Covid-19 changed the complexion of my summer and that of many other folks, but what it failed to affect, save for the occasional cancelation of a fishing derby or walleye tournament I may have participated in or covered, was the summer angling efforts across the map. In fact, many state agencies around the country are reporting a solid spike in angling license sales in 2020 due to the current situation. Outside of those few social aspects that a weekend fishing event brings to the pastime, most angling is done alone or with a close friend or family members and remains relatively untouched by the pandemic, and the solitude found in a stream or on a lake fosters further use of the resource. The same can be said for hunting, and despite the ongoing medical emergency spanning the country and the globe, with some opening dates already passed on the calendar and those to come over the next several weeks.

While hunting as a large group is tradition, particularly on those big openers like pheasant season and deer firearms, so many opportunities cater to the solo hunter, the father-son pair or a trio of buddies in the field. It's likely in this time of social distancing that hunting will continue to help fill the void for safe recreational opportunities, and with so many chances to chase waterfowl, upland game and big game on the horizon or already upon us, whatever break one might have had – if any – is over and the takeover of those open days by these autumn outdoor opportunities is about to begin.

It's a noted saying in the upper Midwest that "hunting and fishing often gets in the way of my hunting and fishing." In the fall, that statement couldn't be more true, especially on the hunting side of the coin. As an avid uplander and bow

hunter, it's often tough to choose between time on stand or starting a morning in the field behind my dog. I find it hard to believe I could make a decision if I added waterfowl to the mix, but for those who are more versatile than I, my guess is it is a welcome challenge penciling in their autumn weekends and scheduling out their hunts. No rest for the willing who rise before dawn and come in from a road traveled in the dark after tapping the last minute of legal light waiting for their quarry. The effort and enjoyment goes far beyond the time in a tree or breaking a sweat along the edge of a brushline of buffaloberries and caragana. Whether it's washing a load of camo in scent-free soap, or strapping a canine carrier into the back of a truck, while leaving room for a bow case and a set of tree steps, preparation is half the fun of getting set for an amazing stretch of hunting. What-

ever it takes to prepare for success is easily accomplished this time of year as a new autumn sets out before us and takes over much of the free time allotted. That's a price of admission that's easy to pay, particularly with college and pro football operating on a limited scale, if at all for some schools, leaving more time for the field and less time in front of the screen screaming at yet another missed field goal.

So if you've been on snooze for the last few weeks, working your way through the dog days of summer, or have just taken some time off to enjoy a final stretch of fishing over the Labor Day weekend, fall is here in one form or another, and the excitement of hunting is about to take over your life. Wake up, shake off the rust and get ready for your quarry to break loose in the field, regardless of if it crows, honks, grunts, ruts, flies or bounds away.





Golf tournament hits close to home

For the last two decades, the Sanford Health Foundation Great American Bike Race (GABR) has raised over \$4 million to support children and young adults in central and western North Dakota with cerebral palsy and other childhood-onset conditions that affect development.

For the second year in a row, Jeff Frank will be leading and hosting a golf tournament that benefits the GABR.

Frank said, "One hundred percent of the proceeds from the golf tournament go to the GABR. From there, families that have children or individuals with cerebral palsy and other onset disabilities can apply for grants for that money."

Frank has many titles. For one, he is a second-grade teacher at Beulah Elementary.

But he's also known as other things. He is a husband to his wife Pam and he is a father to his three children: daughters Raya and Nora, and son Amarok.

Because of his middle child Nora, the GABR is a cause that's very close to his heart.

Frank said, "Unfortunately, I didn't know about it before that. When she was born, she was a 25 weeker. She had some brain injuries from birth. She was diagnosed with cerebral palsy. Sanford Health told us about the GABR. We've been a part of it ever since."

Frank and his family have received incredible assistance from the foundation.

"It's really easy to get a grant from the foundation. My wife and I – we've gotten grants before that helped us pay for driving back and forth to Bismarck. My daughter has therapy twice a week in Bismarck," Frank said.

