





Surging to the top

A song stirring the world

It was a week these two sisters will never forget.

Kendra and Krista Slaubaugh, the two halves of the sister musical duo Tigirlily, have seen a lot of ups over the years. Starting right here in their hometown of Hazen, their music has inspired and pleased audiences throughout the state and the nation. In August 2017, Tigirlily

In August 2017, Tigirlily moved to Nashville, Tenn. to pursue their dreams, both of higher education and of a future in country music.

Then, on Feb. 24, 2021, their new hit song, "Somebody Does," soared. The tune exploded to No. 1 on iTunes' Country Songs chart, and then to iTunes' All Genres Song chart immediately after its release.

"This past week has probably been one of the best of our lives," Kendra said in an interview last Thursday.

Making it big

The Hazen sisters are both thrilled and overwhelmed by the support their have received.

"We definitely weren't expecting to be charting #1 in country," Kendra said. "We charted No. 1. And then, a little later, we saw we beat out all genres. We were definitely freaking out, a really surreal moment for us."


This surge to the top of iTunes, however, was just the start, as Tigirlily was soon after contacted by Monument Records, a division of Sony Music Entertainment, with the offer for a record deal.

"We just broke down crying," Krista admitted. "Kind of everything we had done up to this point helped us get the deal. It's the culmination of everything, of eight years doing endless shows."

Shortly after these incredible breakthroughs came a shout out in "Rolling Stone," featuring Tigirlily and "Somebody Does" in their Country Music Picks section.

"We'd never been featured in such a big publication," Kendra said. "To share the story behind the song was truly, truly an honor."

The sisters said the new deal opens wide new realms of possibility for them to perform their music. But there's no set path, and no certainty what opportunity might come knocking next.

and the world was just super heavy at the time," Krista said. "And we didn't know what we were going to write. We almost canceled the write."

From this uncertainty, De Vette asked the sisters a single question: "If you had one chance to say something to that hurting world, what would it be?"

The question demanded an answer, and Tigirlily found theirs.

"We wanted to make sure people knew they are loved," Krista said.

From that desire arose a song about the value of each person. The capstone of the song is the end of its chorus: "I don't know who needs to hear this. But I know somebody does." VID-19 pandemic began, the sisters began using social media to reach out, finding a large audience through the TikTok app.

The situation of the previous year has also given them a chance to consider where they want to go with their music from here.

"Especially in the last year, we've taken a lot of time to sit down and decide what we wanted to say to the world," Kendra said. "We want to make music that moves people and that related to people."

Since making the move, the sisters have had many experiences, ranging from their graduation from Belmont University to working with Shane McAnally. Even so, none of these highlights have topped their most recent experiences. Of all their achievements, their top charting and "Rolling Stone" feature are the peaks. But the Slaubaughs have also not forgotten their roots in this new phase of their personal and professional lives. "We're thankful for all the support from North Dakota that everyone's shown," Kendra said. "Hopefully we represent the state and the town in the best way we can." With the current changes and ongoing restrictions, Tigirlily isn't certain yet of the next time they'll be performing in North Dakota, but they hope to return soon. The pulls of two new seasons

I questioned the wind and the chill blowing in the mist rising off the wavy surface of the small powerplant lake, a place I frequent this time of year to cure cabin fever prepare things for openwater and chase the largemouth bass and crappies that are two months ahead of their brothers and sisters in the ice-covered lakes around them.

I knew that the wind was wrong for any effective fishing, coming straight from the far shore and lifting a fog off the water toward the launch, but I was also aware that this might be the only time to get a feel on how the boat was doing and more importantly, the old Mercury 25 on its stern.

I solo launched rather awkwardly, brought the boat to the shoreline, now well exposed from a dry fall and winter, and parked the truck before returning and setting sail against the wind under the full power of the reliable trolling motor on the bow. line and gave the first solid jerk of the season.

Brrrrummbrrrummmumummmmm!!!!

I'm sure my eyes grew to the size of whatever uncooperative monster panfish were below and not biting in the after-effects of the overnight cold front. On the first pull, the motor spit and then streamed the warm lake water out and a white haze of whatever was left in the carburetor after last season and the exhaust of the gasoline mixture disappeared into the fog rolling toward shore.

It achieved a steady hum and the exhaust cleared as I let it idle for a few minutes before I flipped the handle shifter into forward and did donuts on the choppy lake surface to break it in for the season.

As I did, the sun came out and the mist gave way to the warming temperatures of the day and the chilly red in my fingertips subsided to a normal peach. Regardless of the slow bite, it was a great start to the openwater



Ranum WPA to provide habitat for wildlife, options for outdoorsmen

In the formative years of my upland experience, CRP was at its peak, grouse, partridge and pheasants were plentiful and there was an area of PLOTS, WPAs and WMAs just up the hill from my backdoor that provided a young hunter and his dog everything they could want in a walk.

A mixture of food in the surrounding soybeans and corn tied seamlessly into a spread of uplands, cattail sloughs, wetlands and stands of brush and treelines.


It was a place that provided sweaty dove hunts in September, where the early morning crack of heavy loads from nearby goose and duck hunters echoed through the haze of dawn and dusk, to late afternoon October tromps which all but guaranteed a shot at a covey of sharpies or a pack of pheasants, all the way up into December.

This place still exists today in the amalgamation of yellow, green and red on the State's game and fish department public lands map, but now stands to be completed by an amazing acquisition which will provide even more for wildlife, hunters and potentially anglers.

