic opposition, it's closest approach to Earth which promised a great view and we certainly got it.

We locked onto the planet with the telescope and although the "canals" weren't so unusual, we noticed Olympus Mons and both polar ice caps, something that I hadn't seen in nearly four years of looking at Mars.

But I think the best example I can give of good night sky viewing came on Jan. 28, 2004 when I photographed the Aurora Borealis. Many of us know that when the aurora dances across the sky, there isn't a sound. That's how I remember that night.

The temperature was 32 below zero and there wasn't a bit of wind. This time it wasn't the telescope, but the camera and tripod were set up in much the same way. I was about two blocks from home on a vacant lot where my greenhouse is now located. I was standing in about two feet of snow and had numerous layers on so I would have the patience for the long haul.

The aurora that night, or actually morning by now, was incredible. It was as clear and as vivid as you'd see in a National Geographic photo.


And, in 2004, I was using a Minolta film camera with the little batteries that look like a very thick dime.

In 90 minutes, I took 108 pictures and although I was comfortable in my stance, the camera batteries froze up a couple of times so I had to take them out and put them in my armpit to warm up enough to operate. Unfortunately, that's when the fingers began to go numb and I couldn't feel myself clicking the shutter. As a result, the last 10 or 12 photos were blurry and useless.

But most were good and some were spectacular and that's the message here today. It's about the clarity you get when it is that cold. I don't think I would have believed it had I not done it myself. It was well worth standing in the cold of night for 90 minutes. Some of those photos still get passed around and it's been more than 20 years.

There's some irony here. When we look back at pictures of Halley's Comet from 1910, most people are wearing just a shirt, no jacket etc. Sure, they could see the comet in May 1910, but the images weren't nearly what they were in January or February 1910.

At least there's one advantage to the bitter cold of winter nights.

Six More Weeks



SHE'S NOT FROM AROUND HERE

On February 2, I woke my kids up early so we would have time before school to watch a livestream clip of a groundhog named Phil emerge from his burrow at Gobbler's Knob. Not because I believe in "whistle-pig meteorology," but because my kids think it's fascinating—and I'm a pushover for my kids.

We watched as men in top hats ceremoniously knocked on Phil's door, then held him up like the Lion King's Simba to a cheering crowd. They unfurled an official-looking scroll and declared—confidently and poetically—that we were in for six more weeks of winter.

At the time, it was about 15 degrees in Minot, and we were coming off several days of subzero wind chills. Pretty standard February fare in North Dakota. It wasn't hard to imagine six more weeks of winter. In fact, I remember joking later that only six more weeks of winter would actually be a pleasant surprise around here.

That joke did not age well.

Just a few days later, North Dakota experienced a jarring temperature swing. We climbed into the 30s. Then the 40s. Then, to 50 degrees and beyond. The kind of weather that ushered in spontaneous (if sloshy) trips to the park, hours of outdoor play, and pleasant conditions for finally removing the last remaining bits of outdoor Christmas décor.

Thinking back to Groundhog Day, I wasn't doubting Phil. I was wondering not if six more weeks of winter were coming—but when they would start.

I shared a few warm-weather observations on Hey Minot (a social media page dedicated to the good things in North Dakota) and was met with commentary from across the country. I noted what parents wore to school pick-up the first day it hit 37 degrees after a stretch of -22. Then I shared the joy of washing my car in the driveway when it was 52 degrees.

The internet responded swiftly.

"Your North Dakota weather is currently drunk in my North Carolina backyard."

"I'm in Pennsylvania—please come get your weather and take it home."

"How is North Dakota in the 50s while Wisconsin hasn't been above freezing in weeks?"

"I'm in New York. It's miserable. I think your weather is lost."

Last month, when I mentioned how warm 46 degrees felt in January, commenters assured me that kind of weather never happens and was highly unusual. In February, commenters were quick to note that warm spells like this are actually quite common.

That's social media for you.