"They've helped pay for part of our van. We have a van that's handicap accessible. They help out with that kind of stuff," Frank added.

Frank also knows that his family isn't the only one that's been affected and received assistance from the

GABR.

He said, "I know just in the Hazen-Beulah area – there's at least four or five different families that get help from the GABR."

This is the second year that Frank is hosting the golf tournament.

"Last year with this golf tournament, I was thinking what can I do to raise a little bit more money and awareness for cerebral palsy and the Great American Bike Race," Frank said.

He added, "Last year was a really good success. We had 18 teams. This year, the tournament's already full."

The rules for this tournament are a bit different than what you'd see in a regular golf tournament. There are nine holes total.

"We're not worried about how good at golfing you are. On one hole, you use a sling-shot," Frank said.

"Another hole – I call it wheelchair putt-putt. I got my daughter's wheelchairs. So I'm blocking the hole. It's like miniature golf," Frank added.

One of the other holes has a more profound meaning behind it because of Nora.

Frank said, "There was a point in my life where I just





thought she was going to be in a vegetative state. You know, not really do much."

"But she sits in her chair and she claps and she hums. She's a pain in the butt sometimes. Anything she can reach, she's throwing it on the floor," Frank added.

Frank said that Nora's favorite song is 'If You're Happy & You Know It'. He also said that she'll clap her hands and kick her feet to it.

"So on hole four, I'm having everyone tee off at the same time. And they have to sing 'if you're happy and you know it clap your hands' – swing. They all have to

swing at the same time," Frank said.

"So it's amazing cause I never thought that she was going to be able to do some of these things," Frank added.

Last year's tournament raised over two thousand dollars. Frank spoke of the current progress.

"This year, just through donations and stuff – we're over that," he said.

Speaking of the businesses that donated, Frank said there were quite a few from both Hazen and Beulah that contributed. Some of the donations were prizes to give away at the tournament while other donations were monetary.

"The Union Bank and Wayne Hoffner donated. West Dakota Lumber, D'Andreas Hot Stuff Pizza, and the IBEW Local 1593 (International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers) donated. And the Then & Now Candy Store in Beulah donated. There's just so many," Frank said.

Frank also said that

Krause's Super Valu is doing loaded baked potato feed for the tournament as well.

The key to great grouse hunting is to put in some extra leg work and visit those trails where trucks and ORVs can't go. The winding one-person path can lead to the promised land when it comes to ruffed grouse, and the only way to get there is on foot. Those boggy areas that would prevent motorized travel generally can be skirted on foot in the late season, providing you access to a whole new habitat that hunters who stick to their wheels just won't have. Be ready to walk a few extra miles, and do it slowly, pausing often in order to bag a few extra birds each season. Under a canopy of red, orange and gold, there are few other afternoon walks as beautiful or as exciting when the leaves are scattered by a flushing grouse.

GET AN EDGE

Key in on places where old growth meets new, where clearings occur and where water winds its way through the woods. Look for distinct areas of forest management, maybe where pine meets aspen, or where mature popples bump up against young trees just establishing themselves. These spaces, along with water sources and terrain can provide a pattern to the area in regard to where

birds locate and can be found time and again. Use a GPS to mark flushes on each trail and revisit them on your next walk; that way you'll be a step ahead of the game later in the season.

DOG IT

Watching a dog twisting and turning around and through bushes, trunks and leaf litter before sending a ruffed grouse booming up through the trees is one of the great sights to behold each fall. Get your hunting buddy in on the action and introduce his nose to a new quarry. They are invaluable in flushing this bird which is fond of staying put until long after the dogless hunter has walked on by, and in finding a wounded one that might otherwise be lost after the shot in the browns and grays of the forest floor.

While the opportunity presents itself, take advantage of thousands of acres of public forest land filled with good numbers of birds this season. Be ready with these tips and learn a few new tricks of your own chasing the thunderous flush of the ruffed grouse...in our outdoors.

The ruffed grouse season starts on Sat. Sept. 12 in North Dakota, and Sat. Sept. 19 in Minnesota.
