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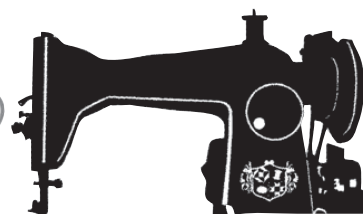

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Country Kitchen Recipes



Stuffed Bell Peppers

Ingredients

6 bell peppers, any color
4 tablespoons olive oil, plus more for drizzling
8 ounces lean ground beef
Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 onion, finely diced
2 cloves garlic, chopped
1 medium zucchini, finely diced
4 Roma tomatoes, seeded and finely diced
Red pepper flakes, as needed
1 cup cooked long-grain and wild rice
1 1/2 cups grated pepper Jack cheese

Directions

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.
- Cut the tops off the peppers. Remove and discard the stems, then finely chop the tops; set aside. Scoop out the seeds and as much of the membrane as you can. Place the peppers cut-side up in a baking dish just large enough to hold them upright.
- Heat 2 tablespoons of the olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the beef, season with salt and pepper and cook, breaking up the lumps, until the meat is cooked through and just beginning to brown, 8 to 10 minutes. Remove to a paper towel-lined plate to get rid of the fat.
- Wipe out the skillet and add the remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil. Add the onions and chopped peppers and cook until beginning to soften, 3 to 4 minutes. Add the garlic and zucchini and cook for another minute. Add the tomatoes and season with salt and a pinch or 2 of red pepper flakes. Cook until everything is heated through, then stir in the beef and rice. Taste and adjust the seasoning. Stir in 1 cup of the cheese.
- Fill the peppers with the rice mixture and top each with a sprinkle of the remaining 1/2 cup cheese. Pour a small amount of water into the bottom of the baking dish and drizzle the peppers with a little olive oil. Cover with foil and bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake until the peppers are soft and the cheese is melted and lightly browned, another 15 to 20 minutes.

Three Ingredient Bacon & Onion Roasted Potatoes

Ingredients

1/2 lb bacon, chopped
6 medium red potatoes, chopped in 3/4-inch pieces
2 oz onion soup mix, 1 packet

Directions

- Preheat oven to 425°F
- Cook bacon in a cast iron skillet until crisp.
- Remove any excess grease, if preferred.
- Add the potatoes and onion soup mix to the skillet and stir. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- Bake in the skillet for 20-25 minutes, or until potatoes are cooked through.



Gardening Tips

All about 'frostbite'

Frostbite apple was first bred at the University over 90 years ago. This small sweet apple lived the life of a breeding stock, known as MN447. For many of those years, University fruit breeder David Rapids kept a small orchard of the apple by the U's North Central Research and Outreach Center in Grand Rapids. It proved to be more winter hardy than any other apple released by the University. Although small, this apple packs a wallop in the flavor department. When the University decided to release this apple, they needed a name, so the Minnesota landscape Arboretum ran an apple naming contest. Some of the names suggested were; Garrison Peeler, Alotta Colada, Lutecrisp, Ufdalicious, Go-4-Gold, Arbor Eatum and Last Tango in Embarrass. Several people suggested Frostbite and that name stuck. Thank Goodness. Can you imagine asking for an apple named

Lutecrisp? Especially in a big East Coast city where they think apples grow in the fruit stand. A Minnesotan would have to be there to explain the name.

Now a bit of apple education. Apple blossoms will only form fruit if pollinated by a tree of a different variety. But because the flesh of the fruit is produced by the maternal branch, it always matches the maternal variety, regardless of which variety supplied

the pollen. The seeds in the apple are hybrid however and will grow into trees bearing different traits. So breeders can't just plant the seeds and get the same tree that the seeds came from. To preserve desirable traits, breeders propagate apple trees by grafting branches from the chosen variety's rootstock. These branches, from the mother tree will always bear fruit with the same flesh as the graft.