The recent heat wave piqued my curiosity—are temperatures like this unprecedented, or am I only remembering the cold days?

Everyone is an expert, and someone is always wrong.

So I got curious. How unusual is this weather, really?

I'm no meteorologist—or weather-predicting rodent—but I can use the internet. I looked at historical February weather data for Minot. What I found was both validating and deeply unhelpful. Over the last five years, Minot has had only five days reach 50 degrees or higher, and two of those happened this year. Several years never hit 50 at all. But every year did have days in the 40s.

In other words, we're all right.

February in North Dakota is brutally cold, but it can also be shockingly pleasant. Highs range anywhere from -14 to 55 depending on the year—or even the day. January is, on average, our coldest month. And a typical year in North Dakota brings around 50 days with subzero ambient temperatures.

To put it scientifically: you really never can tell.

Maybe that's why it's so hard to remember winters accurately. Was it harsh? Mild? Somewhere in between? When temperatures

swing from 50 to -20 and back again, averages get skewed and our bodies are left wondering what just happened. Is it warm enough for a T-shirt? Should I still wear a coat when it's 30 degrees, even though it's 50 degrees warmer than yesterday?

In the end, winter memory is as much about perspective as it is about temperature. We tend to remember the extremes—the bitter cold or the glorious thaw—while the in-between gets blurred. And maybe that's not a bad thing. Living through the cold, the warmth, and the wildly unpredictable swings gives us something to laugh about later, something to commiserate over, and something to compare every future winter to.

One thing is certain: when winter does return for its reckoning—and it will—I'll be thinking of the groundhog. Phil never said when those six weeks of winter would start. Just that they were coming.

And in North Dakota, that feels about right.







SNARLING GHOST DOGS OF DOG DEN BUTTE

Snarling ghost dogs? In North Dakota?

Once was – maybe. Maybe yet today.

I've always had an interest in the history of our state, mostly the early days before roadways and fences and towns. The period when Dakota Territory was the "Old West". Sometimes I wish I'd lived back then, just to say I saw it. When I travel in the state today I see landmarks on the countryside and wonder what meaning they played in the early days prior to statehood. What might have happened there? Was it of any importance? If a vivid imagination doesn't bring an area to life, a little research usually will.

A favorite spot of mine is the often overlooked Dog Den Butte near the tiny town of Butte, located southeast of Velva just inside the McLean County line. A few miles to the west of Dog Den Butte is Strawberry Lake, a popular body of water ringed with cabins.

The region has a lot of history associated with it. The Totten Trail, a mail route from Fort Totten south of Devils Lake, to Fort Stevenson located south of present day Garrison, ran near the Dog Den. Mail carriers and others traveling on the frontier used Strawberry Lake to fill canteens and water horses in the unsettled region.

Dog Den Butte rises tall over the surrounding landscape, offering a superb view of the prairie below. It was a well-known landmark to early day travelers crossing land marked by few distinguishing features. While the butte served as a lookout spot on the frontier, today it supports various communication towers.

In 1868 Col. Philippe Regis de Trobriand, commander at Fort Stevenson, traversed the Totten Trail with a military escort. He was seeking to find the remains of two mail carriers killed on the trail near Strawberry Lake. He found a bloody sock, nothing else, but he noted in his journal that some on the frontier believed that nearby Dog Den Butte was guarded by "snarling ghost dogs". Although it cannot be said with certainty, one of the murdered mail carriers was believed to be dispatched by young Hunkpapa Sioux Sitting Bull who would later become a nationally known figure for his leadership at the Battle of the Little Bighorn and his fierce defense of the Indian way

of life.

A much larger shooting scrape, known as the Battle of the Grand Coteau, occurred near the Dog Den July 13-14, 1851. A band of Metis on a hunting foray found themselves surrounding and greatly outnumbered by Sioux warriors.

An eyewitness to the engagement described the land as where "bison grazed in peace" and hunters "were only worried by the passage of war parties, which were looking for scalps."

