

The best time to fertilize your lawn

Fall is the most important time to fertilize your lawn. Now is when roots grow.

Fall is a great time to fertilize the lawn. Lawns are hungry now and they will develop most of their root systems during this season. Labor Day is a good time to fertilize lawns. Lawns are actively growing and this fertilizer promotes vigorous blade growth and stronger root systems.

A soil test is recommended to determine exactly what fertilizer your lawn needs. In most cases, a winterizer fertilizer is recommended. Formulations vary, but most winterizer fertilizers are approximately 25-3-10 (25 percent nitrogen, 3 percent phosphate and 10 percent potash). Winterizer fertilizers provide a little extra potash compared to summer fertilizers. This boost of potash promotes winter hardiness

Fertilizers with slow-release nitrogen are valuable since they provide a consistent release of nitrogen to the growing plants. They are more expensive, however. Follow the rates on the fertilizer package. A standard rate is 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. For reference, one pound of actual nitrogen is in four pounds of a 25 percent nitrogen fertilizer (such as 25-3-3). Excess nitrogen can burn the turf. Reduced rates can be used in shady spots. They grow more slowly and only need about half as much fertilizer as sunny

To prevent creating dark green stripes in your yard, apply half the fertilizer going back and forth in one direction and the other half going perpendicular to that. For example, apply half going north-south and the other half going east-west.

Be careful about fertilizing in late September/early October. Fertilizing late in autumn can delay the hardening of the turf and make it more susceptible to winter injury. For this reason, weed-and-feed fertilizers are not recommended. The most effective time to kill weeds (late September) is not a good time to fertilize the grass. Use a separate treatment to kill weeds. Fertilization in early spring is not recommended.





This stimulates leaf growth at the expense of root growth. The key to a healthy turf is a strong root system.

Water your lawn after fertilizing. This increases the effectiveness of the fertilizer and reduces the likelihood the fertilizer will run off due to a heavy rainstorm.

Now is the time to practice after school home-alone skills

If you're thinking about having your children go home alone after school in the fall, start now to teach skills, define rules and encourage them to be in charge while you're nearby.

North Dakota guidelines for children staying at home alone allow 9-year-olds to take on this responsibility for up to two hours during daylight hours, but there is much more to this important decision than

Are your children prepared for the many situations that may arise? Are they mature enough? Would they know what to do if they came home after school and the door was unlocked? Are they emotionally ready? Will they be too frightened to stay home alone?

Also, consider children's physical and cognitive abilities. Are they able to think on their feet if a pet gets out of the house? Can they safely reach the microwave to heat a snack?

Think about the location of the home and proximity to a trusted adult who could help if your children were in trouble.

According to ParentsLead. org, children must be able to get home from school safely; use keys, or a code to get in the

door and lock it once inside; know their full name, phone number and address in case of emergency; have access to and know how to use the phone; and know when and how to call 911 or a trusted adult for help. Do they know how to safely make a snack, do homework on their own, follow simple rules, do basic first aid and understand how to tell time?

Encourage your children to discuss their feelings about being home alone. If they are afraid, talk about it, practice being away for only 10-15 minutes at a time and be open to making care arrangements if your children are not ready to stay home alone without fear.

Establish rules. This avoids confusion about what you expect and adds to the children's sense of security. Consider how they will check in with a parent when they arrive home after school. Can the parent take a call at work? Are the children allowed to use the internet, video games and movies? Discuss food, chores, friends, appliances, activities and other possible scenarios, and write out responses.

Have your children practice being in charge while you are outside in the yard or taking a nap. When you and your children feel confident, start by running errands close by and work up to a two-hour time frame. Review the home-alone time each time you return so you can address any issues and make a plan for the next time.

Remember, the ultimate responsibility for the safety, care, well-being and behavior of your children remains with you: the parent or caregiver, whether you are there to personally supervise or not. Grilled Pork Loin Chops

Ingredients

- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 teaspoons ketchup
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 2 (6 ounce) thick-cut boneless pork loin chops

Directions

- 1. Mix the garlic, brown sugar, honey, soy sauce, Worcestershire sauce, ketchup, ginger, onion powder, cinnamon, and cayenne pepper together in a bowl. Pour half the mixture into a large plastic zipper bag, and place the pork chops into the marinade. Squeeze the air out of the bag, and seal the bag. Refrigerate 4 to 8 hours, turning occasionally. Refrigerate remaining marinade in the
- 2. Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat, and lightly oil the grate.
- 3. Remove the pork chops from the plastic bag, and shake excess droplets of liquid from the chops. Discard the marinade from the plastic bag. Grill chops on the preheated grill, basting with the reserved marinade until meat is browned, no longer pink inside, and shows good grill marks, 8 to 10 minutes per side. A meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of a chop should read at least 145 degrees F (63 degrees C).
- 4. Pour remaining reserved marinade into a saucepan over medium heat, bring to a boil, and reduce heat to a simmer. Cook the marinade until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes, stirring constantly; serve sauce with chops.

