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

There is no such thing as a brown thumb

Bunkey's niece just moved into her first apartment. She thought it looked cold and bare, so she went to a local grocery store and bought a cart full of house plants. It is now 3 months later and half of them have given up the ghost. "Uncle Bunk, I think I've got a brown thumb." 'No, you just picked the wrong plants for your conditions. And, you didn't read the instructions that came with them. You have north and west windows, and, like most new house plant mom's, you over watered them. Let's go shopping for plants that will thrive in your windows." This is what they came home with. For the north window, several ferns. They do well in low light and appreciate the cooler temperatures there. She also got a

start of her grandma's Christmas cactus. It likes a cooler spot so the north window will be ok, but it will need more light before it will bloom. The west window is a perfect spot for succulent. They love the hot bright light. For a big accent, she got a fiddle leaf fig. It will stand near the west window for now. Eventually it will need a new home, as these can become huge.

Now that the plants are in their proper places, Bunkey gives Verna a watering lesson. "Read the instructions on those succulent plants. What does it say about watering?" "Ahh, water rarely. What does that mean, every week or every month or what?" Notice the thick leaves, they are water holding machines. When they are nice and fat, they are full of water, f they start getting wrinkled, they are too dry. Right now, right from the nursery, they are just right. So, stick your finger into the soil to see how wet it really is. Not very much, is it? Never let it get wetter than that and most of all don't water

on a schedule. Now to the ferns. They will need more water, but again, only if your finger, buried to the first knuckle touches dry soil. Never let any plant sit in water. It rots the roots. Plant all plants in pots that have a drain and empty the saucer 20 minutes after you water.

Later, a boyfriend gave Verna a sansevieria, known more commonly as mother in law's tongue. At least he gave her the smaller version as the tall ones can really get to be ugly. They grow slowly but you can tell when they need repotting, as they will break out the side of a pot if it is too tight. This plant is almost impossible to kill. Even overwatering it as it will just take what it needs and let the rest drain out. It is a low light girl. In a bright light it burns but just keeps growing.

Growing house plants has nothing to do with brown or green thumbs. It's a question of care. Of learning what works, observing what doesn't and just muddling along with the survivors. The sad truth is that like all living things, house plants die. Those you don't destroy by accident you might have to kill. Euthanasia is unavoidable and murder is par for the course. If it's ugly, kill the darn thing. Be brave. They aren't

Is your philodendron droopy? Has your prayer plant given up the ghost? Is your spider plant full of spiders - the live crawly kind? If your house plants look like you should call a floral ambulance, don't despair, help is here.

The first step in reviving a cruddy looking house plant is a good shower. If you didn't repot the plant with fresh potting soil last fall, dump it out of the pot, wash all the soil off the roots and put the whole naked plant in the sink, or tub, if it is huge, and give it a good bath with slightly warm water. Be sure to get the underside of the leaves. Look carefully at the roots. White roots are alive. There should not be any brown, dry or slimy roots. Cut them off.

Now is the time to divide the plant if it is too big. If repotting in

Are you dreaming of spring? With the warmer temperatures and the snow melting it's beginning to look like spring will actually arrive at some point this year. I love to garden and work outdoors with flowers so each winter I start dreaming of warmer weather, fresh vegetables and colorful flowers attracting bees and butterflies. Every year the arrival of plant and seed catalogs in the mail seems to be encouraging these thoughts with the color pictures of tomatoes and dahlias on their front cover. Even though there is still ice on the lakes, now is the time to be planning your garden for the coming year and it's not too late to start your vegetable or flower seeds inside, especially as the weather warms up!! There are a few key pieces of information that will help you be successful this spring. Here are some tips to starting seeds inside:

- Lighting is key. If you have too little light or it is too far above the seedlings they will reach for light resulting in long, weak stems that are prone to falling over. In the spring when I start seedlings I use grow light bulbs and have them roughly 1-2" above the tops of the seedlings. As the seedlings grow I slowly move the light up so I have strong stems for my vegetables and flowers.
- Use a high quality potting mix, not garden dirt, to start seedlings in. I often see people starting seedlings or growing houseplants in dirt brought in from the garden. Often that dirt has weed seeds, insects or diseases that can negatively affect the growing seedlings. The dirt can also turn into a rock after being watered just a couple times. You can buy a seed starting mix or use regular potting soil to start your seeds in. I've also used the peat pellets to start seedlings in as well and they work well for short term seed starting. Keep the soil slightly moist, but not overly wet. Too much moisture will encourage diseases.
- Transitioning the seedlings outside is key. The first year I started seedlings I had some beautiful tomatoes and marigolds which promptly burned when I moved them outside. Inside I have started to use a fan on low to strengthen the stems and get the seedlings used to wind. Once temperatures warm up I stick my seedlings outside in a protected location where they will only get a few hours of morning sun at a time then slowly lengthen the amount of light they are exposed to till they are getting full sun.