The Metis gathered their carts to form a defensive perimeter, placing the women and children in protective dugouts underneath the carts. The Sioux made several attempts to overrun the hastily built fortress but eventually withdrew. The defenders estimated they had killed a dozen Sioux. Despite "thousands of bullets" no Metis were killed in the fight, but a man taken prisoner by the Sioux was executed within view of the Metis fortification.

When I see the Dog Den today, I think about what it has witnessed throughout history, great herds of buffalo, early day inhabitants, and the like. There are many other landmarks in North Dakota that have very interesting stories associated with them too.

A little history and a little imagination make such landmarks come alive, no longer just another part of innocuous landscape passing outside a car window.

Soaring with Colonel Jane I McCullough

Jane I Lee was welcomed into the world by Gladys and Norman Lee of Hartland, North Dakota on March 17, 1945. Followed by two sisters, the girls grew up on the family farm where Jane acquired skills that proved valuable in the Army. Full of promise, dedication, and love for her family and country, Jane worked hard and persevered to become Colonel Jane I McCullough.

After high school, Jane told her dad she wanted to join the Army. He said, "No! You can be a nurse, teacher or a secretary." She tried to follow his wishes attending Minot State College where she earned her Secondary Education degree in 1968. She taught school for two years. A total career change took Jane back to Minot State College, Trinity School of Medical Technology, where she earned her Med Tech degree in 1972.

Jane worked as a Med Tech for a few years, then joined the US Army Reserves 1 June 1978, when she was commissioned 1st Lieutenant. Her previous education and work experience determined the rank. At the time of commissioning, Jane's school/work experience was two weeks short of the rank of Captain. After completion of the Quartermaster Officer Basic Course, she was commissioned Captain, back dated to 14 June 1978.

Col McCullough always saw being a woman in what was traditionally a man's space as a positive experience. As a woman, she was classified as a minority which brought a certain respect. She had to be able to stand up to the men as their equal and have a good sense of humor. Growing up on the family farm served her well in the Army. She could drive the big 5-ton forklift and truck, and the jeeps. She took the great North Dakota work ethic and farm grown can-do attitude with her throughout her career.

As 1st Lieutenant, then Captain, McCullough's many assignments began at the 311th Evacuation Hospital in Minot, the 889th Quartermaster Battalion in Great Falls, MT, back to the 311th in Bismarck and Minot, ND and then Grand Forks where she joined the 447th Clearing Company. She also completed AMEDD Officer Basic Course in 1981, Officer Advanced Course in 1984, and Military Personnel Course in 1985.

So many moves proved too much for her marriage that ended in divorce after which she applied and was accepted on active duty as Active Army Guard Reserve and continued as Executive Officer at the 447th.

After her wedding to Paul McCullough, the Army sent them to

Phoenix, AZ where she was assigned AMEDD Personnel Counselor at Headquarters, Department of the Army. Here she was commissioned Major McCullough on 21 June 1985.

The Major was next assigned at Headquarters, Department of the Army, AMEDD Personnel Counselor, Madigan Army Medical Center, Fort Lewis, Washington. After this assignment, she was sent to be Executive Officer at the 309th Medical Group and made a home in Potomac, MD. The Command and General Staff Course was completed in 1988 and the World Wide AMEDD Personnel Management Course in 1990.

20 June 1992 brought yet another promotion and Lieutenant Colonel McCullough was soon assigned to the 3rd Medical Command in Decatur, GA where she was Deputy Chief of Staff Security/Plans/Operations.

LTC McCullough continued her education completing Air Force War College in 1994. In 1995 she completed US Army War College, Armed Forces Medical Intelligence Course, and Reserve Components National Security Course.

While in GA, on 24 August 1997 our North Dakota farm girl soared into her final commission, the full bird Colonel, symbolized by an eagle with wings spread.

Col McCullough's most memorable

experience was the two-month Bright Star 1997 Joint/Combined Forces training exercise in Egypt. She and her Unit were flown into the Egyptian Military Base outside of Cairo. While there, she went to Alexandria and stayed at the Mubarak Military City.