Grilled Asparagus

1 pound fresh asparagus spears, trimmed 1 tablespoon olive oil salt and pepper to taste

Directions

- 1. Preheat grill for high heat.
- 2. Lightly coat the asparagus spears with olive oil. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Gardening Tips

Those darn ants

Bunkey's brother, Bruce, hates ants with a passion. If he thought a flame thrower would kill them he'd have one. As it is, you will see him almost every day wandering around his yard with a sprayer muttering "take that you miserable ants'

There are several species of ants usually found in our yards. Cornfield ants, field ants, and pavement ants are all busy in our lawn. They are actually important to the environment as predators on other insects and invertebrates that live in the turf. Soil nesting ants often feed on honeydew secreted by aphids that they find on plants. This can have the indirect result in protecting aphids as they feed, a goal not especially desired. Aphids on flowers can be knocked off by a strong spray from the hose. The trick is to notice them before they damage the plant.

Ant nests create lumps in the lawn. The mounds can be an inch or two wide as is the case with cornfield ants. Some ants will build a mound a foot or more in diameter. The big mounds can smother the grass. Usually when you see ant mounds in bare areas, they didn't kill the grass but they are taking advantage of whatever did. Attempting to mow an ant hilly lawn on a riding lawnmower can result in a trip to the nearest dentist. Not only that, field ants can bite! They are only about H of an inch long but will attack when defending their nest. They are not naturally aggressive toward people otherwise. Ants in the house will drive any self respecting house wife/husband to drink. People don't care that

they are only looking for food and water, they just don't want to share houseroom with them. There are baits available that are quite effective in homes. Just be sure they are not where a child or pet can get at them. The ants haul the poison back to the nest and kill the whole crew.

Ants in the grass are another problem altogether. Even if you do treat a nest, a new nest will re-colonize the area after the insecticide residue dissipates. Don't even attempt to treat the whole lawn unless it is about the size of a bath towel. You just can't stay ahead of them. After all, there are a lot more of them than you. The best you can do is kill the nests close to the house to keep them out. There are insecticides that kill ants. Permethrin, carbryl, bifenthrin, and cyfuthrin are some to try. Be sure to read the label. You want to kill ants not the grass.

June has been drier than normal even though it seems as though it rained every day. July is normally hot and dry. Remember, all growing plants, whether they be trees, grass, flowers or weeds need an inch of water a week. Water trees until the soil around them is soggy. An easy way to water trees is to poke a few holes on the bottom of a 5 gallon pail. Park the pail on one side of the tree, fill it and when it is dry move it around the tree until it is fully watered. Bunkey puts 4 pails around his bigger trees so he doesn't have to move them

The moral of the week is, put up with ants unless they are attempting to share living space and water the snot out of every green thing in your

Mis season problems

Bunkey walks through his gardens almost every day. He found that this way he discovered problems before they got too big to treat. He was able to save tomatoes from early blight by noticing that a few of the lowest leaves were developing brown spots and some of the leaves were almost all brown. He waited until the middle of the day so the leaves were dry. It is easy to re-infect the healthy leaves if you are not careful. Neglected plants will be spindly and the fruit can be infected. He discovered an organic fungicide, Serenade, that seemed to work well for him. His neighbor George sprays his tomatoes with a mix of 1 tablespoon of baking soda 2 tablespoons of vegetable oil and 2 drops of an organic dish soap in a gallon of water. He removes any infected leaves, shakes the mix well and sprays the plants on a cool cloudy day. If the weather is predicted to be hot, he will spray early in the morning. It is never a good thing for any plant to be wet all night. It can lead to more problems than you started with. . If you have had blossom end rot

on your tomatoes, you can just cut the ugly part off and eat the rest. The problem is caused by uneven watering and usually is only on the first crop.

Another icky pest is cabbage worm. Nothing will put a kid off any cabbage, broccoli or cauliflower quicker than finding a cooked green worm on the plate with the food. Soaking the vegetable in a strong salt solution will USUALLY get the worms to float to the top of the water. However, a daily check of your veggies will spot the worms before they get inside the crop. Pick them off and either drop them in a pail of soapy water or if you don't mind the ick factor, squish the stinkers. A hard shot from water from the hose can shake loose some of them. Don't let them just lay there either. Again, soapy water or green fingers. Good gardeners have strong stomachs.

If you have lost your favorite squash to squash vine borer, become a surgeon. Look for a trail of sawdust on the stem. Take your knife and run it up the stem until you find the larvae, there may be more than one. Squish the worm then wash out the cut stem with water. Now bury the stem in the soil. This will save about half of your infested plants. The yellow varieties don't seem to be as easily infected. If you have a good eye, you may see the moth flying around the area of your squash. Look at the base of the vine for the eggs. They are disc shaped, brownish and easy to see so you can pick them off. Covering the soil around the stem of the plants may help. Pull out any vine that died and bag it. The larvae feed for 4 to 6 weeks then burrow into the soil and make a cocoon where they will live over winter. Tilling the soil before planting and after the garden is done in the fall will kill these cocoons as they are only 1 to 2 inches under the soil. Don't plant squash in the same place next year. Rotating your crops will prevent many soil borne diseases and confuse heck out of bugs that attack your plants.