The reason that Frostbite wasn't released sooner is that its strong flavor was thought to be a bit much when the only available apples were Delicious. Apparently the U. decided that people in the 1912 era weren't very adventurous about their food. Instead, Frostbite's main use was in breeding. It was used to create the long lasting Keepsake apple and is a grandparent of Honeycrisp. Just for your information, the U messed up when it created Honeycrisp when it didn't patent the name. This is why one Honeycrisp apple or tree may be different

Grazing/harvesting rule change to benefit producers

Changes in federal grazing and harvesting rules on prevented-planting acres could help North Dakota livestock producers replenish forage supplies or at least offset shortages in perennial forage production, according to North Dakota State University Extension livestock specialists.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will allow producers to graze, hay or cut cover crops on prevented-planting acres beginning Sept. 1. "Many livestock producers in the region are short on forage following a long, cold winter and late spring that depleted forage supplies," says Kevin Sedivec, Extension rangeland management specialist. "Supplies in some areas have been further exacerbated due to low forage production resulting from cool temperatures and drought."

The change in the allowable harvesting or grazing date to Sept. 1 on prevented-planting acres gives livestock producers an opportunity to offset the shortage of forage supplies. "Flexibility in choosing a cover crop mixture becomes greater and strategies for what to plant can be tailored to fit your intended need," says Miranda Meehan, Extension livestock environmental stewardship specialist. "With an earlier release date, landowners can plant different mixtures that can be used for grazing, haying or silage/haylage while providing soil health benefits."

If grazing is the goal

Producers have many opportunities to plant a cover crop mixture to be used for grazing. "Your selection of species to use should be based on when you want to graze and if you want to hay first, then graze," Meehan explains. "The

mixtures can be simple to very complex, depending on budget, soil health goals and species of livestock."

If plans are to graze in September, seed a mixture containing cool-season cereals (oats, barley, triticale), warm-season grasses (sorghum-sudan, sudangrass, foxtail millet), brassicas (turnip, radish, rape, kale, cabbage), broadleaf plants (sunflower, buckwheat) and legumes (forage peas, faba beans, lentils, clovers, vetch). "Your options are plentiful, but select based on production needs, minimal inputs, seed costs and availability, and overall budget," Meehan advises.

If plans are to graze after Oct. 15, the seed mixture options could include cool-season cereals (oats, barley, triticale), foxtail millet, brassicas (turnip, radish, kale), broadleaf plants (sunflower, buckwheat) and legume (forage peas, clovers, vetch). "It is important to have a good grazing management plan in place to avoid potential animal health issues associated with cover crops," says Janna Block, Extension livestock systems specialist at NDSU's Hettinger Research Extension Center. "Many species used in cover crops are known to accumulate nitrates and also may have toxic levels of sulfur. "Sorghum and sudangrass also can accumulate prussic acid, particularly during drought," she adds. "Cover crops may be low in magnesium, which can result in development of grass tetany. Bloat can occur with

legumes or if protein levels are too high in the mixture."

If using brassicas in a mix for grazing, the general recommendation is to limit them to less than 50 percent of the seed mixture to avoid digestive disorders in cattle. Provide livestock with dry hay or other forage prior to turnout, and gradually introduce them to cover crops during a period of several days if possible.

If haying is the goal

The selection of plant species to be hayed after Sept. 1 becomes limited due to lack of drying conditions and the plants' ability to dry sufficiently to make high-quality hay. Forage plants need to be nonhigh water-holding plants and have small stems for greater potential to cure in September or later.

Recommended species for

September haying include cool-season cereals (oats, barley, triticale), warm-season grasses (foxtail millet, sudangrass) and legumes (forage peas, clovers and vetch). The cereal grains and warm-season grasses can be seeded in monocultures or mixtures with or without the legume. This mixture will be a better choice if plans are to graze after harvesting.

