Things you probably didn't know

Bunkey planted 2 pumpkin plants last spring. By midsummer, his garden was nearly covered with pumpkin vines. Petunia was having a hissy fit over how messy the garden looked and insisted Bunkey "do something." Of course, he asked George. "Since you can't stunt a vine, you need either to train it up a trellis, or shorten it. Trellising is not practical for a full size pumpkin so you need to prune the vine. When the vine has as many fruits as you will need, shorten the vine to at least 10 feet for each fruit. The plant needs that much vine to feed the pumpkin. This works with melons and other vine crops. Most vines now are available in bush types. They aren't as fruitful but for most people, it's enough.

Do you really know what hybrid means? It is a plant grown from a seed that was cross pollinated by 2 different parent plants. The first generation of that hybrid is labeled F1. Hybrids are usually much more vigorous than the parent plants, thus hybrid vigor. Seeds are crossed to make a plant more resistant to disease, more floriferous, brighter colored, with stronger stems or in some cases smaller or larger. Forget saving seeds from a hybrid. F2 hybrids will not be similar to either of the original parents. Odd fact. Try this with apple seeds and each seed will grow a different apple. Hybrid apples will have fewer than 5 seeds in each half.

Tips from other gardeners. Who knows if they will work for you, but fun to try. Smear garlic paste in cracks in the house where ants are entering to deter them. It also keeps away vampires, a plus at Halloween. Top dressing strawberries in the spring with composted cow manure will make the berries sweeter; smellier but sweeter. Grated orange peel will keep cats from using your flowerbeds



for a litter box. Pine cones work too as they hurt digging paws. To keep the vegetable garden edges nice and neat and weed free, lay strips of carpet fuzzy side down. If you are careful, you can mow over the edges. Some people, with too much time on their hands, pull the stuff up and dry it to use again next spring. You can leave it in place too. Eventually it will rot and need replacing. It also works for paths. Native bees don't make hives or live in them. When you are done with your Christmas tree, cut the trunk into foot long hunks. Drill rows of holes 3 to 4 inches deep and variety of diameters from 1/8th to1/16th inches. Nail a board on top for a roof and hang around your estate. Wild bees will lay their eggs in the holes. You can tell if a hole is occupied as usually some of the holes will be plugged with mud. Don't make the mistake of hanging the bee logs next to a suet feeder. Woodpeckers consider bee larvae as lunch. One gal with a teen age son, ran out of deer repellent. Remembering how repellent her son's cologne was to her, she grabbed a bottle and sprinkled it around the edge of the garden. She insists it works but has to wear a mask when she weeds. Some of that stuff will clear a room of adults in 10 minutes. Teens must have a different "smeller."

Gardening Tips

Toad furniture

Bunkey absolutely abhors mushrooms, as much as Petunia loves them. This year he is going to give his wife two mushroom growing kits. One of her favorite mushrooms is the shiitake so he got that kit and one for oyster mushrooms for good measure. He carefully read the instructions, as he planned to have a crop growing to give her under the tree. The kit consists of a block of compressed sawdust already inoculated with the mushroom mycelium. The instructions say to make a tent of plastic to keep the block damp, mist it once or twice a day and you should have a bloom of mushrooms in about 10 days ready to harvest. Just to make sure this would work, he got an extra kit to experiment on. Since neighbor George loves "shrooms" too, the experiment is going to be at his house. There is a twofold reason for this; to be sure it works and to keep Petunia from discovering her Christmas gift before time. She is a terrible snoop and usually finds her gifts almost as soon as they come in the door.

The first crop came in just as the instructions said they would. George shared his bounty with Petunia but didn't tell her how he got them. She was ecstatic. This gave George an idea. "Why don't you make her a mushroom garden? It's easy." Sure it is.

They found a place that sells plugs of inoculated mycelium. It also may be called spawn. A package of 100 plugs are enough to inoculate 2 logs and will produce a pound of mushrooms a year for 3 years. To start, Bunkey had to find the proper log for the spawn he was using. They could be alder, ash, oak or maple. The logs need to be fresh, not older than 6 months old. He started with a drill with a 5/16 inch drill bit. He drilled holes about 1 1/4th inch deep in a diamond shape

(off set rows) about 50 per log. The next step is to stick the plugs into the holes. If the plug is too small for the hole, he needed to fill the empty bit with wax to prevent wild spawn from contaminating the log. Now you wait. The logs need to be stored off the ground in a shady spot and watered to keep them moist. About a year later, when the temperature reaches 60 degrees, the mushrooms should start to fruit. Petunia should have mushrooms on her birthday next summer. Just in case however, Bunkey also found a bee house on the internet at solobee.com for her garden. Our native bees are super pollinators, 60 times more effective than honeybees and they live in holes, not hives. This bee house is a neat wood square with a spiral of various sized holes in the front with a frame around it and a multitiered roof. It would be a perfect finial for a wood post. There are two styles, the SoloBee Bungalow costs \$49.00. The larger 2 story is The SoloBee Shrine at \$119.00. These are made in California. This bee condo would be a great gift for any gardener whether she grows flowers or vegetables. An amateur carpenter could make one. This leaves Bunkey out as he can't dive a nail straight, and usually ends up in the ER if he attempts to use power tools. He did drill a hole in his jeans making the mushroom logs. No blood this time.

From other sources

If you get the Forum, you can skip this bit. Don Kinzler, a selfdescribed lifelong gardener, a NDSU Extension Horticulturist and who owned Kinzler's Greenhouse in Fargo has designed a calendar for zone 3 and 4 gardeners. He "scoured information from North Dakota State University and the University of Minnesota to be sure all the information meshed".

