Christmas plants BY CALLA EDWARDS MCLEAN CO. EXTENSION AGENT

Thanksgiving is officially over and I hope that everyone has recovered from the food coma that always seems to follow. Christmas is right around the corner and with the change in the season Christmas plants are becoming common at stores everywhere you look. Around the area cut Christmas trees are for sale and while they smell wonderful and look even better, there are some dangers with using cut trees in your house. I have a few tips and ideas that can keep your Christmas plants beautiful throughout this holiday season and ways to keep your Christmas tree looking great all through the month of December.

Nothing says Christmas like a fresh cut Christmas tree, and picking the right one is a major key to success. As you look for your tree, not only should you be looking at the shape but you should also be checking to see how freshly cut the tree is. If the tree isn't frozen, run your finger up and down the branches or in the cases of a small tree pick it up and shake it. The needles on a fresh tree shouldn't fall off, and if a large number of needles fall off that is a sign the tree is starting to dry out, which can be a major hazard inside your house. Store your tree outside or in a cool spot till you are ready to bring it inside. Before you bring the tree in, cut the bottom of the tree off at a diagonal about 1" above the original cut. This allows the tree to draw water up and keep it hydrated throughout the season. Keep your tree away from drafts or hot areas as they dry trees out faster and always keep water in the reservoir. Dry Christmas trees are a fire hazard so keep your tree hydrated and always check your lights before putting them on. A recent trend is to use a Christmas tree in a pot. This is an excellent way to have a live tree that you can enjoy for years to come. Caring for these trees when they are inside is easy, simply keep the plant watered, however you will have to transition the tree to the outdoors once you are done with it for the holidays. Place the tree in a cooler location so it can go dormant and be sure when vou move it outside you water it well and surround the truck with mulch or plant material to insulate it from the cold temperatures. With proper care these trees can provide enjoyment for years to come.

Poinsettias are another popular Christmas plant, and despite what is commonly thought, they are not poisonous but I wouldn't recommend $eating \, them \, since \, they \, do \, cause$ upset stomach and in pets can cause vomiting, drooling and diarrhea. Poinsettias are fairly easy to take care of, they prefer bright direct light so a sunny window is ideal but be sure to keep them away from drafts and temperature fluctuations. Remember that

the temperature close to a window will be cooler than in other parts of the room. Be sure to water thoroughly and don't let the poinsettias dry completely out as that will shorten their flowering time. If you would like you can keep your poinsettias, and try to get them to bloom next year. Once they have stopped flowering cut the plant back to 4-6 inches tall and water sparingly. Treat your poinsettia like a houseplant till late September. Since Poinsettias bloom in response to long nights after October 1st provide your poinsettia with 14 hours of uninterrupted darkness, even a few minutes of light can mess up their flowering schedule.

One final thought when bringing Christmas Trees and other blooming plants into a house is that often these plants bring in tiny visitors which can spread to your houseplants. Try to keep your new plants and tree separated from your current houseplants to prevent bugs from spreading. Live Christmas trees are notorious for having a few bugs hidden inside so be aware before you put them near your houseplants. With a few simple tips your Christmas plants can bring you cheer throughout the Christmas season and all year long. I've just talked about a few of the more common plants, but there are others that you can enjoy all season long. Brunch burritos

1 pound bulk pork sausage, cooked and drained 1/2 pound bacon strips, cooked and crumbled 18 large eggs, lightly beaten

2 cups frozen shredded hash brown potatoes, thawed

1 large onion, chopped

1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cheddar cheese soup,

1 can (4 ounces) chopped green chiles

1 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon pepper

 $2\,\mathrm{cups}\,\mathrm{shred}\bar{\mathrm{ded}}\,\bar{\mathrm{cheddar}}\,\mathrm{cheese}$

10 flour tortillas (10 inches), warmed

Optional toppings: Jalapeno peppers, salsa or

hot pepper sauce

In a large bowl, combine the first 9 ingredients. Pour half of the egg mixture into a 4- or 5-qt. slow cooker coated with cooking spray. Top with half of the cheese. Repeat layers.

Cook, covered, on low 4-5 hours or until center is set and a thermometer reads 160°.

Spoon 3/4 cup egg mixture across center of each tortilla. Fold bottom and sides of tortilla over filling and roll up. Add toppings of your choice.

$\begin{array}{c} \textbf{Cranberry meatballs and sausage} \\ \text{1 large egg, lightly beaten} \end{array}$

1 small onion, finely chopped

3/4 cup dry bread crumbs

1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 pound bulk pork sausage

1 can (14 ounces) jellied cranberry sauce

3 tablespoons cider vinegar

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1 tablespoon prepared mustard

1 package (1 pound) miniature smoked sausage links

In a large bowl, combine the first six ingredients. Crumble bulk sausage over the mixture and mix well. Shape into 1 in. balls. In a large skillet, cook meatballs over medium heat until a thermometer reads 160°.; drain.