If silage/haylage is the goal

More options can be added to this mixture because drying to an acceptable level for curing isn't as critical. Harvesting before a freeze is important to achieve silage because desired moisture conditions need to be 65-70 percent for a bunker and 60-68 percent for silo bags.

A hard freeze will reduce the moisture content dramatically within 24 to 48 hours. Haylage can be put up at a lower moisture level (40-60 percent), so harvesting in late September to early October is possible. Recommended species for silage and haylage include warm-

season grasses (sorghum, sorghum sudangrass hybrid, pearl millet), cool-season cereals (oats, barley, triticale), brassicas (kale, cabbage, turnips) and legumes (forage peas). The warm-season grasses can be seeded in monocultures or mixtures with the cool-season grasses, brassicas and/or legumes.

A mixture will be a better choice if plans are to graze after harvesting, but it usually results in less tonnage of forage. If haylage will be your final feed produced, eliminate the brassicas in the mixture because they will be difficult to dry to less than 60 percent before mid-October and the other plants in the mixture will be too dry following a hard frost.

Crop producers intending on planting cover crops on prevented-planting acres to suppress weeds and enhance soil health have an opportunity to market this forage to livestock producers. The NDSU Feedlist (www.cg.ndsu.edu/feedlist) can connect crop producers with

livestock producers in search of additional forage.

Meehan recommends producers get a laboratory analysis for any cover crop mixture prior to feeding it to livestock. "Due to this one-time rule change granted by the USDA, creating a high-quality feed will be possible on prevented-planting acres in 2019," Sedivec says. "Take advantage of this opportunity. Plant a cover crop that can enhance your soil health while creating feed for late-season grazing or hay and silage/

haylage production."

Canning homemade salsa recipe, is it safe?

I have a recipe that has been "untested" but has been "in the family" for generations. Am I safe to can it given that no one in the family has ever become ill from eating it canned? Why do all the Extension publications say to use recipes from approved sources?

Most tomato-based salsas are

a mixture of tomatoes, onions, peppers and spices. To home can in a boiling water bath, you must follow research-tested recipes to assure the proportion of acidic ingredients is high enough for food safety. In other words, if your recipe has more low acid peppers and onions than the approved recipe, then it is not safe for canning.

Low acid foods must be canned under pressure to kill the spores that cause botulism. Spores grow when there is moisture, heat and a lack of oxygen. That means your water bath processed homemade salsa can produce toxins even if your

jars are sealed.

If you still want to use your untested recipe or like to be creative by adding your own amount of ingredients, either freeze your salsa or store it up to one week in the refrigerator and eat it fresh.

Salsa safe canning tips

- Choose only high-quality, disease-free, firm produce for canning. Canning is NOT a way to use overripe or damaged tomatoes, or tomatoes from dead or frost-killed vines because these may cause the product to spoil and be unsafe to eat.

- Salsa needs added acid to ensure product safety. Tomato varieties and colors can mixed and matched for salsa but you still need added acid to make sure the product will be safe.

- Don't reduce the amount of lemon juice or tomatoes in the recipe.

- Don't add extra peppers, onion or garlic. You can substitute one type of pepper for another or reduce the amount of peppers, onion or garlic.

- Spices and herbs may be adjusted to personal taste and

won't affect safety.

- Don't thicken salsas with cornstarch, flour or other thickeners before canning. Add thickeners after opening the salsa if desired.

- Always store open jars of home-canned salsa in the refrigerator.

- Don't attempt to can a recipe that hasn't been tested for safety, because food spoilage or a foodborne illness may result.

Do it yourself: The Foam Spider

For many fly anglers, especially those in the upper Midwest, the first fish they often encounter in their early endeavors with the long rod is the bluegill. They're frequently found stocked in farm ponds or naturally occurring in lakes and they provide the perfect target for any surface fishing action this time of year due to their solid summertime appetite. Oftentimes, the first flies offered up to these ready and willing panfish are gaudy spiders with long dangly legs and high floating foam comprising a classic target. While these patterns won't likely turn technical trout, they're fun to tie and easy to flip out on a sunny summer day for bluegills, and no warm-water fly box should be without a few in a variety of colors.