Nitrogen, the transient nutrient

Sometimes it isn't easy being green, especially if your soil is short of nitrogen. Nitrogen is the most ephemeral of the key plant nutrients. It's availability in the soil depends on many things; temperature, moisture of the air and soil, and how active the soil organisms are. Since gardeners can't do much about some of these factors, we need to add nitrogen to our gardens every spring.

Nitrogen is critical for plant growth. It's the fundamental part of chlorophyll. If leaves have the right amount of nitrogen, photosynthesis takes off. Lack of this nutrient causes chlorosis, yellowing of leaves, and slow growth even in the best weather. Some garden plants are particularly heavy "feeders". Particularly roses, corn, lettuce, squash, cucumbers and cabbage. Tomatoes need their nitrogen too but too much and you get a tomato tree and pea sized fruit.

Nitrogen is available in many organic amendments, especially those that contain proteins like grains, seeds legumes and animal by-products. The amount of nitrogen and the ease and speed of uptake varies from one material to the next. Here are the most common sources for the home gardener.

Composted manure. The nitrogen content of manure from grass eating animals varies but it's a great source of both nitrogen and organic matter. You note the word composted. Raw manure can burn the plants, carry weed seeds of plants you have never seen before and even pathogens. If you do your own composting, age it for at least 6 months and be sure it gets really, really hot. If you are not a DIY guy, let the commercial people do it for you. You can get pelleted, composted, poultry manure, or fluffy cow or horse manure at any nursery in the spring. Blood meal is available all summer from nurseries or the big box stores. Mix this with water and water your plants or dig it in to the soil around your corn in particular. Fish emulsion can be sprayed on foliage or poured on the soil; it stinks!! After all, it's ground up fish, guts and all. Crab meal is made from shells and guts of crabs. You till this into the soil in the spring. It contains chitin that suppresses nematodes and enhances beneficial soil microorganisms. Composted feather meal is another that needs tilling in in the spring. This is a long-lasting nitrogen as the keratin in the feathers isn't easily broken down by the soil bacteria.

Plants can be an excellent source of nitrogen too. Alfalfa meal and pellets are available. Fresh alfalfa as a mulch decomposes rapidly and generates heat so use it sparingly. Like the dry stuff, it adds micronutrients, potassium and phosphorus beside nitrogen to the soil. Soybean meal is a slow to medium release source and is sometimes used on lawns. Cottonseed meal can be iffy for organic gardeners. It may have been sprayed with pesticides. It is another slow release and is also slightly acidic, not a bad thing for our alkaline soils.



in the spring, the report will give you a measurement of how much nitrogen you need to add this year. The stuff you added last year has snuck away. So here's to an alfalfa green, stinky fish, or brown composted poop garden next spring.

Not another one!!

Dr. Gregory Polland, the director of the Mayo Clinic Vaccine Research Group, announced that there is a new deadly tick looking for a home.

The Asian longhorned tick is called hemaphysalis longicornus by people who use Latin to confuse the rest of us. This nasty guy has been found in New York, New jersey, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina and Arkansas. Unfortunately, he probably won't stay there. The reason to be afraid is his bite can kill you. And, worse yet, he is an aggressive biter and his wife can lay as many as 2,000 eggs at a crack. The doctor says the bite "can cause great stress to it's host". In other words, the bite hurts like crazy and can make you sick.

In Asia, the tick causes a devastating disease called SFTS, Severe Fever and Thrombocytopenia Syndrome. It kills about 15 percent of people bitten.

So far, the tick has only bitten cattle, but scientists are on the lookout for people who have gotten bitten and are infected. They should be easy to find with those symptoms.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention keep track of tick disease. They say that tick-borne illnesses, like Lyme disease, have doubled in the last 13 years. Lyme disease is the most common and causes about 82% of all the tick-borne

There are other ticks living with us. One causes Rocky Mountain Fever. Even a tick that isn't carrying a bug can give us grief. They itch like mad, so we scratch. Next thing you know you have an infected bite. Humans just can't win-

against ticks any way. Bunkey has been pulling weeds in the cool of the mornings. He hasn't seen any ticks, but the mosquitoes are so thick, he doesn't dare open his mouth for the fear of inhaling a gob of them. He religiously applies bug repellent, so they do stay a respectable distance away. SO, if he didn't get stung by a mosquito, why does he have some large itchy bumps on his torso? No-see-ums, well named cause they are virtually invisible, can bite usually in places like behind your knees, your back where you can't reach to scratch, and any place your clothes are tight, like under your waistband. The best strategy to avoid these biters is to stay out of the garden for now. They eventually go someplace else; to the devil, Bunkey hopes.

Keep your annuals deadheaded to ensure they keep blooming until freeze-up. Now is a good time to add perennials to the empty spots in your gardens, as they are usually on sale now and they will have the rest of the summer to get comfortable in their new home.

Do, do a full body check every time you come in from outdoors. It can't stop no-see-um bites, but it will help to find ticks. Since they like $\bar{\text{to}}$ loaf around on your outdoor clothes waiting for you to put them on again, it's a good idea to either wash them after every trip outside or at least run them through a hot cycle in the dryer. Cooked ticks don't bite.
