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Equipment malfunction leads to WRT for members outages

Being prepared is a key element in the Dakotas, especially in the winter. As WRT Network Manager Jody Murschel explained, "Imagine driving across the remote part of the plains, when all four tires blow out on your vehicle. You've likely prepared to deal with one flat tire, maybe two, but not all four, or in an area with limited cell coverage." This scenario, while not very common and incredibly unfortunate, is a simplified version comparable to WRT's recent outage that affected voice, Internet, Wi-Fi, and email services across the cooperative's territory.

At approximately 10:45 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 10, WRT experienced a major service interruption due to an equipment malfunction. The outage was caused when a power inverter malfunctioned in the central office at WRT's headquarters location in Hazen.

The power output issue set off a chain reaction that caused all three motherboards in the virtualized servers to go down. These servers are essential to providing WRT

services, including routing internet traffic, communicating with other equipment (both internally and externally), and maintaining WRT's service redundancy backups, which ensure connection to the world. WRT CEO/General Manager Troy Schilling noted, "While [WRT] was prepared for any one of these events, the combination was an anomaly, perhaps even calling it a 'fluke' situation might be appropriate, since none

of the other equipment that was powered by the same inverter was affected."

WRT employees working in conjunction with equipment vendors, network engineers, and various other entities across the state and even across the globe, worked around the clock to locate replacement equipment, as well as migrate information, data, and processing to new locations to begin the process of either keeping members' services working or working



again. The outage impacted residents and businesses throughout the WRT service area, although not everyone was affected. WRT's own internal network was also taken down, complicating communications and assisting members. Murschel added, "We were unable to answer phones or emails at the office, making it even harder to assist our members."

The length of downtime for WRT members and their services varied – across both

fiber and copper platforms – due to a variety of factors, including equipment and if any reboots were attempted. Schilling pointed out that restarting or rebooting the router, which can help solve other issues, actually exacerbated this problem, since it made it harder for the system to recognize and reconnect with that individual device.

New equipment was installed over the weekend and most services were restored by Sunday afternoon. The cooperative continues to work behind the scenes to fully restore functionality of all equipment and review the accounts of each of their 12,000 members, correcting them proactively, if needed. Murschel noted, "Our members have come to expect and deserve reliable service, we are working hard to earn that trust back."

In addition to reviewing

member accounts, WRT has installed additional equipment and processes to further ensure this type of outage doesn't happen again. "We are focused on the post-issue phase now," Schilling said. "Once members were fully restored, our immediate goal was to work on any other potential steps that could be taken to prevent similar or future issues."

Schilling thanked WRT employees and members for their positive reaction during the outage. "We have the best members in the world," he said. "We have appreciated all the loyalty and patience they have given during this time. However, we are doing everything possible to not test our members' patience again."

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Spring turkey season set, online apps available

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department is offering 6,025 wild turkey licenses for the 2019 spring hunting season, 370 more than last year.

Eleven of the 22 hunting units have more spring licenses than in 2018, seven have fewer and three remain the same. Unit 21 (Hettinger and Adams counties) is again closed in 2019 due to lack of turkeys in the unit.

Spring turkey applicants can apply online at the Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov. Applications can also be submitted by calling 800-406-6409. Paper applications are not available.

The deadline for applying is Feb. 13.

Successful spring turkey applicants must purchase a 2019-20 hunting license, as last year's 2018-19 licenses expire March 31. In addition to the spring turkey license, hunters must have a fishing, hunting and furbearer certificate, and a general game and habitat license. Also, hunters ages 16 and older must possess a small game license, or combination license. These required licenses must be purchased in advance of the successful applicant receiving the turkey license.

First-time spring turkey hunters ages 15 or younger are eligible to receive one spring license valid for any open unit. To be eligible, the youth hunter must be 15 or younger on opening day of spring turkey season, and have never received a spring turkey license in North Dakota.

Spring turkey licenses are available only to North Dakota residents. Per legislation, an additional four spring wild turkey licenses are available to the Outdoor Adventure Foundation and three to the National Wild Turkey Federation.

The spring turkey season opens April 13 and continues through May 19.