Materials:

Hook: Dry Size 10-14

Thread: 6/0 Color to Match

Body: Colored Closed Cell Foam

Legs: Round Sili Strands

Start the pattern by cutting a piece of foam into a teardrop-shaped strip about one-and-a-half times as long as the hook shank, with a slightly wider pointed end to serve as the fly's abdomen; trim the underside of that portion so that it angles up to the point (1). Once the foam is ready – and it doesn't have to be perfect, bluegills are well known for not being terribly picky – make a small layer of thread in the middle of the hook shank (2).

Lay the foam on top of the hook and using a couple of wraps of thread, secure it onto the hook shank so that the thin end starts just behind the hook eye and the point of the wider abdomen hangs out slightly over the bend. Then wrap a few more times to lock the foam in place (3). In the same spot, tie in the round silicone strands at the top of the fly to be used to form the legs which will be positioned in just a bit (4). Once the silicone strands are in place, gently lift on the front of the foam body and wrap the thread underneath it toward the hook eye (5).

Secure the very front end of the foam with a few thread wraps behind the hook eye forming a rounded segment of the body, then whip finish (6). To complete the fly, gently move the silicone strands down along the sides of the foam so that they'll pulse and wave when stripped across the surface; add a tiny drop of head cement on the bottom of the thread wraps at the middle and front tie-in points (7).

The fly is virtually foolproof and can stand up to significant abuse from marauding bluegills, that will undoubtedly compete with

than the University's apple. They did learn and now all new apples are patented before being released to the public. The reason Frostbite was eventually released was twofold; people are showing a wider interest in trying new delicacies and nurseries were looking for new releases after the huge success of Honeycrisp.

And on the subject of apples, when you buy an apple tree, ask your nursery which other apple would be a good pollinator. The two trees need to bloom at the same time or you won't have fruit. Most crabapples can be a pollinator as they bloom for a long time, much longer than eating apples. To get a twofer, get a Chestnut crab. The fruit is small but super delicious. They are not a keeper but make up for it in their flavor and long flowering time.

Crab apple trees are great landscape trees. If you bird watch, plant the ones that bear fruit. It will attract Robins and Cedar Waxwings in the fall, and if they tree holds fruit all winter, again in the spring. There are flowering crabs that are barren so you get the wild spring explosion of color and no fruit to rake up in the fall. Raking leaves is enough exercise.

gold. This is often caused by cell mutation. These leaves are at a disadvantage in real life as they don't have as much chlorophyll, a vital pigment involved in photosynthesis. Some of these plants are stable, they stay variegated. Others revert to being green. This happens when new growth turns to all green. The all green sections are usually more vigorous than the variegated section and if left alone, the whole plant may revert to all green. This is particularly common on variegated Norway maple 'Drummondii'. It can also happen on shrubs, sedum and hosta. The solution is to remove the all green part of the plant if possible. The Norway maple will have to do whatever it wants as most people are not about to cut half the tree down. It is much easier with a hosta or a shrub.

July 1st is the cut off time to harvest asparagus and rhubarb. However, if your rhubarb has leaf diseases, go ahead and pull any affected leaves. They are still edible, so make a pie. Bag the leaves. Don't attempt to compost them as most home compost piles don't get hot enough to kill diseases. Apparently the Fergus compost doesn't get hot enough either as some people have complained that it carries seeds of weeds they had never had before.