Many of these plants are small enough to grow in pots. A squash that weighs less than a pound is the perfect size for a one or two person family. The first four are all American Selection winners.

Patio Baby eggplant has 2 to 3-inch egg shaped fruits that turn black when ripe and mature in 45 days (from a plant started indoors). The plant is thorn less. Honey Baby squash as a 4 to 8 oz butternut type. If you like Watham, you'll







Blue Flint marks 1M hours of safety

Underwood's ethanol biorefinery is celebrating a milestone this month as it surpasses one million consecutive hours of safety.

Midwest AgEnergy, the parent company of Blue Flint, announced Monday that the plant had gone over 10 years without a "lost-time" accident. According to the press release, this kind of accident is defined as time lost due to an employee being injured on the job and therefore unable to work the next scheduled shift.

Midwest AgEnergy said the streak began in April of 2007, with all 49 employees at the biorefinery avoiding accidents for over 11 years.

"To put the one million safe work hours into context, if one person works 40 hours per week, 52 weeks per year, it would take about 481 years for that person to reach one million safe work hours," the press release stated.

How long does frozen food last?

"I have a question I've been meaning to ask you," a woman informed me one Sunday morning in church.

I took a sip of coffee and leaned closer to see if I had an answer. I figured her question might be about food because I know she reads my column.

"I have had some pumpkin bread in my freezer for about a year and I'm wondering if it is safe to eat," she continued.

"Yes, it will be safe," I responded. "The quality will depend on how well it was wrapped, though.

"How was it packaged?" I asked.

"It was wrapped in Saran wrap," she commented. "It probably will be dry and won't taste very good. I'm going to throw it.'

She answered her own question.

I think I mentioned using freezer bags in the future. Freezer bags are made of a heavier plastic that protects food better than plastic storage bags or plastic wrap. If I didn't mention it, I know my column reader will see this.

I don't want her to have to throw away her delicious quick bread next time.

Food can become forgotten in freezers and then we might decide that we don't want to eat the food. Sometimes off-flavors or colors can develop if food is not packaged in air-tight packaging.

Improperly packaged meat and

poultry tend to be the foods most likely to develop dry, grayish spots characteristic of "freezer burn." Although freezer-burned meat technically is safe to eat, you might not enjoy the off-flavors or colors that can develop.

If you buy extra meat, poultry or other foods, be aware that you can freeze it safely in the original packaging from the store. However, sometimes the store packaging is permeable to oxygen and the quality can decline quickly.

Vacuum-packaged frozen foods will maintain their quality longer. Vacuum packaging equipment is available for consumers to use at home.

If you have freezer-burned meat, you don't have to throw it away from a safety standpoint. Just cut away the "bad" parts. However, from a quality standpoint, your food may not taste very good.

Remember to always thaw meat in the refrigerator or microwave oven. Thawing meat on the counter or in the sink is not safe. Toxins can develop during improper thawing; even if you cook it thoroughly, you could become ill from improperly thawed meat.

What if you thawed some meat

and your plans change? Can you refreeze it?

Technically, you can refreeze meat if it has been kept cold (40 F), but you might expect some quality loss. Be sure to package it properly to exclude air.

A good packaging material should have the following characteristics:

* Moisture/vapor-proof or at least moisture resistant

⁴ Made of food grade material (designed to be used for food products)

* Durable and leak-proof * Doesn't become brittle and

crack at low temperatures * Resistant to oil, grease or

water * Protect foods from off-flavors and odors

* Easy to fill and seal

* Easy to mark and store

like this one. If you don't plan to make sauerkraut but like cabbage, Katrina is the one for you. She matures in 45 days, is sweet and only 4 inches around. Looking for a semi-vining cucumber? Try Parisian Gherkin. This is a true midget cucumber, only 2 to 4 inches long. It is both a pickling and slicer, although how one would slice a 2 inch cuc or even want to is beyond me. If you like the grape type tomatoes, a 2018 winner is Valentine. She is described as being exceptionally sweet, with a deep red, meaty flesh similar to a paste tomato. It matures in 55 days. This is a sprawler so don't put her in a pot. She needs to go in the garden. If you want a container tomato, Red Racer,


a "cocktail" tomato. She comes in at 2 ounces and 1/1/2 inch around. Ifyou prefer a yellow tomato Choice Yellow grows 1/2 oz. fruit on an 18 inch tall vine. If you are looking for a very small-3-inch pepper, Sweetie Pie is for you. You can pick them green or let them ripen to yellow, orange and red. Apparently the grower had a problem and mixed the 3 colored seeds together so you never know which color your peppers will ripen to. If you don't like peppers it is probably because you have only had green ones. They are like green apples, much better and sweeter when ripe. No matter the color, red, yellow, brown or orange, all ripe peppers taste very much alike so don't pay extra for an exotic color. Try a ripe one: you WILL like it.

CHERRY CHOCOLATE SCONES

11/2 c. all-purpose white flour 1 c. whole-wheat flour 1/2 c. sugar

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 Tbsp. baking powder

1/2 c. semisweet chocolate chips

1/2 c. dried cherries 13/4 c. heavy cream

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix flour, sugar, salt, baking powder, chocolate chips and dried cherries in a bowl. Make a well in the center of the mixture and add the heavy cream. Mix until all dry ingredients have been combined, then form into a large circle and flatten. Cut into 10 pieces and bake for 16 to 20 minutes.

Makes 10 servings. Each serving has 320 calories, 18 grams (g) fat, 5 g protein, 36 g carbohydrate, 1 g dietary fiber and 390 milligrams sodium.