The addition of the Ranum Waterfowl Production Area (WPA) to the area just a few miles north of Valley City is a project led by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) with the help of Dick Monson, a farmer and conservationist from rural Valley City.

The recent purchase looks to not only link together two great parcels in that particular space that are open to public hunting, but also conserve and advance spaces for waterfowl, big game and upland species on down to providing critical habitat for disappearing songbirds such as the bobolink and vital pollinators like monarchs and honeybees which have seen declining numbers in the last 50 years.

What's more, if the waters test right, the parcel could lead to expanded fishing options in the area as well. As part of the project, the FWS is looking to establish native prairie habitat on the parcel to promote more upland game,



habitat, seed marginal ground back to native prairie and forbs, and possibly provide a link to a future ice fishing opportunity! Simonson Image created with North Dakota Game & Fish and FWS maps.

and provide nesting cover for waterfowl, along with nectar sources for pollinators with the help of the state's various sportsman's groups and conservation organizations.

"It will be seeded down to a native mix of grasses, forbs and flowers for wildlife habitat," Monson states, suggesting that all supporting entities, regardless of the habitat and the animals they look to promote, will benefit from the project, adding, "it doesn't just target waterfowl but all wildlife species, so it will be a great addition into the WPAs of North Dakota."

Currently Monson, with the help of the North Dakota non-profit Prairie Pothole Partners, has set up a Facebook Page and donation link for individuals, businesses and organizations to contribute and defray costs of seeding and leverage grants to maximize the effectiveness of the efforts.

What's more, thanks to a generous donation, all dollars pledged will be matched on a one-to-one basis. In total, Mon hopes to raise \$32,000 to pay for the planting mix, which runs about \$500 per acre on the 64 acre portion of uplands to be seeded.

While the planting will help raise birds and butterflies, it will also increase soil quality and that of the nearby water, which at approximately 12 feet in depth, may present an ice fishing option in the near future.

"The general area there north of Valley City is an old lakebed, there are some existing WPAs, the Adams Slough WMA is in there," Monson relates of the easily-identifiable circle of public access lands on the state's hunting maps, "and the North Dakota Game and Fish Department is going to check the oxygen level on the wetland at the Ranum WPA with the possibility of stocking fish, so potentially we could get a new fishing spot in Barnes County."

gun was sitting, but unlike the motor, my aim quickly sputtered and I was all over the place.

It'd be five more targets before I'd connect again, and I'd replay each shot and what I did wrong – behind, jerked, under – trying to find consistency. At the end of mv first round, a disappointing single digit total was all I had to show for my efforts.

But, like the old Mercury, I was determined to stick with it and I ripped the top of another box of shells off and flipped it with the wind into the garbage barrel. The group I had joined had departed, and though they were shooting before I had arrived, I'm somewhat suspicious that they may have been embarrassed to be in my company.

Alone, I went through the five stands, calling for clays from the remote speakers and following them out over the horizon.

Suddenly, like the fuel flowing through the engine of the outboard, things began to grab and refill the spaces in my mind.

Hold points on the house, follow-through at the time

of the trigger pull and after, and the timing between calling for the bird and firing, all began to fall into place, and the number of targets taken climbed up into the teens. With the mental and physical cylinders beginning to click in rhythm, I opted for one more round and things began to hum.

Set-pull!-rise-bang!-dust. Set-pull!-rise-bang!-dust. Setpull!-rise-bang!-dust.

The pattern went unbroken for 11 targets and I finished the final post a perfect five-for-five to end with a 21 and felt confident that would provide a good base for the weeks to come.

My arms and shoulder felt the stress of a different workout from holding and swinging the weight of the heavy trap gun, and the slight soreness in my right cheek was a reminder of a new shooting sports season's start.

While the mechanics of it all didn't quite come together as quickly as that of the motor the morning before, it did eventually. And that's all one can ask for as another pair of seasons get started...in our outdoors.

N.D. coal production reaches 26.4 million tons

The Freedom Mine North of Beulah remains the largest lignite producer in the United States.

North Dakota's five lignite coal mines produced 26.4 million tons of lignite coal in 2020, representing a threepercent drop from the 27.2 million tons mined in 2019. The reduction was largely the result of reduced economic activity due to CO-VID-19 pandemic as well as competition from subsidized wind generation.

The Freedom Mine sold 12.6 million to the Dakota **Gasification Company's** Great Plains Synfuels Plant, along with Basin Electric's Antelope Valley Station and the Leland Olds Station. Sales to the Leland Olds Station was impacted by a

fire to a train trestle that later had to be demolished and reconstructed.

North Dakota's second largest mine was Falkirk near Underwood and sold 7.2 million to serve the Coal Creek Station and the Spiritwood Station. The Center Mine sold 4.1 million to the Young Station. The Coyote Creek Mine produced nearly two million tons in 2019, which were sold to the adjacent Coyote Station, south of Beulah. The smallest mine is the Beulah Mine, which sold 426,000 tons to the Heskett Station north of Mandan.

North Dakota's seven lignite-based power plants generate enough electricity to serve more than

"We didn't feel comfortable having it in January," said Isaak, who said the event has existed for 17 years. "In hindsight, January would have worked. "The size of the deer harvested has gone crazy," Isaak said. "There are a lot of 200-plus white tail and mule deer. Years ago, a 170 or a 180 would get you there. Today that's close to average."

Judge's rulings are final. License holder must accompany any entry. Racks can be brought in from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on March 13. Racks will be released after winners are announced. All entries must be cleaned and dry if horns are on the head. No hides, blood or meat.
