

The Easter lily is a symbol of beauty, hope and life.

For those reasons and many more, Easter lilies are a popular potted flower this time of year. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Floriculture Crop Summary, more than 5 million Easter lilies were sold (wholesale and retail) in 2019.

The Easter lily is native to the southern islands of Japan. Western explorers helped spread the bulbs across the globe. Japan was the top exporter of Easter lilies to the U.S. until World War II. Then growing the bulbs in the U.S. became more economical. Bulbs are grown in the field, harvested and replanted each year for three to four years until they reach the right size and maturity. Then bulbs are shipped off to commercial greenhouse growers. Easter lilies are forced to bloom out of their normal time for the Easter holiday. The program to force bulbs to flower is a tricky process and starts 23 weeks before Easter. The cultivar most commonly

grown is "Nellie White," named for a lily grower's wife. Each flower is 3 to 7 inches long with overlapped petals that create a tube shape. The usual flower color is white, but some cultivars come in shades of pink, yellow or cream.

DAKOTA GARDENER

When selecting your Easter lily, choose plants that have dense foliage along the entire stem. The plant should be about twice as tall as the pot. Look for plants that have lots of buds in different stages of development with a few flowers opened to extend your enjoyment of the Like other plants in the Lilium genus, the Easter lily is highly toxic to cats. Just a few small bites can have a serious effect, resulting in vomiting, kidney failure and, sadly, death.

In warmer climates, (USDA Hardiness zones 5 to 11, depending on the cultivar) Easter lilies can be transplanted into perennial gardens after they are done blooming. In our area, Easter lilies for the most part are treated as temporary house plants.

Easter lilies should be kept away from drafts and excessive heat in your home. They prefer temperatures between 65 and 75 F.

Water when the soil feels dry to the touch. Be careful not to overwater or allow the plant to sit in water. When watering, remove the pot from the foil wrapping or other container to ensure drainage of excess water. Place the pot in the sink or other large container to catch the excess water.

Once the flowers open, remove the yellow anthers in the center with a tweezers to extend the bloom time. there have tried and succeeded in overwintering Easter lilies in our climate. Let me know if you are one of those gardeners. I would love to hear about it!

As much as I dislike composting plants, this gardener will not try to overwinter or force Easter lilies out of season. It is an even more complicated process than getting my Christmas cactus to bloom. Happy gardening!

Don't Think Twice – Wear It!

from the stern of the boat and into the flow which was running fast and just a few degrees above freezing. With no life jacket on, he quickly sank in the rolling current and his fishing buddy was unable to reach him as he drifted away and began to drop below the surface.

Amazingly enough, a speeding boat was buzzing into the area and saw the man go under and zipped over, lowering a net into the water where the angler's hand had just disappeared under the surface.

Miraculously, they snagged it in a single pass as his fingers faded from view below the brown-tinged water. With some effort, the sputtering, freezing fisherman was pulled aboard the passing boat; his life certainly saved by the efforts of the good Samaritans who happened to be coming through the spot at just the right time.

The next morning, under my ice fishing jacket and overalls, I clipped together the three straps of the bright yellow life jacket I had brought with in the back of the car to placate my wife and proceeded to fish the chilly weekend sturgeon tournament and the rest of the spring and summer with one on.

Having rarely utilized them as a younger angler, I was fortunate to only fall out of the boat on accident twice, both in shallow water and in the heat of summer. Since beginning to wear my life jacket on every trip, regardless of whether I'm in my tiller boat, my console-based craft or the family pontoon, I've yet to hit the water. But I rest comfortably knowing that if I did, my life jacket would be there to help me stay afloat, no matter how cold, wavy or inhospitable things may get.

Best of all, once worn, it becomes as familiar as a seatbelt, a treestand harness or

a blaze orange vest, and it now feels no different than those safety mechanisms I employ in all other aspects of my outdoor adventures.

The man at the lodge bar was lucky, everyone in the boats around him knew how serious his situation was, and they didn't need statistics to prove it. However, each year according to the U.S. Coast Guard, hundreds of people die in boating accidents. In cases where drowning is the determined cause of death, 84.5 percent of those individuals were not wearing life jackets.

