Those hot summer days can wreak havoc on your pastures, gardens and crop land, but did you know that they can also cause serious problems with your ponds, water sources and even the places your kids go to swim to beat the heat? By the end of June this year we already had one livestock pond test high and another at risk for a harmful algae bloom with Cyanobacteria. Every year we have livestock, pets and even people get sick or die due to these Harmful Algae blooms. Let's take a look at why they are so dangerous.

Blue-green algae or cyanobacteria is a naturally occurring photosynthetic bacteria that can commonly be found in many of the lakes, ponds, watering holes or slow moving streams around the state. Under normal circumstances this bacteria is fairly harmless however under certain conditions the bacteria can multiply quickly forming the "blooms" that can cause major problems. All that is needed is a combination of warm temperatures, calm winds and the right nutrients (Phosphorus and Nitrogen) can lead to blooms that can literally appear overnight. Most algae blooms are visible to the naked eye. They tend to be green to blue-green in color and can look like blue, green or white paint spilled on top of the water. Most people describe the blooms as "pond scum." Occasionally blue-green algae can also make the water look like pea soup. Regular algae also forms mats on top of the water that are green in color, but it is not dangerous and produces no toxins. When in doubt avoid contact with any water covered in algae or that has a scum on the surface.

The blue-green algae isn't what our major source of concern is. While the blooms can cause some problems such as reducing the amount of light in the water, giving the water taste and odor problems and reducing the amount of dissolved oxygen available, the true problem for humans and livestock lies in the toxins



usually appear within 15 to 20 minutes after ingestion. In animals, symptoms include weakness, staggering, difficulty in breathing, convulsions and ultimately death. In humans, symptoms may include numbress of the lips, tingling in fingers and toes, and dizziness. Signs of liver poisoning may take hours or days to appear. Liver toxins can cause abdominal pain, diarrhea and vomiting in humans and death in animals. There is no antidote for this toxin and the best treatment is prevention. It is advised that if you see an algae bloom you keep all livestock and pets away from the area to be safe. If you or your pet do accidentally swim in water that might have had cyanobacteria make sure you wash off with fresh water as quickly as possible. Remember that children are at a higher risk for illness because they are smaller and can get a relatively larger dose of toxin in a short period of time. If you suspect that you might have a bluegreen algae bloom, you can send a water sample to be tested for cyanobacteria. Contact your local extension office for more information about water sampling and where to send samples for testing.

Now you may be wondering how you can prevent these blooms in your water sources and there are several options. Blue-green algae do not form blooms in areas where the water is moving or disturbed so using devices to create turbulence or movement in the water can reduce the algae bloom. Other options include

than running into a pond. These nutrients are a necessity for algae blooms to occur so any change is beneficial to preventing blooms. Some producers use a dye early in the season to reduce the amount of ultraviolet rays that enter non-flowing water sources. The light is needed for the bacteria to photosynthesize and reproduce. One final preventative treatment is to suspend a mesh bag of barley straw in the ponds early in the season. A study from the Center for Aquatic Plant Management in Berkshire, England, says the most effective time to apply straw is before algae growth begins because the anti-algae agents released by the straw are more effective in preventing algae growth than in killing algae already present. The straw becomes active within a month and will continue to inhibit algae growth up to six months. That may be one of the odder solutions, but it could be a cheap idea to try for future seasons so keep it in mind as you harvest barley this fall.

If you have an algae bloom you can use algaecides, such as copper sulfate, however I must warn you that algaecides can be harmful to fish and kill other beneficial algae or plant life in the pond. You need to use caution when using an algaecide in watering areas because the bacteria only release their toxin when killed so if a treatment is used to kill the algae, a lethal level of toxins may result and livestock or pets must be kept from that water source for a week until the toxins are dispersed. NDSU recommends applying 2 pounds of copper sulfate per acre-foot of water. There are no quick fixes for blue-green algae blooms and prevention by keeping excess nutrients from flowing into water sources is the best way to prevent future blooms from occurring.

The good news is that algae blooms typically only last for a couple of days, however they can persist for several weeks. It is important to keep an eye out for algae blooms as you check your livestock this summer. Algae blooms are more common late in the summer and it only takes a few hot days to cause these organisms to become active and bloom. The forecast for this coming week calls for warmer temperatures as the week progresses with temperatures in the mid 80's to 90's forecasted. Electronic cigarettes, also known as e-cigs, e-hookahs, vapes, mods or ENDS (electronic nicotine delivery systems), are made to look like regular cigarettes, pens, cigars, pipes, guitar picks and even a small cellphone, as well as other household items.

However, the one quickly gaining popularity is JUUL. It looks like a USB stick. Students refer to using this device as Juuling.

Vaping is the act of using an e-cig by any name to inhale and exhale aerosol vapor.

Students report it's easy to do in school bathrooms because there is no smoke or smoke odors and the devices are easy to conceal. More than 3.6 million U.S. youth, including one in five high school students and one in 20 middle school students, use e-cigarettes.

What most of these students don't realize is the harm they are doing to themselves by

vaping. Most e-cigarettes have a battery, a heating element and a place to hold a liquid. They produce an aerosol by heating the liquid, which contains nicotine, flavorings and other chemicals. Users inhale this mixture into their lungs and then exhale a cloud of vapor.

When asked, students report the vapor is "just water." Actually, it is formaldehyde and cancer-causing chemicals. The flavorings also are chemicals that have not been approved for inhalation into one's lungs.

Most vapes do contain nicotine, even some the manufacturers claim do not. Nicotine is an addictive substance that makes e-cigarette use harmful to anyone, but especially adolescents and young adults whose brains still are developing.

Nicotine can disrupt brain development; create permanent changes in the brain; adversely impact learning, memory, attention, impulse control, mood and respiratory health; and make the young person more susceptible to nicotine addiction. A typical e-cig pod or cartridge contains about as much nicotine as a pack of 20 cigarettes, making it extremely dangerous around a curious young child.

volume of youth using these devices has prompted a call to action by the surgeon general:

"I, Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, VADM Jerome Adams, am emphasizing the importance of protecting our children from a lifetime of nicotine addiction and associated health risks by immediately addressing the epidemic of youth e-cigarette use. The recent surge in e-cigarette

use among youth, which has been fueled by new types of e-cigarettes that have recently entered the market, is a cause for great concern. We must take action now to protect the health of our nation's young people."


At the same time, companies selling these devices and products are advertising them where youth live - online. A recent study monitored the marketing materials used on social media, including Instagram, Twitter and YouTube. The study noted that e-cigarette companies use cartoons as a marketing strategy and many of the logos contain cartoons.

Although combustible cigarettes and chewing tobacco have had advertising restrictions since 1999, this new industry has none. This, combined with candy flavors and names that appeal to youth, make the problem even greater.

Parents, grandparents, community members, here is your chance to make a difference. Talk to the youth in your life. 


