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
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Three McLean Electric Cooperative Director Seats Up for Election ARE YOU INTERESTED IN BEING A DIRECTOR?

Gardening Tips

Winter injurys

It has been, and still is, a wild winter. To start with, it was warmer than normal, with not much snow but some pretty strong winds. Then, when it started to snow it was like Ma Nature didn't know how to shut it off. Then the cold. Yikes! All these factors will affect your plants come spring.

Let's start with the winds. They dry out the needles on evergreens, either killing them or at least making them slightly nauseated. They can just give up the ghost or just not do well all summer. Especially if it is a windy and dry early summer. There isn't much water in the snows we have had, so that is a possibility. The winds also dry out the buds on shrubs, including raspberries. This will reduce fruiting of raspberries and blooming on flowering shrubs. Wait until you are sure the branch on your shrub is totally dead before you prune it out, then cut it off at the soil level. No sense in leaving dead stems in a shrub. Sometimes shrub or trees will fool with you. They will look fine this spring, a bit less so next spring, then just up and die on you. Some trees that may be most affected are the shallow rooted ones; Norway Maple, Silver Maple, Linden, and the spruces. Birches are particularly susceptible to fall and winter drought. If they aren't killed outright, they become more susceptible to Bronze Birch Borer. Then they die. Shrubs that are planted as foundation plants may be protected from the winds but still die because the warm soil dries out quicker than cold does. They are also water starved is they are under the eaves. Water the snot out of them as soon as you can get the hose thawed out this spring.

If your strawberries weren't well mulched before the good snows started, they may turn up their toes this spring. To tell if they need to be tilled under, pull



a damaged one out and cut the root in half. If it's white, they will live and do well. If there are any brown steaks or mushiness, they are compost. Fruit trees that have been planted within the last year or two could be damaged beyond hope between the wind and sudden

extreme cold temperatures. Again, don't get in a hurry to pull the tree out. Wait until June at least to see if there may be a bit of life left. Of course, if it only has 2 live branches on it, chip it up. It will spice up the flavor of your barbequed steaks.

One bug that should be treated

in early spring is Iris Borer. If the leaves of your iris developed brown streaks and eventually died or if you dug a rhizome up and put your finger right through a snotty root, you have borers. You should have cut all the iris leaves off last fall and bagged them. If you didn't, remove as many as you can in the early spring, then treat the new growth with Spinosad. This is a metabolite produced by the fermentation of a soil dwelling bacterium. It has low toxicity to mammals, but will kill moths, like the borer and butterflies, so do be careful when you spray. You should re-treat in 10 or 14 days for best results.

Even though this article sounds pretty grim for shrubs, trees and fruit, old Ma Nature always has a few tricks up her sleeve, so don't despair-yet anyway.

Clean windsheilds, a very bad thing

Washing bugs off the car's Windshield is usually a messy, icky job. But did you notice last summer that you didn't have to do it as often? While humans may find fewer bugs a blessing, our birds go hungry. Recent studies in Canada found there were fewer tree swallows in the summer than in previous years. Tree swallows live exclusively on flying insects. Fewer flying bugs to eat or feed their babies meant fewer tree swallows.

The National Academy of Sciences, in an October report, documented a dramatic insect decline worldwide. A study done in Puerto Rico in 2012 found that the decline of beg eating birds

were the result of a similar decline of insects they ate. Compared with data from 1976 showing the amount of insect had fallen by 99%. The scientist attributed the decline to the rise in temperatures of 4 degrees. Apparently, bugs don't adapt to temperature changes. They can't regulate their internal temperatures leading to lower sperm counts and a reduction in sperm motility. You didn't know that bud had sperm? (me either).

So why should we care about Puerto Rico's bugs and birds? Minnesota is also getting warmer and unlike the island of Puerto Rico, our bugs can and do just move north to cool off, taking the insect eating birds with them. Our song birds either eat seeds or insects, although some eat fruit. But, almost all of them rely on bugs to feed their babies. Insects are high in protein and fat needed to support the rapid growth of nestlings. We have a short summer, and the birds must be mature enough to take care of themselves before they migrate in the fall.

Surprising enough, habitat changes and pesticides weren't the major influences on insect numbers, only rising temperatures. Not only are birds affected, populations of bug eating animals are also on the decline. Another change we are apt to see in the northern states is the decline of some of our favorite trees. Birches and some of the conifers don't do well in warmer temps either. And how about fish in shallower waters. Will we hook them precooked?

Now for a total change of subject. Have you ever thought of seed not being organic? If the seedbearing plant grows in soil that has been amended with chemicals, apparently the seed has some of those chemicals in it too. Who'd a thought! Here are a few the Minnesota Gardener Magazine found. Cool customer cucumber,

said to be better than Northern Pickling. Galaxy tomato, these were bred for flavor and to resist cracking. Included is Supernova, a mini red Roma, Midnight, a pear tomato, and 3 grape types. Comet, a red, Stargazer, an orange, and Starlight, a yellow one. For a larger tomato, Wisconsin 55, an old favorite, released in 1946 by the University of Wisconsin, is the only one considered organic.

A pea that only has a number-PLS 595, is organic. Not a bad thing as we do eat the seeds. If you like rutabaga, Waldoboro Green Neck was supposedly rescued from a ship wreck off the coast of Maine. Bunkey says they should have left it in the wreck, but if you eat them, this one has especially sweet flavor and pretty purple leaves. Good luck finding any of these, but there were organic seeds sold locally in the "Man's Toy Store" (you know the one I mean) two years ago.

One gorgeous vine

No matter if you pronounce it clah-mat-is or clem-a tis, this vine in full bloom is spectacular. This is one plant that likes our alkaline soil. It likes a pH of 7 to 7.5, right where much of our soil is. Here are a few things you need to do to ensure your vine will live long and prosper.