As you start your seeds this spring be sure to check the frost free date in your area and use that to help determine when you need to be starting seeds. In Washburn our average Frost Free date is approximately April 19. With just a little patience and work you can get a head start on your garden for the spring!!! Reflect on your food choices during National Nutrition Month

Only 25 percent of the U.S. population consumes adequate amounts of fruits and vegetables. Does that percentage include you? If not, that is OK. Small changes can add up to big improvements in our health.

Socially, we have become invested in health and nutrition. You hear about the next best diet on the local news station, your Facebook friend sells a new product, and meanwhile, your cousin tells you that sugar is the key to living longer. We are consumed by several different recommendations and guidelines, so how do we know what we really should be eating?

Nutrition is a science. The topic consistently is being researched to ensure optimal health. One thing we do know is that a magic pill and cure-all diets just do not exist. Finding reliable sources is important when looking for nutritional advice.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture created a guide to

healthful eating called My Plate (choosemyplate.gov). The guide separates the plate into five categories, which represent all the food groups. The five groups are fruit, vegetables, grains, protein

Despite the fact that you should eat from all the food groups, you should put an emphasis on fruits and vegetables. Healthful eating patterns that include vegetables and fruit are associated with a decreased risk of Type 2 diabetes and heart disease.

Half of your plate should be filled with an array of colorful fruits and vegetables. Fresh, frozen, canned and dried fruits and vegetables all count in helping us meet that guideline.

Fruits and vegetables add flavor and texture to a meal. Fruit is naturally sweet and can reduce the amount of added sugar sources you consume. Vegetables taste great in cold or hot dishes, and make a delicious snack and an easy side dish.

During March, which is National Nutrition Month, reflect on the food you typically eat. Where could you add in extra fruits and vegetables? Start with one meal at a time and focus on including more produce in place

of other less healthful options.

Here are some ideas to help you increase your fruit and vegetable

- For safety, rinse all produce under running water before
- Keep colorful fruit and vegetables where you can see and grab them easily for an on-

the-go snack.

- Fill your freezer with frozen vegetables to steam for an easy side dish.
- Blend fruits and vegetables into a smoothie.
- Use vegetables as pizza
- Replace chips with a crunchy vegetable and low-fat dressing.

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

hen the Wilton Food Pantry opened in October of 2013, the volunteers behind the effort had no idea what they were

"When we first started, we thought maybe 12 families a month," Pastor Paul Schauer said. "It's double that and sometimes triple that. We really underestimated the need."

In 2018 alone, the pantry gave out just over 25,000 pounds of food, or roughly 9,000 meals.

Schauer, who works with a group of volunteers to keep the pantry running smoothly, said he's been blown away by the amount of traffic at the food pantry.

"New people come each month," Schauer said.

The pantry, located at the Wilton Senior Center on Dakota Avenue, distributes pre-sorted boxes of frozen and non-perishable food on the third Thursday of each month. Schauer said volunteers get together to sort out the boxes in the basement of the building in order to prepare for distribution each month.

We usually get anywhere between 1,000 and 1,500 pounds of food at a time," Schauer said. "There will be six of us down here when the truck comes and a half

hour later everything is put away."

Schauer said the pantry is stocked each month by Great Plains Food Bank and by community donations. He said donations tend to peak in November and December, then slowly wane through the summer, but that the community is always responsive

"Last year we were running low on funds, and we put the word out and within a few weeks, he had enough money to get through," Schauer said.

Schauer said the pantry feeds people from Wilton, Regan, Wing, Tuttle and Baldwin primarily, but that anyone is welcome.

"There are no eligibility

requirements and no one is turned away," Schauer said. "There's not really a stereotype about who is using the food pantry. It's a little bit of everyone."
Schauer said the pantry is a

labor of love, requiring a lot of man hours to organize and distribute the food, but that it's all worth it on distribution days.

'If you were here on distribution days and you saw the smile on people's faces, and the gratefulness, that part is amazing to me," Schauer said.

For Schauer, keeping the Wilton Food Pantry running is part of being a good Christian.

"Jesus told us to feed the hungry," Schauer said. "That's the ultimate reason why we do it."

Schauer said any checks for the food pantry should be written out to Sunne Lutheran Church, with the food pantry noted in the memo line.

Where's your food thermometer?

"Hi, I'm Julie. What's your name?" I asked the woman sitting at the table at a food safety conference.

She responded with her name and place of work, and asked me where I work.

"I work at North Dakota State University," I replied.

"I went to college there," she said enthusiastically.

"What was your major?" I

"I majored in food science and minored in food safety almost 20 years ago," she said.

"I must have been your instructor," I replied as I held up my name badge.

I was feeling fairly ancient now. I've worked with a lot of students in the past couple of decades.

"Yes, you were my instructor," she noted. "I have a story about you that you would not know."

I was wondering where we were headed with a story about me. I was young back then. What had I done in class?

"I remember you coming to a restaurant with your family where I worked," she said. "It was 'two for Tuesday' burgers.