Col McCullough's driver/bodyguard was a member of Egyptian Military Intelligence. With him, she and other officers were safely driven to other locations, and toured the Muhammed Ali Mosque and a military museum in Cairo. The USS Eisenhower was on the Mediterranean at the time so she was given a full tour of the ship. "It was huge!"


Outside the cities, Egypt was all flat desert where you might look out and see a man and his little son and a donkey walking across the sand. Colonel McCullough loved her time in Egypt and wasn't ready to go home at the end of only two months.

Col McCullough's second final assignment before retirement was Commanding Officer of the 48th Combat Support Hospital at Fort Meade in Maryland. With an NCO and \$4 million worth of equipment, Col McCullough was tasked with developing the Army's first multi-component hospital, staffed by both active and reserve component personnel. Quoting the Colonel, "I loved this job." Her last assignment was to the Army Surgeon General's staff at Fort Sam Houston as Senior Army Reserve Officer until retirement in 2004.

Col McCullough found joy in a distinguished Army career full of travel, interesting people, and best of all, success as a Commanding Officer. Her many achievements include an Overseas Training Ribbon, three Meritorious Service Medals, the Order of Military Medical Merit, three Army Commendation medals, and two Legion of Merits, the highest peace time award and more. She was also elected as a member of The Army Military Surgeons of the United States.

Col McCullough and her husband, Paul, love to see the world. She took her two sons to Norway in 1979, and a second trip there with other family in 1981. Together, from 2001 to 2017, she and Paul traveled abroad 16 times. Their many destinations in Europe and Asia included Istanbul, the British Isles, Russia, Israel, China, and Thailand. They made an Honor flight as well as travel to Mexico and Canada.

Alongside all the military achievements and accolades, Col McCullough with Paul, raised two sons and is now a great-grandmother, devoted to her family and making beautiful quilts. This is what a life well lived looks like.

OPERATION HOMECOMING BRINGS VIETNAM POWS HOME

FEBRUARY 12, 1973

Due to the Paris Peace Accords of 1973, POWs were to be released from North Vietnam during a mission called Operation Homecoming. The first group of 40 POWs, which included some of the longest-held prisoners, left Hanoi on February 12, 1973 on a USAF C-141 Starlifter known as the Hanoi Taxi. The crew stopped at Clark Air Base, Philippines, to offer the POWs medical care, new uniforms, and delicious food

before returning to the United States. During the operation, 591 POWs were liberated. 325 of them served in the Air Force, 138 in the Navy, 77 in the Army, 26 in the Marine Corps, and 25 were civilian employees. There were also POWs released from South Vietnam, Laos, and China. Navy Cmdr. Everett Alvarez Jr. was the longest-held POW, having been in captivity for over eight years. "Everything seemed like heaven," said Air Force Capt. Larry Chesley. "When the doors of that C-141 closed, there were tears in the eyes of every man aboard."


**A ROTATOR FLIGHT,

TWO UNIFORMS, ONE TEAM







Military Couples Beating the Divorce Odds

You've heard the phrase, "50% of marriages end in divorce." But what about military marriages? It's hard to spend time on military spouse pages without seeing someone asking about divorce. The topic feels ever-present in military life. Do military couples make it through the challenges of PCS moves, deployments, uncertainty, and rebuilding life every few years, or are they destined for the same outcome?

According to two military couples who have been married for more than twenty years, divorce in the military is not inevitable. In fact, they say military life can strengthen a marriage — after making it much harder first.

Dual-military couple SMSgt Colin Crandall (Ret.) and MSgt Sherri Crandall (Ret.) shared their experiences and why they believe some military marriages struggle while others endure. Tonya Menuey, married to Brig Gen. Christopher Menuey, also spoke candidly about the realities of sustaining a long-term military marriage.

