

OUR OUTDOORS

The Most Important Season

Don your blaze orange, secure your tag, check your scope one more time and stuff a package of hand warmers in your vest pocket because the big day is just about here. Firearms deer season starts this weekend and you don't want to miss out on the excitement that comes with "the granddaddy of them all" when it comes to hunting.

No matter how you do it, in a group of family and friends, pushing hard through a cattail slough driving bucks and does to the end of a draw, or sitting silently alone in a stand overlooking a trail on a field edge, or mentoring a new hunter along the hillsides of your favorite creek bottom — it is the biggest day on the hunting calendar.

This year the season has gotten even bigger as deer hunting holds a little bit more importance in the hearts of hunters and arguably, the public psyche. For the last 300 days or so, that primal part of our minds (the one which controls fight, flight, feed, and other basic instincts) has been on overdrive, or at least heightened, considering all the craziness that 2020 has thrown at us.

Reports from around the nation continue to come in that more and more people are taking to the field and

getting back to the hunt to test themselves. More people are finding an outlet in nature, and in that caveman sense, providing in a time when everything seems so out of control, as the first inkling that we can't always rely on a commercial supply chain has settled in and store shelves in some places have resembled a CNN report from 1980s Russia. Whatever brings more people back to the fold is good, be it fight, flight or food, and deer season is no better time to experience the outdoors

As on edge as the world has been leading up to this week – socially, politically, electorally and pandemically – it's enough to permanently raise a person's pulse rate, save for those few moments one can turn off the TV or cease the online doom scrolling on social media and squeeze it all out.

But with deer hunting, it's often the opposite. It consists of stretches of extended tranquility punctuated by the thunder of an elevated heartbeat when a buck bursts from cover on a hike or suddenly appears out of the foggy morning while a person is seated and staring off into the nether. When one is lost in those thoughts that only seem to come when we're not gazing at a screen: processing life, watching the world shift, and perhaps thinking that both physical spring and a metaphorical one isn't really all that far off after the season. It serves as not only a reminder of how things once might have been, but hopefully how they can be again.

For the experienced hunter, the start of the firearms deer season marks the return to traditions, a time to connect with how everything started, and pass that on to the next generation; another element which adds to the significance of the days to come.

It's recalling the advice that was given to you, about a safe shot, how animals move, what a cold snap does and what to watch for in the field. In an era where fewer people have been heading out into the field due to diminished time, access, or other limitations, we suddenly find ourselves under the silver lining of a gray cloud.

Many new or inactive hunters are looking for that opportunity to explore the experience running from the sighting-in of a rifle on the range, to the snap of a twig on the forest floor, to the sausage making in the smokehouse a few weeks down the road. While the granddaddy of them all may be so named because it is the final major season of the hunting calendar and signals the end of autumn for many, for others the deer firearms season is just the beginning.

They've earned this season and so have you. Stay safe, think twice, shoot once and enjoy each moment before and after the moment of truth. Through countless days of quarantine and hours of breaking news, through pollwatching and political discord, you've persevered. For those efforts, and the ones required to keep the tradition going, this firearms deer season is a reward for a job well done, loaded with gifts all its own.

It's time to find both the social and the distance we've all been seeking, as part of a blaze orange brotherhood spread out in the field together in the most important season... in our outdoors.





Deer Season Questions and Answers

NDGF NEWS

Every year the North Dakota Game and Fish Department receives questions from deer hunters who want to clarify rules and regulations. Some common questions are listed below. Hunters with further questions are encouraged to visit the Game and Fish Department's website, gf.nd. gov., or call 701-328-6300, from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. weekdays.

What licenses do I need for deer gun season? A general game and habitat stamp or a combination license, and the deer license. Gratis license holders need only the gratis license.

I have a concurrent season license. When can I use it? The license can be used during the archery season with a bow; the deer gun season with a bow, rifle or muzzleloader; or the muzzleloader season with a muzzleloader. You are restricted to the type of antlerless deer printed on the license and must stay in the unit to which the license is assigned.

Can hunters age 14 or 15 (in 2020) with a youth season license who did not harvest a deer during the youth season, hunt the regular deer gun season with this license? Yes, but you are subject to the restrictions listed on the license.

I was unsuccessful in filling my mule deer buck license in a restricted unit during the youth season. Can I hunt the remainder of the state during the regular gun season? No. You are restricted to the same unit as during the youth season.

I shot a deer, but it is rotten. What can I do? You must take possession of the animal by tagging it. A license only allows you the opportunity to hunt. It is not a guarantee to harvest a deer, or to the quality of the animal.

What should I do if I find a wounded deer? Contact a game warden. Do not shoot the deer unless you want to tag it or are instructed acceptable for the deer gun season? No. You must wear both a hat and outer garment above the waistline totaling at $least\,400\,square\,inches\,of\,solid$ daylight fluorescent orange.