First, of course, is proper planting. Get your shovel out. This baby needs a big hole, about 18 inches deep and wide. Add compost for moisture retention, then set the plant deep with the first two leaf nodes below the soil surface. This is to encourage the plant to send up more stems for a fuller vine. There is an old saying about clematis. It wants a warm head and cold feet. You can accomplish this in two ways: Plant taller annuals about 8 to 10 inches from the base of the vine to shade the roots, and/or mulch the soil around the base keeping the mulch from touching the plant. Mulching

or planting too close can lead to root rot and a loss of the plant. Next is pruning. Keep the tag that comes with the vine. That should tell you if it is A, B or C.

A's don't die back in the winter, and bloom in early spring. The flowers are small, often less than 2 inches across, but they make up for it by large numbers of them. If this is a new plant and it has gotten winter damage, wait until new leaf buds sprout out on the stems. Then, starting at the top, cut back the vines to where you find green under the brown outer bark. If the buds are weak and don't show growth in a few weeks, you may need to cut it back a bit more. If it is an older plant that is just not blooming as well as it should, you need to take more drastic measures. After the vines flower, cut off almost all of the side branches leaving only the main vertical stems. If you get wild and cut it down to the ground, you will destroy the shape of your vine and it may not bloom until next spring.

Now to group B. These are the re-bloomers and the double flowering types. They tend to get very tall, 10 to 12 feet. This makes it important to have a trellis that tall; otherwise, when the vine gets to the top of the trellis, it begins to flop over into a tangled mess. This is a good companion to roses as their pruning requirements are similar. Wait until the vines leaf out in the spring then remove any dead stems and do a light pruning to keep the vine trained to the trellis. The first bloom is on old wood. Late summer, new wood will produce blooms again, but they will be smaller.

Group C includes the popular Jackmanii. This is the dark purple clematis often found covering the east side of a house. Another of this group is Sweet Autumn. She will get 20 feet tall. She can be used for a ground cover as any place

the stems touch the soil, they take root. The shorter varieties can be trained up a tree or shrubs, like a lilac. This will confuse your non-gardening friends as you will have a shrub that blooms twice a year but with totally different flowers. This is by far the easiest of the clematis to prune. Since they bloom on new wood, simply whack the whole thing down to about a foot in the spring. This will prevent the bare legs look and ensure the flowers will be as large as they should be.

Proper pruning depends on the type of vine you are growing. This should be a lesson to you to keep a folder with the tags of any perennial plant, shrub or tree you have. It will also make the people in the Extension office less apt to tear their hair out after your visit to have us tell you what that apple is, or to identify what that shrub is by looking at a picture on your phone. Just can't be done.



Is anyone else anxious for spring?

"I know how you feel," she said. I didn't look sad or dejected, by the way. I laughed and kept adding more items to my cart.

What was I loading in my cart? I'll give you a hint: I was in a hardware and home goods store.

I didn't have my cart filled with candy, chips and soda, which you might find in that type of retail

I was picking out packets of flower and vegetable seeds, and seed-starting media. I want to grow things.

What would you expect from someone who has "Garden" as part of her name?

In the Midwest and across much of the U.S., we have had a long, cold, snowy winter. I think we are ready for some grass spears and leaves to begin appearing.

Although we can't begin planting outdoors, at least in North Dakota, we can start seeds

If you are not thinking about growing vegetables or flowers to plant outdoors, maybe a

houseplant would provide some greenery in contrast with our white-coated outdoor world. Check out the new "Trendy and Healthy Houseplants" webinar on the Field to Fork website for more information.

You'll note that house plants do more than beautify your indoor environment. They help purify your indoor air. In fact, according to scientists at NASA, Pennsylvania State University and the University of Georgia, house plants can absorb volatile organic compounds, including benzene and formaldehyde from plastics, detergents and other chemicals.

You also can enhance your plate with colorful plant material at any time of the year. Fruits and vegetables are available in canned, dried, frozen and fresh forms, and they all count toward the recommended daily amount (at least $4 \frac{1}{2}$ total cups daily).

March is designated as National Nutrition Month by the Academy

of Nutrition and Dietetics. This is a good time to think about what we put on our plate and perhaps growing some of the food.

Yes or No: Do you meet the recommendation for fruits and vegetables (at least 4 1/2 cups daily)?

* Yes or No: Do you select more healthful options when eating away from home?

Yes or No: Are you mindful of portion sizes?

Yes or No: Do you help reduce food waste by considering the foods you have on hand before buying more at the store?

Yes or No: Do you make food safety part of your everyday

Maintenance projects proceed

New carpet is set to be installed at the sheriff's office soon, and new lighting fixtures could be on their way for the courthouse.

McLean Commissioners approved a carpet $in stallation for the McLean \, County$ Sheriff's Department during last week's meeting, authorizing the new floor surfacing for one office.

The carpet should help absorb some noise from the boiler room, maintenance supervisor Curt Malo said. Malo said he attempted to get information from local suppliers, but after being unsuccessful, got a quote from Lowe's.

The carpet is priced at \$2,197, with half the cost covered by the state. The commission approved a motion to authorize the purchase.

Malo also presented three estimates for new lighting fixtures for the courthouse, noting that bulbs are frequently burning out when lights power on.

Malo said the new fixtures will have 20 watt LED bulbs, which are less expensive than the current 150 watt bulbs.

"Could save well over \$100 bucks a month," Commissioner Steve Lee said.

Malo said he was interested in a specific fixture for the courthouse, and that the quote from Weber Electric didn't use the same model.

Malo said he would get a new estimate from Weber, who is the most local contractor, and bring it back to the commission.