"Working through it sometimes meant healthy discussions and sometimes anger and tears," Tonya said. "It is never easy to put each other before ourselves, but that is what we tried to do then and continue to strive to do today."

Both couples entered marriage with different expectations. Tonya explained that before meeting her husband, she never imagined leaving Iowa or raising a family far from home. "I believed our love would be enough to sustain

us through anything," she said. "I certainly did not understand what the military would ask of us over the course of his career."

Colin came into his marriage with a different perspective after a previous marriage that lasted only eight months. "In Security Forces there was a running joke that you needed to be signed off in your OJT records as being divorced,"

he said. With both he and Sherri serving, they worried about deployments, opposing schedules, and whether they would ever have a normal family life.

Those concerns became more real once children entered the picture. Sherri explained that parenting added another layer of stress. "Before, it was just the two of us. Then you add kids — illnesses,

schools, moves, and maintaining relationships with family while trying to keep up with military careers. It's not easy."

When asked about the most difficult seasons of marriage, both couples were honest.

Tonya recalled a time when her children were young and her husband's job required long hours, sometimes keeping him away until late at night. He even had to work on Mother's Day. "I have a vivid memory of sitting on the floor with a child in each arm and all three of us crying," she said. Finding a group of other mothers and occasionally hiring a sitter helped her regain balance. "I remember thinking, 'I did not sign up to be a single parent.'"

For Colin and Sherri, one of the most challenging periods came in the weeks following September 11, 2001. Both were assigned to the 314th Security Forces Squadron at Little Rock Air Force Base while caring for their newborn son. Working opposite shifts with limited childcare options, they struggled to balance mission requirements with family responsibilities and faced the possibility of sending their infant away during a time of national fear and uncertainty.

"That moment was one of the heaviest of my career," Colin said, "not because of the mission, but because I didn't know how to protect my family and still serve it."

Both couples agreed that military life adds pressure to an already challenging task: maintaining a marriage while raising a family. When asked how the military could better support marriages, Sherri emphasized education and honest expectations. "[Marriage] is more complicated than most think," she said. "Being honest about the hardships couples will face and helping them know where to go for help would make a difference."

Tonya believes community is one of the strongest factors in long-term success. "The more often couples can be in community, whether through a church, base connections, or friendships with other parents, the better support you have for the long haul," she said. The challenge, she noted, is rebuilding that community at every new duty station.

Colin agreed that while resources are helpful, the foundation ultimately rests with the couple themselves. "Sometimes it will feel like the world is against you both," he said. "But the beautiful thing is you have a partner to tackle life's challenges. You have each other."

According to Pew Research Center data, the overall divorce rate for active-duty service members is typically around 2.5%–3.0% per year, equating to roughly 15,000–20,000 military divorces annually across the active-duty force. While military life presents unique challenges, these couples say success comes not from avoiding hardship, but from learning how to face it together.

tightly as possible.

Older Children: Children from 40 to 80 pounds or 4'9" tall should use a federally approved booster seat.

A booster seat with a lap and shoulder belt combination is the safest. This can be done with a booster without a shield and one that has a removable shield. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for this.

Once children are over 4'9", and have outgrown their booster seat, they should use a safety belt in all seating positions.

Older children are ready to use vehicle safety belts when the lap belt stays low and snug across the hips, and the shoulder belt does not cross the face or in front of the neck.

The safest place for a child to sit is in the middle of the back seat. If the vehicle has a passenger side airbag, all children 12 and under should be restrained in the back seat. Airbags save lives when used with safety belts.

Make sure the seat is installed as tight as possible. Get in a knee on the seat while tightening the belt. A child safety seat should not move more than one inch in any direction.

Always use a federally approved child safety seat and not a regular household carrier.

Toddlers: Child faces forward in car and in an upright position after 12 months and over 20 pounds.

Most convertible seats are for children up to 40 pounds (about 4 years old). Read manufacturer's instructions to check your seat's guidelines.

A forward facing seat must have the harness straps in the upper most harness slots.

