Gardening Tips

Not your grandma's flower BY BEV JOHNSON M.G.

Petunia's granny had windowsills full of plants, many of them African violets. To a small girl, it looked like a jungle and she wanted no part of it. She liked things neat and tidy and granny's plants were anything but. Petunia is a bit of a snob

and always wants to not just keep up with the Jones's, but to outdo them. So, when some of her friends started to display beautiful pots of blooming African violets, she invested in her own collection. Before she bought plants, she needed to know how to keep them healthy and blooming. Taking a page from Bunkey's playbook, she went next door to ask Master Gardener George for his advice on where and how to grow them.

George, being George, started with a history lesson.

Baron Walter von Saint Paul-Illaire, a district commissioner in East Africa, collected some plants growing among the shady rocky ledges in the mountains of Tanzania in 1892. He sent samples of the hairy leaved plants with the pretty blue flowers back to his father in Germany. Dad had connections to the Royal Botanical Garden near Hanover. The director.

Hermann Wendland, gave them a fancy Latin name (you really don't need to know it). Eventually 20 other species were found in East Africa. The new flower was introduced to the U.S. in 1926 and soon made their way into ordinary homes, like Petunia's granny. In 1946, the African Violet Society of America was founded to promote the plant and educate the public in how to care for them and their popularity exploded.

African violets are an easy care plant. They do well in apartments as well as houses. They flower in low light conditions and are easily propagated. They thrive with consistent treatment. They prefer a north or east exposure. Too much light produces leaves that are leathery, small, crinkled and yellow. Not enough and the leaves are thin, darker in color



LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Tackling the budget the 50 million for a Roosevelt center at Medora. Frankly I

The house appropriations committee has been quite busy lately, trying to get all the budget bills and policies money bills through the committee.

We have some challenges getting through the session with not only a balanced budget for this time, but trying to be sure what is done now is sustainable into the future. Somehow it seems that a lot of people and lobbyists seem to believe there is no end to the resources available. Not true. As always there is more demands for dollars than is available. Prioritizing is always difficult and even more so when there are as many requests as this session.

The legislature will have a balanced budget without major tax increases. Always one of our biggest goals needs to be setting policies which allow each of us the opportunity to accomplish our personal goals and better ourselves. It should always be our number one goal as legislators to do the best we can for the taxpayers of the state, not necessarily the government or political subdivisions.

We will be into conference committees now till we finish. There will be some fairly big differences between the house and senate to work out. We did settle the pay and inflators for the biennia. We are trying to help the lower paid employees more than the higher paid employees this time around.

There are still desires to build buildings at campuses. The governor is still pushing center at Medora. Frankly I do not believe we should be investing state money there when we have other more important issues and needs. Most presidential centers are all private money, if they can get resources to build it fine, but my feeling is to keep it private. We will have to see what the full legislature would do with it. The house has not forwarded anything but I hear the senate may try to fund it.

Veto override fails

Legislative day 61 has come and gone and the Legislature is still pushing to get bills acted on. We did have a pretty good week though and acted on 64 bills in the House. Even better, all the committees except appropriations and the new ethics committee finished up their committee work. Appropriations is always last just due to the amount of work they have to deal with before actually being able to start kicking bills out. Plus other committees that deal with policy items sometimes must forward bills to Appropriations because the policy bill contains an expenditure of over 5,000 dollars.

But now the conference committee work starts in earnest. I've already been assigned to five conference committees and have to chair three of those so I won't have much slack time until those get settled. If interested, they are HB 1045 dealing with blockchain technology which is a relatively new highly secure electronic communication method, HB 1123 is an insurance bill dealing with fire protection codes, HB 1095 deals with job security for national guard members, SB 2306 deals with military spouse professional licensing, and SB 2221 deals with confidential legislator communications.

A fairly rare vote was an attempt to override the governor's veto of SB 2244 which would have increased the drivers license fee. The fee increase would have provided the Department of Transportation approximately 5 million dollars each two years, which they wanted to use for road work funds. The Senate did vote to override the veto which takes a two-thirds vote in both houses, but the house failed to get the two-thirds.