This person had an incredible memory. My kids would have been 1 and 4 back then.

"We had burgers going back to the kitchen because they were undercooked," she said. "I told the cooks that they could not undercook the burgers for my food safety instructor! I told them they better use a food thermometer."

I laughed when I heard the story. Obviously, our burgers were sufficiently cooked.

Unfortunately, as I learned in our conference talks, many people still undercook or overcook meat. Undercooking is a safety issue, while overcooking is a quality

So, I need to ask my readers a couple of questions: Where is your food thermometer? When was the last time you used it?

If you don't have a food thermometer, you need to get one. I make this recommendation based on what I heard from research scientists, regulators and educators at the national food safety conference.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Food and Drug Administration, only about one out of three people uses a food thermometer when cooking hamburgers.

Using a food thermometer doesn't mean that you are cooking food to a blackened, rubbery state. Food thermometers ensure safety and quality. Here are the temperature rules from the USDA:

 Hamburgers, sausages and other ground meats should reach 160 F.

• All poultry should reach a minimum of 165 F.

• Whole cuts of pork, lamb, veal and beef should be cooked to 145 F, as measured by a food thermometer placed in the thickest part of the meat, and allowed to rest for three minutes before eating. A "rest time" is the amount of time the product remains at the final temperature after it has been removed from a grill, oven or other heat source. During the three minutes after meat is removed from the heat source, its temperature remains constant or continues to rise, which destroys pathogens.

Fish should be cooked to

 Meat and poultry cooked on a grill often browns very fast on the outside. By using a food thermometer, you can be sure items have reached a safe minimum internal temperature needed to destroy any harmful bacteria that may be present.

I told my husband the story of meeting one of my students.

"You never know the influence you have on someone," he commented.

I thought back to our early parenting adventures with an infant and toddler in tow, braving a restaurant and child seats. We even added a third child along the way during the past two decades.

We always have had several food thermometers in our kitchen drawer, and they get used daily.

Here's a fun recipe that a child or grandchild could help you make.

STUFFED BELL PEPPERS

3/4 c. brown rice

1 Tbsp. canola oil or other cooking oil

1/2 small onion, minced

1 tsp. garlic, minced

2 Tbsp. fresh cilantro, chopped 1 pound extra-lean ground beef

1 tsp. cumin powder

2 Tbsp. Italian seasoning 1/2 c. tomato paste

1 c. low-sodium chicken broth 1/4 c. cheddar cheese, shredded

3 large bell peppers (red, green or yellow)

Prepare brown rice according to package instructions. Preheat oven to 400 F. Heat oil in a pan over medium heat; add onion, garlic and cilantro. Saute for two minutes. Add the ground beef and brown with cumin and Italian seasoning. Add tomato paste and 1/2 c. of the chicken broth, and simmer five minutes. Stir in the cooked rice and cheese. Cut the top off the bell peppers and remove seeds.

Place the peppers standing up in a baking pan. Fill each pepper with the beef mixture. Pour the remaining chicken broth into the pan. Cover top of pan with aluminum foil and bake at 400 F for 35 minutes. Be sure the internal temperature of the meat and rice mixture is at least 160 F.

Makes six servings. Each serving (1/2 stuffed pepper) has 260 calories, 9 grams (g) fat, 20 g protein, 22 g carbohydrate, 4 g fiber and 220 milligrams sodium.

the same pot, be sure the container is very clean. Scrape off any white minerals that have stuck to the rim. You may need to use vinegar or a lime remover to do the job. Once the container is clean, and the plant is re-potted, water it until water runs freely from the bottom of the pot. This ensures that there are no air holes that will kill any roots that hit them. Now, get nasty with the scissors. If it is a vine, remove any vine that has "poodle tailed". That is there are leaves only on the end of the vine. Cut it back either to the soil level or back to where there are leaves all the way down. If you end up with nothing, don't get your knickers in a knot. It will re-grow and fill out quite rapidly.

Upright plants should have any dead or dying leaves removed and if it has gotten lanky from too little sun, you can cut it down, too. Do move it to better quarters after it shows signs of life.

If the plant had bugs, there are two ways to go. Scale is very difficult to get rid of. Better to discard the plant before it contaminates your other plants. Mealy bugs and spider mites can be treated. Do isolate them until they are bugless - unless you don't mind the whole jungle full of creepy crawlers.

If you have had bugs in the soilfungus gnats - removing all the soil from the house, including what is on the roots of the plant, washing the pot and replanting in fresh potting soil takes care of that problem. It is often caused from overwatering so don't do that anymore.

Most house plants die either from over or under watering rather than from diseases. Forget scheduled watering. To properly water most house plants, stick your finger in the pot. If it is dry down to the first joint of your finger, water, not before. A droopy faded looking plant is usually yelling for water. A just droopy plant may be overwatered. Treat your plants with T.L.C. and they will reward you with cleaner air and a more welcoming