Built-in safety seats are federally approved and safe for children over 20 pounds and 12 months.

Why is tire rotation so important?

Vehicle owners need to keep maintenance on the mind to ensure their cars and trucks are operating at peak capacity. Various components should be checked and serviced at key intervals. Oil changes and fluid top-offs are part of routine maintenance, but it can be easy to forget about other important parts of the vehicle, including tires.

Rotating tires is vital to their upkeep. Bridgestone Tires advises that tire rotation involves routinely repositioning a vehicle's tires in specific patterns from front to back and side to side. According to Big O Tires, the front tires tend to wear on the outside edges because the tire leans over when a driver turns a corner. The rear tires just follow the front ones, so they usually wear more evenly. By leaving tires in place, the outside edges on the front tires will wear down much faster than the rest, and those tires will need to be replaced sooner. Rotation may be required by tire warranties. Rotation also keeps the tires working properly.

Experts generally advise tire rotation every 6,000 to 8,000 miles, even if they do not show any signs of wear. It is challenging to determine if weather treads are uneven or how much wear has been sustained just by looking at them. Rotating tires can prolong the life of tires and decrease how frequently they need to be replaced.

Rotating tires keeps the tread depth uniform and helps maintain traction and consistent handling across all four tires. Bridgestone says the tire rotation pattern that is best for a particular vehicle depends on the type of tire being used. Patterns are recommended by the standardizing body of the tire industry, called The Tire and Rim Association, Inc. Individuals can consult with professional mechanics about the proper way to rotate tires. Many tire manufacturers or automotive stores that have sold customers tires also will do tire rotations - some free of charge.

In addition to proper traction, minimizing uneven tire treads causes the vehicle to be more balanced, advises Wrench, a mobile auto repair and maintenance company. This enables the driver to have more control even when roads are slippery. Many auto service centers will then align and balance tires after they have been rotated. At this time the mechanic will likely check brakes as well, since it is easy to see and reach them when the tires are off.

Tire rotation is an important component of vehicle maintenance. Check with a qualified automotive professional to see if it's time to have your vehicle's tires rotated.

- Bison are among the most dangerous animals encountered by visitors in the U.S. and Canadian National Parks.

As we await the hire of a new MFLC for our three PSMIs, I couldn't be more appreciative of our current Minot Public School Counselors assigned to Minot AFB: Ms. Thelma Theis (North Plains Elementary School), Ms. Betsy Casey (Dakota Elementary School), and Ms. Kylie Pawluk (Memorial Middle School). Their work is unique and warrants additional assistance with regard to resources to best support our military-connected students. As such, I thanked each school counselor last week and provided them with the following items: "Seasons of my Military Student" book, "Working with Military Children" workbook, Tutor.com bookmarks, Military-Connected Student Support Matching Game, Minot AFB's list of CDC/YC/Homeschool/Adult MFLCs, MFLC Brochure, Minot AFB School Liaison tumbler, and handwritten note of appreciation. All that I gave—once—cannot compare to all that they give every single day to our students. They deserve our deepest appreciation!

Our Minot AFB counselors have varied experience as school counselors at our PSMIs. This is Ms. Pawluk's first year at Memorial Middle School and this is Ms. Casey's fourth year at Dakota Elementary School. In contrast, this is Ms. Theis's 25th year at North Plains Elementary School, and throughout these years she has split her time between North Plains/Dakota, North Plains/Bell, and North Plains/Longfellow.

I asked each counselor, "Do you think there's a difference between military-connected students and civilian students with regard to supports needed or behaviors?" Ms. Pawluk responded, "I do believe that military connected students live a unique lifestyle that not everyone can relate to, such as frequent moves and deployments. Many in-town students often have family members nearby and many grow up attending the same schools with the same group [of] peers. In contrast, military connected students may have thousands of miles between them and their family and rarely stay in one place long enough to start and finish their school career with the same school or peer group. This can lead them to constantly adjusting to new environments. At the same time, middle school students are developmentally very similar regardless of military affiliation.

