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

Bake Some Comforting **Biscuits** This Winter

All restaurants and stores were closed due to the blizzard, and I was in search of comfort food for brunch.

Biscuits and scrambled eggs with the leftover holiday ham sounded tasty to me.

"Do we have any canned biscuits?" I asked as I searched the fridge.

"I don't think so," my husband replied. "Why don't you be a pioneer woman and make them from scratch?"

The roads to the nearby grocery store were undriveable, so making some hearty homemade biscuits sounded like a good plan to

I picked up my phone and looked for a recipe online. I found one I had never tried.

I gathered all the ingredients and quickly began mixing. When my husband saw me dipping the small chunks of butter out of the flour, he decided to tease me a little.

"Ha. Ha. You mixed the ingredients in the wrong order." he commented.

Why did he have to see

I was working too fast. I added the missing ingredient to the flour, blended it and added the butter chunks. Then I handed my husband the pastry blender.

"Have you seen the TV show 'Dateline'?" I asked with a smirk on my face.

He knew where I was going with my counter-teasing.

"Yes, I suppose this would be an episode where the wife sends her husband out to plow snow, and he disappears," he replied.

"Maybe that's what I was thinking," I noted. "The plowing can wait because I need a little help. You can blend the butter into the flour.

Our collaborative cooking effort yielded some really tasty biscuits. We have a lot of background in the food science area. My husband was a flour milling superintendent for more than 20 years at a couple of large food companies, where the mills produced a million pounds of flour daily. I have a doctorate in cereal chemistry.

Winter is a prime time to explore some culinary challenges. Making yeast bread and quick breads is a lesson in food science and fills your home with a delicious aroma.

Biscuits, muffins, cakes and cookies typically rely on baking powder and/or baking soda to rise in the oven. These leavening agents produce carbon dioxide in the right conditions and allow the baked good to rise. Baking powder includes an acid such as tartaric acid, along with baking soda (sodium bicarbonate).

Careful measuring and proper mixing are keys to baking success. Biscuits should be tender, light and airy with layers that separate. When you cut in the butter, you are separating the gluten proteins. Overkneading the dough can result in flat, tough biscuits when the gluten proteins are overdeveloped.

We used all-purpose flour in the recipe. It is used widely in baked goods, including biscuits, cookies and muffins. It is a blend of "hard" and "soft" wheat grains to reach the correct protein level for baking success.

Bread flour is made from hard wheat (such as hard red spring wheat grown widely in North Dakota) or another "hard" flour. It typically is used to make yeast bread. The higher protein content in bread flour helps create a strong structure

during the mixing process. Yeast ferments the flour starch and/or sugar, producing carbon dioxide.

Cake flour is made from softer wheat varieties and produces a finer, more delicate-textured baked product. If you need 1 cup of cake flour, remove 2 tablespoons of all-purpose flour from the cup and add 2 tablespoons of corn starch.

Self-rising flour already has salt and the leavening agent added to it. Be sure to use a recipe that was developed for this flour product. Usually the company prints recipes on the flour bag.

Whole-wheat flour includes all parts of the grain, including the bran and germ. It is higher in fat and, therefore, can become rancid during storage. Store whole-wheat flour in a cool, dark place. If you won't use up the whole-wheat flour within a couple of months, store the flour package in your refrigerator or freezer in a resealable freezer bag.

The homemade biscuits were much tastier than biscuits from a can. My thanks goes to "momontimeout.com" for posting this recipe for me to adapt slightly. My little blunder during mixing had no effect, by the way. The hot biscuits were delicious with a drizzle of honey.