SB 2321 was another interesting bill to set in law what was an initiated measure from the last election. The bill allows volunteer emergency responders and volunteer firefighters to have one set of red license plates which also allows them free entrance into state parks. Part of the work on this bill included setting definitions in place for who is eligible to receive the plates and for how long. The bill passed easily in the House but had been slightly amended and could end up in another conference committee if the Senate does not agree with the change.

According to the bylaws, any member of McLean Electric Cooperative who is a member of this cooperative as a bona fide resident of the district he/she represents and is in no way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, can become a candidate for the board of directors. Directors shall be elected by the members at large at the MEC annual meeting on June 18, 2019 in

Directors have a fiduciary responsibility to the cooperative. They exercise care, time and responsibility in reviewing cooperative matters. Directors treat cooperative business as if it were their own. Directors devote a certain amount of time to the cooperative. At a minimum, a director attends each monthly board meeting. Directors learn about the industry as a whole by reading other materials and by attending state and national meetings. An understanding of the issues facing the industry is vital. To help directors with their responsibilities, training is offered through the electric cooperative's statewide organization. Courses cover director duties and liabilities, understanding the electric business, board roles and relationships, strategic planning and financial decision making. Directors currently serving the cooperative find the duty extremely rewarding.

Garlic Chicken Stir Fry

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons peanut oil
- 6 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon grated fresh ginger
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound boneless skinless
- chicken breasts strips
- 2 onions, thinly sliced
- 1 cup sliced cabbage
- 1 red bell pepper, thin sliced
- 2 cups sugar snap peas
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons white sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch



Directions

- 1. Heat peanut oil in a wok or large skillet. When oil begins to smoke, quickly stir in 2 cloves minced garlic, ginger root, green onions and salt. Stir fry until onion becomes translucent, about 2 minutes.
- 2. Add chicken and stir until opaque, about 3 minutes. Add remaining 4 cloves minced garlic and stir. Add sweet onions, cabbage, bell pepper, peas and 1/2 cup of the broth/water and cover.
- 3. In a small bowl, mix the remaining 1/2 cup broth/water, soy sauce, sugar and cornstarch. Add sauce mixture to wok/skillet and stir until chicken and vegetables are coated with the thickened sauce. Serve immediately, over hot rice if desired.

Spring Rolls

Ingredients

- 2 ounces dry soy vermicelli
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 ounces mushrooms, drained and chopped
- 3/4 (4 ounce) can small shrimp, drained and chopped
- 1 pound lean ground pork
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 carrot, shredded
- 2 ounces crabmeat
- 3 ounces bean sprouts
- 2 pinches ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons fish sauce
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 20 rice wrappers (6.5 inch diameter)
- 1 quart oil for deep frying

Directions

- 1. Soak the vermicelli 30 minutes in warm water; drain.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix the vermicelli, eggs, onion, mushrooms, shrimp, pork, vegetable oil, carrot, crabmeat, bean sprouts, pepper, soy sauce, fish sauce and garlic.
- 3. One by one, moisten the rice wrappers with a damp tea towel and fill with 2 to 3 tablespoons of the vermicelli mixture. Roll the wrappers, and allow them to set for 30 minutes
- 4. In a large saucepan, heat the oil to 375 degrees F.
- 5. Fry the spring rolls one or two at a time until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Drain on paper towels.



Prairie Fare

What would you do in a disaster involving food?

I always will remember the sound of a freight train roaring through my small Minnesota hometown at about 3 a.m. the morning after the Fourth of July holiday.

The holiday had been very hot and humid, and we had stayed up late lighting

I had my windows open, and my drapes began flying around my bedroom, covering me with an extra layer of fabric. My family hurried downstairs as the sound of the train became louder and louder. By the time

we reached our kitchen, the

sound of the train had quieted.

However, the sound wasn't from a train. We had survived a devastating tornado, which resulted in many injuries and several deaths. Homes were upended, 100-year-old trees were uprooted, leaving large craters in lawns, and businesses literally were blown away. Debris was scattered for miles

We had no power for several days, but fortunately, many people came to help from all over the region. Recovering from the devastation took months, if not years.

Most people have been touched by disasters at some point in their lives, whether from fires, hurricanes, tornadoes and/or floods.

Lately, flooding has been on the minds of many in the Midwest. I have received some calls from neighboring states when floodwaters have flowed over food and equipment in kitchens.