In a large saucepan, combine the cranberry sauce, vinegar, brown sugar and mustard. Cook and stir over medium heat until cranberry sauce is melted. Add the meatballs and sausage links. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, until sausage links are no longer pink and sauce is slightly thickened, 10-15 minutes.

Layered candy cane dessert 1 package (14.3 ounces) Oreo cookies

6 tablespoons butter, melted

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons 2 percent milk

1 carton (12 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed, divided 3/4 cup crushed candy canes (about 7 regular size), divided 2 packages (3.3 ounces each) instant

white chocolate pudding mix

2-3/4 cups cold 2 percent milk

Pulse cookies in a food processor until fine crumbs form. Add melted butter; pulse just until combined. Press onto bottom of a 13x9-in. dish. Refrigerate while preparing fill-

Beat cream cheese, sugar and milk until smooth. Fold in $1 \, \text{cup}$ whipped topping and $1/2 \, \text{cup}$ crushed candies. Spread

Whisk pudding mix and milk 2 minutes; spread over cream cheese layer. Spread with remaining whipped topping. Refrigerate, covered, 4 hours. Sprinkle with remaining candies just before serving.

Sweet potato crostini

2 tablespoons sugar

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

24 slices French bread baguette (1/4 inch thick)

2 to 3 tablespoons butter, melted

TOPPING:

2 cups mashed sweet potatoes

1/4 cup chopped pecans

3 tablespoons packed brown sugar 2 tablespoons butter, melted

1-1/4 cups miniature marshmallows, halved

Preheat oven to 375°. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Arrange bread slices on an ungreased baking sheet. Brush with butter; sprinkle with sugar mixture. Bake until lightly browned, 5-7 minutes. Remove from oven; preheat broiler.

Mix sweet potatoes, pecans, brown sugar and butter; spread over toasts. Top with marshmallows, pressing lightly. Broil 3-4 in. from heat until marshmallows are lightly toasted, 1-2 minutes.

Take steps to avoid getting sick during cold and flu season

"I'm kind of a germophobe," the woman said. "Do you want a sanitizing wipe?

We were passengers on a plane settling into our spots. I was in the middle seat and she was in the window seat.

I never had wiped down my entire passenger area. However, I followed her lead and wiped the tray, seat back and armrests. I think she wiped the window,

I was happy to get the sanitizing wipe. I had just passed a woman vomiting into the wastebasket by the boarding area of the plane.

I buckled my seat belt to settle in place. Then I noticed someone walking toward me who looked kind of familiar. She sat down next to me. She was the woman I had seen vomiting.

The flight attendant handed her a half-dozen "barf bags."

"I hope you feel better," she

Another attendant came by with another fistful of bags.

This can't be happening, I thought to myself. My germophobic neighbor

looked over at our seat companion. I think she was glad I was her human buffer.

I had a 3 1/2-hour flight ahead of me. I plugged in my earbuds and turned the video screen speaker fairly high. I was wishing I had a curtain to pull

ahead and drop the oxygen mask on me without a flight emergency. I didn't want to breathe recycled air.

 $My\,ill\,neighbor\,said, between$ bags, "I bet I'm the nastiest thing you have ever sat next to on a plane.

How do you respond to that? I wanted a parachute.

She used all the bags during the flight. I escaped getting sick, but I felt kind of ill leaving the

We are in the midst of the flu season, and I had gotten a flu shot a few weeks prior to the airplane trip. Getting vaccinated to help prevent flu is important for all of us, regardless of age.

I also had taken another step due to the courtesy of my healthy seatmate on the plane: I had disinfected common surfaces. Surprisingly, viruses can survive on surfaces for three days.

My ill neighbor had handed me a cup of water from the flight attendant. I thought about that the entire trip and avoided touching my face, eyes and

Staying well-hydrated also is a key to helping prevent the flu.

As soon as I left the plane, I made a beeline to the bathroom to wash my hands. I washed my hands three times. Washing our hands for at least 20 seconds with warm, soapy water is one of the most important ways to help prevent colds and the flu.

According to the Food and Drug Administration, antibacterial soaps are part of the category known as "antiseptic wash products." They are used with water and washed off after use. "Rubs" are leave-on products (also known I wondered if they could go as "hand sanitizers"). The "rub"

category also includes antiseptic

In a pinch, such as when you are in the middle seat in a plane, a hand sanitizer can be used. Be sure the sanitizer is at least 60 percent ethanol alcohol. Use the amount recommended on the label, cover all surfaces of your hands and rub your hands until the sanitizer is dry.