Homemade Biscuits

3 c. all-purpose flour

3 Tbsp. sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. cream of tartar

3/4 c. cold butter

1 egg

1 c. cold milk

Note: I reduced the sugar to 2 tablespoons, and used unsalted butter and low-fat

Preheat oven to 450 F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or lightly grease. Cut the cold butter into small pieces and put in refrigerator until ready to incorporate. Combine the dry ingredients in a large bowl. Mix egg and milk in a cup with a whisk. Add butter to dry ingredients and cut the butter into the mixture using a pastry blender until the particles are about the size of peas. Add the egg-milk mixture to the dough. Mix just until combined. Place the dough onto a floured surface and knead about 10 times. Pat the dough into a circle about 3/4 inch thick, then cut with a floured round biscuit cutter or glass. Pat out remaining dough and cut. Bake for about 12 minutes or until golden

Makes 12 biscuits. Each biscuit has 240 calories, 12 grams (g) fat, 4 g protein, 27 g carbohydrate, 1 g fiber and 280 milligrams sodium.

Dakota Uplander: Halftime Report

The firearms deer season serves as the often spectaclefilled halftime show for the upland season in which wingshooters trade in their shotguns for rifles or exchange their #5 shot for slug ammunition.

Like the midpoint of a football game, the switch to deer season also gives those in the know a moment to lay out how things went in the first half in the region's uplands and what can be expected in the second half.

Throughout North and South Dakota, struggles with weather and conditions in the early portion of the upland seasons for sharptailed grouse and pheasants were notable,

some great opportunities for hunters venturing out after their venison has been turned into the processor.

Northern Efforts

"It would be a tough halftime, I'd say we're playing more like the Cincinnati Bengals than we should be and probably in a recovering year" said North Dakota Game & Fish Department (NDG&F) Upland Game Management Supervisor Jesse Kolar, "the one thing we didn't expect was perhaps some of the difficulty with the abnormal weather this vear." he continued, citing access issues due to flooded roads and moisture delaying harvest.

A blizzard dropping 30 inches of snow over portions


but the second half sets out of eastern North Dakota, and more than a foot over south central and southeastern areas of the state hampered hunter efforts in getting out after birds on the mosthunted days of the year.

With many hunters cancelling their plans for traditional opening hunts, Kolar expects the season long harvest numbers to still even things out, despite a decrease in hunters on the landscape and for total pheasants taken to be at or above last year when it was roughly 327,000 roosters. While that heavy snow and the subsequent melt added to flooding conditions in sloughs and lowlands which often harbor pheasants, there is an upside to the abundant moisture, according to Kolar.

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PLOTS Program to keep growing in 2020

With gains of nearly 30,000 acres in the Private Land Open to Sportsmen, or PLOTS, program from 2018 to 2019, the North Dakota Game & Fish Department is eyeing a continued increase of quality hunting lands for sportsmen across the state heading into

of private land contracted with the department for hunter ess from a high of over one million acres in the mid-2000s, NDG&F Private Lands Section Leader Kevin Kading suggests the program is poised to make the most of the opportunities currently on the landscape, benefitting both landowners and sportsmen in the coming year and long into the future.

Future Focused on Quality

'We still have our sights set on a million acres as far as an overall goal, but we don't have a timeline; we're not going to get excited about that as far as losing sight of quality," Kading stated, "with all the work that goes into one PLOTS agreement, 30,000 acres last year was a big

lift because a lot of those acres were new habitat, new grass plantings, five or six thousand acres of those are new grass," he added, stressing that a lot of time and effort goes into getting all aspects, from the contract, to the planting, to the cost-share programs to be analyzed.

When the state boasted more than three million acres of private marginal lands enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Now at about 791,000 acres Program (CRP), the process seemed almost as simple as hanging up new signs around the grasslands which landowners made available to the NDG&F for the program and ultimately to hunters. Now with significantly less land enrolled in CRP, locking down quality tracts of habitat provides more of a challenge for Kading's team, which consists of eight private lands biologists around the state. These staffers cover multiple counties and are on the ground working with landowners finalizing agreements, developing the best seed mixes for the terrain, assessing the habitat needs for their region's wildlife and other efforts related to the process.

They're the ones that hunters should be thanking," Kading said.