Rhubarb is attacked by several different leaf spot diseases. The two most common are caused by fungi. Ascochyta leaf spot starts as light green or yellow spots that eventually grow into white spots with a thick red margin. The center of the spot often falls out making

the leaf look like someone took a shotgun to it. The other disease, Ramularia leaf spot, starts as small red spots that eventually develop a white or tan center with a purple margin. This stinker can also cause infections on the stems, you probably don't want to use those in a pie. Spores from both these diseases are spread from infected leaves by wind or splashing water. Removing infected leaves as soon as you spot them will drastically reduce the infections. Also, remove all the rhubarb leaves from the garden after a killing frost as the fungus can survive the winter on old sick leaves. To get the best of your "pie plant" fertilize her in the spring as growth starts then again after the last harvest. She is a hungry girl. Do the same for your asparagus plants.

When you harvest spring asparagus, cut the stems level to the soil even if you can't eat some of the bottom half. This makes it much easier to keep the weeds down in the patch and see the new shoots next spring. After the first of July, let the plant grow. Leave the ferns uncut in the fall. This will help them hold mulch and snow, ensuring you a good crop for next spring. Cut the ferns down early next spring.

If the summer continues as it has started, look for a lot of fungus diseases. A cool damp spring followed by a muggy hot summer is a perfect set up for a fungus explosion so patrol your gardens every day. A strong shot of water from the hose can often stop an infection in its tracks. Enjoy the stinking hot weather. Petunia will enjoy it from a air-conditioned house.