I hunt with a bow. When do I have to wear orange? Only during the regular deer gun season.

Can I hunt road rightsof-way? Do not hunt on road rights-of-way unless you are certain they are open to public use. Most road rights-of-way are easements under control of the adjacent landowner and are closed to hunting when the adjacent land is posted closed to hunting.

Can I hunt on a section line if it is posted on both sides? No. If the land is posted on both sides, the section line is closed to hunting, but is still open for travel.

Can I hunt over bait on private land? It is unlawful to hunt over bait, or place bait to attract big game for the purpose of hunting, in deer hunting units 3A1, 3A2, 3A3 north of U.S. Highway 2, 3B1, 3C west of the Missouri River, 3E1, 3E2, 3F1, 3F2, 4A, 4B and 4C.

What if I want to have a mount made by a taxidermist and take the meat to a butcher shop? How do I keep the tag with it all? The tag should remain with the antlers and the carcass tag should remain with the meat.

I shot a deer in a unit that has carcass transportation restrictions (3A1, 3B1, 3F2, 4B and 4C). What field dressing restrictions must I follow? Hunters cannot transport the whole carcass outside of the unit. Exceptions: meat that has been boned out; quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached; meat that is cut and wrapped either commercially or privately; hides with no heads attached; skull plates with antlers attached having no hide or brain tissue present; intact skulls with the hide, eyes, lower jaw and associated

tissue present; antlers with no meat or tissue attached; upper canine teeth, also known as buglers, whistlers or ivories; and finished taxidermy heads. However, hunters can transport the whole carcass between adjoining CWD carcass restricted units.

Can I retrieve a wounded deer from posted land? If the deer was shot on land where you had a legal right to be and it ran onto posted land, you may retrieve it. However, you may not take a firearm or bow with you. The department suggests contacting the landowner as a courtesy prior to entering.

What if the landowner says I cannot retrieve a deer from posted land that was shot on land where I had a right to be? Contact a game warden.

Can I drive off-trail on private land to retrieve a deer? Unless prohibited by a landowner or operator, you may drive off-trail on private land once a deer has been killed and properly tagged. You must proceed to the carcass by the shortest accessible route and return to the road or trail by the same route.

Can I transport someone else's deer? Yes, but you will need a transportation permit from a game warden. The license holder, person transporting the animal, and the carcass must be presented to the game warden before the permit is issued.

May I carry a pistol when I am hunting with a deer rifle? Yes, but the handgun must meet minimum requirements listed in the deer hunting regulations to be legal for taking deer.

Can I carry both bow and gun afield during deer gun season if I have both licenses? Yes, but only if you are going to fill your gun license. No firearms, except handguns, may be in the hunter's possession while hunting with a deer bow license. However, handguns may not be used in any manner to assist in the harvest of a deer with an archery license.

LEMON BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

By Oh My Goodness Chocolate Desserts

Ingredients

For Streusel Topping:

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup granulated sugar

½ teaspoon cinnamon (or more to taste)

6.5 Tablespoon unsalted butter-melted

For Lemon Blueberry Muffins:

1 ½ cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

2/3 cup granulated sugar

1 Tablespoon grated lemon zest

2 eggs

2/3 cup Greek yogurt

1/3 cup vegetable oil

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice 1 and 1/3 cups blueberries-fresh or frozen (reserve ½ cup of blueberries for topping)

1 tablespoon flour

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 F degrees and line standard muffin or cupcake pan with paper liners and set aside.

To make the crumb topping in a small bowl, whisk together flour, sugar and cinnamon, add melted butter and stir with a fork until crumbly. Refrigerate until ready to use.

To make the muffins in large bowl stir together flour, baking powder and salt and set aside.

In a medium bowl place 2/3 cup granulated sugar and lemon zest and rub for a minute. Add eggs and whisk together eggs and lemon-sugar until combined. Whisk in yogurt, oil, lemon juice and vanilla extract (mixture should be pale and yellow)

Fold wet ingredients into dry ingredients and whisk everything together.

Reserve ½ cup of blueberries for topping. Place remaining blueberries in a small bowl. Dust blueberries with 1 tablespoon flour and toss them until all blueberries are coated with thin layer of flour and then fold them really gently in the batter.

Spoon batter into prepared muffin tins, filling maximum 2/3 of each cup and gently tap the pan on the work surface to set. Cover the batter with the remaining blueberries and then cover the blueberries generously with streusel

Place them in the oven and bake at 400 F for 5 minutes, then REDUCE THE OVEN TEMPERATURE TO 375 F and bake 13-15 minutes or until the toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Cool for 5 minutes in the pan then remove muffins and cool on a wire rack.