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Icing Winter Trout

On the heels of a fast fall bite, trout in lakes and ponds can provide quick action under the ice as well, and a variety of tactics will add a good deal of color to any ice fishing adventure where these fish are found. Whether stocked or naturally occurring, and where ice fishing for them is allowed, stationary efforts, flashy lures and simple baits help cover water and catch more trout when the hardwater season sets in.

Quick Glance

It's important to understand the various regulations in place from state to state and even from lake to lake throughout North Dakota when it comes to ice fishing for trout. A few lakes throughout the state prohibit ice angling for trout while other waters prohibit the use of live bait for these species.

Additionally, crossing the borders into any other state such as Minnesota, South Dakota or Montana brings a number of new regulations into play, season dates governing closed ice opportunities, and access restrictions to certain lakes and reservoirs during the hardwater season. Be familiar with those rules in place for a destination trout water and know what type of tactics can be employed for success.

Look Up, Tip Up

In winter, trout will roam the water column, but like many species will rise to an offering. It's not uncommon to find them a few feet below the bottom of the ice, so be a sonar unit from just below that point on down to the

On those impoundments where trout are present and tip-up use is allowed, set out as many as can be utilized to cover the various depths in the surrounding area, and document where each one is set at. Punch a large grid of holes and as a hot flag develops, move the outlying tip-ups in line with the fish trap that is getting the most action. Note the bottom depth and where fish are coming in relation to it and coordinate rod-based efforts off those numbers.

For those lakes where live bait is not legal, tip-ups rigged with light line leaders and small hooks stacked with maggots can produce, but automatic rod-based hook-setting units will be even better at connecting with the sometimes subtle bite trout species have when it comes to these tinier offerings. Otherwise, on those lakes where minnow use is permitted, eightpound fluorocarbon leaders of three feet in length rigged with a split shot and #4 hook baited with a minnow of two or three inches is a perfect offering for trout. If possible, punch holes before dawn and have tip-ups spread out before first light as trout are often active in the early morning hours and again in late afternoon.

Giving the noise and vibration time to dissipate and an opportunity for trout to cruise back in is vital to success and more shouts of "FLAG!"

Hot Roddin'

Trout can provide a great deal of on-ice excitement

prepared to find flickers on with the most basic of ice fishing tackle, as a simple medium action ice rod rigged with four-pound test line will deliver those lures and baits that trigger the hard strike of rainbow, brown or cutthroat trout residing under the ice in a given lake. Flashy lures pay off at early ice, and spoons like the Swedish Pimple and Kastmaster with a good deal of flash and flutter on the rise and fall draw aggressive trout in for a look and a strike.

> While some trout can get large, consider using spoons a step down in size from what may be employed for walleyes. Instead of a quarter-ounce, scale down to a eighth.

> Where legal, tip them with minnows or minnow heads to add some flavor to their flicker, or on those lakes where live baitfish are prohibited, use waxworms, maggots, mousies or artificial baits such as Gulp! maggots and waxies in a variety of colors. Other options for trout under the ice include small jigs tipped with waxies or maggots, along with hackled and marabou jigs in more natural colors like olive, brown and black.

> This winter get an understanding of the trout fishing options in the immediate area and add some very memorable angling moments to your onice experiences. By covering water with tip-ups and other stationary methods while exploring points, drops, adjacent flats and other high-percentage areas with active offerings for cruising trout, success can come quickly and lead to a season of excitement.

Ice access points on lake announced

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Garrison Project, announced their 2019-2020 winter access policy this week. This year there will be 113 areas/points of entry to Lake Sakakawea and 20 areas/points of entry to Lake Audubon.

The areas/points of entry are a combination of boat ramps, shoreline access sites, and freeways located in limited development areas. Univ a couple of these points will be foot traffic only, mainly due to terrain. Entry points, defined in the policy, are available for the period of the calendar year in which Lake Sakakawea and Lake Audubon freeze over until April 1 of each calendar year, or until the lake becomes ice free, whichever occurs first.