As more and more people take to the water each year, and most states do not require adults to wear personal floatation devices (most requirements are limited to children), the risk for accidental drowning remains high should things go south in a watercraft. Particularly in the spring, when cold waters cause an immediate loss of buoyancy due to the shock and rapid exhale the body experiences upon submergence. life jackets are a vital tool in surviving an on-the-water emergency.

We don't think twice about our inadvertent role in capitalism and marketing programs wearing our favorite fishing lure sweatshirts or caps on the water each spring and summer. We don't hesitate to don a safety lanyard in the treestand or slap on a little extra orange heading into the field each fall.

For the life of me, I can't figure out why I didn't wear one sooner, and why other anglers refuse to do so now, when most modern life jackets are lighter, more adjustable, and in some cases, almost unnoticeable when worn.

This season don't give it a second thought. Wear your life jacket from ice out until ice up and help set a new standard that will change your brand of fishing ... in our outdoors.

consecutive days of pain in his right upper abdomen. I questioned him, looking for clues of gallstones, liver mass, or maybe an ulcer in the small bowel, but his answers did not fit my expectations. The pain was located under his right ribs and radiated into his back, just as I would expect of gallbladder disease; but it was not triggered by eating, and the way the patient described the pain did not fit the profile of an abdominal disorder. Then, a lightbulb went off; I needed to look at his skin.

I examined his right back. and sure enough there it was: a cluster of red, blistering, lesions that the patient had not yet noticed. This was not gallbladder or liver disease; it was shingles.

Shingles is a skin eruption caused by a reactivation of the varicella zoster (or chicken pox) in some people the reactivated virus can spread to areas of the body following the distribution of that spinal nerve, causing a painful blistered rash which looks like chicken pox.

The pain caused by shingles often occurs prior to the visible skin outbreaks making it easy to misdiagnose. In my few years of practice I have discovered shingles in patients complaining of ear pain, abdominal pain, and low back pain.

When administered early. antiviral medication can limit the duration of shingles and reduce the risk of post-herpetic neuralgia, a pain in the affected nerve distribution which lasts long after the rash resolves. At its worst, post-herpetic neuralgia can be a debilitating and life-long condition.

Thankfully, widespread childhood chicken pox vaccinations started in the late 1990s so decades from now, shingles may be a rare relic of the past in the United States. Until then, I will always remember to look skin deep when investigating a patient's new pain.

Rotarians DAKOTA DATEBOOK

Dakota Datebook written by town for the following year, Sarah Walker

March 29, 2021 — In 1921, the conference of the district of International Association of Rotary clubs, which are service organizations, was in Fargo. Rotarians had traveled from around the region for the two-day conference, which culminated on this date.

At the time, it was customary at these sorts of conventions for the different delegations to pull stunts, wear costumes and generally attract attention. This time did not disappoint. The delegation from Williston, for instance, represented themselves by wearing cowboy outfits, "complete down to chaps, boots, spurs and .44 caliber 'six' guns." Grand Forks also went the route of the cowboy, while Minot delegates bore their town's slogan, "Why Not Minot?" Devils Lake sent "red devils." Duluth Rotarians were trying to get the conference in their

and so they came with a band to maintain their presence.

The Bismarck delegation chose a rather different path ... 33 Rotarians, plus a few of their wives, appeared at the gathering "clad in convict suits with the words 'Cheer Up' on their breasts." They had practiced a lock-step march, in single file, each with a hand on the shoulder of the "convict" in front, and had several songs prepared, including one with a contrived rhyme scheme that stated, "We are prisoners from the Bismarck Pen, and we are sure going back again ... For we like it in that Bismarck Town where they sure do make things go around ... for our Rotary makes us like it more, and we cannot see how we got along before."

It should be noted that they did not travel to Fargo in their attire; the Bismarck Tribune reported that they were "fully aware that a straggling member in his hurry to make the train might pass before the eye of a watchful prison guard and be detained.'

However, once dressed in their costumes, they attracted a lot of attention — The Fargo Forum reporting that photographers took pictures everywhere they went.

They returned in their prison dress, to the delight of Bismarck residents who spied them departing from the train ... having advertised the capital city in a manner that was certainly quite memorable.

Directors learn about the industry as a whole by reading other materials and by attending state and national meetings. An understanding of the issues facing the industry is vital. To help directors with their responsibilities, training is offered through the electric cooperative's statewide organization. Courses cover director duties and liabilities, understanding the electric business, board roles and relationships, strategic planning and financial decision making.