However, proper handwashing is considered the most effective way to prevent the spread of infections. According to a study conducted in Japan, hand sanitizers would have to be in contact with viruses on hands for four minutes to kill the germs.

By the way, when you are purchasing soap, remember that antibacterial soap is not more effective than regular soap. As a budget bonus, regular soap often is less expensive than antibacterial soap. Regular soap also does not kill healthy bacteria on the surface of skin.

Stay well with healthful food choices, too. Chicken, vegetables, lentils and broth are a comforting blend of ingredients. This recipe is inspired by Indian cuisine and can be made ahead of time as a freezer meal for heatand-eat meals.

Lentil chicken curry

1 pound chicken, cubed

4 c. vegetables, chopped or diced (for example, leek, carrot, celery, bell pepper, zucchini) 2 cloves garlic, minced

1/3 c. red lentils, dry (cooked according to package directions)

2 Tbsp. red curry paste 1 c. coconut milk

Salt and pepper (optional)

Note: Red curry paste is available in the ethnic foods section in many grocery stores.

Cook the chicken, vegetables

and garlic until cooked through. Cook lentils according to package directions. Add the lentils, curry paste and coconut milk. Stir to combine; season to taste. Let cool completely in shallow pans in the refrigerator. Place in a labeled freezer bag, flatten and freeze, or divide into single-serving freezer containers if desired and freeze. Thaw in a refrigerator and heat. Or from frozen, remove from bag and microwave for four to $4 \frac{1}{2}$ minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve over rice or with naan (flat bread).

Makes five (1-cup) servings. Each serving has 270 calories, 12 grams (g) fat, 25 g protein, 17 g carbohydrate and 270 milligrams sodium.

GARDENING TIPS

New annuals for 2020

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA EXTENSION MASTER GARDENER

If you love Calibrachoa, the flowers that look like little petunias, you'll be over the moon with this year's selections. The Million Bells Cabaret line has one called Good Night Kiss. This is very dark, bright pink with a white ray center. Another is from the Minifamous line, Neo Double Orangetastic". This is a double with orange petals with a wide yellow edge. The nice thing about these plants that, unlike petunias, they are self cleaning so they stay neat and tidy all summer. These are pot plants specially designed for hanging baskets. The singles attract humming birds, especially the red colored blooms. To keep them at their best, fertilize every 2 weeks.

If you like petunias, the newest one is called Midnight Gold. This is a basket plant with huge double flowers of dark purple edged in yellow. Another is Lavender Sky-Blue, one of the Easy Wave series. They bloom all season and tolerate both heat

is a little more mounded than the Waves. The color of this one will be darker in cool temps and lower light. She is 5 to 7 inches tall and up to 4 feet wide. For best blooming, keep them moist and fertilize every 2 weeks. Petunias are a full sun plant.

The Galaxy series of zonal geraniums produce mounded plants that keep their large semidouble blooms all summer. They look great all by them-selves in a large pot. They come in dark red, red, watermelon, pink purple, salmon, white and violet. They are 16 to 20 inches tall and are great for a spot that gets dry. That doesn't mean not to water them but they will tolerate a dryer area.

An impatient that is resistant to downy mildew is every shade gardener's dream. Well, dream no more. Panamerican seed company has one called Beacon. It comes in 6 colors and 2 mixes. They say that this series is reliable, fast filling, and adds season long color to shade gardens or hanging pots. Sales of these plants support the OI' foundation for brittle bone disease

For a bright accent on the edge of the garden or in a pot, you

and cooler weather. This series might want to look at Concertina Cockscomb. You can start these at home. All they need is good starting mix, warmth, sunlight and good drainage. The plant is only 8 to 10 inches tall and 8 inches wide. The blooms are bright colors and the flower looks like you squished a bigger flower into a ball, all curly and round. The word cute comes to mind.

For a bright "thriller" in a large pot, how about a dahlia? The Venti series are about 16 to 18 inches tall and 14 to 16 inches wide. This is a uniform, vigorous series of double flowered blooms in a broad range of colors. They will keep blooming all season if you religiously deadhead them; they are great planted in the flowerbed too.

There is no common name for Osteosperums. It's that daisy like flower with the blue center. The Zion series has a new earth tone bloom. It is a soft peach with gold tips and a greenish center. Another new one is Zion Purple Sun. This may not be for everyone as it Is orange and purple.

Spring is coming, really! Look for these plants at your local nursery then. In the meantime, we can dream about the perfect garden. (It never happens).