Three ice access locations have been removed from the approved list. The first of which is the Red Mike Mid Gate Shoreline Access, located just east of Lund's Landing (White Tail Bay). This access crosses through private property and may be opened at a later date. There are also two areas near Riverdale that are no longer approved ice access locations. The Lake Sakakawea State Park East of Cabin Area and Old Highway 83 South access locations, due too severe erosion in 2019. These areas are currently unsafe and should not be used for accessing the ice.

The Corps of Engineers now updates and maintains an interactive web application pertaining to ice access locations. The web application displays all approved ice access locations and their status. There are two ways that users can access the data. There is a web link is https://arcg.is/jTe0T and can be used on any computer or smart phone. Users can also download the ESRI application on either iPhone or Android. The ESRI application is free. Open the ESRI application and search "Lake Sakakawea Ice Access."

The Corps of Engineers does not encourage or recommend driving on the ice at any time. For those that do recreate on the ice, the Omaha District urges extreme caution as any winter activity performed on the ice can be hazardous. For instance, thin ice or open water may exist near springs and pressure ridges throughout the winter.

Anglers are required to use only licensed, motorized vehicles and existing authorized public roads for entering and leaving ice fishing access areas. Some public roads often drift closed with snow and will not be plowed open. In these instances, operating a motor vehicle off-road to obtain access

is not allowed. Additionally, the public is reminded that access is for ice fishing purposes only. Restrictions are in place to preclude using the ice to cross the reservoir, which has occurred in some areas in the past few years.

All Title 36 Regulations apply to the Ice Fishing Access Sites. North Dakota Game and Fish WMA Regulations apply within all Wildlife Management Areas located on Corps lands around the reservoir. Additionally, North Dakota Game and Fish has specific regulations pertaining to the use of ice/ fish/spearing houses within the State of North Dakota.

The Corps advises, "Have fun this winter and be safe; "ALWAYS, KNOW BEFORE YOU GO." Check in with someone who is near the particular body of water where you are accessing. Bait shops, outfitters, game wardens, and public land managers are all valuable sources for ice condition updates.



CREAMY ITALIAN CHICKEN

Ingredients

- 4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (6 ounces each)
- 1 envelope Italian salad dressing mix
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted
- 1 can (4 ounces) mushroom stems and pieces, drained
- Hot cooked pasta or rice
- Minced fresh oregano, optional

Directions

Place the chicken in a 3-qt. slow cooker. Combine salad dressing mix and water; pour over chicken. Cover and cook on low for 3 hours. Remove chicken. Cool slightly; shred meat with two forks. Return to slow cooker.

In a small bowl, beat cream cheese and soup until blended. Stir in mushrooms. Pour over chicken. Cover and cook until chicken is tender, 1 hour longer. Serve with pasta or rice. If desired, sprinkle with oregano.

CARAMEL-PECAN STICKY BUNS

Ingredients

- 1 package (1/4 ounce) active dry yeast
- 3/4 cup warm water (110° to 115°)
- 3/4 cup warm milk (110° to 115°)
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 3-3/4 to 4-1/4 cups all-purpose flour FILLING:
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

Directions

In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add the milk, sugar, oil, salt and 1-1/4 cups flour. Beat on medium speed for 2-3 minutes or until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough.

Turn onto a floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour.

Punch dough down. Turn onto a lightly floured surface. Roll into an 18x12-in. rectangle. Spread butter to within 1/2 in. of edges. Combine sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over butter. Roll up jelly-roll style, starting with a long side: pinch seam to seal. Cut into 12 slices.

Combine brown sugar and cream; pour into a greased 13x9-in. baking pan. Sprinkle with pecans. Place rolls cut side down over pecans. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 1 hour.

Bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes or until well browned. Cool for 1 minute before inverting onto a serving platter. **8** | 01.20.20 | Xtra

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
