Once in a lifetime hunt

If you are really lucky, you may get one of these tags, but the odds are against you.

There were 15,334 applicants for a big horn sheep tag, and four were given out in North Dakota.

That's as lucky as winning the lottery. North Dakota Game and Fish says this is the hardest tag to draw in the country because of how many hunters put in and the limited tags given out.

So you can just about imagine how excited 26-year-old Ty Evenson of Garrison was when he was one of the four to get a tag this year.

Evenson has been hunting for as long as he can remember. He used to hunt geese and pheasant with his friends in high school.

Now he goes bow and rifle hunting for white tail deer with his father mostly. They also hunt pheasant and coyotes.

But he has always had his eye on the prize.

"I've been putting in for the sheep, elk and moose tags, the Big Three, since I was 15 years old," Evenson said. "So, 11 years."

He dropped his \$5 registration fee in the mail to enter the lottery without thinking too much about his name being drawn.

"So when I got the tag I was

super pumped," he said. "It didn't seem real!"

Evenson's tag cost \$30. Sheep tags in other states run upwards for \$40,000.

His first call when he got the notice was to his father.

Evenson's dad, Jerry, also puts in every year for the tag. He has drawn an elk tag years ago, and brought home a cow.

Sheep season runs Nov. 1 to Dec. 31, and you are only able to take male sheep (rams).

That first weekend he headed out to his unit, about 10 miles south of Medora.

'Opening weekend I had my dad, brother-in-law, cousin and two friends from work with me," Evenson said. "We didn't get him opening weekend and ended up going back out Nov. 6 with my cousin, Travis Even-

getting your sheep right away adds a bit of urgency to the next week's hunt.

A few days later he headed back to Medora.

"I did feel some pressure, especially after we had some missed opportunities with the one (sheep) I was going after," Evenson said. "But we just kept pushing and working for

He got his sheep that after-

"We hunted (him) for four days," he said. "It was right around 45 miles of walking between pre-scouting and hunting.'

The sheep was estimated to be about 12 and a half years

He wasn't sure on weight since he had walked two and a half miles in to the wilderness to get him. They field dressed and carried it out.

His biggest prize prior to this hunt was his first buck he shot with his bow. But, he said, this sheep shoulder mount will definitely top that since there have only been 249 rams taken in North Dakota since the state started giving out tags in 1975.

"It was truly something I'll never forget, it was really a once in a lifetime experience," hopefully be one of the few

Fish house regulations

Winter anglers are reminded that any fish house left unoccupied on North Dakota waters must be made out of materials that will allow it to

Other fish house regulations include:

Fish houses do not require

Occupied structures do not require identification.

However, any unoccupied fish house must have an equipment registration number issued by the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, or the owner's name, and either address or telephone number, displayed on its outside in readily distinguishable characters at least three inches high.


Fish houses may not be

placed closer than 50 feet in any direction to another house without consent of the occupant of the other fish house.

All unoccupied fish houses must be removed from all waters after midnight, March 15.

Anglers should refer to the 2018-20 North Dakota Fishing Guide for other winter fishing regulations.





Into the world: A Hazen student's journey abroad

Every so often, you find yourself able to embark on the trip of a lifetime.

Sometimes it's for a day, sometimes a week. But sometimes it can be for longer, even several months. And such a trip is likely to leave a lasting impression.

That was the case for Aimee Wiedrich.

"I've been thinking about doing a foreign exchange program since my freshman year, but I didn't start actually acting on it until November of last year," Wiedrich recalled.

The process moved quickly from there. She turned in her application for participating in the program in January of this year, and was accepted in February, flying out July 10 for a new temporary home across the ocean, a home she would stay at until her return to America Nov. 24.

Her destination? Melbourne, Australia, where she would stay with a host family and experience a semester of education abroad.

Wiedrich actually lived in the suburbs of the sprawling city, in a town called Wantirna South. She lived in the upper levels of an apartment there with her host family: Deborah and Andrew Judkins and their 10 year old daughter Lacey. Andrew and Deborah own two different wedding venues, with Deborah handling the wedding planning and helping the bride while Andrew handled much of the business and financial side of the work.

Before she could get to know her new home, she first had to get there. A series of connecting flights from Bismarck to Minne-

apolis to San Francisco to Melbourne made up the trip, with a 15 hour flight between the last two desti-

In addition to the length of the trip, there is also the time difference, magnified by crossing the International Date Line. Wiedrich said she wasn't able to sleep much on the plane ride, but despite arriving early in the morning, Melbourne time, her host family wouldn't let her sleep. They kept her awake until that evening, and Wiedrich credits this for her quick adjustment to the new time zone.

"I kind of like to say my very first impression was I was so full of confidence and very excited. Then, when I got to the airport [in Melbourne], before I even got through customs, I saw the toilets were set up differently than in America, and I didn't know what to do. And my confidence sort of disappeared, and that's when the nerves started hitting.'

Only two days after her arrival, Wiedrich found herself entering the doors of The Knox School, a prepthru-12 private school that Lacey Judkins was also attending. She found an education experience very similar and yet worlds apart from what she grew up knowing in Hazen.

"It's almost the same," she said. "It starts at 8:40 instead, and gets out at 3:40."

However, there were also significant differences, like alternating daily schedules. Because it is a private school, Wiedrich said they were able to make some of their own decisions, like getting out at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, and reducing the number of periods in a

day from five on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays to three on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

In total, Wiedrich attended six different classes that varied in their times among the three or five period days. These were English 11, Chemistry, Legal Studies, Theater Studies, Math

Methods and German.

"The German class was kind of fun," she said. "So we had a British teacher, Frau Beard, last name spelled like the facial hair. So there was a bunch of Australians and an American speaking German in British accents."

Other differences included a lack of actual assigned homework, with the only things counting towards her grade being school assessed coursework (or SACs) and the exams.

She also said the subjects were dealt with differently than in America. Whereas in the United States you might progress from algebra to trig, or from biology to chemistry, in Australia you take Year 9 English or Year 10 math, which includes all the different aspects of the subject area at higher levels.

While attending The Knox School, Wiedrich was also a part of the school senior concert band, symphonic

estimated population of just shy of 5 million people. But she grew to love the experience.

"So Melbourne has a reputation for being the most livable city, and it was," she said. "It was very clean, and the people were very nice. It was also very modern."

Wiedrich said there was a large shopping mall across the street. She and the friends she made often visited many of the businesses around the streets, and Wiedrich noted there aren't a lot of chain stores, but mostly individual businesses she came across.

"It is more of an upscale area," Wiedrich said, speaking of Wantirna South. "There's a lot of vegetation, and the people that lived there are very proud of it and it was kept very maintained."

She said the apartment she lived in stuck out, being a unique building of many different squares of different colors. She added it was called the "Kubix Building", and noted it had a sort of resemblance to a Rubik's Cube.


Among her experiences in the Melbourne area included seeing local attractions like Flinders Street Station,




"It was life-changing," Wiedrich said. "It opened my eyes and helped me realize there's so much more to the world than just Hazen, North Dakota."