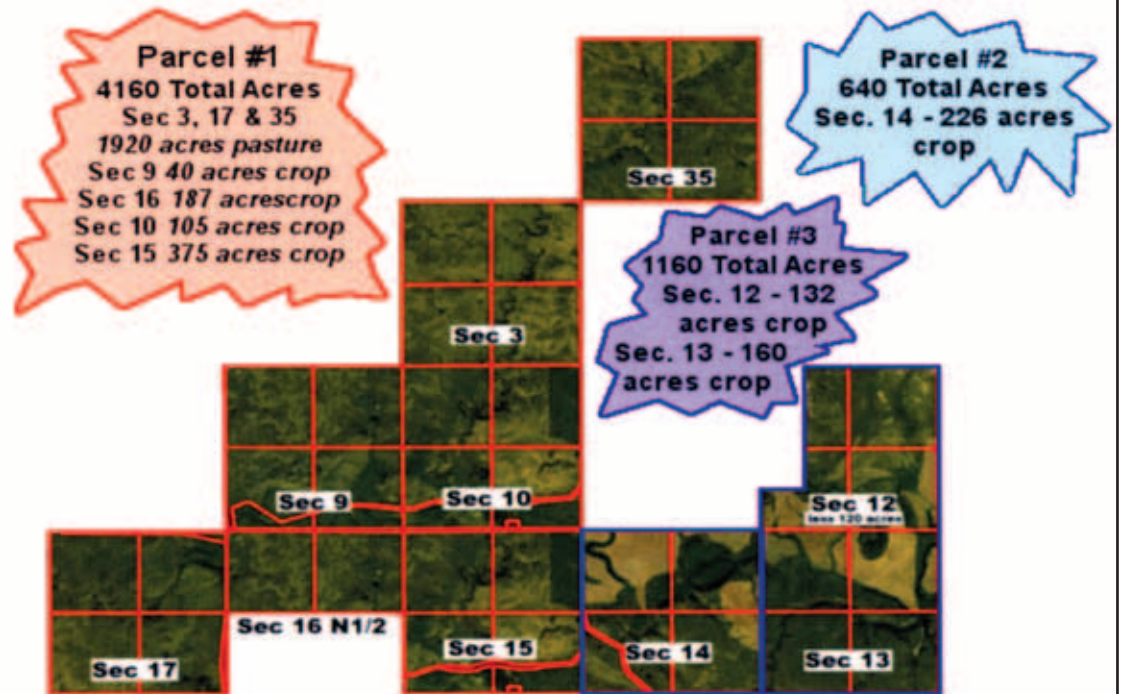

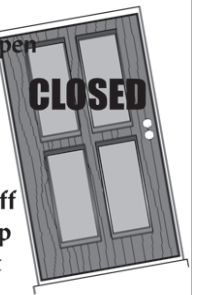

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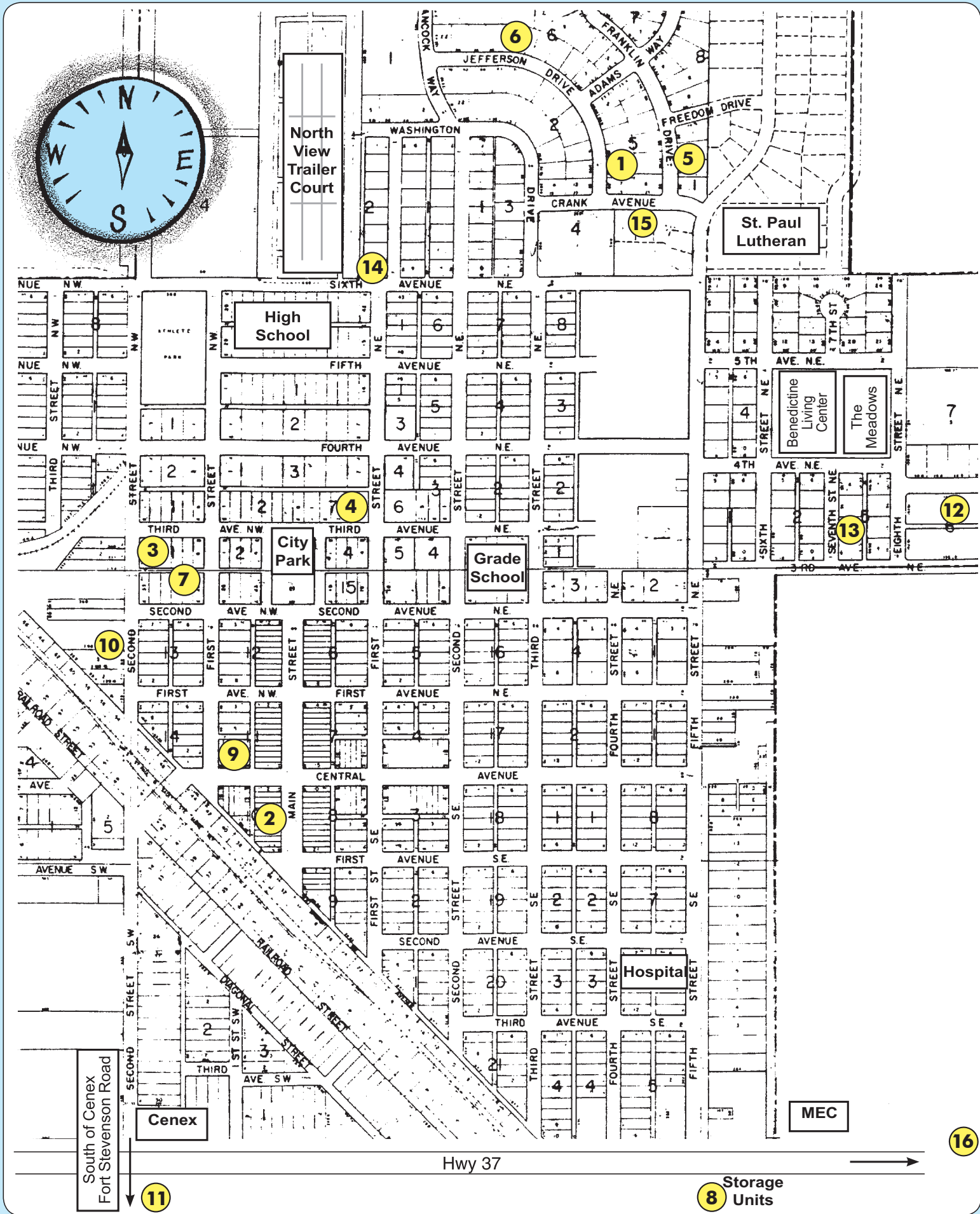