All students benefit from constant support and strong relationships. While military connected students may need additional support related to transitions and connections, they are still middle school students first and share many of the same needs as their peers."

Ms. Casey shared that all the on-base students are in the same boat with their moves and transitions, so all are so supportive of each other. The staff see it, too. In contrast, she said the schools downtown don't experience the same camaraderie from this shared experience, so they receive different kinds of supports. Ms. Theis responded, "I most definitely believe there is a difference between military-connected students versus civilian [students] and support needed." Ms. Theis said all students can encounter challenges that arise at any given time, but "Military students will face the challenge of having to PCS, numerous times. Each transition brings its own unique challenges. Leaving friends, classmates behind, maybe moving further away from family. Civilian students face their own daily challenges, but don't have to worry about a parent deploying for a length of time."

When asked what the best part of their job is, all counselors agreed it was the students. Ms. Pawluk responded, "The best part of my job as the school counselor is the daily interaction with students. I love being in the hallways, greeting students in the morning, and wishing them a good day. It is those small moments that connections are built. What brings me the most satisfaction is the appreciation I receive from both the students and the staff. It is great knowing that students feel supported and that staff value my role as a school counselor." Ms. Casey said, "The kids. The community on the base. It's a great community. This is not anyone's permanent home, but they try to make the most of it and are very welcoming." Ms. Theis shared this similar thought, "The best part of my job is the students. Their background, what knowledge and skills they possess and bring each day. Seeing them grow and become role models and leaders in the school and transferring it into the community. I am truly fortunate to be part of a military school, because of the support military parents also bring and willingly share to make sure our schools feel like home."

I can honestly say, I agree with our counselors' sentiments! The best part of my job is working with students, families, school staff, community members, and commanders on real-time military-connected student supports within a welcoming, homelike community. We collaborate with great people on behalf of great people who serve and sacrifice!

As the MPS guidance counselors continue providing exemplary care to our military-connected students, I want to thank them for their time and support. Our students—often deemed "at-risk" due to their significant social, emotional, and academic challenges arising from frequent moves and parental deployments—are lucky to learn in these Purple Star schools with professionals dedicated to their success.



FISHING:

Lake Sakakawea elevation, Feb. 9: 1,827.79 feet above mean sea level (MSL); 15,500 cubic feet per second (CFS) Garrison Dam average daily releases.

Devils Lake elevation: 1,448.87 feet above mean sea level (MSL). Stump Lake elevation: 1,448.82 MSL.

• N.D. Game & Fish Dept. game wardens: No new reports.

• Devils Lake, Woodland Resort, Devils Lake: Try 12 to 15 feet for walleye working trees or rocks in the morning or late afternoon using rattling jigs or spoons tipped with minnow heads. Perch bite remains tough but look for occasional one in with walleye. Move around, though, if targeting perch because they're not schooled yet.

• Lake Darling, Karma C-Store, Ruthville: No new reports from area lakes.

• Lake Metigoshe, Four Seasons, Bottineau: Sort through your bluegill catch for keepers with most fish on the small size. Occasional nice crappie and walleye. Fair to good pike spearing success.

• Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Cenex Bait & Tackle, Garrison: Anglers starting to move ice houses off Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon with water along shoreline edges and on top of ice. Use extreme caution on both lakes. Missouri River tailrace producing decent walleye down river.

• Lake Sakakawea/Lake Audubon, Hwy. 83 Lawn & Leisure, Garrison: Missouri River tailrace producing some nice eating-sized walleye. Warm weather creating poor and dangerous shoreline ice conditions with water along the slumping edges of Lake Sakakawea. Use extreme caution on Lake Audubon and vehicle access isn't recommended.

• Lake Sakakawea, New Town: No new reports.

• Lake Sakakawea/Missouri River, Scott's Bait & Tackle, Pick City: Missouri River tailrace fair to good