Let's try some scenarios,

a good idea.

1. Let's say you are anticipating a flood situation. What are some items you will want to have in place in the event of power outages if you are able to stay in your home?

are able to stay in your home?

2. A worst-case scenario has happened, and flooding has reached the main floor of your home, including your cupboards. What flooded food must you discard?

3. Your commercially and home-canned foods have encountered floodwaters. Can they be saved?

4. Floodwaters washed over wooden spoons and pacifiers stored in a basement. Can they

Here are some things to consider:

1. Be sure to have an adequate supply of food (enough to last at least four days), and move any food stored in a basement storage room to the main floor. Have emergency cooking equipment with propane or other fuel available, along with flashlights, batteries, candles, matches and a fire extinguisher.

Remember that every person in your household needs about a gallon of water a day. In preparation for a power failure, turn your refrigerator and freezer to colder settings. In the event of power outages, you can use dry ice to maintain the temperature of refrigerated food. However, be sure to handle dry ice carefully because it measures minus 216 F. Wear gloves or use tongs, and follow other safety precautions.

2. Most food that has encountered floodwaters must be discarded because the water can carry raw sewage, oil, chemical wastes and other contaminants. Therefore, discard meat, poultry, fish, eggs, fresh produce, foods in cardboard boxes or with cardboard seals (such as many salad dressings or mayonnaise), spices, opened containers, flour, sugar, grains, coffee (in canisters) and food in glass jars.

3. Undamaged commercially canned goods that encounter floodwaters are safe if you properly sanitize the containers. However, home-canned foods should be discarded because floodwaters could seep under the seals.

To clean commercially processed cans of food, wash the top of the can and dry. Next, write the contents on the can with an indelible ink marker because you do not want the contents to be a surprise later. Remove the can labels because paper can harbor dangerous bacteria. Next, wash the cans in a strong detergent solution and rinse. Finally, immerse the containers for 15 minutes in a bleach-water solution.

References vary on the concentration of the bleach solution to use, but 2 tablespoons of unscented bleach per gallon of water is typical for surfaces that do not come in contact with food. Finally, allow to air-dry. To sanitize surfaces that come in contact with food, 1 tablespoon of unscented bleach per gallon is the typical concentration.

4. Discard items made

4. Discard items made from porous materials that encountered floodwaters. These items include wooden spoons, plastic pacifiers and plastic baby bottles.

Raisin Power Poppers

2 c. old-fashioned oats

1 c. creamy peanut butter (or sunflower or other nut butter) 1/2 c. honey

1/4 tsp. vanilla extract 3/4 c. raisins (chopped in half or thirds)

1/4 c. chia seeds (can substitute ground flaxseed)

Mix all ingredients in a medium- to large-size mixing bowl. Chill ingredients in refrigerator for one hour. Roll into tight balls (a little smaller than a golf ball, about a tablespoon in size). Store in an airtight container in refrigerator up to seven days.

Makes 40 servings. Each serving has 90 calories, 4 grams (g) fat, 3 g protein, 11 g carbohydrate, 1 g fiber and 50 milligrams sodium.

and while the plant may grow well, it will not flower well. They want a moist well drained soil. It is best to water then from the bottom as water on the hairy leaves can damage them. Too much water and the plant will rot, just like any other house plant. There are soil mixes and fertilizers made just for violets.

Petunia started her collection with a double pink flowered violet. They also come with variegated foliage, pointed, quilled, spooned and ruffled leaves. Flowers can be blue, pink, violet, purple, white, orchid, reddish-pink and bi-colored. They tend to "sport" or mutate.

To start a new plant, slice a mature leaf stem at a 45 degree angle. Dip it in root compound and then into potting mix. Water every 3 or 4 days. Be patient as the plant is working hard underground to develop roots. Only then it will send up new leaves at the base of the leaf. This girl likes company so she will grow daughters, soon filling the pot with multiple plants. Pull the whole mess out and, using a sharp knife, cut the plants apart, right through the crown and root. The new plant's crown should be just above the surface of the soil.

Even brown thumbed Petunia was able to grow healthy violets. She eventually had 10 of the most exotic ones she could find. Of course, being Petunia, soon tired of the "mess" they made and gave the whole lot away as gifts to her green thumbed friends.


